FRANCISCO, Jan. 16 (AP)—A mighty torrent rolled down the Feather river today, but army engineers expressed hope the new and soggy levee south of Yuba City would hold.

At Shanghai Bend, just below the confluence of the Yuba and Feather rivers a mile south of Yuba City, the situation was very critical. It was the site of the huge levee break that let flood sweep through Yuba City last Christmas week.

By 8 A.M. today, the river level had been cut 67.2 feet for the two hours. Engineers said the levee might still give way, but they were throwing up hastily with mud and available materials. 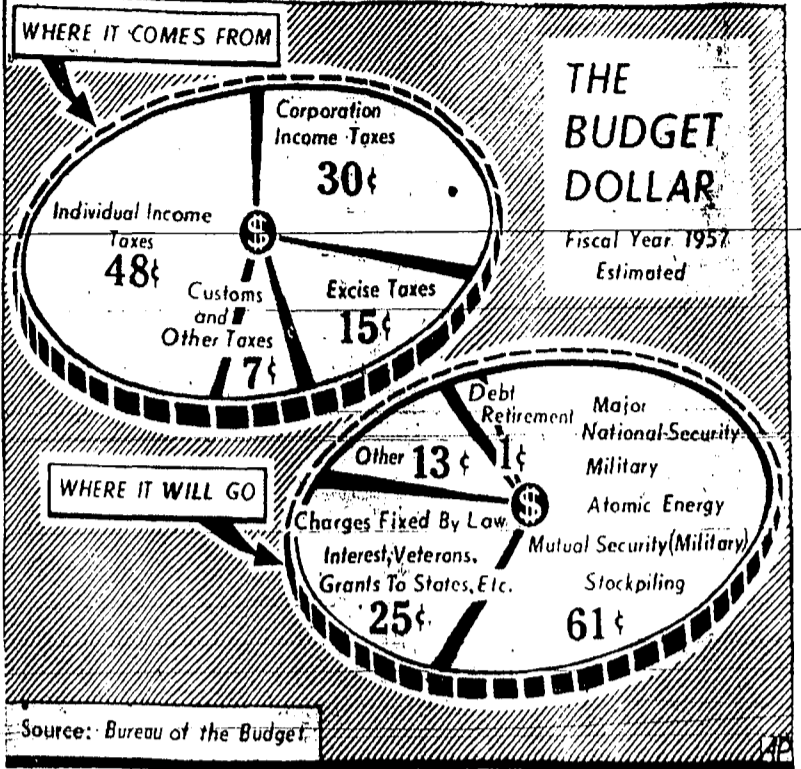

Balance Seen On Soil Bank Plan Expense

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower proposed today to put his administration's new 1 billion dollar "soil bank" program into effect without increasing total spending by the agriculture department. The total would remain at about \$4 billion dollars a year.

The budget he sent congress for fiscal 1957 was based on the expectation that the payments farmers would get for taking land out of production would be offset by reduced government spending to buy up surplus crops.

Two-Phase Program

The theory was that the new two-phase soil bank plan, which the President outlined to congress in a special message last Monday, would cut production enough to make this balance possible.

Today's budget message, covering the 12 months starting next July 1, indicated that only 350 million dollars in new money would be spent on the soil bank plan. This would cover cash payments to farmers who put part of their acreage into a proposed new long-term "conservation" reserve.

Another 400 million dollar outlay, under the "emergency" phase of the soil bank plan, would take the form of certificates entitling the farmer to cash or kind for not growing wheat, cotton, corn or rice. These payments would be financed out of the Commodity Credit Corporation's existing stocks or surplus crops.

Little Difference

The remaining 250 million dollars of the soil bank's estimated 1 billion dollar first year cost would be in payments to be made anyway under the government's long-time agricultural conservation program.

Mr. Eisenhower recommended a fiscal 1957 spending budget of \$43,661,548 for the agriculture department. The fiscal 1956 spending was \$3,852,751,913, only \$8,216,635 under fiscal 1957 estimates.

