Solon Seeking Debt Payment Instead of Cut

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland said today he would like to see the government able to pay about one billion dollars on the national debt before taxes are cut.

He also indicated that he doubts the Eisenhower administration will recommend a tax reduction in the 1956 election year.

Knowland told newsmen he was not suggesting the one billion dollar annual payment on the national debt as a "rigid" figure or as one backed by the administration. But he did make clear that he believes the administration is prepared to give priority to at least some debt reduction ahead of a tax cut.

Tells Views "I don't believe there should be any tax reduction contemplated until the budget is balanced and there is some reduction of the national debt," he said.

He also said he thinks there can be no appraisal of tax cutting prospects until after the heavy tax collections due next April 15.

Wants Fiscal Facts Knowland said the administration "wants to see what the fiscal facts are" before tax legislation is considered. If government revenues should increase substantially above expected levels, he said, there could be enough for both a payment on the federal debt and a tax cut.

But he added that "based on present treasury figures, that does not seem likely."

LAMPA, Dec. 15 (U.P.)—A month-old infant was snugly bedded down in a specially equipped railroad Pullman bedroom on the Union Pacific line to St. Louis, Mo., for an operation of his deformed leg.

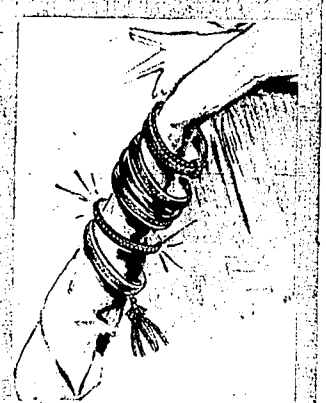

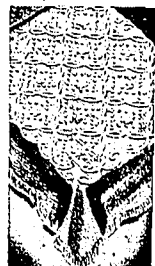

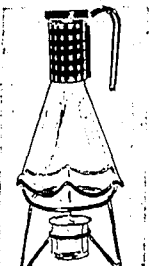

Report Shows Work Day on Farms Is Cut

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (Special)—Idaho farm operators have reduced their workday hours about 26 per cent since last September, the department of agriculture reports.

The seasonal reduction applies in a lesser degree to hired farm workers in the state, who shortened their workday about 11 per cent, according to agriculture's continuing weekly survey.

Based on Questionnaire Reports on all states are drawn up on the basis of questionnaires mailed to some 15,000 to 20,000 farmers across the country.

During a busy September, Idaho farm operators worked an average 11.7-hour day. Hired workers put in a 9.3-hour day.

By Dec. 1 the figures had dropped to 8.6 and 8.2 hours respectively.

Both Idaho groups put in one of their busiest years in 1955, the department of agriculture revealed.

On June 1 farm operators were working almost 12 hours daily, as hard as any period during the last three harvest years.

Hired workers matched their employers in June by registering their longest average working day—8.4 hours—in the past three years.

This year was no exception in the marked seasonal drop in working hours on Idaho farms, agriculture said.

Down in September, operators' hours dropped from the 11-plus level in September to between eight and nine by Dec. 1.

Hired workers followed suit, reducing their workday over the same period from the 9-hour-plus to the 8-hour-plus level.

The other mountain states showed the same seasonal ease-up in work hours.

For the eight mountain states average workday hours dropped from a year-high of 11.5 in September to around 8.7 the beginning of this month.

Berlin Blockade Feared

Taxpayer Will Be Hit by New U.N. Additions

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 15.—The addition of 18 new members to the United Nations is going to hit the individual taxpayer in the pocket.

The U. N. budget—the bulk of which is borne by the United States, which pays one-third of the total—will be boosted by about \$100,000 in the coming year, informed sources said.

The cost estimate is based on an expected increase of \$83,000 for the enlargement of the seating capacity of the assembly hall and main committee rooms for additional telecommunication installations and for the purchase of miscellaneous equipment.

