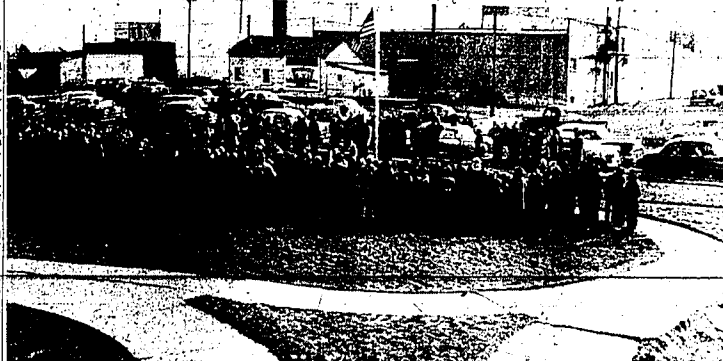

### Unity in Korea Is Still Shown As Long Hope

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Permanent peace and unification for Korea still are a long way off, United Nations observers said today in interpreting U. S. and British reports to the U. N. main political committee on the divided nation.

U. S. delegate Jacob Blaustein and Britain's Sir Pierson Dixon, as the first speakers in the committee's general debate on Korea yesterday, painted a dismal picture of post-war events in the war-torn nation.

But the United States in a resolution offered to the committee expressed the hope that peaceful means would be found for the unification of Korea. The resolution called on the general assembly to push its efforts for "an early solution of the Korean question."

The American resolution breathed life into the question for at least another year since it requested that the Korean question be listed on the agenda of next year's general assembly.

The American resolution outlined no methods or means for bringing about lasting peace and unity for Korea. Two days of discussion in the main committee on Korea showed the western nations and communists as far apart as ever on vital issues.

BOISE, Nov. 10.—The city of Caldwell has been cleared of charges that it contributed to an Aug. 2, 1949, traffic accident by failing to properly mark a dead end road that dropped into a drainage ditch.

U. S. District Judge Fred M. Taylor has entered a summary judgment in favor of city officials in an action brought against them by Melbert Clayton, Caldwell, and Verge W. Lemmon.

Lemmon, an Oregon postal worker, asked \$18,645 in connection with an accident in which Clayton's car, in which he was riding, went into the ditch. He claimed Clayton was driving recklessly.

Mayor Jason Smith, direct Commissioner M. DeWitt and other city officials had sought the summary judgment on grounds the position of road in question had been turned over to the state highway system. State Highway Engineer Earl V. Miller, in an affidavit, supported their position.

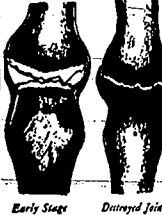

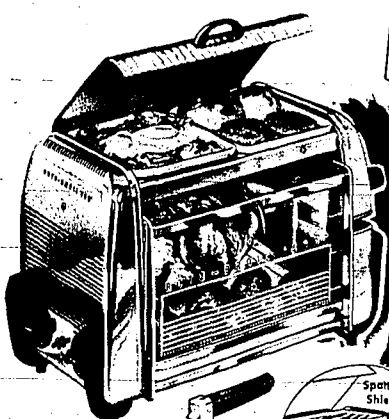

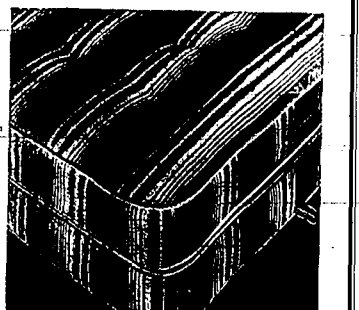

## Minors' Illicit Use of Tobacco Hit by Burley PTA President

Editor, Times-News:

I wish to discuss with your readers a problem of law enforcement which is of importance to every man, woman and child in the state of Idaho.

This particular law enforcement problem is the use of tobacco by minors. The Idaho state code is very specific and reads in part as follows: "18-1502. Use of tobacco by minors—Sale to or abetting of minor.—Every minor person who shall buy, accept or have in his possession any cigarette, cigar or tobacco in any form... shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100; and every person who shall give, sell or furnish, directly or indirectly, any cigarettes, cigars or tobacco in any form... shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished for the first offense by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100, and for the second offense by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$300, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not to exceed six months."

