India's people, a richly colorful nation of varied races, religions and customs live in an area of 2,959,000 square miles, less than half that of the United States.

Agriculture is the country's main lifeline. It provides the livelihood of 70 per cent of the people.

During the seven years between 1949 and 1954 India has to import nearly 10,210,000 tons of cereals to feed its people. Up to August this year, imports totaled only 426,000 tons of wheat and 265,000 tons of rice.

In addition to growing enough food for present needs, the government has enough food grains in storage to meet any unexpected reverse in production during next year.

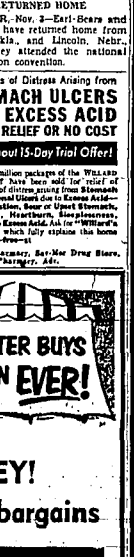

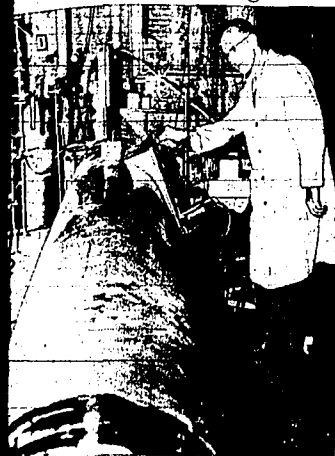

Solar Energy Aid to Water Deserts Told

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 3 (AP)—Solar energy some day will in effect make rivers flow backwards, from the sea to the land, supply desert regions with life-giving water, a leading American researcher in sun power asserted yesterday.

The spectacular feat will be achieved, by using the sun's energy to distill and purify ocean water to give it a grade for human consumption, for irrigation and for industrial use, said Dr. Maria Telkes, of New York University.

Dr. Telkes, who has developed a small sun still that produces pure water at costs approaching those prevailing in desert areas, addressed the world symposium on applied solar energy.

The symposium, held in Arizona because of its plentiful sunshine, low rainfall and growing need for fresh water, brought together scientists from about 30 countries around the globe.

Opening the symposium sessions here after two days of technical meetings in Tucson, Henry B. Barrent, head of the organization behind the project, announced plans for the building of a "laboratory of the sun" in this country.

Open to All
The laboratory, Barrent said, will be open to scientists in all countries who are interested in solar research and will have access to the body of all technical information so far accumulated.

Barrent is president of the Association for Applied Solar Energy and also president of the American and Foreign Power company, with widespread holdings in Central and South America. The association is the moving force behind the symposium and much of the work done in this country so far.

Dividends Ready For GI Insurance

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—The veterans administration announced yesterday it will pay about 210 million dollars in dividends on life insurance policies next year.

The payments will represent regular annual dividends on national service life insurance originated in World War II and the U. S. government life insurance of World War I.

Eligible policy holders, VA said, will receive their payments shortly after the anniversary date of their policies, beginning in January and continuing through December.

Youths in Jerome Collect for Funds

JEROME, Nov. 3—More than 100 boys and girls of the Jerome council of churches canvassed Jerome for contributions for the relief of underprivileged children on Halloween night.

The \$18,750 collected will be sent to the United Nations International Children's Emergency fund for food and medical supplies to be sent to all parts of the globe.

Following the canvassing, the children met at their various churches for games, dancing and refreshments.

New Drug Is Acclaimed on Tuberculosis

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Scientists said today they are very optimistic about a dramatic new form of streptomycin which promises to make the treatment of tuberculosis more effective and far safer than it is now.

The new drug is said to eliminate the deafness, dizziness, and other side effects which have constituted the chief deterrent and most serious limitation in the prolonged use of ordinary streptomycin.

The German scientists who developed the drug gave a glowing report on its merits in a paper presented to the food and drug administration's third annual symposium on antibiotics. It was the first such report given in this country.

Dr. Henry Welch, chairman of the symposium and the government's top expert on antibiotics, said the new streptomycin hasn't been tried yet in this country.

"But if it performs the way the Germans say it does," he said, "it may affect the entire method of treating tuberculosis in the United States."