"This budget permits an intensification-of-efforts-to-aid-farmers in making the difficult readjustment from the abnormal situation of the war and postwar period to a realistic peacetime outlook for markets," Mr. Eisenhower said, "so that they may share more equitably in the prosperity which other sectors of the economy now are enjoying."

Atomic Towns Must Be Sold, Congress Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Some years the atomic energy commission can't make a dime.

In one of its fiscal 1957 operations the AEC will save \$2,100,000. But in the process it will wind up with a net loss of \$1,453,000.

This is the result of a 1955 act requiring the commission to sell its properties in the atomic towns of Oak Ridge, Tenn., and Richland, Wash.

These towns, along with Los Alamos, N. M., have been government-owned and government-operated since the birth of the atomic era. Their populations total 73,000.

The government is hanging on to Los Alamos, its top atomic weapons laboratory, but has been told by congress to get rid of Oak Ridge and Richland in the "next few years."

In the recent past, revenue from property has exceeded the costs of running the towns by amounts ranging from \$2,619,208 in 1955 to \$933,500 in 1956.

It will be a different story in 1957. The AEC assumes in its new budget that it will continue to be responsible for running Oak Ridge and Richland through 1957.

It also expects to complete a "sizeable volume of sales" of property in that year. In so doing it will cut the costs of town-operation by \$2,100,000. But as it sells revenue-producing property, the excess of income over outgo will shrink.

By the end of 1957, the new budget says, it will have shrunk to a net loss of \$1,453,000.

PARIS, Jan. 16 (AP)—Mollet, leader of the French Socialist party, emerged today from the circle of French politics as the most likely candidate to be France's next premier in an alliance with Pierre Mendes-France.

Most observers were convinced Mollet had the nod and said he would be the premier if he makes any sort of fight for it. The 57-year-old appeared to be Mendes-France's one of the leaders of the "Republican front."

Mendes-France called a meeting today of the executive committee of his Radical Socialist party to put its formal stamp of approval on the alliance with the Socialists and it promised to be a stormy one.

Caristaken Premier Edgar Faure, Mendes-France's bitterest political enemy served notice he would attempt to oust him.

Mendes-France ousted Faure from the Radicals when Faure dissolved the assembly but there appeared no way he could keep Faure from attending the session.

Radio Isotope Boom Seen at Idaho Station

IDAHO FALLS, Jan. 16 (AP)—Idaho's materials testing reactor is now producing radioisotopes worth one-half million dollars annually — and the isotope business is steadily rising.

Dr. R. L. Doan, manager of the atomic energy division of the Phillips Petroleum company which operates the reactor for the atomic energy commission, made the disclosure here Saturday.

"Isotopes can be irradiated at the MTR and then can be used for myriad uses in industry, agriculture and medicine," Dr. Doan said. "Their uses range from serving as tracers to unusually precise measuring instruments."

As tracers the isotopes can be introduced into a material or a person for tracing the regular course of function of the material or substance, he explained. Then by using a radiation detector the material or substance can be followed and its action studied.

Oil flow, for example, he said, can be determined through a pipeline through the use of a "getter" counter, rather than tearing up the line.

Dr. Doan made the comments when asked about whether the Western AP lines strike is affecting shipments of isotopes from the national reactor station.

"The strike," he said, "can certainly affect the shipments from here. It would especially affect isotopes with short radiation life which need to be dispatched to their destination promptly."

