Smylie Protesting Proposed Raise in Rail Freight Rate

BOISE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie today protested to the interstate commerce commission the proposed seven per cent general railroad freight increase.

In a letter to Richard F. Mitchell, commission chairman, Smylie said agricultural interests in Idaho consider such an increase "unjust and discriminatory" because it tends to disadvantage shippers in reaching competitive markets in the east. The letter was released by the governor's office. He is on an eastern speaking tour.

He cited as an example that one-third of the selling price of Idaho potatoes on the eastern seaboard comes from the cost of transportation.

"With prices now received by the farmers at low levels, any increase in freight rates at this time will increase his burden considerably," Smylie wrote, and added: "And jeopardize their ability to market their products."

He said he noted the proposed increase did not contemplate any "hold-down" on agricultural products. He called this unjust because of the long distance goods must be shipped from Idaho to the eastern seaboard.

Smylie also objected to the proposed Feb. 25 effective date for the increase with a provision of a refund if the increases are later found unworkable.

His objection was based on the example of a car of Idaho potatoes which was delivered Friday. The refund, he said, would then go to the buyer of the potatoes and not to the grower and shipper in Idaho.

Smylie Avers State's Funds Will Balance

BOISE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie has reiterated his belief the state's general fund will be in balance June 30 and June 30, 1957, the 1955-56 current biennium.

"There is no reason to believe the 1955 legislative 'careful calculations for a balanced budget were inaccurate,'" Smylie said.

Smylie related to a recent statement by State Auditor N. P. Nielson who said he "was dubious" about whether the books would be in balance after June 30, the end of the current fiscal year. Smylie said it is likely the state will be in and out of the red through the next fiscal year because it has no working cash balance.

"But as I have pointed out before," he added, "this was a planned legislative procedure adopted (by the 1955 legislature) through bipartisan study and bipartisan support."

New Punch Is Given Dulles By Harriman

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20 (AP)—Gov. Averell Harriman of New York said today that U. S. foreign policy under Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has become "reckless and un-American."

Harriman, potential Democratic presidential candidate, told a Town Hall meeting at the Biltmore hotel that "American prestige and leadership in the world have declined drastically in the last three years."

"The causes of this decline are many, but much of it can be traced to the replacement of substance in foreign policy with high sounding claims made for purposes of domestic politics," he said.

In the second major address of his west coast trip, Harriman pointed to what he called a "weakening of the United States' position and the loss of confidence we once enjoyed among the newly-free peoples of Southeast Asia."

He said the Eisenhower administration also has failed the American people in the fields of education, agriculture, protection of free enterprise, development of natural resources and the war against poverty.

Police Chief Is Escaped Convict

CHEROKEE, Ala., Jan. 20 (AP)—John Edmund Burton, the police chief here since Oct. 1, has been arrested and unmasked as an escaped convict from the Kibby state prison.

Authorities said he had been doing a "dam good job" of enforcing the law. However, they hinted he may face some serious criminal charges.

Burton was being held on a fugitive warrant in the Walker county jail as Jasper.

Crash Kills

VIENNA, Austria, Jan. 20 (AP)—The official Czechoslovak news agency announced today that a Czech airplane had crashed in the Tatras mountains near the Czech-Polish border, killing 22 persons and injuring four others.

Committee Deadlock On Schools Is Broken

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—The house rules committee's deadlock over the school construction bill was reported broken today, and the big debate on federal aid to schools is expected to hit the house floor next week.

"And it will be a hot one," said Representative McConnell, Pa., senior Republican on the house education committee.

McConnell said "there's no question" about the bill coming out of the rules committee next Tuesday or Wednesday, though he said floor debate may not begin until the following week.

Fog, Slippery Roads Plague Magic Valley

Heavy fog and some slippery highways greeted much of Magic Valley Friday morning but while the ice disappeared from the roads at an early hour, all the fog did was rise and continue to blot out the sun.

There were no commercial airline flights into Twin Falls or Burley during the morning.

The highway department at Shoshone reported all roads in the district were "generally slippery" early Friday as a result of the snow on Thursday. Above freezing temperatures changed the situation during the morning and most of the roads then were reported clear of ice. The snow that fell on Thursday also was melting fast in most sections.

Hailey didn't get the fog and only a little snow reported in good condition shortly before noon.

The CAA at Burley reported that the fog began to close in shortly after midnight and that by quarter of a mile. The ceiling was several thousand feet high by noon.

