4 Girls Born; One Dies But Others Alive

DELLVIEW, O. Nov. 25 (U.S. Press)—A petite young matron with brown hair gave birth to four tiny daughters today. The third baby arrived about 10 hours after her mother, but doctors said the others were "doing fine."

The quadruplets were born to 25-year-old Margaret Bieleh, who had been expecting twins about the second week of January.

Married two years last June to Martin Bieleh, Jr., a 30-year-old mechanical engineer, the first five first-born mother also has a 15-month-old son, Jimmy.

All four new-born girls first had been reported "doing well." The baby who died weighed about 3 1/2 pounds at the time of her delivery. The last-born weighs about a pound and a half.

The babies were placed in an incubator immediately and their exact weight could not be determined.

None were given names. Bieleh said, "We just haven't had time to decide. Even though we were expecting twins, we didn't even get around to picking two names."

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Pllea Is Given To Keep Tiffs Within Shores

CATTYBUSH, Nov. 25 (U.S. Press)—President Roosevelt today urged the nation to keep its international bickering at the water's edge.

"What amounted to a new plea was to keep the nation's international bickering at the water's edge," the President endorsed the following statement by the chairman of the senate foreign relations committee:

"We must assure the world that we are capable of having a non-partisan American foreign policy and that regardless of who wins or loses in 1936 our foreign program will go on substantially as it is."

Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, said following news of the chief executive had signed and approved the statement of George, which was made to the New York Herald Tribune.

Snyder was asked whether the President felt that Adlai Stevenson had given support to this thesis of a non-partisan foreign policy.

"I don't know," Snyder said, "but he hadn't asked the President about that."

He reported today that Stevenson, who opposed Eisenhower for the presidency in 1952 and wants to run again, had said recently that American foreign policy is worse off than at any time since the Korean war.

"I think I might have caught on at any time since the Korean war," he said, "but I haven't." He said he has frequently expressed his appreciation for the statesmanlike cooperation given him by Senator George in foreign affairs.

There appeared almost no chance, however, that foreign policy actually will be kept out of the campaign. Former President Truman said the political arena after Mr. Roosevelt and I had kept it out for years. Now the Democrats are in a position to make the most of it and I am sure they will. 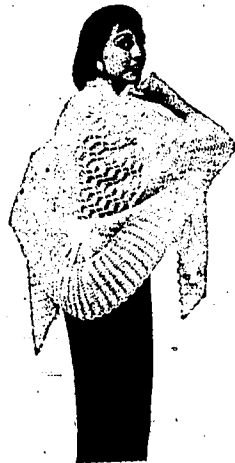

\$40,000 Suit
Is Filed Over
Death of Girl

BURLEY, Nov. 26—A suit has been filed in district court here by George O. Russell, Twin Falls and Flor and Jean Russell Parich, Burley, against Peter Ghentl and the Deane and Chicago Trucking Company, Inc. for damages amounting to \$40,000.

The claim states that the daughter of the couple, Julia May Russell, was killed in a mishap July 25, 1955, four and one-half miles east of Burley in Cass county.

The girl was a passenger in a 1950 Dodge pickup driven by Ghentl who started to pass a 1951 semi-truck and trailer driven by Hasley Dorer for the trucking company. Dorer, however, started to pass two vehicles ahead of him despite Ghentl's action. Ghentl continued trying to pass Dorer and ended in the borrow pit at a speed in excess of 60 miles per hour. The Russell girl was thrown from the pickup.

Russell and Mrs. Pavich, who were divorced in 1943, are asking the court to award them \$40,000, plus funeral expenses and other obligations of \$493.50. Douglas Kramer, Twin Falls, is attorney for Russell, while Nelson and Nelson, Burley, are attorneys for Mrs. Pavich.

Byrd Leaves On New Trip To Far Area

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 26 (AP)—Near Adm. Richard E. Byrd leaves today for New Zealand to join "Operation Deepfreeze," the United States' first attempt to locate a permanent settlement in the Antarctic. It will be the fifth expedition to the south pole for the white-haired, 62-year-old explorer, who arrived here yesterday.

"Through this expedition we hope to establish a permanent settlement," Byrd said. "The other nations have the same idea."

Others Will Do Same

The admiral said other nations including Russia, Great Britain, France and Australia, intend to set up bases in the Antarctic in conjunction with the geographical year of 1937-38.

