Air Collisions
Danger Noted
With Concern

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—The air is so crowded these days that airlines pilots are getting worried about the danger of collisions.

The skies aren't so jammed as highways yet. But because of booming air traffic and other factors the Airline Pilots association warns that the collision menace is very real and getting worse.

There has been a lot of excitement about the problem of air collisions as a result of the recent simultaneous destruction of a United Airlines plane in Colorado. But the pilots really fear more attention.

The association cited these reasons in its official publication:
1. Air traffic is booming, not only on commercial lines but in private and business flying.
2. There is more bad weather flying than to better navigational aids, but this in turn creates a new danger—it puts more planes in the air under blind-flying conditions and increases the chances for air collisions.
3. With all the improvements in aircraft design, one factor has been largely ignored—cockpit vision. A pilot moving at 200 miles an hour can see only five per cent of the sky.

MOSCOW, Nov. 17 (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Soviet Communist party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev left today by plane for a three-week swing through southern Asia, including state visits to India and Burma.

The Soviet leaders and their party took off from Moscow Saturday at 4:12 a. m. (8:12 p. m. EST Wednesday) in two Ilyushin-14 transport planes. They are scheduled to stop first at Tashkent, one of the oldest cities in central Asia, before continuing to New Delhi where the government of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru was reported to have prepared an elaborate state welcome for their arrival Friday.

A small group of eastern diplomats was at the airport to see the Soviet leaders off. No western diplomats were present—even Swedish ambassador Holm Sothman, dean of the diplomatic corps, begged off because of the hour.

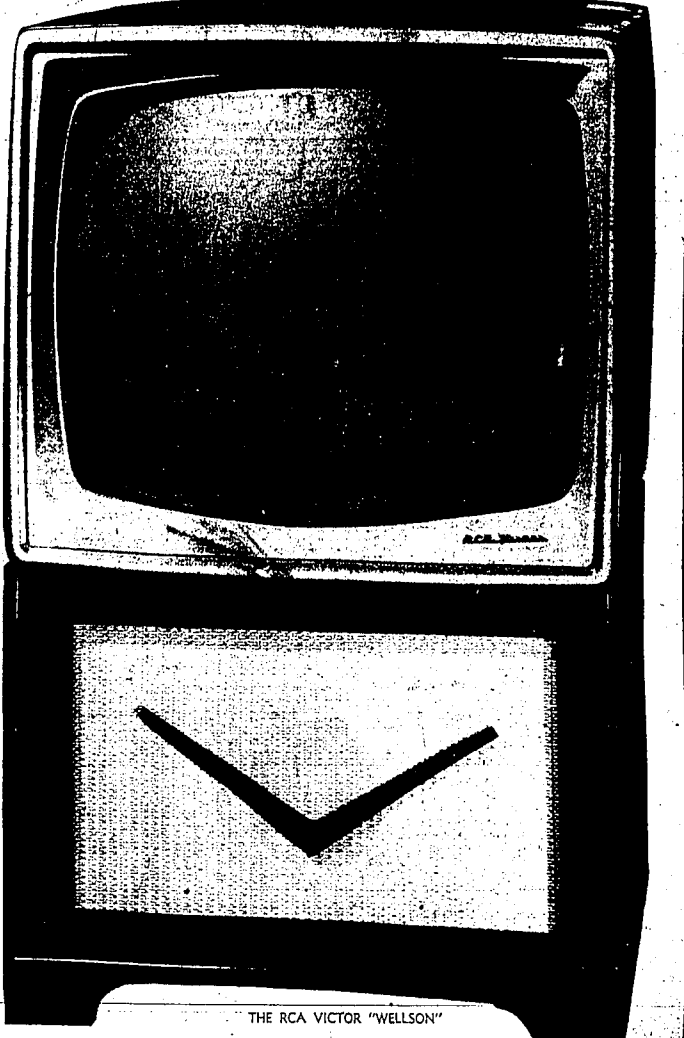

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U.S. Agencies, Pentagon Begin Large Scale Uses of Electronic Automation

WASHINGTON (NEA)—While Congress probes automation U. S. agencies promote it.

