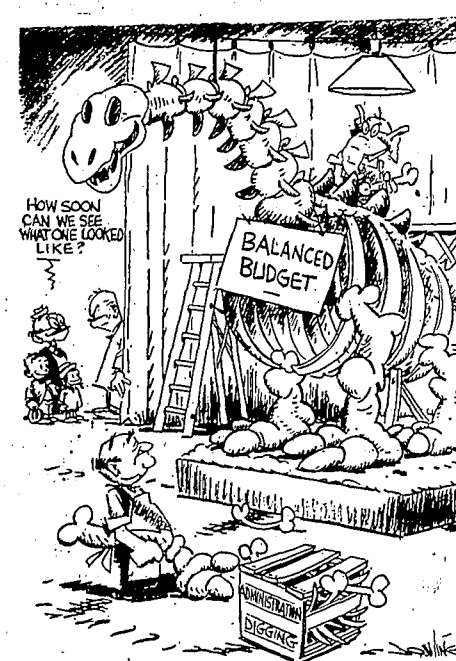

Congress Asked for "Relief" From Presidential News Ban

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Society of Newspaper Editors has called upon congress for "relief" from executive orders which deny government information to congress, the public and the press.

"Never before in our national history has presidential power been asserted in terms so all-embracing," Gross said in a statement filed with a House subcommittee investigating alleged suppression of information.

"Congress is the primary source of relief," Gross said. "The power of congress, if it will but act, is enough to legislate freedom of information for itself, the public and the press."

"Its power, like those of the President, are not unlimited, but they are extensive. They are largely untraced. Their operation is in terms of responsibilities and duties."

Gross, freedom of information counsel for ADVE, listed some 100 documents used to assert presidential authority to deny information.

"Incredible as it may seem," he said, "one of them, a letter of August 3, 1948, purporting to be from the President, is cited to bar information from congress on the strength of statements made by President Truman at his 'press conference' that date."

Gross outlined specific steps congress should take to break down the barriers to a free flow of public information from federal officials. He said his recommendations were his own and not necessarily those of ADVE.

He said congress should repeal parts of two so-called "housekeeping" laws which he declared contain such "loose and vague" language that officials use them to bar instead of release information as intended.

Gross said loosely-worded laws and lack of any law in some cases freed the issue of information "a matter of grace, indulgence or unrestricted discretion."

"Congress, the people and press are reduced to the status of silent men and supplicants for the favor of their public servants," he asserted.

He said this situation should be rectified by "an objective judicial discretion 'whereunder denials of freedom of information may be made by the mere process of law."

The so-called "custody statute" provides that "the head of each department is authorized to prescribe regulations not inconsistent with law for . . . the custody, use and preservation of the records, papers and property appertaining to it," Gross noted.

U. S. Settles 7-Year Claim Against Firm

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—A \$2,974,000 federal settlement was announced today against the bankrupt Tucker Automobile corporation for plant rental payments not settled after seven years yesterday for \$2,275,000.

The settlement was approved by Federal Judge Milton L. Tappan, who provides for the government to keep a check for \$1,275,000 put up as earnest money by Preston Tucker, who was granted an option to purchase the plant owned by the government. The remaining \$1,700,000 is to be paid when money is available.

Tucker's firm occupied the plant here which now is used by the Ford aircraft engine division when he envisioned production of a rear engine dream car. The plant was acquired by the War Planta corporation. In 1948 bankruptcy proceedings started against Tucker to collect the rent.

The settlement makes no provision for paying \$2,000,000 in claims of dealers who had hoped to sell Tucker cars to suppliers who were owed \$10,000,000 in stockholders, according to Norman Nachman, attorney for the bankruptcy trustee.

Tucker corporation's only asset now is a wholly owned subsidiary, Air-Cooled Motors, Syracuse, N. Y. The firm makes helicopters for the government. Liquidation of the firm is under government approval and Nachman said assets unlikened. The firm has total assets estimated at nearly \$5,000,000.

U.S. Compiles Data on Reds' Cruel Tactics

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—The state department is compiling a "white paper" of cruel and inhuman treatment which Chinese Communists have inflicted on the hands of the Chinese people.

Officials reported this as the state department Friday night disclosed that U. S. Ambassador to Peking, James H. Doolittle, has written to Red Chinese envoy Wang Ping-nan at Geneva against such treatment of Americans in China.

