State police reported driving conditions good, but that persons had lost their lives and the worst of the debris had stopped up most of the mud and water.

More Flood Waters Threaten California; 40 Are Known Dead

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26 (UPI)—Danger of further floods in California increased today when more rain poured down on the sigma delta area of the San Joaquin and Stanislaus rivers as Civil Defense Chief Val Peterson arrived to inspect the flood disaster that has claimed at least 40 lives in two states.

The U. S. weather bureau in Fresno issued new warnings this morning for the central San Joaquin valley as other California cities in California, Oregon and Nevada began counting their dead and making guesses of the destruction that has taken more than 50 million dollars damage.

2 Injured Men Moved to Ship From Ice Cap

Debris from the violent windstorm Friday still was strewn across the southern part of Idaho Monday as residents continued the work of cleaning up and surveying the damage. Individually, no one apparently was hit by great damage, but collectively the loss apparently was extensive.

The storm laid its heaviest hand on the vicinity of Murghat and Artesian City where some buildings were toppled, and in this sector television aerials crumpled and trees torn up by the roots.

Motorists Head Toward Tragic Total

Motorists drove rapidly toward a grim new holiday death toll Monday in Reno, Nev., with the heavy buildup of home-bound traffic in the 12 hours remaining of the 78-hour week-end. Persons were already dead—only 91 short of the all-time traffic toll. Fires took 50 lives, and other accidents 63 for a grand total of 678.

Legless Veteran; Involved in Loyalty Case, to Get Benefits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The VA announced restoration of legless veteran's \$320 a month, which it said had been suspended Nov. 30 by a regional office pending investigation. The VA's action came a few hours after the New York Post printed a story about Kutcher's difficulties. In addition to his compensation trouble he lost his job and was threatened with eviction. 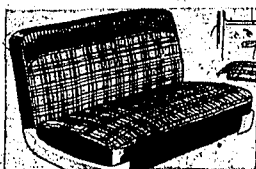

One Phase of Dam Project Is Completed

BOISE, Dec. 26 (AP)—Idaho Power company said Friday its crews have completed a 47-mile, 230,000-volt transmission line to its Snake river dam into the northwest power pool.

Thirty men working out of La Grande, Ore., finished the line from Baker, Ore., to LaGrande this week, the firm announced. The project started last June.

Idaho Power said the job was completed on schedule in spite of severe weather. It said the work was completed within the estimated cost of \$1,100,000, although final cost figures are not available.

The line provides Idaho Power's second link with Oregon and Washington members of the power pool. The transmission line is "dead ended" at the Bonneville substation at LaGrande. The company said it will be connected for power interchange next spring.

Idaho Power said its Quarts substation, five miles west of Baker, would be completed by March or April, bringing the company's expenditures on power pool facilities to \$2,500,000.

The company said the crew which had been working on the line would move to the Brownlee power project on Snake river next week to re-route power lines around the new dam.

Taken to station

He was taken to a police station for further questioning late in the day.

He apparently was the elder of two men hunted by police in connection with a Christmas bomb plot that was so bizarre no one could believe it at first.

The man, believed to be a religious fanatic, wrote a series of letters demanding that Pope Plus XII excommunicate all scientists working on atomic bombs. He tried to bomb the big church to call attention to his plea.

Church Bomb Plots Planned For Yule Day

Bomb Found

Police found a time bomb clicking in Sacre Coeur Christmas day while hundreds of people prayed nearby. They were able to defuse it some 30 minutes before it would have gone off. Police said it was powerful enough to have killed many of the worshippers.

Four letters warned of the plot. They were signed "Daniel, Count of Paris" and were scribbled on cheap writing paper. Police at first thought they were a joke but investigated at Sacre Coeur and found the bomb hidden near an altar behind a bouquet of violets.

On the letters came Christmas eve but police did not investigate until they received an urgent telephone call Christmas morning warning that the famous church whose dome rises above the trees of Montmartre would be destroyed.

Flung Against Wall

The bomb, about as strong as a 75 millimeter shell, exploded out of 24 pounds of black powder, an old clock mechanism and batteries. It was discovered by A. M. Jany, the sacristan, who flung it against a wall. Police later dismantled it.