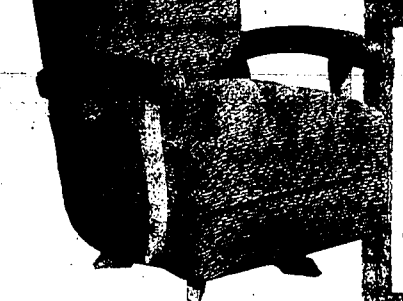

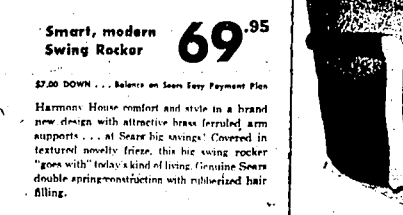

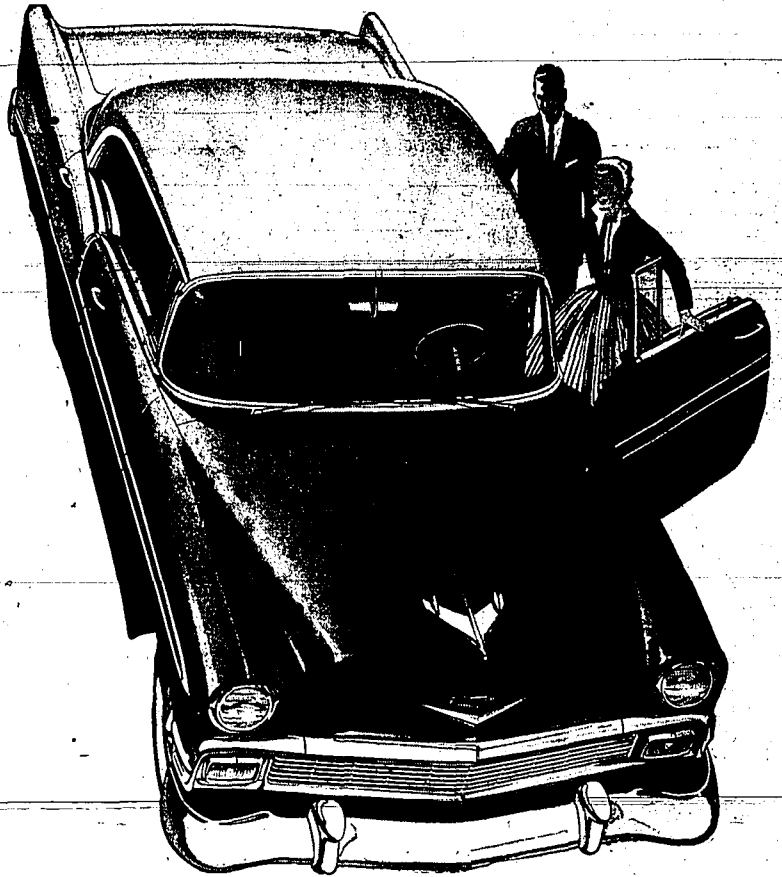

Czech Blasts Phony Soviet Peace Efforts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—The death of a young Czech in the Middle East, proves that communists' spirit of Geneva peace conference is a fake, a former Czech diplomat said today.

Jura Slavik, who broke with the Reds in 1948, said in an exclusive interview that the communists are using guns made available by the end of the Geneva and Moscow wars to stir up new trouble of an anti-Jewish complexion in the Middle East.

Danger Noted
The Czech sale of arms, pushed by Russia, is a dangerous strategy which reveals the spirit of Geneva program as a fake, Slavik said.

The communists are using the slogan to gain time by smokes for their treachery.

Slavik has been working here since 1948 for a free Czechoslovakia. He resigned to say that because here that a few days after the Reds took over his homeland.

Slavik said the former Skoda munitions factories and other arms works are being made into people communities. Factories are located at Pilsen, Dubnica, Brno and Tuzova. The former Tuzova munitions factory, he said, is producing heavy weapons and industrial goods for the Red army.