The U. S. officials indicated that Johnson's protest so far as they know has brought no change in the treatment.

The state department also announced that Johnson has repeatedly protested to Wang against the failure of the Reds to permit U. S. citizens to leave China in accordance with the Johnson-Wang agreement announced last Sept. 10.

There are 14 Americans still held in Chinese Communist prisons. Beginning last Sept. 8, 27 Americans have been permitted to leave China but the United States contends that this partial release is not enough and that the 14 should also have been allowed to come home long since.

Officials declined to give any details of the "cruel and inhuman treatment" with which they charge the Reds.

They said full information would be disclosed when the state department's report is published as an official document, commonly known as a "white paper."

PARIS, Dec. 11 (AP)—Salvador Dali drove to Sorbonne university Friday night in a black and white Rolls Royce limousine filled to the roof with fresh cauliflower.

Then he delivered a lecture which touched on rhinoceros horns, sunflowers and cauliflower.

The talk sponsored by the International Center of Catholic Research, was attended by about 1,000 noisy students, two score photographers and a sprinkling of figures from the capital's intellectual and society circles. The object of his lecture, the unorthodox Spanish painter said, was to present a "difficult case"—now he painted rhinoceros horns, then sunflowers, then cauliflower.

When copying the Louvre museum's 17th century masterpiece, "The Lacesmaker," by Dutch artist Jan Vermeer de Delft.

Dali, his moustache twitching, said the story went back to his ninth year in the Spanish town of Figueras. His father had a reproduction of Vermeer's painting in his study.

One day Dali felt an "excruciating" pain in his elbow. The pain, he said, came from bread crumbs from which his arm was resting. The bread, he said, had fallen into the hand of the lacesmaker. At about the same time Dali painted the remains of a rhinoceros horn walking stick, which he said, led "with little surprise" to his painting rhinoceros horns when copying the "Lacesmaker."

The resulting curves, he said, caused him to switch his copy job to sunflowers, now he's considering cauliflower.

Confirmation was made by Dr. Elizabeth Roemer who conducted her research at the Lick observatory on the Berkeley campus here. It was a requirement for her PhD degree.

An intensive study of some 1,200 spectrographic plates that have been taken at Lick since 1896 resulted in her findings. The spectrograms revealed shifts in the spectrum of light emitted by the star and permitted measurement of its velocity around its radius. From these measurements, Dr. Roemer was able to deduce the existence of the invisible partner.

With this confirmation, astronomers now know that the North Star actually is a system of three stellar bodies, only one of which can be seen by the unaided eye. The second can be seen through a telescope, but the hitherto unproven third probably never will be seen. It is far too faint and too close to the great, white super giant, Polaris, as the North Star is known.

Dr. J. H. Moore, former director of Lick observatory, first proposed the possibility of the invisible companion member in the Polaris system in 1929. The North Star, chosen as the first star because of its brilliant variance over a period of about four days, was studied. Dr. Moore found the shifts in apparent velocity over the four-day period were not repeated exactly in the subsequent periods. He could account for this only by attributing it to the existence of another star which meant another stellar body.

Used Same Instrument
Dr. Roemer's findings were made possible by the fact that she used the same instrument employed at the observatory for the past 60 years for spectrographic observations. Dr. Moore had found that the shifts in the four-day cycle repeated themselves in some 30 years for a "long period" variation. Dr. Roemer's research, following her predecessor's by about 30 years, gave confirmation to his speculation.

Because of this confirmation, the North Star system is now considered for the first time. It is a dwarf star just a little hotter than our sun, and the brightness of Polaris as measured at Lick confirms recent findings that indicate the universe actually is twice as large as astronomers once thought it to be.

Speeders Face Speedy Action by T. F. Police as Radar System Opening Nears

Speeders face speedy action by Twin Falls police as the radar system opening nears. The new \$1,400 radar unit will give accurately and instantly the officer operating the machine the correct speed. It will clock anything from a pedestrian to a car traveling 100 miles an hour.

Traffic Sgt. Frank Barnett found on a recent check that the invisible beam picked up a man walking and clocked him at four miles an hour. The machine has been given tests both day and night. One test was made of a boy on a bicycle.

