French Communist Leader Is Foe of Free Men Everywhere

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—The most dangerous enemy in western Europe of free men and women everywhere is identified now as a bald little Frenchman named Jacques Duclos.

Duclos is 59 years old. Intelligent Europeans have been acquainted with him for a long time. Americans know of him, but have forgotten. Duclos was No. 2 man in the French Communist party when he briefly caught the attention of Americans in late May of 1945 with an article entitled: "On the Dissolution of the Communist Party in the United States."

His piece was a blistering attack on Earl Browder, a Kansas boy who in 19 years had been Communist for some years in the United States. During the latter war years, Browder and the Communist elders in this country formally dissolved the party, and proclaimed its success as the Communist Political Association of the United States. Browder thereupon began to propagandize co-existence—that communism and capitalism at home, and the Soviet Union and the United States in the world, could live happily together.

What Duclos did to Browder was to denounce him as an ally of J. P. Morgan and company, a traitor to Lenin, to Stalin, and to Karl Marx. The Communist secretariat in the United States thereupon admitted grave error, kicked Browder out and installed William Z. Foster as party boss, a job he still holds. The political association was dissolved and the party was revived.

Thereafter, Browder was uniformly described in Communist publications as a renegade enemy of the working class who had been expelled for playing foolery with what was described as "United States imperialism."

Poster wrote: "Browder's whole conduct has lent aid to these warmongers."

Duclos wanted the United States Communists to resume the class war, infiltrate all levels of American life and shoot for the world revolution with special emphasis on the American chapter, thereof.

That's the kind of chap Duclos is and was, and that is an indication of his standing in the Communist party—one socko article written from Paris and, presto, the party in the United States stands on its head: Duclos is now the active leader of French Communists who have just returned 151 members to the new French parliament. That is one more than they had 10 years ago before Communist strength began to sag in France. Duclos and his Communists have come back in a big way. They polled 26 per cent of the French general election vote.

Duclos again is a man of great power. His party is the third largest in the new parliament, and not a bad third, either.

In his new position of power, Duclos will continue to seek the overthrow of western civilization as he sought it in May of 1945. Specifically, he will seek to weaken France by any means, to nudge or stampede that country away from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization defense alliance.

Duclos will maneuver in France to prevent the unification of Germany and to push Western Germany from her western moorings. He will do what he can—and it probably will be a job—to make peace on reasonable terms, instead of more, possible. Duclos is a man of whom the United States may hear so much from now on as never to forget him again.

Rumor Caused by Bulgarian Absence

MOSCOW, Jan. 18 (AP)—Premier Nikolai Bulganin's failure to appear in public since Jan. 4 has caused some speculation in the diplomatic corps whether he is ill, out of town or resting.

Bulganin last showed up at an East German embassy reception on the occasion of East German President Wilhelm Pieck's 80th birthday Jan. 4.

Since then other members of the presidium received an Iranian parliamentary delegation on Jan. 8 and attended the Moscow premier of the American opera "Porgy and Bess" on Jan. 10 without Bulganin.

The Soviet press department refused to comment on rumors emanating abroad that Bulganin was ill. Foreign Ministry Press Chief Leonid Ilchev also declined to discuss the rumors at a news conference.

Original Okay On Army Plan Cited in Fight

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—An authoritative defense source said today that Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway originally approved the Eisenhower administration "new look" military program which he now criticizes.

Ridgway said Monday he was shocked when President Eisenhower told congress in his 1954 state of the union message that the new military program was "unanimously recommended" by the joint chiefs of staff.

Probes Asked
In a Saturday Evening Post article that has provoked two congressional inquiries, the former army chief said he "most emphatically" did not concur in the plan "as it was presented to the people."

The defense source reported that Ridgway originally joined other new service chiefs in devising and approving the plan in the summer of 1953 but "changed his mind" by the time it was submitted to congress in the budget in early 1954.

He Approves
The military leaders put their plan in writing, and Mr. Eisenhower approved it as presented by Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson and Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs, the defense authority said.

The plan curtailed ground forces and built up air-atomic power. As first written, it called for cutting total military forces from 3,500,000 men to 2,815,000 in three years.

Ridgway began to have misgivings in the fall of 1953 after consulting his army staff and commanders. The source said, and from the time the "new look" went to congress he fought army slashes both in committees and at the Pentagon. He retired last June 30.

