

Blind Seeing Eye Dog Gets Life of Ease

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 1 (AP)—A blind man here who has two seeing-eye dogs—one of them retired—allowed today he would never allow the two of them to meet. He doesn't want the older dog, now gone blind herself, to realize that someone has taken her place.

State Sen. Thomas Hasbrook, 33, who was blinded by an exploding land mine in World War II, returned home from Whippany, N. J., recently with a new seeing-eye dog—Tunah—to guide him through his busy days as a legislator and public relations man.

Comfort Stated
Before he got home he arranged to have his old dog "Pay" taken to the home of his parents. There she will live out her days, which may not be many, in comfort but in darkness and without the companionship of the man she served for 12 years.

"Tunah and Pay probably won't ever meet," said Hasbrook, obviously regretful at the step he had to take. "They told me at the school it would be the best thing for me and the dogs."

"They advised me to heap affection on Tunah. It probably stay away from Pay for a few months."

Party Given
Pay was retired with honors. They had a farewell party for her at the Lilly and company pharmacy, a firm where she had become familiar over the years as Hasbrook's "eyes" during his office hours.

For a seeing-eye dog she had a better than average career. To keep him with Hasbrook she had to guide him not only through his job at Lilly's but on his many tours around Indiana making speeches and to and from his seat in the Indiana legislature.

Tunah is having a little trouble getting used to Hasbrook's routine, both at work and at home. On the first day at the office visitors kept coming into Hasbrook's office to meet her but she spent most of the time under his desk.

Likes Boys
At home there is Mrs. Hasbrook and the children—two boys and three girls. "I guess she's jealous. One night she tried to keep the baby from climbing up on my lap," Hasbrook said.

In another part of Indianapolis, Fay is adjusting to a new life of all play and no work. If she is allowed visits with Hasbrook at all they will have to be brief.

"They tell me she's been frisking in the snow occasionally," said Hasbrook. "And she sleeps a lot."

Statistics Shown on Growing Cost for Socialized Medicine

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Prime Minister Anthony Eden's Conservative government has just sponsored some interesting reports on what everyone was getting spectacles or health service (NHS).

NHS also is known as socialized medicine, a tax-paid healing system which had former President Truman's sympathetic interest at one time but got nowhere in Congress. A British investigating committee set up in 1953 now reports that the cost of national health service in the United Kingdom still is going up.

It cost \$1,032,000,000 in the 1954 fiscal year, an increase of more than 130 million dollars since fiscal 1950. Costs long since had doubled the original estimates of the Socialized system shortly after World War II.

The report estimated current costs at 324 per cent of British treasury revenue. On the same percentage basis, socialized medicine would cost the United States about \$2,066,000,000 in the current fiscal year—and go up from there if British experience is a sound guide.

The committee reported that the administrative structure of NHS was sound and had a record of real achievement. It rejected the idea that some of the small fees imposed after experience with socialized medicine should be increased. The committee said some should be reduced.

Even the Socialists acknowledged after practical experience that they had been overly generous in their nationalization of all medical as-

might mean a stay of weeks or months.

Put another way, it appears that individuals needing major operations under the British NHS must get in line for weeks and months to obtain surgery. The shortage of dentists is terrific, with a consequent similar delay in dental care. There was a time when three months was the customary wait for new spectacles.

Economy-minded Britons were disappointed in the committee's failure to foresee any economies while recommending more costs.

The house of commons was informed that Sir Anthony's Conservative government agreed with the committee's general conclusions and over-all approach.

The hard political fact is that the under-privileged British masses fell in love with socialized medicine from the beginning. Any government which tampered with it much would be tossed out. For many a lower class Briton it was a sudden change from no medical care to lots of it for free—even if he had to wait a few months to get it.

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Anti-Protons Exist; Photo Proof Given

NEW YORK, Feb. 1 (AP)—Proof of the existence of the anti-proton, which annihilates regular matter, was reported yesterday to the American Physical Society.

The proof lies in new photographs of an anti-proton annihilating itself and part of an atom in a spectacular explosion, said Dr. Owen Chamberlain, one of the University of California physicists who discovered the anti-proton last fall.

