Bitterest Cold Wave Numbs West Regions

The bitterest cold wave of the season has hit the Pacific Northwest to the southern States seaboard today.

Independence Is Slated for Sudan

KHARTOUM, Sudan, Dec. 16 (AP)—Prime Minister Ismail el Ashari told parliament yesterday he intends to announce Sudan's independence on Monday after 56 years of British-Egyptian rule.

The 1,500,000-square-mile Sudan, reaching from the southern Egyptian border nearly to the equator, has a population of about one million.

El Ashari's statement apparently cut across a British-Egyptian agreement that the Sudan's future should be put to a vote of the Sudanese people on the rival issues of independence or merger with Egypt.

Further Drop Seen In Farmer Incomes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—If Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson's prediction is correct, net farm income in 1956 will be about \$10,200,000,000, or 10 percent less than 1955 and \$1,600,000,000 less than 1954.

A net farm income of \$10,200,000,000 would mean a drop of almost 14 percent in two years.

This year's estimated farm income of \$10,600,000,000, already has Republican politicians worried in advance of next year's presidential campaign. The predicted further drop of about 40 percent—although much smaller than the 50 percent drop would add to their misery as well as hurt the farmer.

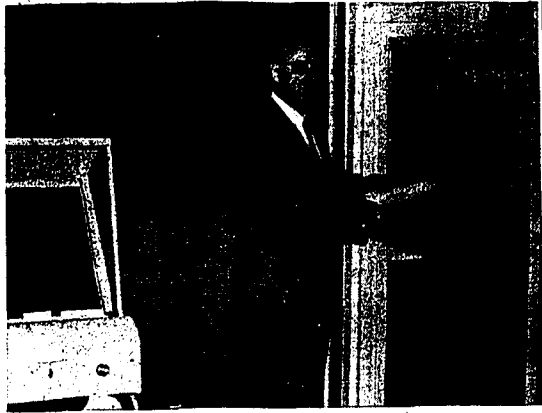

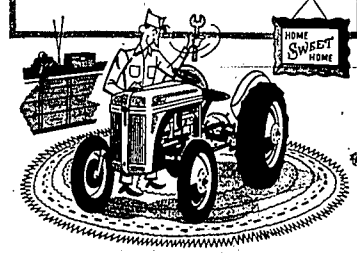

Welker Plans New Steps on Support Bill

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—Herman Welker, R. Ia., said yesterday he will submit an amendment to the price support act which would make it possible for outright payment of surplus grain and corn to distressed areas.

Welker also said he would continue his fight for higher crop prices by urging all possible aid on a bill to amend and extend the Sugar Act of 1942.

The senator's office said Welker submitted the price support amendment plan to Secretary of Agriculture Benson Thursday morning and that Benson said he may like to have it included in the President's message to congress.

"It is deplorable that under the present law governing the surplus-grain," Welker said after his talk with Benson, "grain and corn cannot be diverted for feed and livestock unless it is found to be deteriorating. The law states that the grain must be of a quality fit for people for less than 100 per cent of the support price."

"In view of the severe winter and the feeding problem faced by the farmers in my state, I consider it an emergency of the highest order that an amendment to the present act, providing an absolute necessity and possibly one of the best orders of business when congress convenes," he said.

Welker also said he has asked Sen. Harry S. Byrd, chairman of the senate finance committee, to act speedily on H.R. 7020 to amend and extend the Sugar Act of 1942.

Group Seeks New Data on Atom Energy

CLEVELAND, Dec. 10 (AP)—Senator Anderson, D., N.C., chairman of the joint congressional atomic committee, last night announced broad plans to get more information on present and potential peacetime uses of nuclear energy "out into the open."

He did so in a speech in which he also laid out a "clearance" requirements of the atomic energy commission controlling access to confidential or secret information of potential value in peacetime applications.

"It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than it is for a businessman to receive frank and complete and unfettered answers from the atomic energy commission," he declared in a speech at the Nuclear Science and Engineering congress.

He said his committee hoped—with the aid of public hearings—to do the following during the early part of the next session of congress:

1. Appraise the present and future impact of peaceful atomic applications on the American way of life, economy, industry, and natural resources, including the effect on employment.
2. Consider the impact of the atom on economic and industry abroad "as it will affect economy and industry here at home."
3. Study "atomic activities" of the AEC "in its role of developing and regulating the peaceful uses of atomic energy."

Aly Khan Enters Hospital in Paris

PARIS, Dec. 10 (AP)—Prince Aly Khan was operated on yesterday at the American hospital in Paris. He had been in the hospital since he was taken to Paris after he was "doing so well." But they refused to describe the reported operation.

A hospital official said "an acute attack of influenza" had been the cause of his illness.

Board Awards Six Contracts On Road Jobs

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—The state highway board held routine sessions during its afternoon session on the first day of its regular December meeting yesterday.