19 More Ready

In the present general assembly and committee rooms the seating arrangement could be used to accommodate 19 additional delegates. To accommodate more desks and seats for the representatives and their aides must be added. The present assembly and meeting rooms are estimated to be able to accommodate a maximum of 84 nations with renovations.

If the membership is increased beyond 16 the additional seating alterations in the present setup.

Budget Raised

It is estimated that the U. N. budget would have to be raised \$83,000 to cover alterations and expansion of facilities.

To this must be added another estimated \$50,000 in travel expenses for the delegates from 18 new countries to the 1955 general assembly—which will inform delegates that they also must be added. The estimates are for \$5,000 for each new delegation as an estimate of five representatives for each country.

Flag Poles Needed

The new members would also require the addition of 16 more 23-foot flag poles at a cost of \$216 each to the display in front of the U. N. headquarters. The 9-foot by 7 1/2-foot flags are available for eight of the new members and for the others they can be made available within a week.

The flags available now are for Italy, Austria, Finland, Libya, Nepal, Albania, Bulgaria and Honduras.

The failure of Outer Mongolia and Japan to receive approval for membership this year cut the estimated cost to the United Nations by some \$10,000, sources said.

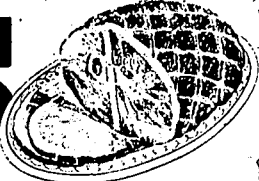

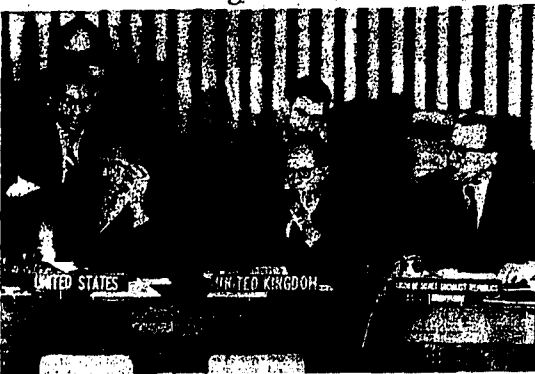

I belong to no political party and I hope my remarks have no political bias whatever.

First, I believe that the debate over fixed vs. flexible price supports is largely political and beside the point. administration stands, there would still have been a very considerable surplus. In my opinion, most people do not realize that new fertilizers, new varieties of grain and new types of machinery, accompanied by extensive research by state and federal agencies, have resulted in a farm technology of such magnitude that the surplus are likely to continue for at least 20 years. It is right that state and federal agencies which do their best to produce surpluses should face the results of their actions.

The six-point program proposed by Secretary Benson with the approval of President Eisenhower is a good program provided it is backed up by adequate legislation and vigorously administered.

So far as grain and cotton are concerned, in the long run the really important point is not whether the loans shall be fixed at 90 per cent of parity or on a sliding scale of 75 to 90 per cent at the judgment of the secretary. Neither the one nor the other will cut down surpluses effectively.

Therefore, I would say that the really important thing for grain and cotton is to cut down surpluses by radical acreage cuts together with all possible effort to expand consumption at home and abroad.

The best method of making acreage cuts in the soil bank idea which is actively backed by the farm organizations. But if this is to be effective it must be administered by farmer-elected township and county farm committees and the amount of money available must result in a really large acre diversion of grain and cotton acres into grass and other permanent soil building crops. United said it would return all strikers to the payroll no later than Dec. 19 without disciplinary action. The strike began Oct. 23.

The dispute centered around a company demand that all its flight engineers be certified pilots. The company retained this right in the new contract but agreed to provide pilot training for its flight engineers. Those not wishing pilot training will be kept on as engineers, the company said.

Kent said the agreement provided that all flight engineer work will be performed by members of the Flight Engineers union.

The agreement also calls for wage increases raising flight engineers' monthly pay on DC8 planes from \$775.58 to \$813.53 and on DC74 from \$856 to \$902. The raises are retroactive to Feb. 1, 1955.

Ulcers Attack Halts Trip of Visiting Chief

CHICAGO, Dec. 15 (AP)—A sudden stomach attack today forced Uruguayan President Luis Batlle Berres to discontinue his tour of the United States.