In the armed services and almost every U. S. office a revolution in procedure, operations and planning is going on through widespread use of electronic "brains" and automatic equipment to save labor and increase efficiency.

Use of giant computers for industrial planning, control of production and clerical work, and the use of new automatic machinery in electronic brains and factories is called automation.

Startling advances which the federal government has made in automation also comes to light as the joint congressional committee on the economic report opens a major investigation of the subject.

Rep. Wright Patman, D. Tex., who is heading the probe, hopes to discover such things as how much employment in industry automation will cause, how it will affect mass purchasing power and labor will share its benefits.

The American Federation of Labor's government employees unions has appeared to the department of defense to set up a special committee to study automation's effects on federal workers.

In the government automation has had its greatest impact on all types of activities in the services and in the Pentagon.

The use of workers on the army's artillery shell manufacturing lines has been up a reported 20 per cent by new automatic transfer machinery. Electronic machines used by the adjutant general's office now tell in a few moments exactly how many men are on leave, on sick call or in the guard house.

A few years ago this information would have taken months to compile and required the work of hundreds of clerks.

New machines at the army's Rock Island, Ill. arsenal now provide a complete electronic catalog of every production machine tool the army owns. It can tell in a few moments, for instance, what tools would be needed and where they are available to start up a tank production line.

This is a great mobilization aid. All the existing and 450 million electronic brains floating out the vast and complex problems of supply and

Crowds Hail Sultan After 2-Year Exile

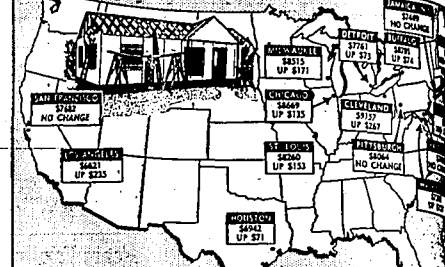

Accidental Discovery May Be Oldest Find of Prehistoric American People

One day last August Aas Johnson was operating his dray—kind kind about a mile from a construction site near the western town of Turin.

Suddenly the line uncovered what looked like human bones. Aas Johnson jumped down, took a closer look and promptly called the county coroner.

Johnson hadn't found a mine—nor any fossils—but he had, further, made one of the most notable archaeological discoveries in the history of North America.

Experts from the State University of Iowa, summoned to Turin, soon confirmed the skeleton uncovered by Johnson's drayline was one of the most important discoveries on this continent man ever made on this continent.

Working with small shovels, hand trowels and wheel brushes, scientists turned up three more skeletons at the site and established they were 3,000 to 4,000 years old—maybe as much as 9,000 to 10,000 years old.

Says Dr. R. J. Ruppel, state university anthropologist who helped direct removal of the skeletons: "It will be one of the most important finds in the new world if the dates are on the order of 9,000 to 10,000 years of age. It then becomes the only site with more than one human being present, and one of the only two sites which are absolutely documented and about which there is no question of placement of the remains."

"It's the only early man site which provides evidence on the basis of all practices. Even if the date is found to be around 3,000 or 4,000 years old, it is still extremely important as it is found in a well-preserved, undisturbed, datable back to the Wisconsin glacial period, about 10,000 years ago and other finds are known in this material."

The four Turin skeletons, Ruppel adds, are "by far the largest number of human bones found in glacial deposits."

Bones are found, a carbon 14 dating process may be employed later to determine more accurately the age of the skeletons. Carbon 14 is a radioactive isotope present in all living matter. It disintegrates at a constant rate. That makes it possible—through a complicated laboratory process—to establish fairly accurate dates for archaeological specimens.

A year or more of painstaking laboratory and field tests remain before scientists will be able to make final appraisals of "Turin man." In order to become valid, or widely accepted, these appraisals will have to satisfy other archeologists.

One foremost expert on early man, Dr. Marie Westwood, curator of archeology at Denver's Museum of Natural History and author of the authoritative "Ancient Man in North America," said after an inspection of the Turin site:

"It is entirely possible that the skeletons found at Turin could be of early post-glacial age—some 9,000 years old—but it still will be important if they should prove to be much younger, for information about this period is urgently needed."