During the morning meeting the board awarded six contracts for the construction of a road and 26-foot bridge on state highway 44 between Star and Middleton, extending 20 miles on a route between Polk and Zonia, and a roadway and railroad underpass on five miles of U. S. 22 between Rogerson and Point Rich.

The group is scheduled to meet again Friday.

Unified Air Raid Warning System for Europe to Be Installed; U.S. Is to Pay

PARIS, Dec. 10 (AP)—Western statesmen decided Thursday to construct a unified air raid warning system from Norway across Europe to Turkey, backed by a new jamming communications net.

The United States will pay for the beginning of this installation.

The foreign, finance and defense ministers of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) took this step on an urgent report from U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles that the Soviet Union had reopened the cold war.

NATO's own military planners backed Dulles' warning that the Russian military threat is greater now than ever before. The Soviet Union has opened a "bombardment" of blasting any part of the NATO area with tremendous nuclear explosions.

Proposals submitted in person by Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, supreme allied commander in Europe, for a more efficient coordination of air defenses as a step toward their eventual integration were accepted, promptly by the NATO ministers.

The Gruenther program will lump the various national air defense forces into a single command, to be built at the estimated cost of 15 million pounds, roughly 42 million dollars, will utilize a new American invention, it is called the "willow" system.

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson, on behalf of the U. S. government, offered in finance the construction of three pilot lines — an offer which the NATO ministers immediately accepted. One link will be the shorter span on Norway. The others will link SHAPE with Naples, and Naples with the allied base in Izmir, Turkey.

Kenneth Bean Ahrenkiel was arrested a week ago after a pathological report confirmed the lot. Steve Lantz Buckley had died as a result of head injuries.

Ahrenkiel told Judge Gilbert Norton in seventh district court he struck the infant at least three times with his hand while attempting to discipline him.

Crazed Youth Who Killed 3 Shot by Posse

VANDERGRIFT, Pa., Dec. 16 (AP)—love-crazed teenager who had wounded a girl who refused to date him and killed her parents and uncle was hunted down, shot and killed yesterday by a posse of 20 police and volunteers.

John Pallone, 17, died last night in a fatal bullet wound inflicted by the posse's blazing rifle.

Pallone wounded policeman Gus Zanone of Apollo, Pa., a member of the posse and fifth person to fall before the boy's blazing rifle.

Zanone was admitted to Armstrong County Memorial hospital with wounds above the left eye. His condition was reported as good. The girl, Gladys Small, 15, was a patient in the same hospital with a bullet wound of the chest. Her condition was critical.

Members of the posse closed in on Pallone's father-like refuge some 20 minutes after Zanone was shot. They found Pallone crouching in the snow behind a tree stump on a hill overlooking Baker's Hollow. Blood from a bullet wound was staining his red hair.

They then took him to the hospital, where the first report of his condition was "critical." Surgeons undertook an emergency brain operation.

His father's nerve outbreak began Wednesday night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. Warren Small near this rural community 20 miles northeast of Pittsburgh.

Gladys recalled that she had been called to the home of her father. "Wouldn't let me talk to other boys," "My parents finally forbade me to see them," he threatened. "I said 'I'll get all of you some day,'" he related.

They came to the house Wednesday evening.

Terrorists family

Armed in the rifle, he was so dynamic, the girl boy tormented the family, shot the girl and killed her. The mother, Mrs. J. Warren Small, and younger children cried in fear. As she watched outside Pallone saw Small's brother, Ernest, 49, 24, return to the house with rifle and shot him down in the yard.

The pallone fled, and the manhunt was on. Officers continued the search and patrolled roadblocks throughout the night despite near zero temperatures and intermittent snow.

Early yesterday morning they found evidence Pallone had been holed up in an abandoned house about midway of the 2-mile trip from the Small home to the house where Pallone lived with his parents. His father, Ernest, 49, is a mill worker.

Tracked to Snow

From the abandoned house, police tracked Pallone for about three hours, following his footprints in the snow.

"About 11:10 or 11:30 a.m. he fired at us," said State Police Sgt. Merle Polakoff, leader of the posse.

"That was the first we knew where he was," he said. "He fired himself back a big stump and a fallen tree."

Zanone hit a few minutes later and taken to the hospital.

Ranger at Ketchum Promoted To Staff of Sawtooth Forest

George W. Carlson, forest ranger in Ketchum, has been transferred and promoted to the staff of Sawtooth national forest headquarters, Twin Falls, according to Charles I. Daugherty, supervisor.

Born in Eaton, Colo., Carlson received his degree in forestry from Colorado State college, Fort Collins, in 1914. Immediately following graduation he served three years in the 10th mountain division, rifle artillery.

He began his career with the forest service in 1923 as a seasonal worker. Returning from the armed services in 1940, he received an appointment to the staff of Sawtooth national forest, Wyoming. He made watershed surveys for the intermountain forest and range experiment station in Ogden and served as assistant ranger on the Cache and Snake National forests before being promoted to forest ranger in Italy in June, 1932. He was transferred to his position in Ketchum about six months ago.

