Idaho Natural's Gas Contracts Rejected in Highest State Court

BOISE, Oct. 29 (AP)—New uncertainties piled up in the southern Idaho natural gas picture today with a unanimous decision of the state supreme court rejecting the award of a distribution certificate to Idaho Natural Gas Company. The court sent the case back to the state public utilities commission with orders to hold a new hearing or award the permit to the rival Intermountain Gas Company. Writing for the court, Chief Justice C. J. Taylor attacked Idaho Natural's "unrealistic and ill-considered" application for a distribution certificate. He said the application was "unrealistic and ill-considered" because it did not take into account the needs of the public and the interests of the state.

West Rejects 'Anti-NATO' Offers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—The White House announced today that Harold E. Stassen, special assistant to President Eisenhower on disarmament, will fly to Geneva Monday to take part in the big four foreign ministers talks on curbing the arms race. The White House said that the United States will not accept any "anti-NATO" offers from the Soviet Union or other countries. Porcupine as Food Is Goal For Forester

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 28 (AP)—If you've got a right tasty recipe for porcupine barbecue, roast or irrisce, the man who wants it is here.
Ernest L. Kolbe, chief forester for the Western Pine association, is the man. Making porcupine meat is his goal.
The reason is this: Porcupines eat bark on young trees with such enthusiasm that dead and stunted trees are dotted the forest in "increasing numbers. Porcupine damage, Kolbe says, "must be kept right along with forest devastation caused by insects, diseases and forest fire." So Kolbe wants porcupines to become the prey of the thousands of hunters who go into the woods each year.
Requests to hunters to kill porcupines on sight hasn't had much effect. If there were some way of turning the animals into a good camp fire meal, then the hunters might use a bullet on them.
Kolbe said he's really serious in seeking recipe. And he doesn't want the one about barbecuing a porcupine on a board and then eating the board. "That's the only one he does know."

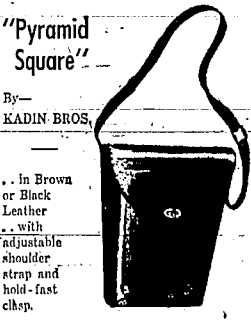

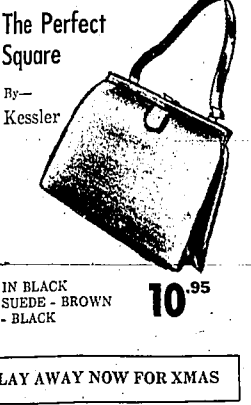

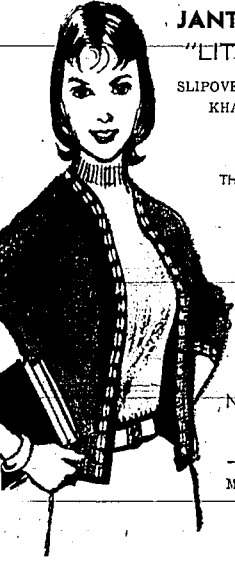

WATER RIGHTS IN JEOPARDY

With good cause, the proposed status of a century-old rule that western water rights are dependent on and determined by state law has been threatened by a Supreme Court decision in the *Beaton dam case*. The "National Reclamation Association" has been formed to combat this decision.

A serious breach of this rule has been inflicted by a Supreme Court decision in the *Beaton dam case* in Oregon. In this case the high court upheld a claim for a right to build a power plant that had been turned down by state authorities. Involved were some Indian lands and a considerable long-established irrigated area.

In ruling the court, of course, only interpreted the law. The court's decision is not a new creation. It was clearly brought out by the Reclamation association's meeting this afternoon at the long-time state seat of the National Reclamation Association in Salt Lake City. Speaking for the association was Senator Frank Brown of Wyoming, author of a bill which would repeal the association that has been a result of the court's decision. Speaking in the name of the Association were a number of prominent individuals from Idaho, including Senator Dworshak.

It is a situation in which Idaho, with an outstanding record of success in the field of reclamation, has been forced to accept a decision that would nullify all the effective safeguards for this important industry.

Those who heard Sen. Henry Dworshak's talk at the "get-acquainted" banquet of club patrons and business men at the Turf Club today, early evening, had the opportunity to witness with him afterwards, probably have even greater doubts about our relationships with Russia.