Gooding also reported fog early in the morning and an overcast sky at noon. Roads in the country were slippery early in the day but were generally in good condition by noon.

Temperatures throughout the entire valley have been mild.

Earl Koehler, commissioner of law enforcement, said there would be no more extensions. He earlier extended the Jan. 1 deadline to midnight Jan. 20. State police have been instructed to begin arresting drivers who fail to display 1956 plates on their cars Saturday.

Group Backs I. F. Attorney For U. S. Job

POCATELLO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Several groups have been organized throughout Idaho to support a movement to back attorney William S. Holden, Idaho Falls, as Republican candidate for the U. S. senate. O. Ed Fiandro, Pocatello, said today.

Fiandro was elected yesterday as chairman of the Pocatello Holden-for-senate group.

"There definitely is a strong undercurrent throughout the state to draft Mr. Holden as a candidate," Fiandro said.

Holden is known for his work in the field of reclamation. He is 49 and has not been engaged actively in politics except for one term as a state senator from Bonneville county.

2 Prisoners Flee From Boise Jail

BOISE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Two prisoners escaped from the "escape proof" Ada county jail today by tearing off a shower head, enlarging the hole with a hack saw and cutting the bars over the nearest window.

"They let themselves down hand-over-hand from the sixth-floor level by means of blankets tied together, and stole into the courtyard just to stop the Ada county courthouse."

Sheriff's deputies identified the escapees as Gilbert W. Wise, 34, and Eugene Ronald Snyder, 25. Wise was serving time for burglary, Snyder for forgery. Both were transients. Police did not know where they got the hacksaw.

Ship Crashes Into U.S. Radar 'Isle'

BOSTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—A ship crashed into the Texas Tower, a radar "island" 100 miles off Cape Cod, today, suffering serious damage, but the tall tower structure was unscathed.

There were no casualties.

The ship was the military sea transport service's Baglita, which had gone out to the tower with fresh water and other supplies.

Portions of Ike's Plan for Farmers Rejected by GOP

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Senate Republicans rejected part of the administration's new farm program today. They scrapped an administration proposal to sell government-owned surplus crops at market prices to help finance a soil bank program.

Sen. George D. Aiken, R., Vt., ranking GOP member of the senate agriculture committee, said such sales "would nullify the purpose of the whole" program which is designed to bolster sagging farm income.

Surplus Problem Is Main Institute Topic

Problems of farm surpluses were the main topic of discussion Thursday afternoon at Twin Falls county farm institutes drew to a close at both Buhl and Castleford. In the afternoon meeting at Buhl, representatives of three leading farm organizations were unanimous in advocating the establishment of some form of soil bank where farmland is set aside on each farm for raising soil-building grass but no usable crops. Urging this plan were members of the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union and the Idaho Cooperative council.

Bombay Riot Turning Into Hooliganism

BOMBAY, India, Jan. 20 (AP)—City authorities issued a "shoot at sight" order to Bombay police today when a four-day orgy of rioting began degenerating into general hooliganism and looting.

Police opened fire at two places, killing one person and injuring two others as the officers broke up looting of a store and halted hoodlums who were hurling rocks at suburban trains.

Communists Blamed

Police Commissioner K. D. Billimoria officially blamed the Communists for inspiring the riots and announced that 47 persons had been killed and more than 500 injured in four days of rioting. He said 2,168 persons were under arrest.

Violent rioting flared in the nearby town of Nipani today and police charged into a howling mob with iron-tipped clubs. One woman was killed and another was hurt. Police imposed a strict curfew.

Thieves Steal, Loot Truck of Gold Bullion

GENEVA, Switzerland, Jan. 20 (AP)—Police sent out a five-nation alert today for a casual set of thieves who made off with a pickup truck containing \$200,000 in gold bullion while the lone driver sipped coffee in a restaurant.

Theft of the 250 kilograms (550 pounds) of gold from the unguarded truck was believed to have been the largest such haul in European history. The robbery occurred in broad daylight on a busy street.

Man Is Fined On Negligent Driver Count

The driver's license of Jackie L. Calton, route 2, Twin Falls, was suspended for 30 days and he was fined \$50 and \$3 costs Friday in Twin Falls police court when he pleaded guilty of negligent driving.

