Test Planned For Drug on Tuberculosis

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New Book Is Presented on 'Saucer' Lore

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—A new book on flying saucers reports that scientists have detected "times normal radiations" at the time of unidentified objects in the sky. But it says there is no proof the phenomena are connected.

The author, former Air Force Capt. Edward J. Ruppelt, was for two years chief of the air force project for investigation of flying saucer reports.

He said data which he gathered on radiation reports was rejected by the air force as containing "not enough conclusive evidence."

Ruppelt, now a research engineer for Northrup Aircraft, Los Angeles, said he coined the term UFO "flying saucers"—unidentified flying objects.

"No one could explain the sudden bursts of radiation, but there was no proof that they were associated with UFO's," Ruppelt said in "The Report on Unidentified Flying Objects," published today.

Ruppelt said photographs taken of mysterious aerial objects always proved to be disappointments—"in a sense, if you've seen one you've seen them all."

The best motion picture films, he said, were those taken by Nick Marziana, Great Falls, Mont., Aug. 15, 1950, and navy photographer Delbert C. Newhouse near Tremonton, Utah, July 2, 1952. A panel of scientists decided the Tremonton sightings could have been soaring gulls, while the Montana sightings could have been two jet aircraft.





WASHINGTON — "Why are you so prejudiced against Ben. Estes Keafauer?" asks Mrs. L. Danville, Va. "You write regularly that he has no chance for the presidential nomination, and you seem of the opinion that he does not deserve it."

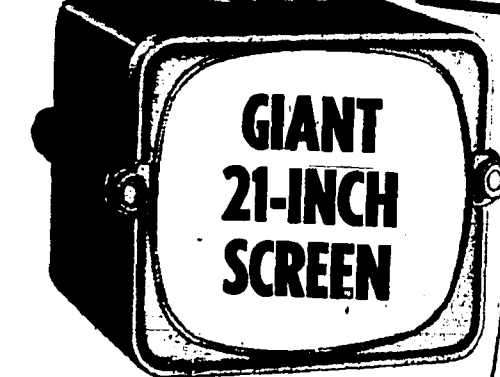

Amateur Horticulturist Works With Cactus

Magic Valley Hobbies No. 3

Rupert Man Cultivates Thorny Cactus And Is Repaid With Boundless Blooms

For a really sharp hobby, consult Carl Henschel, Rupert. He raises cactus.

Henschel claims his 2,500 cactus plants constitute the largest collection in the intermountain area but he adds he hopes someone will disprove his boast "so I can meet him."

The Rupert man, whom most people recognize as a postal clerk, has been growing cacti for nearly 20 years. He is a member of the Cactus and Succulent society of America and showed colored slides of some of his plants at the society's national convention in Denver in 1953.

Henschel became interested in cacti because of their odd shapes and it wasn't until after he had started to raise them that he discovered they have blooms that rival the orchid.

Cacti exceeds almost every other flowering plant for size of blooms and variations in color, he said. Some plants are as small as thimbles and some tower 50 feet in the air. One of his plants is no more than two inches high but when it blooms, the flowers are all of four inches in diameter. Some bloom only at night.

Some cacti are flat, some are round and others are as thin as a pencil. There are a few that are snakey and trailing while others grow in the form of bushes. Still others grow into tall columns, with and without branches.

While most of Henschel's plants come from California and Texas, he has imported some from Mexico. Actually, not all the plants in the Rupert collection are cacti. Cacti belong to a division of plant life known as succulents and not all cactus-like plants are cacti, he said. In fact, some succulents look more like cacti than some cacti, he added.

Henschel raises cacti from seed. He gives the seeds a start on blotting paper, transplanting the plants after they start growing. All cactus seed are round but as they sprout and begin to grow, they take on various shapes. One variety, after two or three weeks in the sunshine, becomes tiny globes of yellow, crimson and violet.

Henschel built a small greenhouse and a coldframe in which to keep his hobby during mild weather. From the middle of November to milder weather in March, they repose in a more or less dormant state in the basement of his home. During this period he waters them only once a month and the cool basement keeps them from growing.

He is of the opinion the care and treatment the plants receive during the winter is responsible for the blooms in the springs. If nights are cool he removes the plants from the basement, he covers them with canvas and warms them with electricity. Last June 25 he had 50 varieties blooming at one time. One of the species, commonly called cob cactus,

was so covered with flowers the plant could not be seen.

One of the most unusual succulents he has is the "living baseball," a native of Africa. This succulent is round like a ball and has seams like a baseball.

