





### Survey States Seed Potatoes Crop Doubles

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—Idaho's 1955 crop of 3,167,000 bushels of certified seed potatoes was more than double the 1954 crop, the USDA reports today. The 1955 production was 70 percent greater than the 1949-53 average. Above average yields and increased acreage under certification produced the bumper crop. The 1955 production which met certification standards consisted of 2,167,000 bushels, with netted germs making up 92.5 per cent of the total. The total certified acreage harvested in 1955 was 12,245 compared to 6,100 in 1954.

### Idaho Expects High Interest In Politics, Boom, During '56

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—What's ahead for Idaho in 1956? Financial experts say business will be good and prosperity will continue on its high level of 1955. The state's population, though not expected to rise sharply, is slated for steady growth. Politics, long one of the Gem state's favorite pastimes, catches the spotlight. This is a national election year and Idaho voters must select a senator and two representatives for the 85th congress that will convene next January. In addition, the entire state of state legislators—29 representatives and 44 senators—will come up for review by the electorate. Chief interest will center about the race for the U. S. senate seat now held by Herman Welser, a Republican. He expects to be challenged in the August primaries by William Holden, Idaho folk. Alvin R. McCormack, Lewiston, is the only Democratic aspirant to the office to make known his intentions. McCormack finished third behind Glenn H. Taylor and Claude Burtenshaw in the 1954 Democratic primaries. Taylor has refused to confirm or deny persistent rumors he will again make the race. In Rep. Eamer E. Budge's solidly Republican second congressional district embracing most of southern Idaho no Democrat has raised his voice. The seat was in Democratic hands for only six years in recent history—from 1932 to 1938. Louise Shinduck, secretary to Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., here, is being touted as a Republican opponent of Rep. Grace Frost, the Democrat who represents Idaho's first congressional district. But however brightly the spotlight focuses on this year's congressional elections, Gov. Eubank E. Smylie won't be overlooked. His proposed constitutional amendment permitting him to succeed himself as Idaho's chief executive goes on the general election ballot in November. The proposition, already okayed by the legislature, needs only a bare verbal majority for passage. Except for verbal brawls with Democratic State Treasurer Enoch Moon over budget matters, Smylie was virtually unopposed in his first year in office. He has been talked about as a candidate for Dworshak's seat in 1960 and even as a vice presidential possibility this year. One of the most puzzling developments in Idaho centers around natural gas. A pipeline is under construction through the state from which Idaho will get about 30 million cubic feet of gas daily. That's for sure. There's less certainty about who will distribute the gas. The southern Idaho franchise finally went to Intermountain Gas company in December after the state supreme court had upset an earlier public utilities commission award to Idaho Natural Gas company. But Intermountain hasn't had much luck lining up local franchisees. On the other hand, cooperative distribution systems have signed up Pocatello and Burley and appear to have the upper hand in Shoshone and Idaho Falls. Moreover, Idaho Natural hasn't breathed its last. It has served notice it will appeal the case to the U. S. supreme court and already has asked the PUC to rehear the issue.

### Freedom Set For Japanese 'Tokyo Rose'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—The justice department said the notorious Tokyo Rose, who escaped a death sentence but was imprisoned for her World War II broadcasts on behalf of the Japanese, will be released Jan. 28. Iva Toguri d'Aquino began serving her 10-year sentence in the federal reformatory for women at Alderson, W. Va., Oct. 6, 1949. The slim, University of California graduate is being released early because of time-off for good behavior. Sally Is Left She leaves behind her in Alderson a partner in treason—Mildred Gillars, who beamed broadcasts to Americans from Berlin urging them to surrender under the name of Axis Sally. American-born Tokyo Rose once received a tongue-in-cheek citation from the U. S. navy for "greatly contributing to the morale" of American fighting men in the Pacific theater. She could have received the death penalty in her San Francisco trial for her disc-jockey propaganda program that was liberally laced with sex and sedition. At one point, she campaigned during intensive jungle fighting against the anti-malarial drug, Atabrine. Service physicians ruefully reported later her suggestions that the drug caused sterility had some effect on G.I.s.

The men reportedly stole a car in Nevada and abandoned it near Piler. The two left a ship at Long Beach, Calif., Friday on a 72-hour leave which ended at 7:30 a. m. Monday.

