New Soviet Blood Purge Reported; Six Officials Shot by Present Regime

BOISE, Nov. 22 (AP)—Soviet Russia disclosed today that six followers of the late Joseph Stalin were shot in the biggest known blood purge of the supposedly anti-Bulgarian-Khrushchev regime. The radio announced that six former police officers were executed for carrying out plots by the late Stalin to lead, covering up his misdeeds and framing his enemies. In addition, 25 persons were sentenced to terms of 25 years, capital or life imprisonment, for the same offenses.

Sales Tax Is Advised For Education Needs

BOISE, Nov. 22 (AP)—Trustees of Idaho's public schools, meeting in the last of seven regional conferences, called yesterday for a sales tax or a higher income tax to raise more money for public education. Roy Wilkins, Pyle, R. Gooding, chairman of the legislature's interim committee on education of the state's minimum education program, said similar suggestions had been made at the six other meetings held since October. Support for a sales tax came yesterday from James H. Knibus of Nampa, but Roy Kinoy Miller, D., Elmore, opposed it, saying: "It hits the small person who doesn't make much money. It wasn't working when we had it before and I don't think it will be brought back. It was the most unpopular tax we have ever had."

French Move To Quell New Riff Uprising

RABAT, Morocco, Nov. 22 (AP)—France poured in troop reinforcements today to quell a new uprising in the Rif mountains. Sultan Mohammed ben Youssef began a race with revolution to establish an independent Moroccan government. New violence also threatened in Casablanca. Thousands of grim-faced Moroccan soldiers shut their shops and left their jobs in that city to mass in a marching band at the head of their political prisoners slain in a prison mutiny. Nationalist agitators in Casablanca exhorted Moroccans to stop work today in open defiance of authority from Ben Youssef for peace and order in the violence-ridden North African territory. At least 20 persons have been killed in the wave of bloodshed and terrorism since the sultan's return to the throne. While the sultan sought to form a new national government that would be a coalition of the old and new, nationalist groups moved into the barren Moroccan mountains to the north, where they were led by Mohammed el-Bachir. The new trouble in the Rif flared first among the small, fertile valleys.

Demo Lashes His Foes for Phony Deeds

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 22 (AP)—Harrison, governor of New York, headed for Oregon today talking like a presidential candidate but continuing to vow he is not at this time.

Harrison lit into the Eisenhower administration's foreign policy in an address before a Democratic rally here last night.

Backs Morse

He said in his Oregon visit he would lend the full weight of his support to the reelection of Sen. Wayne Morse, D. Ore. The Republican who turned Democratic after Mr. Eisenhower's election.

Harrison said he would make a major address covering the Pacific Northwest's most vital resource—hydroelectric power—at a Democratic rally and dinner in Missoula, Ore., tonight.

In his Seattle speech yesterday, Harrison called the administration's foreign policy a "classic in the history of bungling."

Accuses GOP

He accused the Republicans of conducting a program of foreign relations based on "ill-conceived experiments" and "flabby eloquence."

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLING POT SHOTS

U. S. FARM SURPLUS

A drive to liquidate the U. S. government's storage warehouses clean of its seven-billion-dollar holdings in surplus farm products is heading for the next congress.

The idea behind this proposal is that these surpluses now over-hanging the market and depressing current farm prices, which are making some of the huge surpluses make high price support levels unpopular.

If the surpluses could be liquidated, it is argued that scarcities would be created and prices would go up. Then, at high support levels, farmers could begin unlimited over-crop. That's the vicious circle surrounding this surplus liquidation proposal.

The senate agriculture committee under the chairman Allen J. Ellender, D., La., now touring the country, has actually approved proposals that the surpluses be dumped in the ocean. This shocking suggestion came from former Utah State Sen. Hyrum Gibson and from Idaho cattleman Ivan Plebe.

No political leader has yet dared go that far. What they do fear is reaction like that of the Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace got from his depression relief plan for killing off the surplus pigs to raise hog prices.

The actual destruction of food and fiber worth hundreds of millions of underfed and poorly clothed people in the world would cause great revulsion. It would let communist propagandists point out how the selfish capitalists destroyed food and let people starve. Just to keep quiet, both Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson and his predecessor, Sen. Clinton Anderson, D., N. M., point out, in some way to market these surpluses.