Section 18-1502 is as much a part of Idaho state law as those laws concerned with traffic violations.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10.—California orange shippers today flatly denied a statement by Florida Citrus Mutual that the eastern citrus growers would not compete for the eastern holiday market, but said that shipments for the month of November would be less than in previous years.

Also surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Leon Pickett and Mrs. Grant Baker, both Murtaugh; a sister, Mrs. Claus Clawson and a brother, Herb Nielson, both Murtaugh. Six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren also survive.

### British Plan Asks "Foreign Legion"

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Members of parliament and British generals called today for an expansion of Britain's African Negro army and the recruiting of a "foreign legion" from displaced persons to enable the country to slash its draft term.

The army league, a group of strategists, former generals and members of parliament, introduced the proposals in a pamphlet published today. Military sources said the ministry of defense and the war department were studying the plan.

The league said its proposals would enable the government of Prime Minister Anthony Eden to cut Britain's draft term to 18 months from the present 24 months. Such a cut has been demanded by Socialists in the house of commons.

### Funds Needed for Pocatello Schools

POCATELLO, Nov. 10.—The superintendent of Pocatello schools said yesterday unless something is done to get more school funds for the city, the city school board may have to go on a half-day schedule or be held the year around.

Gerald Wallace, speaking to the Pocatello Parent-Teacher association, said at least 10 new grade school buildings are needed to meet increased enrollment requirements next year.

He contended a more fair and equitable distribution of state taxes throughout Idaho is needed to help the local school construction problem.

### Speaker Says Nations Envy U. S. Systems

"Most wanted in Latin America today is Christianity and democracy as practiced in the United States," Capt. Jose O. Baldivieso, Bolivian consul to this country, told 500 persons attending a Town Hall meeting Friday night at the junior high school.

A former delegate from his country to the United Nations, the Bolivian consul said countries of South America would like to be in partnership with their North American neighbors. He said Christianity and democracy would like to be practiced. They must come first, he said, with material things coming second.

Christianity and democracy, Captain Baldivieso continued, have three stages of development before they are accepted. He listed them as: 1. They are accepted; 2. They are practiced; 3. They are loved.

# Birth of a Region's BRIGHT NEW FUTURE

Progress for the Snake River Valley is being born in Hells Canyon. New supplies of electric power to spark the continued growth and development of communities, industry and agriculture are on the way. At long last, it's **FULL SPEED AHEAD** in Hells Canyon — good news for everyone.

Design plans for the Brownlee and Oxbow dams on the middle Snake have been approved by the Federal Power Commission. The construction contract has been signed. It is the largest construction project ever undertaken in Idaho or eastern Oregon. Payrolls and materials will create new business, add dollars to the local economy. The immediacy of the undertaking is outweighed only by its benefits to the people of Snake River Valley.

#### THE BEST PLAN OF DEVELOPMENT

Idaho Power Company's projects were approved following a most exhaustive study and public hearing in which details of the Company's plans were exposed to every conceivable test of engineering and economic feasibility. In the year-long hearings before a Federal Power Commission examiner, full and complete opportunity was given to every interested party to express their views both pro and con.

In the end, it was the unanimous decision of the Federal Power Commission, backed by the recommendation of its engineering staff, that a license for construction be granted to Idaho Power Company. The Commission said the Company's three-dam project "is best adapted to a

comprehensive plan" for developing the Hells Canyon reach of Snake River.

#### A PLAN OF MULTIPLE ADVANTAGES

Simply stated, the Idaho Power plan is best because it produces approximately the same amount of power (as the plan proposed for Federal development) at a substantially lesser cost per kilowatt, and can produce it sooner. Because it is paid for by citizen investors—a large number of them residents of the Snake River Valley—not borrowed from the tax moneys of the American public. Because it will supply 4 million new tax dollars annually to the states of Idaho and Oregon and approximately 6 million dollars annually to the Federal government. And because it includes such features as flood control, navigation, recreation, and conservation of fish and wildlife resources without expense to the United States government.