At the large airports in Russia he was surprised to witness the complete and bustling characteristic of *Luftverkehr*—flight—in New York.

While Russia's one big automobile factory with 40,000 employees does not compare in size with our automotive industry, its production and efficiency are not to be minimized.

Russia does have pretentious buildings, immense industrial plants, fine electric power generation facilities, excellent horses and dairy cattle and modern farm machinery, he found.

Topic Given For Meetings For Newsmen

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 29 (AP)—Latin-American newspapers seized in political revolts and the "baiting of the United States press against growing governmental secrecy" will be the chief topics of a meeting of the Inter-American Press Association which opened today.

More than 1,000 delegates, representing some 250 publications in North and South America, registered for the 8th-10th annual convention. Spoken-at-by government censorship would be thoroughly discussed.

A highlight of the meeting will be an address by Vice President Richard Nixon next Tuesday. He has said his address will be a major policy speech.

Another highlight will be the participation in an open forum on press and government by three former Latin-American presidents. Dr. Alberto Llerenas Camacho, former president of Colombia, and former director general of the Organization of American States, will act as moderators. Dr. Harmonio Arias, former president of Panama, and Dr. Carlos Prío GARCÍA, president of Cuba, will also participate.

Members of a permanent association of American newspaper publishers will meet in the afternoon to discuss the press in the entire hemisphere. They will present a country-by-country report on the present situation during the next two days.

Probe Asked Of Tax Case, Former Aide WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—Rep. Herman P. Eberhardt, D., Pa., today demanded a congressional inquiry into the role played by a former aide of the Internal Revenue Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews in a tax case involving the company he headed.

Eberhardt said he will ask the house ways and means committee, of which he is a member, to investigate reports that Andrews on two occasions granted relief to the company, the American Priority and Casualty company, Inc., of Richmond, Va. Andrews will leave his job as the nation's top tax collector on Monday to become chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the company.

In a letter to Secretary of Treasury George M. Humphrey earlier this month, Andrews noted that the company was in debt to \$149,000 in unpaid dollar tax case now pending in the courts.

But he said he had "not gotten into the case at all" except to inquire about its progress.

On the basis of Andrews' assurance, Humphrey told him it was "proper" for him to take the job with the company.

Eberhardt said that Andrews' letter gave the impression that he knew little about the tax case and had taken no action on it.

But he said he had heard that Andrews in July, 1953, reduced the company's assessment, which then upped certain funds of the company pending the outcome of the court case from \$200,000 to \$149,000.

In December, 1953, Eberhardt said, Andrews released the remaining \$149,000 jeopardy assessment.

New Airport Is Opened at Chicago Site

CHICAGO, Oct. 29 (AP)—Midway airport, located at terminal in the world, was given a little more "breathing space" today as Chicago opened its second airport for commercial passenger traffic.

The new terminal—O'Hare field—will handle all traffic in an all-day air show of jet planes from every military air arm in the country.

O'Hare field, located on Chicago's far northwest side, will take over five per cent of Chicago's commercial passenger traffic beginning tomorrow.

Four airlines—American, Northwest, Trans World and United—are expected to transfer 10 per cent of their schedules from Midway to O'Hare by the end of the year.

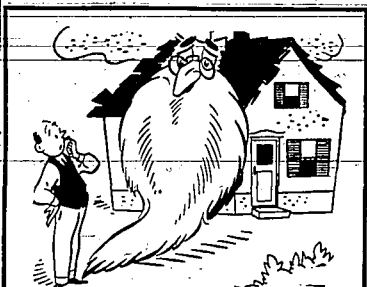

4-Year-Old Girl Is Pawn in Inter-Faiths Adoption Issue

A 4-year-old girl named Hilmy McCoy has become the pawn in an unusual legal battle in Massachusetts. Her mother is a Roman Catholic, but the couple who adopted her when she was 10 days old are Jewish. The following dispatch reviews the case and the problem of inter-faith adoptions which it raises.

BOSTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—On Feb. 23, 1951, an unmarried student nurse gave birth to a healthy, normal girl at Kenmore hospital. Ten days later, mother and daughter left the hospital by separate paths.

