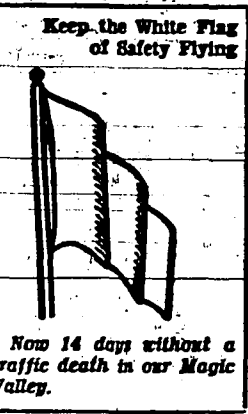

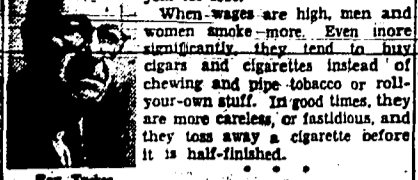

WASHINGTON - The American people's smoking and eating habits furnish almost as good an index of current and future economic conditions as statistics on industrial production, employment and profits, according to Washington experts in these seemingly unrelated fields.

STUDIED CIGARETTE BUTTS - In fact, one of the late Andrew Mellon's tax and financial assistants used to walk the streets, scanning the gutters before he submitted his final reports on prospects.

RELIABLE INFORMATION - On Mellon's suggestion, I interviewed him because "the greatest secretary of the treasury since Alexander Hamilton" said that his forecasts had been unusually reliable.

On this basis, Secretary Ezra Taft Benson's reports of tobacco prospects and 1955 performances delight experts at treasury, commerce and federal reserve.

CIGARETTE SALES 414 BILLION IN 1955 - The figures for 1955, the nation's most prosperous year, support this seemingly non-economic and non-conventional theory.

Cigarette sales in 1955 were 414 billion, less than the \$23 billion in 1933 and a record of 435.5 billion in 1952.

FOOD PURCHASES - Studies of food purchases by agriculture and commerce confirm this rosy outlook.

The increased demand for the more expensive meats, according to reporting retailers, partially accounts for the fact that urban prices remain high, although payments to farmers for cattle and hogs have dropped heavily.

Another significant sign is that out-of-season fruits and vegetables are selling at peak levels, as always happens when pocketbooks are bulging.

Economics, cigarettes and dietetics may seem to be entirely unrelated to the laymen, but not to the experts.

VIEWS OF OTHERS

DANGER OF PROVINCIALISM

In some of our western states, where water is at a premium, narrowly provincial views about the utilization of water supply have been expressed in recent years.

The incident in question has to do with the Columbia river, which rises in British Columbia, flows through a Canadian watershed for its first 465 miles, crosses the border and flows 745 miles in Washington and Oregon before emptying into the Pacific at Astoria.

The result would be to increase Canada's hydro-electric power supply by 5,000,000,000 kilowatt-hours a year and reduce the power production of United States dams on the Columbia by a fourth.

QUITTING SMOKING

It's resolution time. At midnight, perhaps a million people will resolve to quit smoking (a popular resolution) forever and ever.

Such are the reasons used by men and women to justify (to themselves) breaking of no-smoking New Year's resolutions.

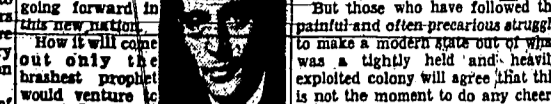

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

JAKARTA, Indonesia - Take 30 million people, an island chain rich in every resource, and independence won after more than 300 years of colonial rule, and you have the makings of an extraordinary experiment that is going forward in this new nation.

After a governmental crisis that began in June, Indonesians two months ago held their first national election. On the whole, it was an orderly election and there is hope that a new government can be formed with a stability and effectiveness at least equal to that of the present coalition.

During the weeks of the governmental crisis with the uncertainty of the election ahead, the military is reported to have been tempted to seize power. It would not have been difficult, since the military leaders comprise one of the most coherent and alert groups in the country and they are strongly anti-Communist in their outlook.

Blaming the United States for taking the side of the Indonesians in their struggle for independence, the Dutch have said that we should have known that these people were not ready for independence. Certainly, they were not ready for it, since they received no instruction from the Dutch in even the rudiments of self-government. But to have denied them their independence by the continuing use of force probably would have been futile in the long run and it would have added to the heritage of hate, which is one of the grave handicaps in the current struggle.