New park, picnic and camping areas will be easily accessible over roads to be carved from the wilderness in the months ahead. And following a policy to which Idaho Power has adhered rigidly through years of service, the project will fully protect irrigation water rights of present and future agricultural development upstream.

#### BRIGHT, NEW FUTURE

Without a prompt start and rapid completion of the projects, the Snake River Valley would face a blockade of its continued orderly growth and expansion. Electric power capacity has been increased four times in the past 10 years, and it must treble again in the decade ahead if community, industrial and agricultural progress is to be continued without hindrance.

A bright, new future for the Snake River Valley of Idaho and Oregon as well as the Northwest is wrapped up in these projects—new jobs, plentiful electricity to meet the growing needs of population and industry at rates a third less than the national average, a higher standard of living for every family, and greater productivity for industry and farm.

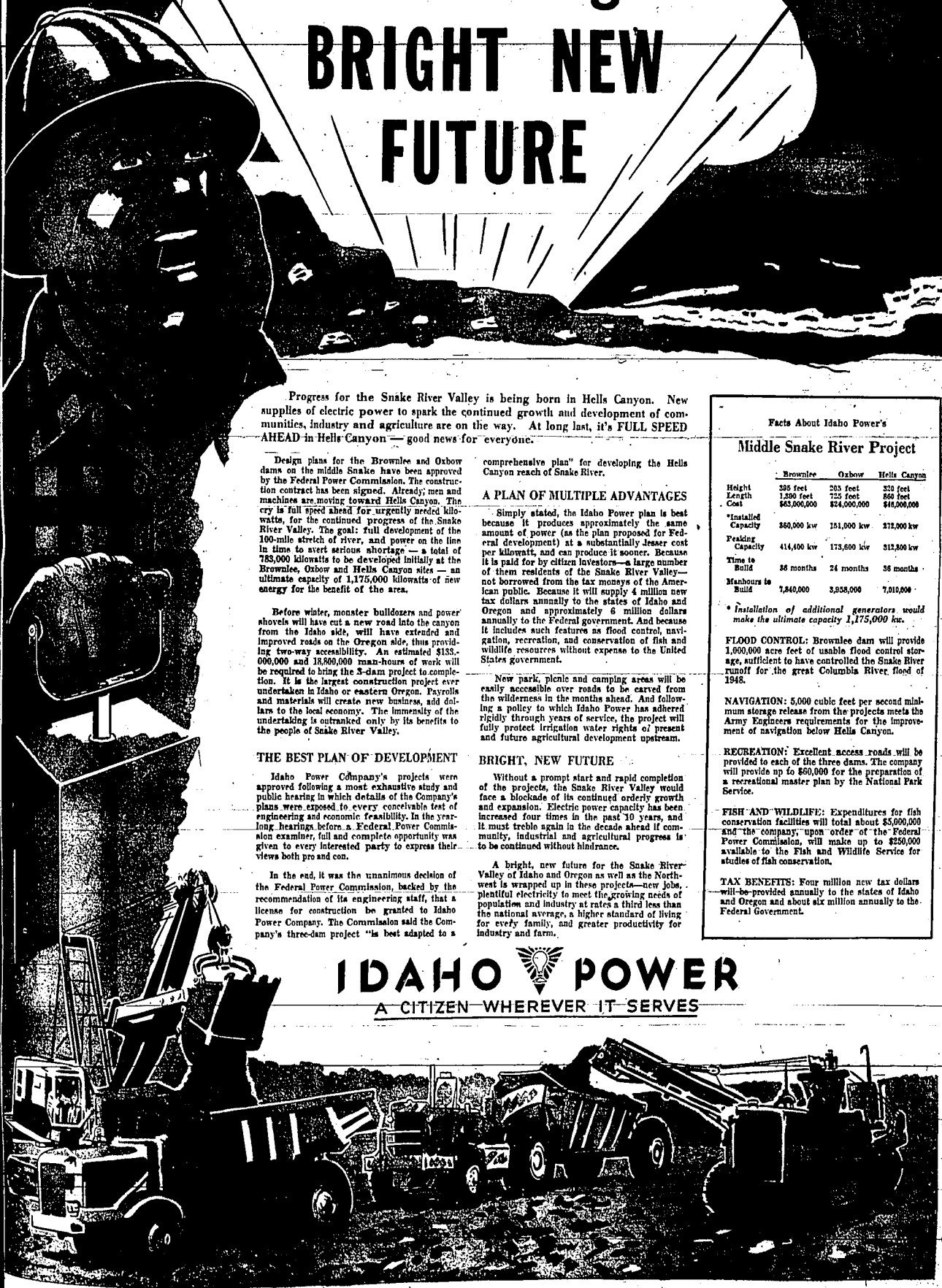

Some American Prisoners of Chinese Reds Had Hell; Other Had Easy Time

HONG KONG, Nov. 12 (AP)—The treatment given Americans held in the time in Shanghai, which like the negotiations in Geneva, has varied widely. For some, it was tolerable. For others, it was tolerable. Judging from the stories told by the prisoners, it was tolerable. The others, including five Roman Catholic priests, admitted signing some sort of confession. Two of the Americans, both Yale bright scholars, signed confessions readily. They, it developed, were missionaries. In some cases prisoners simply were worn down by constant abuse and screaming in others, physical torture was used. Lawrence Buol, a civilian airplane pilot, spent more than five years in prison in Kunming, in southwest China, after his plane crashed. To all appearances, Buol's long captivity had no serious effect on him. His first words on reaching freedom were: "I was just a boy who was with the Red Army (People's Liberation Army) and whether Rocky Marciano was still heavyweight boxing champion. Buol said the Chinese let him have a radio in his cell. His treatment, he said, did not include torture. The Rev. Levi Lovgren, a Protestant missionary, was held most of the time in Shanghai, which like Kunming is in