Death, Destruction In Alaskan Airplane

AN Alaska, Nov. 30 (AP)—An air force jet fighter plane, veering like a bird in flight, crashed into a forest, killing four crew members and destroying the aircraft.

The wreckage was being recovered by the Air Force. The plane was on a mission to test a new type of engine. The crash occurred near the town of Fairbanks. The pilot was killed. The other three crew members were rescued. The wreckage was scattered over a large area. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

Schools' Authorities - Asking Local Power

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—A subcommittee report to the White House education conference today called on the federal government to keep its fingers out of local school administration.

The report, presented to a general session of the conference by James E. King, Brownwood, Tex., represented the consensus of the nearly 2,000 conference participants. It called for a series of roundtable discussions. Minority reports which the subcommittee considered important enough to be presented recommended:

1. State officials provide administrative services over, above and beyond the capabilities of local districts to provide for the education of their children.

2. A study of the practicability of the 12-month school year to make the school year more continuous.

3. Studies of non-teaching duties and ways to free the teacher to exercise his primary responsibility for instruction.

4. Fiscal independence for local school districts under state law.

Red Officials Are Releasing U.S. Turncoat

HONG KONG, Nov. 30 (AP)—The British embassy in Peking has informed the United States government that turncoat spy prisoner Richard R. Tamm, 22, Alden, Minn., will be released by the Communist Chinese, it was disclosed today.

The message from Peking said Tamm would cross the border from Red China to Hong Kong today. He did not appear, but observers said he may have been released. The U. S. consul general here had no more information about Tamm. The letter also requested information from Peking concerning Tamm.

Boost predicted for Farmer Market Back to Pane by Top Court Ruling

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—American farmers will have in 1975 a market for 40 per cent more food and fiber products than now if latest forecasts of government economists are correct.

The estimate, which was based upon prospective increases in population and export demands raised this question: Will farmers be able to supply market demands? The report said that the demand for food and fiber products will increase by 40 per cent by 1975. This is due to population growth and increasing exports.

BOISE, Nov. 30 (AP)—State Police Sgt. J. H. King, Brownwood, Tex., requested that Idaho drivers aid in a traffic safety event. The event is a "no-political" program with "slogans" and a "buck-warm attitude".

District Vote For Highway Areas is Set

Voters in the third congressional district in Twin Falls today will elect one commissioner to the three man board Monday as all voters in the district vote in Idaho bond elections.

The polls in the nine precincts of the district will be held from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. on Monday. Leonard Peters, outgoing board member, is the only candidate for the third commissioner area to file a petition. Deadline for filing was Sunday.

Gas Issue Handed Back to Pane by Top Court Ruling

BOISE, Nov. 30 (AP)—Rebuffed a second time within a month by the state supreme court, the Idaho public utilities commission turned over to the state supreme court the question of how should be awarded a certificate to distribute natural gas.

The court yesterday reaffirmed its unanimous decision of a month ago that the PUC was wrong last February in awarding the permit to Idaho Natural Gas company and should have given it instead to Intermountain Gas company.

But two of the five justices today, saying they had "reexamined the issues" and "to the conclusion that this commission should have been upheld. In denying a rehearing of the case and sending it back to the PUC for further proceedings, they cited the need for a quick decision so that Idaho might be in line for large amounts of gas to be piped into the state.

A representative of Idaho Natural said he felt the PUC should have a second set of public hearings to determine who should get the right distribution rights. C. Allen, chairman of the PUC, had no comment on the decision. He said the commissioners would study the question of how to decide what to do.

Called on Smylie, 13 Democrat Idaho men asked Gov. Robert E. Smylie and called him to do all in his power to resolve the question of gas. Intermountain and Idaho Natural were two of three private companies who had applied for a permit a year ago for the right to distribute gas in some two to three dozen communities of southern Idaho.

The commission decided for Idaho Natural, but Intermountain appealed to the supreme court. The court Oct. 28 reversed the PUC. The court said the PUC plan was "inadequately designed" and "not in the public interest".

