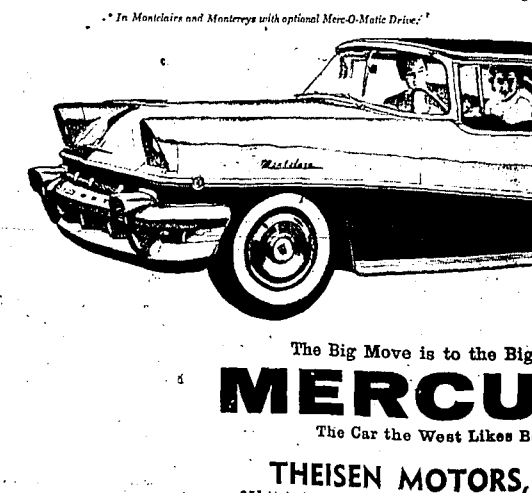

Tourist in Rural Russia Tells Burley Lions of Observations

BURLEY, Dec. 12—Julius Kleiner, Nampa dairyman who recently returned from a farm tour of Russia, spoke at the Burley Lion club's annual farmer's night Friday evening in the Burley Elks dining room.

Kleiner, with a group of 11 other farmers, was in Russia for 27 days and they enjoyed excellent hospitality and had very good food of a large variety. Everything is under a plan, in Russia, he said, and no person or group owns any land. The state decrees just how many acres can be planted to each crop. The farmers sell their produce at various prices with almost all of it being sold to or through the government.

Kleiner said bookkeepers keep close tab on all phases of production. The average farm worker receives about \$20 a month on an official rate of exchange. He said Russian peasants have plenty to eat, existing on a diet of 70 per cent cereal, but that living conditions are poor.

The speaker said state farms are very large and better than collective farms. The state gets about 85 per cent of the produce and uses that money for the improvement of roads, hospitals and other state functions. In addition to military spending, he said the Russian people are satisfied easily, and that their living conditions are improving daily. He said they have one ideal, "to communicate the world with Moscow the center."

Air Chemicals Get Blame for Lung Cancers

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12 (AP)—Deadly chemicals in the air from raw gasoline fumes and from automobile exhaust gases probably are to blame for the present increase in lung cancer, according to top California medical men.

The doctors, Seymour Farber and Paul Kofin, told the American college of chest physicians yesterday that if lung cancer continues to increase at its present rate, by 1970 one out of every 15 men in this nation will develop it.

"Some new factor has been at work in the past 50 years to cause this increase in lung cancer, and we think it is these compounds which have grown with the automobile industry," said Dr. Kofin, University of Southern California pathologist.

He said the deadly chemicals need not be associated with thick smog as experienced in Los Angeles, but such chemicals are present in the air of every large city. This would account for the fact that city residents have more lung cancer than country people, he said.

Los Angeles inhabitants have no more lung cancer than residents of any other city, Dr. Kofin stated.

Dr. Garber, head of postgraduate medical training at the University of California, said present efforts to control or cure lung cancer are directed at chemicals, since surgery has been able to save only 10 percent of its victims.

Senator Says 'Freeze Out' Tactics Used

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., says some California Democratic party leaders are using "freeze me out" tactics to keep their building program out of the state for at least 10 years and to keep the party from being re-elected.

The senator made the charge last night before addressing a dinner of the Jewish national fund. He said, however, despite the "freeze out" tactic, he does not discourage it.

Kefauver said since arriving in California he has noted strong support in the state for the candidacy of Adlai Stevenson. But, he said, "the same grass roots support that I had before (1952), maybe a little more."

When questioned by reporters concerning whether he will become a candidate for the Democratic nomination, he said his political plans will be announced "shortly," not later than Jan. 15.

"If I run for anything, it will be for President—not vice president," he added.

In his speech before several hundred dinner guests, Kefauver said if the communist nations continue to supply arms to Egypt, "we may have no alternative but to enable Israel to buy sufficient arms to protect her sovereignty."

Kefauver declared in criticizing the government's foreign policy in the Middle East that "the United States needed a 'real foreign policy' which neither abused in meaningless slogans nor rendered inefficient from the start by penny-pinching concern with balancing the budget for protective political reasons."

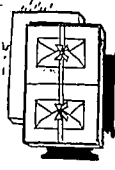

3-Way Battle Observed for Top Red Spot

LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—A London newspaper said today Soviet Communist leader Nikita Khrushchev, former Premier Georgi Malenkov and an "unidentified group of ultra-extremists" are engaged in a three-way struggle for leadership in Russia.

Daily Mail diplomatic correspondent Walter Farr said the Soviet Union is heading for a new series of large scale purges that will see one or the other of the three factions emerge triumphant.