The Turin skeletons—of a man, a child, 6 to 10 years of age, an adolescent, and a tiny infant—were uncovered about 20 feet below the crest of a bluff and were within 30 feet of each other. All were in a two-foot vertical line.

"The essentially complete nature of the skeletons," says Dr. Ruppel, "will allow many more observations of their structure and function."

anatomical facts than have heretofore been possible, since previous discoveries have been more fragmentary.

The bodies may have been buried widely different times, but Dr. Westwood thinks the location of the four skeletons "suggests a definite cemetery area is represented."

At least two of the bodies were inflexed, or doubled up, position, with knees drawn up to chest, further indicating formal burial. Up to the Turin discoveries, it had not been supposed that the disposal of the dead was attended by such formality in the rugged post-glacial era.

There's definite evidence that red ochre was sprinkled on one of the skeletons.

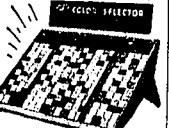

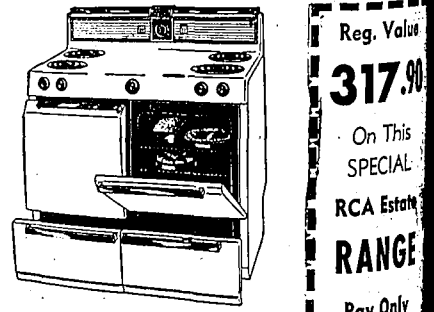

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Demos Study New Pledges On "Loyalty"

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—The Democratic national committee today was expected to adopt a compromise "loyalty" pledge imposing the choice of the party's 1956 presidential convention on all delegates.

The proposal had the backing of Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler, who said he would recommend its approval when the committee opens a one-day meeting at 10 a. m. EST.

Butler predicted the committee would approve the proposal, which is designed to settle a major dispute between northern and southern Democrats.

Under the plan the making of a convention delegate would constitute a pledge by the party's leaders of that state that the convention nominee will be placed on the ballot.

Some Democrats had pressed for a signed statement binding delegates to support the man chosen to run for President at next year's convention. Others had wanted no loyalty pledge at all.

The new proposal was recorded as a compromise between the two points of view and was drawn up by a special committee headed by Stephen A. Mitchell, former national chairman.

Split Caused
The loyalty issue caused a major party split in 1948, when "Dixiecrats" refused to place Harry S. Truman on their ballots.

In 1952, some southern states adopted a rule that delegates are obliged to support a nominee they voted for, if they simply didn't vote.

Butler contended that the new plan depends on the "good faith" of state party leaders.

Appointments Set
The chairman was also scheduled to recommend the appointment of three vice-chairmen to represent Democrat state governors, senators, and representatives on the national committee.

It was reported that Butler would recommend Gov. Robert W. Meyner of New Jersey, Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana, and Rep. Hale Boggs of Louisiana.

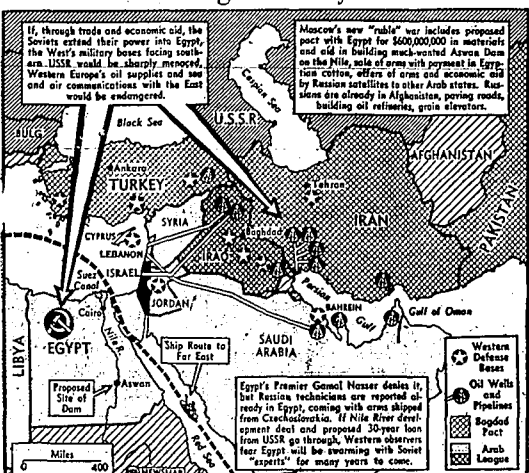
All three men are regarded as backers of Adlai E. Stevenson, who announced only two days ago that he is running for the Democratic presidential nomination next year.

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Battle of Eyed Group Army and State Department Can Offer Special Men Special Foreign Training

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—United States has a new training program for overseas personnel.

Both the army and the state department are giving high priority to foreign training programs so that U. S. representatives abroad may operate with greater skill.

At the state department's foreign service institute, plans include bringing highest ranking U. S. diplomats from the field to participate in strategic "diplomatic games."