"There ought to be about 40 bases down there within two years. We will have five or six, including one at the south geographic pole," Byrd said.

The erect, bright-eyed explorer told newsmen who met his plane here that he had been picked by pretty Dallas, Tex., girls, who objected to his remarks about women and the Antarctic.

Calls It Silent

In a recent statement Byrd remarked that the bottom of the world was "one of the most silent and peaceful places in the world" because there were no women in Little America.

One of the Texas pickets told the admiral to "take another look."

"I did," he said, "she was very pretty."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—Chief Justice Earl Warren, long a champion of the poor, has been named chairman of the capital's march of dimes campaign.

Mr. Warren and his wife kicked the drive off yesterday with a tour through the wards at Children's hospital. They distributed candy and balloons and chatted with the young patients.

One of the patients was 5-year-old Deborah Thomas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Thomas, Hillcrest Heights, Md.

Thomas told Mr. Warren he remembered reading newspaper stories in 1930 about the polio attack suffered by the chief justice's young daughter, Miss (Honey) Bear Warren. She was partially paralyzed for nearly a year, but made a complete recovery and recently was married.

The chief justice recalled that he had been state chairman of polio fund-raising drives before his daughter was stricken. When that happened, he said, he was aided by help from the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

He said recent development of the Salk vaccine and other progress towards combating polio "only makes all Americans, including myself and my family, anxious to redouble our efforts to do what we can to eliminate this disease from our national health picture."

The south hills have been filled with hunting "muscle" for the past three weeks as two Magic Valley hunters and their four dogs trailed and bagged a cougar, three bobcats, a lynx and 19 raccoons.

The music was the baying of the four dogs owned by "Bud" Bennett, 204 Elm street, and Floyd Sharp, route 1, Filtr, as they trailed their quarry.

Almost daily the canine music has been heard in the south hills. It approaches the finale with a crescendo of shouts from the hunters and the crack of a .22 rifle as the snarling, fighting cats are treed or brought to bay.

Sunday and Hawk, Bennett's dogs, are veterans in the cat catching business. The dogs of Sharp are equally as good. Freddie, one of Sharp's dogs, is from one of Sunday's litters. His other dog is named Banger.

When the dogs strike a hot trail the men can tell by "votes" of their animals which one is taking the lead.

The cougar, which weighed 166 pounds, was taken Friday after a three-hour chase. The dogs tired it and Sharp brought it down from a small tree with a shot from a .22 rifle.

The bobcat was taken Thursday and the lynx was killed a week ago. Bennett says it is uncommon to find a lynx in this area. Nineteen raccoons have been taken so far this year.

Bennett has been hunting cougars and bobcats for several years. Sharp, a hunting partner, has also engaged in the sport for a long time.

Sharp plans to make a rug out of the cougar skin. Bennett has several skins that he took during last winter's hunting.

Funds Are Needed for State Hospital, Says Burley Woman

Editor, Times-News:—
It was appalled when I read in your paper, Nov. 20, that the hospital south is losing three of its outstanding men. What is Dr. Conroy's superintendent doing in the hospital, to do if the people permit the legislature and the medical profession continue to hamstring every effort he makes?

Everybody was excited a few years ago when screaming headlines proclaimed the hospital one of the best in the United States. It made beautiful reading and excellent propaganda for the politicians. The whole mass stunk so bad that the state legislature got busy and passed some resolutions concerning the hospital. The mentally ill in Idaho. Then suddenly state hospital south lost its news value and the legislature wasn't quite so generous.

Only a handful of people know that every two years the hospital staff has presented its budget to the legislature based upon the minimal needs for the hospital. They received the money they must have if they are going to operate properly. Few people know and many are not in the least interested to learn that the hospital needs \$45 a day to take care of a patient in the hospital has only \$3.80. They do not know nor care, perhaps, that the staff is greatly overworked and at least 80 more people are needed. It is not generally known that the staff was so desperately in need of help this spring that they sent letters to some citizens of Idaho begging for volunteers to help without pay.