Police said some of the letters were distributed by a bare-headed young man in his 20s wearing a dark overcoat and trench shoes. He handed one of the warnings to a chaplain at the cathedral and then hurried away.

The letters, almost incoherent, said next time there would be no warning. One asked for Pope Plus to come to Paris to pronounce the excommunication. The others babble of future bombs and one was signed, "on behalf of Father Christmas by his son, Daniel."

Blaine County Sets Mark for Selling Bonds

With Blaine county leading the way, district No. 3, including Magic Valley, has purchased \$7,413,000 worth of savings bonds to rank first in the state.

Twin Falls county purchased \$38,218 of bonds in November to complete 80 per cent of its quota and ranks 11th in the state. Its residents have purchased \$24,200 this year. Jerome county bought \$9,252 in bonds to bring its annual total to \$144,656 or 43.7 per cent of the quota. It ranks 20th.

With \$21,382 in bonds purchased in November, Cassia county has a year's total of \$22,850. Its 72.2 per cent places it in 18th position. Minidoka brought its completion quota percentage to 64.3 by purchasing \$11,509 in bonds last month. It ranks ninth.

Gooding with a \$120,189 total this year, ranks 16th in the state. Gooding county citizens purchased \$3,197 in bonds last month, accounting for 74.2 per cent of the quota.

Ranking fifth in the state with 100.1 per cent, Blaine county citizens raised their 11 months total to \$145,058 with a \$11,988 effort in November. Their quota was \$145,000.

Lincoln county sold only \$86 worth of bonds during November. Its 11 month total is \$10,976 or 26 per cent to rank 39th in the state.

Ranking 44th is Conasa county where the \$35,500 quota is 24 per cent filled. Conasa citizens bought \$5,281 in bonds last month for a year's total of \$5,281.

Average U.S. Income Drop Seen in 1954

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The average American family income was about \$4,173 in 1954, the census bureau has reported.

This was a slight drop from 1953, when average income in that boom year reached \$4,233. However, the 1954 average family income was nearly \$300 higher than in 1952, a gain of seven per cent.

The census bureau said the 1952-1954 gain reflected a continued rise during the years in wage rates in most major industries.

A big gap existed between city and farm families. The average farm family income in 1954 was \$2,000. But this did not take account of income to farm families in the form of products raised on the farm and consumed there.

The report said about 16 million, or some 40 per cent of the nation's families had incomes of \$5,000 or more in 1954. About eight million, or 20 per cent, had incomes under \$2,000.

The remaining 16 million families—around 40 per cent of the nation's families—had incomes ranging from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

Help Is Sent On Soldier's Orphan Load

SOUTHPORT, Ind., Dec. 24 (AP)—The mother of a soldier in Korea who is building army obstacles to maintain an orphanage in Seoul, asked him that help is on the way.

Working through her church, Mrs. Christian Moeller has obtained a pledge that a religious organization will take over operation of the orphanage when Pfc. Fritz Moeller comes home in February.

The 22-year-old soldier, who studied business at Indiana university, started the orphanage for 30 Korean children in an "old limits" area. The army frowned, and a chaplain said it would be a waste of money without church backing.

"Help is coming. We are pulling for you," Mrs. Moeller cabled her son today. She instructed him to contact a representative of World Vision, Inc. in Seoul, Korea.

Mrs. Moeller wrote World Vision at its Portland, Ore., headquarters on the advice of her Baptist minister. The organization now supports several Korean orphanages and is willing to take over another, she said.

World Vision will send Irvin Raetz to Seoul to contact Moeller about taking over the orphanage, Mrs. Moeller said.

Vessel Crippled By Heavy Seas

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 26 (AP)—The 120-foot tugboat "Express" was proceeding up the Oregon coast today with a jury rig rudder which her crew fashioned to replace her broken steering system.

The vessel, owned by the Petroleum Navigation company of Seattle, was being escorted by the coast guard cutter Tansy and the commercial tug Mer Perce. Her speed of advance through the moderate seas was about four knots.

The rudder cables on the express snapped yesterday in heavy seas about 18 miles northeast of the St. George reef light ship off the Oregon-California border.