Farr said Khrushchev is trying to pack the February congress of the Soviet Communist party with his own supporters to ensure that his views are adopted. He said the congress will prove the real test of strength of the three factions.

Uncensored reports show that there is now an atmosphere of filth and confusion in high places in Moscow comparable with the period immediately following the end of the Stalin era," he said.

Farr cited as evidence of the confusion recent errors in Pravda, the official communist publication, and radio Moscow's recent reference to Malenkov as a "first deputy premier."

Cyprus Students Riot With Army

NICOSIA, Cyprus, Dec. 12 (AP)—British troops and colonial police riot squads used tear gas and batons to disperse pro-Greek student demonstrations in Nicosia Saturday. Nineteen students were arrested.

The rioting began when pupils at a secondary school refused to attend classes and poured from the school shouting slogans for union with Greece. They were joined by students from another school and surged through the main streets waving Greek flags.

The 300 demonstrators were scattered by British troops driven to the scene in buses. Police lobbed tear gas shells into the mob and arrested 10 students.

Trustee Named to Ford's Foundation

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—Henry Ford II Saturday announced the election of Julius A. Stratton, vice president and provost of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, as a trustee of the Ford Foundation.

Stratton, a native of Seattle, has been associated with MIT almost continuously since his graduation from the school in 1922.

He became professor of physics in 1941, shortly after he had become a member of the AEC's radiation laboratory. In 1942, he was detached from the laboratory to become expert consultant to the office of secretary of war. He became vice president and member of the corporation of MIT in 1951.

Stratton is the only wine whose taste is not marred by tobacco smoke.

Health of Presidents Often Is Matter for Political Concern

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The health of Presidents frequently has been a matter of political and public concern. There were some slanderous whispers and inside-dope letters about the health of President Roosevelt's physical condition during the years of his presidency.

But, aside from such, there was a gentlemanly understanding all around that no political play would be made on FDR's (colossal) misfortune, polo. He was a cripple, but the lameness did not extend to his head. So his legs and his steel braces were largely ignored, especially by the news photographers who never took advantage of their chance to photograph Mr. Roosevelt in strange and painful postures.

But the time came after two robust terms of office and well into the third when the wear of the White House began to crack Mr. Roosevelt's health. His colds or bouts with influenza seem to last a bit longer and, then, longer than that.

White House reporters noted the physical changes. So did other regular visitors. There seemed to be a steady deterioration. Some of FDR's close political associates have written books since his death. In them the record is clear that the insiders knew in 1943-44 that Mr. Roosevelt was failing. That was a prime cause for their successful campaign to elect Henry A. Wallace as a fourth-term running mate.

The insiders didn't want to take the very real chance that Wallace would serve out Mr. Roosevelt's fourth term. So evident was the President's failing health and so widely was the fact known among the citizens, that FDR, himself, determined on a strategy to scotch the public fears.

He chose his New York City campaign appearance for as bright a piece of political strategy as even he could wish for. The day was awful—cold rain and gusts of wind.

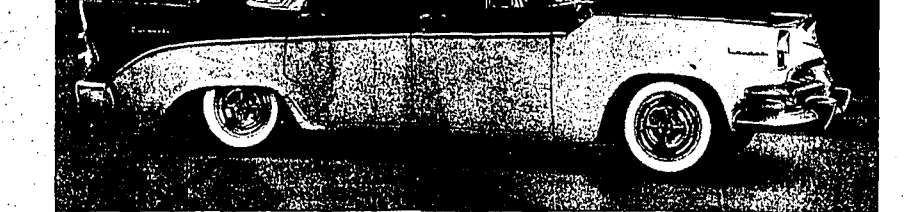

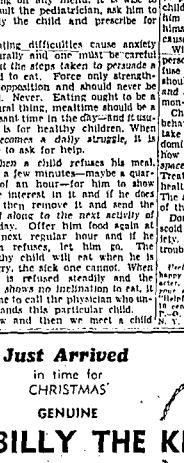

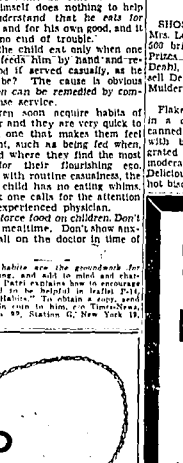

Idaho Anglers, Hunters Asked For 'Scores'

BOISE, Dec. 12—Hunters and fishermen were asked today to jot down the number of birds and fish they have harvested for the year while it is fresh in their minds in preparation for the annual Idaho hunting and fishing harvest survey to be conducted soon after the first of the year.

Ross Leonard, fish and game director, said, "Nobody has any trouble remembering his score on a big game, but the details of his record on fish and birds soon become hazy." He said the questionnaires will be similar to those sent out early this year cover the 1954 season, and will be accompanied by a pamphlet to assist the sportsman in keeping his fields of activity to his own satisfaction.