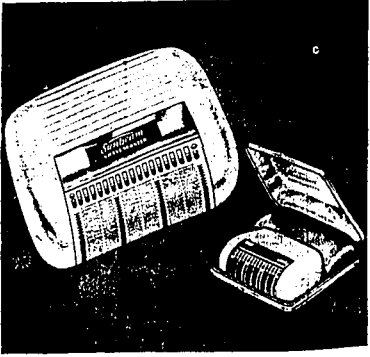

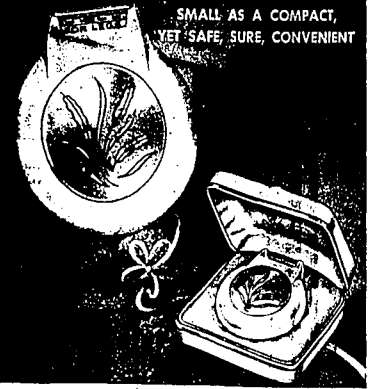

State Readies All-Out Fight For S-D Days

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 20 (AP)—Washington, which won national honors last year for highway safety, will observe Safe Driving Day Dec. 1 with an all-out battle against traffic killers.

Every uniformed state patrolman and the entire arsenal of weapons used in the traffic war will be on the road S-D day. The patrol will be assisted by about 70 selected national guardsmen, who will relay violation reports to law enforcement officers.

Weapons include radar and loud speaker cars, helicopters and air planes, drunkometers, unmarked patrol cars, and spotlights at key traffic routes.

Woe 'Oozer'

Use of these weapons and the cooperation of the driving public helped Washington win the gold Oscar of the National Committee for Traffic Safety in 1952, as well as the National Safety Council grand award.

Gov. Arthur B. Langlie declared war on negligent drivers in 1953, and has carried on the fight with such a passion that he himself has arrested violators.

Tells Goal

"I'm not going to be satisfied until we reduce fatalities to 2.5 persons per 100 million miles of travel," he said.

Before Langlie's concern over "highway slaughter" prompted him to take the book of violators, accidents were killing Washingtonians at the rate of 5.7 per 100 million miles, approximately the national average. The figure was reduced to 4.4 early in Langlie's safety campaign, and dropped to 2.6 in the first seven months of 1953.

The campaign is paying dividends. Fatalities in the state during the traffic war numbered 379 fewer than during the comparable four-year period. Savings to Washington residents have amounted to more than 15 million dollars in reduced accident costs and automobile insurance premiums.

Kalapa Disappoints

There has been a relapse, however, which Langlie considers a "little disappointing." With traffic volume up from eight to 12 percent death toll rose for the year during award-winning 1954.

Langlie is considering a beefed-up enforcement program which would include encouraging courts to sentence traffic violators to driver training school.

Other possible moves include tougher driver's examinations, improvement of traffic sign systems, renewed use of airplanes, and tightening up of a point system by which habitual violators can lose their licenses.

Rapidly Expanding Birth Rate Is Seen As Biggest Threat to All World Areas

LONDON, Nov. 20 (AP)—Lord Simon, of Weyburn, has charged yesterday that there is a "conspiracy of silence" to conceal from the world a threat to come more than that posed by the cold war as the hydrogen bomb.

"The threat, he said, is the birth rate."

"The population of the world increases by more than 80,000 every day. This means an increase of 34 million a year."

In 1900 there were about two billion human beings on the earth. By 2000 A. D. there will be about five billion.

The world is increasing its population with no regard for the fact that few countries can adequately support new population, Lord Simon said. The millions of new mouths to feed and millions of new bodies to clothe are setting "damning pressures" around the world.

Lord Simon headed a group of "distinguished natural and social scientists" who just completed a two-year survey of "world population and resources." With publication of their findings, Lord Simon let go with an attack on what he believes is a deliberate attempt to ignore the birth rate dilemma.

"You can't even get public bodies like the United Nations to discuss overpopulation even though it is a matter of unparalleled urgency," he said. "Why? I suppose because countries of birth cuts across some religious and folk beliefs."

The world population survey was sponsored by "political and economic planning," an independent research organization which has inquired into matters of public concern for 24 years. Its council of management includes a number of prominent Britons.

Lord Simon, 76, has served in parliament and as lord mayor of Manchester. He once headed the British League of Nations.