Our folklore is richly flavored with more than a mere sprinkling of myths concerning our animal life. To dispel some of it, here's another helping of facts vs. myths. Myth: Toads possess the ability to remain imprisoned under ground, sealed in rocks or in the cleft of a growing tree for years on end.

Fact: To be sure, almost every year there are stories of toads being blasted out of rock during excavations—operations or being dug up from great depths beneath hard-packed clay, or being released from within some building's cornice.

Myth: An hour of sleep behind midnight is more beneficial than an hour after midnight.

Fact: Certainly the value of sleep may be enhanced by regularity of habit and quiet, but it bears no relation whatever to the clock. Besides, I seem to wake more refreshed from sleep in a darkened room.

Myth: A person who hears pearly deaf as an adder.

Fact: A great deal of controversy has been waged on the hearing ability of snakes, whether added to any other kind. Fact is, all snakes lack a middle ear and they have no eardrum. Despite widespread popular beliefs, snakes cannot hear airborne sounds. That goes too for the python. However, they are sensitive to vibrations in the ground on which they are resting.

Myth: It is dangerous to eat acid foods with milk—the acids make the milk curdle, like strawberries and cream.

Fact: The milk will curdle, regardless—if fruit acids don't do it, the stomach acids will. If you can again they would have emerged under their own power and it would have happened the following rainy period.

In unusually dry years, it is conceivable that a toad might possibly skip a year and not emerge until the next rainy period—but many would not survive the second year.

AN ENCOURAGING RECORD

After all the effort that has been put forth throughout Magic Valley in recent years, it was reassuring to note that traffic fatalities dropped off appreciably during 1955.

We can understand why all law enforcement officials in the valley are encouraged by a sharp reduction in automobile fatalities.

State Police Lieut. Clark Hand was among the law enforcement authorities who expressed gratification that traffic fatalities in Magic Valley had dropped from 58 in 1954 to 34 in 1955.

On behalf of every member of district four of the state highway patrol, said Lieutenant Hand, "I wish to extend my appreciation to all drivers for helping reduce the number of traffic deaths in Magic Valley.

Hand urged all Magic Valley drivers to continue to exercise caution. He urged courtesy on the part of all drivers, pointing out that excessive speed is the cause of a majority of traffic accidents.

The cautious driver is usually a careful driver, he said. "A little less speed and a little more thought will not only reduce the traffic deaths and accidents in Magic Valley but throughout the state as well."

All this will be encouraging news to those who have played any part over the years in trying to cope with the ever-increasing traffic problem. It will arouse the more enthusiastic to even greater efforts and rekindle hopes in others who may have felt at times that their contributions were unavailing.

Copied with all this effort has come an endorsement of the state traffic patrol and such new devices as improved radio equipment and radar.

The more this combined effort is brought to bear, the sooner the irresponsible driver will be run to cover and with that change will come a proportionately lower loss of human life, not to mention all that will be saved in needless destruction of property, broken homes, permanently crippled bodies and headaches.

Let's join with Lieutenant Hand in a determined hope that traffic fatalities in Magic Valley will be reduced another 25 per cent in 1956.

ANOTHER PAGE OF HISTORY

**JEROME**, Jan. 5—Of the 56 herds on test in the Gooding-Lincoln-Jerome Dairy Herd Improvement association testing unit No. 2, three herds averaged more than 40 pounds of butterfat per cow for December. Ben Russell, tester, reports.

Wayne Mecham, Hunt, with 15 registered and grade Holsteins, averaged 1324 pounds of milk and 48 pounds of butterfat. Reed Taylor and sons, Wendell, with 29 registered and grade Holsteins averaged 1285 pounds of milk and 43.2 pounds of butterfat. Kenneth King, Wendell, with 13 grade Holsteins, averaged 1248 pounds of milk and 42.1 pounds of butterfat.

Russell reports the following cows in his unit averaged 80 pounds or more of butterfat for the month. Blue Ribbon, registered Holstein, owned by Jack Edwards, Dietrich, averaged 2,780 pounds of milk and 102.9 pounds of butterfat.