The tug radioed the coast guard here that she was in danger of running aground after her cables snapped.

The coast guard here said the express would put into Coos Bay, Ore., for repairs.



He inflated the raft and started to row but the current was too strong. He went away from the car instead of toward it.

Three on Car

Then a smaller helicopter came along to pull the rubber boat toward three other persons who were on top of another car.

They were successful in picking up the woman and baby but the pilot from the big helicopter pushed a man, a woman and a little boy into the water.

The man and little boy never reappeared.

Woman Is Hysterical

When the small helicopter pulled the rubber boat over to the woman, she wouldn't let go of the car and was hysterical.

It was the worst thing I ever saw. I was just sick.

You can't imagine what it was like. All I could think of was my own little kids safe at home around the Christmas tree.

Boost Is Seen For Idaho '55 Spud Harvest

BOISE, Dec. 26 (AP)—Idaho's 1955 potato production was estimated at a whopping 61,850,000 bushels by the USDA crop reporting service for the 1954-55 season. This is an increase of almost 11 million bushels over the 1954 crop.

The state produced 40,800,000 bushels last year and has an average annual production of 41,700,000 for the 1954-55 period.

The estimates include all spuds harvested in the state and about 16,000 bushels left in the ground in southwestern Idaho because of unfavorable prices. They do not include spuds left in the ground in the eastern part of the state because of freezing.

The USDA said the crop got off to a slow start because of the cool spring and late planting. Summer growing weather was not so hot. Irrigation facilities were taxed, the report said, making it impossible to keep adequate water on much of the crop. This, it said, resulted in a very heavy percentage of rough potatoes.

And in mid-November below zero weather from an estimated 3,000 acres of spuds in the ground. The rough spuds too have caused storage problems in many cellars.

"As a result of the freeze-plus a high per cent of rough potatoes—the throw-out in sorting operations is running quite high," said the USDA.

Victims were Mrs. Gladys Soper and her children, Elaine, 12; Marilyn, 12; Loren, 10; Owen, 3, and Dale, 2. State police said the fire broke out about 2:30 a. m. and was discovered by Warren Soper, the father and only survivor.

Soper, who is hospitalized in a state of shock, told police he smelled smoke while asleep upstairs and awoke his wife who followed him to the kitchen with the two youngest children.

He said the smoke and flames knocked him down when he opened the kitchen door and he crawled through the burning room to safety, assuming that his wife and two children followed him. Their bodies, and those of the three other children were found later by firemen.

TOKYO, Dec. 26 (AP)—Communist China announced today it had completed a steel bridge across the Han river section of the Hankow transportation complex in China.

Singing Dogs of Denmark Eye Fame and Fortune in America

NEW YORK, Dec. 26 (AP)—This, then, is the story of Peary, Pussey, Dolly and Cassey—the singing dogs of Denmark—and how they crossed the seas to America and won fame and fortune.

And pulled the wool right over the eyes of some big Broadway characters, including a large corporation and numerous disk jockeys.

Now, Denmark, as you know, was the home of Hans Christian Andersen, the master of make-believe, and . . . well . . . to tell you the honest truth the singing dogs of Denmark are kind of a make-believe choral group.

Peary, Pussey and company didn't really come to America in person. But their voices did. For one awful moment last week, RCA Victor record company began to suspect human voices were involved: Transatlantic phone calls set the record straight. They're doggy voices, all right, but . . .

Well, here's the dope. An RCA Victor official's friend brought back from England, recently, a record named "The Singing Dogs," starring five dogs that yipped, yapped, and yowled their way through "Simple Bells," "Patty Cake," "Three Blind Mice" and "Oh, Susanna."

The dogs carried the melody and filled in the cues perfectly.

Victor song and sales experts listened and thought: Wow! Master of Mystery will be a smash!

They purchased the master record from the European company. They released the record in America. Hysteria! Pastels sold since "The Thing." It has just ended its first two weeks with a sale of more than 200,000 records.

Dogs coast-to-coast began attack-

ing radio and phonograph loudspeakers, clawing and barking. Disk jockeys were flooded with requests about how to teach your dog to sing. RCA Victor publicity people poured out information based on word that preceded the record here.

