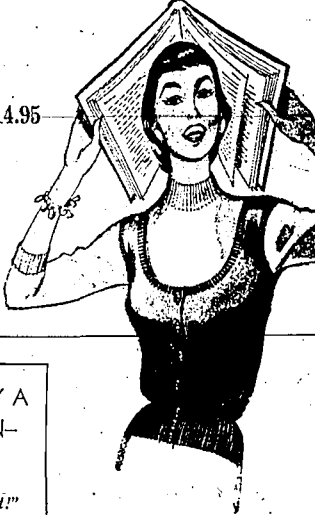

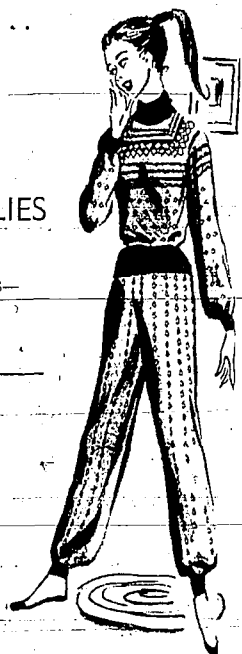

'56 Output of New Cars May Outpace Sales

DETROIT, Nov. 8 (AP)—Passenger car assemblies this year will come close to eight million units; retail dealers will fall somewhat below that figure.

Sales records have been lapping week after week this year. In an October 10 survey, authoritative sources, total retail deliveries for 1955 will equal the volume of 1954. The figure was 2,264,431 units.

By the year-end, the same sources say, total retail deliveries of new cars will total to approximately 7,500,000.

The figures indicate a sharp upsurge in dealer inventories is expected. With return to full scale production after the model switchovers, the factories once again are producing at a rate somewhat higher than retail deliveries are being made. So a year-end field stock of around 750,000 new cars is not unlikely.

All Building New Cars
Dealers started 1955 with 203,881 cars on hand. But at that time only a few new models were available.

Somebody in the industry questions that the retailing division will sell a tremendous volume of new cars next year. There is a wide difference of opinion, however, as to whether the total will approximate that of the present year.

Sales Chiefs Optimistic
The industry's general sales chiefs, of course, are more optimistic than ever in their sales forecasts. Some of them continue to insist the demand will return to full scale production level. Most of them have had that view through much of the last decade.

Authorities trade sources say the price increases announced by the manufacturers will not restrict demand.

It should be understood, of course, that the manufacturers already are not binding up the retailers, insofar as resale operations are concerned. To remain within the law the manufacturers allow the price as "suggested" retail listings.

Space 'Shot' To Be Made At Dixie Site

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 8 (AP)—Launching of the first man-made satellite into space, to be a highlight of the international geophysical year of 1957, will be done in the United States, probably in the south.

Dr. Detlev W. Bronk, New York City, who also is president of the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research, said that "for technical reasons" it will be best to launch the satellite close to the equator, and this probably will be done from some part of the southern United States.

The earth's outer surface moves fastest at the equator in rotation and no doubt scientists will want the satellite to take advantage of this additional speed.

Design work on the satellite, which scientists said would be the size of a basketball, and its rocket-powered mechanism, is under way, the noted physicist told reporters at the NAS meeting.

This spectacular project is only one of several being undertaken by more than 30 nations, including Russia, participating in the international geophysical year program. The projects will investigate natural forces of earth and space.

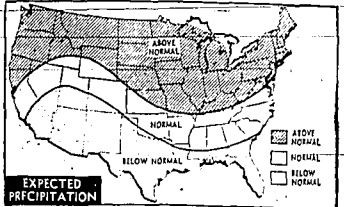

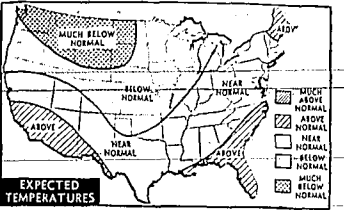

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Russ Housing Experts Like Seattle "Best"

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 — Russia's housing chief reported that a month-long tour of the United States by Soviet housing experts has contributed to better mutual understanding between Americans and Russians.

He said he hopes an American housing delegation will tour Russia and learn as much about Soviet construction practices and techniques as the Soviet delegation learned in America.

T. K. Kazulla, Soviet minister of city and rural construction, made the statement in a speech before the National Press club.

"Our visit, following the visit of the agriculture delegation, will contribute to a better mutual understanding," he said through an interpreter.