Polly, grade Holstein owned by Reed Taylor and sons, Wendell, averaged 2,940 pounds of milk and 102.9 pounds of butterfat.

Toby, registered Holstein owned by Archie Malone, Jerome, averaged 2,200 pounds of milk and 95.9 pounds of butterfat.

Queen, grade Holstein owned by Arnold Main, Jerome, averaged 2,200 pounds of milk and 92.4 pounds of butterfat.

Buty, grade Holstein owned by Wayne Mecham, Hunt, averaged 2,700 pounds of milk and 87.7 pounds of butterfat.

Valentine, registered Holstein owned by Jack Edwards, Dietrich, averaged 2,300 pounds of milk and 80 pounds of butterfat.

**Noted French Singer Is Dead At Age of 82**

**PARIS**, Jan. 5 (AP)—Mistinguett, the ageless beauty of the French music hall whose "million dollar legs" charmed three generations of theater-goers, died today in an oxygen tent.

She was actually 82 but for years she insisted she was only 67 and her friends who had watched her play the role of a beautiful young girl only a few years ago went along with that.

She suffered a stroke on Christmas eve and a few days later developed double pneumonia. Yesterday she was placed in an oxygen tent by her 51-year-old doctor son who remained by her bedside.

**Affairs Cited**—Mistinguett didn't marry until the middle 1940s, but before that she had many love affairs. One of them was with the French comedian Maurice Chevalier. It lasted ten years.

Mistinguett and Chevalier were the two biggest names in the French music hall from their first appearance together in the Folies Bergere. They still were when she died.

Mistinguett was born Jeanne Marie Bougrois in 1873 at Engennes-Bains near Paris, daughter of a Belgian upholsterer and French mother.

**Gets Stage Name**—She received her stage name in 1894 when Parisian show promoter Saint Marcel billed her as "Mistinguett" and gave her \$1 a day to sing three popular songs.

The name stuck and in later years she was never called anything but Mistinguett. And when anyone heard the name they thought of legs.

She insured her legs once for three million dollars but she also was known for her "champagne smile"—a combination that made her wealthy as well as well-liked.

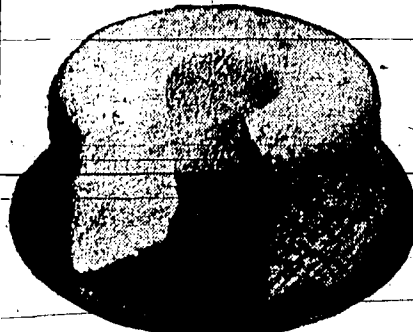

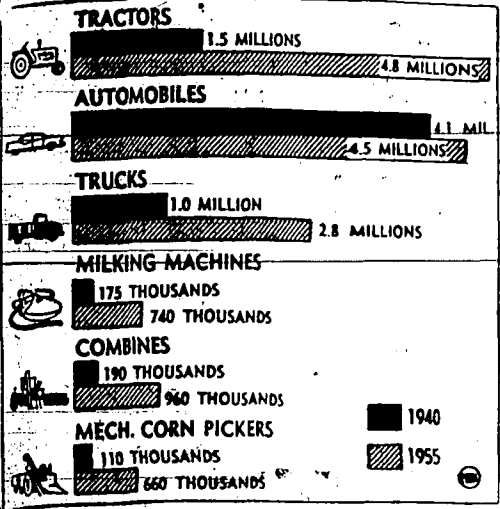

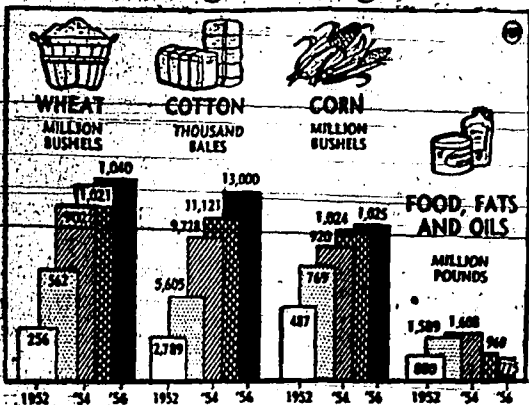

### Statistics Report 4,589,000 of U. S. Citizens Are Alcoholics

NEW YORK, Jan. 5 (AP) — The freshest and most scientifically tested statistics place the number of alcoholics in the United States at 4,589,000, of whom 2,055,000 are women. This amounts to 4,300 alcoholics for each 100,000 of population on a nation-wide basis. But the nation's capital showed a rate of 7,800 per 100,000 population which was the highest on a regional basis.

