

Alaskans Say "Worst Over" For Big Snow

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan. 2 (AP)—Snowbound Alaskans who dug out from the heaviest early winter snowfall in history today agreed "the worst is over."

The big job of removing snow still is ahead," said George Shannon, Anchorage city manager. "It will take us several days to get the job done."

The shock of the territorial M. R. Brock of the territorial employment service here said the "help-wanted" sign was out for men to shovel snow. There were 23 applicants but more than a 100 men were needed.

The snow fell steadily for more than 50 hours from here south to Yakutat and the mayors of both Anchorage and Cordova declared emergencies at the height of the storm.

Hundreds of stranded cars still remained on streets and highways and taxicab drivers were doing a hand-to-hand business with traffic at a virtual standstill.

Nellie Brown, Anchorage's first woman resident, snowshoed into town from her home three miles away.

"I used to come in to town this way back in the old days and I'm still not too old to snowshoe in again," she said.

Elks in Idaho Studying Law

BOISE, Jan. 2 (AP)—The Idaho Elks Rehabilitation Center has announced formation of a committee to study legislation in other states and "point out the need for adequate laws regarding the education of the handicapped in Idaho."

Clayton Lorenzen, superintendent of the center, said that Idaho laws permit, but do not require, the school districts to build special facilities for exceptional children.

"As a result, there are few special units in Idaho providing these educational opportunities," he said.

"In a state where there are large special schools for the mentally retarded, the delinquent, the blind and the deaf, the educational opportunities for educable, crippled children are lacking."

He said the center feels that school districts should be financially able to see that the exceptional child is given adequate education either within the district or at a nearby place.

Strange Disease Could Ruin Corn Crops for Nation

ATLANTA, Jan. 2 (AP)—A disease that floats in the air and migrates like birds could wreck America's greatest food crop, corn, scientists warn.

It is corn rust disease. But fortunately, scientists are finding strains of corn that resist this fungus disease. They think this resistance can be added to present-day hybrid corn in time to thwart disastrous epidemics.

Strangely, some resistant strains come from Mexico and South America where great civilizations once flourished and perished partly, because, perhaps the rust disease ruined corn crops.

The story of this scientific search was described to the American Association for the Advancement of Science by J. G. Dickson, P. M. Leroux, R. Syamananda and A. L. Flanagan, plant pathologists of University of Wisconsin.

Refund of Excess Charges Ordered

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The federal power commission has ordered the Panhandle Eastern Pipeline company, Kansas City, to refund \$38,116,056 in "excess charges" to its wholesale natural gas customers.

It also ordered the company to pay interest on the overpayments at a rate of six per cent annually.

The commission said the payments cover the period from Feb. 20, 1952, through April 30, 1954, when rate increases were in effect subject to refund of any excess charges.

It emphasized that its order does not foreclose further refunds that might result from further hearings on two points—the treatment of cost for company-produced natural gas and treatment of revenues and expenses from gasoline plant operations.

Wholesale Drive Arrests Speeders

MARSHALL, Tex., Jan. 2 (AP)—More than 165 speeders were arrested on a 10-mile stretch of highway here as officers cracked down on holiday drivers.

Afghanistan Pact Okayed by Soviet

MOSCOW, Jan. 2 (AP)—The parliament of the supreme Soviet (parliament) has announced it has ratified the agreement for a 10-year extension of the 1921 treaty of neutrality and non-aggression between Soviet Russia and Afghanistan.

The agreement was reached Dec. 18 on the visit of Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist Party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev to Afghanistan.

Americans Bored, Bewildered Over Optimism of Russ Leader

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The latest burst of sunny optimism about the world outlook from Premier Nikolai Bulganin of Russia left officials in Washington slightly bored and more than a little bewildered.

The ras and rags of Soviet policy as reflected in statements by Bulganin and Russian Communist boss Nikita Khrushchev, are becoming so frequent and so contradictory that even the experts are getting dizzy.

A few anchor points stand firm amid the confusion.

The clash last week between Khrushchev and President Eisenhower showed that the Soviets are still determined to whittle or force the Western powers into accepting permanent their massive control of half a dozen eastern European states from Poland through Albania.