The Czech factories are known to be turning out Soviet-designed tanks, trucks, and jet fighters, planes and other modern weapons. The Czechs have boasted that their military machine is in the Korean war. Arms have been going into Red China from Czechoslovakia for a long time.

Truman Lauds Harriman for Russian Stand

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—President Truman today lauded Averell Harriman, governor of New York and prominent member of the Democratic presidential campaign, in the first volume of the ex-president's memoirs, published Wednesday.

Truman says Harriman performed "world service" as the country's ambassador to Moscow and he gave him urgent personal advice that the United States stand firm against a possible Soviet "barbarian invasion of Europe."

"At this point," Truman relates, "I urged Harriman to stand firm and not be afraid of the Russians and that I intended to be firm. I would be fair, of course, to the Russians and I needed us more than he needed them."

Excerpts from the Truman memoirs have been published in Life magazine and the New York Times. The complete first volume, "Years of Decision," is published by Doubleday and company (\$5) and contains many added details.

The portions of the book praising Harriman have usual interest in the light of Truman's recent statements describing the New York governor as exceptionally well qualified for the Democratic presidential nomination. Truman also has said here-fore, in not backing away from Adlai E. Stevenson, the 1952 Democratic nominee.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—Another rise in metal prices is threatening today to plague the manufacturers of many of the goods you want to buy.

The price of copper has jumped in London again, and users here are wondering what's in store. Producers of nickel have raised the price charge on their Canadian customers.

Platinum has gone up as an ounce a price five per cent. A few agricultural products have risen.

Properly labeled the cause of much of the inflation in the metal markets of recent weeks and months. General prosperity around the world is being reflected in the demand for metal—for cars, refrigerators, TV sets and the multitude of things that men want in order raise their standards of living.

The world prosperity has encouraged labor to ask higher wages. With demand for metals rising and the cost of mining and processing it also rising, the metal forces have united to boost the price of most metals high above their levels of recent years.

New Terms Used In News Banning

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Congressional action on a committee disclosed yesterday that about 30 new classifications have been created to keep non-security government information from the public.

The classifications include such designations as "need to know" and "medical-private."

The disclosure was made by a special house committee created this year to study government information policies and to determine whether the public is being deprived by federal agencies of information which it could have without jeopardizing security.

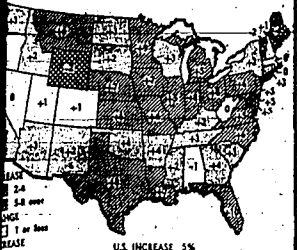

Many Meats Rate Special Tag in Mart

By The Associated Press
You'll find bargain aplenty in food stores this week in beef, lamb, pork and poultry.

Once again, pork is the star attraction. Pork prices on the down-grade since summer, have taken one of their biggest tumble yet—in some cities you'll find prices of center cut pork chops down as much as 14 cents a pound from a week ago.

Roads from the coast to coast featured week-end "special" in supermarica from coast to coast. There's some indication, though, that pork prices may have finally hit bottom. Wholesale quotations are up about two cents a pound this week—a hint that retail prices may soon go higher.

Chickens Lower
Frying chickens are lower in many parts of the country; price cuts average about 10 cents a pound.

Turkeys are on the week-end special list in some eastern cities, but as low as they were at Thanksgiving time last year. The big birds are fetching a price a cent or two more at wholesale than a year ago, mainly because farmers aren't raising quite so many as last year.

Beef fanciers are likely to find slightly lower prices this week on post-rib and sirloin steaks, round, brisket, and top-and-bottom round. Wholesale prices are down a shade.

Lamb to Plentiful
Lamb is plentiful. Roast leg of lamb is moderately priced; lamb chops about 12 cents a pound are down a few cents in price.

There are plenty of good buys in ham, whether of the smoked, picnic or "fresh" variety. Veal prices in several cities are a little higher.

Leafy vegetables head the bargain parade in produce this week. Iceberg lettuce from California is being prominently featured all over the country; prices in the east start at around 16 to 17 cents a head. Outstanding buys among these vitamin-rich greens are endive, escarole, collards and kale.

