Speedup Set For Fast Jet Plane Orders

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The air force said today that contrary to claims by Sen. Stuart Symington, D., Mo., its carrying out its production speedup of two super-sonic jet fighters. 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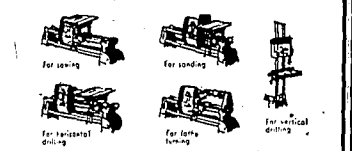


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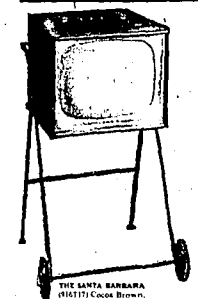

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

This final guest column was contributed by Mordecai Hai, long a New York newspaperman.

Recent reviews of Walter Lord's book, "A Night to Remember," they say, brought to the mind of the former New York Herald reporter an experience he had in 1915, the year of the Titanic disaster.

Seven or eight reporters were at the Ellis-Carlton hotel when I met an intricate with Count Johann von Bernstorff, then German ambassador to the United States. He had had the temerity to advertise in the Times wanting American news of the Lusitania and therefore had much to explain to the press. Most of the waiting reporters had been assigned to the Ambassador on other occasions, but on that day he wanted himself to all, even the representatives of the German Journal.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

West Germany is the strongest nation in western Europe, muscular, hard at work, still proud and desiring to remain so. It is in union with the eastern zone which Truman and Roosevelt have handed to Soviet Russia. Evolution has been a long and painful one.

The West German government, the Bonn is a dull little landlocked nation with a population of 15 million. It has no sea, no air force, no navy, no army, no police, no courts, no laws that it is not in a permanent state of emergency.

On a day, Westwerk Peter Demoskov, the government, got back to Berlin and the government buildings in Bonn which now house the legislature and a building industry, comparable to our own in Washington, will become hounded by the Gestapo.

Our own high commission in 1932 published a tract entitled "1932: Germany's economic crisis occupied by the rampers of Hell. The author was Robert P. Hall, press-officer of the German government, who had been division of the high commission. The promise of better times was short-lived. With the aid of the committee sharply reduced congress began slowly to enlarge the number of its subcommittees to compensate. So today there are 235 regular standing and joint committees, against 230 in 1946.

The house agriculture committee finds it necessary to maintain 12 separate subcommittees, one for each major crop. If this kind of things keeps up one may discover in 1965 that there is a subcommittee on blueberries and a subcommittee on timothy.

Recently the National Planning association through a Ford foundation grant, made an exhaustive comparison between congress and the British parliament. Naturally enough, Dr. George Galoway, who made the study, found many important differences, some of them inevitable, some to our advantage, some to our disadvantage.

The study caused the NPA to highlight again what students of parliamentary systems regard as the major shortcomings of congress.

Obviously not cured, is the rabbit-like multiplication of committees. Another is the time-wasting practice of hearing key witnesses on major bills before first a house and then a senate committee. Such hearings should be joint.

Another great time-waster is the habit of having endless house roll calls which consume hours of valuable effort. A push-button voting system would vastly shorten house balloting.

It has been rather widely assumed that Moscow's sharp criticism of Alexander Vlasov, Soviet architect of the Russian Revolution, was doomed him to a sad fate upon his return. We might be surprised. But then perhaps we never knew what happens to him.

Now comes blame Vlasov and other architects for huge amounts spent in unusual but unnecessary adornment of postwar Russian buildings. The implication is that if this money had not been so foolishly spent it could have been used in alleviating the now chronic Soviet housing shortage.

The truth is the housing lack is perhaps the single most striking evidence of the Kremlin's neglect of its ordinary citizenry. The housing shortage in plain fact worse than it was under the czars. The debt has become the forgotten project of the century.

Trapped Man Brought From Ocean's Floor

SOLONOM, Md., Dec. 2 (AP)—A navy diver recuperated today from the ordeal of being trapped for eight hours in frigid, pitch-black water 130 feet below the surface of Chesapeake Bay.

Yellow divers succeeded after frequent setbacks in freeing Joseph R. Tallarion, 35, Chicago, early last night before the cold and pressure became unbearable. A naval officer killed the veteran diver "one of the toughest men we've got."

Tallarion had become trapped at 11:15 a.m. EST yesterday when suit underwater current forced his lines around a dummy mine he was trying to recover. The mine contained scientific instruments and photographic equipment used in underwater research by the naval ordnance laboratory in Washington.

The 30 divers who took part in the rescue were hampered by strong tides, which made it difficult for them to gain a foothold near Tallarion, and by the darkness at the depth where he was trapped. Rescuers said they had to work "by feel."

Slow Ascent Made — When freed, Tallarion brought slowly to the surface to prevent him from suffering an attack of the dreaded "bends" which results from a too sudden change in pressure.

The diver emerged with the chill of the water smiling despite his numerous aches and legs and told rescuers he was "glad to be on the surface."

During the early hours of the ordeal he maintained good spirits. But later he complained of dizziness and said that he suffered sharply during the slow and painful ascent to the surface.

Man Quoted — Chief Warrant Officer Gerald Church, who helped with the rescue, said that several times during the rise to the surface Tallarion said: "I can't stand any more of this."

But Church said Tallarion, who remained conscious during the entire operation, "never got panicky." At the surface he was examined by doctors and rushed into a decompression chamber for four hours so that he could gradually adjust to the lighter pressure above ground.

Wife Watches — His wife watched through a window in the chamber, smiling encouragement. When Tallarion emerged, she ran into his arms for an embrace and long kiss. Both were smiling through tears.

The couple has no children. Tallarion, who holds a chief metalurgist rate, was put to bed for the night in the infirmary at the naval ordnance laboratory at Solonoma. His condition was satisfactory.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—I wish you knew I am a member in good standing of a society called Les Amis d'Escoffier.

