Barlow Given Verdict Over Right of Way

BURLEY, Dec. 23.—A three-man commission appointed by the district court has awarded K. C. Barlow, Inc. \$4,465 for a right of way 163 rods long across land owned by the corporation for a natural gas line. The award is against the Pacific Northwest Pipeline Co., which was right of way across two pieces of land owned by the corporation. One is located one mile south of Burley and the other is two and one-half miles south of the city. The commission was appointed to study the disagreement between the pipeline company and owners of five pieces of land through which rights of way had been granted. Evidence, however, was presented only with reference to Barlow's land.

Herman Bedke, attorney for the pipeline company, said a request for a jury trial. He said the award represents a rod for the right of way and the other is a rod for the right of way. The 75 land owners who already have granted rights of way across the pipeline company's right of way have been paid a rod for the right of way plus whatever damage is done to the land.

50-50 Chance Predicted for Holiday Snow

Weather forecasters said Friday the chances now are about 50-50 for a white Christmas in much of the Magic Valley. A storm moving into the area has brought rain to much of Idaho and the weather here said the rain may turn to snow by Friday night. Colder weather also is predicted. Rainfall for the week ending Friday was high with low readings including 39 in Boise, 43 in Idaho Falls, and 46 in Pocatello. 46 in Twin Falls and 51 in Salt Lake City.

Maximum temperatures Friday were expected to be not much higher than the morning lows with minimums in the 30s. Snowfall is expected to range from 10 to 15 in both states.

Middlemen's Price Taking Probe Starts

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—The agriculture department today pressed its investigation to discover if price-fixing by middlemen may be partly the cause of plummeting farm prices.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson said he wants to know if middlemen are reselling "improper" profits at the expense of the nation's hard-pressed farmers.

Benson announced yesterday the farmer's share of the consumer food dollar declined 30 cents in November—the lowest point in 15 years.

Otto John Charges Treason

COMMERCIAL, Dec. 23 (AP)—The Idaho governor today announced charges against Otto John, his double-identity alias, and charged the state to prevent his return to Communist East Germany.

Wichmann, the West German prosecutor, said today he had received information from a source on charges of espionage with the Communist Party during his 11 months in Germany.

John was arrested because of suspicion that he had been a spy.

Paul was high official in the West German government was roughly equivalent to that of J. Edgar Hoover in the United States.

Wichmann said he sought political asylum in the United States in 1948 and was arrested 12 days later.

John said the fact that he was a spy for the Communist Party during his 11 months in Germany is not in itself evidence of treason, but is comparable to the espionage of the Soviet Union.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 23 (AP)—Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield has been told that a post office substation is urgently needed in Idaho Falls. It was reported today.

Charles R. Stark, secretary-manager of the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce, told Summerfield in a letter that the substation is needed because postal volume has increased 20 per cent over 1954, and the year's receipts will exceed \$500,000.

Summerfield had asked for an evaluation of the local postal situation.

Objection Heard On City's Budget

BALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 23 (AP)—The city commission heard several residents voice objection to the size of the city's 1956 budget, then decided to give the fiscal documents a little more study before okaying it.

Next year's proposed budget calls for an outlay of \$11,375,550—some \$181,000 higher than 1955's record budget. The meeting was a public hearing on the money appropriations.

One speaker, Dr. M. Hyrum Harris, told the commission it might find itself replaced by a city manager form of government unless "economy is the watchword."

Harris, executive secretary of the Utah Taxpayers association, urged job classification studies and an effort to combine some city operations with those of Salt Lake county as possible ways to cut down on city costs.

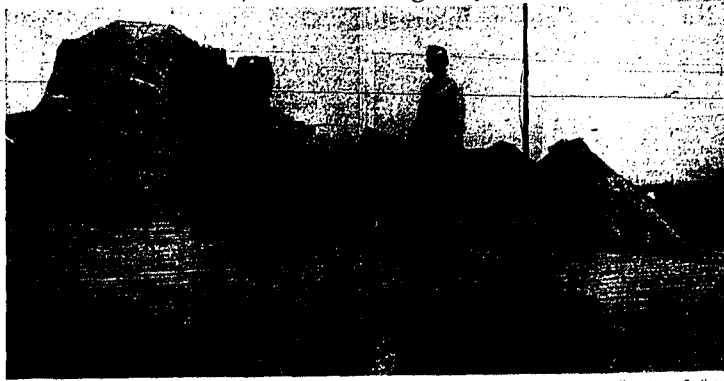

Progress Made in Big Cancer Study

Dec. 23—The big cancer study conducted by the American Cancer Society in the metropolitan area is making progress in the diagnosis of cancer, according to a report issued by the national association.