"The singing dogs are real living, breathing dogs who sing under the direction of their cat, Wladimir," it said. The dogs were termed "A Danish vocal group, currently touring the continent." The managing director sent a photographer to Copenhagen to get pictures. Back from him came a cable that put the Victor people in a terrific-stra-tentary.

"There is no dog act."

There followed a series of phone calls to Copenhagen, and things cleared up considerably. Wladimir, a bird and animal authority, has for years been putting barking dogs and catling birds and such on radio to demonstrate breeds and species.

The record was made by cutting up tape recordings of barks and whines and splicing them together. He selected five dogs whose vocal ranges he liked, took them to a recording studio, and got as much of a scale as he could out of each. Then the individual notes and phrases were snipped out and refiled together perfectly in tune. Anyway, that's what RCA Victor was told on the phone. Wladimir now has the dogs together for broadcast.

Come now into the picture a real Broadway type, Golis Goldmark, a record publisher. He's rushing into print sheet music of the four songs, with five dog pictures on the cover. Through Broadcast Music, Inc. he will get a royalty every time the record is played on the air. Because,

Snow Tractor Does Well on Primary Test

WALLOWA, Ore., Dec. 26 (AP)—Leonard Ferguson, Wallowa, took his spiral-track snow tractor out for a test Saturday, and said it performed "better than we expected." Ferguson said the tractor, propelled by two, long revolving drums with screw treads, made up to 20 miles an hour over a level snowfield, and climbed a hill that would have been too steep for a Jeep in summer.

Ferguson said they would have given an even more impressive display of the tractor's power, but the only available rope broke.

Rope Snapped
The rope had been tied to an automobile. The intent was to have the tractor pull the car sideways across a road. Just as the car began to move, the rope snapped, Ferguson said.

For power there was a four-cylinder, 70-horsepower gasoline engine, geared to the drums. Three long pieces of two-inch angle iron had been welded spirally onto the drums for treads to bite into the snow.

The steel drums, made in Boise, are 11 feet long, 30 inches in diameter.

Friends Watch
A number of friends went along to watch the test, 12 miles north of Wallowa. Snow was about 2 1/2 feet deep, Ferguson said.

Also there was Nels, Junior Carper of the Idaho Military District in Boise, who financed Ferguson's construction of the tractor. Carper said the tractor could become an important development for Arctic troops.

Religion Is Used as Therapy For Mentally Ill; Yule Noted

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—At the government's biggest mental hospital they practice all the modern art of healing. They also employ the ancient therapy of religion, believing it to be a powerful medicine for ills of the mind and spirit.

At Christmas time this past year the old and new became particularly evident.

The hospital is St. Elizabeth's, a sprawling, many-structured, high-walled institution—100 years old this year—in Washington's Congress Heights district.

Its superintendent is Dr. Winifred Overholser, one of the country's foremost psychiatrists.

The hospital's 7,600 patients are human beings whose ills are much like anybody else's except in degree. Maybe there is something for everybody in the spiritual medicine practiced at St. Elizabeth's.

Dr. Overholser has this to say about Christmas:

1. It is first and foremost a religious occasion.
2. It is a time for remembering and being remembered.
3. It is a time for happiness.

So at St. Elizabeth's on Christmas, this year or any year, the accent is on religious nourishment. Some 25 Catholic and Protestant services will be conducted in the various chapels, halls and wards.

Other observances of the season began Dec. 15, and will continue through Dec. 30. And on Christmas "every patient received a present; nobody was forgotten."

Happily "only a very few of our patients are so ill that they didn't know it was Christmas."

There may be those who feel a bit cynical about remembering the unlucky just once a year. Dr. Overholser's reply: "Try remembering them at other times, too."

But he feels that it is particularly important that no one be forgotten on Christmas. Christmas "is a time for remembering."

Christmas means a lot of hard work for the staff of St. Elizabeth's. Among other things they are seeing to it that every ward has an indoor Christmas tree.

In all, more than 150 events were scheduled for this holiday season. They include scores of ward parties, dancing, music, ballet, movies, bingo and "psychodrama."

The patients themselves are the dancers, players, actors. Do-it-yourself extends to St. Elizabeth's in prop-building, score-writing, and composition of all sorts from poetry to the dramatic.