The unit may be used while installed in a police patrol car or may be set up on the ground. The complete unit is made up of a recorder, radar meter unit, tripod and battery. A rack has been constructed for installing the machine in a car.

The machine is operated by one man. He obtains three records of a vehicle's speed. One is on the speed meter, similar to a speedometer on a car; another on a chart and third on a small scale above the recording needle.

Navy to Speed Plans on Atom Engine Plane

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The navy disclosed today it has stepped up its program to develop an atomic-powered seaplane that could fly non-stop around the world.

The navy said it has awarded contracts to five firms to study the problems of an atomic power plant for a seaplane. The contracts are preliminary to actual development of an atomic reactor which would give a seaplane virtually unlimited range at speeds in excess of 600 miles an hour.

Contracts Let

The contracts were let recently to Allison division of General Motors corporation and Nuclear Development corporation of America, White Plains, N. Y., the navy said. The aircraft gas turbine division of General Electric company and the Curtis-Wright corporation are conducting similar studies under contracts placed for the navy by the air force.

A fifth contract was let to the air research division of Garrett corporation, Los Angeles, Calif., to study an atomic plane's auxiliary systems such as heat, pressure and electricity.

The navy already had let two high priority contracts to Glenn L. Martin company of Baltimore, Md., and the Convair division of General Dynamics corporation for development of an air frame of an atomic-powered seaplane.

Developed Seaplaner

Martin developed the Seaplaner, a radical new multi-jet seaplane which the navy believes will serve as a prototype of an atomic seaplane. The first Seaplaner exploded and crashed on a test flight last week, but the navy is pressing ahead the production of more of them.

The new contracts show that the navy is stepping up its efforts in the race to develop an atomic plane. Previously the atomic plane project has been handled primarily by the air force and the atomic energy commission, with the navy to the role of a cooperating participant.

Naval officials have predicted publicly that the seaplane is likely to become the first atomic-powered plane. Air force officials have conceded that the seaplane is a logical vehicle for atomic power.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 17 (AP)—Senator Kefauver, D., Tenn., said Saturday he would not accept his party's vice presidential nomination under Adlai Stevenson or any one else.

Kefauver, who announced Friday that he was a candidate for the presidential nomination, told newspapermen:

"I've made up my mind that I want to be president and I won't accept an alternative. If I won't be successful in getting the nomination, I want to go back to the senate."

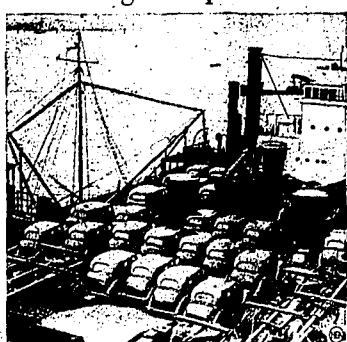

Mystery-Man Eden Is Facing Immense Domestic Problems

LONDON (NEA)—Britons have yet to see Sir Anthony Eden in action, while making more workers available by eliminating some existing jobs.

But no government has had the courage to attempt the public this bitter pill, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rab Butler has tried to curb consumer spending by tightening up on bank credits and toughening up on installment buying.

But he may have to increase purchase taxes and introduce a comprehensive sales tax along American lines before he is through. These measures are bound to be unpopular.

Rather belatedly, Sir Anthony Eden has begun to take the people into his confidence, when they "are trying to do too many things at once."

Some of the things: New houses, new schools and super-highways; electrifying the railways; developing nuclear power; maintaining her armed forces and armaments with the most modern weapons.

At the same time Britain is aiming at a high level of exports, a high level of capital investment and a high standard of living.

Something will have to give. So far the Eden government has avoided a system of priorities; but soon, in consultation with labor and management, it will have to decide which things come first.

The problem facing Sir Anthony Eden is as much psychological as it is economic. He must overcome the nation's fears, as well as restore its confidence in the future.

For the past 145 years Britain has been engaged in a far-reaching social experiment. A country impoverished by two world wars and greatly handicapped in competition with the new giant powers, she has been trying to set new standards of social security and of full employment.

"We now know that the Communists are so far ahead of us in strength on the ground and under the sea that it would be very difficult to defend ourselves, for us to catch up."

"So our only chance for adequate defense lies on top of the seas—and above all, in the air."