Lord Simon said he was an old man and comfortably off so he didn't have to worry about the consequences of handing out tough information.

"So I can say birth control is the only solution I see for the dilemma which is rapidly advancing upon the world. I hope some way can be found to do this acceptably to all the main religions," he said.

He urged a large-scale research project to find "the perfect pill" which would render human beings sterile for periods of about a month. Only such a pill, he said, could reduce the birth rate among people too ignorant or too lazy to use other methods.

Critics of Lord Simon's view claim the way to "keep ahead" of the population increase is to put more land under cultivation, synthesize food, and have the rich countries help the poor with money, food and technical assistance.

For these critics Lord Simon has three answers:

Trend of Yule Cards Doesn't Recognize Spirit for Season

I can't draw a straight line and Mary isn't much better, but it looks as if one of us is going to be the artist within the next week or two, talent or no talent. We both reached this conclusion a few days ago when we went shopping for our Christmas cards. We had money for them right in our little fists, but after looking over the displays in half a dozen stores we came home empty handed.

You never saw such an array of McMore Christmas cards—if they can be rightly called that—in all your days. The cards were pretty enough, but they had no more relation to Christmas than the atom bomb.

Christians and the men who furnish them with ideas, now seem to be of two schools. The first and most distasteful school is the "cute" school. The artists who belong to this one aim for laughs, and their work gives one the impression that during the off-season they do illustrations for the "funny" and novelty store catalogues. Certainly they would be right at home illustrating lightning bolts and exploding clear plates that tilt, and bouncing cigars that squirt water.

The Christmas cards of these artists feature puddles doing flippa-sauces swinging from champagne

bottles, Santa Claus about to lose his trousers, and angels decked out in milk and peas.

Sombody should tell these men to get on what Christmas is all about. They should be taken around on Christmas eve and allowed to peek through window and see kids hanging their stockings, parents putting the finishing touches to the mantel and placing the long-hidden presents beneath it. It might do them good to hear a carol or two, or to go outside a place of worship and watch the folks on Christmas.

The other major school of Christmas card artists can be called the "sophisticated" school. These gentlemen make every effort to get as far away from any suggestion of Christmas as possible. It must burn them up to have to include the words "Merry Christmas" on their cards. They dab on mad splashes of color, employ futuristic animals that could never be mistaken for reindeer, and generally draw as-if-plan-ning a left hook exhibit.

What has happened to the men and women who used to draw the lovely cards that were so much a part of Christmas? The wise men, the adorable Christ child, a sweet madonna. Is there any law against drawing the manger?

We are going to keep looking for some old-fashioned Christmas cards, for as I said, we are poor hands with paint and brush. But if we can't find any, we are going to turn our own. The spirit of Christmas will make us do it if we have to, and so it can be recognized.



Blue-Eyed Gentleman of 98 Remembers Lincoln in Coffin

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The gentleman with the blue eyes, the straight collar, the cigar at his lips, between two fingers, sat bolt upright at this rollicky feast and remembered "way back to 1863."

He remembered a man in a coffin. "I can see that face yet," he said. "Gastin—honestly—, but there was something in his face that was really spiritual, even in death. It has stayed with all my life—the face, the spiritual part of it."

"To see such an ugly face, and to have it give you an impression that was something beyond human, was... well, was a counterpoise to the blue-eyed gentleman." Ordinarily a homely object doesn't give you inspiration. In this the inspiring man is an exception. It was inspiring human. It has lasted with me all my lifetime. It was probably the most spiritual thing in my life."

The man in the coffin was Abraham Lincoln.

The gentleman doing the remembering, at the desk where he presides every day at a college, was Dr. Maurice J. Lewi, a fellow who

wears the word prodigious like a feather in a hat.

"For many years," Dr. Lewi will put a minor misaction. He will be 98 years old. That would seem to call for something of a celebration.

"Celebration? No, sir. I don't want any more," said Dr. Lewi. "They showed all that. If I live to be 100, then they can give me a banquet."

There's little doubt around the New York College of Podiatry, which Dr. Lewi, an M.D., founded in 1912, and of which he is president and director of instruction, that the banquet will be given.