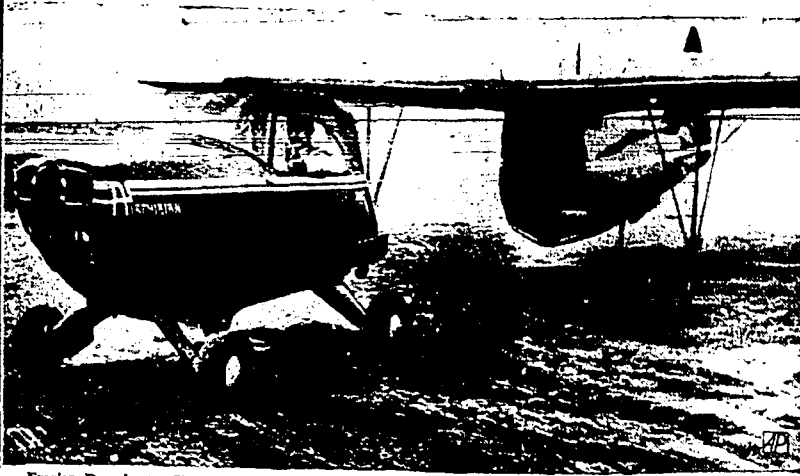

Mysterious Phenomenon



Greenland Ice Cap Could Put 17-Foot Sheath Around World

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16—Enough ice covers Greenland to envelop the entire world in a frozen sheath 17 feet thick.

Cut into jumbo ice cubes it would give every person on earth a two-ton chunk once every minute for a year.

If it melted all at once, the world's oceans would rise by 24 feet—perhaps higher as Greenland itself lifted from release of weight.

Such are the almost inconceivable dimensions of the Greenland ice dome—647,800 cubic miles of ice.

From 1948 until 1953, and scheduled again in 1957, French expeditions to Greenland have explored and surveyed the ice face of the largest island on earth.

Totally unknown plains plateaus, valleys and mountain chains were discovered buried two miles deep.

Map makers blazed 10,000 miles of new exploration. Climatologists recorded conditions that affect the weather of the entire North Atlantic and the lands around it.

With weasels (World War II snow vehicles), a cable hoist and air drops, the Victor expeditions managed to get more than 100 tons of equipment and supplies onto the perpetually frozen roof of Greenland.

They found moving glacial snow and ice, slush, hummocks and crevasses, warm foehn winds and midsummer blizzards with gusts of 120 miles per hour and temperatures of 40 degrees below zero.

Eventually their central icecap station was built. For two successive winters, parties of eight men dug in and lived through some of the world's wildest weather. Buried in the snow, like prisoners in cells,

Tax Slash Gimmick Is Sought in Ike's Budget Message; Politics Is Involved

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16—Suspicious Democrats were looking for a political gimmick in President Eisenhower's new budget. It would be good news for taxpayers if they found it.

The gimmick would be an overly conservative estimate of revenue which might require substantial revision within a matter of months.

If the gimmick is there, Mr. Eisenhower would be on the way to out-smart the Democrats on a campaign year income tax reduction which could make votes for Republican candidates nationwide.

The Wall Street Journal put it this way: "The President will deliberately hold down revenue estimates. The reason: Tax strategists fear sizable surpluses in today's budget would set off tax cutting, spending sprees in congress."

"So Ike will estimate the surplus at a few hundred million dollars for this fiscal year and only slightly larger for fiscal 1957. Officials confide they may lack up revenue and surplus figures later in the spring."

Translated into presidential year politics, it means: The Republican administration intends to control the campaign year action of the Democratic congress on tax reduction—and to get the credit for Mr. Eisenhower if a cut is made. It wouldn't be fair to suggest that the budget figures are falsified. But they are very likely to change substantially before they are officially reviewed again sometime prior to June 30. Budget estimates usually must be revised from time to time.

Meantime, Mr. Eisenhower will keep thumping his annual message warning that a sound financial policy forbids the Democratic congressional majorities from moving at once to trim taxes. Sometime before June it is quite possible that the President will discover happily that revenue is running ahead of estimates, that the outlook for the next fiscal year is rosy by some billions of dollars.

Mr. Eisenhower could then send a message to congress announcing the good news—and that Mr. Eisenhower would get campaign year credit with the voters for easing their tax load.