Best vegetable buys still include potatoes and onions. Cabbage is in good supply, along with bunched beets and carrots.

Fruits Available
Grapefruit and oranges are abundant and moderately priced. Frozen orange juice, an excellent buy right now, may go up a little in price soon.

Apples are still abundant and cheap; grapes from west coast vineyards are plentiful, with the superior and luscious varieties providing the best bargain.

Raspberries and strawberries are now available at moderate prices. Cantaloupes and honeydew melons are higher.

Credit Curbs For Housing May Loosen

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—Federal Housing Administrator Albert M. Cole said today that the recently imposed "moderate" housing credit will be removed as soon as conditions permit.

He said the reins were tightened on housing credit to prevent even a mild inflation. The new requirements reduced the maximum mortgage maturity from 30 to 25 years, and increased the minimum down payment on homes from five to seven per cent.

"The purpose was to anticipate possible inflation—not the old-fashioned printing press inflation resorted to by insolvent governments, but the sort that can arise in an economy of abundance when demand for certain products shows signs of exceeding the supply immediately available," Cole said.

He said that better homes and better living conditions is the goal for all Americans.

"The housing picture in the United States is a very good picture indeed," he said. "Whatever moderate check has been placed on new housing starts will not alter that picture."

Chickens Are Now Happier, States Expert

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—You probably hadn't realized it, but the truth is that chickens are getting happier all the time. This, in spite of the fact that they're working longer hours and at something of a speed-up.

Chicken creature comforts are the answer.

Chicken farmers are happier, too. They don't have to sit up with their chickens any more. Automatic gaugels turn on the lights an hour or so before dawn, automatic feeders switch on, and the hens go to work while the farmer snoozes.

This, and other chicken intelligence is from a chubby, high-spirited name called Everett Keen, who broke off the conversation in his hotel room from time to time to peck at two dozen baby chicks scattered about in his bathtub. Half a dozen more, just hatched, by drying out on a towel.

Keen just performed three or four caesarians. Keen said, "I didn't like the way the chicks were breaking the air of the egg shell."

Keen is in the business of making chickens comfortable. He makes chicken furniture, a comfortable chicken is a happy chicken, and a happy chicken lays more eggs and grows faster into a hefty fryer or broiler.

Big Help Found

"They've been found at Penn State university farm, that's where the year around, they'll lay more and grow faster," he said. "Now we know whether any farmer is going to air condition their hen houses very soon, but you can bet there'll be some sides in that direction eventually."

Keen, who makes his furniture at Millfield, N. J., was cited when interviewed to show his work at the mid-Atlantic state farm and home show at Atlantic City. His gadgets include an automatic, clock-started feeder, automatic sanitary drink fountain, ventilated meat chiller and roaster, egg washers that employ jet streams of air, hospitals for the sick, and play rooms for the growing birds.

He also makes "chicken specs," which in reality are not specs at all but blinds. Sometimes steel, they fit on like spectacles but the chickens think they're wearing them and see anything straight ahead of it.

Use Explained

Keen explained their use. Hens begin laying eggs at six or seven months, and for this production they don't need roosters. So most egg-producing flocks don't have roosters among them.

With nobody to rule the roost, the hens, who are rather high strung anyway, get to bickering, start stepping each other down and hen-pecking each other. The cure, Keen says, is to put on the blinds. "The blinds are put on at about six months."

"How long are they left on?"

"For the duration," Keen said.

Tell of Struggle

Holland Lecturer Recounts Struggle for Untapped Land

NEW YORK (INRA)—Victor DeBruyn, 41, who has lived in the jungle highlands of New Guinea through the hardships of peace and the ordeal of war, has come to America to tell a story he knows well—the fight of the Dutch colonies to hold their New Guinea soil against Indonesia's pressing claims.