### Army Plans to Assist Aid Area Industry

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 4 (AP)—Army ordnance announced today it will try to do as much of its buying as possible in the flood disaster areas of northern California and Nevada. Col. C. A. Heath, commanding general, San Francisco ordnance district, said the office of defense mobilization has ordered his district to negotiate for procurement items at going prices without waiting for national advertisement of bids. "Our objective is to get employees of flooded plants back to work or to put labor to work where unflooded capacity exists," Heath said. "The more production dollars we can get into the stricken regions, the quicker their recovery will be." He explained that army ordnance is concerned with everything that shoots, is shot or rolls. This includes major and minor items which are produced widely in the district, principally in the metal working industries. Heath said he has sent representatives of ordnance procurement centers across the country to list current and future needs that can be filled by producers in the flood area. He said with his information, his headquarters will negotiate with business and industry in all California counties north of Kern and in Washoe county, Nevada, as part of an "operation beaver" to rebuild the economy.

Top Gangster Boss Leaves U. S. in Exile

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (AP)—Joe Adonis, one of the nation's most sinister underworld chieftains, went into voluntary exile yesterday to beat a new record for the fastest flight in a 1950 airplane.

Adonis, 53, was known in the underworld as Joe A. He has been called everything from a murder-for-hire boss to an overlord of a 20 billion dollar a year crime syndicate.

In effect, he was deported, but he agreed to go voluntarily to escape formal deportation proceedings and an eight months prison sentence.

Adonis sailed aboard the Italian liner Conte Biancamano for Naples, where his longtime underboss, associate, Charles Lucky Luciano, is living out his life in exile.

"I'm not going to look him up and I hope he doesn't look me up," Adonis told reporters.

Raised in Brooklyn, Adonis first got into trouble with the law in 1926 on a minor charge. Quietly, with little public notoriety, he branched into big time crime.

By 1950, the New York district attorney's office was labeling him "one of the nation's most notorious and flagrant law breakers"—a top boss of all illegal gambling east of the Mississippi river.

His downfall began before the Senate crime committee in 1951. He was headed by Sen. ESTE KENNEDY, D. Tenn. Before that committee he was described as one of the top six underworld syndicate men in the nation and an overlord in the old Murder, Inc. gang of the 1930s.

Wife of Dr. Otto John Breaks Silence, Tells Story, Stresses His Innocence

Dr. Otto John, the former West German security chief, has been described as a double turncoat since his dramatic return to West Germany last month. His wife has now agreed to end her self-imposed silence to reject the charges that her husband went in the East of his own will.

His broadcast and press conference convinced public opinion that he went over to the East Germans on his own accord.

"I still know that he was fighting for his own life," Frau John said. "And that he knew he would get no chance of escape until he had won the confidence of his captors."

From East Berlin the Russians took Otto John to Moscow for two weeks of incessant questioning. From there he went to the Crimea for two months "conspicuousness."

Only one year ago he was turned over to the East German authorities. They established him in a small house on the edge of the Zeuthener lake, just in the Soviet zone and beyond the southeastern corner of the Soviet sector of Berlin, under close guard.

"From the first day that I was there," Otto John told his wife, "I planned somehow to escape." In his letters to his wife he underlined words like "gezwungen" or "zwangsweise," which mean "forced" and "under compulsion."

At the Humboldt university on Dec. 12 John managed to "lose himself" from his guards by mingling with the crowd of students. He slipped out of a side door and found the Danish car waiting for him at the pre-arranged place.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Now comes the time when teachers knit their brows and talk to their pedagogical consciences. Should this child, so spotty in performance yet with so many good points, be held back to strengthen his weak places, or be sent ahead with a hope and a prayer? So much depends upon coming up with the right answer. So much depends on the circumstances of the child's background, and on the teachers who will find him in their classes.

When the school has been organized with an eye to the uncertain growth of the children, allowing room for their blank spots as well as for their full ones, the problem is not so difficult. It is possible then to so grade pupils that while they attend various classes fitting their grade of accomplishment in the subjects of the grade.

This requires the services of a program teacher who makes the individual programs and keeps track of the progress of the pupils. In this way children can work with their age groups and still get the instruction they must have to become well-grounded graduates.

But many schools cannot be graded in this way because there are not enough of these unevenly gifted pupils to warrant the services of the program teacher. Sometimes the head can take over this work, some-

times a skilled teacher can help these of her own group with the help of the other teachers concerned. Some such arrangement should be made, because repeating the whole grade is rarely necessary or wise.

Occasionally, very occasionally, when a pupil has lost a term because of illness he should repeat a grade—not so much because he lost the work—which must be made up, but because he must have time to get well without pressure. All good schools take care of this situation as a matter of course.

What about the pupil who has dragged along all term, doing as little as possible, yet making the grade? The teacher wonders if he does not need the discipline of a hold-back to wake him up. No. What he needs is work that challenges his sleeping abilities. Promote him, promote him twice if that will force his interest.