The explosion produced eight visible particles possessing such high total energy as to give proof that an anti-proton produced the explosion, he explained.

All living and inanimate things are made of protons and neutrons, which form the cores of nuclei of atoms. The anti-proton, however, is a bit of "reverse matter." It is just like a proton, except that it has a negative instead of positive charge.

When an anti-proton meets a regular proton, or a neutron, it annihilates itself and the proton or neutron. The two particles are turned into energy.

Marines Complete Arctic Maneuvers

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Feb. 1 (AP)—A Navy amphibious task force was en route to San Francisco yesterday after completion of Arctic operations in Alaska.

The assault on the heavily defended missile launching site at Mokoshin bay on Unalaska island was made by about 2,500 men of the task force during the last week of the maneuvers. The task force of heavy transports and supply ships had sailed with the marines from San Diego Jan. 3.

The marines were landed on Unalaska by helicopter and from their ships last Wednesday. Mud and cold winds made the operations difficult, but task force officers described the maneuvers as successful.

Kubitschek Opens Presidential Task

RIO DE JANEIRO, Feb. 1 (AP)—Juscelino Kubitschek began his first full day as president of Brazil today with a meeting of his "honest but mediocre" cabinet.

Kubitschek and his vice-president, Joao Goulart, were sworn in yesterday in ceremonies attended by U. S. Vice President Richard M. Nixon and special envoys from 60 other countries. The final event of the day was a reception for the special ambassadors at 9:30 p.m.

A communist threat to pocket the inaugural ceremonies fizzled out, although a handful of Reds showed up with banners demanding realization of their outlawed party and renewed diplomatic relations with Russia. Twenty-three communist demonstrators were arrested.

Cerebral Palsy School Given Book Aid by College Students

An automatic book page turning device for cerebral palsy school pupils was demonstrated Wednesday during an assembly for Twin Falls Business college students.

The machine was purchased for the cerebral palsy school through funds raised by the business college students. The machine is operated electrically and will turn up to 100 pages of a book by pressure on a switch. A teacher must first attach clips connected to a string to turn the page.

As the switch is pressed an electric impulse winds a small cylinder to the left of the machine pulling the page over. A string connected to the next page holds the book open until the operator is ready to turn the page.

The student body raised money for the machine through a rummage sale. The machine is believed to be one of the first used in the state.

General May Face Actions After Speech

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1—The Army indicated last night it is looking into Maj. Gen. Eugene Caffey's action in praising a speech by a Georgia congressman favoring racial segregation.

Caffey is judge advocate general of the army, its chief legal officer. He has said his remarks made in an appearance before the Georgia legislature, were misinterpreted in news reports.

Nevertheless, Representative Powell, D. N. Y., sent a telegram to President Eisenhower yesterday demanding that Caffey be dismissed.

"The record is very clear on what he said," Powell told a reporter. "He can't get out of it." Powell, a Negro, is a leader of the fight in congress against segregation.

The judge advocate general, a native of Boston, Ga., addressed both the Georgia house and senate briefly in Atlanta Monday, mentioning that he had read a speech made to the general assembly last week by U. S. Rep. John J. Flinn, a Democrat from Griffin, Ga.

"If I were going to make a speech I would hope to make one like that," Caffey told the house later, before the senate, he said. "There was a lot of meat in that speech I, for one, admire it."

Flynt addressed the legislators last Tuesday. He appealed to Georgians to join the interposition movement to preserve school segregation in the south despite the supreme court's edict that segregation is unconstitutional.

Armed Forces of U.S. Enter Modern Era of Guided Missiles and Grim Race

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—The U. S. armed forces are well across the threshold into the guided missile era. They are spending record sums this year in an effort to pull ahead of Russia in the grim race to perfect these "ultimate weapons."

Under development are almost-human missiles not yet publicized but far more fantastic than the six types of robot weapons already in the hands of U. S. combat units.

The deadly "birds," as military men call them, are likely to revolutionize warfare in the 1950's. The big question is whether Russia will have them first.