When I asked a member of the legislature why more money was not taken to state hospital south he said, "Because you and I do not want to pay more taxes."
One of the easiest excuses made and hard to argue about because it is so very true. But let me state my own case. I have a son who is a patient at hospital south. If things continue to worsen at hospital I will have to bring my son home. If I bring my son home I will have to quit work to take care of him. And, then, as I have no other means of support the son will have to provide for me and my three children instead of caring for one. If this condition exists in my home it exists in the homes of many other wage earners who have loved ones at state hospital south. How can the state save money by caring for the mentally ill in private homes?

Guidance Department Is Seen As Necessary Unit in School

Editor, Times-News:—
The purpose of this letter is to explain an important educational service which is often neglected in our Idaho schools. The state department of education recommends that all schools keep a cumulative record folder for each pupil. This folder is to follow the pupil all the way through his school days and should contain such items as health record, scholastic performance, extra-curricular activities, personal pictures, discipline problems, test results and other pertinent information about the individual. If this folder is properly maintained a counselor can give advice of a highly valuable nature—advice that might avert the difference between success and failure in the pupil's later life.

The easiest way to appreciate the value of a guidance and counseling department in the schools is to first look at the people who are sent to our state institutions: the state prison, reformatories, correctional hospitals and schools. All of the people sent to these places are misfits or maladjusted in some way. According to scientific research there are underlying causes that produce these unfortunate cases. A successful guidance program might find these causes and remove them before any serious irregularities or mistakes occur. This aiding in decreasing the enrollment in the above mentioned institutions. Also causing less expense to the taxpayer by eliminating the need to build and maintain larger correctional institutions and allowing more tax money to be placed on prevention rather than on cures. Railroads' Authorities Admit New ICC Ruling Is Problem

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Railroad men here have said today the lack of achieving racial desegregation in the South's interstate train service will prevent almost as many problems as the first rail crossing of the Continental Divide in 1869.

But as one executive put it: "The railroads always obey an order."

He referred to yesterday's order from the interstate commerce commission directing an end effective Jan. 10 to racial segregation of interstate passengers on trains and buses, and in public waiting rooms and rest rooms.

A check with a half-dozen rail executives disclosed no firm plan of action yet to carry the order into effect. They agreed many problems were involved. They asked not to be quoted by name.

None of the railroad representatives here suggested taking an appeal from the ICC order to the supreme court, whose 1954 ruling on school segregation was cited by the ICC in support of its order.

One official commented: "It may be that the long-established practice of southern carriers in separating white and Negro passengers may just go by the boards under the weight of operating difficulties."

He disclosed the situation against a "backdrop" of a statement from southern state officials, asserting their intention to retain local statutes requiring railroad companies to maintain separate or divided coaches, waiting rooms and rest rooms for whites and Negroes. These states, Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, South Carolina and Virginia, have such laws.

And this, one railroad man said, is the heart of the difficulty. After Jan. 10, the railroads are confronted with the prospect of maintaining one set of "mixed" accommodations for interstate travelers to satisfy the ICC, and another set of separate facilities for intra-state patrons, to satisfy local authorities.

"I don't know how you are going to unscramble interstate and intra-state travelers in a waiting room," one railroad man said. "So far as I know, no one knows at this point how it can be done. It surely isn't going to be an easy job—and it's got to be done by Jan. 10."

According to transportation experts here, every railroad offering passenger service in the South and Southwest has provided separate facilities for whites and Negroes un-

der the "separate but equal" doctrine which the ICC has sanctioned since its organization 68 years ago.

Freighter's Crew Rescued From Waves by Helicopter

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 22 (AP) — The crew of the wrecked Liberian freighter Kismet II was rescued by helicopter today. Rescuers had battled waves, rough seas and high winds on the rocky north coast of Cape Breton island since yesterday.

The men were hoisted to safety in a boatswain's chair swinging below a Canadian navy helicopter. The helicopter, dotted 1,100-foot coastal cliffs of the island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence to perform the feat.

The 2,648-ton ship had been pounded by seas whipped up by winds of 30 to 45 miles an hour since it ran aground yesterday. Dispatches from the scene said the crew of 21 was saved. Earlier reports had said 30 men were aboard.

Earlier, a convoy led by a snowplow and carrying a ton of breaching buoy equipment, reached the scene after pushing 100 miles through snow-clogged roads from Sydney.

Winds had diminished to 25 miles an hour and skies were clearing so the helicopter operation got underway.