Other U. S. agencies with personnel overseas are giving advantages of the wide range of courses offered at the institute. And it is to be hoped that this will become the place where specialized training for foreign assignments can be given.

The army is carrying out a highly selective educational program for officers abroad with its main emphasis directed at study and understanding of the Soviet Union.

Foreign area specialist training of the army is given to this unique highly qualified officers each year. These men must be college graduates with exceptional army records and three years experience with troops.

"This is a very expensive form of training," says Maj. Gen. Arthur G. Truett, recent assistant chief of staff for intelligence. "We estimate that over-all cost is between \$50,000 and \$60,000 per man. So we get them into the program while they are young enough to give the government full return on its investment."

The FAST grind starts off with a year at the army language school at Monterey, Calif. This study is supplemented by 12 months at a civilian university in this country or abroad.

Here the student concentrates on the geographic, cultural, social, economic and military background of one area. He can choose Russia, China, Japan, the Middle East or South Asia.

Then he spends approximately two years at what amounts to "on the job training" assigned to army military attaches in various countries or special intelligence detachments in Japan or Germany.

Approximately 40 officers in this category are now stationed at Ogrammerga, Germany, where they are becoming experts on Soviet Russia. For obvious reasons they cannot train in the USSR.

"We look forward to a time," said Truett, "when every one of our attaches, missions and military assistance advisory groups will be staffed by FAST graduates. At present, the military designates to Iran, Japan and Russia are FAST officers."

In the civilian realm, the foreign service institute is launching a comprehensive program to give in-service training to employees ranging from file clerks to career ministers.

The institute also offers courses to overseas employees of the U. S. information agency, commerce and agriculture departments, and the international cooperation administration.

Its main purpose, however, is to

The institute now has an enrollment of 250 full time students and 650 part time students. Their staff, which is drawn mainly from within the ranks of the foreign service, numbers approximately 40 full time instructors and 60 part time teachers.

Twenty languages are taught, from Polish to Portuguese to Russian. And the courses, to mention a few, include communist strategy, reading rate improvement, the current American scene and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The institute has set up three basic courses. Junior and middle grade officers are now required to take three months of courses before they can be assigned abroad or promoted.

A high level seminar is being worked out for top flight FSO's and career ministers who may participate on a volunteer basis. Hoekins

Folios Called
Hospital workers called police who found Isaacson calmly waiting for them, his 22 caliber pistol in his hand. He made no further attempt to use it.

Isaacson said his stomach pains "came from drinking water." He had been in hospital for mental patients here in 1946 and 1947. He was a mental patient in the state hospital at Agnew in 1952 and 1953.

It added Truman personally preferred Gov. Hartman of New York.

Truman's statement: "Mr. Roscoe Drummond's article is not based on fact. No one speaks for me on my choice of candidates, or my opinion concerning any of them. When I have anything to say I will say so openly as I have in Boston, Chicago and New Orleans. No one, I reiterate, speaks for me."

H-Bomb's Power Shown by Official

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10—The former chairman of the atomic energy commission said yesterday that the devastating power of hydrogen bombs "is not generally understood."

Such a bomb, Gordon Dean told the national convention of the Public Relations Society of America, may contain 1,000 square miles, or an area 70 miles long by 70 wide.

"The effects of atomic and hydrogen weapons must be fully understood if we are to protect ourselves in the event of attack," he emphasized.

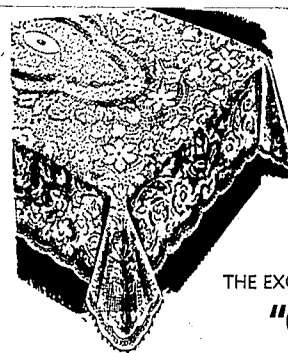

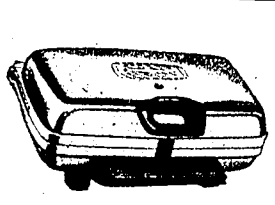

Cold Wave Batters Midwest, Knives Deep Into Southlands

A vast cold wave lashed the Midwest and deep into the heart of the southland today.

The worst blast hit Michigan, where gale-force 70-mile-per-hour winds accounted for the death of two Detroit men. One was killed when the wind toppled a 30-foot wall on him, and the other perished when a sheet of steel was blown on him while he was working on a construction scaffold.