Some cacti have spines and others a feathery plumage. The "sand dollar" and "Star cactus" are virtually spineless but are covered with white spots. Bristles are featured on some while others are armed with hooks. The Arizona barrel cactus has hooked spines.

Henschel says there is a false notion that cacti, being desert plants, thrive on a minimum of water. Except for the winter months, he never lets his plants dry out. The warmer the weather, the more he sprays with a hose.

Like a lot of people, and not a few birds, snakes and animals, cacti are misunderstood. Despite their grotesque and sometimes belligerent appearance, they produce a beauty unrivaled any other place in nature, their admirers contend.

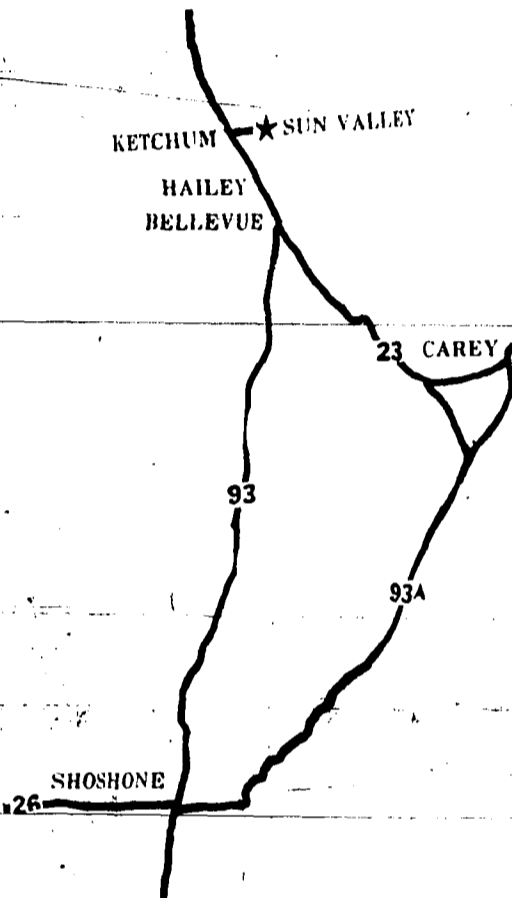

Magic Valley Tours Idaho? Where's That? Ask Skiers Who Are Well Acquainted With Sun Valley

As inconceivable as it may seem to Idahoans, there are people in the world who have heard of Sun Valley but never heard of Idaho.

To put it another way, Sun Valley—a part of Magic Valley—is world famous; so famous the state of its location is unnecessary to those viewing the resort from thousands of miles away.

Started as a winter resort, Sun Valley is gaining in popularity as a summer playground, too. Yet, while this is so, most of its worldwide fame still stems from the snow encrusted slopes and bowls where skiers from novice to champion can stamark and schuss until the snow wears out.

The site of the resort, to borrow an expression, is as old as the hills. But the resort is only 20 years old this year. At the behest of Averill Harriman, Austrian Count Felix Schaffgotsch scouted America's west in 1935 for a site in this country that might compare with Europe's famous skiing resorts. Sun Valley is the result.

Located only a mile from Ketchum, just off highway 93, Sun Valley is a self-contained community with a village board, places to stay, restaurants in which to eat, motion pictures and other shows to see, lay-outs, stores in which to shop, a postoffice and recreation of all kinds.

The resort, on one hand, caters to duck, pheasant and big game hunters while, on the other, is a mecca for hundreds of convention delegates. Scores of persons, from vacationists on limited budgets to kings and queens, are attracted to the valley of the sun and all that it has to offer.

In driving from Shoshone to Sun Valley, vehicles climb 1,382.5 feet in the 33 miles but the only noticeable grade is Timmerman hill, south of Bellevue. State plows keep the road open in winter but in periods of heavy snow, they are augmented by plows from Sun Valley since Sun Valley buses meet all trains at Shoshone. The valley floor is 6,000 feet above sea level and peaks surrounding it range as high as 12,000 feet. Snow usually comes early and stays late.

Some of the resort's recreational facilities are available all year. For example, there's the ice skating rink, recently enlarged to United States Figure Skating association specifications. And if you should happen to forget your skates, or just don't know how in the first place, don't let that stop you. Skates can be rented at the rink and instructors are on hand to teach you to keep your skates and ice in contact with one another.

Also available throughout the year are two outdoor swimming pools and six soundproof bowling alleys. In the winter there are horse-drawn sleighs in which to ride and dog sleds to race. During the summer there are horses and bicycles to ride, golf and shuffleboard to play, arrows to shoot, a skeet range and nearby trout streams for fishing.

