AMERICAN FARMERS UNITED! Much as everyone may be hoping for some solution to the so-called farm problem, President Eisenhower's proposed billion-dollar "soil bank" looks like another one of those government nostrums—fantastic and impractical right from the start.

It has all the appearance of a desperate, last resort attempt to ease the pain of the American farmers. But actually, it would be only a palliative offering nothing in the way of a sound remedy with lasting effect.

It amounts to another anesthetic right at the time when U.S. department of agriculture officials are pointing out that the government's investment in surplus farm products has climbed close to \$8,750,000,000—the largest on record!

Strangely enough, the farm problem seems to have the entire country stumped. Not so long ago, Secretary of Agriculture Benson openly solicited suggested solutions, but as yet no one has come forth with a logical answer.

So we flounder around with a "prosperity" top-sliced out of balance—labor enjoying the highest wage, hour and fringe benefit standards in its history; business piling up profits (before taxes) at an unprecedented rate, and the farmer, by ugly contrast, getting less and less for practically everything he sells and paying more and more for nearly everything he buys.

Much as the modern politico-economists might ridicule the idea, even though they haven't the answer, what would be wrong in suggesting that the farmers try to work out their own salvation, instead of looking to Washington for some miracle formula subsidized by the taxpayers?

Why not take a page out of organized labor's book, for instance? It was not so long ago that the average laboring man was regarded as having not a ghost of a chance against big business. Now this same working man is part of a powerful labor force almost bigger than the government itself.

These labor forces didn't sit around and wait for the government to give them a hand-out. They formed a powerful organization that made the average politician sit up and take notice.

They had one thing to sell, and that was labor, a vital part of our national economy. Unless they received the wages, hours and other conditions they wanted, they knew they could bring industry to a standstill. At first, big business fought it out with big labor at the risk of going broke. Then the employer decided it was easier to acquiesce and pass the added expense on to the consumer.

Like labor, the farmers have only one thing to sell—the crops they produce. But these crops are just as vital to our national economy. And what power these farmers would have if they could exercise similar controls over their wares! So why not?

### "Frictionless" Auto Engines Are Invented

LONDON, Jan. 13 (AP)—A British scientist claimed today to have invented a "frictionless" automobile engine that can run 2000 miles without overhauling.

Millionaire inventor George Bradshaw said that "frictionless" double-ended pistons between 2000 cylinders made the engine possible. Bradshaw, 67, was a top scientist for the British admiralty during World War II.

He said the engine is "arcooled" and can run on any fuel.

"I can build it any size, even 1,000 horsepower," he said.

A spokesman for the Bradshaw company, which has built three prototypes of the engine, said the invention may revolutionize motorizing just as the jet engine changed air travel.