The president suffered an apparent bleeding ulcer attack at a private dinner last night and was rushed to a hospital. Doctors at Wesley Memorial hospital said his condition was "excellent" but advised him to stay in bed for at least a few days, cutting short his 10-day tour of the U. S.

Painted at Dinner

Sources close to the 58-year-old president said he fainted while attending a dinner in his honor at the exclusive Chicago club.

Batlle Berres recovered consciousness and refused to be carried to an ambulance. But, while walking to the door he became ill and vomited some blood, the sources said.

Hours later at the hospital, attending physicians issued a statement saying "there is apparently a bleeding ulcer. The president's condition is excellent."

Wife Is Ill

The president's wife, attending a suburban function, was reported to have suffered an attack of indigestion as she rushed to her husband's side. Batlle Berres' oldest son, John, 21, was also with him. Uruguayan officials were meanwhile trying to locate his youngest son, Luis, in New York.

Batlle Berres had been showing visible signs of strain during his fast-moving big through this country. Yesterday, before flying from Boston, Mass., to Chicago, he remarked that he had made about 250 speeches in 10 days.

5,000 Seniors Take Test for College Grant

EVANSTON, Ill., Dec. 15 (AP)—The National Merit Scholarship program, sponsors of the largest private scholarship program in American history, today announced 5,000 high school seniors have advanced to the semi-final round in scholarship competition.

Ultimately, at least 625 of them will be awarded four-year college scholarships with a total value of over \$2,500,000. The 5,000 whose names were announced today were the quest for merit scholarships in a preliminary screening test Oct. 26. They represent every state, and the territories of Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

The October examination was in each of the participating high schools. The next examination will come Jan. 14, and will be a college aptitude test administered in testing centers.

Of the 5,000 taking this test, about 2,500 will go on to the final.

From the list of finalists, perhaps as many 500 merit scholars and 2,000 certificate of merit winners will be named. In the final judging, personal qualities, leadership potential and actual previous scholastic achievement will be considered.

'Inertia' Claim Is Made Upon Foreign Plans

CHARLOTTE, Calif., Dec. 15 (AP)—Ben Mike Mansfield charged today that Russia is winning the cold war struggle because the Eisenhower administration's foreign policy is bogged down in "massive inertia."

The Montana Democrat, who is an influential member of the senate relations committee, said that the administration's foreign policy is "without drive, a policy, stricken with a poverty of ideas."

In a speech prepared for delivery at Pomona college, Mansfield pointed to his "ominous trends" in world affairs on recent travels in Southeast Asia, Europe and North Africa.

Red Gains Told

"The Soviet diplomatic offensive, dramatized at Geneva last July, has made great gains," he said.

"Despite bold terms like 'massive retaliation,' this Soviet diplomatic offensive has been met with nothing but a 'massive inertia'."

The Eisenhower administration has been carrying out the basic foreign policy laid down by the Truman administration but has added no new ideas—only "dynamic and dangerous Republican words," Mansfield said.

"A vacuum of thought seems to have settled upon the administration, and this vacuum threatens to seriously injure our interests as a nation," Mansfield said. "Laziness and indecision prevail where clear thinking is required; faction dominates where energy and drive are needed."

A major weakness in the administration's foreign policy is a split over it in the Republican Party, he said. President Eisenhower would had to depend upon Democratic support to put over "the constructive aspects" of his foreign program, the senator contended.

Police recovered the bodies of the victims, tentatively identified as George Morrison, 48; his wife, age 48; Morrison's mother, 70, and his son, Peter, 8.

Another son, 10, escaped death because he had been taken to a Framingham hospital yesterday for a tonsillectomy.

John Tibbets, a neighbor said, "No one could get into the house to save them. It was just one big square of fire."

Washington State Gives Car Rates

OLYMPIA, Dec. 15 (AP)—The state tax commission announced yesterday the rate at which cars will be taxed for 1956.