Testifies
He testified last year that army cuts would harm national security "to a degree." In his magazine article, he ascribed the cuts to politics and contended he was subjected to both subtle and crude pressure to conform.

Wilson, asked about the pressure charges at a news conference yesterday, said "I don't recall any such business." He said he did not want to be surrounded by apple polishers and people "who seem to agree with me when they really don't."

The secretary implied that Ridgway had failed to sell him, Radford or the navy, marine and air force chiefs on the need for a bigger army.

Kremlin Intrigue Is Seen in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—The house committee on un-American activities warned Americans yesterday to keep vigilant, that the communist conspiracy still dwells among them.

In its annual report, released yesterday, the committee said it had unearthed new evidence during its 1955 hearings of "machinations of the Kremlin's conspirators in this country."

Chairman Walter D. Pa. said the results of the work "point clearly to the fact that the menace of communism in America remains unabated."

The report spoke of evidence of communist infiltration of government, summer camps, youth organizations, entertainment, New York neighborhood groups, and the Newark, N. J., Fort Wayne, Ind., Milwaukee, Los Angeles, San Diego and Seattle, Wash., areas.

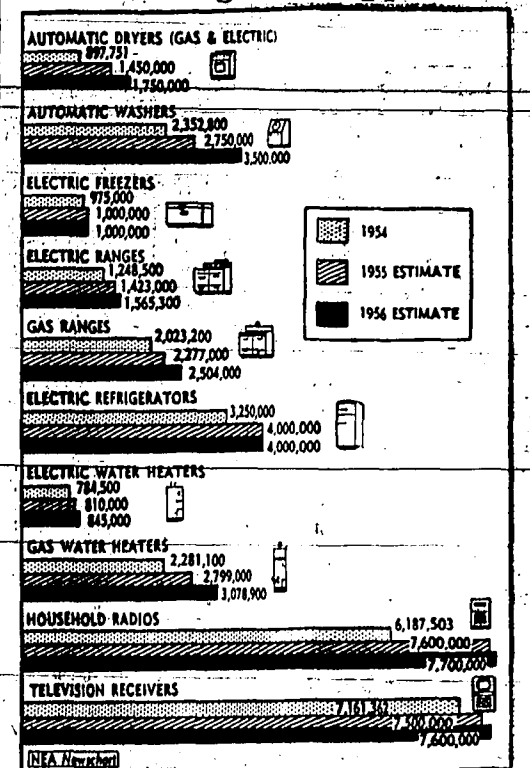

Expansion Set For 1956 in 2 Big Industries

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (AP)—Leaders in two belt-and-rod industries—auto and steel—agree the future is "bound to be good" and revealed billion-dollar expansions backing up their confidence.

General Motors corporation, the world's biggest manufacturer, has announced it was hiking capital spending to one billion dollars in 1956, or more than a third higher than the previous record outlay and nearly two-thirds greater than capital spending in 1955.

GM President Harry W. Curtis, in announcing the expansion before top business leaders here, said it reflects GM's belief "another record year" is in store for business in 1956. But the gains will be lower than in 1955—the most outstanding year in the history of our country from a business and economic standpoint.

At the same time Benjamin F. Fairless, former chairman of United States Steel corporation, said at a news conference the steel industry has launched the biggest peacetime expansion program in history in a show of confidence in the future.

Fairless, now president of the American Iron and Steel Institute, said steel companies plan to boost input capacity over a three-year period by 15 million tons at a cost of more than three billion dollars.

Flights Chart Land Mass in Frigid Areas

ABOARD USS GLACIER, Anarctica, Jan. 16 (Delayed) — A series of exploratory flights into the navy's "cold gray yonder" has proved that Antarctica is a single land mass, Rear Adm. George Dufek said today.

Scientists had long debated whether the area is divided by a strait leading from the Ross to the Weddell seas, but the flights discovered a range of 15,000-foot mountains where scientists thought the strait might be.

The explorations were made in 10 history-making extreme range exploration flights by aircraft of Dufek's "operation deepfreeze" task force 43. The flights ended yesterday with a series of three across the great unknown.

Pilots Named

The last flight, which crossed the geographical south pole for the fourth time, was made by Pilot Capt. William (Trigger) Hawkes, Jersey City, N. J.; Lieut. Cmdr. John Torbert, San Francisco, plane commander, and marine S/Sgt. Robert Spann, Buffalo, N. Y., the navigator.