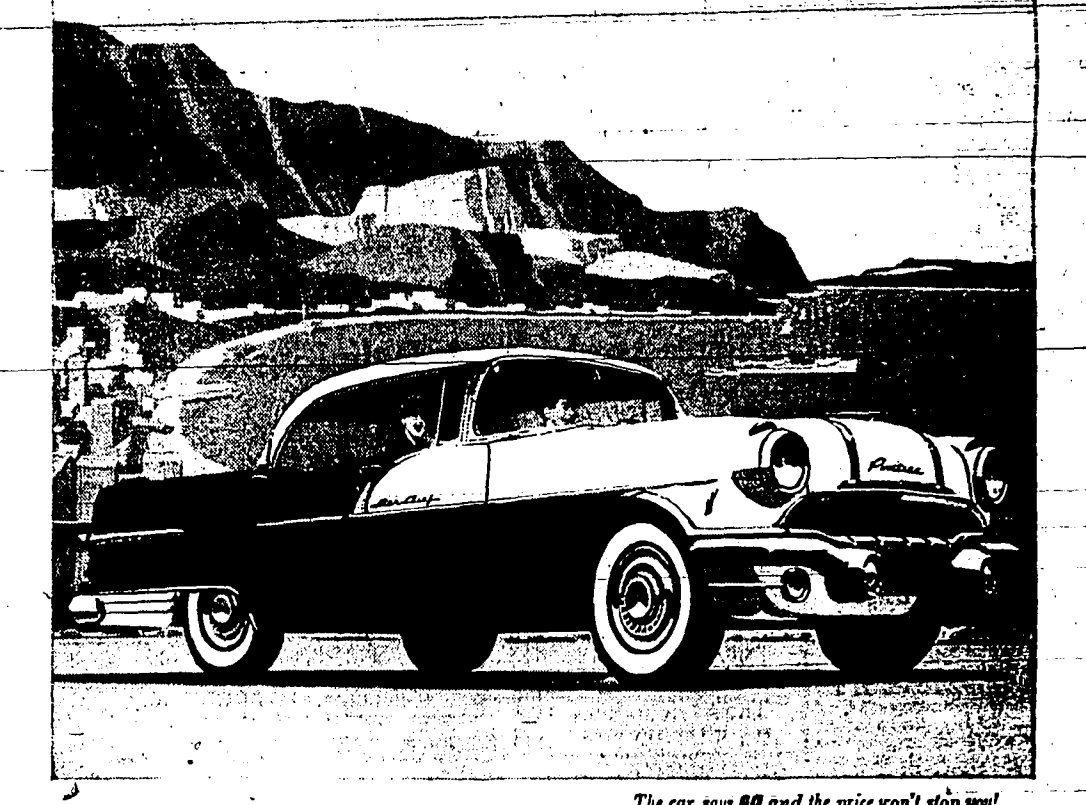

### Pakistan Asks U. S. to Enter Baghdad Pact

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Jan. 11 (AP)—Pakistan spokesman here said he believes the United States should join the Baghdad pact, which is erecting a defense wall between Russia and the strategic Middle East.

Said Hassan, chairman of the pact's economic committee, expressed hope America will accept formal membership in the British-sponsored alliance, to which it already has pledged its full support.

Hassan said also he hopes more of "our brethren in the Arab world" will join the pact, whose present members are Britain, Pakistan, Turkey, Iran and Iraq.

There appeared to be little immediate prospect of recruiting further Arab members. A recent proposal that Jordan should join touched off a wave of riots and strikes in that country that forced two governments out of office in a month.

Reports from Damascus today said 300 Jordanians have fled to Syria to escape prosecution for taking part in the riots, which are said to have been financed by Egypt and Saudi Arabia and organized by the Communists.

Other Damascus reports said Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Syria, in a new effort to wean Jordan away from the West, have offered to pay that country more than \$2 million dollars a year to replace the aid it now receives from Britain.

Egyptian Premier Gamal A. Nasser sent a cable today to Samir al Rifai, Jordan's latest premier, congratulating him on his pledge that Jordan will join no new pacts while he is in office.

### Nixon's Manager Files Libel Case

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 11 (AP)—Vice President Richard Nixon's 1952 national campaign manager accused a national magazine in a \$1,000,000 libel suit yesterday with calling him Nixon's secret link to the underworld.

The former campaign manager, Alty Murray M. Chotiner, filed the suit in superior court yesterday against "Behind the Scenes" magazine, naming most of the magazine's officers and about two dozen John Doe as defendants.

Chotiner charged that he was referred to as Nixon's underworld link in an article published in the March issue of the magazine. He said it was "but one of a series of attacks that are being launched by those who seek to discredit the vice president for political purposes."

### Newspaper Strike Settlement Nears

DETROIT, Jan. 12 (AP)—The Detroit newspaper strike, one of the longest big city shutdowns in history, appeared headed toward settlement.

But all sides, and neutral government mediators as well, cautioned that hitchhike could develop to stall resumption of publication by the Detroit News, Times and Free Press.

The strike that closed all of them entered its seventh week yesterday. Publishers said they had reached tentative agreement with all three mechanical departments unless currently on strike—the stereotypers, the printers and the mailers.

### FBI Slates Three Parleys in Idaho

BOISE, Jan. 12 (AP)—The first of three FBI law enforcement conferences on auto theft will be held here April 18, R. N. Hestony, special agent in charge of the Boise, Mont., office said yesterday.

Two other Idaho sessions will be at Pocatello, April 12, and Moscow, April 17. Hestony said the conferences will be aimed at bringing about added coordination between law enforcement agencies.

### Divorce Granted

District Judge Hugh A. Behar granted a divorce Thursday to Barbara Fry from Floyd Fry.