Excise tax fees range from \$1.10 for a 1941 Crosley to \$128.40 for a 1956 Continental Mark II.

Automobile owners will also have to pay a 45 basic license fee, 50 cents filing fee and 10 cents special fee, or a total of \$1.05, in addition to the excise tax.

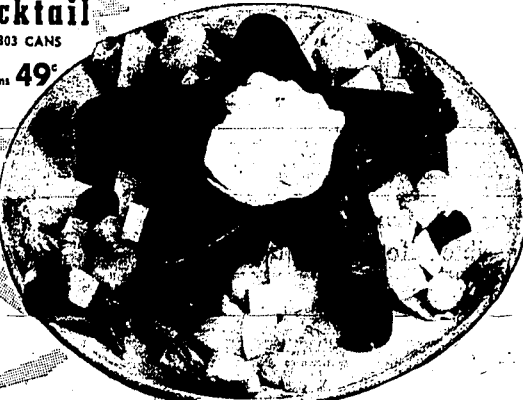

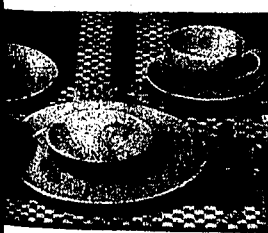

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Russia Toots Her Horn on Foreign Aids

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—The United States has a gigantic lead over Russia in providing financial help to less-developed countries.

Eighty foreign nations and dependent territories have received more than \$5 billion dollars in U. S. aid since 1945.

About 37 billion of this was in the form of economic aid. Most was given away. Loans were the exception.

A great deal of the total went to European allies, including France, Britain, Italy. But the United States also has put nearly 16 billion dollars into the Middle East and Asia areas where Russia is now centering its attentions.

The Soviet Union, so far as is known, has yet to give away its first red rubis for economic aid. Despite all the communists talk about future "aid," there is no sign yet that Moscow's purse strings will be relaxed—except for business deals.

While the reds aren't giving money away they are sending thousands of Soviet technicians to less-developed nations. Russia is training about 53,000 experts in a year, many of whom are being sent abroad.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said in Chicago on Dec. 9 that these Soviet technicians are "a symbol of promises which are alluring."

If the Soviets have given away anything, free experts believe it must have been only military goods transferred to Red China to fight the Korean war. The Chinese Reds are receiving an estimated 430 million dollars in Soviet "loans" over the 1950-1960 period. Russia has loaned \$40 million to \$50 million dollar "debts" owed by Communist Yugoslavia.

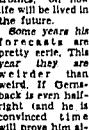

Probe Begins On GI Homes Sales Losses

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Relatively few GI home loans are gone. But in 40 per cent of recent cases in which the veterans administration has had to foreclose, the property has sold for so little to pay off the balance.

The veteran home buyers, obviously in financial hot water, have already lost their houses, then have been stuck with deficiency claims by the government averaging \$485 per loan.

Concerns Noted
House investigators who reported this today termed it a cause for "great concern," since the upset was made in a booming economy and on a rising real estate market.

Their study was made at the direction of the house veterans committee, which will consider next year whether legislation is needed to throw new safeguards around the GI loan procedure.

Reports Studied
The investigators obtained from each VA regional office reports on the 100 most recent foreclosures on homes bought by veterans with the help of government loan guarantees.

A total of \$4.64 million was lost. The study showed that in 2,275 cases the government sold each defaulted home for less than the amount owed on it, leaving the veteran in debt to the government for the amount of the deficiency.

"In some instances the regional office managed to conduct the post-foreclosure activities in a manner that on every foreclosure or default, there was a loss to the veteran," according to a statement issued by the committee.

Blame Taken
"In our estimation this is inexcusable, because we are and have been on a rising real estate market for most several years. In fact, there is little or no excuse for a deficiency claim in the case of a foreclosure."

The veterans administration had commented on the problem in 1945. However, VA in the past has pointed with pride to the low default rate on its home loans.

Such loans made so far, only 23,577 have gone sour.