They can't be given away indiscriminately without breaking farm markets over the world. Even the sale at cut prices can ruin foreign farmers.

The agricultural trade development act of 1955, intended to deal with this problem, gave a 25 percent advance on the sale of surpluses for foreign currencies, barter, giveaway for disaster relief, school lunch programs and the like.

About 1.5 billion dollars of these surpluses have been disposed of in the last year. But one billion dollars worth of surpluses remain—5.8 billion dollars owned outright and 1.6 billion dollars held by commodity credit corporation as security against crop loan advances to farmers.

The surplus consists of 2.7 billion dollars worth of wheat, 1.8 billion dollars worth of cotton and its products, 14 billion dollars, 500 million dollars tobacco, 384 million dollars rice and small feed grains, 326 million dollar of products, 99 million dollar of wool and 260 million dollar of other products like honey and tung oil.

How much the U. S. taxpayers would stand to lose if these were dumped is uncertain. If the United States had to pay transportation charges for moving the products to the bottom of the ocean, the loss would be more than seven billion.

So far, products which cost the CCC 469 million dollars have been sold at world market prices for 364 million dollars. The loss, 105 million dollars, or 22 percent of the 469 million-dollar surplus could be disposed of at that discount, the loss would be around 1.5 billion dollars.

From the politician's standpoint, this would be a cheap price to pay for farm vote support in election day.

The rationalization for getting rid of U. S. surpluses at cut prices is that this is what was done with surplus arms, ammunition and defense plants at the end of the war. "If we sell it to you for 25 cents on the dollar, why isn't it also all right to do it with butter?" ask farm lobbyists.

This is said to be the price which the public must pay to get abundant production and to keep agriculture prosperous and happy.

U. S. PLANES FLYING HIGH

The first concrete sign that America is likely to carry its long domination of world commercial plane manufacture into the jet age has come with the announcement by KLM, the Dutch airline, that it will buy eight Douglas DC-8's for its trans-Atlantic service.

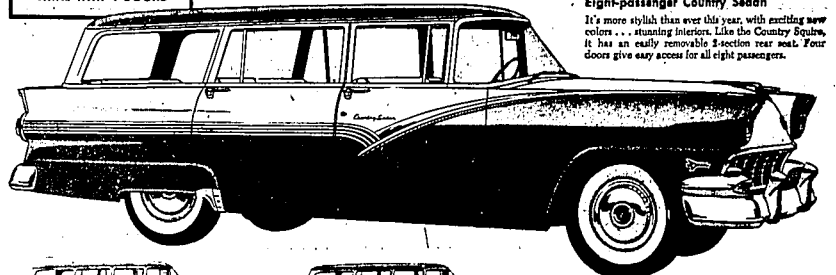

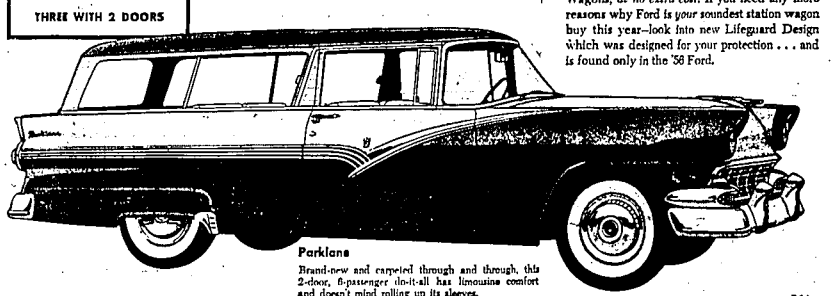

Red Exhibits Lose to U. S. Train Outfits

NEW YORK, Nov. 29—A wide-eyed delight of every child, the electric train is dramatically stealing the spotlight from Russia's gigantic nuclear and industrial exhibits at international fairs around the world.

At Jakarta last summer completely ignored the Soviet's elaborate propaganda displays of freckled, sultry-looking models and lumbering farm machinery as they thronged bayed around an American-made layout of toy trains with throbbing chugging and whistling through simulated mountains, tunnels and villages.

Scene Repeated
This scene is being repeated wherever Russia and the United States are trying at fairs to catch the eye of the world's window shoppers.