The report said there was a rise in the incidence of cancer from 1937 to 1954. It is difficult to determine how much cancer was "real."

Cases discovered by diagnostic techniques for diagnosis increased in the past "would have been" the report said. The experience of physicians with cancer has also increased.

Richfield Gets Dial Telephones



Life in MAGIC VALLEY

RICHFIELD'S switchover to dial telephones caused C. A. Johnson, Richfield pioneer, to delve into his memory and old telephone record books to produce some facts concerning the start of a telephone system in the community.

A land opening in June, 1907, by the Idaho Irrigation company, started the Richfield tract. Telephones were needed immediately to serve the construction camps while irrigation canals were being built. Lines were built in 1907 and service expanded as the need arose.

"In 1937 the Big Wood Canal company, organized by the waterusers, purchased the Richfield Public Service company for \$3,000. The year before some citizens of Richfield formed the Richfield Mutual Telephone company and filed papers in Boise on Jan. 3, 1937. Signers were First State bank, by George R. Schwager, A. L. Fletcher, R. J. Leamon and Owen Youngkin.

"The Big Wood Canal company and the newly organized telephone company entered into a contract, turning the operation of the system over to the telephone company. This contract continued to Sept. 1, 1939, when the system was turned over to Mrs. O. E. Bays for five years.

In March, 1943, they terminated their contract, turning it back to the telephone company which operated the system until March, 1948, when it was leased to Mr. and Mrs. Harvey W. Smith. CAREY, who ran it until Sept. 3, 1949.

On Oct. 1, 1949, the telephone company again took over and then leased it to Mr. and Mrs. Fred Boshear, contracting to release the system to the Boshears if certain improvements were made. Among these was the installation of a new manual switchboard, bringing modern telephones to Richfield for the first time.

Shortly after Boshear became the first private owner of the exchange he sold the system to E. L. Siegel, the present manager.

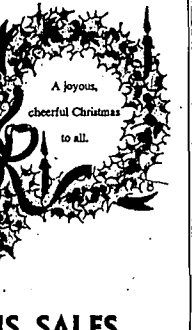

Seedings Set To Alter Big Storm's Path

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—The weather bureau plans to use dry ice seeding next year in an effort to change the path of at least one hurricane.

The experimental idea was outlined to the Washington Meteorological society by Robert Simpson, who heads a new, special hurricane study group set up to learn more about how the big storms develop and move.

If it works, the experiment could steer the hurricanes away from a populated area, or perhaps keep it entirely away from land.

Simpson said the study group has one possible method in mind, based on a close study of energy exchanges and wind movements in a hurricane.

Seeding clouds with dry ice has been used in some artificial rain making experiments. As applied to hurricanes, the idea is to set off a freezing reaction in the moisture-laden hurricane winds. It is hoped the release of heat as the moisture freezes will upset the pattern of energy which moves the storm and cause it to veer.

To date, Simpson said, studies indicate that a moving hurricane sometimes carries with it large amounts of liquid water, as distinguished from ice particles.

They indicate also, he said, that the conformation of winds around a moving hurricane changes in such a way that it may be possible to seed this atmosphere with dry ice, to get freezing of the moisture started.

Once started, the freezing should continue, and, Simpson said, if the seeding is done at the proper time, in the proper measure and place, the storm's own wind circulation should carry the reaction far and wide.

Changing of so much water to ice would release vast amounts of heat—energy—upsetting the "energy budget" or pattern of energy which moves the storm. Simpson said this would give man a way to use some of the hurricane's own energy—far more energy than man can command in any other way, even a hydrogen bomb—to change its course long enough at least to spare lives and property in its path.

Tulane Romps Past Cougars By 91-52 Count

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 23 (AP)—Tulane's Greenies look an immediate lead and padded it steadily for a 91-52 victory over the Washington State Cougars here Thursday night.