The flight over the south pole, at 2 a.m. was made in bright sunshine. Clouds which often cover the area thinned and exposed the peaks of four ranges unknown until then to man.

Another flight, by marine Lieut. Col. Hal Kloks, penetrated still another unknown area to the "pole if inaccessibility"—the point on the earth's surface considered the hardest to reach.

Small Part Left

Navy sources said the flights left only about three-tenths of the entire continent still unmapped and unexplored.

Dufek, who helped map the flight to this point said "once conquered this spot loses its magic and must be 'discovered' somewhere else."

The "pole of inaccessibility" was the fourth "pole" to be reached by the navy expedition. One was the geographical south pole itself. Another was the south magnetic pole—which compasses in this area point away from. Another was the geomagnetic pole—the magnetic pole in relation to the rest of the world.

The agricultural program now in vogue has made the big farmers wealthy, but had hurt the small farmers and thrown the agricultural economy out of balance, he said.

"This is not a Democratic or a Republican problem, but an American problem," Stallcup said.

Has Titles Although he went through the Civil war unranked Lundy now boasts of being an "honorary general" on the personal staff of a governor of Florida and in the "titles of Alabama."

The grizzled veteran once turned down an invitation to appear on a nationwide television show because "I don't want anyone to see me using a cane, especially a yankee."

He lives with a son and daughter near Laurel Hill, 17 miles from Crestview.

Licensing of Dogs in Rural Areas Sought

BOISE, Jan. 18 (AP)—Bonnieville and Bingham county commissioners have been asked to require licensing of all dogs in rural areas as Ada county commissioners did last week.

The Idaho Wool Growers association reported yesterday.

Mel Claar, association secretary, said farmers in both counties had petitioned the commissioners for such action. The Wool Growers association and other groups have pressed for such action by county commissioners in accord with a law passed by the 1955 Idaho legislature.

The law says commissioners "shall" take such action, but leaves the time for doing so indeterminate. Stockmen had long sought mandatory licensing legislation to protect their herds from depredations blamed on wandering unlicensed dogs.

Regarding the Ada county action, Claar commented: "Maybe this will get rid of some of these underfed and undercared for no-ownership dogs."

Claar said there had been considerable loss of stock to dogs in Bingham county, especially in the sheep-raising area around Aberdeen. He added that there had been "terrible dog depredations in two or three counties" during the past year.

The worst instance, he said, was in the Bellevue-Gannett area, where one operator suffered a loss estimated at \$600 and his neighbors lost stock worth several hundred dollars also. Claar said 23 ewes belonging to the one rancher were killed in two nights.

Plane Landed Safely Despite Lighting Loss

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (AP)—A crippled plane flying without lights in a New England snowstorm made a safe landing at La Guardia field last night through the "grace of God" with 24 praying passengers and crewmen aboard.

After the plane had glided to a halt, many of the 21 grateful passengers asked for the home addresses of Capt. Robert I. Francis, the pilot, and Barbara Crowley, the stewardess, so they could send tokens of thanks for their safe arrival.

Francis called on every truck he had learned in 15 years of military and civilian flying to find a haven after his radio, lights and navigation instruments failed on a North-east airlines Boston-to-New York flight.

Miss Crowley, 27, Belmont, Mass., held the only light aboard the plane, a flashlight. The pretty red-haired stewardess at one tense moment during the flight focused the tiny light on a scrap of paper held by one of the passengers, salesman Jerry Ferron of Roserett, N. Y.

Writes Note
Ferron had told Miss Crowley he wanted to leave a farewell note for his wife. He wrote: "Bobby, I love you."

But the farewell note wasn't necessary. Francis, 37, Scituate, Mass., and his co-pilot, Louis Balestra, 37, won their battle with the snowstorm.

They flew their twin-engine plane at six different altitudes during the ordeal and ventured over the Atlantic ocean without life rafts to avoid the hazard of crashing into another aircraft.

Sights Point
Francis dropped his blacked-out craft through the snow to a low altitude and sighted Montauk point on the tip of Long Island about three tense hours after the plane had left Boston.

Miss Crowley quietly had instructed the passengers in the use of the plane's safety hatch. After the grave instructions, the blacked cabin again was silent except for the murmur of prayer.