He smokes eight cigars a day, eats "everything," has Scotch-and-sole before dinner, day the cigars with the meal, puts in five days a week on the job, writes historical-medical treatises, makes speeches, plays poker and what maybe three times a week at the New York Bridge-Whist club (which he founded in 1910), attends meetings of the Albany Society of New York (which he founded in 1920).

It was 8 when he saw Lincoln's body lying in state in the capitol in Albany, N. Y. He went twice through the long double line to see the face in the coffin (tears were sobbing, their handkerchiefs were out, and you could hear their voices, filled with tears, as they walked up the steep hill!)

"I've seen practically every President since then," he said. "I know many of them personally. I knew Garfield, Cleveland intimately, Harrison, Teddy Roosevelt—he mentions me in his autobiography—and the latter Roosevelt."

Dr. Lewi was a medical witness at the execution of President McKinley's assassin and attended the post mortem examination.

"I'm one of 14 children, all of them, with the exception of two, lived into their 70s and 80s. My baby sister is alive at 87. My baby brother is 84, and he's known to his companions," said the doctor, huffing out a chuckle of cigar smoke, "as Lewi the 98."

Prospects for Shipbuilding Seen as Good

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30.—A California congressman believes the prospects for west coast shipbuilding look next to sparkling, despite the fact their industry is at a low ebb right now.

This note of optimism was sounded yesterday by Rep. George P. Miller, an Alameda Democrat. He was one of 140 interested persons who attended a meeting of Gov. Goodwin Knight's committee of ship construction and repair.

"Pacific coast companies are planning to build 500 million dollars worth of ships in the next decade," Miller said. "They are making plans for a big trade in the Pacific basin."

"I feel sure that the west's traditionally great spirit will react itself and that we will be able to recapture the business."

"The meeting devoted considerable time to discussing the possibility of building a navy supercarrier on the west coast."

Rear Adm. M. J. Lawrence, commander of Mare Island navy yard, suggested that now is the time for west coast interests to start fighting for a contract to build the world's first atom-powered aircraft carrier.

7 Linemen Killed In Work Mishap

TEHUACA, Mexico, Nov. 30.—Seven telegraph linemen were killed by electric shock yesterday when a cable they were working on came into contact with a high voltage electric line.

While hundreds of Mexicans looked on, six of the bodies dangled from poles and the cable for more than an hour until Red Cross and rescue contacts removed them. The seventh man was killed on the ground with the cable wound around his neck.

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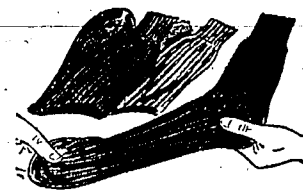

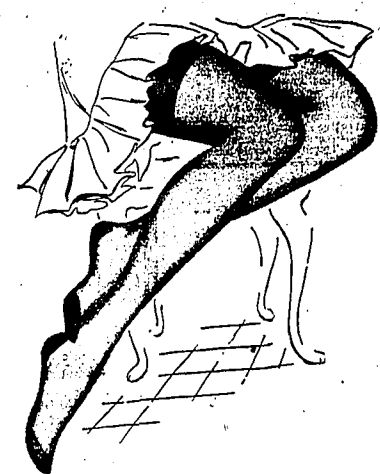

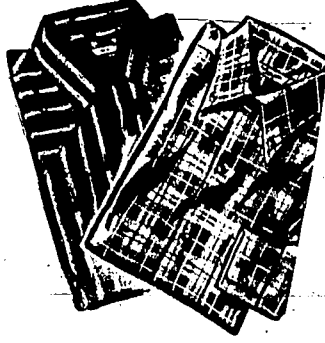

Keyboard for Typewriter to Be "Jumbled"

By HARMON W. NICHOLS
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—A jumbled keyboard for typewriters is being developed by the U. S. navy, according to a report from the navy's chief engineer, Capt. David W. Roscoe.

Translated, the above says: "These lines are being typed on a new jumbled typewriter. The construction soon will be given a four-month test by 25 expert typists picked by the general services administration. The typewriters which operate some 800,000 typewriters, usually to see if the new machine's "simplified keyboard" really will speed up the output of typists by 25 per cent as the developer claims.