Khrushchev and Bulganin apparently hoped to win this out by good will and blandishment at the summit conference last July. They failed.

Now Khrushchev is willing to risk the final shreds of his good relations with Eisenhower by denouncing the President's routine Christmas message expressing a vague hope for freedom for the satellite peoples.

Eisenhower responded from Key West Friday that peaceful liberation of the satellites will continue to be a major American aim.

While denouncing Eisenhower for "interference" in the internal affairs of their satellite empire, the Soviets are openly trying to influence the internal political sentiments of India and other Asian countries.

Their campaign to bind the neutrals to Russia and to spread undeveloped lands.

The major points of collision between Russia and the western powers appear quite clear. The Russians, like the West, no longer seem so afraid that an atomic war may break out—the lesson of the European war—likely to remain fixed for low years at least. 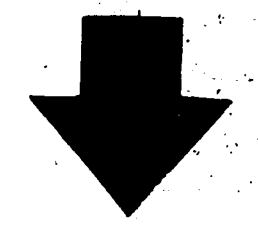

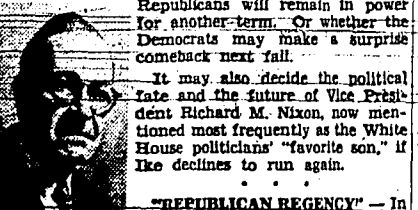

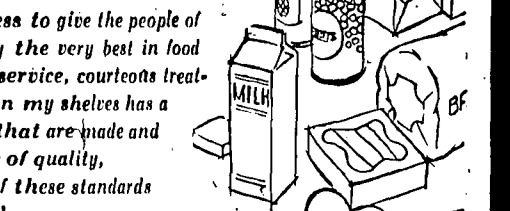

Premier for Russia Turns Off Invective, Eyes Another Meet

MOSCOW, Jan. 2 (AP)—Premier foreign ministry and broadcast by Nicolai Bulganin has turned off the flow of Soviet invective against the West, declaring that the spirit of Geneva will not be "buried" and another Summit conference might be fruitful provided some big issues are overcome. The fact that both sides of the East-West division now have the H-bomb is no sure guarantee there will be no war, Bulganin asserted. But she seemed to reflect a Soviet feeling of security, growing out of the summit conference at Geneva last summer, against the actual possibility of H-bomb war. Bulganin's statements, closing with greetings and best wishes to the American people on the New Year, were contained in answers to written questions from Hearst Metrotone News. The agency furnishes newsreel films to television stations. The text of questions and answers was handed out by the soviet

day, or is still pushing the Geneva line espoused by Bulganin. But even Bulganin gave no hint of retreating from any Soviet position. Since the Geneva conference last July with President Eisenhower, British Prime Minister Eden and French Premier Faure, the Soviet leaders evidently have felt greater confidence as a result of Eisenhower's categorical assurance that the United States would never be a party to an aggression on Russia. Despite an atmosphere of good feeling, the four chiefs of government at Geneva traded no concrete agreements, however, and their foreign ministers later were unable to make any progress at all on German unification, European security, disarmament, or lowering barriers of the iron curtain. In the interview, Bulganin was asked whether he considered that the spirit displayed at Geneva is still alive and will continue to live? Bulganin answered: "The historical significance of the Geneva conference of the four power heads of government lay in the fact that the spirit of cooperation and mutual understanding displayed by its participants created new possibilities for improving relations between states and created prospects for safeguarding a stable peace between the peoples." Colorado War On Beetle Hits Mop-up Stage

DENVER, Jan. 2 (AP)—A five-year war on a beetle which threatened multi-million dollar damage to Colorado's western spruce forests is in the mopping-up stage, thanks to modern chemicals, woodpeckers and the weather.

An epidemic of the Englemann spruce beetle, a quarter-inch bark insect, was first spotted in the White river national forest in 1941. It was not until 1950, however, that the U. S. forest service obtained funds for a large-scale control program.

The main weapon in the forest service arsenal was the use of insecticides. A total of 2,871,339 gallons was used to treat 1,628,460 infected trees—at an average cost of \$3.25 per tree.