Peace on earth and good jobs to men is substantially what the President offers on peace and prosperity for short. These generalities are buttressed by swelling spending programs in the farm and human welfare areas which were the foundation of the new deal Democratic political organization created by Franklin D. Roosevelt back there in 1933-34-35.

Soviets Intervene In Finn Elections

HELSINKI, Finland, Jan. 16—Finland began today a two-day presidential election in which the Soviets were reported to have intervened on behalf of their favorite candidate, incumbent President Juhon Paasikivi.

Informed sources said the 85-year-old Paasikivi wanted to retire after 10 years as president but that the Soviets insisted he run once again as "the Finn Russia trust."

Russia was said to fear election of another president might change Finland's policy of friendship to Russia.

The balloting today and tomorrow is for 300 electors who will meet Feb. 15 to choose a president—a record number of 2,500,000 Finns was expected to vote.

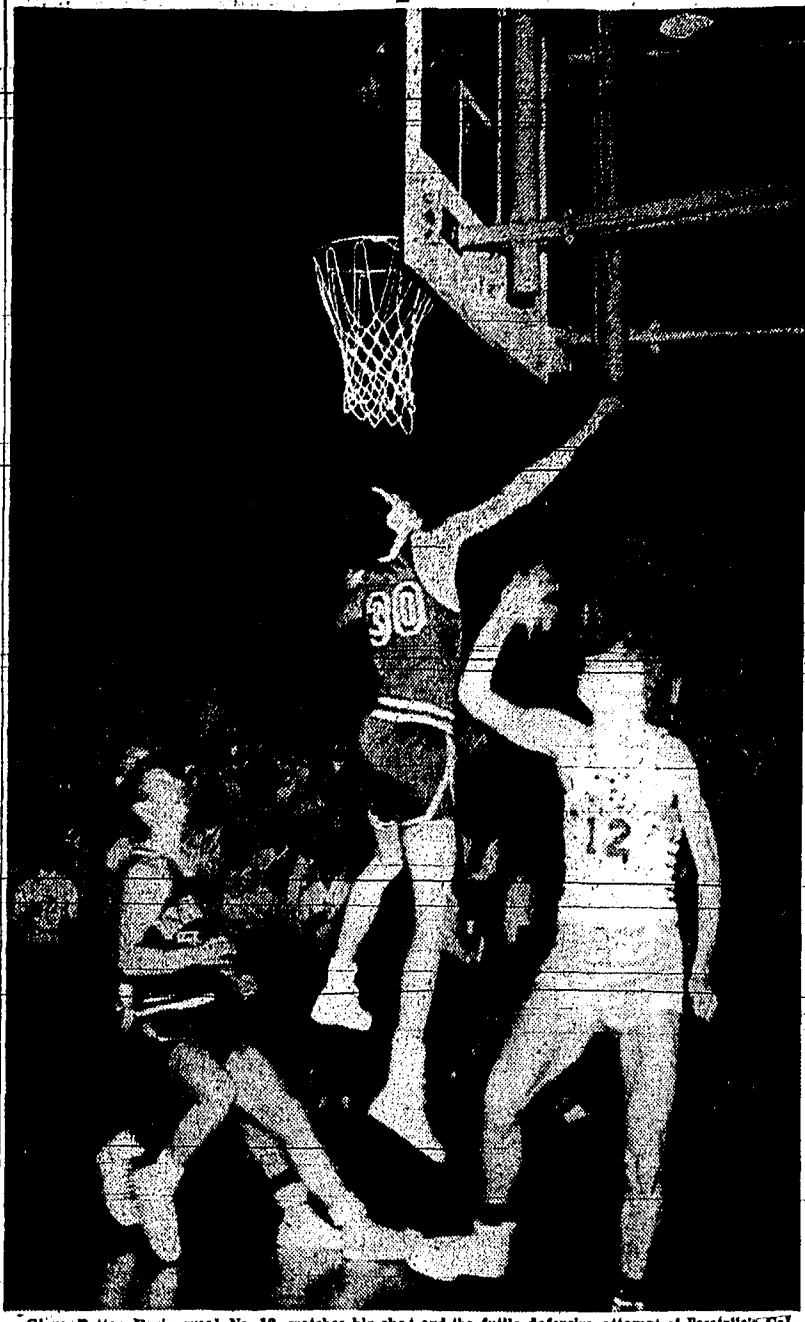
The officials ruled that he caught the ball in the end zone and therefore it was a touchback with no points.