Mrs. Fry was given custody of three minor children, awarded \$100 a month for their maintenance and support, plus all the household articles and furnishings. Fry was allowed to retain a 1953 automobile and an equity in real property. Rayborn, Rayborn and Kramer, Twin Falls law firm, represented Mrs. Fry. H. N. Jewell was attorney for Fry.

### Crop-Killing Cold Waves and Long Drought Plague Areas

Florida's crop-killing cold wave went into its eighth day today and a worsening drought in Texas stirred demands for a special legislative session.

Florida's hurried weather forecasters said it should start warming up a little tomorrow afternoon. But \$2 million dollars worth of crops have already been destroyed and cold weather fires have killed six persons.

The patience of high-paying vacationers was just about at an end even though the sun breaks through in the daytime, brisk northwest winds make swimming and sunbathing a risky proposition.

It was a chilly 45 at Miami early today, which put the resort city in about the same class as Boston, which had 40. Other southern cities fared worse as Baton Rouge, La., registered 31 degrees and Atlanta, Ga., 33.

In Texas, alarm increased over the state's seven-year drought. State Sen. Jimmy Phillips, a candidate for governor, said a special session of the state legislature is the "only hope" for solving Texas' pressing water problems.

Meanwhile, residents had to water their lawns in many areas and forecasters saw no rain for the parched state until at least the end of January.

### Navy Jet Planes Smash In Midair

PEARL HARBOR, Jan. 12 (AP)—The navy said yesterday two Cougar jets from the carrier Shangri-La collided in the air halfway between the mainland and Hawaii Monday, killing one of the pilots.

The dead pilot was identified as Lt. (jg) Marion G. Herring, 26, Pine Valley, Calif. The second pilot, Lt. Robert K. McNeil, 31, Salem, Ore., bailed out at 14,000 feet and was rescued 30 minutes later. The jets were practicing an interception mission.

### Date Is Set For Trial of Bomb Slayer

DENVER, Jan. 12 (AP)—John Gilbert Graham's claim he was insane at the time he is accused of killing 45 persons aboard an airliner will be tried before a jury beginning March 8.

Trial of the 33-year-old defendant on his plea of innocent by reason of insanity was ordered yesterday at the request of defense attorneys despite reports of four psychiatrists that Graham was sane last Nov. 1. That is the date he is accused of planting a dynamite bomb in the luggage placed aboard a United Air lines plane by his mother, Mrs. Daisie E. King, 55.

### Blaine Budget In 1956 Set by County Board

HAILEY, Jan. 13—Blaine county commissioners set up a tentative current expense budget of \$77,915.06 Tuesday afternoon. The budget will be approved in February. Last year the budget was \$72,700. The increase of \$5,145 will be used for election expenses and official bonds for officers. Wayne Clark, chairman of the board said.

The road and bridge fund budget of \$100,000 exceeds last year's budget by \$20,000. Clark said this additional sum has been budgeted to rebuild and oil four miles of road to the Little Wood River dam north of Carey and to put a sealcoat on the Triumph mine road.

Other funds remain the same as last year. The county agent's budget is \$3,300, the noxious weed control budget is \$9,500, and the county surveyor \$100.

The charity and hospital budget was set at \$19,483, department of public assistance, \$730, and county physician, \$1,720.

In the current expense budget is included county recorder, auditor and clerk, \$11,485; sheriff, \$15,903.52; assessor, \$8,985; treasurer, \$7,460; prosecuting attorney, \$4,375; county commissioners, \$4,950; elections, \$4,000; district court, \$1,700; probate court, \$4,084.02 justices of the peace, \$425; public health, \$4,170; courthouse, \$5,242.50; coroner, \$650; and miscellaneous, \$4,545.

### Crow Indians Set Prices on Dam Projects

CROW AGENCY, Mont., Jan. 13 (AP)—A five-million-dollar price was fixed Tuesday by the Crow Indians of Montana for the government to build a dam on the Yellowstone river, and give it to the Crows 60 years hence.

After years of haggling in which cries were raised that the project would depopulate the last of the Indians' open buffalo hunting grounds, the Crow Indian council came to the decision in a seven-hour, argument-filled meeting. The vote Wednesday night was 148-137 for this proposition:

The Crows would reserve the right to all mineral rights in the 6,997 acres involved in southeastern Montana. The tribe would reserve the right to use water in the proposed Big Horn river reservoir for recreation purposes.