Here with his wife for a national lecture tour, DeBruyn reports the Dutch still holding the upper hand in the struggle for this giant island remnant of Holland's East Indies empire, a struggle that has raged since 1945, when the U. S. and Indonesian efforts to infiltrate small military detachments among New Guinea's natives.

The price in this contest is strange, thinly-populated land of largely untapped or unknown resources. A country of jungle-clad mountains reaching to 16,000 feet, of huge swamps and broad lakes, of eternal snows and fertile tropical soil.

Perhaps a million natives live scattered across New Guinea's coastal plains and central highlands. You can walk days and never see another human. In the high country, you can find some of the world's last primitive men, who labor still with stone instead of metal and may carry spears—the cause that makes noise.

DeBruyn slimly built with intense brown eyes and glowing hair, knows the region thoroughly. For 17 years he has served the Dutch colonial government in or near New Guinea, first as a district administrator in the highlands and now as a trainer of new administrators in the northern coastal town of Hollandia.

In World War II DeBruyn acted as his highland outpost, defied Japanese surrender demands and took off for the hills to set up an intelligence lookout with a band of 40 stone-age natives as his eyes and ears. For two years he endured reports of Japanese activities to Australia. So great was the enemy menace it took DeBruyn three months to cover the last 20 miles to the coast when he was ordered to evacuate in 1944.

After the war he came back and Indonesia's battle for independence from Dutch rule. In a 1949 treaty with the Dutch, the Indonesian government agreed to control of much of the Netherlands East Indies—but not New Guinea.

Since then they have tried endlessly to add its 160,000 square miles to their sprawling island straits.

Treatment for Burma Chief Is Paying Off

The red carpet treatment which the Kremlin has given to Prime Minister U Nu of Burma during his visit to Russia seems to be paying off in a big way. In various speeches, he has pictured Russia, under its communist dictatorship, as being about as nice a country as could be imagined.

U Nu worked up to a climax yesterday when he invited Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Communist chief Nikita S. Khrushchev to visit Burma and they accepted.

He previously had made the startling proposal at a dinner in Moscow Tuesday night that the Soviet Union should be invited to the next conference of the Asian-African bloc of countries.

Nikita S. Khrushchev, the first secretary of the Russian Communist party, interrupted him to greet heartily Khrushchev said that such an invitation would strengthen world peace.

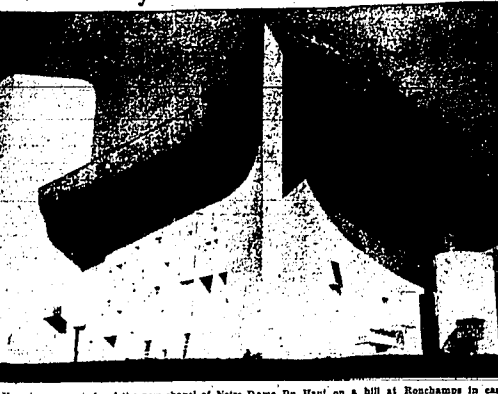
Moscow dispatches said that diplomats of other countries which belong to the 29-nation African-Asian bloc organization were most startled and embarrassed by Nu's statement.

It was noted that when Nu arrived in Russia, he was given a reception more elaborate than any accorded any foreign visitor except Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India.

U Nu and Nehru are fellow "nationalists." They oppose western "colonialism" and "imperialism," and are for the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

U Nu has reaffirmed his views on those issues in speeches he has made in Russia. He also announced that he wants to buy industrial equipment from Russia and import Russian engineers to handle it.

Study of Unusual Architecture

America's Big Cities Join in Battles To Eliminate All Conditions for Smog

America's big cities have become partners of industry in a multimillion dollar battle against smog. Practically every city with a heavy industrial concentration has its bureau of "air pollution control."

The industries themselves, prodded by smoke-control ordinances and public opinion, are spending huge sums to avert their breath.

In some cities the battle is almost won. Pittsburgh, once the butt of vaudeville jokes because of its smoky skies, hasn't had a bad attack of smog in years.

But in others, including New York and Los Angeles, the anti-smog campaign is relatively new and still without clear and dramatic results.