The child, Hilmy McCoy, was welcomed eagerly into the home of a childless Jewish couple, Melvin and Frances Ellis of Brookline.

The mother—Marjorie McCoy—dropped from sight.

Ordinarily the story should have ended there, like so many others in which a mother cannot keep her child and turns the child over to foster-parents.

It would have ended there but for a minor legal technicality. Marjorie McCoy's signature on the original adoption petition was not notarized immediately. This technicality nullified the Ellis adoption petition and ordered Hilmy restored to her natural mother.

Appeal were filed. Hilmy remained with the Ellises. On Feb. 14, 1952, the Massachusetts supreme court upheld the Reynolds decision and the validity of the 1950 state law prohibiting inter-faith adoptions "whenever practical." On June 15, 1952, Reynolds ordered the "Ellises" to surrender the child within four months. The Ellises made such efforts but within a week of July 1, they took Hilmy to Massachusetts. Her natural mother has been issued for their arrest.

Inter-faith adoptions are approximately 100,000 a year. The Inter-faith Adoption Council, a United Press survey shows, has approximately 100,000 religious background either agency policy or through the courts which give final approval to them.

First-Hand Observer Gives Searching View to Russia's "New Look," Deeds

How genuine is the "new look" in Russia? Does it extend right down to the Soviet people? In an outstanding position to judge is Henry Shapiro, U.S. news correspondent in Moscow from 1937 to 1953. Shapiro has just returned to Moscow after a two-year stay in the United States. The UP assigned Shapiro, as his first task, to give his verdict on whether Russia has really undergone a change of heart. In question and answer form, here is his report:

Q. Do the Russian newspapers ever make fun of their own country? **A.** Definitely yes. World tensions have gradually been reduced since the end of the Korean war, culminating with the Geneva conference. Aside from the progress toward normalization of east-west relations in the last two years, there is growing realization there is a military stalemate as the result of nuclear weapons which make war mutually suicidal. The H-bomb is probably the strongest single deterrent to war.

Q. Do you think the likelihood of war with Russia has lessened? **A.** Definitely yes. World tensions have gradually been reduced since the end of the Korean war, culminating with the Geneva conference. Phyllis Leber, Moscow, vice chairman of the Republican state-central committee, urged the young Republicans to take an active part in the senior GOP organization.

Stevenson Bid For '56 Fight Now Expected

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson will enter a number of presidential primaries in an aggressive campaign for the Democratic nomination in 1956, sources said today.

Supporters of the former Illinois governor predicted he will announce his participation in primary contests at the same time he formally announces his candidacy for the nomination. That will be soon, they said.

There was one report that the announcement would be made tonight at a meeting of Democratic leaders in New York City, where Stevenson is to speak.

Stevenson's associates here were inclined to doubt that. But they admitted an announcement, coupled with a statement that Stevenson will accept a state of delegates in the Minnesota primary, if "possible."

Stevenson is said to have been advised that he can make a good race in the Minnesota primary. Minnesota's is the second of the presidential primaries, to be held next March 20, a week after New Hampshire's.

Democrats supporting other candidates expect Stevenson to enter some presidential primaries. Local supporters of Sen. Ross B. Slaughter, D., Tenn., regarded Stevenson's entry in the Minnesota primary as a certainty.

'Loud Talk, Few Actions' Charged

DUQUITH, Minn., Oct. 29 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson declared tonight that the Republican administration has brought "three years of loud talk and little action."

Stevenson, who has not announced his intentions but continues to talk like a man who will accept a second serious Democratic presidential nomination, assailed the administration record in general and hit particularly at its farm program and foreign relations.

Tiff Develops Over McKay April Speech

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—The Democrats and Republicans got into a "he-did-the-dirty" argument today over whether Secretary of the Interior McKay said in 1953 that "we're here in the saddle as an administration representing business and industry."

The Republican national committee on its part said McKay was in "outstanding mistake" in an article in the November issue of the Democratic Digest, A. No. 1, which listed the digest's statement that McKay said in 1953 McKay told the U. S. chamber of commerce:

"We're here in the saddle as an administration representing business and industry."