the southwest and far away from Peiping. Lovgren said the communists "rode us pretty hard." But apparently he was not physically mistreated. Father Harold Rigney, a Roman Catholic missionary, was held in Peiping. He has not yet told his whole story. But it is known that the spirit seeks in chains. Harriet Mills and Walter Rickett, the Peiping scholars, who were in the same prison with Father Rigney, came out bragging themselves as spies and spouting kind words for the Peiping regime. Rickett admitted spending hours in hand-cuffs, and it is believed he went through worse torture. But he seemed to have rationalized that in his mind as proper punishment for what he considered his "crimes."

Press Attitude For Campaign To Be Sought

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (AP)—Sigma Delta Chi today recommended that the American press "objectively" during the 1952 presidential campaign. The survey recommended by SDXC committee on ethics and news objectivity was approved "almost unanimously" by the journalism fraternity's delegates at their 46th annual convention. The group also approved to "look into the possibility" of including radio and television news in the 1952 survey. Reactions Sought Before the survey is actually undertaken, however, SDXC will check with about 60 publishers and editors throughout the country to get their reaction to the survey. SDXC said it would also have to study the feasibility of financing such a survey. Means Outlined The survey would include a check of the news coverage of the campaign, a "flow of news" survey, based on interviews with editors and reporters, and an "attitude effect" survey involving a poll of newspaper readers about their "attitudes" toward the campaign news they read. Norman E. Isaacs, managing editor of the Louisville Times, head of the SDXC committee on ethics and news objectivity.

British Minister Arranges Meets

GENEVA, Nov. 12 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan of Britain will fly next week to Baghdad for five-nation talks on the defense of the Middle East, his aide has reported. The meeting in the Iraqi capital will inaugurate the ministerial council of the Baghdad alliance of states along the northern tier of the Middle East—Turkey, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan and Britain. Bedsie Manners Will Go in Atomic Attacks, Says Expert