Two lifelines were strung from a 1,000-foot cliff, only 25 feet away, to the stricken vessel. But the breaching buoy was necessary to make the lines effective.

Throughout the night rescuers kept watch atop the cliff, their searchlights cutting through a blinding

\$2,000 Asked For Trespass Of Crop Land

DURLEY, Nov. 22 — Melvin Bailey and Etta Bailey have filed a suit in district court here against Charles W. Parr, Clarence Allan Parr, J. M. Parr, David A. Taylor and W. D. Taylor for \$2,000 on a charge of illegal and willful trespassing and for costs and disbursements of the suit.

The Baileys say they own property which adjoins property owned by the Parris in which they have planted 200 acres of dry land wheat. They also claim to have 20 acres of barley which had not been harvested because of the weeds. They said they were waiting for a heavy frost to kill the weeds.

Prior to the time that the two parties pursued the land there was just one fence enclosing the two parcels and there are still no division fences inside. On Oct. 24, Melvin Bailey learned that the defendants had sold the pasture and the wheat to the Taylors and he asked Clarence Parr what he would do about a fence between the properties. He claimed that he was told that if he wanted a fence it was up to him to put one up.

On Nov. 10 the Taylors put between 400 and 500 head of cattle inside the fence and they are now allegedly allowing the cattle to trample on the wheat crop.

The plaintiffs are asking the court to temporarily restrain the defendants from allowing the cattle to graze their land. They ask further that in the event the court does not issue the restraining order, that the defendants must show cause why they should not be restrained from allowing the cattle to graze, pasture and trample. The Baileys are represented by Norman H. Nielson.

APPLINGTON, Wis., Nov. 22 (AP) — Joseph P. McCarthy had political circles buzzing in his home town today because of his recommendations of a convicted gambler and bootlegger for a federal post.

The Outaouais county Republican committee said it was "caught by surprise" when McCarthy's Washington office announced the appointment of Thomas Miller, 37, as Applington's acting postmaster.

Records showed that Miller had been convicted in 1921 on charges of violating the federal prohibition laws. In 1946 and 1951 he was convicted on charges of accepting illegal bets on horse races.

McCarthy refused to comment on the matter except to say he had recommended Miller for the post. Miller said only that "there are a lot of things you can check up on me and I don't have to say anything."

The summit conference at Geneva, from which came the so-called Geneva spirit, he said in answer to a question, "Didn't amount to a damn."

New York's Gov. Averell Harriman, he said, was right when he called the conference a failure.

"Harriman knows what he is talking about. He dealt with the Russians. They understand only force."

Attorney Trio Set to Defend Bomb Slayer

DENVER, Nov. 26 (AP)—Former U. S. Attorney Charles B. Vigil, who successfully prosecuted Colorado's most notorious gambler, will defend 32-year-old John Gilbert Graham against the charge he murdered his mother by bombing the millionaire—while 44 persons died.

District Judge Edward J. Keating, who declared Graham indigent and unable to engage competent counsel on his own, also appointed John J. Gibbons, a prominent criminal defense attorney, and Paul Weadick, attorney for the defense late yesterday.

Graham is charged with the murder of his mother, Mrs. Daisy King, 51, a passenger on the United Air Lines DC-6B that exploded and crashed near Longmont, Colo., on Nov. 14, killing everyone aboard. Graham was charged with planting a dynamite time bomb in his mother's luggage after insuring her life for \$37,500.

Keating said he would confer with the defense counsel today and give them copies of the criminal information for study. He urged them to confer with Graham at least today or tomorrow for preparation of the defendant's arraignment on Monday.

Nuclear Fallout Travels to Area

MOSCOW, Nov. 26 (AP)—Two University of Chicago scientists predicted today that atomic fallout of a large nuclear explosion in Russia may have traveled from one Moscow to another.

Dr. J. V. Jordan, agricultural chemist at the university who is in charge of studies of radio activity in the air, reported that W. R. Shelli, research technician, obtained a reading of 127 counts per minute in radio activity in the air here yesterday.

"Although far from dangerous, this reading indicates that fallout from our instruments since we started making daily checks of the atmosphere has been more than a year ago," Jordan said.

Doctors Won't Make Calls at Private Homes

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Nov. 26 (AP)—Indonesia's overworked doctors are refusing to make calls at private homes, and the provisional parliament's health committee wants the government to fund them.