The landing was routine. "By the grace of God, we landed safe," Francis said.

Prayers Were Made
"Thank God," said Sterling Tibbets, 28, a salesman of Caribou, Me., who was traveling with his wife, Rita, 23, and their 25-month-old daughter Kim, and Tibbets' mother, Mrs. Emily Tibbets.

"We prayed fervently as we groped through the darkness," Tibbets said.

The stewardess said there was no panic aboard and baby Kim never whimpered as the plane groaned in the darkness.

U. S. Acts Against Former Announcer

BOISE, Jan. 18 (AP)—The federal government moved yesterday to collect \$10,447 and foreclose the mortgage of a former Boise radio announcer who has been charged with embezzling \$464 from Nation KGEM.

The Federal National Mortgage Association charged in federal court that Athen Mendenhall, one-time manager of KGEM, had disappeared last fall, abandoning his wife and children.

It asked permission to take possession of the Mendenhall home in Boise, saying payment on the \$10,000 mortgage was overdue.

The station's embezzlement suit against Mendenhall is still pending in Ada county district court.


Copper Leads in Mine Production

RENO, Nev., Jan. 18 (AP)—Copper as usual made the most money among minerals produced in Nevada during 1955.

A year-end report by the Nevada Mining association discloses practically all of the 78,000 tons of copper mined last year came from three large operations—Kennecott Corporation and Consolidated Copper Mines corporation, both in White Pine county, and the Anaconda company at Weed Heights in Lyon county.

Total value of copper mined last year is \$57,700,000. Tungsten came in second with 5,500 tons produced worth \$23,000,000.

FBI Chief's New Crusade Is Doomed to Lose, Says Writer

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (AP)—Of all the lost causes of the 20th century, J. Edgar Hoover has embarked on the one perhaps least likely to succeed.

The distinguished director of the federal bureau of investigation, who has had a marked cultural influence on the under-world, thinks respect-for-law-and-order would be enhanced if people would quit calling a policeman a cop.

Cop is an ugly word to Hoover. In an editorial in Hal Boyle's law enforcement bulletin he denounced it as derogatory, disdainful and implying scorn.

"This may be true at times when it is spoken in a certain tone or inflection. But unfortunately for his crusade, cop is one of those slang terms by which the American lan-

guage is eternally enriched. It is too crisp and descriptive to be dropped from our vocabulary.

Equally unfortunate for Hoover's campaign is the truth that it isn't only underworld characters and snide members of the general public who use the term cop. Cops don't like the average citizen to call them cops. But what do they call themselves when talking to other members of the profession? Cops!

"The current issue of the New York Politician magazine uses the word cop twice. The television program, 'Dragnet,' put on with the blessings of the Los Angeles police department, starts off week after week with, 'The name's Friday, I'm a cop.'

A veteran police sergeant here, admitting that members of the force generally referred to each other as cops and that the term had become well-nigh universal, said: "Underworld characters are supposed to call us names like flatfoot, dick, gumshoe or harness bull, but that's only on TV and in the



movies. They call us cops—just like everybody else.

"We actually don't like for civilians to call us cops. We'd rather they address us by our rank or use the word 'officer.' It's too much easier to say cop than policeman."

There is some doubt as to the origin-of-the-word cop. Some hold it is merely an abbreviation for "constable of police." Others feel it was coined by London street urchins who mistook the brass buttons of the early British bobby for copper.

Whatever its etymology, Hoover declared cop has the "same unsavory connotation as 'quack' and 'hack' when referring to the doctor and the journalist."

But, actually, does it? The term is too widely used to be limited to such a meager interpretation.

What man in "the long blue line" doesn't take pride in being called "a good cop?" What policeman can resent a big-eyed kid who looks up at him and says, "When I grow up, I want to be a cop just like you."

Any word can be good or bad, depending on the way it is said. People can be policemen—but nobody can police a language.

