

Time Device Seen Link in Graham Case

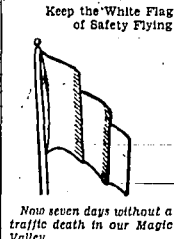
DENVER, Nov. 10 (AP)—Authorities refused Saturday to confirm or deny a published report that Jack O'Connell, Graham, accused of murdering his mother by dynamiting a commercial airplane, purchased a time device before the fatal crash.

The Rocky Mountain News said it learned Graham bought the device last month for \$525 at a local electric supply company in Denver. The newspaper said the device, four inches by two inches, is a type used for turning on kitchen fans or other household appliances.

Dist. Atty. H. M. Keating, who is handling the state case against Graham, said he would not confirm or deny the reported purchase of the timing device. The FBI also would not comment.

Graham, 23, is accused of planting 25 sticks of dynamite aboard the plane on a flight from Denver to near Alton, Colo. Nov. 1 just 11 minutes after it had taken off from Denver.

All 44 persons aboard the plane, including Graham's mother, Mrs. Daisie King, 49, were killed.

Dionne Quint Quits Convent For Hospital

Notre Dame D'Espérance hospital, where Marie's sister Cecile and Wilma, who is training as a nurse, said she will be kept under observation for a month.

She said funds received locally are used to provide chest X-rays, radiographs of patients and help support the mobile chest X-ray unit.

Part of the money donated over the country is used for medical research to find out more about the tuberculosis germ that causes it and the way human bodies react to it.

The Twin Falls county organization is composed of persons interested in the development of programs to control and eliminate the disease. It is a voluntary organization and members receive no monetary compensation.

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Military Posts' Schools in South Take Negroes and Whites; No Trouble Seen

Teachers are teaching voluntarily in the integrated post schools. And some southern educators and observers are watching the military experiment closely.

De-segregation of schools on southern military posts, begun during the Truman administration, was all but completed this fall under an Eisenhower administration order banning separate racial schools after Sept. 1.

Some 77 post schools, almost all at the elementary level, are now operating on an integrated basis in 10 southern and border states. The only military bases still having segregated schools are the army posts at Ft. Meade, Md., and Pine Bluff, Ark., where the government contends its deadline. All post schools in the "deep south" are run by the armed forces. Local officials there refused to operate integrated schools for the military.

This reporter visited four post schools—two in Florida and Texas—where integrated this fall, one in

Alabama last fall and the fourth, in Georgia, in September, 1953.

Post commanders, school officials, teachers and parents said the schools were working smoothly with but rare instances of minor racial friction. The small number of Negroes involved, almost certainly had a bearing on this.

At Eglin air force base on Florida's Gulf coast, Dr. James N. Lulon, Tennessee-born principal, has 192 Negroes among his 802 students.

Orus Kinney, assistant principal, fresh from segregated Alabama schools, said integration "is working fine here." He said neither he nor his wife, teaching at Eglin, had any hesitation about integrating Negroes and whites together at the air force-operated school.

"It doesn't matter who the children are," said Kinney. "The more people we educate the better off we are, particularly in the south."

He knew of one teacher who turned down a job at Eglin because of integration. "The sole Negro on the staff of 22 is the school librarian.

Kinney said she was fully acceptable to the other teachers, nearly all southerners.

The Negro librarian, a native of South Carolina whose son attends the Eglin school, said the teachers and school officials were "wonderful" to her and there were "no references" to her race.

Miss C, a young white teacher



born and educated in Mississippi, had taught a year in an all-white school in Meridian, Miss., before coming to Eglin. She said she was the envy of other first grade teachers because she drew the school's only Negro first grader.

"She is very appealing," Miss C said of her pig-tailed pupil. "She was at the class average when school



started and now is ahead. She dresses way above average. Her speech is funny. But she'll talk like the rest before long."

A white Mississippi mother, whose 11-year-old daughter attends Eglin's fifth grade, said she is "not opposed to integration at all." She was against racial intermarriage but did not think an integrated school's



would lead her daughter to marry a Negro.

At Ft. Benning, Ga., the three post elementary schools were integrated in the fall of 1953 and now have about 1,700 white and 35 Negro pupils. The teachers—so far all white—are mostly from Georgia and Alabama. Officials expect to hire school's Negro teacher in a year or two.