Religious therapy, though especially meaningful at Christmas, is practiced throughout the year. Twenty days before this Christmas, Dr. Overholser participated in "gate stone" ceremonies for a new interdenominational chapel which will be dedicated to the spring. He proclaimed "the value of religion in the care and treatment of the mentally ill."

He said the new chapel "will be a constant testimonial to the truth, despite differences of creed, that"

men of good will can mountably together for the best and in the service of the world.

Pilgrims Trod Dusty Road to Famed Village

JEERUSALEM (Israel section), Dec. 26.—Hundreds of Christmas pilgrims plodded along the dusty road to Bethlehem through villages trod three days ago by rioting and gunfire.

Bright sunshine streamed down on the little town where Christ was born and there were few signs of the bloody riot that the Arab legionnaires of Jordan suppressed with machineguns and tear gas.

While-painted United Nations jeep buzzed along the road the three wise men took nearly 2,000 years ago, but except for the ruts left by the 1948 war there was little or no sign of strife.

The pilgrims crossing from Israel were mostly Christian Arabs from the north—from Galilee and from Nazareth where Christ once piled his sandals as a carpenter.

As they crossed into Jordan, immigration officials exchanged one Israeli pound around \$2.50 for one Jordanian dinar per person. No one was allowed to carry more money.

To Cross Tomorrow Overseas tourists, including large number of Americans crossed into Jordan Christmas eve, when the U. S. consular corps will travel to Bethlehem.

Normally the road they travel is closed, for it lies close to the barbed wire barricades and minefields of the Israeli-Jordan border.

Medical Science in '56 Could Solve "Silent Heat" Actions

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—One of the fascinating scientific mysteries which medical science may solve in 1956 is what "silent heat" does inside the body.

It produces heat, for one thing. Of that there is no doubt it also is capable of producing chemical and biological changes. Of that there is no doubt either. The big questions are, what changes at what intensities?

"Silent heat" is sound of such high intensities, the human ear can't hear it. The ear stops hearing when sound passes about 17,000 vibrations per second, approximately. Anything higher than 20,000 is "ultra-sound."

During 1956, ultra-sound medicine spread through the country. The American Medical Association accepted it, with reservations. It has its doubting, but there are many doctors who are frankly afraid of it.

They're afraid because it represents an awesome power whose effects on the body are poorly understood. In industry, ultra-sound when coupled with abrasive materials will drill holes through steel. That requires frequencies which approach the astronomical—they're ultra-ultra-sound.

For medicinal purposes, ultra-sound is produced with a top capacity of around one million frequencies per second. This is accepted as safe provided it is applied for short periods at one time and with careful regard for the general state of the patient.

With this limited ultra-sound, doctors have been reporting some extraordinary results in relieving pain and eradicating such diseases as arthritis and other rheumatic conditions and such diseases as sinusitis and adenoiditis which, that have been "cured."

Gaiuzza Paz formally took over the keys of the Prensa building and the printing plant six blocks away from his attorney, Manuel Ordonez, who cleared the building in the name of the Paz family on Monday.

"I hope you have the keys," Gaiuzza Paz grinned as he said Ordonez approached the building. "If not, you'll be like a bridegroom without the wedding ring."

State County Is Hailed for Ore Deposits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (Special)—Valley county, Id., may soon become an important source of vital metals such as titanium, manganese, pie iron and columbium, the bureau of mines reports.

The essential metals may be refined from "alluvial" sands which occur in Valley county and which are shown by bureau tests to be high in "ilmenite" content, a concentrate containing titanium and pie iron.

Bureau experiments at its Albany, N. Y., laboratories show that electric smelting of the Idaho ilmenite is "technically feasible."

Further, says the bureau, "the Albany tests showed that the titanium content of the slag made from Valley county ilmenite is higher than that of any commercially available material except rutile (another concentrate)."

With extensive treatment of the Valley county sand, the bureau said, "it might be possible to extract some manganese, essential in steelmaking, and columbium, which is needed for high-temperature alloys that go into jet engines."

The bureau has issued a report titled "Electric Smelting of Ilmenite Concentrates From Valley County, Idaho."