The game cost Tulane the services of leading scorer and rebounder Calvin Grayson. He injured an ankle early in the second half and was not expected to be ready the next week, Oregon boys announced at Miami Beach, Fla.

Bob Ekber, Hop Deipt and Steve Blumoff led the Greenies with 16 points each. Grayson had 14 before going out.

Washington State forward Larry Beck and Ed Steele also had 16 each. Tulane never was behind. The Greenies led 30-15 after 10 minutes and had increased their margin to 50-24 at halftime.

Washington State made just five field goals and 18 points in the second half.

Tulane hit 33 of 82 field goal attempts and 25 of 31 free throws. WEC made 20 of 58 field goals and 12 of 25 free throws.

The victory was Tulane's fourth against three losses. The loss was Washington State's sixth against a win.

Hunters Asked To Reduce Loss Of Waterfowl

BOISE, Dec. 23.—With the waterfowl season set to close Dec. 31, the Idaho fish and game department today issued an appeal to hunters to reduce the number of birds lost as unwelcome bycatch.

Lesl Mohler, chief of game management, said, "Crippling losses are a wasteful drain on the resources as well as an immediate loss to the hunter." He cited reports from several states indicating that as many as a fifth of the ducks shot down are lost as cripples.

"Conservation-minded hunters urge observance of a five-point code in this respect," he said. "Adherence of it during the holidays and asked hunters to adopt the code as a conservation measure."

The five points are:

1. Let ducks and geese come well within range before you shoot.
2. Use the correct shot size with maximum load to insure a clean kill.
3. Mark each downed bird carefully, including patches of vegetation and other landmarks as check points. Then cover immediately and look hard for it.
4. Be equipped to waste in search of your bird, or to use a boat if necessary.
5. The serious waterfowl hunter should use a goose decoy. This dog will save the hunter a lot of cold work and will leave few, if any, cripples unrecovered.

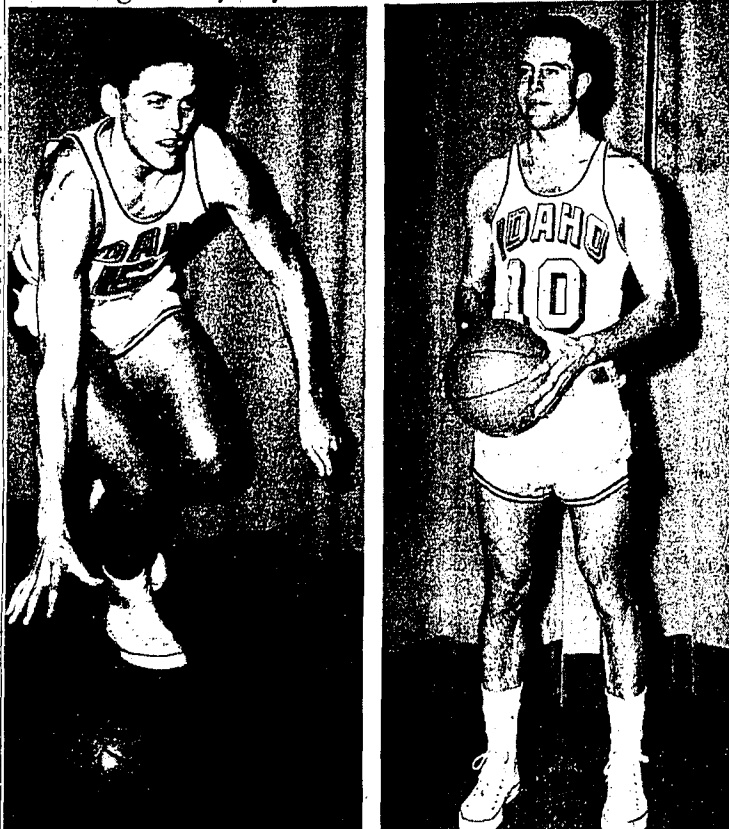

That is one of several ideas discussed at a lunch attended here this week by a group of traffic authorities and representatives of the liquor industry.