There are only 1,500 physicians in all the 3,000 islands of this republic with a population of 82 million. Doctors' offices are hopelessly jammed from dawn until midnight.

Won't Answer Phone
Physicians say they could get out only to a home needing medical assistance if they wanted to. So those who have ill must be transported to the crowded offices and wait for hours before they can be examined and get treatment.

Indonesia called
He said some doctors were forgetting their high calling and the necessary sacrifices to minister to the sick. He cited an instance where five doctors refused to aid a stricken child. The child died en route to a hospital.

Now the committee is considering proposals that government doctors refusing aid be denied promotion and that private doctors who fail to minister to the sick lose the right to practice.

Report Says British Lose Desert Fight

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 26 (AP)—The newspaper Al-Ahram has reported from Dammam in eastern Saudi Arabia that more than 100 British troops were killed and wounded in a recent British attack on Rastag in the principality of Oman.

Recent Saudi Arabian charges that 50 Britons were killed in the adjacent Buraimi oasis were denied by the British who still claim Saudi Arabia for proof.

Al-Ahram attributed the report to reliable sources it said were able to penetrate the "British iron curtain" around Oman. It said a large British force attacked Rastag in the past few days and that the Omanis kept out of the battle.

It said the British also attacked Dammam in Oman with overwhelming forces and occupied the town but that the Omanis were still determined to oust the Britishers at any price.

Declines Knowledge
A spokesman for the British embassy said "we have no knowledge of the report."

The dispute between Britain and Saudi Arabia centered over the Buraimi oasis where British troops recently evicted the Arabians from the disputed, oil-rich area.

Experts say that between one and two per cent of the population is mentally retarded.

Some Observers Say Activity Is "Bushing" Chief Executive

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—For it may be worth some of the chance and unofficial lookers-on at Gettysburg think President Eisenhower appeared a bit peaked and hurried after his big mid-week work day.

The medical bulletins report the President to be picking up the burdens of office without evidence of fatigue. There is no intent to challenge the integrity of those bulletins. Never was the illness of a top level U. S. official more faithfully reported in its gains and reverses than Mr. Eisenhower's recently in Denver by his staff.

But the fact remains that some individuals who would have no interest in it either way believe they can detect an outward appearance of slow down in Mr. Eisenhower's vigorous recovery.

So, it is reasonable to report these lay observations because the people at home and abroad have shown a hungry personal and political interest in Mr. Eisenhower's well-being. The political interest builds up to a question which will be asked with increasing frequency daily throughout the world until the President gives the answer to it: Will he run again?

The political fortunes of both major parties are tied to the answer. The political fortunes of numerous office seekers in both parties are tied to it. U. S. foreign and domestic policies depend in large degree on the answer as do the policies of foreign allies and cold war enemies. It is a large question which Mr. Eisenhower's physicians have given him an opportunity to ignore until February, if he so desires. The implication of their judgments of the President's recovery has been that it will not be until late winter that he or they will know whether his heart could take a second term.

The physicians with their machines and knowledge can determine with much accuracy whether Mr. Eisenhower will be fit to go again. But only he can determine whether he would be willing.

If his heart were able, but his mind were not quite made up, it is likely that the recent Democratic attacks on administration foreign

as the campaign winds him, may or may not be justified. Only time can determine that. But, for sure, Mr. Eisenhower will not agree. The fields of foreign policy and national security were the only ones in which he felt self confident when he took office. Criticism of those policies is peculiarly a personal criticism of the President's own judgment.

Could be that enough of it would entice him into another campaign, 1956.