What most impressed the 10-man Harper, both Idaho Outdoor association representatives and that of 13 American cities, Kazulla said, were the building blocks used in home construction and the equipment used in the American kitchen—especially what Americans call, he said, "the things of the future."

Kazulla, a busy Russian, good-humoredly answered a barrage of questions thrown at him by press club members.

Asked which city the Russians liked best, he said that "without offense to any other city" they preferred Seattle. Wash. He quickly added that when they were there the weather was fine and they were taken on a sight-seeing tour of the lake and mountains, and that this might have made the difference.

Asked which city had the prettiest city, Kazulla said that unfortunately the delegation was taken to places where there were hardly any women at all.

Seedlings Absent, but Annual Growth Of Bitterbrush Is Available for Deer

Despite the decadent condition of seedlings, the bulk of the annual growth of the plant is available for the Cassia deer herd this winter, experts noted in a south hills study Friday.

The study group was composed of representatives of the Idaho Fish and Game department, forest service, bureau of land management, Jerome Rod and Gun club, Southern Idaho Fish and Game association and Idaho Outdoor association.

Similar utilization studies were made last spring and another is planned for next spring to determine whether utilization on the winter deer range has been excessive. Lewis Clark, Twin Falls district forester, pointed out a vigorous, healthy plant can withstand 50 per cent utilization of the current year's growth.

This percentage can be lower, depending on condition of the bitterbrush. Bitterbrush is the chief browse plant on the deer winter range, he said. It is especially important as winter and early spring feed. Not only is bitterbrush forage of high quality, its height makes it accessible to deer even during heavy snows, he stated.

The browse study, along with the deer census and other studies, will determine the number of special hunting permits to be issued in the future.

Several "key areas" were pointed out to the group by Clark. These are open areas which are protected from winds and weather and are trees of snowdrifts found on crests of hills. It is in these areas the deer bunch up. The slopes of the Pines Fork, McMillen creek and Rock creek were used as examples.

The 100-acre recreation project on Dry creek under the direction of the bureau of land management was

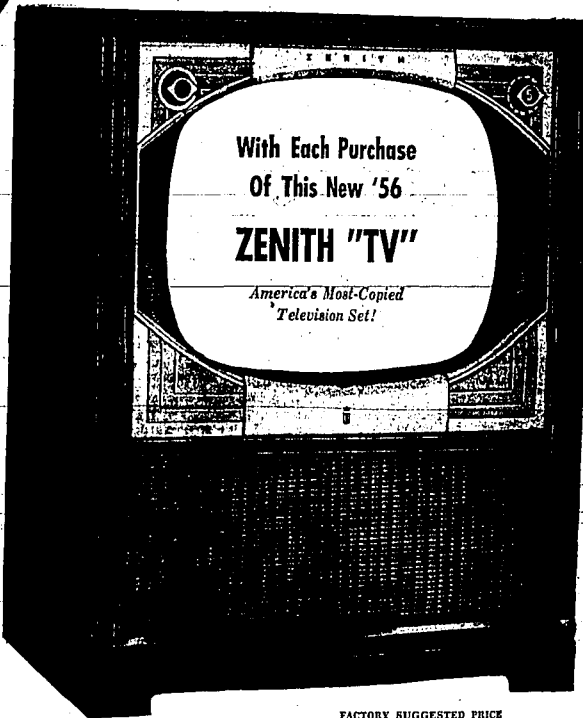
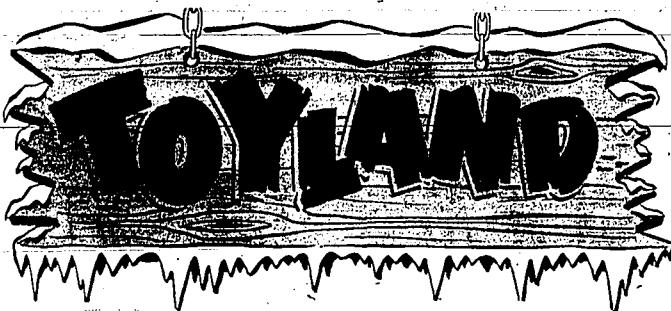

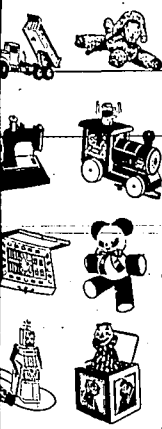

DENVER, Nov. 3 (AP)—The president of the National Association for Infantile Paralysis today said that two scientists have succeeded in crystallizing purified polio virus as an important step in the fight to eradicate the disease.