Jobless Aid for All Workers Is Aim of Folsom

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Secretary of Welfare Folsom has urged that congress extend unemployment coverage to all workers industry.

Folsom was the first witness before the joint economic committee's subcommittee on low income families as it opened hearings on ways to help the low-income group improve its earnings and level of living.

When in LA Grande Sept. 15, 1935, Miss Elizabeth Blinger suggested I see Mr. Roy Owen, Oregon highway commissioner.

I asked him: "How about crossing Oregon at its old boundary near the Huntington-Ontario cutoff starts? Of course, there is a better route, but either would be river grade up Idaho side."

George said that he believed "on the whole Mr. Dulles has made a good report under the disappointing circumstances he found to exist in Geneva."

Mansfield said the failure of the Geneva talks to result in a treaty was not played for political advantage.

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Schools Seen Helping Low Income Class

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Samuel M. Brownell, U. S. commissioner of education, said Saturday schools alone cannot remedy the plight of low income families. But, he said, they can be a "effective instrument" in such efforts.

Brownell, in testimony prepared for the Senate-house economic subcommittee on low income families, said children from such families are most likely to drop from school. "This, he said, tends to create a vicious cycle" because the school grade attained by an individual largely determines his income.

Brownell said 1939 census figures show that average annual income varied from \$1,108 for those with no schooling to \$2,533 for those with eight years of secondary education and \$4,497 for those with four years of college.

The committee heard testimony from some witnesses who said federal aid to education would be a major means of helping low income families improve their status.

Secretary of Welfare Folsom said the administration is taking a "fresh look" at the situation. He said he and President Eisenhower "have discussed a number of possible improvements and revisions which we are considering in the administration's proposals for federal assistance."

Brownell, on that point, said the administration is "introducing legislative proposals to the Office of Education to lend greater assistance to state and local agencies in their educational efforts."

Higher Supports On Milk Sought

CHICAGO, Nov. 19 (AP)—Representatives of milk producers Saturday called for higher price supports for their output.

Spokesmen for the National Milk Producers Federation headed by E. M. Norton, executive secretary, appeared before the Democratic national committee's advisory committee on agriculture.

"Immediate increase in price support levels for milk and dairy products should be made mandatory," he stated, pending the adoption of a self-help program for the industry.

Jeep-Riding Pair Drives Into Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 19 (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Schneider arrived here today on their 17,000-mile Jeep ride from Circle City, Alaska, which began in June, 1934.

Queen Elizabeth Presents Modern Note to Services

LONDON, Nov. 10—Queen Elizabeth, who has an almost abject wearing a V-necked dress and unmistakable expression of "wheezy" carrying a black leather purse, walked into the throne room at Buckingham palace.

In front of her stood nearly 200 of her subjects, awaiting the "investiture" a royal ceremony, almost as ancient as the crown itself, of present honors.

In back of the queen, dressed in the splendor of centuries long, stood the traditional guardians of the sovereign, carrying their long spears of office.

In back of them stood the throne itself. As the center figure of an ancient ceremony and in surroundings hundreds of years old, stood the queen in her V-necked dress.

No one more than the queen herself reflected this blending of the very old in the tradition of the crown and the very new of 1935.

She looked as if she had dropped in for a cup of tea. But there was no mistaking, from her manner, that she was queen.

Five investitures are being held this fall. The latest one was held this week.

For the ordinary Briton, there is no greater honor than to step before the queen and have her pin on him the order of the British empire or the order of St. Michael and St. George. A similar honor, awarded for meritorious services of many kinds from heroism in battle to a lifetime of work in a mine or on a railroad.

There is nothing like it in the United States. It is as much a symbol of a Briton's success as it is his being a member of the crown.

But no matter how hard he has worked for the honor, and no matter how proud of it he is, he is likely to say after the ceremony:

"How does the queen do?"

"It is standing in one spot for an hour, pinning on up to 200 medals, shaking 200 hands and making pleasant and smiling-conversation with 200 unknown faces.

