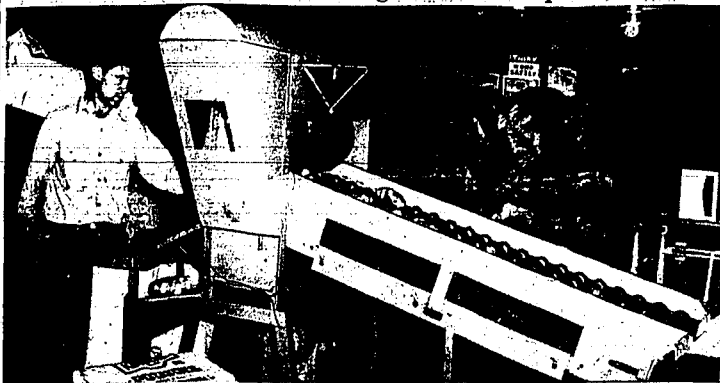

Eden Viewing War Dangers For Mid-East

LONDON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Prime Minister Eden said last night the Arab-Eden dispute is the gravest "international danger." He said the United States and Britain are agreed on the necessity of working for a settlement.

Eden spoke in a parliamentary debate on the Middle East. He delivered his remarks after a three-hour session devoted to a resolution introduced by the opposition.

Eden said, "I am confident that the United States and Britain are agreed on the necessity of working for a settlement."

Eden's remarks were seen as strengthening his position and those of his opponents who are demanding a determination.

Cheers Rung

Eden reaffirmed Britain's adherence to the 1947 UN resolution and the United States' attitude at keeping peace in the Middle East. He said:

"We are ready to carry out jointly with our allies any action necessary to bring about a settlement of the Arab-Israeli dispute."

Referring to the Arab-Israeli dispute

Eden said, "I am confident that a settlement more urgent than ever in the history of the world."

He defended a recent speech in which he advocated a compromise between Israel and Egypt as the only way to peace.

Israelis have regarded the speech as a "challenge" to their claims over that territory won after the 1948 Arab-Israeli war.

Eden said:

"What I was trying to do was make both sides of this dispute realize that they could live together in peace and that it was not necessary to start a new war. I said or drew back from the motives I had in mind."

He believed the possibility of a settlement does exist. He said the United States are in agreement on this and on the urgency with which the effort must be made.

Salty-to-Fresh Water Project Urged in Talk

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., yesterday argued a federally financed program for converting salt water into practical and economic process for converting fresh water from the sea.

Mounting Blizzard Is Raking Adlai Strikes Northern Plains; Cold Is Due

By United Press

A mounting blizzard drove out of Canada into the northern plains today. The storm was already in force in northern Saskatchewan, where severe blizzard conditions were reported. In the Dakotas, where warnings were hoisted in this country for parts of the Dakota.

Blizzards and heavy snows were reported in South Dakota early today.

The advancing cold battered the Northwest through southern air which warmed up the midlands yesterday, bringing temperatures as much as 14 degrees. The report was for blizzards for much of the western states.

Elsewhere, up to five inches of rain forced the evacuation of 40 persons from Kent, Wash., and caused damage to homes at Astoria, Ore. A descent, "heat wave" continued from the northern mountains to southern California, but the East slipped in cold which included a heavy blizzard over the Midwest.

It was much colder in the Canada plains area, where the mercury ranged between zero and 10 below. The falling snow was whipped by winds which reached gusts of 75 an hour, restricting visibility occasionally to zero.

The storm's advance guard was felt early today at Aberdeen, Md., where nearly an inch of new snow fell in a one-hour period. At Huron, Mich., gusty wind whirled in snow hitting 30 miles per hour and drifting new-fallen snow into drifts.

Winds of 30 miles per hour were clocked at Lehigh, N.Y., and Billings, Mont., reported gusts of 33 miles per hour blowing snow and rain. In Detroit, gusts of 20 miles per hour were reported.

More snow was blamed for the death of two motorists on a road in northern Michigan yesterday. The Detroit Register reported that the bodies of a man and a woman were found on a road. The man was killed by a car which was stopped for a warm and died of carbon monoxide poisoning.

The blizzard was welcomed in the Pacific Northwest, where it promised to put an end to torrential rains and keep sweltering streams inside their banks.

Another storm was reported in the northern states, where winds of near-hurricane force delayed a number of New York-bound ships from leaving New York harbor. The British liner Queen Mary was among the storm-tossed vessels.