Sun Valley lodge, which looks as though it had been built of logs but which really is made of concrete, was built first.

The lodge was followed by the less expensive Challenger inn and lastly, the chalets were added for vacationers on limited budgets. Prices at restaurants follow the precedent set by the places to stay with excellent meals available at the cafeteria at moderate prices.

But even with all this, Sun Valley still emphasizes skiing. On hand are 46 ski instructors under Big Ed's lead to teach the finer points of staying on your feet while plowing downhill on two pieces of wood at 40, 60, 80 miles an hour. The ski school is the largest organization of its kind in the world and every instructor has been on the staff for at least three years. Some of them have made skiing history.

A beginner, with no equipment, still can go skiing at Sun Valley. Skis and boots may be rented at the general store in the village. For the novice, for a flat fee, can stay at a "learn-to-ski" weeks during the season. Other runs on Baldy are River, Canyon, Exhibition, Olympic, Roundhouse slope, College, Warm Springs, Ridge, Cutoff, Rock Garden, South slope, Christmas bowl, Christmas ridge, Easter bowl, Look-out bowl, Left bowl, Mayday bowl, Cold Springs, Broadway, Sunnyside, Lower Christmas, Inhibition, Puge's Moogels, Central Park, New Canyon and Seattle ridge. On Dollar mountain are Dollar and Half Dollar runs. Recently a run was completed for children on Penny mountain near Ketchum.

There is a social side to visiting Sun Valley, too. Cocktails are served in the Duchin room and dinner dancing follows every evening at the lodge and the Ram.

And for those who have an aversion to anything strenuous, there are spacious sundecks upon which to relax while maintaining last summer's tan this winter.

Bill 7030 will insure domestic producers 55 per cent of the increase consumption due to population growth in this country.

This will amount to an additional acreage allotment of 10,800 acres in Idaho within six years which will offset the reduction in 1955, Millar reported.

The beet growers voted to retain the 1955 board of directors. The reelected directors include Howard Parish, Ted Scott and Monroe Hays, for one-year terms; Clarence McKibbin and Charles Colner, two-year terms, and Jack Claiborn and Leon Pickett, three-year terms.

"Stewardship is No Laughing Matter"

What is stewardship? The most picturesque definition of stewardship I know is one given by a boy of 19 in a stewardship class. He said, "Stewardship means that life is a great ship."



What is stewardship? The most picturesque definition of stewardship I know is one given by a boy of 19 in a stewardship class. He said, "Stewardship means that life is a great ship, loaded with a rich cargo of many things to be delivered to many people, in many places. God is the Owner of the ship but I am the captain of it."

He might have gone on and said, "Everything I have aboard, all my possessions, my talents, my time, my health, my strength, my capacities, my personality, my privacies, my money, is a cargo to be delivered. God has entrusted it to me to deliver to his children in every place I go. I do not own what I possess; I owe it. God has made me the captain of his ship, and it is my job to bring the ship to the right port and discharge its cargo to the right people. Everything I have aboard is for delivery."

Stewardship makes of all of us containers of the wine of God's grace and love. We are partners, fellow-workers with God in bringing in the perfect society among men. This society being described in the Holy Bible by the words "kingdom of God on earth." The principle of stewardship is quite widely acceptable to Christians in general but it is not nearly so widely practiced.

Partnership with God is more a belief than a business. And too much a confession, too little a career. However a genuine surprise awaits those who undertake the career of being one of God's faithful stewards. You see, stewardship is not primarily for the expansion of the Christian enterprise but rather for the expression of our life in Christ.

Stewardship is not a matter of frictions, whether one-tenth or one-half, but a quality of dedication which underlies all we do in life. It conceives of life, not as a goblet to be drained, but as a chalice to share.

The chief business of a Christian steward is to make service to God and to his fellowman his full-time occupation. Stewardship then becomes the basic ingredient in living. When this happens life expands and great things are accomplished for God.

What then is stewardship?
 "It's doing your job the best you can."

And being just to your fellow men;
 It's figuring how and learning why,
 And looking forward and thinking high,
 And dreaming a little and doing much.

It's keeping always in closest touch
 With what is finest in word and deed;

It's being thorough, yet making speed;
 It's daring blithely the field of chance
 While making labor a brave romance;
 It's being clean and it's playing fair;

It's laughing lightly at Dame Despair;
 It's sharing sorrow, and work, and mirth,
 And making better this good old earth;
 It's serving, striving through strain and stress,
 It's trusting Him and doing our best.

This I believe then to be a way of living that each one of us would want. And this way of life waits