The irony of J. Edgar Hoover's campaign is that his own splendid career has done much to add a new

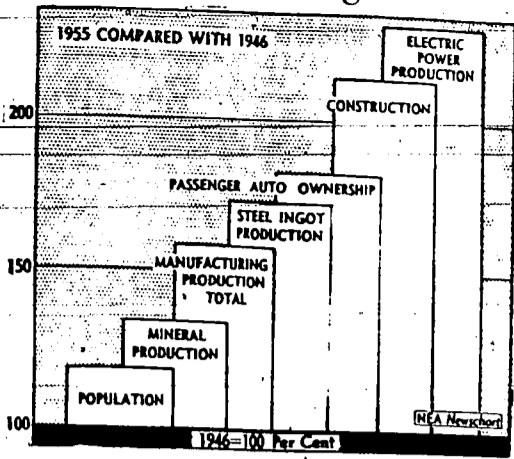

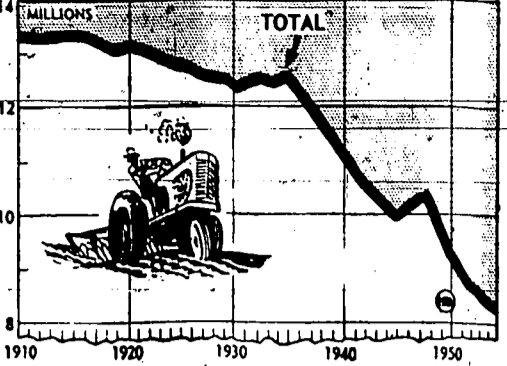

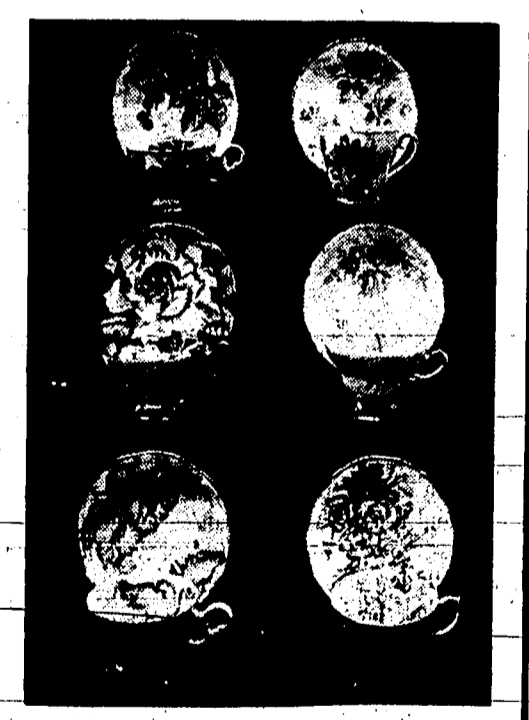

Smylie Seeks To Aid Idaho Frost Victims

BOISE, Jan. 18 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie called on Secretary of Agriculture Benson yesterday to declare the Emmett valley in Gem county an emergency area so farmers who suffered severe frost damage might take advantage of long-term low-interest loans.

Such loans from the farmers home administration "are vitally needed to get this area back into total production," he wrote Benson.

Smylie said that orchards in the valley had suffered 40 per cent or more of total damage, some up to 80 per cent.

A two-day frost struck the valley in mid-November, the temperature dropping 13 degrees below zero in some parts of the area, noted for its normally mild temperatures.

"This sudden unforeseen loss of bearing orchards in the Emmett Valley has brought about an emergency situation in this area which cannot be coped with through presently available financial sources," Smylie wrote.

"In view of the request by the growers and handlers, supported with evidence of extreme damage to this area, I urge that you give favorable consideration to declaring this an 'emergency area' so that emergency loans might be made available through the farmers home administration.

"This would allow for long-term low-interest loans which are vitally needed to get this area back into total production . . ."

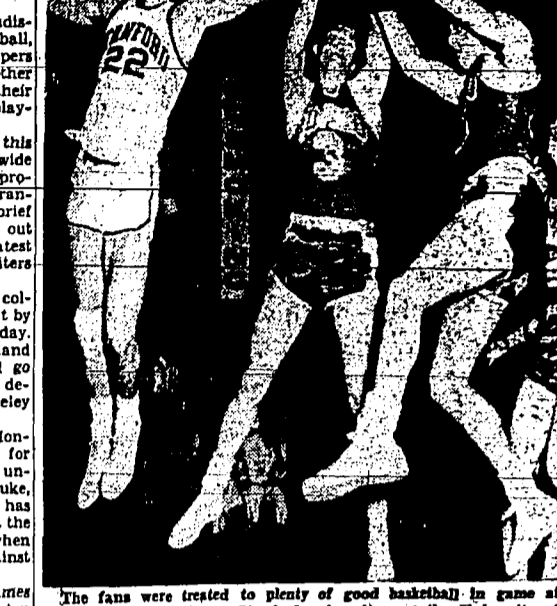

Group OK's Revision of Safety Laws

BOYCE, Jan. 11 (AP)—The Idaho chapter of the National Safety Council has approved 105 revisions and additions to the Idaho minimum general safety standards and practices code recommended by its code committee.