The service built 533 miles of access roads to carry the program to affected areas. Private timber operators cooperated in removing infected trees. And nature, too, pitched in with a hand of its own.

"No story of the battle of the beetle would be complete without a word about man's best helper, the woodpecker," says Forester Joe Kay, who is in charge of insect control for the Rocky Mountain region.

For one thing, noted Kay, the number of woodpeckers increases in proportion to the available food supply. In 1954, a record number of beetles moulted, so did the number of woodpeckers. In 1951, a record cold snap combined with these circumstances to help turn the beetle in some areas.

Temperatures dropped as low as 86 below zero in some sections. The cold was lethal to beetles, but had no effect in the woodpeckers.

Kay feels that the threat has now been largely contained, thanks to this combined effort.

"The big job ahead," he says, "is training those interested in recognizing the symptoms of an infestation and then acting promptly to deal it a death blow while still small."

Kay says the battle has admittedly been costly. But he adds that if the epidemic had been allowed to run its course, an estimated 23 billion board feet of spruce would have been destroyed in Colorado alone.

U. S. Doesn't Get Any Revenue From Fantastic Amounts Spent for Betting

In his speech in the house last June, he said:

"I am relatively sure that, if enacted, my bill would cut down taxes, increase revenue for health and welfare services, decrease racketeering—channel-people—gambling—sinners and provide a healthy outlet for daydreams."

But the opposition is overpowering. It ranges from church groups to bookies and gamblers who feel it would draw money away from them. States resist the federal government moving into the field on grounds it would be an invasion of states' rights.

New Look in Forecast Set

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The weather bureau announced a new look in forecasting which will permit such cheerful expressions as "unusually fine weather" and "clear and bright."

The new look also will spread a bigger umbrella over the weatherman who attempts to say whether it is going to rain.

When chances are better than 50-50, he will throw in the term "likely." "Perhaps" will be used when less than 50-50 but there is better than 25 per cent possibility.

When the possibility can't be ignored, but still is almost anybody's guess, the forecast will report cagily that the weather is "unsettled, possibly snow" or whatever the occurrence may be.

The bureau said the weatherman should report happily that "unusually fine weather" is in prospect on days when there are no "almost invisible cirrostratus clouds which give the sun a dull appearance."

Boyle Airs Troubled Feeling TV Misses on News Reporting

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK, Jan. 2 (AP)—What's wrong with television news programs? In the few years since TV first invaded the nation's living rooms it has made it possible for anyone to sit comfortably at home and learn the proper way to bake a cake or hold up a bank.

But within the industry itself, there remains a troubled feeling that television hasn't yet whipped the problem of how to present news effectively. Many viewers share this feeling. They doubt that television does a good job of telling them really what is going on in the world.

Sometimes they feel a bit lost between the crack-of-doom-voiced announcer who makes a \$2,000 hold-up sound like a threat to inter-

national peace and the coy-Ann-Maria-type commentator who tries a slanting line in every sentence.

But one of the reasons in the field, Walter Cronkite, favors an improvement soon. Cronkite first was chosen for his coverage of the 1962 political conventions.

"The big problem in our news show has been the adjustment between solid news and entertainment," he said. "Sometimes we've tried too hard to hold the attention of people with entertainment gimmicks instead of real information."

"Television is a marvelous medium for transmitting news, but we're still in the middle ages in terms of techniques of presentation. However, there's a tremendous under way. The new electronic visual tape will make it easier to do on-the-spot sound recordings. You can edit the tape and play it back immediately. Unlike film, it doesn't have to be sent first to a laboratory to be developed."

Cronkite also believes further spread of the coaxial cable will speed the creation of a nationwide series of TV bureaus which can flash more spot local news features on network shows.

Something is needed to simplify TV news programs, which today are a form of organized chaos. It requires 27 men to put on Cronkite's "Sunday News Special," a 15-minute show, not counting film delivery messengers and laboratory technicians.

"Sometimes you still wonder how a program manages to get on the air on time," he said, smiling.

Cronkite is what is known in the trade as a "solid" news man. He believes strongly the TV audience prefers to be shown serious news of real importance rather than a spoon-fed entertaining side-show feature.