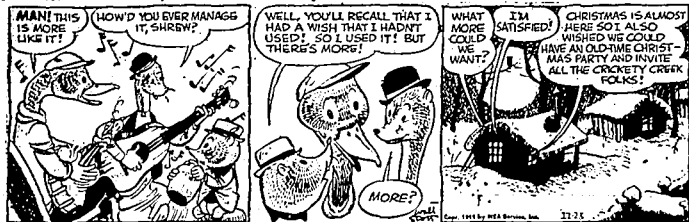

Atomic Power
Era Advances
Through Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (U.S.)—The era of atom-for-profit moved perceptibly closer in 1955, the first full year of the atom's commercial history. Though most companies figure they'll be lucky to break even on nuclear operations for the next five years or more, atomics already has become a major American industry. It now is getting multimillion-dollar infusions of private capital, and in 1956 expects a major breakthrough — private sales in foreign markets. Overseas buyers are ready and waiting, industry leaders have reported. Their orders should help sustain the industry through the lean years before atom-fueled power plants find their American "mass market" and begin to earn money. Meantime, the cost of atomic power plants is being whittled down by steady technological progress.

The most advanced designs now on the drawing boards still are at least twice as costly, per kilowatt of capacity, as coal plants. But experts say the new designs may be only about one-sixth as expensive to construct as the nation's first full-scale atomic power plant, being built jointly by the government and Duquesne Light company of Pittsburgh. It will start delivering power in 1957. The cost trend is favorable enough in any case, to have induced three private utilities to announce in 1955 that they will build new commercial reactors and finance them wholly with private funds.

Agriculture's Problems of Surpluses, Declining Prices Made Top Headlines

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—American agriculture made headlines in 1955 with its problems of mounting surpluses, record production and declining prices and incomes.

The economic situation of farmers reached a point by the end of the year that made it likely farm problems would be a major domestic issue in next year's presidential and congressional elections.

Certainly Democrats were making the most of the farm income situation in their criticism of Eisenhower administration farm program and of Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

Government figures indicated that farm prices as a whole in 1955 averaged about five per cent below those of the previous year and

about 25 per cent below the postwar, than has the average return net-peak reached in 1951. Measured in another way, the prices averaged 25 per cent of parity compared with 85 in 1954 and the record of 123 set in 1946.

The further downturn in prices was reflected in an additional decline in farm income. The agriculture department has estimated income left farmers after deduction of production costs totaled about \$10,000,000,000 compared with \$11,800,000,000 in 1954, \$12,802,000,000 and the record high of \$16,774,000,000 in 1946.

In analyzing prospects for 1956, the department said a further decline in income appeared likely. The drop in total farm income has been greater in recent years

Wheat Crops Surplus May Be Increased

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—An agriculture department production forecast indicates that farmers next year may again produce more wheat than is needed to fill market needs. This would add still more wheat to record surplus supplies.

The forecast indicated that crop of around 870 million bushels is possible next year, which would be more than 70 million bushels above prospective market requirements.

Next year's crop is the third consecutive one being grown under rigid federal planting and marketing controls. The controls were put on in an effort to curb production.

On hand at harvest time next year will be a reserve and surplus supply now estimated at 1,042,000,000 bushels—which is more than enough to meet domestic and export needs for 14 months.

The department forecast the 1956 winter wheat crop at 735,372,000 bushels compared with 702,372,000 produced this year. No forecast was made for spring wheat inasmuch as it will not be planted until next spring. But a crop comparable to this year's 232,000,000 bushels would give a total of about 967,000,000 bushels compared with 938,000,000 this year and 1,154,000,000 for the 10-year 1947-53 average.

By comparison, market requirements are not expected to exceed 800,000,000 bushels.

The acreage seeded, the percentage such seedlings represented of plantings for this year's crop, and the indicated production of winter

wheat, respectively, by major-producing states included: Montana 1,639,000; 89 and 32,351,000; Idaho 922,000; 102 and 18,646,000; Utah 231,000; 101 and 4,656,000; Washington 1,894,000; 100 and 49,244,000; Oregon 720,000; 96 and 18,000,000.

Wheat Crops Surplus May Be Increased

The continuing decline in prices and income in 1955 was attributed largely to the existence of record surpluses of farm products and to an even larger production of agricultural products than in previous years.

Surpluses stored under government price support programs approached a record high level by the end of the year, or an increase of more than three-quarters of a billion dollars. This increase would have been larger had not the government unloaded nearly a billion dollars worth at cut-rate prices or donated for welfare uses.

Farm leaders in and out of government agreed that there was little prospect for material improvement in farm prices as long as these surpluses hung over markets.