The action was taken at the final session of the group's annual meeting.

The proposed elevator, dumb waiter and escalator code was distributed to the membership for study. Final action will be taken at the spring meeting tentatively scheduled June 4 in Idaho Falls.

The group tabled a request by Rex Pollack, Kellogg, for discussion of provisions for cessation of blasting while men are underground in mines.

The group approved a motion by Eldon Beck, retiring president, that cities be asked whether they desire to continue a traffic safety contest. He noted that only a few cities sent in records for entry in the contest last year.

The chapter proposed changes in the safety code requiring employers to maintain first aid facilities for injured employees and to keep a record of all injuries.

It also suggested that trucks carrying dangerous explosives be adequately marked and kept away from congested areas. It asked that strict medical standards be observed in treating eye injuries.

Other proposals dealt with good housekeeping practices, employer and employee responsibilities, stairways, ladders, lighting and illumination, cracked saws, drilling for blasting and other subjects.

Power Needs In Northwest Are Outlined

PORTLAND, Jan. 11 (AP)—The Pacific Northwest will need 67,000,000 kilowatts of power within the next 50 years, the general advisory committee was told yesterday.

Lesher S. Wing, San Francisco regional engineer for the federal power commission, made the report to the committee—a high-level planning board which is assisting the corps of engineers in current review studies of the Columbia basin 300 report.

The capacity of the Northwest power pool now is 7,622,000 kilowatts.

F. E. Brown, chief of the corps' engineering division, discussed 85 possible projects throughout the Columbia river basin, a number of which were not previously considered in the development contemplated in the 300 report.

Ten of these projects, providing other benefits besides power, are in Canada.

Brig. Gen. L. H. Foote, north Pacific division engineer, told the group that no investigation of the

Salmon river power potential in Idaho would be undertaken in the review study because of the stream's importance as a fish spawning grounds.

Plane Sabotage Penalty Sought

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Senator Magnuson, D. Wash., said today that he will introduce legislation to punish anyone who sabotages a United Air Lines plane near Denver has changed his mind on capital punishment.

He proposed a bill that would provide the death penalty for persons guilty of committing sabotage on airplanes.

Magnuson, previously opposed to capital punishment, declared: "The Denver explosion convinced me that if a person can be sentenced to death for murder, then a person mean enough to destroy an airplane filled with innocent passengers should be given the same punishment."

The Magnuson proposal would make possible a \$10,000 fine or 20 years' imprisonment, or both, in instances where an aircraft is damaged through sabotage or the crew is injured. The death penalty would apply in cases where the action resulted in the death of a plane's occupant.

Four U. S. Planes Make Long Jaunt

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, Jan. 11 (AP)—Four planes of the U. S. "operation deepfreeze" expedition arrived at Wigram field at Christchurch today on a 2,200-mile non-stop flight from their base in the Antarctic.

The pilots made the hop over the South Pacific ocean from McMurdo sound in 10 hours and 45 minutes, nearly two hours ahead of schedule. The two four-engine C54 Skymasters and two twin-engine PV2 Neptune patrol bombers landed within 15 minutes of each other at Wigram.

Cmdr. G. K. Ebbe, commanding officer of the deepfreeze squadron, said that the ice was breaking up around the Antarctic landing field.

"We had to get out—we couldn't have operated another week without danger of losing aircraft," he said on his arrival here.

Psychologist May Face Prison Term As Counterfeiter

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Jan. 11 (AP)—A federal court jury yesterday found psychologist Albert L. Anderson guilty of two violations of the counterfeiting law.

Anderson, 31, grew up in Salt Lake City and was graduated by the Universities of Utah and Minnesota. He was convicted of photographing a \$50 bill and a \$20 bill.

He faces penalties of up to 15 years in prison and up to \$5,000 in fines.