Calton was cited by city police Thursday night following a traffic accident near the intersection of Fillmore street and Heyburn avenue in which a Flier coupe was injured. Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Cedarholm were taken to Magic Valley Memorial hospital following the accident. Cedarholm sustained facial lacerations and Mrs. Cedarholm bruises to her legs.

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Hutchins Speaks at Moscow; Blasts Legion for Opposition

MOSCOW, Jan. 20 (AP)—Dr. Robert M. Hutchins made his much-discussed appearance at the University of Idaho yesterday afternoon, blasting members of the American Legion who objected to his addressing the students.

Hutchins, president of the Fund for the Republic, made no reference to the state-wide controversy in his prepared talk on "The Promise of Education."

But in an interview earlier, he said the protests against him by Idaho Legionnaires "amounted to a threat to America's civil liberties."

Ship Gains

ABOARD ICEBREAKER USS GLACIER, Antarctica, Jan. 20 (AP)—Delayed—This mighty icebreaker began crunching today toward the American settlement on the "beach" at a steady one mile every six hours to ease supply difficulties for the U. S. Antarctic expedition.

The Glacier, which had furnished supplies for the four aircraft which returned safely to Christchurch, N. Z., hoped to get within four miles of the settlement tomorrow to permit use of a four-mile fuel line.

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Officials Cancel Raid on 'Boards'

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 20 (AP)—Police were poised to pounce on punchboards as illegal gambling devices. But before setting out to sweep the city clean they quietly changed their minds.

There was confusion as to who issued the order. It was explained by former mayor Earl J. Glade.

Glade said punchboards had been allowed to operate in the past as a stimulant to the city's local candy industry. But he denied there had ever been a formal "gentlemen's agreement" between the city commission and the police department to allow use of the boards.

Firm Formed

BOISE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Three men today filed a certificate of incorporation for the Shoshone Natural Gas company in Shoshone, Ida.

They are Harry F. Magnuson, Alden Hull and H. J. Hull, who capitalized the firm for \$100,000 and said they would seek gas distribution rights in the community.

Chamber Hits Cuts in Plane Services Here

Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce board of directors Friday authorized E. H. Heap, a board member and attorney, to submit a formal protest demanding immediate re-examination of the two air flight reductions by United Air Lines.

The directors, meeting in weekly session at the Rogerson coffee shop, decided to make the letter in form of protest rather than in the resolution form used by the city commissioners.

They also voted to cite the effect on the community as the main reason for protesting, noting it has taken more than 20 years to make the people in Magic Valley air-conscious.

Conference Is Held for T. F. Schools' Plan

Ernest H. Ragland, superintendent of schools, spent Thursday in Boise in conference with architects working on the new Twin Falls elementary school building plans. He was accompanied by Owen Kinney, building and grounds supervisor.

Ragland said that as a result of the conference, some modifications in roofing specifications were made which will mean greater economy of building costs.

Bids for the new schools are scheduled to be opened at 8 p.m. Jan. 26, at the junior high school.

American Dead Returned Home

VOKOSUWA, Japan, Jan. 20 (AP)—The first of the 952 unknown American dead of the Korean war was on their way "home" today.

The cruiser USS Manchester sailed for Honolulu with 50 American sailors, soldiers, airmen and marines who died in the three-year war against communism for burial in American soil. Their final resting place will be the National Memorial cemetery in Honolulu.

All four services paid tribute to the unidentified dead in a solemn 45-minute dockside ceremony. Four flag-draped caskets on the cruiser deck symbolized the unknown dead of the army, navy, marines and air force.

Thirty-six jet planes of the army, navy and air force flew over in a roaring final salute. A volley was fired by the four-service band guard.

Idaho Future Bright, Panel Talkers Aver

BOISE, Jan. 20.—The 46th annual Idaho engineers' convention opened last night with forecast of a bright future for the state in industry and resource development.

Speakers in a panel discussion ranged from minerals to tourist trade, tempered their remarks with statements that much work remains to be done.

"We can't stand still," declared moderator Orland C. Mayer, secretary of the state board of engineers. "Unless the state's industrial development is stepped up," Mayer said, "we will lose our most valuable resource, the boys and girls of our state."

Larry Mills, public relations director of the Boise-Payette Lumber company, said the future of the lumber industry "will be based on the ability to make more efficient use of the trees we now have."

Dr. J. D. Forrester, dean of the school of mines at the University of Idaho, said the mining industry in Idaho "has a very bright future" and added that a big part of the state's mineral wealth is to be found in nonmetallic minerals. In the past 10 years, he said, production of such minerals has increased from 10 to 25 per cent of the total production of industrial mineral commodities.