Carlson is a member of the Ketchum-Saw Valley Rotary club, active in the Baptist church and is currently governor of area three for Troutwater International.

Carlson expects to move his family to Twin Falls shortly after Jan. 1.

Storms Rage Off England; 7 Lives Lost

LONDON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Storms raging over the North sea took seven lives yesterday and four fishermen were reported missing.

The British Air Force's helicopter crashed into the 117-foot Bell Rock lighthouse off Scotland's west coast last night. Both crewmen were killed. Further north, in the Moray firth, a gale blew the 150-ton Bell Rock pier into the sea. Five of the crew were rescued, another was drowned and two were missing.

The French fishing boat Andre-Guillaume was missing in a storm yesterday. The bodies of two fishermen were recovered from the sea but two others were missing.

The winter's worst snowstorm swept Denmark, stranding hundreds of cars and delaying mail, sea and air traffic. Two fishermen drowned at Skagen, Jutland.

Water Power Development Cost Is Told

HONOLULU, Dec. 16 (AP)—Secretary of Interior McKay estimated yesterday a three billion dollar outlay in the next 10 years was needed for water power development in the Pacific northwest.

The valuing cabinet official told the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce, however, that the need could be met only by "partnership" between the federal government and local groups—both public and private.

"In the past 10 years," he said, "Congress has appropriated only about half as much as will be needed in the future. And the outlook in congress is certainly not favorable to the great increase in appropriations which would be necessary."

McKay said the problems of future water power developments are so great in the United States that "they must be approached on a cooperative basis"—adding:

"The issue is not, as you may have heard, public versus private power." McKay said that "fortunately, the forward-looking partnership program has won widespread support and we can expect joint strides to be made in partnership development in the northwest in the critical period that lies ahead."

McKay denied frequent Democratic charges that his department is engaged in a "give-away" program. "I can tell you flatly," he said, "that we have not given anything away. There have been accusations that we are giving away park lands and wildlife refuges with both hands."

He said 400,000 acres had been added to the park system and 70,000 acres to wildlife refuges since 1933.

Lausche, Will Not Get Vote From Labor

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Ohio's Gov. Frank J. Lausche will have labor trouble if he is serious about seeking next year's Democratic presidential nomination.

Labor leaders blame the governor for at least two unfavorable sins. If he actually goes for the nomination, they will get a long-sought change to cut him down to size.

Lausche announced this week that he would enter Ohio's presidential primary as a favorite son candidate. That should show all other Democratic hopefuls in the state. Labor cannot lick Lausche on his home grounds. He's been elected governor five times by now, never with more than grudging labor admission that he might do it and more often without even that.

There are Democrats who argue that Lausche is no Democrat, a disguised Republican. There are even more Ohio labor leaders who will insist now that the governor is no pal of the unions. Lausche, nevertheless, has been unbeatable in Ohio. It is considerably more than likely that Lausche will win the Ohio presidential primary.

In other states it could be another story. Lausche would not offend labor leaders if he dared cross the Ohio frontier to enter the White House. But it is not in state presidential primaries that the giant CIO, likely to be elected, and the Railway Brotherhoods, will expect to repay Lausche for past misdeeds.

Organized labor would expect to stop Lausche in the Democratic caucus and on the floor of next year's Democratic national convention. The unions have a long record of having vetoed Democratic candidates before this and the odds that he will be able to repeat his record are 100-to-1 or longer. All of this may be why Lausche hesitates to enter primaries in states where he is underlined in rainbow ink and tagged unfavorable. No. 1 was not invited. LONDON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Hugh Gallwey, the new leader of the British Labor party and a potential prime minister, said today the West ought to counter communism more vigorously and "blow our own trumpets a bit."

The right-wing Socialist who succeeded Clement Attlee two days ago as Labor party leader summed up two globally-important beliefs of his political policy in an exclusive interview at his red brick home in Hampstead:

1. Now that the Geneva spirit has "evaporated" the West ought to give another more vigorous and constructive reply to such Communist propaganda as the Khrushchev-Bulgaria speech in India.

2. British relations with the United States must be kept "close and cordial."

In addition, he said he believes it would be a "great pity" for the West to let the Russians get away with their offer to discuss banning hydrogen bomb tests "without taking it up."

"I certainly would like to see the British government taking the initiative," he said of Russia's claim that they stand ready to discuss banning Soviet, American and British nuclear tests.

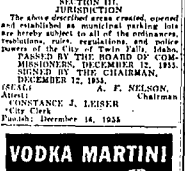

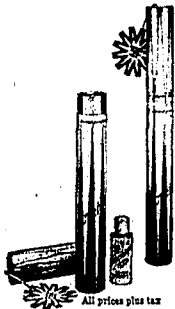