Extreme Care Urged for Yule Trees, Decorations in Homes

Extreme care in keeping Christmas trees away from heating systems, portable heaters and open flames should be used by all homeowners, Fire Chief L. Z. Bartlett warned Saturday.

The pitch-and-lead-filled trees are ignited easily and burn furiously, he noted. The month of December always brings a sharp increase in fires, most of them caused by neglectful placing of trees, he said.

Bartlett said that the fire department offers several precautionary measures. He urged people to select a small tree and store it outside until a day or two before Christmas.

When it is brought in, stand it up away from heat and do not let it block an exit. Be sure that electrical decorations are in good condition and when purchasing new light cords look for the Underwriters Laboratory seal on the cord.

Provide a switch some distance from the tree to turn lights on and off and decorate only with fireproof ornaments.

He said electric trains should never be set up under a tree which should be wrapped in flame-retardant material. Homeowners should quickly lay out the tree and decorations before the fire starts to burn.

Solon Sticks To Belief on Cut for Debt

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Representative Mills, D. Ark., said Saturday his still-ended public hearings on tax policy have convinced him to a right in the administration of the national debt before income taxes are cut.

Mills is an influential member of the tax-writing house ways and means committee, heads a Senate Finance subcommittee on tax policy which Friday wound up two weeks of hearings. He said the subcommittee is scheduled to play announced in early January.

Emphasizing that he spoke as an individual and not for the subcommittee, Mills said he has no prospect for any "net reduction" in federal taxes in the current fiscal year. He will not vote on the bill.

"I am not going to close the door to the possibility of a tax reduction in fiscal 1957 (the year ending July 1)," he said, but emphasized that if an anticipated treasury surplus actually is realized, that date part of it should be earmarked for debt reduction.

"The reduction of the national debt in times of peace and prosperity should have priority," he said.

"That may not be good politics, but I think it is good judgment to tell the public that it is making itself sick on too much inflation."

Coast Valley Cleans up in Quake Series

BRAWLEY, Calif., Dec. 17 (AP)—Imperial valley residents, cleaning up after the most damaging series of earthquakes here in 15 years, learned Saturday the shocks may continue for several days.

More than 70 small to moderately strong quakes have been felt since the first one at 7:54 p.m. Friday. The heaviest shock, at 10:18 p.m., reached a magnitude of 5.3. The strongest ever recorded anywhere was 6.6.

No One Hurt No injuries have been reported but residents of valley towns said they were developing "quake legs."

Seismologist Charles F. Richter of the California Institute of Technology said nine of the tremors were of magnitude 4 or over and 30 of them were 2.5 or more.

The quakes could continue for days, he said. In 1952, he added, damaging shocks occurred on three successive days in the desert valley, mostly between 8 or over and 10 or over.

Brawley, with 12,000 population, was the hardest hit, with plate glass windows shattered in at least 20 stores, walls and plaster cracked and furniture tipped. A large amount of merchandise dumped from shelves and tables.

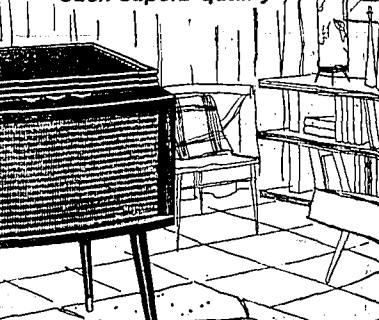

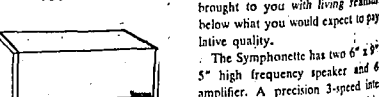

HAGERMAN, Dec. 17 — "Peace-time Atomic Energy" was discussed by Earl Haroldson, Twin Falls, guest speaker at the annual Masons Order of Eastern Star banquet Thursday evening in the Methodist church.

Haroldson gave a short history of the development of theories concerning atomic energy, a resume of the advancements made upon the problem, and some details of the methods being used for peaceful development. He stressed the use of atomic energy to light a city, made at Arco last July, the first time in history.

The atomic commission and private industry, he stated, are working together to bring about uses for generating power. Ten per cent of steam plants built by 1965, he predicted, will be operated by atomic energy.