But the really "hopeless" one who, though intelligent, gets a 40 in arithmetic, 60 in spelling, reads haltingly, gives no trouble nor anything else all day long? That one stays back—He needs a thorough examination as to his physical and mental health, his home background, his life so far. That should have been done before term end, as soon as the teacher decided he was falling badly. But he should not go ahead until his condition has

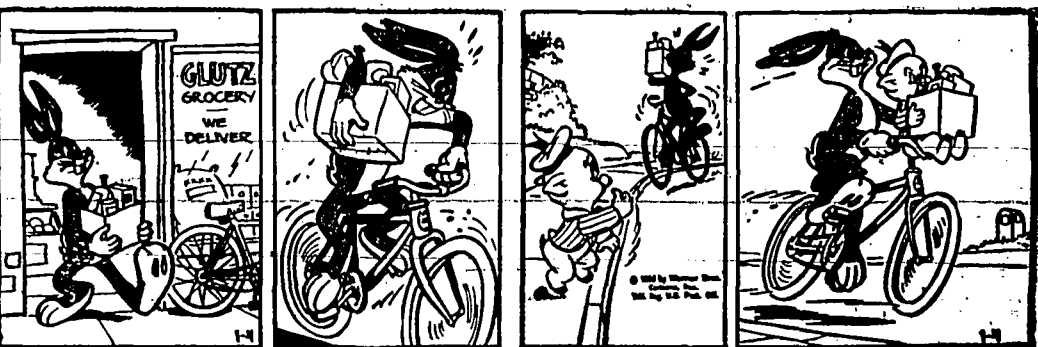
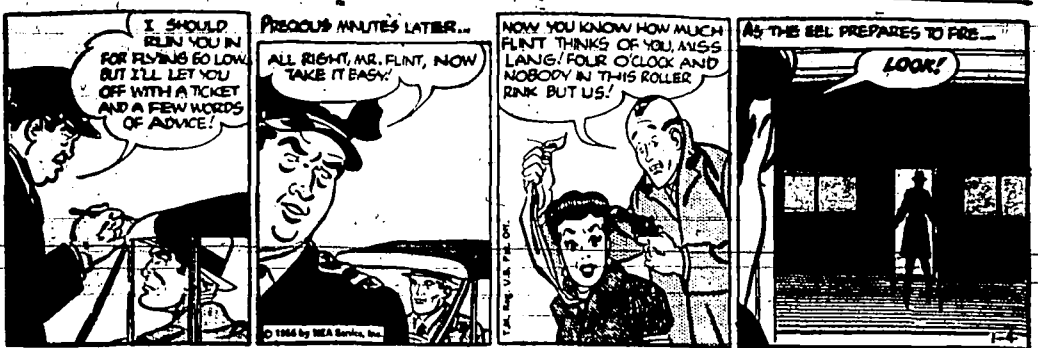

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### Korean Truce Switches Men To Other Side

TOKYO, Jan. 4.—Because of a truce agreement, unique in the history of modern warfare almost 50,000 Chinese and North Korean soldiers are member today of the armies they were fighting against four or five years ago.

They are the prisoners who returned to return to old territory under the Panmunjom armistice of 1953 which ended the Korean war. Most of these 50,000 men who once fought under the red flag are now wearing the uniforms of the South Korean and Chinese Nationalist armies.

History Recalled  
It was four years ago this week that U. S. Adm. R. E. Libby made an unprecedented proposal for the widespread tent at Panmunjom where United Nations and Communist negotiators were laying down terms for a Korean cease fire. Libby said the U. N. was demanding that no prisoner of war be sent home against his will.

The Communists refused. As a result, the Korean fighting wore on for another 18 months. There were another 140,000 casualties, including 9,000 U. S. dead.

Winn Principle  
At such a price the United Nations won its principle of voluntary repatriation of war prisoners.

When the long truce negotiations finally ended in July, 1953, 35,000 North Koreans and 15,000 Chinese chose freedom rather than a return to their Communist-dominated homeland.

On the United Nations side, 23 Americans, one Briton and a few more than 300 South Koreans chose to stay with the reds. Six of the Americans have since come home. One died in China in 1954. The other 16 remain behind the bamboo curtain.

GOODING, Jan. 4.—Leonard Ray Crawford has been granted a divorce from Veda Adele Crawford in district court here on the grounds of willful desertion. They were married in Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 6, 1948, and have two children.

The court ratified a separation agreement and ordered Crawford to pay \$50 a month child support. Nash J. Barinaga, Boise, was attorney for Crawford.