H-Bomb Part May Provide Needed Light

CLEVELAND, Dec. 13 (AP)—One of the ingredients of the hydrogen bomb offers possibilities for nuclear energy production in electric plants and other places, a nuclear engineering expert said yesterday.

An official of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission said that the hydrogen bomb and a variety of other man-made radioactive substances are producible in the atomic program show prospects of providing a new and improved method of generating "self-luminous" light.

"That's the same kind of thing that has been talked about in the past," said the official, "and it would be a practical and economic process for converting fresh water from the sea."

He said the cost of the project is money which would be required to produce the atomic bomb could do this.

'Living in Sin' Is Cheaper in Many Nations

LONDON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Douglas Easton, a British author, is right rather than get married in half the countries in Europe.

Easton's book "Living in Sin" says that "widow marriages" are the economic advantage of couples who are divorced and remarry in many nations.

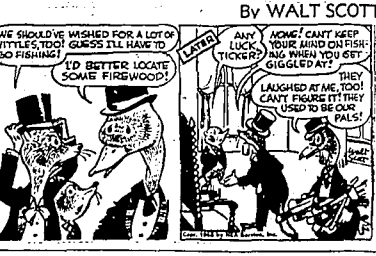

Board Gives Final OK For Big Giveaway

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 (AP)—The hands of the set-in wall clock in the window of the 11th-floor board room neared 1 p. m. when a chunky man sitting midway down a 40-foot mahogany table said in dry, inflectional tones:

"Then I've agreed we'll go ahead on this basis?"

Twelve men around the table nodded their heads. Four were industrialists and business men; two were publishers; one was a banker; one was a judge; three were educators; one was a lawyer.

It was last Saturday afternoon. The nodding of heads gave final approval to the biggest one-shot act of philanthropy in history—granting 600 million dollars to American private colleges, hospitals, and medical schools.

The man doing the talking was Henry Ford II, chairman of the trustees of the Ford Foundation, which his family set up in 1936 to make grants to advance human welfare. Outside the board room, the Ford name is decorated by buff and bright red, only two pictures broke the wall monochrome and father, Henry and Edsel Ford.

Final Session Held

"This was the final session of a three-day meeting of the 13 trustees who control the country's largest foundation, with a 24-billion-dollar capital."

Henry Ford II is 30. On his immediate right sat Charles E. (Electric Charlie) Wilson, 66, former president of General Electric and chairman of the foundation trustees finance committee that planned the sale of Ford Motor company stock to the public next January.

Just as the offering of the stock made financial history, the announcement of the half-billion-dollar grants made philanthropic history.

Knowledge Cited

"And you can be sure we knew this was a monumental thing," said H. Rowan Galtzer, Jr., foundation president, today. "These programs have developed in an orderly, thorough way in the last 2 1/2 years. The first time the college grant program was discussed was in September, 1953. The real decision on it on the faculty raises—came last winter."

Galtzer, 48, a San Francisco lawyer, was assistant director of the radiation laboratory at Massachusetts Institute of Technology during World War II. Now his president over a foundation that spreads into seven floors of a Madison Avenue building.

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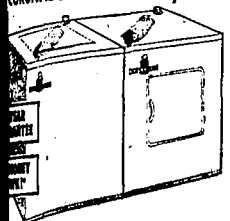

U. S. Policy in Water Dispute Is Denounced

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11 (AP) — Sen. Edmund G. Brown today denounced U. S. policy in California's dispute with Arizona over waters of the Colorado river. Brown also accused the administration of turning over water resources to private power companies.

The blast from California's Democratic attorney general followed that the U. S. supreme court had denied California's request that Colorado and Wyoming be made defendants in a pending suit over use of Colorado river water.

The high court granted a California motion to join Utah and Nevada as parties, only to the extent of their interest in lower basin waters.

Three attorneys general of the United States are playing politics with one of the greatest lawsuits that has racked our nation," Brown said.

"I told reporters that Brown cannot help but know that all the upper basin states should be parties to the lawsuit. If he doesn't think so, he should have spoken out. But to remain silent in a matter so important as this can be attributed to a lack of political responsibility."

"The silence of the U. S. attorney general permits critical interference with our national water law in a critical time in its development. I would like to know if he discussed this matter with the U. S. senators of the upper basin states, and what promises or commitments they made to him."

"The results of his silence are in line with the entire water policy of the present administration. In marital matters you find the federal government paying all the bills and supporting Federal operation of a project. But in top-flight operations, like Hells canyon, in Idaho, you find the resources turned over to a private power company, the Idaho Power company.