The speaker enumerated the tech- nological problems facing the scientists. Among the major prob- lems, he said, are the materials necessary to build reactors, the disposal of the highly radioactive waste materials and protection of person- nel. Among the economic problems

U. S. to Carry On Talks With Chinese Reds

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—The United States will continue its Geneva talks with Red China until all American civilians still held in China are freed.

It will do so despite its accusation that the communists have broken their word on freeing the remaining Americans they still hold.

The accusation was made last night in a formal government statement which charged the Chinese with violating their September agreement to free all American civilians "expeditiously."

The statement was America's answer to a Communist Chinese charge that it in the United States has violated the agreement.

Despite the bitter exchange, officials said, the United States is not planning to break off the Geneva negotiations with Red China. They said the United States thinks the talks may yet be valuable in winning release of the remaining American civilians in China and in getting Red China to renounce use of force to settle territorial disputes.

In this statement the state department said Communist China still holds 14 American civilians until it agreed to release the U. S. citizens expeditiously last Sept. 10.

Slight Increase Reported for Idaho's Farm Income in 1950

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (Special)—Idaho was one of only three western states whose farm marketing receipts increased in 1950 over 1949.

A check of department of agriculture reports for the first three quarters of this year shows Idaho farmers took in 250.7 million dollars at farm marketing.

This is an increase of 39 per cent over the same period last year, when receipts were 248.4 million dollars.

Only other gainers in the 11-state western region were Oregon (12 per cent) and California (11.8 per cent).

All other western states registered losses for the same periods, with Arizona worst-hit by a 17 per cent reduction.

Here are the percentage declines in the other western states: Montana 7 per cent; Wyoming 18 per cent; Colorado 18.8 per cent; New Mexico 8.6 per cent; Utah 7 per cent; Nevada 6 per cent; Washington 14 per cent in farm marketing, cash receipts, while the rest of the country registered state-by-state drops which ranged from Oklahoma's 18 per cent plus to North Carolina's 0.1 per cent.

Decoy Hearse Fools British

NICOBIA, Cyprus, Dec. 11.—Cyprus used a decoy hearse Saturday to hoodwink British troops and police on the alert for demonstrations at the funeral of a slain leader in the guerrilla campaign for union with Greece.

The authorities had slung a bar on more than 50 meters (164 feet) the funeral procession of Harizanos Mouskas, a cousin of Archbishop Makarios. The Greek Orthodox bishop is leader of the Enosis union with Greece movement, and Mouskas was slain in the ambush of a British jeep. He had a price on his head when killed.

When the funeral cortege appeared in Nicosia's Metaxas Square, troops and police dispersed the 200 mourners with tear gas. A few minutes later, another procession of 200 mourners marched out of an underground safe of the court of a British officer, and proceeded unhindered to the cemetery.

Troops were on the alert for fear Archbishop Makarios would convert the funeral into a demonstration. The archbishop was at the funeral but did not speak.

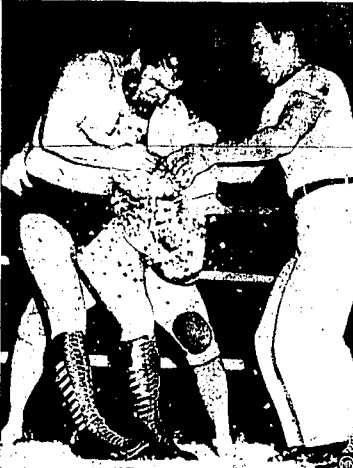

Experts Sure Auto Market Won't Waver

DETROIT, Dec. 10.—The market for new automobiles may level off somewhat in 1956 but industry analysts see no major decline, barring a severe economic jolt.

Final figures for 1955 production and retail deliveries should amount to 8,000,000 and 7,900,000, respectively. The totals for 1956 could drop a million units in each category, but the experts say the trend for the future is definitely upward.

The industry's heaviest sales total for a single month came in August, 1955, when slightly under 700,000 retail deliveries were recorded.

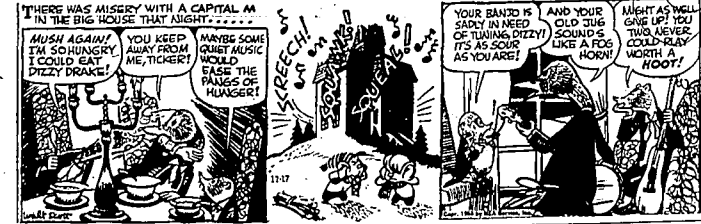
The trade paper Automotive News, commenting on what would be needed to achieve a million-sales month, says these factors will have to be combined: Even greater expansion of production capacity; an improved customer yearning for a highly desirable product; a heavy inventory at dealerships; and a full-throated sales campaign topping anything ever seen before.