"The statement has been wrenched out of context and is misquoted," the Republican committee said.

"What McKay said, according to the official transcript made by the chamber of commerce, was: 'The thing I want to say to you business men and women today is that as an administration representative of business and industry we are here on trial and all of you folks in business must be very, very careful to see that the United States business man only asks for his fair share of the profits of business. That's the thing I'm most concerned about.'"

McKay spoke before the chamber April 29, 1953.

The Democratic national committee, in a rebuttal, said it based its digest statement on an Associated Press dispatch which said in part: "What McKay said to the businessmen and a member of a business team, the (McKay) admonished: 'We're here in the saddle as an administration representative of business and industry.'"

To get the thing settled, the AP went to the chamber headquarters today. There, a tape recording made of McKay's speech as he delivered it, contained these words:

"The thing I want to say to you business men and women today is that we are in the saddle as an administration representative of business and industry."

It went on to say that "we're here on trial" and the businessmen should not ask for more than a "fair share of the profits of business."

The AP quoted these words about profit in the first paragraph of its story. The Democratic Digest did not quote them.

National Park Tourist Plans Being Set up

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—The government is about to complete arrangements for a 10-million-dollar development to take care of visitors to Yellowstone national park.

A spokesman for the national park service said William Nichols, president of the Yellowstone Park company, Bozeman, Mont., is meeting with officials of the service to conclude agreements to be contained in a new two-year contract with the company.

In many of the big national parks the accommodations for tourists are operated by private companies under contracts with park service. Yellowstone Park company holds such a contract.

Details of the Yellowstone program remain to be worked out. The park service spokesman explained that the main issue in the negotiations has been "what the company should do to make more adequate provisions for the increasing number of overnight visitors."

"The company," he said, "has agreed to a \$10-million-dollar improvement program to be carried out over the next three years.

"In principle the company has agreed to a proposal suggested by the park service that over the long-range period it will make improvements amounting to 700 million dollars should be provided. The exact part of the program has not been spelled out.

The spokesman said final agreement was expected soon on the main provisions but that it would probably take about two weeks to prepare the contract which will be approved by the involved parties.

After final approval by the company and the interior department, the contract must be submitted to congressional committees before it can become effective.

Limts Noted To Vets' Pay

Veterans and widows receiving non-service-connected pension payments from the veterans administration are urged by Arnold Helwege, VA manager here, to keep an accurate check on their income to be sure it does not exceed statutory limits.

Under existing law, Helwege says, annual income in excess of specified amounts may result in denial of benefits. When income is received in excess of these amounts, VA is required by law to stop pension payments.

In those cases where the VA is notified promptly, pension payments will be discontinued only on the last payment date. However, where the veteran or widow fails to notify the VA promptly, discontinuance will be retroactive to Jan. 1 of the calendar year in which the excessive income was received.

Income limitations for any calendar year are \$1,400 for a veteran without a wife or child, or a widow without children, and \$1,700 for a veteran or widow with such dependents.

Credit Curbs To Be Cut if Building Off

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—FHA Commissioner Norman Mason has promised to loosen the curbs on mortgage credit if new home building drops sharply.

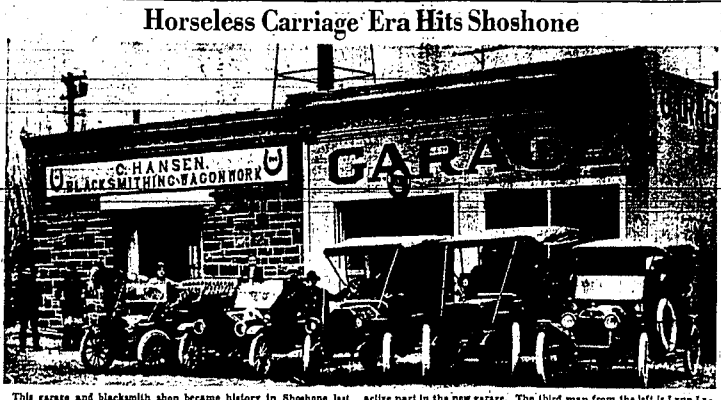

Admiral Byrd Slates Jaunt To Earth's Big 'Deep Freeze'

 NEW YORK, Oct. 29 (AP)—Once upon a time there lived, in a state called Virginia, three brothers named Tom, Dick and Harry. But they were not just any Tom, Dick and Harry. Their last name was Byrd.