Party Enters Ike's Name in Six Elections

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Without waiting for President Eisenhower to make up his mind, Republicans in six states have taken preliminary steps to enter his name in presidential primaries starting in March.

These states are New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Oregon, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

Two Others Holding
In two other states where the candidate's consent is required—California and Ohio—favorite son candidates have announced with the idea of holding these delegations for Eisenhower should he decide to run for a second term.

The President's doctors have said it would be around mid-February before they could give him a report on his recovery from a heart attack upon which he could decide about his political future.

Two States Move
Latest moves to enter Eisenhower in preference and delegate primaries, to be held in 1956 in 18 states, Alaska and the District of Columbia, came this week in Indiana and Pennsylvania.

In the Hoosier state, Gov. George N. Craig said the President's name would be entered in that state's May 8 presidential preference primary unless he decides not to run. The winner will get Indiana's 32 national convention delegates to be chosen later in a state convention. This will be Indiana's first presidential primary.

Named for April Vote
Republican factions in Pennsylvania also got together this week to place Eisenhower's name on the preference primary ballot there April 24. Sixty district delegates are elected in the primary. The GOP state committee names an additional 10 delegates at large.

The Kentucky state leaders complained they were going ahead on their own without consulting the President. Senator Duff, R., Pa., a participant, said if the President's health continues to improve, "I feel he will run again."

**Early Return to
China Predicted**
TAIPEI, Formosa, Jan. 2 (AP)—President Chiang Kai-shek in a New Year's message said the time would soon come for Chinese on the mainland "to rise against the communist traitors in a mighty revolution."

"We will fight the red bandits, Mao Tse-tung and Chu Teh, chairman and vice chairman of the red regime, and our sworn enemies, the Russian communists, to the bitter end," he declared.

The message was issued against a backdrop of rising action in Formosa itself, with the communists making threatening gestures at the Nationalist offshore islands.

The official Central News Agency said red artillery shells early Saturday struck Quemoy across Formosa strait—for the fifth straight day.

**Egypt Recognizes
New Sudan Land**
CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 2 (AP)—Egypt formally recognized Sunday the million-square-mile Sudan as an independent nation.

The vast area reaching from the southern Egyptian border nearly to the equator had been ruled jointly by Britain and Egypt since Jan. 19, 1899. It has a population of about nine million.

Action Looms For Rate Cuts

BOISE, Jan. 2 (AP)—Paul Mills, chairman of the rates committee of the Boise Chamber of Commerce, reports progress in the chamber's effort to lower shipping rates between the Boise valley and points in northern Nevada and southern Idaho.

He said that major carrier members of the Rocky Mountain tariff bureau had agreed to seek reduction of class rates between Boise, Nampa, Caldwell and northern Nevada and commodity rates on less than carload lots from the three cities to southern Idaho.

The new rates will come up for adoption at the San Francisco conference of the Inter-mountain Carriers Jan. 12-13 and if approved will be submitted to the Idaho public utilities commission and the interstate commerce commission.

"This is a tremendous step forward for Boise distributors and gives the local wholesaler through the lower rates being asked an opportunity to compete with other shipping areas on a more competitive basis," Mills said.

British Blocking U.S. Deportation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The immigration service says it is anxious to deport a Chinese now in a Missouri mental hospital but that the British have balked at letting him return to his homeland via Hong Kong.

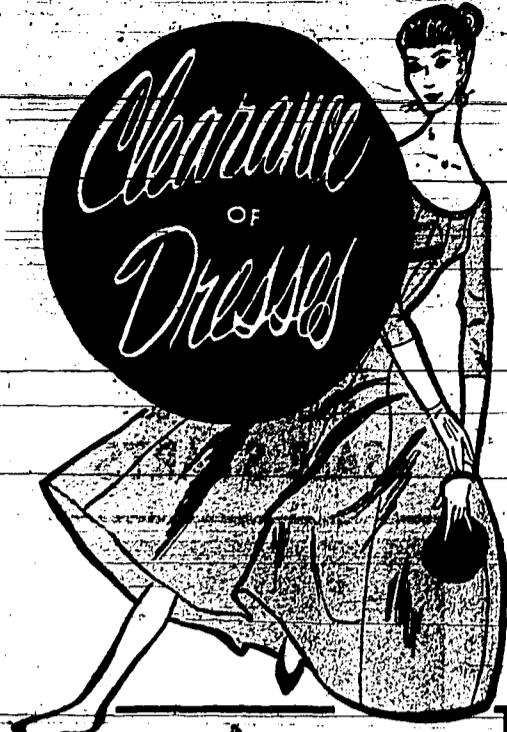
This was the service's comment on a Red Chinese charge that Lin Yung-ming is being prevented from leaving the United States.