The broadest styling and engineering changes reportedly are planned for the 1957 model year. They could stimulate new record highs that year after a record breathing spell during the next 12 months.

Certainly the industry is not slowing down in any of its expansion planning. From top to bottom the car makers are improving their facilities for producing motor vehicles. A substantial amount of new production capacity is scheduled to be ready during 1956. Much of it is rolled out about 3 1/2 million of the vehicles by Chevrolet and Ford, 7,700,000 cars the industry has built.

All indications are their competitive battle will be hotter than ever during the year ahead.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

In these days of atomic weapons, to say nothing of high powered rifles and hand guns, it would seem man would be satisfied with the modern inventions. Most men are, but not Ray Kestler, TWIN FALLS. Kestler is going back to the stone age. He makes arrowheads.

Kestler isn't exactly a rockhound, although he knows rocks and how to polish them. Nor is he so called "pebble puppy" for his knowledge of geology far surpasses the average amateur. But through his interest in rocks he became interested in Indian artifacts. Now Kestler duplicates the work of the stone age craftsman.

Indians in this area used obsidian as their main raw material for arrowheads, spear points and scrapers. Kestler works chiefly with obsidian, too, but he won't hesitate to make an arrowhead from any pretty piece of stone of even colored glass.

He uses the same pressure method used by the stone age Indians but works with a finer tool. As a result his arrowheads probably are "daintier" and more accurate than originals. The flakes he removes by pressure are smaller and finer point to the arrowhead than those made by the Indians.

Kestler admits Indians probably knew a lot more about the cleavage of rocks than he knows. He says they were able to remove larger flakes of rock and still produce highly accurate points.

Surprisingly, there is a market for his modern arrow points. Some hunters, for example, disdain the use of such modern weapons as guns. They prefer the long bow, and with fisher's rods and reels are able to catch a fish on anything but a fly, there are "purists" among the archers. They won't use anything but their own arrows. They want to get right back to nature and use stone points.

Then, too, Kestler's smaller points make up into excellent jewelry. A pair of identical points, one either black, obsidian or lustrous agate, can become a pair of earrings guaranteed to attract attention. Speaking of fishing, Kestler is a fisherman, too, but not a dry fly purist. During the winter months he sometimes gets pretty cold for fishing so Kestler devised a means to equip his rowboat with a heated stove for warmth. For fuel, he uses driftwood.

Most historians write only of the wild and woolly west. Joseph W. Fulder, HALLEY pioneer, complains Fulder is quick to admit saloons are a part of the picture of the west but adds just as quickly there is another side to the story.

Water Tank Readied for Arco Trip

AEC's Arco Plant Gets Huge Tank Made by Local Concern

A 30,000-gallon eight-ton water tank was rolled out of Twin Falls Thursday on a semi-trailer for delivery to the atomic energy commission at Arco. The big tank was assembled in 12 days at Self Manufacturing company, 247 Third avenue south. Two welders and a helper built the tank in a company warehouse yard. It meets specifications of the American waterworks standards as required by the AEC.

The tank is of welded construction with one-quarter steel plate used in sides and floor. It is 16 feet in diameter and is 18 feet high. A tank ladder, shell manhole, roof hatch and all necessary outlets and openings for fitting were included in the fabrication.

Air pressure tests were made here and the interior cleaned by the flame dehydrating process. The outside received three coats of paint as required by specifications. The self-supporting roof is built to withstand 25 pounds per square foot of snow load.

A Reynolds-Walker 12-ton crane was employed to load the tank on the semi-trailer. It will be installed on an asphalt saturated sand cushioned base at Arco by the Arrington Construction company.

Larry Thornock, superintendent of Self Manufacturing company, supervised construction. Because of its size it was built in the company warehouse yard.

He explained that a tank of such proportions was usually constructed on the site where it was to be used but because of climatic conditions and for economic reasons, it was built here and transported to Arco.