**New Wonders; Same People,
Unveiled for World of Future**

CLEVELAND, (NEA)—Here's the latest from the World of Tomorrow, unveiled for the general public at the historic first Science Congress and Atomic Exposition, held here:

In the world of the future, everyone can have two pairs of hands, something mothers have wished for. TV's big eye will haunt us even more. We must learn a lot of unfamiliar words like isotopes (varying form of a chemical element).

If the engineers and scientists were examples of the Men of the Future, they'll be split about 50-50 whether to wear a brown suit or one of blue or gray. They'll favor brown shoes. A large percentage will wear glasses. Generally their hair will range from mouse brown to black. There will be little gray hair, plenty of bald patches. In other words, these nuclear wizards looked as ordinary as you and I.

If the meeting was an example of Conventions of the Future, there will be the same old standing in line for credentials, lapel badges, overheated lecture rooms, and sleeping in the back rows.

This big "trade fair" concerned atoms rather than, say, groceries. Firms were offering equipment and processes which would open shortcuts to the men in research centers.

For instance, in the future world we may have our cigarettes cleaned by high speed sound waves. While the waves weren't of nuclear origin they demonstrated a shortcut in cleaning nooks and fissures—important in nuclear research.

**Australian "Back Country" Is
Vast Area; Full of Paradoxes**

MULOORINA, South Australia, Jan. 16 (AP)—The old west still lives "out back" in the heart of Australia, where camel bones are used as airport markers and they measure ranches in square miles instead of acres.

Kangaroos are a greater menace than jackrabbits out here. Fences are "dog proof" and run unbroken for hundreds of miles. Radios are used as telephones and airplanes as cars.

Water pours out of artesian wells at the rate of millions of gallons a day but the land is a desert. Cattle and sheep fatten to feed-pen size on land that has barely enough vegetation to prevent erosion, and deadly snakes are an accepted menace.

Jeeps have replaced horses, helicopters are in demand and fortunes are being made off sheep and cattle. Draft beer is easier to get than water in communities 180 miles from a railroad. Telegrams are sent and received by radio, and the family shopping and backyard gossiping is all done by wireless.

Wild horses and camels are considered pests. Hundred-mile cattle drives are commonplace. Golf is played without greens and race meetings are held in hamlets containing less than 200 souls.

School is taught by radio, examinations given and report cards issued by teachers who never see their pupils. Electricity is generated

by the wind, and every ranch has at least two cars.

Elliott Price's "station" here at Muloorina is typical of the homesteads that dot the millions of square miles of Australia's back country. Price, a fast-talking, thick-bodied man, estimates his ranch at about 312 square miles.

His visitors land their planes on a runway outlined with the whitened bones of the hundreds of camels which once were bred at Muloorina and then slaughtered when the government no longer needed them as beasts of burden. All the ranches have windsocks, and most have their names painted on roof and shed tops to guide planes across the trackless wasteland.

Kangaroos are killed by the hundreds in a year-round open season. The damage they cause to rangeland runs into millions each year. Heavy wiremesh fences protect the 12,000 sheep at Muloorina from wild dogs, or dingoes, which can slaughter 80 head a night.

Price figures the helicopter will revolutionize the stock-raising business in Australia.

"With one of those things," he says, "a man can hop around from range to range, keep an eye on his stock and do five times as much work as can be done now. I only hope they hurry up and invent one I can run before I get too old for a license."