Boal O'Connor praised the work of Drs. Carlsson E. Scherwid and Frederick L. Schaffer, University of California scientists, who disclosed Thursday they had crystallized purified polio virus the first time a human or animal infecting virus had ever been taken through this process.

Said O'Connor: "Polio research always has been a slow process because of the chemical composition of viruses, and this new development may be one of the important means of obtaining additional information."

O'Connor, here to confer with regional March of Dimes officials, addressed at a news conference the success of the Salk polio vaccine did not end the need for polio research. He said science must learn more about the virus and the polio virus in particular before the disease can be eliminated as a serious threat.

Marshal Says War Dangers Fading Away

DENVER, Nov. 3 (AP)—Britain's Field Marshal Lord Montgomery said today he thinks the danger of global war is "not far off" from the development of atomic weapons "which nobody wants to use."

Montgomery, commander of North Atlantic treaty organization forces, told newsmen after a 10-minute news conference that the President Eisenhower will give a peace speech.

He said that "the outlook for peace is good as concerns global war" but "there are still a few little bits of trouble."

The British field marshal, who gained international fame for his role in the Battle of El Alamein in World War II, said that "the danger of global war is 'not far off' from the development of atomic weapons."

Montgomery said he did not know why, but "that's what it looks like to me."

Chippier and glib, Montgomery parried questions joyfully with replies that were as quick as a well-oiled machine. He said that the normal time of 20 minutes for most visitors in his meetings with the executive staff was also his call on Mrs. Eisenhower.

Montgomery warned against any "reactionary" move to go back to the communists. He said "duality" is apt to raise the head of a "reactionary" movement, but "it is very important that (western) nations not drift apart."

He said of the Russian that "I should look at them a bit longer and make certain we are not being deceived by their peace proposals."

Montgomery, wearing his ribbed uniform of olive drab, said he "did not think that the 'problem of Europe is Germany.' The problem of Europe is Germany."

Miracle Lung Is Described By Physicians

CHICAGO, Nov. 3 (AP)—Surgeons told today of a medical miracle and the part played by a simple new artificial lung.

It began with the horrible moment when a steel worker was crushed by a locomotive against a stone wall. He was his breast-shouldered, weighing 235 pounds.

Yet he was crushed by the monstrous machine into a space only eight inches wide. Worse he was slowly rolled into that tight area. Ribs and bones splintered. He had 25 fractures of 20 ribs, breast bone, clavicles and pelvic bones broken. Internal organs injured.

Doctors met him at the hospital door. He was unconscious, so badly hurt "it seemed he had already died before he survived," said Dr. E. J. Avery, 2 E. Avery.

With his crushed chest, even if he could begin breathing normally, the motion would prevent circulation of the wired-up bones on his broken ribs.

The simple new lung gave the patient the "miracle" was "accounted to" the American College of Surgeons by Dr. E. T. March, inventor of the lung. Dr. Avery and Dr. W. Benson of Northwestern Medical School and the University of Chicago clinician.

The man recovered and is back at work. The lung is helping, 100 people with crushed chests and patients in breathing troubles after surgery or for other causes.

Dr. March's lung did the breathing for a month for the crushed man. It blew air gently into his lungs, then let it escape. His own breathing muscles stopped working, his molten ribs could knit.

The new lung is a transparent plastic, four feet wide, three feet long, a foot high.

A motor-driven piston pumps air through a tube and valve in pulses, like normal breathing. The air enters through a tube inserted at the throat into the trachea or air tube of the lungs. The other tube is necessary if the artificial lung is going to do a person's breathing for days at a time. For shorter periods, the tube can more simply be put into the nose or mouth.

Burns said that the Arab and Jewish sides were still in conflict and that he was not sure of the outcome of the negotiations.