I never met August Escoffier, the famous French chef who was born in 1846 and went to his reward in 1935. But we were kin of a sort. He loved to cook and I always have loved to stuff my mouth with rich food.

"Les Amis d'Escoffier" is a case you aren't up on your high school French means "the friends of Escoffier." Once a year, in many cities of the world, hotel managers and chefs fight to see what fine meals they can put out in honor of the grand old man of the kitchen, sauce and his trade.

Nobody ever wins, but every hotel manager in active membership puts a burr under his head chef to see that there is a lot of good stuff under the glass and fluid flowing without interruption into glassware of various sizes. Wine, mostly.

First one of these things I ever attended was in Minneapolis, Minn. I believe that Cedric Adams, a columnist for the Register and Tribune papers, and I were the first newspapermen ever to luck a bib with the high and mighty of the chef.

There were no speeches at these gatherings at the grand hotel, and there are no speeches now, either. Everybody is supposed to dip the proper fork into each new dish that comes along and bow a head in memory of the famous Frenchman.

That night back there in 1926, I think it was, wound up with the wealthy hotel managers gathered around a crap table and beginning a simple little crap game at 10:00 o'clock. Cedric and I left.

Well, a recent one of these annual affairs was held at the Sheraton Carlton Hotel here.

The menu started out the same— all guests are equal. It said at the beginning that "there will be no guest of honor. Members and guests will sit where they please."

Spiciness was tucked in the collar. Smoking forbidden up to the limit decreed. I served. A person who smokes while eating does not deserve the title of "gourmet."

The menu—as much of it as time allowed: "La tortue verte amantillado"—Green turtle consommé perfumed with the finest sherry. "Les filets de sole de la manche nantaise"—Filet of English sole, with rich cream sauce, completed with crawfish butter, garnished with bonneted tails of crawfish and sliced truffles. "La mignonette d'escabeau Escoffier"—Scalloped saddle of spring lamb, small potatoes noisette "rossolone"—small Parisienne potatoes browned in butter. "Les fonds d'artichaud charnart"—Artichoke heart filled with puree of green peas. "Le sorbet d'orange au Miris"—Pineapple sherbet.

Probers End GOP 'Game,' Solon Claims

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—Sen. Matthew M. Neely, D. W. Va., said today senate investigators have demolished what Democrats call the Republican "numbers game" on security risk firings.

"I don't think there's anything left of it," Neely told newsmen.

The senate subcommittee on government employees' security called today for a breakdown of discharges from government agencies to bolster its argument.

Statistics Quoted — The subcommittee said that less than 10 per cent—342 of 2,566 federal workers fired "because of security questions" actually lost their jobs under President Eisenhower's Republican program. It said the rest were discharged under regular civil service procedure.

Neely said the "numbers game" is "such a farce now that nobody believes it ever was anything but a political hoax."

The "numbers game" is the name late Democrats have given to civil service compilation reports of the number of persons fired because of acts or conditions which it is claimed would make them possible security risks.

Complaint Given — Democrats have complained that these figures, echoed in GOP campaign oratory, have given the impression that an executive order by President Eisenhower has resulted in the ousting of thousands of subversives inherited from the Truman administration.

Mr. Eisenhower's order set forth a wide range of grounds for discharge, such as unreliability, morals, excessive drinking, or anything in a man's record which might subject him to blackmail. These were in addition to any subversive activities.

Subcommittee counsel Paul E. Huddick charged that the order is so broad that a "zealous" security officer could list as a security risk a person fired from government for almost any reason.

Idaho to Keep Supply of Hay For Own Use

BOISE, Dec. 2 (AP)—Idaho is well fixed for hay and is hanging onto it for a possible long winter. About \$200,000 more were produced, economists of the University of Idaho extension service said in their publication "Economic Factors for Farm Families."

"The hay crop is 150,000 tons bigger than the 10-year average. It is just as well the supply is good, the economists hinted, because extra feed in winter could be indicated a long feeding season is in prospect."

"This underlines the desirability of keeping our hay supply in the state," said Robert Wilcox and Virgil Kennedy, specialists in the economic situation.

Hay has moved into Boise valley because that area's crop was held down by a late spring. Most other districts had substantial yields.

Movement out of the state is less than a year ago.

Idaho ranges were better than last year as winter started. The condition was also slightly above average.

The economic response is a lower percentage of No. 1 potatoes in the large crop. The total crop is about 10 million bushels above the year, and growers' reports of the 10 million bushel crop indicate only 10 per cent more No. 1. The 10-year average for No. 1 is 64 per cent, they say.

Crowds place part of the blame on frost damage for the unusually heavy pickout, the economists said.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2—Installation of a credit selling system is one of the things that make the American economy run—brilliant and strong—and there is no sign that credit sales of merchandise are getting out of hand.

"The opinion of Walter Hoising, a practicing merchandising expert for many years who takes no stock in the opinions of some economists that the credit-buying public now may be living beyond its means."

Hoising was chairman of the Macy's and president of DeWitt Tel-ler, prestige merchandising firms which have no installment plan with which such buyings as an executive at Montgomery Ward, and elsewhere.

"The boys are really worked up about this every one in a while—it gets to be sort of a fad with some economists and professors." Hoising said in an interview. "There may be a ceiling, of course—some place that's the top—but write not anywhere near there yet."

"There is no sign that merchandise installment buying is writing out of hand, and there's no reason to build up a lot of busobuses."

"Credit men who are operating under the free enterprise system are adequately amply to handle the situation. They'd be the first to see if it was getting out of hand. It's the kind of thing that private enterprise can handle—and is handling—well. I see no reason for government control or arbitrary regulations."