Lin, a former student at University of Missouri, is confined as a schizophrenic in the state mental hospital at Farmington, Mo.

The immigration service obtained a deportation order against Lin in 1951, a spokesman said. The order still stands but, he added, the British have been unwilling to permit Lin's passage through Hong Kong, apparently because they believe he might remain there at his father's home.

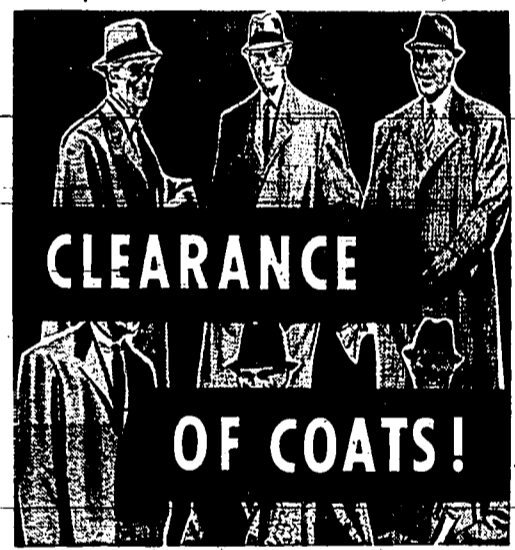

Once-Great Battleship Heads To Scrap Heap After 54 Years

NEW YORK, Jan. 7 (AP)—The review that marked the coronation of King Edward VII, and Roosevelt's "Great White Fleet" in 1905 she escorted the ship that toured the world in 1907, would be back to the United States for final burial. A newer battleship was given the name of Illinois in 1941, and the old Illinois became the Prairie State.

Whatever her fate, 10,000 World War II fleet officers and 1,000 New York naval veterans of the Korean war who were trained aboard the battleship will remember her as a grand old ship despite her shabby appearance. Some 1,200 reservists who now must commute to the Bronx or Brooklyn for their weekly evening classes, will remember the convenience of the battleship to their Manhattan offices. More than one voiced this lament:

"The army reserve has national guard armories by the dozen all over Manhattan, but the navy and marine corps only had the Prairie State. Now we're practically homeless."

Optimism Set For Year-End Power Report

SPOKANE, Jan. 7 (AP)—Pacific Northwest Power company has issued an optimistic year-end report on the general economy of the region and its own plans for a 210 million dollar hydroelectric project on Snake river.

Pacific Power and Light, Portland General Electric, Montana Power and Washington Water Power, the four utilities which make up Pacific Northwest Power, reported \$1,750,000 was being spent on the Pleasant Valley and Mountain Sheep dam sites on the middle Snake between Idaho and Oregon.

The federal power commission granted the company a preliminary permit April 8 and the firm filed its license application Sept. 7. The completed dams would produce a total of 1,183,000 kilowatts.

"The economy of the Pacific Northwest will grow and prosper if local power suppliers are permitted to go ahead with comprehensive plans for building major new hydroelectric projects," said Kinsey M. Robinson, president of both WWP and PNP. "But northwest citizens will be denied prosperity if political power cliques are allowed to blockade private capital seeking to help relieve critical power shortages."

Robinson said the power combine would resist any effort by "blockaders" to stop its Snake river project, which he described as the largest hydroelectric development undertaken in the region by private capital.

Atom Icebreaker Vessel Is Planned

MOSCOW, Jan. 7 (AP)—Two leading Soviet scientists report Russian designers are working on an icebreaking vessel powered by atomic engines.