The queen hardly ever falters. But there are a few times in the long

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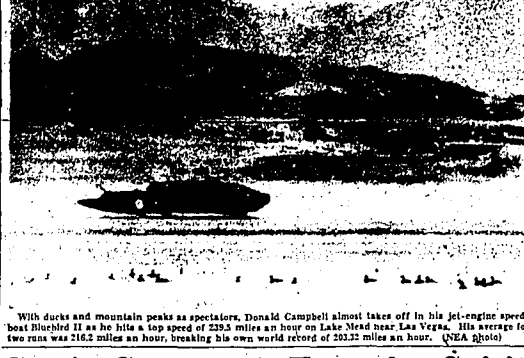

191 Killed in Plane Crashes In 4 1/2 Months

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10—More persons have died in commercial airplane crashes in the United States since July 1 than in any of the last three years, according to government records.

The civil aeronautics board said Friday's crash of a non-scheduled airliner in Seattle brought to 191 the number of persons killed in crashes of domestic passenger planes since July 1. Six airliners—two unscheduled—have crashed.

Domestic airline crashes killed 33 persons last year, 169 in 1953 and 81 in 1952.

The total of six airliner crashes since July 1 is the highest for any five-month period since November, 1951-March, 1952, when seven airliners cracked up. Eleven airliners crashed up to October, 1954, and February, 1947, and six between September, 1945, and January, 1946.

Airliner fatalities so far this year include Friday's crash, totaled 232 for domestic flights of U. S. scheduled and non-scheduled airlines. This is the highest since 1951 when 233 persons died.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10—Mrs. Helen D. Parkinson ran out of gas on the Fourth street bridge.

Returning with a can of fuel, she found a strange man looting her belongings out of the car. She protested, and he knocked her down and began banging her head against the pavement.

Mrs. Parkinson, 33, said there were at least 50 persons standing around but none came to her aid until a truckdriver stopped.

Her assailant then fled, to be captured minutes later by a motorcycle policeman.

"When I was yelling for help," Mrs. Parkinson said afterwards, "I saw one man calmly eating an apple."

Police identified the arrested man as a transient.

The machine is the result of considerable research and experimentation, but a prototype model will be made for and purchased by the Idaho Potato Producers association for field trial use in several packing houses in the state.

The association is charged by virtue of its contract with the commis-

alon on research and education work for Idaho's potato industry.

Following such trials it is anticipated that shippers will purchase machines to the end that all potatoes leaving Idaho will carry the name of the state of their origin.

The system will implement a long-sought means of carrying Idaho's reputation to the ultimate consumer.

Frank Albaugh represented Packers Service, Los Angeles, inventor of the machine, at the meeting.

Births Outstrip Deaths Three To One for August Statistics

More than three to one during August, reports the state department of public health.

A total of 1465 births and 491 deaths was reported during August. Heart disease was the leading cause of death again, accounting for 144 deaths or 29.6 per cent.

Births in the nine Magic Valley counties were Blaine, 13, with one being born at home; Camas, five; Elmore, 65; Gooding, 16; Jerome, 32; Minidoka, 20, and Twin Falls, 64.

The health department reported 58 infant deaths with Camas reporting one; Elmore, none; Jerome, one, and Twin Falls, one. All were under a month old. Of the six deaths of infants under a year old, Elmore county had one.

Magie Valley reported five of the 30 stillbirths recorded. Camas, county had one; Gooding, one; Jerome, one, and Twin Falls, two. Prema-turally deaths numbered 12 in August for the state. Camas reported six and three divorces; Gooding

had 12 marriages and 31 divorces; Jerome reported seven marriages; Lincoln had three marriages and four divorces; Minidoka listed nine marriages and three divorces, and Twin Falls recorded 23 marriages and six divorces.

An accident accounted for 33 deaths, 11 from auto wrecks, 10 occupational deaths, 10 from accidents in the home, and 10 others. Blaine had one accidental death. Elmore reported one heart disease death, one cancer and two from other causes. Gooding reported one heart disease death, one cancer and two from other causes. Jerome had three deaths from heart disease, one cancer and two from other causes. Lincoln had one death from cerebral hemorrhage and four deaths in August. Camas, Gooding, Lincoln and Minidoka had no accidental deaths by ages were: Blaine, one 15 to 24 years old, 31 to 44 years old, 45 to 64 years old, 65 and over, 8, and one where the age was not known.

Notifiable diseases reported during August rose from 420 last year to 469.

Blaine recorded two cancer cases; Camas reported one case of whooping cough; Camas listed one polio, two cancer, two whooping cough, one gonorrhea, one chicken pox, one mumps, one German measles and one other.