Report Urges Pay Hike for Rail Workers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP) — A fact-finding report filed at the White House yesterday recommended a quarter billion dollar annual boost to wages and health benefits for 150,000 non-operating employees of the nation's railroads.

The report, submitted by an emergency board named by President Eisenhower, said the employees should get a 14 1/2-cent hourly pay increase plus an added 2 cents per hour payment toward their health and welfare plans.

The 18 1/2 per cent an hour total increase compares with 10 1/2 cents an hour offered by the carriers and a 27-cent an hour increase sought by the rail labor unions involved.

The board recommendations are not binding on either side, but such suggestions usually form a settlement basis.

The workers involved are telegraphers, clerks and others who do not actually operate the moving trains. The present average is \$1.78 per hour.

The emergency board recommended that the 14 1/2-cent per hour pay boost be effective as of Dec. 1. It suggested the additional 2 cents if standing become effective next March.

The board making Monday's recommendations consisted of Dudley E. Whiting, Detroit, chairman; John Day Lewis, Chicago, and C. Allan Deal, Philadelphia.

In deciding the 18 1/2-cent figure the board said that amount was fair to permit the non-operating rail workers to catch up with increases won by the operating workers, such as engineers, firemen, etc.

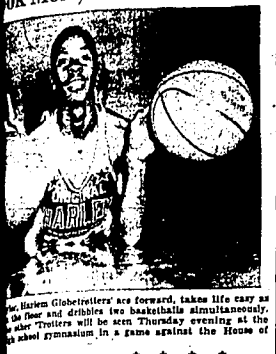

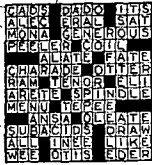

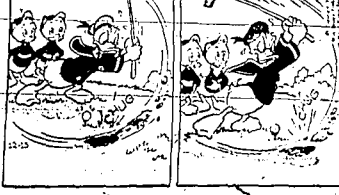

Smooth Consolidation of Soviet Power Following Death of Stalin Very Evident

MOSCOW, Dec. 13.—The meeting of the Russian parliament on Dec. 22 is expected to give further indication that a relatively smooth consolidation of the Soviet regime has taken place in the post-Stalin era.

Speeches to be made during the session are expected to indicate that there has been progress in the major fields of national activity.

Nearly three years after Josef Stalin's death, western observers think the new principle of collective leadership appears to be working efficiently.

It is noteworthy that Stalin never left the Soviet Union during his 30-year rule except for brief wartime visits to Tehran and Potsdam.

The present year has marked a continued relaxation of cultural life in the Soviet Union.

The appearance of such a group of Soviet leaders in foreign countries was another 1954 highlight.

More western newsmen have received Soviet visas this year than ever before under communism.

It was the first time since 1917, a foreign theatrical company—the Paris Comedie Francaise—came here to perform.

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Court Ruling Due in Union Pay Dispute

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31 (AP)—The supreme court agreed yesterday to rule on whether a company which says it cannot afford to grant a wage increase may be compelled to open its financial records to a union.

The court acted in response to a government contention that an employer could avoid wage negotiations merely by saying it is in no position to grant a wage increase.

Involved in the case which the court agreed to review and rule on are the *Truitt Manufacturing Company*, Greensboro, N. C., and the *AFL Ironworkers Union*.

The national labor relations board ordered the company to open its financial books to the union when it contended it could not afford a wage increase demanded by the union. The ironworkers union, in the summer of 1953, had demanded a wage increase of 10 cents an hour. The company offered 2 1/2 cents an hour more. The company said a strike was called when it rejected the union demand.

The U. S. court of appeals at Richmond, Va., overruled the NLRB. It held the *Taft-Hartley* act does not require disclosure of financial records as a test of good faith bargaining.

The question of whether a company may be required to open its financial records to a union has never been taken up by the supreme court.

In another action Monday, the court ruled that an employer who fails to comply with a NLRB order to bargain collectively with a union must do so within a reasonable time or be guilty of contempt.

Fighter Explodes Up High, Crashes

MOORE LAKE, Wash., Dec. 31 (AP)—A jet fighter plane loaded with rockets apparently exploded at between 20,000 and 30,000 feet yesterday, then crashed in a field. The pilot was killed.

Col. W. P. Hippler, executive officer at Larson air force base here, said the plane was on a routine training mission. The pilot's body was found about a mile from the main wreckage.

Parts of the plane were scattered over a wide area. Hippler said it wasn't known whether the pilot had tried to bail out.