For payment of World War II and Korea, VA will guarantee repayment of up to 60 per cent of a home loan, with maximum financing of \$4,000. This helps the veteran get favorable financing.

Good Samaritan Loses Other Leg

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 10.—Walter B. Adams, 26, Dallas, who lost one leg two years ago, lost his other leg last night while trying to help an accident victim.

Adams was driving in Dallas county when a car in front of him struck a horse that had wandered onto the road. The impact threw the horse over the car.

The driver, who was identified as Crumpley, 46, Dallas, did not get out of the car and appeared to be stunned by the impact.

Adams stopped and left his car to go to the aid of Crumpley. At that time a patrol car driven by Asst. H. Armet, 43, Dallas, approached and swerved to avoid hitting the horse.

Adams was taken to Parkland hospital where he underwent surgery. His condition was not reported as critical.

Crumpley incurred only minor injuries and was released from the hospital.

Landing Made

GLASGOW, Scotland, Dec. 10.—The landing gear of a British European Airways Viscount airplane collapsed on a landing approach, and the plane crashed landed on a golf course.

All 23 persons aboard escaped without injury.

Statesman at U. N. Takes Long Time to Accomplish Act

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—When the United Nations diplomats are talking about the act of statesmanship, they are usually referring to the act of statesmanship.

When the U.N. admitted 18 new members yesterday it climaxed a whole series of somersaults—going back for years—by the U.N. membership.

Take the case of Spain. Since 1945 the U. N. had approved a series of resolutions to keep Spain out of the United Nations.

Russia was just as opposed to U. N. membership for Spain. But the cold war began. The United States wanted military bases in Spain as outposts against Russian attack.

Russia, anxious to get some of her satellites into the U. N., knew she couldn't if she tried to block Spain, which now had U. S. support.

Take Outer Mongolia, which declared itself a republic in 1945 and applied for membership.

But in 1947 Mongolia and Nationalist China were fighting.

Russia warned that if her satellites were voted—a veto would keep her out of the U. N.

So it obtained from voting on the 13 non-satellites.

Records Neared
LONDON, Dec. 10.—Russia's crude steel production is expected to achieve this year's target of 42,000,000 tons, an increase of eight per cent over last year, it was predicted today.

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New Republic Is Feeling Its Growing Pain

The Republic of Indonesia is suffering severely from growing pains. This unique nation consists of more than 17,000 islands and countless islets. It stretches for 2,000 miles along the Indian ocean.

Indonesia obtained its independence from the Netherlands on Dec. 28, 1945. From the start it has been plagued by revolts. Rebels of various sorts have held large areas of it. The government is unable to control its own armed forces.

Yet Indonesia demands instantaneously that the Netherlands surrender the 160,000 square miles of West New Guinea to it.

How it could control this area if it cannot control its own territory is something of a mystery.

Restraints Forced
The army forced the resignation of Premier Ali Sukarnoprijo and the army chief of staff he appointed.

The latest development came yesterday when the army refused to accept a new deputy chief of staff appointed by Premier Sukarno.

Ali force men were drawn up at their force camp outside of Djakarta, the capital, for the installation of Air Commodore H. Soejono as deputy chief of staff.

There is more potential trouble over the issue whether Indonesia shall remain a republic or become a monarchy. The principle of separation of church and state, or shall become a strictly Moslem state.

Indonesia's 81 million people are 90 per cent Moslem. President Sukarno and former Premier Sukarnoprijo are working for the election of a constituent assembly which will make Indonesia a purely Moslem state.

Traffic Bottleneck To Be Eliminated

BOISE, Dec. 10.—The state highway department said today it plans to eliminate another traffic bottleneck on one of Idaho's main highways by calling for bids for a 1,100-foot overpass on 10th street in downtown Boise.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

When the home-taught child enters the first grade, he finds he does not understand what the teacher is trying to teach him. Mother did not do it that way, and he is confused and discouraged. "She (meaning the teacher) mixes and mingles up," better not have him mixed up and discouraged right at the start.