Forms will be about 17,000 fishermen and 10,000 hunters drawn from the Idaho fish and game department's master license list. "These surveys are designed to reveal trends in hunting and fishing pressure and in the harvest taking on an area, as well as statewide," he explained, "and they are extremely valuable in game management."

He pointed out that Idaho people hunt and fish with great freedom of choice, with a minimum of area control and very limited checking station requirements. "This makes for more freedom in hunting and fishing, but leaves us guessing about the total harvest except in special areas where close check is necessary. With the cooperation of sportsmen in these surveys, we can fill in the needed information from the questionnaires."

The questionnaires will request information as to the number and kinds of game taken, with the general area to be indicated in some specific "check boxes on the trap cards. Success of the past fishing and hunting season will be helpful when you start to fill out your questionnaire, and will increase the accuracy of your report," Leonard said. "Even if you don't happen to receive a questionnaire, you will probably find the record interesting in making comparisons with your success next year."

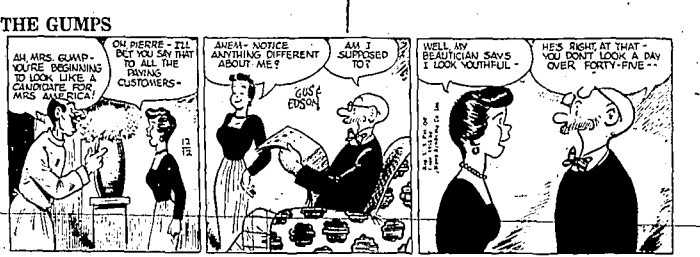

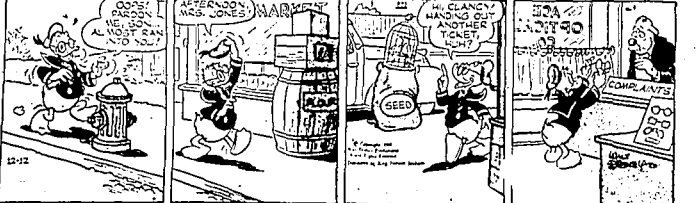

Expert Seeks Discipline Aid In Psychology

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—A psychologist is advocating a new school of psychological thought and action. Emma Coyne, psychology teacher and counselor at Brooklyn college, invited his fellow scientists to say "no" to what she called "the mask."

His idea was that psychologists have gone too far in "understanding" the socially unacceptable acts and failures of their patients.

"Understandings," he said, can go so far as to carry the implication that the psychologic accept "deviant behavior." He added that there was "room for a psychology" based on "insistence on truth in the mask."

Others, "the value of meeting standards" is under-mind. He had in mind the popular school of child psychology which seeks to give credit to spare the child from becoming "inhibited."

People take it so seriously, "one dare not speak the child's mind," psychology book has been collected.

High schools and colleges, teachers send students to psychologists for some such reasons as "Student X has cheated on my examination. I think he is disturbed." "Student Y is charged with truancy rate. I think he is disturbed."

"Might it not be that disciplinary action rather than "supportive therapy" is the first order of business?" Coyne asked.

"I wonder to what extent poor or non-existent study habits, poor spelling, difficulties in high school and college may not be attributed to parental and/or personal failure to "push your child" rather than to unresolved oedipal complexes or to "hairs of the father image or authority of society."

He used to think, he said, that a psychologist should never let a person taking his professional counsel, know he disapproved of that person's behavior, "no matter how deviate."

But now, after much experience, he feels that with "a significant number" of the persons who seek his professional help, "the concept of discipline in general and of self-discipline in particular is a foreign and unknown concept. In short, rather than insistence upon adherence to standards having failed or having caused maladjustment, adherence to standards has not been required or tried in all too many instances."

Line to Slate Jet Craft for Fast Service

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—Continental Air Lines today announced the purchase of four jet Strato-liners which will cut the Denver to Chicago flying time by more than one hour.

Robert F. Six, Continental president, said four Boeing 707 jet Strato-liners purchased by his company will be put into operation on routes between Chicago, Denver and Los Angeles and Chicago, Kansas City to Los Angeles by 1956.

Continental will be the first company to establish regularly scheduled jet transport service over the route, Six said.

The "707s," powered with Pratt and Whitney J-57 engines are capable of speeds up to 600 miles per hour and can carry 118 passengers. The Strato-liners have a maximum non-stop range of more than 3,000 miles, Six said.

It is predicted that regularly scheduled flights would be started by August, 1956, with an entire fleet in operation by September.

The airlines official also announced the purchase of five Douglas DC-7Bs in addition to the "707s" at a total price of \$33,000,000.