Despite use of production control measures for some major crops, farmers produced more crops and livestock products in 1955 than in any previous year. Total production was 112 per cent of the 1947-1949 base average compared with 108 per cent in 1954.

This big increase reflected agriculture's growing efficiency of production—gained through better machinery and equipment, more fertilizers, more and better insecticides, improved livestock feeding practices, and improved strains of crops.

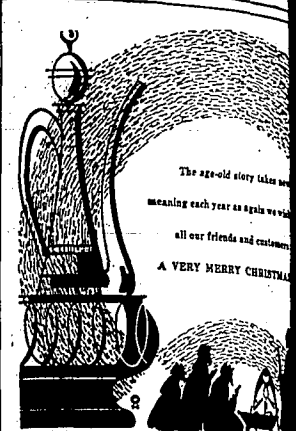
As the year drew toward a close, demands were being made by some farm leaders and some political leaders for a drastic change in the GOP farm programs. These programs feature a flexible farm price support system as distinguished from rigid, high-level supports of the preceding Democratic administration.

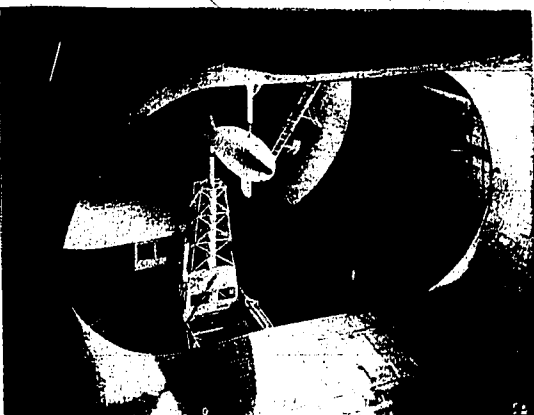

Names of the foster parents were not released by American authorities here.

Top-Drawer Assistants of Ike Consult, Agree That President May Run in 1956

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The sudden surfeit of confidence that President Eisenhower may run again should be attributed largely to a recent exchange of views among top-drawer members.

As many as a dozen persons engaged in the informal back and forth by mail, telephone and face-to-face conversations. The round robin developed several substantial points of opinion, such as:

These are some of the substantially-held opinions of some of the men who did the most to put Mr. Eisenhower in the White House and are most eager that he may be still

ing and able to seek another term. Among those who exchanged views on 1956 Republican prospects were Gen. Lucius Clay, board chairman of Continental Can company; Presidential Chief of Staff Sherman Adams; Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr.; former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Dr. Paul D. White's optimistic report last week-end on Mr. Eisenhower's present and probable future vigor gains added significance when measured against the judgment of the top-like-men as to the factors likely to govern the President's 1956 decision.

These men and the powerful political and moneyed interests they

represent are wholly committed to Mr. Eisenhower for 1956, if he will go. Privately, most or all of them say the party must have him. They would not want to be in the position, however, of dragging an alluring man.

The tie binding these men together would break with a snap heard coast-to-coast if the President pulled out. Two of the group are possible Republican presidential nominees if Mr. Eisenhower withdraws. The two are Dewey and the vice president.

Increases for Grasshopper In 1956 Seen

BOISE, Dec. 23 (AP)—Idaho's uranium prospectors are finding lots of grasshoppers even when they don't find much uranium, the University of Idaho extension service reports.

A spokesman for the service said entomologists were getting valuable information on grasshopper infestations from the uranium workers, who have to get down close to the ground with their Geiger counters.

The spokesman commented as the U. S. department of agriculture predicted there would be three times as many grasshoppers on western ranges next year as there were in 1955.

The department said infestation of 20 million acres was expected in 16 states, including Idaho and Utah. The estimate for 1955 was six million acres.

The 1956 Mormon cricket infestation was expected to be about the same as this year's, covering 100,000 acres in Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming.

The extension service spokesman said extension entomologist Roland Portman and federal entomologist Keith Evans of Twin Falls both have reliable in checking on insect infestations.