J. O. Breisford, president of the Gate City Steel company, Boise, said two of the major problems facing Idaho manufacturers are freight rates and taxes. He added that freight rates are improving, but said an increase in assessed valuation is needed to help the tax situation.

"This can be accomplished," he said, "either through reclaiming additional industry, or a combination of both."

A. B. Jonasson, secretary of the Idaho department of commerce and development, said more than a million out-of-state cars come into Idaho each year. They carry an average of three people per car who spend an average of \$8 per day per person, he said.

March of Dimes Report Given as Drive Reaches Two-Thirds Point for County

With the March of Dimes hitting the two-thirds mark in the month-long campaign, Publicity Chairman Carl Berg gave a report Friday on past and future special events.

He said the Twin Falls Soroptimist club got the drive off to a good start by collecting \$1,652 in a canvass of the business district. More money is still coming from the Soroptimists, he added.

The "toll road" set up by members of the Lions club on Addison avenue west—the Saturday netted \$875. Members of the Teens Against Polio have raised \$417 so far from sales of crutches, dime earrings and pens. The TAPs will be active for the rest of the month, Berg noted.

Some \$472 was raised from coin cans distributed to school children, he reported. Bickel school results have not been reported yet, but \$189 has been turned in for Lincoln school, \$169 from Washington, \$90 from St. Edward's and \$25 from Memorial Lutheran school.

Scott's cafe gave the gross receipts from coffee sales for one day, Berg said. The effort netted \$130 for the March of Dimes. A Chinese auction conducted by the Rev. Norman Stockwell at a Rotary club session netted \$12.85.

March of Dimes cards mailed to residents have raised \$1,307.25 to date with more coming in. The coin collectors left in stores will not be collected until the end of the month, Berg pointed out.

No figures were announced for the telephone. Berg pointed out it was impossible to set a figure for the event because the bulk of contributions was in the form of pledges and people have been lax in paying their pledges. Returns will be divided by five counties.

Checks for the March of Dimes have been received by the drive treasurer, Frank Slack, at the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company. More checks are being received daily and Berg says he has no idea of the total.

Berg said the Twin Falls Livestock

Commission company had pledged a percentage of receipts from a weekly sale. Results of the "gasoline day" are not known yet, he reported. He said indications were the event had not reached its 100,000 gallon goal. Service station operators gave one cent a gallon to the March of Dimes on all gasoline sold that day.

Several more special events have been arranged for the March of Dimes, Berg reported. He said the armed forces march to Sun Valley will start Saturday, continuing for a week. Also on Saturday, Rupert national guardsmen have scheduled a march from Rupert to Twin Falls by way of Paul, Hazelton and Eden. The Sun Valley march is being made at the rate of two cents a step for the group.

A county-wide talent show is planned next week at Piler. On Saturday night, Buhl Rebekahs and Odd Fellows will hold an auction of pies and fancy work.

Next Tuesday night, the Mother's March on Polio is scheduled in Twin Falls. In conjunction with the porch-sight campaign, five jet planes are scheduled to sweep across the valley between 6 and 7 p.m. A ground observer corps check is planned with the sweep by the jets.

Berg said Granges, women's clubs and many other organizations in Twin Falls county were to be com-

ended for their efforts on behalf of the March of Dimes.

Group Assails Move to Hire Teacher Aides

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—The National Education Association yesterday assailed the idea of hiring enough good teachers to replace under the present educational setup and that "teacher aides" may help solve the problem.

The NEA hit out at "untried and untested procedures." It thus took issue with the Fund for the Advancement of Education. This organization, financed by the Ford Foundation, recently described an experiment in Bay City, Mich., in which assistants relieve elementary teachers of clerical and "house-keeping" duties.

Although emphasizing that the experiment has not been evaluated, the Fund said there is "promising evidence" that it enables a teacher to instruct up to 25 pupils efficiently as she could handle 20 otherwise.

But a report by the NEA commission on teacher education and professional standards questioned the "promising evidence" which would drastically increase the present load of every qualified teacher.

"The American people are being advised that by providing a qualified teacher with mechanical and teaching aids and clerical helpers the number of children to each classroom can be materially increased without loss of efficiency," it said. "Then it said that giving 'quick and easy answers to difficult problems' . . . is the simplest and surest way of defeating the progress of the past in efforts to make of teaching a real profession."