Scores of hunters were feared strayed from the states' snow-blanketed north woods and state legislators meeting in a special session at Lansing last night were unable to drive out of the city. The high winds stranded 50 freighters at the mouth of Lake Erie and Great Lakes shipping was virtually halted.

Gate force winds also lashed Chicago, injuring three persons and in Wisconsin small craft searched for two hunters missing since high winds blowing from the north bay into a frenzy. Two other hunters were brought to safety after a search of several hours on Wisconsin's Lake Winnebago.

In Minnesota, 600 pieces of equipment were called out to clear north-south highways of eight to 10 inches of snow. In Indiana, heavy rain and floods added to the misery in Ohio and Indiana.

The Miami river swelled up near Dayton, O., after 2 1/2 inches of rain, forcing the evacuation of residential areas along the river banks. The river kept rising at the rate of eight inches an hour and rescue units were called out to help the stranded. In central and southern Indiana, more than four inches of rain sent flash floods swirling across high-

School Costs Are Itemized For Trustees

BURLEY, Nov. 17—The annual audit for the Casala county school district was presented to the board Monday night by Orland Bateman, auditor. The audit shows a total expenditure for 1954-55, to June 30, 1955, of \$1,000,883.25. The balance owed by the school district on bonded indebtedness is \$1,035,000.

General control, including election expenses, census, and other special publications, telephone, secretarial and administrative salaries cost \$272,000. Total expenditures for instructional service was \$469,058.73. This included textbooks, tests, general school supplies, special school supplies and principal and teacher salaries.

Plant operation cost \$154,974. This covers fuel, water, light and power, janitorial supplies and janitor salaries. For the maintenance of plants which includes electric service, plumbing and heating service, furniture, instructional equipment, and buildings, \$272,000 was spent. The auxiliary agencies, the libraries, agricultural and home economics departments, and realties used \$12,332.72.

The fixed charges which cover insurance payments were \$18,255.84. The debt service for principal and interest on bonded indebtedness was \$53,077.07. The total cost for new purchases of instructional equipment, furniture and for improvement to grounds and buildings took \$16,692.47.

The total spent on transportation was \$15,023. This covered the salaries of mechanics and drivers, new buses, parts, repairs, gas and oil, grease, tires and tubes, maintenance of transportation buildings, and insurance on school buses.

The balance on hand in the general fund on June 30, 1955, was \$125,944.26. At that time, however, there were \$207,767.77 in outstanding warrants that had not cleared through the bank.

Supt. Bernel Wigley reported arrangements had been completed with Box Elder county, Utah, to transport Tracy and Montgomery pupils from Idaho to Utah. The county school buses will go two miles into the Clear creek area to take pupils to the Clear creek station. Wigley also reported that Mrs. Lloyd Cox has been employed to assist Mrs. Max Hymns in the school for exceptional children.

Mechanization of Farms Widens Rifts Between "Small" and "Big" Operations

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17—Rapid mechanization of agriculture spurred by huge war and postwar demands is serving to pour fuel on a long smoldering rift between "small" and "big" farmers. And declining prices of farm products the past few years are serving to fan the feud.

Recent hearings on farm problems held by the senate agricultural committee in major farming areas of the country indicated this division may become a major issue—along with farm price supports—in next year's presidential campaign.

Machinery, electrification, better seeds, improved fertilizers and the like are making it possible to grow more and more crops on fewer and fewer acres. Likewise, new feeds are opening the way to the production of more meat, eggs and poultry with less feed and labor.

By an increase in the average size of farms. This situation is bringing to the forefront demands of some farmers and their leaders that the nation decide whether agriculture is to be regarded as merely a business-type enterprise or a social institution designed not only to produce food and fiber, but to preserve a rural way of life.

Conflict over these two philosophies dominated many of the committee hearings. This development has given rise to new demands that government farm policies be designed to protect the "family-type" farm against the encroachment of corporate-type farming.

bell Sets New Record Piloting Bluebird Over at 216 Miles Per Hour

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 17 (AP)—England's Don Malcolm Campbell, the only man to fly more than 200 miles an hour and live to tell about it, broke his own world record today when he jet powered Bluebird over Lake Mendocino at 216.2 miles an hour Wednesday.