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (AP)—Federal Civil Defense Administrator Walter Peterson warned today that doctors will have no time for a kindly bedside manner if an atomic bomb strikes. Residents of a city under atomic bombardment will have only two choices, "stay and die or move out and survive," he said. "No ambulance may ever arrive, wounds which do not immediately endanger the patient's life will get summary first aid treatment, and dying patients may get no care at all other than sedation," he said. Peterson, speaking before a civil defense conference of county medical society representatives, said the potential lack on medical personnel is already too great. "No matter how well we lay out plans to prevent casualties," he said, "nuclear attack on this nation would result in more casualties than we could properly handle. The best we will ever be able to do is to make the most efficient use of the facilities and personnel we have available." Peterson told the physicians at the sixth annual conference sponsored by the American Medical Association, that everyone's attitude toward casualties must be revised. "We are not psychologically equipped to accept the 'production line' type of medical care that means little individual attention to patients," he said. Dr. G. E. Fryer, medical consultant for civil defense in the Canadian department of national health and welfare, told the conference that America and Canada have "excellent cooperation" in C-D activities. Fryer said that Canada is now basing some planning on the fact that there may be a "definite period of strategic warning" before an attack. For both countries, he said, this depends on the radar network line across the northern United States and Canada.

**Survey Eyed On Effects of Heart Attack**

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (U.P.)—Dr. Paul Dudley White, Boston heart specialist directing President Eisenhower's treatment, has begun a nationwide survey among doctors to learn how common such heart disease is in America and what has happened to the victims.

The survey will determine how many have had acute coronary thrombosis attacks like that of the President, while percentages are still alive and what proportion have been able to return to work.

In a letter published in the current issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, he asked "all physicians in this country" to mail him information on their heart patients.

He said he is seeking the data "since the current illness of President Eisenhower has brought acute coronary thrombosis still more into the limelight than it has even been before and since it is important to have more information on the prevalence of this disease in the United States today."


A spokesman for the AMA Journal said Dr. White did not say what he intended to do with the information.

President Eisenhower is expected to arrive at his farm home Monday. He will stay for some of all the weeks between now and the next year, recovering his strength from a heart attack. If the weather turns bad, he may go south later.

Workers only recently finished rebuilding and enlarging the President's old, drafty, undistinguished farm house into a modern, six-room, beautiful mansion, with seven bedrooms, eight baths, a big sea-cooled study, and a studio for painting. The grass is green, the pond stocked, the putting green newly finished, and the barn is filled with hay.

The moment the President moves in, the white brick-structure temporary White House, but it will remain essentially a home—the first of their own that the President and Mamie ever had and the one they expect to enjoy for the rest of their lives. The farm has been changed for the President's return.

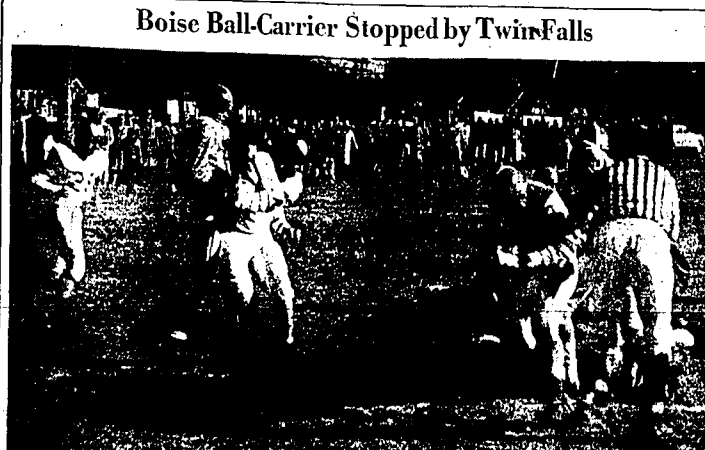

# Closely Guarded Washington Secret Is Amount of Money Spent for Junketings

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—The tourtiest year in history is drawing to a close for senators and members of the house—and for some wives, children and at least one mother-in-law of a legislator.

Since congress adjourned in mid-summer, and in some cases earlier in 1955, some 200 legislators have journeyed abroad—to Europe, to the far east, just about everywhere that Americans are permitted to travel.

What all this costs is perhaps the most carefully guarded secret in Washington, but whatever the figure is most of the lawmakers will assure you the taxpayers get their money's worth. Their reasoning is that members of congress educate themselves through what they see abroad in such a way that they can save far more in federal spending than their trips cost.

All the same, nobody is saying what the junketing—as everybody calls it—does cost.