Concern about Soviet progress was reflected in Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson's order last month for a "substantial expansion" of army, navy and air force work in missiles, both for the 5,000-mile "intercontinental" range and the 1,500-mile "intermediate" range.

Private Help Is Needed in Health Plans

BOISE, Feb. 1 (AP)—Dr. John L. Butler, Idaho mental health director, has declared that private groups of doctors and laymen must be the "strong right arm" of a public mental health program in Idaho.

Butler was guest speaker at a meeting of the Ada, Canyon and Gooding county mental health associations, groups made up of business and professional people.

The state health department will provide assistance where possible, Butler said, but private groups must lay the groundwork by determining the needs of mental health.

Once the communities have become "mental health-minded," Butler said, then professional people will be attracted to provide needed psychiatric service on a private basis.

Harold Klobucher, Gooding, president of the Idaho Mental Health Association, met with Butler and other association members earlier in the day to plan the organization of more local mental health groups throughout the state.

Safety Factor In H-Bomb Is Given in Meet

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Congress heard yesterday that the biggest nuclear weapons give some of their potential victims a few breathless seconds to duck, burrow or dodge for their lives.

This was one of few encouraging notes in testimony before a house government operations subcommittee by Dr. Willard F. Libby, member of the atomic energy commission.

Subcommittee Chairman Hollifield, D. Calif., said one purpose of the hearings is to inform the public on possibilities of civil defense. He said he and the subcommittee members feel civil defense can be effective if there is understanding by the public, financial support by congress and courageous administration.

Libby said it is important for people to know that there is an interval between the flash of a nuclear weapon and the arrival of the deadly shock wave.

"You would have a real chance to protect yourselves," he said.

Libby estimated there would be about one and one-third minutes between the explosion of a 10-megaton H-bomb and the arrival 18 miles away of the blast wave. A 10-megaton bomb would carry the blast effect of 10 million tons of TNT.

Libby raised no bright hopes about the chances for survival of anyone near the point of explosion. But he emphasized the importance of things that could be done in the wider fringe areas of bomb damage.

He said everyone should know "that three feet of earth is good protection" against radioactive fallout.

Science Makes Slow Progress In Preventing Artery Trouble

NEW YORK, Feb. 1 (AP)—Although progress is slow, science definitely is making headway in its search for ways of preventing human arteries from "hardening" and stopping the "hardening" process once it has started.

Take the experiments of a doctor of philosophy (in chemistry) and a doctor of veterinary medicine with flocks of white leghorn cockerels and with several chemical and non-potable forms of alcohol.

One of the alcohols was cholesterol, which the animal body extracts from its food but also manufactures on its own and in some bodies collects in crystalline form inside arteries. This "hardens" the arteries and sets the stage for heart attacks and for the mental debilities of old age.

Another alcohol was of the same chemical class but a product of the soybean in its germination, growth and maturing. The third alcohol was the result of a chemist's manipulations in his laboratory. It was a salt of an ester, or compound, of an alcohol.

Our scientists, Thomas B. Clarkson, D.V.M., J. Stanton King, Jr., Ph. D., and Nela Hyder Warnock, B. S., of BRISTOL, Tenn., quite aware that these alcohols somehow react upon one another, divided their white cockerels into four flocks.

All were fed on the same mash to which cholesterol had been added. But the soybean alcohol was added to the mash of flock number two,

the man-made alcohol was added to that of flock number three, and both the soybean and man-made substances were added to the mash of flock number four.

As was to be expected, the circulating cholesterol in the blood streams of all four flocks shot up. That of the cholesterol-only flock went the highest. That of the flock which got both cholesterol and the man-made alcohol was second highest. And that of the flock which got both soybean and man-made alcohols was the lowest.

The conclusion is dramatic—but not explained. Somehow the man-made alcohol enhanced the chemical ability of the soybean alcohol to hold down circulating cholesterol.

When the scientists analyzed the main heart arteries of their cockerels for deposited cholesterol content, they got the same results but even more strikingly.

Soviet May Test Ballistic Missile

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D. Wash., warned the senate today that Russia may fire a 1,500-mile ballistic missile this year and upset the balance of world power.