In New York, Fund President Clarence H. Faust said: "Our bulletin, 'Teachers for Tomorrow,' is a factual document which speaks for itself and is available without charge to anyone interested in seeing it."

The NEA report said: "It cannot be reasonably predicted that we shall have all of the teachers which could annually be consumed by our society before 1965, but there is fairly good evidence that in the early 1960s we will be able to supply the minimum, indispensable needs."

Solon Assails Idaho Power Dam Projects

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, D., Ore., has asked the Oregon hydroelectric commission to refuse to grant a state license to Idaho Power company for construction of low head dams in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake river.

The federal power commission has granted licenses to the power company to build three dams on the river and preliminary work on one dam already is under way.

Neuberger, in a telegram to Lewis A. Stanley, secretary of the hydroelectric commission, said sanctioning of Idaho Power's program would not be in the best interests and welfare of the state.

The senator claimed development of the Snake river by Idaho Power instead of by the federal government, would result in loss of three million acre feet of water storage now needed for flood control. He said it would also mean the loss of more than 400,000 kilowatts of firm power.

"If the state of Oregon approved Idaho Power as development agent at Hells Canyon, it will be signing eastern Oregon's economic death certificate," Neuberger said.

Farm Group Raps National Policies

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20 (AP)—The National Council of Farmer Cooperatives yesterday protested what it called a national policy emphasizing the dominance of American industry of foreign and domestic trade at the expense of agriculture.

A resolution adopted at the close of the council's 27th annual meeting said this policy has developed gradually in the last 25 years, although this nation traditionally has been an export nation for agricultural products.

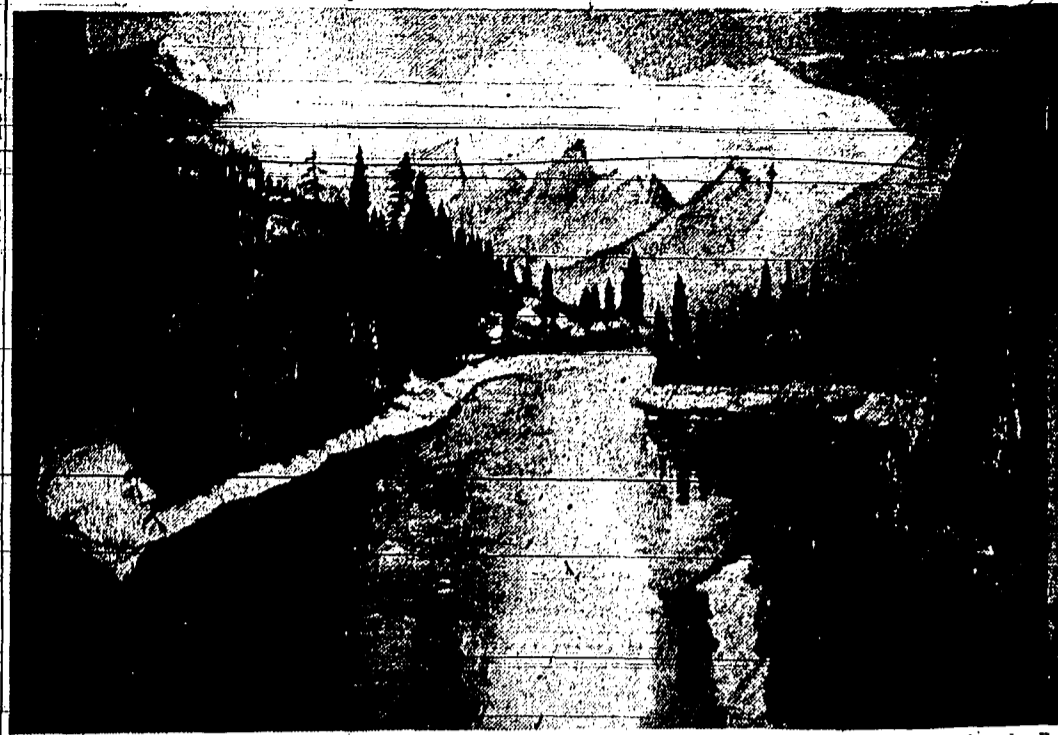

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Senator Potter, R., Mich., asked the senate yesterday to defeat legislation he said would benefit some 8,000 natural gas producers at the expense of 29 million consumers.