Lawrence Cowen, president of Lionel Corporation, the world's largest manufacturer of toy electric trains, said in an interview that the highly exhibited model trains in Guam, Manila and a spectacular show will move. Cowen added, however, that the natives, who had never seen a train of any kind before, at first scattered in panic, but gradually crept back and were soon so fascinated as children on Christmas morning.

Toy trains even played a major role in the tense cold war in Berlin in 1951 when they lured thousands of youths over to West Berlin from a youth festival staged by the communists, he said.

Had Tanks Honored
However, until last year Russia and her satellites had been attaching the play away from America by selling up costly industrial exhibits in the 150 fairs aimed at dazzling people outside the iron curtain. President Eisenhower, quick to see a golden opportunity to show off the reds by putting the goods of free enterprise along side those of Soviet countries, last year earmarked \$2,250,000 to be spent for U. S. participation at trade fairs in Great Britain, the United States in the best possible light overseas.

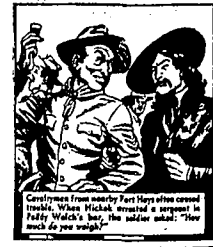

Colored Lights and Figures on Panel Used to Follow Unidentified Airplanes

COLORADO SPRINGS, Nov. 22—A tiny white light on a panel suddenly began to flash rapidly. An orange ball beside it lit up. A song began.

Simultaneously, a code number and a string of figures are chalked alongside the lights by a man—and women—working behind a glass panel who has to write them backward so they are readable from the front.

An orange line, identified by the same code number, starts across a glass map of the United States 20 feet high and 20 feet long.

That is the way the continental air defense charta the course of an unidentified aircraft believed friendly, in any part of the nation.

The operation heads up at the command's headquarters here staffed by air force, army and navy personnel.

Officers watch the movements and order operations they deem necessary. The sighting, reporting and order take only minutes.

The orange line lengthens as more reports come in until the aircraft is identified as friendly. Then the lights flicker off.

Had the plane been believed hostile, or known to be friendly, different colored bulbs would have told the tale.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin told the 100 members of parliament that the Western powers are to blame for "setting the problem of disarmament back 10 years."

Nikita Khrushchev, first secretary of the Communist party, charged that "reactionary circles" tried to intimidate Russia with atomic bombs and "as a result we were forced to create atomic and hydrogen weapons."

"The spirit of Geneva causes indignation to certain persons" who are still "trying to follow the notorious policy of 'from a position of strength,'" Khrushchev said.

Both Khrushchev and Bulganin who were interrupted frequently by cheers of the parliament members, declared Russia and India are united in an "unending battle for peace."

Both vowed respect for India's right to choose its own path of development.

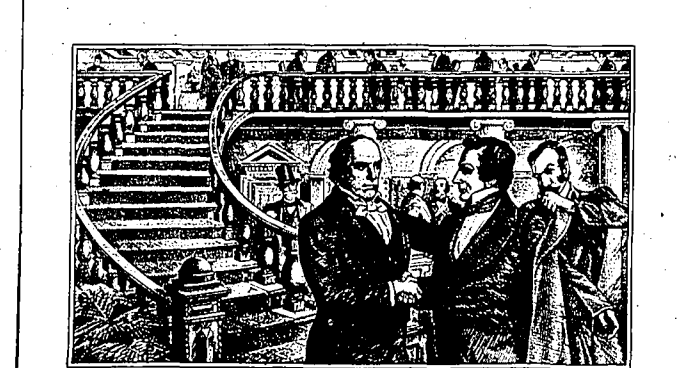

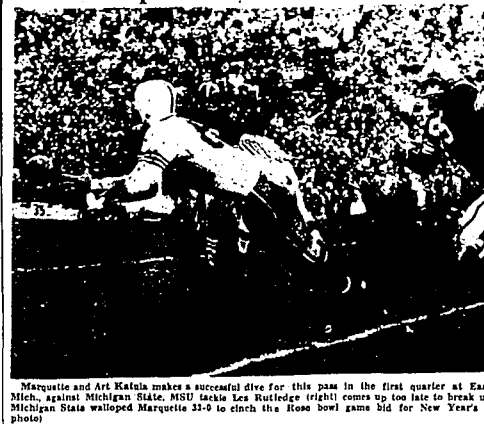

Pert Young Miss Chooses Odd Work; She's Private Detective on Own Firm

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., (UP)—A 23-year-old Albuquerque girl, who earned a living for two years trailing and checking on people, now is setting up her own business as a "private eye."