B. Golubov and L. Khitrin, members of the Soviet academy of sciences, wrote in the Moscow newspaper Evening News that designers also are busy on plans for miniature radio broadcasting units powered by atomic batteries.

They predicted that the Arctic wastes of the Soviet Union will be ultimately covered with a network of atomic power stations.

McCarthy Is Set to Battle 2 Committees

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Sen. Joseph P. McCarthy, R. Wis., said today he will fight to cut off funds of two Senate subcommittees which have criticized the administration's loyalty-security program.

McCarthy told a reporter he will speak on the Senate floor against appropriations for the constitutional rights subcommittee headed by Sen. Thomas C. Hennings, Jr., D. Mo., and the government employee security subcommittee under Sen. Olin D. Johnston, D. S. C.

Calling the "diservice" McCarthy said the subcommittees "are doing a tremendous disservice. They are wrecking the security program—what there is of it."

The Wisconsin Republican said the subcommittees under Democratic control "are doing exactly opposite" to a resolution passed by the Senate last year in which the Democrats, in effect, promised to continue investigations of communism.

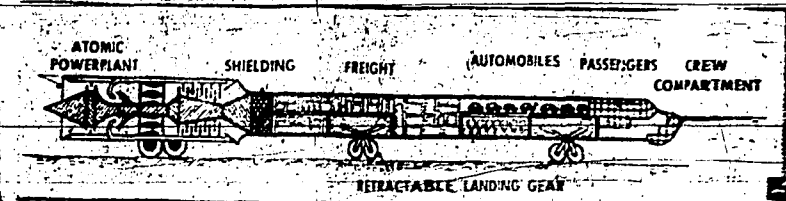
"Instead, we have two active Senate committees doing everything they can to make it hard on persons fighting communism," McCarthy said. "There is no reason why those committees should exist."

Funds Cut

The Hennings subcommittee, which received \$50,000 last year for eight months operation, has charged that the security program has deprived some persons of their constitutional rights to be confronted by the witnesses against them.

The Johnston subcommittee received \$125,000 last year. It was charged with the security program for federal workers and has charged that the administration's figures on persons fired as security risks are 90 per cent false.

Russian Plane of Future?

Mid-Air Refueling Is Slated For British Entry, Comet IV

LONDON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Britain's Comet IV jet airliner may use mid-air refueling next year to enable it to compete on the Atlantic run with long-range American jets, informed sources said today.

"There was no immediate comment from the DeHavilland Aircraft company but usually well-informed aviation sources said that the Comet IV, which is scheduled to go into service with British Overseas Airways sometime in 1957, will eventually be refueled in mid-air to enable it to fly non-stop from London to New York.

Chief argument in favor of the Boeing 707 and Douglas DC-7 aircraft which are competing with the Comet is that they could fly the Atlantic non-stop. The Comet IV, as currently designed, would have to make one refueling stop at either Gander, Newfoundland, or Prestwick, Scotland.

The aviation sources said that the plan to refuel the Comet in mid-air had been discussed several years ago but shelved at the time of the disastrous series of crashes which grounded all the jets in 1954.

Experiments were made with the prototype Comet I several years ago but proved unsuccessful since the refueling aircraft, a converted Lancaster bomber of World War II, flew too slowly for the sleek jet.

Governor Urging Airline Extension

BOISE, Jan. 2 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie says he is preparing a letter to the civil aeronautics board asking that a proposed Phoenix-to-Salt Lake City airline be extended to Pocatello.

Smylie, commenting on a letter from the Pocatello Chamber of Commerce requesting such an extension, said his office would do everything within its power to be helpful.

The chamber also sent its letter to Idaho's congressmen. The CAB will hold hearings in Washington Jan. 16 of three proposed air routes from or through Salt Lake City.

Progress for South Listed

TUSKEGEE, Ala., Jan. 2 (AP)—The South made "definite progress" toward racial integration in 1955, says Tuskegee Institute, even in areas "where tension or conflict predominates."

But there was no indication of "substantial adjustment or of extensive conflict," President L. H. Foster observed in his second annual race relations report.