A United Press survey of air pollution control programs in 10 heavily industrialized areas indicates smog is being recognized as a problem that cannot be solved by passing an anti-smog law or hoping for a change in the weather.

Instead, it is being pursued through scientific avenues and through public education programs designed to make everyone smoke-conscious from factory owners to householders with trash-burners in their backyards.

Air pollution exists to some extent wherever there is industry. Factory smokestacks, railroad engines and automobiles pour fumes and soot into the air constantly. Most of the pollution is blown away.

The more familiar term "smog" was coined to describe the condition when smoke and dust combine with a moisture and low-lying fog to form a choking and blinding envelope of air. Freakish weather conditions are usually part of the picture.

Some cities, either by their geographic location, are more prone to smog than others. San Francisco, though heavily industrialized, seldom has smog due to a built-in system—prevailing westerly winds from the Pacific ocean.

Los Angeles, on the other hand, sits in a basin that makes it especially vulnerable to "temperature inversions" in which a layer of warm air filled with smoke and fumes is held close to the earth by a layer of cold air on top.

New Bomber Eyed Now by Navy Forces

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Assistant Navy Secretary James H. Smith, Jr., disclosed today that the navy, which has just successfully tested the world's first multi-jet airplane, now is pointing toward a supersonic sea-based bomber.

At the same time Smith opened the door to a compromise in what has appeared to be a growing air force-navy controversy over the revolutionary new airplane now ordered into production by the navy.

Smith, assistant secretary for air, said in an interview that he sees no objection to the air force also buying some of the jet airplanes if it can use them.

The atom-bomb carrying airplane—the "Puff"—Steamer—built by Glenn L. Martin company of Baltimore—more—streaked the impressive speed over the upper Chesapeake bay.

The sleek, streamlined seaplane, powered by four jet engines atop its swept back wings, demonstrated two capabilities that compare favorably with any modern land-based bomber: (1) a speed of about 600 miles per hour at very low altitudes, and (2) an ability to take off after a run of only about one mile.

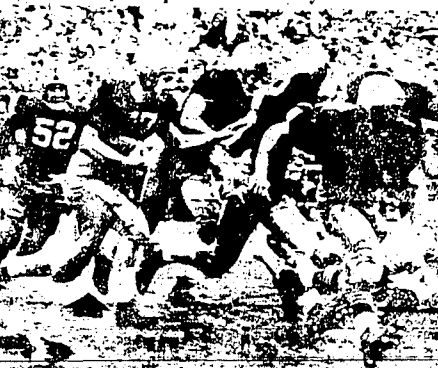

Langlie Says He Will Back Ike's Choice

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP) — Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington announced today that if President Eisenhower did not seek re-election in 1956 he would "give a lot of weight" to the man Mr. Eisenhower might name to replace him.

"The President is in a pretty good condition to give me and any other American good advice since he's been working with the men from whom he might pick a candidate and knows their qualifications," Langlie told a press conference.

The Washington governor, here to speak before a "pulse of the nation" forum dinner at the National Republican Club in New York City, said in his state were in a "standby" stage waiting to see what President Eisenhower decides.

"They are highly pleased with what the President has done," Langlie said, "they are now in a standby stage of waiting to see if Mr. Eisenhower is going to run again or who he will endorse."

"I believe that situation will continue at least until January or February."

Langlie, only man to serve three terms as governor of his state, said he did not think an "Eisenhower ticket" necessarily would help him if he decides to run against Senator Warren G. Magnuson, D., Wash., in 1956.

"I don't think the President could help me," he said, "I'd just have to go out and prove to the people of Washington that I would make a better governor than Magnuson."

Langlie, who has spent 20 years in public life, would not say definitely if he would be a candidate against Magnuson but he made it fairly certain he would not seek a fourth term as governor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP) — Singer Lu Ann Simms, who was dropped from the Arthur Godfrey family last week, landed temporarily in the Jackie Gleason family.