"I'm beginning to get results too," said Marian Kent, who started her own business just a few weeks ago after two years with an Albuquerque agency.

"Maybe it's just curiosity at hearing about a woman private investigator, but people are coming to me. Of course, since most clients of agencies are women, some just want to talk to a woman."

The pert, blond Miss Kent, who gives an impression of naivete because of her glasses and dimpled smile, was graduated from Albuquerque high school in 1950. She held several secretarial jobs and worked for a telephone company as a long distance operator.

Then she met her future husband, another private detective, and "I just naturally drifted into the work." She was married last Dec. 2.

Contrary to popular belief, a private investigator is not in a cloak and dagger profession, Marian says, "nor is it a dirty business."

"Being a private eye is unusual and a very fascinating life. Most people have the impression it's a dirty business, but it's only as dirty as you make it. People get the wrong impression from television and the movies. They're actually surprised when they learn the truth."

"Sometimes, I think they're disappointed."

Marian specializes in domestic investigation. The cases she's handled range from checking on marital infidelity to blackmail.

"My job is to prove or disprove the allegations made by my clients," she said. "Most of my clients are women, which makes investigation a good field for a woman. A man is more likely to solve his own problems where a woman will seek help."

"Often I just go and talk with the other person involved and check his character. Many times my job involves trailing people. Incidentally, whenever I'm trailing someone or I'm on a stakeout, I always notify the police. Marian discovered where

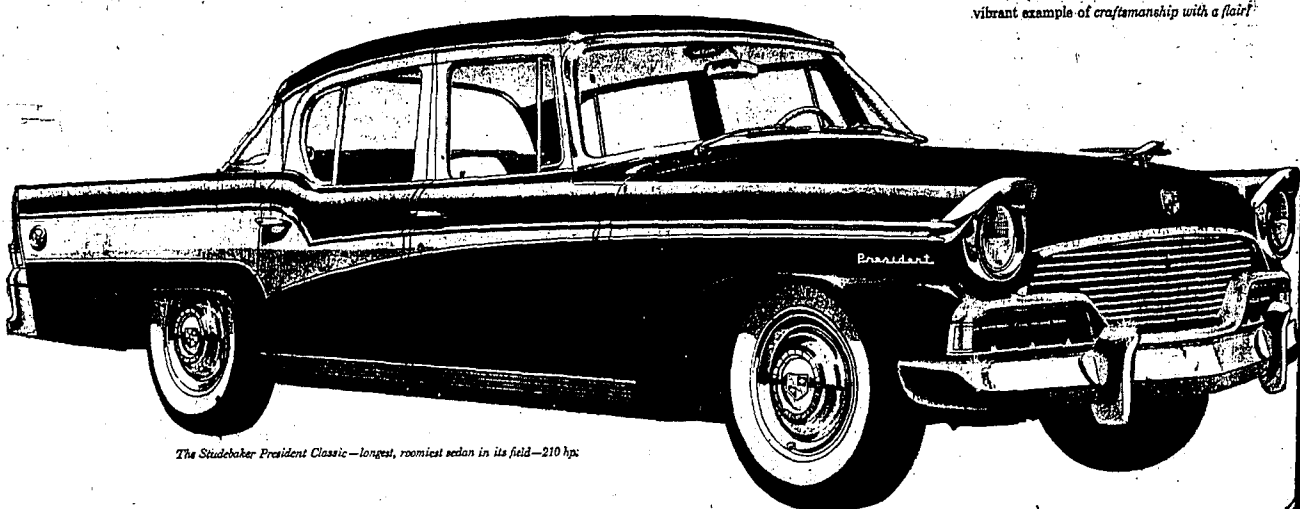

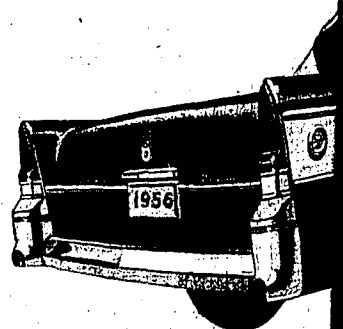