The report can be obtained from the Bureau of Mines Publications Distribution Section, 4800 Forbes St., Pittsburgh 13, Pa., the bureau said.

Requests for the report should include its code number, R. I. 5170.

35 Guerrillas Die in Bitter Algerian War

ALGIERS, Algeria, Dec. 26 (U.P.)—“Blue Devil” French alpine troops won a rebel stronghold in the Djurdjura mountains have killed 35 guerrillas in bitter fighting in a snowstorm.
Eleven other rebels were wounded and 21 taken prisoner in the same fight among the snow-capped, 8,000-foot peaks 50 miles southeast of here. More than 200 men—French and independence-seeking nationalist rebels—have been slain in violent outbreaks in Algeria in the last 10 days.
The new wave of stiff fighting in Algeria since the outbreak began in earnest in Algeria 13 months ago, it coincides with a hot campaign in France for the election of a new parliament Jan. 2 and with plans for a new French army building in Algeria.
Premier Edgar Faure was campaigning with statements that new taxes and new reinforcements were not necessary in North Africa, where there already are 330,000 troops. Nevertheless, the defense ministry spokesman said 60,000 more troops have been pledged to Algeria and are on the way soon. The troops are part of a plan bearing the name of French Defense Minister Pierre Laniel.
The defense ministry issued a statement saying the troop movement was nothing new and had been underway since October.
The French general in Algeria, Jacques Soustelle, also denied asking for “new” troops. He pointedly went on to say, however, that he had been asking for several months for the means to restore order.

Trailblazers of New Nuclear Era Plan First Big Congress

CLEVELAND, O. (NEA)—The Davy Crockett and Dan'l Boone of the new atomic era are going to have a routing get-together.
They'll emerge from their lonely haunts and sit down here together for a week starting Dec. 12. An estimated 5,000 will swap yarns about their adventures, from the trail ways on reversion in mercaptophenothiazole vulcanization to the tale of the dissolution of low-temperature sodium in hydrofluoric acid solutions.
This is the first Nuclear Engineering and Scientific Congress ever to meet anywhere.
Thirty organizations, representing 60,000 of our best engineer-scientists, are participating. A library of 300 scientific papers will be read. Many foreign delegates will be present.
It's called the biggest single project ever undertaken by the Cleveland Engineering society, is to find circles of the nation. Its purpose: To take a full-scale look at atomic energy in industry, government, education, medicine and agriculture.
De-classification of restricted information following the Geneva meeting makes possible this open discussion which needs 80,000 square feet of exhibition space to display the progress in peaceful uses of atomic energy through products and processes of 200 firms. It will be open to the public.

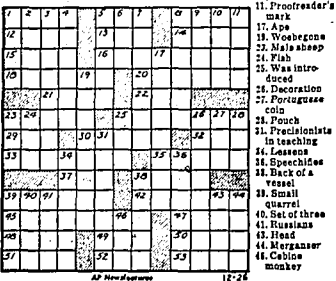

Slayings Put Algerians in Grip of Fear

ALGERIA, Algeria, Dec. 26 (AP)—Querrils, warfare has mounted sharply in French Algeria. A climate of fear was created by reports that officials who fail to quit their government jobs would be executed. Incomplete, indicated 60 persons had been killed in the last 24 hours.

In Paris, Premier Edgar Faure and leading ministers met with his committee to coordinate North African affairs to consider military measures in Algeria where Governor General Jacques Soustelle has asked for reinforcements. There are about 320,000 French soldiers in North Africa, mostly in Algeria.

The heaviest fighting started when the French opened a drive in the Nememcha mountains south of Constantine. Militaries joined the operation against a handful of rebel bands known to be at large in the French authorities said the drive cost the rebels 32 days, 10 captured and 100 killed.

In Algeria, nationalists circulated tracts threatening execution to any French soldier who would report on military posts before the French elections Jan. 2. A number of test officers were known to have been released already. Threatening letters have been received by many soldiers. Nationalists also tried to word through the native quarters of the larger cities to step up terrorist activities in the Christmas season, particularly on Christmas eve and day.

Increased terrorism has been reflected in the number of deaths and assassinations, burning of farm buildings and schools and the cutting of telephone lines.