Jury Rules for Ousted Member Of Labor Union

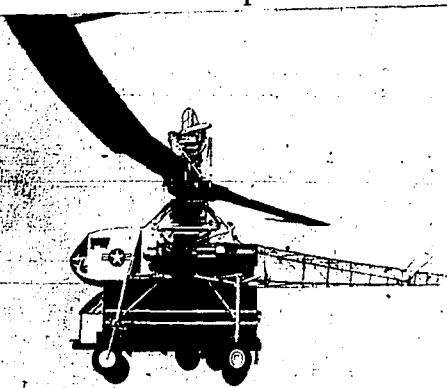

Census Tally Reveals Farm Acreage Rise

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The census bureau has said its census of agriculture discloses that farms are getting bigger and "horseless farming" is becoming common.

Nearly all farms now have electricity, the report said, and the number of farms is growing smaller.

The biggest decline in the number of farms between the census of agriculture in 1950 and the farm census in 1954 occurred in the south.

The census bureau said, and was accompanied by a decline in tenant and share farming.

The partial report on results of a seismometer is an instrument that records and measures the movements of the ground during the 1954 farm census taken in October and November of last year included these details:

Between 1950 and 1954 there was a decline of 599,769 in the number of farms in the United States. The total in 1954 was 4,252,723.

The west had 461,673 farms in 1954. This was 28,974 fewer farms than in 1950, a decline of about 6.4 per cent.

Between 1950 and 1954 the average size of farms in the United States increased from 213.3 acres to 242.2 acres. Farms were biggest, by far, in the West where they averaged 284.8 acres in 1954 compared with 102.4 acres in 1950.

Most of the decrease in the number of farms from 1950 to 1954 was in farms of 10 to 100 acres. This was due to the pull of jobs in industry and merging of farms.

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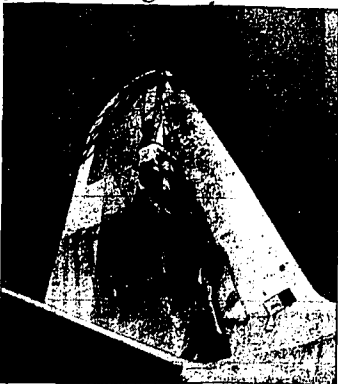

Autos, TV Sets, Not Clothing, Show Today's Raise in Wages

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The rise in the cost of living has led to a new pattern of spending. In this day of the universal blue jeans, clothing isn't the "item of prestige" it used to be. After a long bout with commerce and agriculture department consumption tables and other data, Mrs. Lamale concludes that this is a natural outgrowth of our postwar way of life. Clothing makers have called it "a revolution." She attributes it to: The growth of the suburbs, early marriages, the increase in the size of families, the do-it-yourself trend for household chores, in general, a new informality of living at all income levels.

Or, more briefly, "to changing ideas about what's important." Don't think that dressing America is no longer big business. In 1954 Americans spent \$24,500,000,000 for clothing, accessories and footwear. That was six per cent higher than the 1947-9 average. But if you adjust for population growth and price increases, per capita spending for clothes in 1954—despite higher family incomes—was eight per cent under 1947-9. This isn't just because new fabrics have made clothes "more durable, more comfortable, and more easily cared for."

It is true, Mrs. Lamale believes, to a basic change in the "pattern of consumer preference." Easter financing terms for homes, cars and appliances have played a part in the change. So has the multiplication of radios and machines for making life less arduous and more entertaining. "It is evident," Mrs. Lamale says, "that the spectacular increases in the purchases of automobiles, television sets and furnishings and equipment for the new postwar homes have taken many of the dollars which might have gone to clothing under prewar spending patterns."

In 1954 Americans spent 70 per cent more for autos than they did in 1947-9. For furniture they spent 22 per cent more. Expenditures for radios, TV sets, records, and other musical instruments were 45 per cent above 1947-9. The new trends are most noticeable in the suburbs. "In spite of higher average incomes and larger average family size, suburban families spent a lower proportion of their income for clothing than did families in either large or small cities."

Mrs. Lamale attributes this to the fact that the more suburbanites than city dwellers own the houses they live in. When you're paying off a mortgage and furnishing a house, you have more than a new set of threads to think of.

Mrs. Lamale's research findings aren't exactly gloomy for clothing makers. They may not be getting as big a share of "disposable income" as they used to. But as the population grows, income rises, and war do men and boys...

Spiral Track Snow Vehicle To Be Tested

BOISE, Dec. 23 (AP)—The Idaho military district has said a snow-going vehicle which may revolutionize military tactics in the Arctic will be demonstrated Saturday at Wallawa, Ore.