Tom grew up to be a farmer. Harry became a U. S. senator. And Dick became, in time, the greatest American explorer of the earth.

It has not been recorded what the unpopular one, Tom, thought as he watched the exploits of the other two. But Dick once recalled, "Tom, he just sits there and he watches us, and then he kinds of shakes his head."

Dick, who was named Richard Evelyn after his father, is a compact, pipe-puffing man with a prominent nose and a friendly, southern laugh that goes "yah, yah, yah, yah." As Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, he has been the type who gets things done, a "doer."

But when you know him, he turns out to be sort of a dreamer.

Once again, as if he's ready to shove off on an expedition bound for that misty region that explorers were called "the unknown," this will be Admiral Byrd's fifth expedition to the lost, utterly dead, continent called Antarctica.

At this time they'll set up a base at the loneliest, coldest (100 below), deadliest, most inaccessible place on earth—the south pole—where only Amundsen and Scott have stood before, with their persons, though.

And soon which only Amundsen emerged. Scott, the heroic Englishman, and his entire party died on the long walk of agony back to the sea.

In the south pole is 10,000 feet high, in the middle of the world's largest and highest plateau, atop an icecap 500,000 square miles in area. It is a hell flock that shrouds a continent nearly as big as South America and larger than Australia and the United States combined.

Because of its killing cold and direct aspect, the continent holds no life, not even a germ or virus of the common influenza—except at its coasts, where seals and penguins play.

Most of this continent has never been seen. We know less about it, as one with his eyes, than we do about the sunlit side of the moon.

If ever a man feared to know more about it—to look where no man has looked before—that is Richard E. Byrd.

Between flights, he puffed his pipe and talked his dream—that someday Antarctica would become a big deep freezer for mankind; a place that would banish famine from the earth.

"The nations of the world may someday use this great refrigerator," he said. "When countries have a bumper crop, they can put the surplus down here for use in famine years. The world food supply will even out."

There's no doubt that the perpetual cold beneath the icecap surface will keep food. We ate, in 1947, food that Byrd had put in snow-tunnel caches 30 years before, on his first expedition.

The admiral loves that forsaken place. "I feel better down here," he used to say, squinting out over the soundless, antiseptic wastes. And when we left, he tacked up a little note in his hut: "This has been a peaceful place. I destroyed better than to be vandalized. Otherwise—welcome."

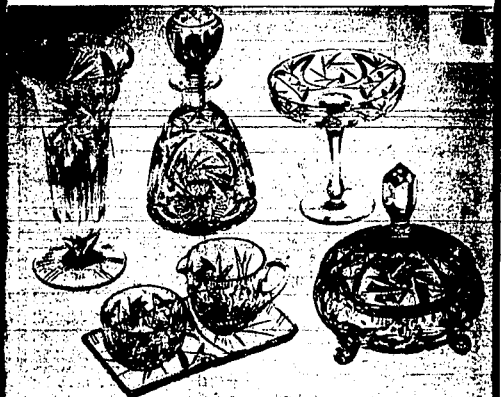

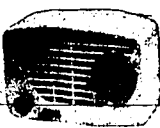

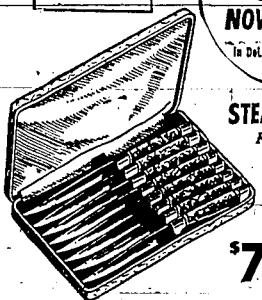

Small-Scaled Arabian Battles May Have Big Repercussions

LONDON, Oct. 29—A battle between two handfuls of soldiers in the Arabian peninsula has brought to a climax the latest dispute over the Buraimi oasis. The dispute involves, on the surface, a date palm oasis, a few square miles in area, dotted by nine Arab villages.

It has brought charges of bribery running into scores of millions of dollars. It has embittered relations between Great Britain and Saudi Arabia. Affected also, indirectly, are relations between Britain and the United States.

The reason is that Buraimi is an oil field of possibly fabulous value. The issue is whether the United States-owned Arabian American Oil Company (ARAMCO) or the British-owned Iraq Petroleum Oil Company shall get the prospecting rights.