Of the states, California led all the rest, with a rate of 7,050, followed by Connecticut, Nevada, Delaware, New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Illinois in that order. Only one state had a rate of fewer than 2,000 per 100,000 population—Idaho with 1,770. In ascending order from this least alcoholic state were South Carolina, Alabama, Iowa, Kansas, South Dakota, Utah and Mississippi.

The new statistics are for the year 1955 and showed only a slight overall increase from those of the previous year—from 4,380 per 100,000 population to 4,589. This carried further a slow increase in rate which

began after 1930 which showed the lowest recorded, 2,680 per 100,000 population.

The rate for 1910 was 4,000 for 100,000 population.

Those are the statistics—from the Yale university center for the study of alcohol. The question is, what is to be made of them? Yale's statistical scientists, Mark Keller and Vera Efron, approached this question with extreme caution.

If you took the numbers of alcoholics year by year, you could then say alcoholism was increasing at an enormous rate. But the total population has increased enormously over those years, they pointed out—and so the only meaningful measure of increase is the rate per 100,000.

But one relatively clear statistical demonstration was the ratio of male alcoholics to female alcoholics. In 1953 it was 5.5 males to each female. In 1952 it was 5.3 to one, but the year before it was 5.5 to one. Indeed, since 1910 the ratio has varied only narrowly—between 6.3 to one (in 1910) to 5.2 to one (in 1925 and 1930). So there is no relative rise in alcoholism among women.

The statisticians noted strange statistical occurrences in their tabulation of alcoholism by states, but had no explanation for it. In Arkansas, Maine and North Dakota the rate approximately doubled between 1940 and 1953. In 1940 these three were among the lowest. And Nevada showed the least increase—a mere two per cent. In 1940 it headed the states; in 1953 it was fourth. But shifts in only a few positions in the rating were "meaningless."

### Crews Open North, South Travel Road

By The Associated Press  
Traffic moved freely between north and south Idaho for the first time in almost two weeks Wednesday as the highway department washed final repairs on a washout of U. S. 95 between Riggin and New Meadows.

The road disappeared Dec. 22 when the flood-swollen Little Salmon river took out huge slabs of pavement along the canyon wall for about a mile and a half.

The department completed a temporary bridge 2 1/2 miles south of Riggin and opened the route to passenger cars and small pickup trucks.

It warned, however, that repairs still in progress might force further delays. The road was still closed to buses and heavy trucks.

Repairs to U. S. 95 and other roads and bridges damaged by the December floods are expected to total some \$300,000.

Most of the other damage has been repaired, except for a few slide areas on state route 17 between Banks and Crouch, where the road was still restricted Wednesday to one-way traffic.

The highway department reported a general improvement in road conditions elsewhere during the day as soaking temperatures melted the snow and ice.

The temperature climbed to 87 in Boise and hovered in the 40s and low 50s in other communities of the state.

The weather bureau predicted more balminess Thursday, with readings of 49 degrees in northern Idaho and 59 in south. They weren't expected to fall far below freezing Wednesday night.

There were scattered icy patches on the roads during the day and a general snow cover in the mountainous sections of southeastern Idaho.

The highway department warned of dangerous conditions on Tomcat Hill between Shoshone and Challis and on Harvard Hill between Potlatch and St. Maries.

Motorists were warned to watch for rocks rolled onto U. S. 10 by melting snow between Coeur d'Alene and the Montana line.

### Flood Losses For Railroad Told by Chief

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5—The record storms and floods in Oregon, northern California and Nevada over the Christmas holiday period cost the Southern Pacific about five million dollars, the company reported today. D. J. Russell, SP president, said the loss represents flood damage, operating expenses of battling the storm and loss of revenue.