"There are islands of tension and conflict in areas where adjustment has been made," he commented, "and some measures of adjustment are noted in areas where tension or conflict predominates."

"Overall, there seems to be definite progress toward desegregation."

The race relations report was inaugurated last year to replace the annual lynching survey which the Negro school used for two decades to measure white and Negro relationships. The lynching report was abandoned because Dr. Foster said it no longer accurately mirrors racial feelings.

Looking toward the relations "seems possible through many avenues."

Rolling in Dough, Dogs Solve Case

EL CENTRO, Calif., Jan. 2 (AP)—Dogs rolling in dough solved the case of the missing \$200,000.

The money, in non-negotiable checks, disappeared a week ago while en route from a bank here to Los Angeles via air.

No clues were found immediately. Then a tracer was put on other shipments on the plane. The mystery was solved, it was reported, with the disclosure that the envelope of checks had fallen into a crate containing dogs.

The pups chewed up the checks and used the paper for bedding, literally rolling in the dough.

Two Killed by Craft Accident

LANCASTER, Calif., Jan. 2 (AP)—An investigation was conducted today into the crash of a twin-engine plane in which a Hollywood stunt pilot and a 12-year-old boy lost their lives.

Bill Barnes, owner of Barnes Air Service here, said he watched in horror yesterday as the plane carrying his wife and two step-sons crashed at the edge of Rossmore airport after it made a low landing approach and hit power lines.

Killed in the flaming crash were veteran pilot Loren Reebe, 40, of North Hollywood, Calif., and Ross Durham, one of Barnes' stepsons. Mrs. Gladys Barnes suffered only serious injuries while her second son, Lamoyne Durham, 11, escaped injury.

Barnes said Reebe, a movie stunt pilot, was bringing Mrs. Barnes and the two boys back from a holiday trip to Las Vegas, Nev. Barnes, also a veteran pilot, said he awaited his family at the strip and saw the plane make the fatal approach.

Witnesses said the older boy was killed instantly before he could be freed from the burning wreckage. Reebe was thrown clear of the plane and died later at a hospital.

