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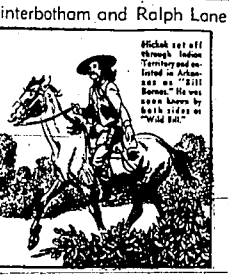

**Top Tour of U. S. Shows Farmers Are Worried but Not Yet in Big Depression**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The farmer is worried and uncertain about the future. He's not bankrupt, but he's not in a depression. And with few exceptions he is not in open rebellion against the Eisenhower administration. In normally-Republican areas—yet. But he has been hurt, to varying degrees, by a combination of sagging farm prices, government acreage controls, and steady or rising prices of things he must buy. And if experienced politicians from the Mississippi river west have read the signs correctly, the GOP is in for a rout in many farm areas in 1936 unless farm income rises. "Our farmers are more scared than hurt—but they're definitely scared," a banker reported at Worthington, Minn. A California bank official said the same thing in virtually the same words. "Conditions in my area were fairly good this year," a Davenport, Ia., banker said, "but young farmers are having trouble meeting their payments." Many young farm families "went into debt expecting to sell hogs at 25 or 26 cents a pound," he said. But with hog prices hovering around 13.5 cents a pound "there's a lot of grumbling about livestock prices." Resentment against administration farm policies appeared strongest in Minnesota, Oklahoma and the Dakotas. In both North and South Dakota, however, most Republican leaders have long been on record in favor of more federal aid for farm income. Ben Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., said he could see "the makings of a political revolt" in farm areas of the upper Midwest. But the extent of Democratic gains will depend on local political leadership, he admitted. In Iowa, where the administration had claimed strong farmer backing for its flexible price support program, Sen. Edward J. Thye, R. Minn., said he found "creeping into their thinking the idea farmers are in trouble." "That didn't exist a year ago," Thye said. And in Oregon, a Republican county judge admitted "the farm issue certainly has cut down the size of our vote as of today. We will be in very serious trouble unless some changes are made." That fear was not universal. In

places of other crops, chiefly animal feed grains. This thinking led E. ## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The apparent shift of the American people to a politico-economic middle path—the so-called "middle-of-the-road" philosophy—has been recognized by both major parties in nominating candidates and framing platforms next year.

On the doors of Republican headquarters in Washington, a sign reads: "The warning: 'No radical or ill-talented need apply.'"

No ill-talented politicians but no conservative program will take place if President Eisenhower is re-elected. He has fixed the pattern. But the situation, the more they substitute mass model themselves after him. Otherwise, they would be repeating the GOP had a chance to hang up in more than 30 years.

**NO REVISIONISM AMONG GOP POSSIBILITIES**

—More specifically, an examination and analysis of other possibilities disclosed by even more candidly than the administration's general policies. Nixon-Knowland-Warren-Knight-Herter-Lodge-Humphrey, so the list runs, and there is not a revisionist in the bunch.

Oddly, Chief Justice Warren if the most liberal, and the least radical, of the candidates for the White House. Vice President Nixon is running ahead of the fellow-Californian.

**DISCOUNT CHANGES OF EXTREME NEW DEALERS**

—On the Democratic side, the recognized leaders are now being discounted. The extreme new dealers—namely, Gov. Averell Harriman of New York and Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee. In view of the fact that the latter is a Republican, it is not surprising that Adlai E. Stevenson will be renominated on an early basis.

Although the Chicago lawyer felt compelled to spread himself on farm and labor policies in 1952, largely because the shadow of Harry B. Truman fell upon him, he is expected to make a more fundamental departure from the radical modification of his predecessors' program, if he were elected.

**STEVENSON'S STAND**—Stevenson, as is true of every other Democratic candidate, advocates a higher minimum wage figure, 90 per cent instead of flexible policy support prices, greater consideration for public health, education and highways. And on these questions, many pro-Republican agree with him.

But he would work for no politico-economic revolution. If so, he would not have the support of so many of the party's big names. It may be significant that he has talked at length with them recently, and presumably assured them that he would not make any such radical changes.

**CONTEST OF PERSONALITIES**—In short, the 1956 campaign will be a "cold war" rather than a hot one. It will be a contest of personalities rather than of principles. It will convince many skeptics that the two parties are as alike as two peas in a pod.

But the new dealers will not give up their demand for destruction of basic new deal reforms. They will contend, as they always have, that they know more about the economy than the Republicans. Democrats pose as the realists of the new deal. They will make a "gimme" appeal. But they have no new, solid, or revolutionary ideas up their sleeves.

—And the man most responsible for this meeting in the middle of the road is Eisenhower!