OBS-TV announced that Miss Simms will make a guest appearance on "Stage Show" this Nov. 12. The program, produced by Jackie Gleason, will be Miss Simms' first TV assignment since her split with Godfrey.

McCarthy Hit By Ruling in Kamin Trial

BOSTON, Nov. 3 (AP) — In an opinion asserting Sen. McCarthy, R., Wis., had no right to engage in a general fishing expedition while holding a hearing at a one-man subcommittee, U. S. District Judge Bailey Aldrich Wednesday threw out four of six counts against a witness cited for contempt of congress.

Without hearing the defense, the judge acquitted Leon J. Kamin, 37, on two counts and dismissed two others. That left two counts for the defense to answer when trial resumes Thursday after a one-day suspension.

After an earlier mistrial with a jury, Kamin now is being tried without a jury.

Kamin, a former research assistant at Harvard, now a research psychologist at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., appeared before McCarthy at a public hearing of the senate permanent investigations subcommittee in Boston Jan. 15, 1954.

Kamin refused to name his associates, invoking the free speech provisions of the first amendment and asserting he would not become "a political informant" for these referrals, six in number, he was cited for contempt.

Reds Seek to Ease Israel's Fear on Arms

GENEVA, Nov. 3 (AP) — Russia has sought to assure uneasy Israel she will not be hurt by the flow of red arms to Egypt, diplomatic informants here reported.

Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, at the same time, was said to have refused to block the sale of Czechoslovakian war goods to the Jewish state's longtime enemy.

He served notice of this in talks with U. S. Secretary of State Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan and Premier Moathe Sharmet of Israel.

Sharmet went to Molotov Monday night to protest that injection of heavy war goods into the Middle East, and especially into the Arab states bordering Israel, might touch off new Arab-Jewish fighting that could expand.

In explanation, the informant

said, Molotov made it clear Russia's intrusion in the area was provoked by development of the Baghdad defense pact sponsored by the United States and Britain.

Why should she? I echoed. How about that soul-wrenching rendition of Group Capt. Peter Townsend? How about the shattering of her youthful dreams? How about the bleak life of spinsterhood that faces her now? How about those lonely nights?
Nonsense, he said. Margaret never intended to marry Townsend. You can't put me off that way, I

say. All over the world there is lamentation at the end of the affair. It stands for the bravery and nobility of the princess, scorn for the powers who bent her to their will. Why a newspaper here even claims it is such a great love story we will be telling our grandchildren about it.
Is it, asked the friend, the same paper that said in 1936 that we would be telling our grandchildren about the Duke and Duchess of Windsor?
Suppose, I said scornfully, you tell me what you THINK is the truth behind the romance.
"All right," he said, "but you won't be popular with the gum-chewing stenographers."

"First, at no time did Margaret seriously consider marriage with Townsend.
"The meetings here were his idea. He bombarded her with phone calls and messages till she agreed.
"She told members of the royal family: 'This man was my hero and my friend. I must see him.' It is his holiday.
"She was not a victim of pressure by the royal family. They did not like Townsend as an in-law and told her so. But if she had changed her mind and decided to marry him, they would not have tried to stop her.

Hope Raised
For Peace in
Vessel Strife

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3 (AP)—APL licensees today were expected to stamp their approval of a new contract marking "historic" progress toward bringing permanent peace to west coast waterfront.

Maritime spokesmen hoped that the new pact would end—for three years at least—labor strife that has beset the shipping industry for the last three decades. No other west coast industry has been harder hit by work stoppages over the years.

APL stevedore leaders last week joined the sailors and the cooks and stewards of Harry Lundberg's AFL Seafarers International union in approving the new contract.

Key provisions are these:

It will run for three years; there will be no delay of ship sailings by refusal of the seamen to sign on or for any other reason; any disputes will be settled by grievance machinery.

Begin Voting

Union leaders recommended approval of the contract and the sailors already have done so. The cooks and stewards are in the process of okaying theirs and the first men begin voting today.

After all three are approved, master contracts will be signed by the GPU and the Pacific Maritime association, American President lines and Pacific Far East lines.