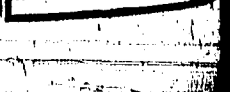

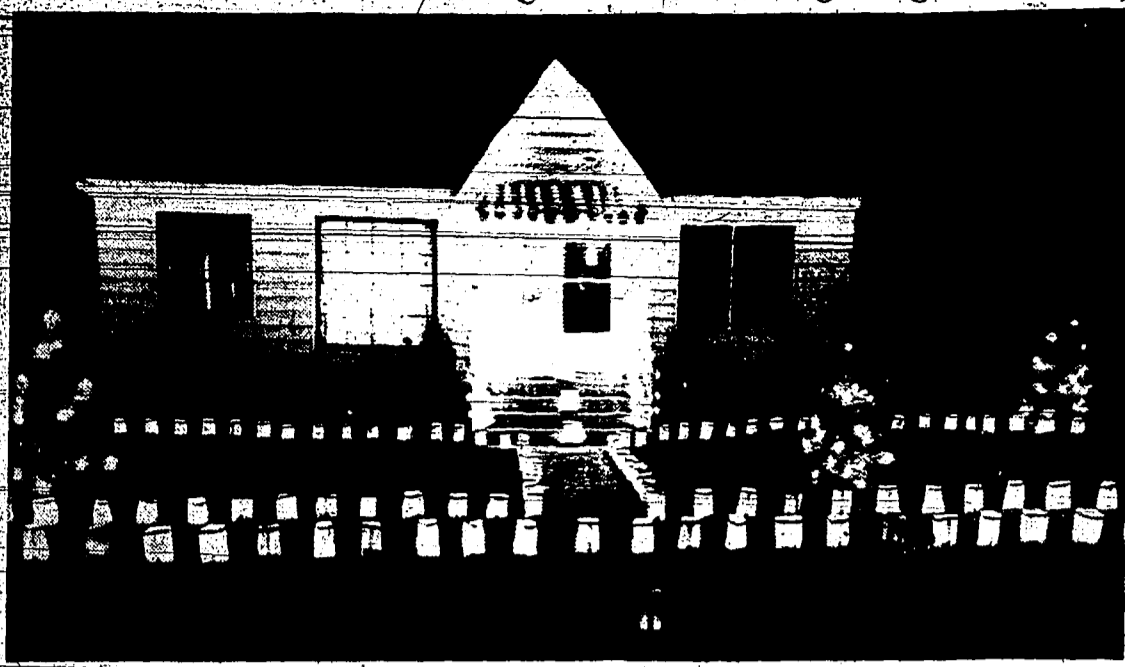

Exile Planned For Diehards

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Jan. 2 (AP)—The provisional government is going to ship 25 "troublemakers," including many Peronista diehards in civilian and military ranks to virtual exile on the chill, windswept flats of southern Patagonia. These men have been arrested over a period of a week by government authorities bent on smashing three "subversive" plots aimed at harassing provisional President Pedro Aramburu's regime by fires, sabotage and strikes. Whether ex-President Juan D. Peron is secretly directing his supporters from exile in Panama is not known. But copies of a purported letter from him to all "Peronistas" are being circulated. A series of suspicious fires has plagued Argentina. One destroyed a dockside customs warehouse. Another dock fire damaged several nearby navy ships. Twenty persons have been arrested in connection with a strange pre-dawn railroad station fire at Cordoba Thursday.

Ike's Administration Seeks Compromise Highway Plans

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The administration, under pressure from Republican congressional leaders, is seeking a compromise on its proposed highway construction program. Republican sources said the search for a compromise has delayed plans to have highway legislation ready for presentation to congress not long after its 1956 session opens tomorrow. The compromise deals with financing plans for the program. While no final decisions have been made, officials said, the administration is trying to develop a program which would include remnants of its original bond-financing plan as well as higher taxes on highway users as proposed by house Democrats.

Bride Discovers Tragedy in U. S.

ISLEIN, N. J., Jan. 2 (AP)—"I knew in my heart that we'd get together. I've never known happiness," says a German war bride who arrived in New York with her 3-week-old baby yesterday to learn that her husband died Friday. Mrs. Krista Holder found out the tragic news shortly after the plane landed. Her husband, Frank Holder, Jr., 34, Iselin, was injured in an explosion at the Cornell-Dubilier corporation in south Plainfield, where he was employed, the day before his wife gave birth to a daughter in Germany.

MINERAL VALUES Show '55 Boost

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The bureau of mines reports value of mineral production in the United States jumped 11 per cent in 1955. It rose to a new high of \$15,800,000,000, compared with a previous record of \$14,600,000,000 in 1953. The 1954 figure was \$14,000,000,000. "The 1955 rise was due almost entirely to increased production," the bureau said. "Although appreciably higher prices were noted for copper and natural gas, prices generally remained steady." Strong increases in production of fuels, copper and iron ore paced the increase. Nearly all commodities registered higher values in 1955, with metals leading the way with a 35 per cent increase. Fuels and non-metallic minerals each increased by more than eight per cent.

LONDON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II today named Rudolf Bing, manager of the New York Metropolitan opera, a commander of the British empire in her New Year's honor list. Bing, a Vienna-born impresario who headed the Edinburgh festival in Scotland before taking over the Met in 1950, joins President Eisenhower and Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., among Americans so honored.

The queen also honored Margot Fonteyn, the graceful British ballerina, in her New Year's list. Miss Fonteyn was named a dame of the British empire, the feminine equivalent of knighthood, and she will be known as Dame Margot.

The queen decorated 702 persons, including 106 women, in a list of honors that ranged from peers to 74-year-old miner.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Jan. 2 (AP)—Provisional President Pedro Aramburu told the Argentine people in a New Year's message that strengthening of democracy is his regime's steadfast goal.

"The most transcendental struggle of the last hundred years" was the way Aramburu described the revolution last fall that resulted in the downfall of Juan Peron. He said Argentina has emerged from "one of the darkest tyrannies that ever crushed a people."

Aramburu declared that his government is determined to achieve economic stability and pull the country out of the extremely difficult conditions left as "a sorry legacy of dictatorship."

He promised to increase salaries to match rising living costs.