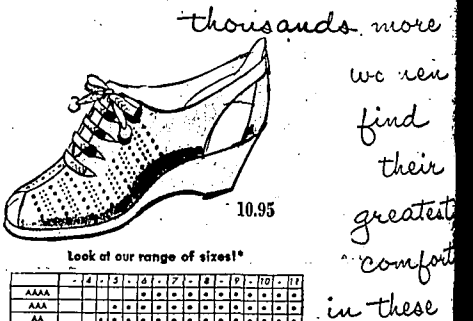

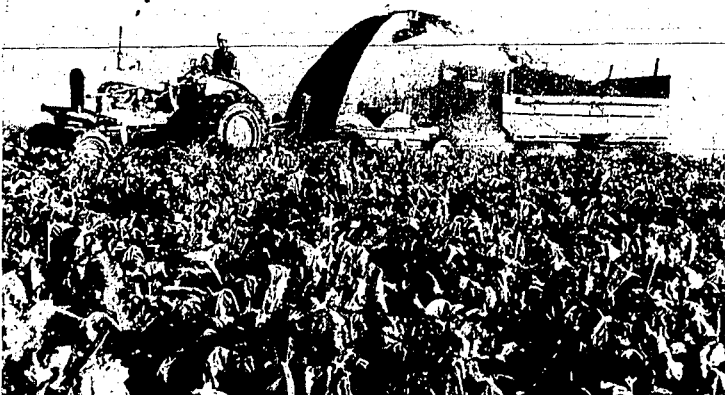

34 Million-Dollar Sugar Crop Is Seen In Survey of Gem State Beet Counties

Idaho's fertile irrigated farmlands are pouring out a 34 million dollar sugar crop this year, a recent survey of the state's 25 sugar beet counties has shown. The annual "sugar crop" is in full swing with a total of 13,372 acres being harvested. That acreage is expected to produce 957,570 100-pound bags of sugar which, at a retail value of \$40 per bag, would be worth more than \$38 million dollars.

In the Twin Falls area, the annual sugar crop is expected to be 1,372 acres being harvested. That acreage is expected to produce 957,570 100-pound bags of sugar which, at a retail value of \$40 per bag, would be worth more than \$38 million dollars.

On their land, are left out entirely under the federal regulations, or get at best, only a token allotment. Sugar is an important crop to them as a cash crop, as part of a beneficial rotation plan, and as a basis for livestock feeding programs. This is, of course, detrimental to the market for those crops.

Amalgamated Sugar Company spokesmen estimate the factories at Twin Falls and Rupert could handle at least a 25 per cent increase in sugar beet acreage in this area, without necessarily for major mill expansion. Such an increase, they feel, could "history" is used in setting individual acreage allotments. Other factories in Idaho are the Amalgamated mill at Nampa, Franklin county's plant at Preston and the Utah-Idaho Sugar company's factory at Idaho Falls. The state ranks third among the nation's 21 beet sugar-producing plants, for total tonnage of beets and beet sugar produced. Only California and Colorado top the Gem state. Growers and processors alike are pinning their hopes for the future on proposed legislation now pending in Congress. A bill which would give American growers a share in each year's American market increase passed the house last summer. It is expected to go before the senate early in the next session beginning in January. As the act now stands, Cuba gets 25 per cent of each year's American market growth, other foreign countries 4 per cent, and domestic growers nothing. If the measure is passed, Idaho growers may then look forward to a reversal, at least, of the present trend toward ever smaller beet acreages, according to Elcock. By definition, about 50 per cent of the people are below average intelligence.

Some Drugs May Delay Recovery, Scientist Asserts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Government scientists at their conference suggesting that use of antibiotic drugs "may actually delay recovery in cases of the common cold, influenza, polio, measles and mumps."

The scientist, Dr. Barbara Moulton of the food and drug administration, said the same applies to herpangina, a viral infection of the throat resembling a "strep" sore throat.

But she said the use of antibiotics in three other viral diseases—small pox, chicken pox and shingles—may be helpful "because of their effect upon secondary bacterial infection."

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Big 4 Parley May Tighten Western Tie

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The brighter side, if any, of the big four foreign ministers conference is that it should strengthen the western alliance against communist aggression.

It is not whistling in the dark to report that the United States stands to gain a bit, even if the conference fails. Some important facts became lost or mislaid in the pleasant atmosphere which enveloped last July's summit conference.

One of these facts was that the United States had agreed only reluctantly to the summit meeting in the first place.

Now the big four summit meeting is being cut down to size by the foreign ministers meeting to which it gave birth. The United States position is that Washington is doing everything it can to obtain success at Geneva—and that a failure there must be the Soviet Union's responsibility.

If Geneva is a failure, U. S. diplomats feel it will be up to London and Paris to propose future talks and hope in a strong western alliance against communist aggression instead of seeking safety at the conference table.

That would continue to be the United States position until offers more than a mere smile as proof of good intentions.