## VIEWS OF OTHERS

**POOR SPELLERS**

Dr. Herbert B. Croft of the English department at Oregon State college, has provided corroboration of what most of us have been aware, that youngsters are doing better in the English department at the same age. He has shown, too, that the younger generation is more poorly grounded in formal grammar.

Some 1,800 freshmen at OSC this fall took the same English placement examination that had been given to the class of 1952. The average score was 66 in 1952 and 68 in 1953. In English usage and punctuation there was no difference, but in spelling and formal grammar the 1953 group fell behind.

We understand there is now a trend in the last few years toward improving spelling by teaching children in the lower schools to recognize individual letters. This will be a contrast to the present practice of teaching children to write words without regard to their spelling. Whether there should be a return to the deadly dictating of sentences which has been the custom for years is another question. College freshmen of 1953 retained some of the grammar they had memorized in this fashion, but the younger generation's ability to write correct English is still somewhat in question.

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## FUTURE EISENHOWER

With President Eisenhower's return from Denver, some of the uncertainty that has bedeviled his future since the fateful farm attack of Sept. 24 has begun to disappear. Firm dates now dot his calendar.

Most of the time in November and December he will live and work on his farm in Gettysburg, except for brief trips for special meetings at the White House. Of greatest interest is the program that seems to be shaping up for him after Jan. 1, when he is expected to resume living in Washington.

Reports from the capital here indicate that President and Mrs. Eisenhower will decide and make known whether or not he will run for a second term.

This assumes, you will note, that he will not have decided before that time. Evidence is mounting that he has not yet made up his mind and perhaps is not trying to do at this stage.

Men in Mr. Eisenhower's official entourage knock down every story which suggests he has decided. Roscoe Drummond writes in both the New York Herald Tribune and the Christian Science Monitor, recently said flatly that he knows two members of the President's family who believe he is still weighing the decision of deferring it.

There is considerable feeling that Mr. Eisenhower is hoping that the doctors can tell him how complete his recovery may be. That time will be the latter part of January.

By that time, too, he will have been back in the White House long enough to get some clear ideas on how he can perform his official duties under the present regimen the doctors will prescribe for him.

He will then be able fairly to consult his conscience on the state of his health and the state of his country, as Drummond said, and determine his course. He will then be able to tell his supporters must give pause to the politicians and others who quickly concluded the President would make a snap decision not to run.

When the Russians got on airplanes, they immediately demanded all the magazines. They wouldn't read a word of English. But they studied all the pictures in the advertisements like crazy.

As far as housing is concerned, Loftus fears the Russians are going back home with a pretty confused idea. Everybody tried to explain everything. But the housing concepts of the two countries are right out of two different worlds.

The Russians were all engineers and construction men, and good ones. But there is no private home building industry in Russia.

## BIG PARDON

**Challenges of Racial Ruling Facing Court**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The supreme court faced new challenges to racial discrimination today hard on the heels of last week's sweeping decisions barring segregation in public parks, swimming pools and golf courses.

Scheduled for action are two cases testing state laws on interracial marriages and the listing on the ballot of the race of Negro candidates for public office.

Jim Gray Nelson, a Chinese-American of Norfolk, Va., has just filed the high court to throw out the state statute forbidding marriage between white and non-white. Twenty-two other states have similar laws on the books.

The other case was brought by A. B. McDonald, who sued the Oklahoma election board for \$200,000 after the word "Negro" appeared on the ballot after his name, McDonald, a Negro, was an unsuccessful candidate in the 1954 Democratic primary for U. S. senator. The U. S. court of appeals in Denver, Colo., held the listing was unconstitutional discrimination.

Later this week, the court turns to the problem of communism in America. Arguments are scheduled on the Communist party's attack on the 1950 subversive control act and on the legality of state anti-subversive laws.

The USS Searcher, a converted World War II Liberty ship, was swept by fire 125 miles at sea yesterday when fuel tank exploded and burst into flames.

The ship reported today that the bodies of two seamen, trapped in the ship's hold, had been found. They had been missing since fire broke out in the radar sentry's starboard fuel tank last Feb. 1, 1954.

The blaze was brought under control about six hours later.

The Searcher had just started a 30-day patrol in the Atlantic ocean off Cape May, N. J., as a floating base in the continental air defense command's chain of vessels and planes guarding the nation against attack.

The 10,000-ton vessel carrying a crew of 14 officers and 170 men was crushed through the Atlantic some 125 miles southeast of New York City when the disaster struck.

Three injured seamen were transferred to the coast guard cutter and then to one of the planes which flew them to the coast guard air station at Floyd Bennett field, Brooklyn.

The United States marine corps has participated in all the nation's wars.