Mildred Deen, a secretary in the office of Sen. Lyndon Johnson, D., Tex., thinks it is a fine idea. She can do about 50 words a minute now, and is perfectly willing to try a machine that could save her up to 100 words a minute. "If it can stand the pace," Mildred Deen said.

Throws Up Hands
 Mrs. Jane Johnson, a secretary for Murray Snyder, assistant press secretary at the White House, threw up her hands at the thought. "Why don't they think of that business of having all the vowels where they are handy in the first place—about 60 words a minute?" "Well, have to learn all over again if this new keyboard is so good. Might even have to go back to school," Mrs. Henriette O'Donoghue in Sen. Estes Kefauver's office has said. "I don't like the idea of changing the keyboard. Typing all these years, the Chattanooga, Tenn., lady said she'd go her best if a chance comes. "But it might be quite a trial!"

Doesn't Care
 The amiable Flo Bratten, who has been with "Junior Senator" Albert W. Barkley since he started in politics way back there, says the government can have its new typewriter. "Why don't they think of that?" "I don't care," said she. "I'm retiring the last of the month, anyway. Wherever I go I'll take my portable, which I have taught to spell right."

But if you think the professional typists are antipathetic trouble, consider the plight of the newspaper man who latched on the "ack-and-ye-shall-find" system.

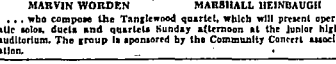

Even worse is the fact that the new board has hidden the letter "X." They must have left it in the alphabet, but I'll swear I can't find it anywhere. And "X" is one of the most important letters. We use it to cross out words.

'Loaded' Auto Is Dangerous Weapon Now

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—All over the world today this fact must be faced: Few weapons are more dangerous than an automobile when it's loaded with a careless driver.

To dramatize this point, the President's committee for traffic safety has set aside this Thursday as 5-D day, National Safe Driving day. It wants everyone to be especially careful and not get himself killed Thursday, to show what can be done when safety is practiced by everyone.

Points stressed

The committee is stressing such points as:

1. Last year 36,000 persons were killed in traffic accidents in this country. If we keep our present bad habits, more will die this year.
2. Every 25 seconds someone is hurt in an auto accident.
3. The cost is staggering—\$4,400,000 each year in medical bills and property damage.

In stressing safe driving the importance of safe driving is being emphasized. Yet in the larger cities more than half the fatalities are walkers.

First Mishap Cited

So far as the American Automobile association is concerned, the first fatality by auto was a pedestrian. In September of 1899, H. H. Bliss was killed as he stepped off a New York street car platform.

The first auto accident of which identity was known was a Buick Buick, collided with Edwin Thomas, who was riding a bike. Miss Thomas' leg was fractured, and Willis was loaded in jail for the night.

The memorable date: May 21, 1899.

SOONERS AS 1955 NATIONAL FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS

Sooners Earn Nod In Balloting by Sports Writers

The mighty Sooners of Oklahoma, acclaimed as 1955 national college football champions Tuesday after finishing second in the final Associated Press balloting, moved into first place in the college rankings over a 20-year period as a result. The Sooners will receive the Walter J. Hugh O'Donnell trophy, the championship emblem given in memory of the former Notre Dame football player and president, at a banquet Monday night in Dallas. The Sooners return from their Orange bowl game with Maryland Jan. 2.

This marks the second time in the 20-year history of the AP poll that Sooners have been designated as national champions. Oklahoma has won the national title and the eighth straight year. The Sooners have finished in the first ten in the rankings in 17 of the 20 years, only in 1934 and 1935. The O'Donnell trophy, given by the Notre Dame Monogram club after the first retirement of the trophy in 1947, must be won three times to gain permanent possession. The Sooners won the trophy in 1955, 1956 and 1957. It has been the basis of determining the championship trophy winners since 1941.

Of the 100 teams of the first 10 of 20 years on the same basis as the votes are counted in the weekly poll, 100 teams were ranked in the ahead. Points are counted on the basis of 10 for each first place vote, 9 for second, etc., down to one for tenth.

This year Oklahoma was listed first and earned the whole total of 3,581 points. Michigan State took second with 2,814 points. Texas and Maryland third with 2,574 and 2,574 points.