Better buy a good picture story book and read the little one. Buy books to suit the age of each child in the family and start them on reading for pleasure. Leave books about the room in handy places—a table near a chair, for example. Read parts of a book aloud and when the children are interested, let them go on with the story themselves.

Reading books to the children, with the children taking turns, and sharing reading experiences, will help greatly to teach children to read with enjoyment.

Reading requires books, newspapers and magazines that can be read. The papers that reach the home rarely interest the children. Buy the grown-up people claim them, and if the children get the funny sheets they are contented that they are the paper. Funny sheets entertain, but they require little reading. Good families take children's newspapers, never sever all their children's membership in a book of the month club. The supplies for the children of the ages up to adolescence. Children experience reading by independent paths.

A great deal could be done at home to give the children a taste of the best ways to make children ready for full instruction in the subject when they get to school.

This readiness is important. It implies enjoyment of stories, a habit of listening and therefore of attention. It implies reading experience and that is what makes a fine foundation for beginning to read books.

In my experience, it is better to teach reading at home. That is a technical process better left to the teacher who has been trained for the task. The school has decided on a method of teaching. The mother is free to choose anything about the method and will proceed on one path or another. She has been told about it.

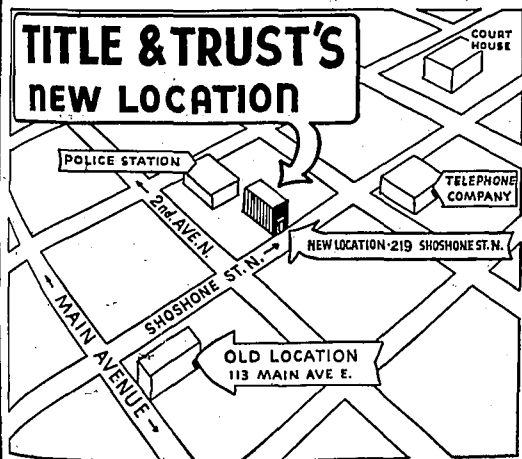

Special Buys Are Noted in Cuts of Meat

By The Associated Press
You'll find attractive buys in pork, beef, veal and lamb in many of the nation's food stores this week-end. Meat prices in general are still heading lower, and judging from the record pickup of supplies, the end is not yet. Last week production of government-inspected meat set an all-time record. All told, 27,000 tons of pork, beef and other meats were processed. Pork accounted for nearly half the total.

For the coming week-end one of the big food chains has trimmed prices of center cut pork chops in several major cities from six to 19 cents a pound.

Lamb is down from two to six cents a pound. While beef prices are going downward there are bargains aplenty in everything from hamburger and business chuck pot roasts to porterhouse steaks.

While the meat gut is good news to the bargain-conscious housewife, it's a growing problem for the farmer, the packer and the retailer. No less than 100,000 head of government-inspected hogs have been scheduled for early 1956 by the National Association of Food Chains.

Meat is to get people to eat more. The major campaign, scheduled for Jan. 28 to Feb. 4, will concern beef with pork. Others will be devoted to beef and veal calves (Jan. 9 to 18) and ham and lamb (March 22 to 31).

There is a wide assortment of bargains this week in produce. The department of agriculture has singled out potatoes, rutabaga, turnips and white turnips, beets, carrots, baby parsnips and kale as outstanding vegetable buys. Listed as good buys are cabbage, beans, peppers, corn, egg plant, celery, and lettuce.

Apples are still plentiful and reasonably priced, as are oranges, seedless grapefruit and tangerines from Florida and large red emperors grapes from the west coast.

Americans are eating less fruit than they used to. Total fresh and processed fruit consumed in the United States is about the same today as it was 10 years ago, government statisticians say, but the population has increased mightily, so per capita consumption has fallen.

While use of frozen fruits and juices has climbed sharply, this gain has been more than offset by declines for canned, dried and fresh fruits. Consumption of fresh oranges, peaches and pears is down sharply. Add to your list of fruits in plentiful supply right now: Winter pears, dates, cranberries.