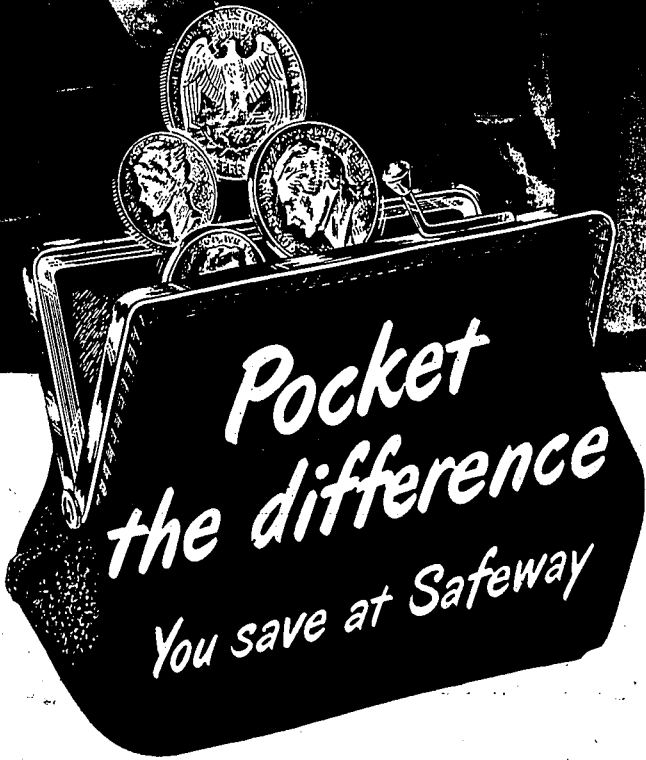

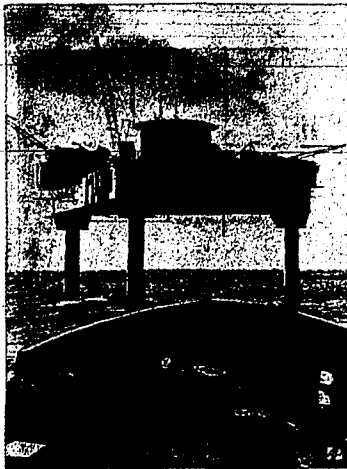

Resistance Is Found in Car Price Boosts

DETROIT, Nov. 26 (U.P.)—Industry surveys indicate the auto manufacturers' 1954 price schedules developed some auto resistance with the presentation of the new models. Experienced observers point out, however, that this is virtually a tradition in the industry. They say every price increase the car makers ever have made was met almost immediately with protests from buyers. A recent survey indicated something of a lag in new car sales, although it was not a major proportion. Some retailers were inclined to attribute this to the higher prices for the 1954 line of cars.

Older Industry Analyst Blamed It on Extra Sales Pressure

Other industry analysts blamed it on the extra sales pressure devoted to cleaning up the 1953 models on hand. One analyst said as a week before the new models of each make went on sale emphasis was placed upon the bargains available in 1953 models. When the new models became available promotional effort emphasized that the models were a year older why buy a year-old car when you can get a brand-new one for practically the same price. **New-Old Cars** For resale and trade-in purposes 1953 model cars now are considered a year older even if they were built only a few weeks ago. But it also is true they were available considerably cheaper than new 1953 models. The surveys indicated relatively few 1953 models were left in new dealers' show rooms. They were sold to used car operators or placed on sale in the new car dealers' show rooms. **Automotive News**, which made a cross-country survey earlier this year, reported that in 1953 it reported it found "discounts are rampant, having been granted in some form before official" introduction day. **Discounts Reported** It added that discounts of \$200 to \$300 on 1953 models were reported from scattered points. The manufacturers in introducing new models announced higher list prices. The increase ranged from around \$10 to as much as \$550. There was some speculation before the new models came out as to whether the full increase would be passed on to the new car buyer. **Repeat Reductions** In many instances it hasn't been asked of the new car purchaser. And new car buyers have become so accustomed to reductions from the "list" price that they expect them without argument. **The "It"** "It" of course, is the price suggested by the car maker. There is no law that requires the dealer to follow the manufacturer's suggested price; in fact Federal law specifically prohibits the manufacturer from setting the retail price for his product. That's why the manufacturer "suggests" the price.

Church Urged To Be Honest On Sex Views

LONDON, Nov. 26 (U-P)—A Church of England publication warned that sex will take over as the main driving force of modern life if religion ceases to urge the church to take a frank attitude in helping members with sex problems.

"It is of no use for the church to play ostrich," said the publication, a report by the Rev. W. F. Wylie on the work of the church on sex and its future.

"If and when faith decays," it said, "it is the main driving force of conventional society—most infrequently taken by sex, for sex is the great assured means of fulfillment of completion and of union for men and women."

Already Dominant

Wylie made clear he believes that the dominant factor of the future is sex.

"Hence it is the church's care that sex should be rightly used and guided," he said. "This way the church could reach many thousands who otherwise would never heed its voice."