Russell explained the revenue loss is due not only to suspended service and consequent inability to move traffic, but also damage to properties of shippers which has put them temporarily out of business.

A large share of the loss, he said, occurred on the Northwestern Pacific railroad, an SP subsidiary serving the area between Tiburon and Eureka.

NWP expects it will be another three weeks or so before the line is opened to Eureka and Arcata. It is still out of service from Willits north.

The SP called out several thousand men, including the forces of the Morrison-Knudson company, to reopen all four main line routes radiating from San Francisco. Most of these men are still at work, bringing the railroad back to the condition it was in before the storm.

### Step Is Noted In Object of Atomic Plant

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5—The atomic energy commission yesterday took another step toward the objective of stimulating private ownership of atomic energy facilities for peaceful uses.

AEC Chairman Lewis Strauss announced approval of a program to encourage private industry to build and operate plants for the chemical processing of irradiated fuel elements from research and power reactors.

The idea would be, the AEC said, to have such privately owned processing plants in readiness to work in conjunction with commercial atomic power plants when they get into operation.

Chemical processing plants constitute an integral portion of the "full cycle" of nuclear reactors.

That is, atomic fuel like uranium or plutonium or thorium becomes contaminated as it is used, with fissionable products after it is used for awhile and must be chemically processed to remove them.

The fuel that remains from this preparation can be cycled again. Some of the fission products can be put to peaceful purposes, and the remainder must be disposed of as waste.

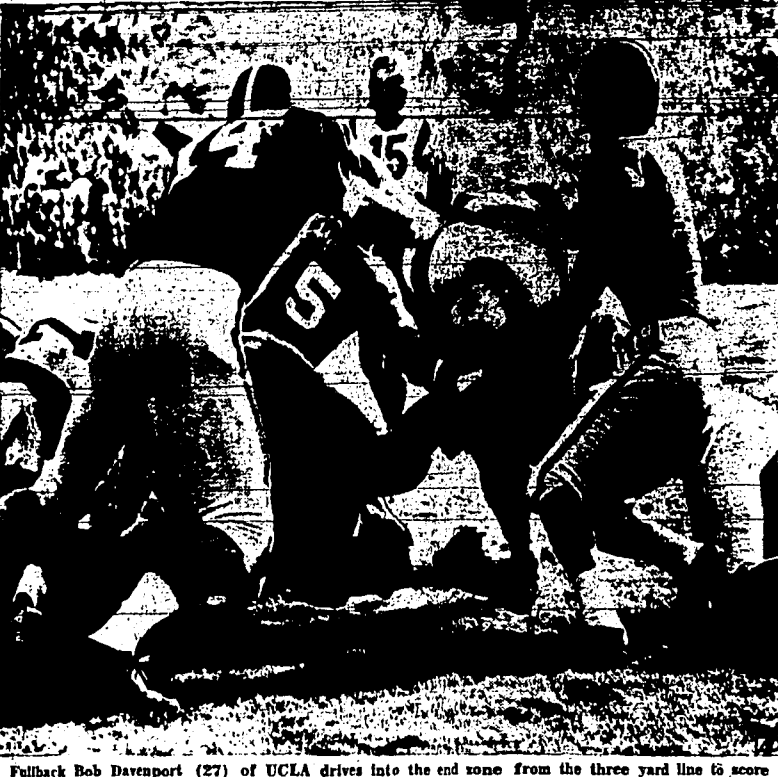

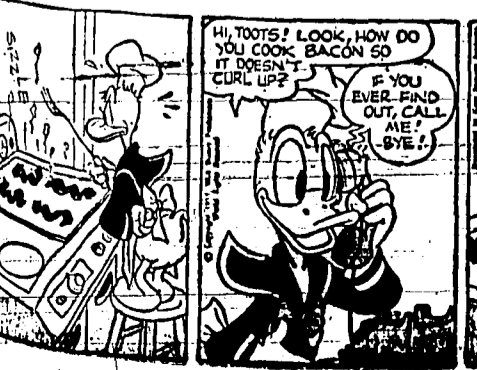