The bureau of reclamation would pay 1 1/2 million dollars in advance, and \$150,000 a year for 50 years.

Ownership of the dam, hydro-electric plant, all other fixtures and facilities built at the damsite would revert to the Crow Indians.

Next development will be reaction from the bureau in Washington, D. C.

### Decorated "GI" Rejoins Service

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 13 (AP)—Llewellyn M. Chilson, 38, the nation's second most decorated soldier of World War II, has enlisted in the army for the fourth time, it was disclosed today.

Chilson, who considers Dayton, O., his home, signed up for his fourth hitch yesterday at the armed forces recruiting station here. This time he will be an anti-aircraft specialist with the 451st AAA battalion.

Chilson, who is outranked only by film star Audie Murphy in the number of decorations—his honors, fought with the 45th Infantry division through North Africa, Sicily, Salerno beach, Anzio, southern France and Germany. He was wounded twice.

"I always like the army," Chilson said after signing up the fourth time. "I guess I'll make a career of it and stay in at least 20 years."

### Algerian Leader Denies Resigning

PARIS, Jan. 13 (AP)—Both the French government and Jacques Soustelle denied today that he had resigned as governor general of Algeria.

Informed sources said earlier that he had offered his resignation, although the government of Premier Edgar Faure could refuse to accept it.

After the denial, the informed sources said Faure telephoned Soustelle in Algeria this morning and persuaded him not to resign.

Soustelle, now in Algeria, was reported to have sent in his resignation because of the cool reaction in France and in Algeria to his plans for integrating the territory with metropolitan France.

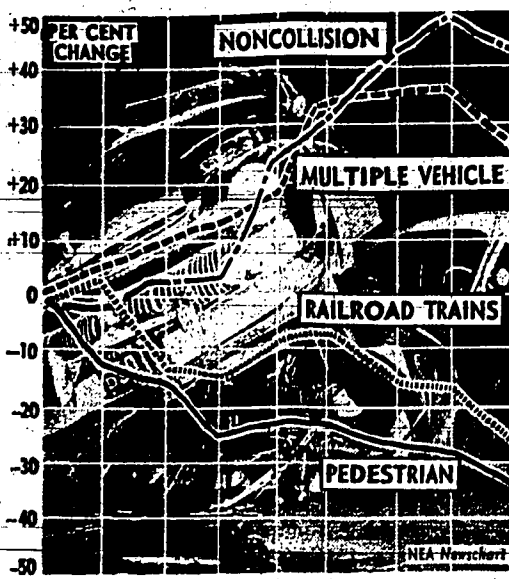
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### Trend of Death



The estimated 38,500 motor vehicle deaths in 1955 continued the strong upward swing of fatalities since the end of World War II. But the increase in deaths has not occurred in all types of accidents, according to the National Safety Council. As chart above, from council data, shows, since 1946, pedestrian deaths and deaths from collisions with trains, streetcars and bicycles have decreased. On the other hand, deaths from multi-vehicle collisions and non-collision accidents have increased sharply. Information on types of accidents for 1955 is not yet available, but the 1946-54 period well illustrates the divergent trend in accident types. (NEA)

### Family's Attitudes Observed As Clue for Ike's Intentions

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 (AP)—The substantial majority of White House news reporters who are convinced that President Eisenhower will not run again are much influenced by the attitude of the family.

Long before Mr. Eisenhower was struck, Washington was discussing the report that Mrs. Eisenhower opposed a second term. She was said to be supported by her son, Maj. John S. Eisenhower, and by her mother, Mrs. John S. Doud.

Reports of the family attitude toward a second term appear to be solidly founded. All hands, however, do not give the same weight to the influence of the President's family upon his political decisions. It has been revealed that Mr. Eisenhower has discussed his political future with some of his associates and plans to explore the subject much further with them. He said so last Sunday at Key West.

Some of his top political associates, among whom would be several likely to have been in on the discussions, recently have been getting together to canvass the 1958 prospects. Former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, several cabinet members and at least one former army comrade were parties to the various exchanges.

It was their judgment, perhaps based on ideas some of them had exchanged with the President, that his son and womenfolk would have little to do with his final decision on a second term. It is quite obvious that family opposition has not yet persuaded Mr. Eisenhower to close the door to another campaign for the White House.