The watchers include the clothing industry. Charles can start a fashion with almost anything he wears. He's on this year's list of 10 best dressed men, which his daddy didn't make.

Years of Decision

Now that he is 7 the years ahead become momentous for Charles. His mother must decide when to make him Prince of Wales. At the moment she thinks he is too young for the splendid ceremonies in ruined Caerleon castle. His father must be selected, for in a year or so he will begin his studies outside the royal palace.

### Boost Asked For Defense Plan in State

BOISE, Nov. 14 (U)—About a third of Idaho's 44 counties have adopted and set up local organizations in the state's civil defense program. Adm. W. C. Specht, state director, has said in a report to all state, county and local officials.

Specht isn't completely satisfied with the report.

"Since the counties and communities are the backbone of our entire state structure, we won't be satisfied until they all get into the picture," he said.

Specht, a retired navy man and native Idahoan, was named to the directorship by Gov. Robert E. Smylie last May 3. The appointment followed approval of a civil defense setup in Idaho by the 1935 legislature.

Specht's report to the officials included a letter from Smylie in which he pointed out:

"We must recognize in these times that no locality is immune from disaster in its many forms. Effective organization and planning to alleviate disaster is a sensible form of insurance on the future."

Although there are still some households left at the state level of organization "we could function immediately and bring into action to a certain degree," Specht said.

But he added that 100 per cent cooperation is lacking in many spots on the local level. He expressed the hope that this phase of the program will show definite improvement soon.

### German Countess, 26, Tours World on Her Motor Scooter

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—Three years ago Countess Dagmar von Bernstorff decided to become the first countess in history to go around the world on a motor scooter.

"The end is now in sight," said the pretty, blue-eyed, 26-year-old German aristocrat.

She and her first cousin, Dieter Ebelier, who has acted as her bodyguard, escort and chauffeur, have scooted 60,000 miles (counting hitches aboard ships) since they set out from Munich on Sept. 27, 1942.

Their extraordinary journey had as its basic purpose the collection of folk lore and folk music for educational and travel programs which the pair write and produce for a radio station in Berlin-Baden.

In addition to a vast store of cul-

tural material the countess and Ebelier collected seven flat tires and one traffic ticket—for scooting on the wrong street in Rome. The countess also collected eight marriage proposals.

"Most of them were in Pakistan," she said. Visiting blinders are always popular in Pakistan.

Their vehicle, a two-wheeled, 4½-horsepower Vespa scooter, pulls a single-wheeled trailer in which they keep their clothing and recording equipment.

"Because we were not allowed to carry guns," recalled Ebelier, "we had to ward off the dogs with cakes of soap wrapped in a stocking, which we swung like a blackjack."

In Turkey they were caught in an earthquake. In Iran they became lost in a snowstorm. In Indonesia they scooted straight through a camp of outlaws.

"The outlaws were so surprised to see us come riding out of the jungle on a scooter they left their guns at their sides," Ebelier said.

The couple started out with \$500, have earned about \$5,000 giving lectures or writing articles. They earned their passage across the Pacific on a Honduran freighter. The countess worked as a quartermaster, Ebelier as an able-bodied seaman.

Later this month the couple hope to work their way across the Atlantic on an Italian vessel, then scoot the last lap home. So far as they know no one before, countess or not, has ever girdled the globe on a motor scooter.

Here are a few of their impressions of America:

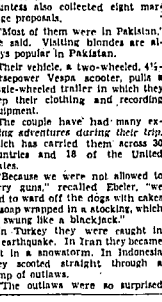
"We always thought New York City was in New Jersey."

"We had the wrong idea about the United States. We thought it would be noisy, with everybody honking his motor horn or whistling at girls on the street. It isn't that way at all. You have a quiet country."

"We found family life here much stronger than we expected."

"We are amazed to see how few houses have fences. It is quite thrilling to see so few fences."

"Your man in the street may not be too familiar with international affairs, but he seems to know every-

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—Playwright Robert Emmett Sherwood died following a coronary thrombosis today at the age of 52.

Sherwood entered New York hospital early Saturday morning after suffering the attack at his home. He suffered a setback about noon yesterday and was reported in steadily worsening condition this morning.

He died at 9:55 a. m. the hospital reported.

Sherwood was the author of more than a dozen Broadway hits plays and a definitive political biography, "Roosevelt and Hopkins: An Intimate History."

He had been an intimate of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, serving in several wartime posts in Washington. He left his post as overseas director of the office of war information in 1944 to join the President's campaign speech-writing staff.

A new Sherwood play, "Small War on Murray Hill," is scheduled for production shortly by the playwright company of which he was a founding member.