Boise Banker Sentenced on Morals Count

BOISE, Dec. 26 (AP)—District Judge M. Oliver Koelsch sentenced a Boise banker to 10 years in prison for sex perversion with a minor boy Friday, and the former district vice president was ordered to appeal the sentence to 10 years.

Koelsch and District Judge Meritt Young handed down the terms to four others who had pleaded guilty to similar sex charges.

The men are among 13 who have been arrested since late October in a morals drive which Ada County Prosecutor Blaine Evans says involves more than 100 juvenile boys and adults. Three other men were sentenced to jail last month.

Koelsch sentenced Vernon H. Charles, 31, to 10 years in prison and Charles P. Peck, 32, to 10 years in prison on charges of committing infamous crimes against nature with young boys.

Strike Talks Halted After Union 'Abuse'

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 26 (AP)—Strike-busting Westinghouse Electric corporation has said its negotiators "terminated" meetings with the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical workers "because of profane abuse."

Westinghouse's top negotiator, Vice President R. D. Blatter said, it was impossible this afternoon to preserve any semblance of reasonableness or decency. There can be no other excuse for this conduct except deliberate calculated ploy to bring about a tie to negotiations.

Federal mediator John H. Murray said the company walked out of the afternoon meeting about an hour and a half after it started.

Murray said no further sessions are scheduled in efforts to settle the nine-week-old strike which closed 20 Westinghouse plants.

Another big union, the United Electrical Workers (and is striking against the company and has closed another 10 plants. That union is continuing its negotiations.

Blatter said the end of the meeting was preceded by what he described as "an obscene, unprintable reference to the head of the company's negotiating committee by the IUE president."

Boy Sent to Jail For Sheep Theft

BOISE, Dec. 26 (AP)—Federal Judge Chase A. Clark has sentenced a 16-year-old boy to jail for violating an 18-month probationary term by stealing a sheep on the farm of his IUE parent.

Clark also sentenced an Indian adult, Bobbie Billy of Ft. Hall, to 30 days in jail for violating probation on a breachy conviction.

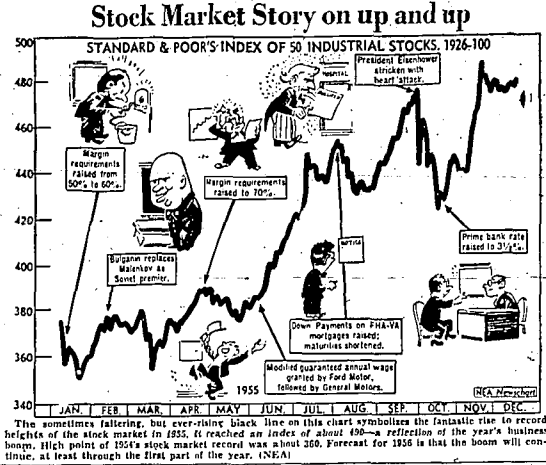

Nehru States Red Leaders Twist History

NEW DELHI, India, Dec. 26 (AP)—Jawaharlal Nehru has accused Russia's leaders of "twisting history" in anti-western speeches during their recent tour of India.

Delogates at a closed meeting of Nehru's congress party said the premier declared he was "embarrassed" by some of the lines used by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and Soviet Communist Party Chief Nikita Khrushchev.

Tells of 'Twist'
Nehru said the Russians twisted history in claiming that the western allies sent Nazi Germany against the Soviet Union in the early days of World War II.

Nehru said he was embarrassed, by this particular speech, informed sources reported after the congress party session.

Liked G.M. Talk
But he told the party members he was not embarrassed by the Russians' references to Kashmir and Portuguese Goa.

Nehru said he divided the Russian-Khrushchev declarations into three categories:

1. Speeches in which they criticized the West on general lines without directly attacking specific issues. Nehru said he did not mind these.
2. Speeches in which they made direct attacks. He said he took particular objection to these, and especially regretted the attacks on Britain.
3. The Russian comments on Goa, which India wants free of Portuguese control, and Kashmir, a border territory in dispute between India and Pakistan. Nehru said he reported to have said he was not embarrassed by press reports of these speeches.