Guidance on problems involving sex is to be based on the most imperative tasks," the report added.

Noted Lecturer

Wylie is a lecturer for the moral values board, and has given many talks on sex. He is also a member of the work assistants giving moral guidance to paragonists.

"It must not be forgotten that the sex instinct and specifically that of the male is being stimulated constantly by the Rev. Wylie."

Half the advertisements in certain religious places, such as calligraphs in the London, are being deliberately or accidentally on sex appeal. And all these things together are the one message that sex is the greatest thing in life and that no one must miss it at any cost.

Often Only Outlet

"Many sociologists consider that the modern man has a sex outlet in the age of the 'bulge' period and the 'pen' phase are slowly being worn and killed by the sex instinct. No outlet, however, can be destroyed—it will merely seek another outlet, and only to see the only outlet left today is that of sex."

Sex by itself, however, is not attractive, must always fall to give men and women what they need, or even what they think they need.

"Only the Christian religion can put in its proper and God-given place."

The report said that until recently the chief sex problem confronting society was the unmarried mother. Now the chief problem, the Rev. Wylie writes in the report, is the failure of many marriages which has sexual origin.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (U-P)—The National Milk Producers Federation has invited officials of five other national farm organizations to meet in Washington, D. C., in an effort to unite the farm groups to lobby for legislation on legislative recommendations.

Chairman Ellender, D-Tex., the group's legislative committee, had asked farm groups to try to reach an agreement on legislative recommendations before the end of the year.

The milk producers suggested the farm groups tackle such matters as disposal farm products, price supports, crop production and marketing control programs, proposals to take land out of production and put it in soil building crop for future use and proposed "self-help" programs for the dairy industry.

The organizations invited to the meeting were the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Grange and the National Farmers Union.

Solon Urging Stronger Law Of Narcotics

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (U-P)—Rep. Hale Boggs has urged for elimination of the last loophole through which a federally convicted narcotics peddler can escape going to jail.

The Louisiana Democrat, chairman of a House narcotics subcommittee, said he will seek legislation to strip federal judges of the power to grant probation to first offenders convicted of narcotics charges.

Legal judges through the judiciary conference are likely to oppose the move as they did in 1951 when Boggs put through congress a law requiring mandatory jail sentences for second offenders. The conference has generally opposed congressional moves to restrict judicial powers.

Boggs said the subcommittee's public hearings in Washington, New York, San Francisco, Seattle and Chicago convinced him that narcotics Commissioner Harry J. Anslinger is right in believing that further restriction on judicial discretion would help curtail illegal trafficking.

Boggs said the hearings, which ran from next month, determined that judges are lenient and cases in circuit courts in Louisiana are being handled in a way that is not in the best interests of the public.

He said that in California, Chicago, Detroit and Los Angeles but added that law officers have been a determining factor in cracking down on peddling in Los Angeles.

West Display Of Magazines Is Forbidden

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (U-P)—Communist Czechoslovakia's effort to reach the people of the western publications has reached into the flower garden of the U. S. Capitol at Prague.

The story, as reported by officials who served there, goes like this:

Just before the great book show of the people of Prague ended taking Sunday walks. Traditionally, all embassies which had in the shadow of the presidential palace have through their gates to the strolling public on Sunday.

Table Headed

This fall the American embassy set up a small table in its courtyard. On the table were great stacks of U. S. magazines which the embassy staff had received from home. These publications included news magazines, periodicals and some news and picture magazines.

People lined behind the table during their walks through the courtyard garden. By the end of the first day all the magazines had disappeared. In the time the American embassy was doing a land office business in back lane news.

Reds Found Out

That soon the communist regime which forbids any and all western literature to its people had learned what was happening.

On Nov. 11 the Czech foreign office called in Harold S. Tucker, in charge of the embassy in the absence of Ambassador Alexis Johnson.

Tucker said he had been told that U. S. magazines with ready reach of Czech citizens was "unwelcome."

He expunged the magazines were not propaganda but simply reflected American culture through their stories and advertisements.

Reminder Given

At the same time Tucker reminded the communist regime that the Czech practice of making propaganda pamphlets available in heavy circulation is forbidden.

Nevertheless, the embassy had to call off its magazine display. The table no longer sits in the courtyard on Sundays.