Campbell cracked the mark of 202.32 which the debonair Britisher set at Lake Ullswater in England last July 24.

It also justified the confidence the 46-year-old spent time in stuning at new achievements when he brought his two and one-half ton, all-metal water monster to America nearly two months ago.

"The Bluebird was timed officially at the phenomenal speed of 239.5 on the first of two required runs over a measured kilometer distance, and 193.9 on the return run.

The only other man to exceed 200 miles an hour was John Cobb of England, who was killed and his jet propelled hydroplane derailed at a speed of 208 miles an hour one run in Scotland in 1932.

Campbell and the Bluebird at Lake Ullswater were timed at approximately 215 and 189 miles an hour for the 202.32 run.

Campbell, the son of the late land and water speed enthusiast, Sir Malcolm Campbell, was a happy man when he disembarked out of his cockpit.

"The run down was fine," he said, "but on the way back the wind had come up and the water was a little rough."

"I took a terrific beating," he said, "but it was all worth it because I might have been hurt through the plastic canopy protecting him had it not been for the shoulder straps which lock him in the single seat cockpit."

On Campbell's July record run, the world mark was 178 miles an hour, set in 1932 by Stanley Stayer's Shero-Shun IV of Seattle.

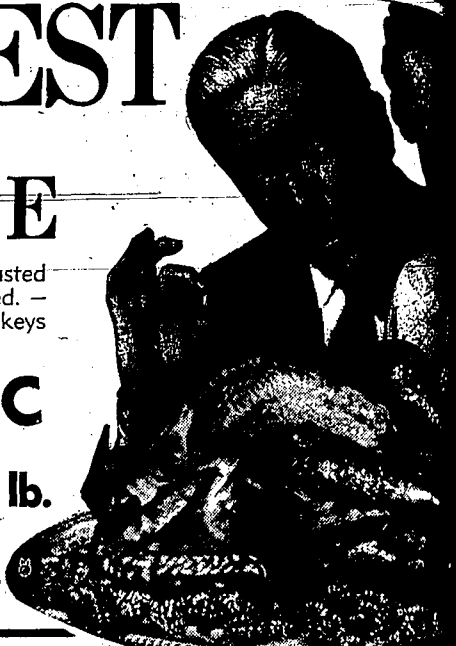

Emphasis Put On Turkey in Food Markets

By The Associated Press
The emphasis will be on turkey in most of the nation's food stores this week-end.

Most dealers figure that many housewives will be buying their Thanksgiving birds on Friday or Saturday, rather than early next week, so turkeys will top the list of advertised specials. It's generally agreed that they will cost more than they did a year ago—perhaps five or six cents a pound—because production is down around four per cent. The national turkey federation stresses, however, that there will be ample supplies of plump birds.

Other Meat Cited
For the forthcoming week-end, stores will have a good selection of worthwhile buys in meats. Prime ribs will be widely featured, with prices down to four cents a pound from a week ago in many instances. Sirloin steaks will be lower, too, and some other types of steaks will be available at sale prices in many outlets.

Lags of lamb and loins of pork are other favorite week-end selections. Fryers, on the other hand, will cost you more than a week ago. Price advances of around six cents a pound will be fairly common.

Scattered stores plan to feature such items as smoked ham, chuck roast, round roasts and cross-rib roast.

Vegetables Get Flattering
There's a good choice of vegetables to be had at reasonable prices. The best buys include beets, cabbage, onions, potatoes, radishes and turnips (both yellow and white). Also recommended by produce men are cauliflower, beans, cucumbers, spiced celery, spinach, scallions, endive, eggplant, yams and artichokes. Peppers, carrots and golden heart celery are higher.

Apples are considered a good buy in fruit, although there is a wide range in quality. Lemons are cheap. Bananas are among the better buys in grapes.

Citrus Is Cited
Oranges and grapefruit are up slightly at wholesale but are rated good buys, nevertheless. Tangerines are moderately priced.

Except for peaches, nuts are on the scarce side and rather high in price, according to produce specialists.