Saudi Arabia does business with ARAMCO. Its royalties from ARAMCO's exploitation of Saudi Arabia oil make King Saud one of the wealthiest men in the world.

Buraimi has been in dispute for 20 years. It lies between Saudi Arabia and a group of Arab sheikdoms protected by Great Britain.

There have been a number of little clashes between Saudi Arabian and rival Arab troops in the oasis.

Britain and Saudi Arabia have agreed to submit the dispute to arbitration by a special tribunal meeting in Geneva, Switzerland.

The British member of the tribunal resigned and walked out on Sept. 17. He charged that the Saudi Arabians were resorting to bribery, and that the ruling was followed on Oct. 4 with some startling charges. It said King Saud had offered a bribe of \$4 million dollars to a brother of the ruling sheik of Abu Dhabi, in whose territory the oasis is located.

Britain charged that the idea was to cause a split in the royal-family and overthrow the ruling sheik. But the brother reported to the British instead.

Prime Minister Anthony Eden announced the most recent development in the house of commons.

King Saud had moved some of his troops into the oasis. Eden announced that he had informed the sheik of Abu Dhabi and the sultan of Muscat, who also has an interest in Buraimi, that the attempt to arbitrate the dispute had failed.

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U. S. Diplomat Needs Praise, Claims Byrnes

NEW YORK, Oct. 29 (AP)—James F. Byrnes, former secretary of state, says the time has come to halt political attacks on the nation's diplomats.

The Alger Hiss case, he says, served as a stimulus for unfortunate and unfair criticism of the entire state department.

Describing career members of the foreign service as "our first line of defense in peacetime," Byrnes writes in Collier's magazine: "The time has come to stop shooting our sentries."

"If our men and women of our diplomatic establishment continue to be the objects of political attacks, of ridicule, neglect and mismanagement, if public confidence is not reinvigorated in the quality and dedication of their service, the result could be national disaster."

According to Byrnes, who attended the Yalta conference as director of war mobilization, Hiss conferred there each day with Secretary of State Stettinius and H. H. Hopkins, adviser to President Roosevelt.

"I do not know the extent of his (Hiss') influence upon them," Byrnes writes.

"But I think it is only fair to say that the mistakes of Yalta, revealed with all the benefits of hindsight, were made on Hiss and on considerations in which Mr. Hiss could hardly have been a decisive or dominant factor."

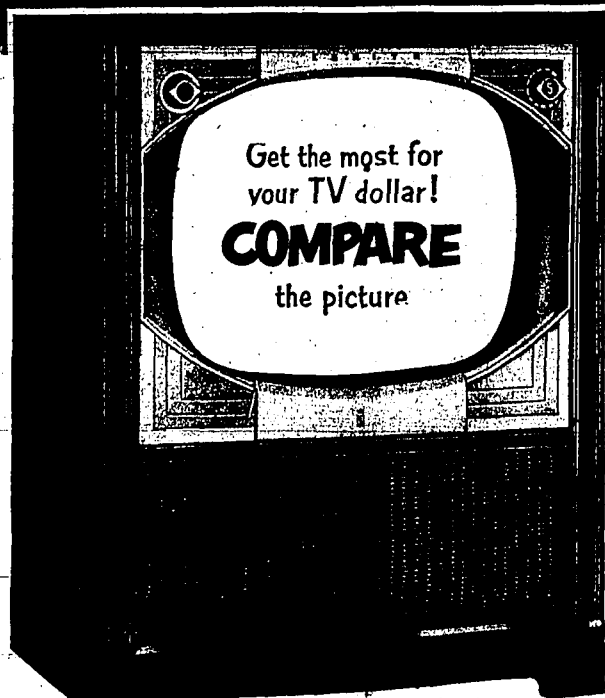

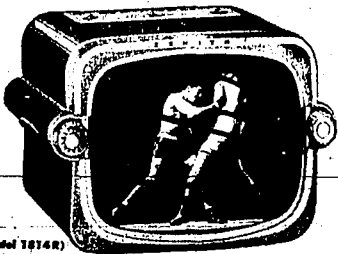
