WESTERN, Nov. 4 (AP)—The western big three asked Russia today to agree to free German elections next September as a forerunner to reunification but ran into a stone wall.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. Molotov, who met with representatives from Germany and the Bonn Republic, reiterated his demand that representatives from Communist Germany and the Bonn Republic be summoned to discuss the reunification problem.

BOISE, Nov. 4 (AP)—The state board of education plans to appoint a committee next week to evaluate the state school for the deaf and blind at Gooding.

Idaho Power Given Permit to Begin on Dams Immediately

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—The federal power commission issued a permit today authorizing Idaho Power company to proceed immediately with construction of the Oxbow and Brownie dams on the Snake river in the Hells canyon area between Idaho and Oregon.

The FPC approved both dams as well as the Hells canyon dam in its opinion and in an order which directed the company to hold up construction until it submitted design plans for the Oxbow and Brownie projects.

The company will be required to start construction on the Hells canyon dam by the Aug. 4 order but construction of the other two dams will not be started immediately.

The FPC order of Aug. 4 called for design plans for the Hells canyon dam within one year on the Brownie unit and four years on the Oxbow unit.

Idaho Power President T. M. Roach said several weeks ago that he expected to have both projects completed and delivering power before the deadline for beginning work at the dams.

The Brownie dam, to be located eight miles downstream from Brownie dam, will be 283 feet high and cost about \$33 million dollars.

The Oxbow dam near Homestead, Ore., will be 283 feet high and cost about \$33 million dollars.

FPC approval of construction of the dams is a necessary step toward litigation and power commission hearings. Public power advocates are hoping to have both projects built to be built by the federal government.

Private interests generally support the dams. They contend that their opponents sought to bar any of the projects from being built in the Pacific Northwest area that power was provided by the federal government.

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 4 (AP)—Two scientists have succeeded in crystallizing pure polio virus for the first time, a step that will help in the development of a new vaccine.

The scientists responsible for the discovery are Drs. Carl W. Scheraga and Frederick C. Schaffer. They announced their discovery at a meeting of the American Chemical Society in Pasadena.

Scheraga and Schaffer are scientists at the University of California at Berkeley. They have been working on the crystallization of the polio virus for several years.

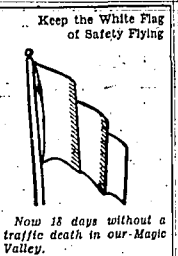

Subscriptions Salesmen Are Violating Law

The solicitation of magazine subscriptions, within the corporate limits of Twin Falls is forbidden by ordinance. A team of magazine salesmen invaded Twin Falls but only as far as the first door before they were taken into custody by city police, transported to the police station and shown a copy of city ordinance No. 12.

The ordinance, approved and passed by the city commission in 1933, prohibits peddlers, hawkers, itinerant merchants or transient vendors of merchandise from engaging in business in the residential sections of the city. However, it does not prohibit such activities in the business districts.

If a magazine salesman or any other peddler is invited to call at a residence to make a sale the ordinance does not apply in such cases. Persons who are contacted by peddlers may sign a complaint against them if they wish.

Until the ordinance was passed in 1933, peddlers, hawkers, itinerant merchants and transient vendors of merchandise were free to do business in the residential sections of the city. The ordinance was passed in 1933 and was enforced in 1934.

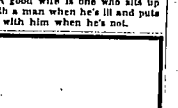

Elks Give \$7,565 in Drive; Donations For Center Not Restricted to Members

Members of Twin Falls Elks lodge No. 1183 have raised \$7,565 in their drive to contribute \$14,000 toward construction of the Idaho Elks Rehabilitation center in Boise, reports Stanley Phillips, drive chairman for the local lodge.

"Although this campaign is primarily an Elks' project, anyone can feel free to contribute to the fund," Phillips said Friday. "The Rehabilitation center will serve all the people of Idaho and we don't want to bar anyone from participating in such a worthwhile project," he explained.

At present, the center devotes most of its program to rehabilitation of polio victims, but a complete rehabilitation program will be developed when adequate facilities are available in the new structure, Phillips points out.

"Emphasis will be placed on rehabilitation of handicapped children who have a good opportunity of being physically and mentally retrained," Phillips said. "Some adults will be admitted."

He points out that such rehabilitation service is not available in Idaho at present. The "total" rehabilitation program will consist of physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, special education and pro-vocational training.

"The Twin Falls Elks lodge is proud of the part it is playing in underwriting construction of these special facilities," Phillips declared. "Many of our members have donated \$10, each—and more toward our goal of \$14,000. Each day, more members of the lodge send their checks to our secretary, Charles F. Larsen."

This generous reaction of our lodge members serves well to illustrate the kind of cooperation of the Bennevont and Protective Order of Elks—charity," Phillips continued. "But we know full well that many residents of Twin Falls and Magic Valley, who aren't members of the Elks lodge, also practice charity in their daily lives."

"It is for this reason we do not want to limit donations for the Rehabilitation center to Elks only. Anyone wishing to contribute to the fund can contact our secretary, Mr. Larsen, at phone number 99 or mail checks to him in care of Elks lodge No. 1183, Twin Falls."

More than half of the necessary \$210,000 has been raised for the ambitious project, according to Clayton Lorenzen, superintendent of the Rehabilitation center. He reports the remainder is expected to be available before ground-breaking ceremonies scheduled for next spring.

Idaho Elks have dubbed the building fund the "Debbey Daines fund" in honor of the Gooding polio victim who was selected as poster boy for the March of Dimes. Debbey Daines spent nearly all his life since his attack of polio at the Rehabilitation center.

The Elks Convalescent home was established in 1947. 1,333 patients admitted through 1954, 850 have been polio victims. Another 395 were referred to the home by the department of public health for various crippling conditions and 110 were for a variety of cases, including cerebral palsy. The average stay at the center is two months and 23 days per patient.

Ask Enforcement

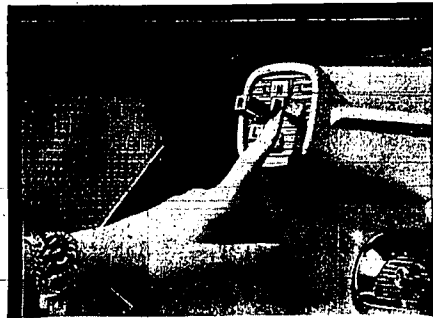

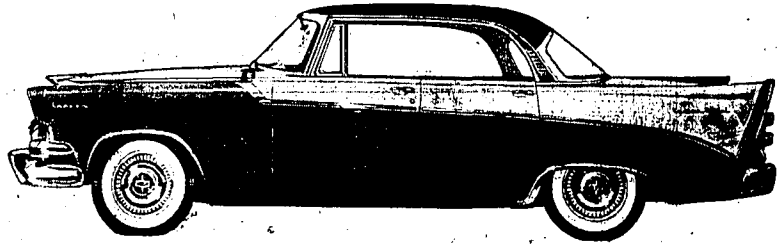