Coffee prices are due to come down, following cuts in wholesale prices of around four cents a pound in the last week by leading roasters. It's expected that chain stores will be turning prices on their private brands of coffee, too.

Other Worlds May Exist in Outer Spaces

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Alan may be on the verge of proving that other worlds exist in space beyond the solar system.

Dr. Helen B. Hoze, astrophysicist of the National Science Foundation, told the United Press that this could well be "one of the great scientific events of the coming decade."

Proof Sought
She said at least 100 observations are searching intensively for "gravitational proof" that the nearer stars possess planets like those, the earth, among them, which swing orbitally around the sun.

Most modern astronomers believe there may be in the universe millions, perhaps billions, of life-bearing worlds similar to the earth. But even the nearest presumably would be far too tiny and too dim to be viewed directly by even the greatest telescope now in existence.

Experts Quoted
Assuming science does establish gravitational proof of planets outside the sun's system, will man ever reach the means actually to see them? The United Press put the question to some others who have thought about the difficulties involved. Their comment follows:

"The will, the money or the order of atmosphere turbulence is the big obstacle now. But suppose the rocket means were developed to a space laboratory outside the atmosphere. In that event there would be some means of communicating with others who have thought about the difficulties involved. Their comment follows:

"There is a very little hope of ever reaching the moon with the instruments we have now. But nothing is impossible."

Astronomer Francis P. Scott of the Naval Observatory—"If I could find some smart fellow would come along and do it."

Benjamin Adelman of the national capital astronomer—"It might be possible if we could establish an observatory on the moon."

Article Noted
A new statement of theoretical reasons for belief in "other worlds than ours" appears in the current Atlantic monthly. It was written by Donald H. Menzel, director of Harvard observatory. He believes that "life, even human or super-human life, may exist in millions of places in the universe."

As of now, however, about all that astronomy hopes to prove in the reasonably near future is that there are other planetary systems in the regions of space closest to the sun.

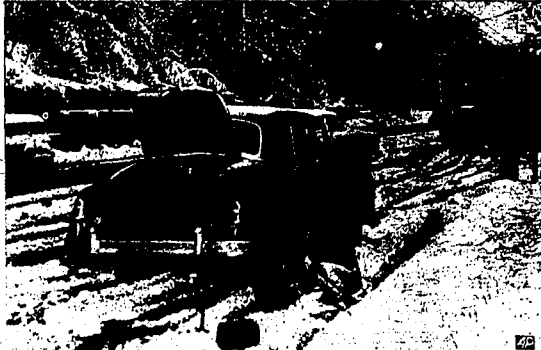

Whisky Aids In Rescue of Suicidal Try

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—Two priests, a fireman and a pint of whisky were credited today with saving the life of a would-be suicide who leetered for more than an hour above a crowded downtown street.

The man, Armand Fred Escalante, 30-year-old cleaner and dyer, horrified a huge throng of downtown shoppers yesterday as he clung to the base of a flagstaff at the edge of the roof of the Veterans Administration building.

The entire incident occurred in full view of the United Press San Francisco bureau located on the top of the San Francisco News building across the street.

Sirens Jammed
Escalante began his exhibition at about 3:15 p.m., and within minutes the streets were jammed with firemen, police and curious onlookers.

Hallex and with his tan trenchcoat whipping in the wind, Escalante alternately stood on the ledge and sat on the brink with his legs hanging in space.

About 20 firemen held a circular rescue net on the sidewalk about 100 feet below. Escalante screamed and cursed his would-be rescuers and held them at bay with

threats to "keep back or I'll jump." About an hour later, the man drank a cup of coffee and smoked a cigarette offered by Father Joseph Wong of nearby St. Patrick's church.

Battalion Fire Chief Joseph Dykes then offered Escalante a pint of whisky. The man reached out gingerly and took the bottle. He pulled some money from his pocket and offered it to Dykes in payment.

As Dykes reached for the money, he grabbed Escalante by the leg. Father Wong and Father Martin Walsh grabbed the man and he was pulled to safety.

Escalante's sister-in-law, who arrived on the scene shortly before the rescue, said she received a letter from Escalante yesterday morning in which he threatened to jump from a "tall building" or the Golden Gate bridge.