He has said he has not finally made up his mind. Now comes James C. Hagerty, presidential press secretary, with some carefully chosen words of comment on the fact that Mr. Eisenhower's name will be presented in the Illinois presidential primary. Illinois Gov. William G. Stratton announced yesterday that he would enter Mr. Eisenhower as a Republican presidential candidate.

Hagerty said there would be no statement of assent or dissent from the White House on Stratton's plan. He emphasized, as did Mr. Eisenhower at Key West, that the "ultimate decision" has been made. And, Hagerty added, "That decision he, and he alone, will make."

The family attitude toward another four White House years could not fail to have some influence with the President. But there is no evidence that family opposition will be controlling.

There would be precedent for Mr. Eisenhower to reject family advice to leave the White House while the going was good. The late Robert E. Sherwood in his book, "Roosevelt and Hopkins," recalled that Mrs. Roosevelt was sturdily opposed to a third term.

FDR usually accepted her advice on politics. But not that time. He didn't say yes and he didn't say no right up to the time the 1940 Democratic national convention was in session. Then Mr. Roosevelt released the hundreds of delegates who had been pledged in primaries and by state leaders without either his consent or opposition. But the delegates wouldn't shoo away. Although released, they nominated FDR again. It was the best organized spontaneous draft on record. Back there in 1930, as now, the great majority of party leaders wanted the man in the White House to stay put.

### Flying Saucer Viewer Looks On New Sight

BOISE, Jan. 13 (AP)—Kenneth Arnold, the man who set off the flying saucer furore in 1947, now sees 31,200 balloons before his eyes. And that's no fooling.

Arnold went to a government surplus sale at Ogden, Utah, to buy 500 salt water distillers and came home with enough of the balloon-shaped gadgets to cover the large lot beside his Boise home.

They cost him \$80—the one and only bid on the carload lot of emergency distillers that cost the government \$373,000. Arnold said he was told he had to take the whole lot or nothing.

"A real bargain," he said, surveying the mass of balloons that cost him less than one-tenth of a cent apiece. "But what do you do with them?"

The distillers are used to convert sea water to fresh water and are stored as life saving equipment aboard ships and planes.

Arnold set off the flying saucer scare in June of 1947 when he reported seeing "nine objects in the air in the vicinity of Mt. Rainier, Wash., while he was flying his plane in the sky."

An afternoon joint session with the men is scheduled for Thursday, Dan Warren, state 4-H club leader, will speak.

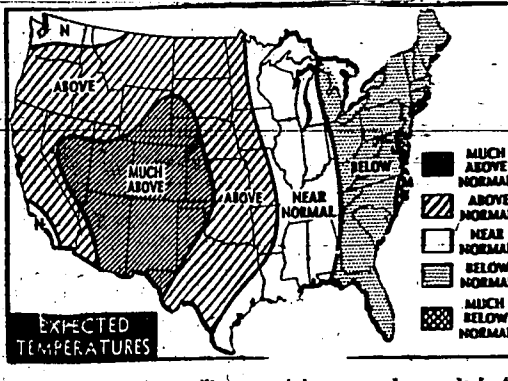

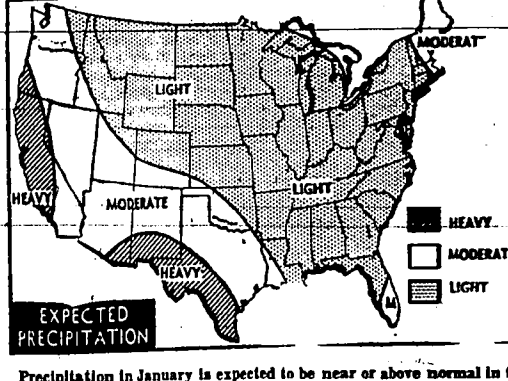

### 'Lost Initiative' Is Noted by Acheson

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 (AP)—Former Secretary of State Dean Acheson charged last night that the United States has lost the "initiative" in the cold war and is drifting away from its western allies.

In a speech before the Woman's National Democratic club, Acheson said there are indications of a "timid, hesitant approach" by the United States in the Middle East. He added that "the time bomb of Quemoy and Matsu is ticking away. The hour it is set to go off is not known."

Acheson made these and other assertions in support of his charge that in cold war struggle between the Communists and the free world the "initiative... has not recently been in western hands."