The machine—called a "spiral track snow tractor"—was invented by Leonard Ferguson of Wallawa and financed by M/Sgt. Junior Carpenter of the 15th in Boise.

The cab of the vehicle is mounted on two revolving drums, each 11 feet long and 30 inches in diameter throughout their length, which are mounted parallel to the direction of travel.

Welded to these drums are continuous cleats which form a spiral running the length of each drum. The drums revolve toward each other, so that the spiral cleats churn the snow backward.

The 15th said an experimental model, weighing 2,600 pounds, had been shown to operate at maximum efficiency in snow more than five feet deep, a depth at which caterpillar-tread vehicles will stall.

Because the drums are hollow, it said, the vehicle will float on water. On snow, the drums sink about six inches below the snow's surface.

Ferguson said the experimental model travels at 12 miles an hour and can climb a 20 per cent grade. He said larger models, when equipped with 50-foot drums, would travel at 70 miles per hour.

LEWISTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—Reed Hunkle, secretary of the Lewiston Elks lodge, was arrested Wednesday on a police court warrant which charged the serving of liquor at an illegal hour. Hunkle was freed after posting \$200 bond.

The alleged violation took place early Sunday morning at the Lewiston Country club, which is operated by the Elks. The warrant was served on Hunkle as the club official responsible for the bar's closure on schedule.

Leonard Wayright, a police officer, said he entered the bar about 1:20 a.m. Sunday and observed a number of persons drinking.

First Model of Earth Satellite

Pig Breeding Increase Set In U. S. Plans

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The agriculture department today predicted the 1956 spring pig crop will total 56 million head, a decrease of two per cent from the 1955 spring crop.

The prediction was based on reports from farmers that they have bred or will breed 8,112,000 sows to farrow next spring. The number of sows farrowing in the spring of 1955 was 8,209,000. They produced 57,342,000 little pigs in the spring of 1955.

Comparisons Shown
The predicted 1956 spring crop of little pigs compares with a 1941-53 average spring production of 54,213,000 head, and 1954 spring production of 52,827,000.

The 1955 fall crop of 37,314,000 pigs combined with the spring crop of 57,342,000 produced a total of 94,656,000 hogs for this calendar year.

Prices Knocked
The heavy crop of pigs played havoc with live hog prices this fall, knocking them down about 40 per cent. The national average price of good butcher hogs yesterday was about \$11 per hundredweight. A year ago the national average price was around \$18.

The plummeting prices for live hogs this fall caused Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson to announce in October a limited government pork purchase program in an effort to stabilize the market.

Price Drops
On the day the pork purchase program went into effect, live hogs

sold at \$13.90 a hundredweight. During the next two months the average market price dropped to \$10.40, the lowest point in 14 years. Farmers' reports on breeding intentions indicate that production in the west north central and western states will drop seven per cent and two per cent, respectively.

Copper Price Goes High in Harried Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—This was the year that copper reached its highest price since the 1870s. It was also a year of sustained demand—and higher prices—for most other nonferrous metals, including lead, zinc, aluminum, nickel, silver, tin and platinum. But the big excitement in the metals markets was centered around copper. Booming demand and a worldwide shortage of the metal pushed the price quoted by producers, from 30 cents a pound to 43 cents highest since 1872. Custom smelters sold their output for a time at 30 cents a pound. And some hard-

pressed fabricators, striving to get enough metal to keep their plants going, paid even more than that. When 1955 opened, producers were working feverishly to step up production—strikes in the preceding year had caused a shortage. As a result, the price went up from 30 to 33 cents a pound in January and from 33 to 36 cents in March. Copper was still short when much of the industry was hit by strikes during the summer. Metal sources estimated that between 75,000 and 80,000 tons of copper was lost during the strikes. Meanwhile, there had been strikes in northern Rhodesia and Chile and quotations were soaring on the hyper-sensitive London Metal Exchange. American producers in Chile were under pressure from the government there to advance their mines. In August, there was a four-cent jump in copper's price to 40 cents.

By the end of the month it was 43 cents. As the year ended, demand was still heavy and some trade sources predicted that it would continue so through the first half of 1956, assuming no downturn in business generally. READ TIMES-NEWS WANT ADS.