"All he wanted to do was find his wife," she explained.

Escalante's estranged wife, Laura, was on her way up in an elevator when the rescue was made. The couple was reunited at the psychiatric ward of San Francisco hospital where Escalante was taken for treatment and observation.

Hells Canyon Dams Are Cited As Example of "Partnership"

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (Special)—Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay took the Hells Canyon issue this week as a prime example of the administration's "partnership" policy in natural resources development.

McKay cited the Idaho Power company's three-dam proposal before a gathering of Republican leaders at Burlington, Vt.

"Contrary to false and exaggerated charges that have been made against the administration by those who would promote a federal power monopoly, there is a great variety of projects now pending," McKay said.

Foremost among those which demonstrate the private end of the partnership is Idaho Power's proposed Snake river plan, he declared.

"For years federal construction of a high dam at Hells canyon has been rejected by congress. Now the Idaho Power company has been authorized by the federal power commission to go ahead with power development in this area. Private construction will have the government the 350 million dollar cost of the federal dam and the northwest will get the power it needs."

All this does not mean the federal government has "washed" the hands of power and natural resources development, McKay said.

Among the projects which will enjoy exclusive federal participation is the Upper Colorado river storage project now pending before congress. McKay pointed out.

A "partnership" project between federal and local interests is the giant John Day dam in Washington-Oregon, McKay said.

Such a broad program, he concluded, cannot help but influence the nation's voters at election time next year.

"With this start I know you will furnish the sinews of victory," he told his Republican colleagues, "so that our party will sweep to municipal, county, state and national victory next year."

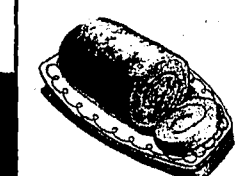

Cold Season Is Here; Expert Proffers Advice for Avoiding and Curing Colds

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—The cold season is with us again. It's time to winterize.

Scientists are working on vaccines but these won't be around for quite a while. An expert said today that plain old-fashioned horse sense is still about the only weapon man has against his age-old enemy. The common cold is by all odds the most notorious member of the respiratory infection family. But it has some equally unattractive relatives, like grippe, influenza, bronchitis and virus pneumonia.

Together, these diseases cause America more mass misery than any other illness. The average person gets six attacks a year. Children are particularly hard hit. And the cost in lost wages and production is more than two billion dollars annually.

In spite of these discouraging facts, Dr. Norman B. McCullough said there are many simple things people can do to avoid colds—and to hold down the damage if they do get them.

His prescription: Get plenty of rest, avoid chills, wear sensible clothing, and don't dope yourself with a lot of unnecessary drugs.

McCullough knows what he's talking about. He is clinical director of the National Microbiological Institute and an authority on upper respiratory infections.

He took issue in an interview with many of the so-called cold remedies now in general use. He said science hasn't come up with a cure yet and there's no use pretending it has.

McCullough asserted that anti-influenza drugs which have been in vogue in recent years don't do any good at all. They help in some kinds of allergy, he said, but have no effect on an honest-to-goodness case of cold or grippe.

The same applies to heat rubs, bicarbonate of soda and similar home cures, McCullough said. They aren't any help and, in some cases, could be harmful.

McCullough also warned against the indiscriminate use of antibiotics. He conceded penicillin, for example, helps in some kinds of pneumonia and sinusitis when they are caused by bacteria. But he said antibiotics don't do any good in ordinary cases of cold, grippe and similar infections which are mostly caused by viruses.

McCullough said nose drops help clear clogged nasal passages. But he warned they shouldn't be used for more than three days. After three days, he said, they inflame the mucous membranes and do more damage than good.

In short, McCullough said the best way to beat the respiratory infections this winter is to prevent them. And to do this, he recommended a simple list:

- 1. Avoid undue fatigue. Overexertion reduces resistance, allowing latent viruses to flare into activity and cause trouble.
- 2. Avoid chills. It is particularly important to avoid drafts while sleeping. Chills also reduce resistance.
- 3. Avoid close contact with others who have colds.
- 4. Avoid overheating. Wear light-weight underclothes, moderate weight suit or dress and overcoat.