### Union's Board Votes Aid for Mine Strikers

DENVER, Jan. 13 (AP)—A program of aid and support to 900 metal miners still on strike in the Coeur d'Alene, Ida., district has been unanimously adopted by the executive board of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, (I.M.S.W.).

The miners, members of Mine-Mill's Local 18, have been on strike since Aug. 24, 1955.

Issues include wages, vacations, holidays, classifications, hours of work, union security, hospitalization and medical care for workers and dependents.

The union earlier reached agreement with Bunker Hill and Sullivan, largest operator in the area, which employs about two-thirds of the workers in the district.

"The International Union is prepared to lend every assistance to its local union in Idaho in order to help secure an honorable and just settlement of this strike. To that end, we are ready and willing to meet with the responsible spokesmen for the companies involved in the dispute," John Clark, Mine-Mill president, said Wednesday.

At the same time, Clark announced an accelerated program of strike relief to assure that no striking miner or his family would suffer.

### Usual Long Route Chosen by Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 (AP)—The senate had a choice yesterday in passing a bill in 90 minutes of listening to a "20 minute" speech by Sen. George W. Malone, Nev. As usual, it took the long route.

Sen. John O. Pastore, D-R.I., asked Malone to delay his speech for seven minutes so the bill could be considered. Malone refused to wait that long.

But he said he would give Pastore a minute and a half. Pastore, despite offering, retorted that he would wait until he had a freeze over rather than accept such an offer.

So Malone proceeded to speak for an hour on what he regarded as the evils of reciprocal trade.

He sat down. Then—only then—did the senate pass Pastore's bill to speed up non-competitive television licenses.

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### Top Ambition Of Dulles Hit By Big Paper

LONDON, Jan. 13 (AP)—The London Daily Mirror, Britain's largest circulation newspaper, said today that presidential ambitions may have led Secretary of State John Foster Dulles to grant Life magazine the "brink of war" interview.

The report in Life said the United States was prepared to begin all-out war if the Korean truce talks failed, that Dulles sought Anglo-American intervention in Indochina and that the United States was prepared to go to war if necessary in the Formosa crisis early in 1955.

The Daily Mirror suggestion appeared among a general outcry in the British press against the statements attributed to Dulles. One newspaper referred to a "dance of death" up to the edge of war and back again.

Disturbed Officials indicated they were equally disturbed but refused an immediate comment at the moment. Many observers said the statements embarrassed Prime Minister Anthony Eden at a time when he was under fire from several quarters.

The reasons behind the Life report and especially the timing of its publication became overnight the biggest diplomatic question in Britain. It appeared Labor members of parliament would ask angry questions in parliament about Eden's role in the Dulles decisions.

The Daily Mirror, which has a circulation of 4,500,000 and often acts as unofficial voice of the Labor party, led off its editorial by asking, "Why has Mr. Dulles . . . suddenly thrust himself forward as a 'tough guy' in Far East politics?"

This question was being discussed by diplomats in London last night, the Mirror said. "The diplomats came to the conclusion that Mr. Dulles feels himself a possible candidate in the American presidential election campaigns this year."

Some officials privately speculated that Dulles intended to serve notice to the Communists that the "Geneva spirit" or lack of it meant no weakening of America's position.

The authoritative London Times said Dulles' words "may thus have a beneficial and cautionary effect in Moscow, in inducing the Soviet government to use its influence to restrain the Chinese from an aggressive policy."

### U. of I. Professor To Conduct Tour

MOSCOW, Jan. 13 (AP)—Dr. E. Malcolm House, associate professor of history and political science at the University of Idaho, has been named to head a student tour of Europe this summer.

Sponsored by the Association of Academic Travel Abroad, a non-profit educational organization, two groups of students—one from Montreal and the other from Quebec—will meet at Southampton, England, July 24 for tours of seven European countries.

Under House's guidance, the students will travel to England, Holland, Belgium, Germany, France, Switzerland and Italy.

I dug it myself, and there is no use in saying that it is a showplace, because it isn't. It has a very ordinary view, even for a cave, and it isn't handy to schools, bus lines or shopping centers. It doesn't look like much from the outside, and the inside isn't much better. It's the sort of cave a passer-by wouldn't give a second glance.

There just isn't anything I can do, even with Mary's help, to make the cave more homelike, or make it look as if someone lived there. Mary