Simple ABC Is Told on Lee Losing Posts in CAA, CAB

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Here is an ABC on two men named Lee who lost their jobs on the CAA and CAB.

Sound confusing? It is. Even telling the difference between CAA and CAB gets confusing. Now, with politics involved, things are worse.

One man is Josh Lee, the other is Frederick B. Lee, a Republican Democrat, lost his job when his term was up; Frederick B. Lee, a Republican, was nominated.

CAB—Civil aeronautics board—a five-man board which is the big boss of civil aviation. It sets the safety rules, investigates accidents and decides who to blame for them.

The CAA—Frederick B. Lee was administrator and boss—is part of the commerce department. This man Lee is answerable directly to Secretary of Commerce Weeks.

Josh Lee, former Oklahoma senator, was appointed to two six-year terms on the five-man CAB by fellow Democrat, President Roosevelt and Truman, in 1943 and in 1949. His second term ends Dec. 31.

President Eisenhower could have reappointed him but announced Dec. 8 he would replace Josh Lee with another Democrat, G. Joseph Minetti, of New York.

This might not have attracted much attention if Frederick B. Lee had not bounced into the news about the same time: Republican Secretary Weeks forced Lee, a Vermont Republican, to resign as boss of CAA. A job Eisenhower gave him in 1954. On Dec. 10 Eisenhower announced he would be replaced by another Republican, Charles J. Lowen, Jr., Denver. The Democrats jumped on this, not so much on the exit of Demo-

cratic Josh Lee as on the firing of Republican Frederick B. Lee, but linked the two departures.

In a letter sent with his resignation to Eisenhower, F. B. Lee said Secretary Weeks told him they weren't getting along satisfactorily.

But, Lee informed newsmen, Weeks had never told him what was wrong. Then Weeks' undersecretary of commerce, Louis S. Rothchild, said Lee was asked to quit because of an accumulation of stresses detrimental to the sound development of civil aviation.

Up stepped a spokesman for the Democrats, Senator Monroney of Oklahoma, chairman of the senate's subcommittee on aviation. He said his group would investigate the whole thing in January.

Monroney said Frederick B. Lee had been let out because he didn't "knuckle up" to Weeks and

Rothchild so they could be the big boss of aviation. He said Frederick B. Lee favored a big federal aid program to help build more airports while Weeks and Rothchild wanted a "railroad-slanted transportation policy."

Monroney said Minetti, picked by the Republicans to succeed Josh Lee on the CAB, although a Democrat, was a "buddy" of Rothchild.

The sacking of Frederick B. Lee from the CAA, Monroney said, "is all part of a pattern which included the blocking of the reappointment of Josh Lee (to the CAB)."

Roas Hittler, Republican and chairman of the CAB) is soon to be appointed a federal judge. And Weeks will have another position to fill in his grab for control of aviation."

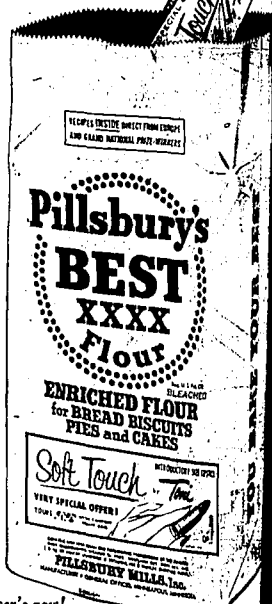

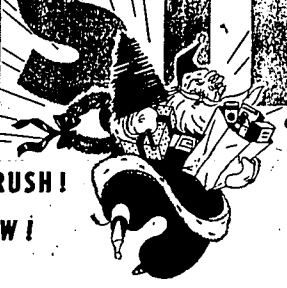

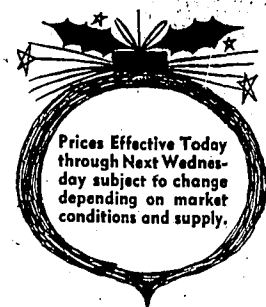