Most of this year's travelers financed their trips with congressional funds and counterpart money—that is, foreign currency funds set up by foreign nations which receive U. S. aid.

A few of the travelers say they paid their own expenses while many say they paid at least the expenses of relatives accompanying them.

The law says congressmen using counterpart money, which they get from U. S. embassies, must make a complete report on the use of the house administration committee or the senate appropriations committee.

So far the house group hasn't received any such reports. The senate committee says the financial accounting, if and when received, are confidential.

What about the state department, which hands out the foreign currency? It says it has no authority to disclose the figures.

Key congressmen in a position to demand an accounting from the state department politely decline requests that they do so. "Too many colleagues may be embarrassed," they say.

Essentially the house administration committee probably will make public reports on how many American dollars, appropriated from the house contingent funds, have been spent by traveling house members.

There is the expense of providing transportation in military planes, of dining and frequently winning visiting legislators out of foreign service funds, of providing limousines and furnishing hotel suites.

Returning travelers speak freely about counterpart funds being disbursed lavishly.

"You can always tell who is carrying the money when your train, auto or plane arrives," one house member said. "It will be the fellow carrying a satchel. He's from the embassy and he has an envelope of foreign currency for everyone in the official party. He is known as the bottle-boy. You can get more if you need it. You must agree to return what you don't spend, but that is as far as the accounting goes."

### Madmen's Art Tries Haunt; Exhibits Seen

LONDON, Nov. 10 (U.P.)—A haunting pattern of red and blue lines, the work of the immortal ballet dancer Vaslav Nijinsky, is on display today in an exhibition of paintings by madmen. Nijinsky painted it while in the throes of the insanity that struck him down at the height of his fame.

It hangs, amid scores of others brought in the weird world of deranged minds, in a gallery in the fashionable west end.

The paintings were all done by patients in mental homes. They were assembled, for an exhibition called "Aspects of schizophrenia art," by the Institute of Contemporary Arts.

**Dance in Madness**

Nijinsky's painting was done in soft pastel red and blue. It shows only curved blue lines on a red background and curved red lines on a blue background. The lines radiate and blow away from the center to the top and the bottom of the foot-square paper.

It was all Nijinsky's clouded mind could produce. What he thought it meant he never knew. It was a grave when he died in 1950 after 32 years of insanity.

The paintings, many by once-famous artists, others by men given paint and brushes as an outlet for their mad ideas, are shown by the "Aspects of schizophrenia art."

**Escape to Fantasy**

(Schizophrenia is a form of insanity in which the victim gradually withdraws from the realities of life into a world of fantasy.)

The show is the curious confusion and the morbid thoughts of madmen.

The paintings fall into three patterns.

**Animals Noted**

In one, the painter works out images he sees in his subconscious mind, more often animals than anything else. Some of the figures come out like life. More often they are shapeless masses.

A second pattern shows an obsession with intricate designs. In these, the painters take great pains to make the chaotic but balanced drawings. Nijinsky's work was among these.

The third group shows concentration on words. These paintings are splattered with nonsensical hodgepodge of known words or collections of letters forming invented words. Most of these show the patient's devotion to a single idea, or, some imagined persecution.

### New Designs In Churches Get Approval

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (U.P.)—An authority on church architecture urged the air force yesterday to go ahead and build that controversial modern chapel at its new academy.

"They don't go in for 'period style' in designing their airplanes," said Walter A. Taylor. "Why should they use antiquated Gothic for their academy chapel?"

Taylor is research director of the American Institute of Architects and chairman of the architectural committee of the National Council of Churches. In an interview, he stepped right into the row that has been boiling since plans for the air academy at Colorado Springs, Colo., were unveiled last year.

Some congressmen raised a howl of protest at the severely modern buildings proposed by the prominent Chicago architectural firm of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill. The loud protests were aimed at the chapel, which one senator compared to an accordion, and another dubbed a "concrete wixen."

The air force retreated in disorder, and returned a few weeks later with sharply rounded-down plans that called for more stone and less glass in academic and administration buildings.

The chapel disappeared completely from the revised blueprint. The latest word from the Pentagon is that new designs for the chapel are being "studied" and it may be "quite different."