Jackson was the lead-off speaker for a group of junior Democrats who believe Russia is overtaking America's advantage in modern arms and planned to proclaim their alarm about it. Jackson is a member of the committee on armed services and atomic energy.

He called for an all-out program to develop an intercontinental—5,000 mile—ballistic missile as well as an intermediate range—1,500 mile—weapon.

Budge Lashes Costs for Big Nevada Battle

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—The federal government is spending thousands of dollars because navy officers refuse to pay \$6 for Nevada water permits, Representative Budge R. Ida, said yesterday.

Testimony given at a recent house interior-committee hearing shows Budge told a reporter, that the officers "flaunted state water rights" in a case involving six water wells.

He said the navy drilled wells at its Hawthorne ammunition depot and could have obtained water rights by paying \$6 to the state engineer and signing certificates declaring the water would be put to beneficial use.

"Instead of doing this," Budge said, "the navy withdrew its applications, saying it didn't have to comply with state water rights. The state is suing, and the justice department is defending the navy."

In addition to the "many thousands of dollars" to be spent on the court case, Budge said, the navy sent to the committee hearing "a half dozen admirals, a half dozen captains, the secretary of the navy, the navy's chief counsel and several assistants."

"All this," the Idahoan said, "because they didn't want to spend \$6. Instead they flaunt state water rights and want to dominate and oppose them, which will arouse the people in the West who rely on state water rights."

Solons Study New Ways to Increase Tax

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Democratic-led congress and the Republican administration were more interested in tax increases today than the election-year income tax cut that is supposed to appeal irresistibly to candidates for office.

While neither the Democratic leadership nor President Eisenhower has closed the door on income tax reduction this year, it is not in the works now. And it is far from a sure thing for later in the year.

Congress and/or the administration are thinking about tax increases for highways, social security and mail service as shown by these developments:

1. GOP congressional leaders reported yesterday that Mr. Eisenhower had agreed to accept a Democratic plan to finance an expanded highway program from increased user taxes. The central feature of this is expected to tap the motorist for an additional one cent a gallon for gasoline.

2. Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield went before senate Republicans yesterday to ask again for the administration program to raise postal rates 400 million dollars a year, including a penny increase on first class and air mail.

3. The senate finance committee is working on a bill, passed by the house last year, to lower the age at which women and disabled persons could qualify for old age insurance benefits. The house bill calls for increasing the present pay roll tax by one-half per cent each on the employer and employee. For persons earning over \$4,200, this would mean a \$1 increase in paycheck deductions each year.

beef from a 60-day supply to a 180-day supply. The program was started last month, and is centered largely on buying boneless beef from heavy weight choice grade cattle. Military needs normally are obtained from a wider range of grades.

Arabian Area Plays Part in Current Meet

By United Press
A little Arabian kingdom is playing a big part in the talks between President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Anthony Eden in Washington. Saudi Arabia is the country. It occupies most of the Arabian peninsula, bounded by the Red sea, the Persian gulf and the Arabian sea.

Saudi Arabia practically floats on oil. And that oil is the real issue in what is becoming an urgent Anglo-American problem. Mr. Eisenhower and Eden have discussed a number of world problems—relations with Soviet Russia, German unification, what to do about Communist China. But the problem of Saudi Arabia is an immediate one. It enters into the Palestine problem, the Baghdad defense alliance and the Russian campaign of penetration in the Middle East.

Agreement Unlikely
If the President and Eden can come to any agreement on Saudi Arabia, their conference will be a success. But agreement seems to be unlikely.

Britain's relations with Saudi Arabia are bad, and getting worse. Relations between Saudi Arabia and the United States are good.

Britain is involved in a long-standing dispute with Saudi Arabia over possession of the little Buraimi oasis on the east coast of the Arabian peninsula. Both countries claim it. Britain's claim is made in behalf of a group of tiny sheikdoms, or Arabian principalities, which are tied to Britain by treaty.

Battle Held
Last October a few dozen troops and police of the sheikdoms—led by British officers—threw a few dozen Saudi Arabian troops and police out of the oasis. Saudi Arabia is fumingly angry over that. Behind it all is the clash of oil interests. Buraimi oasis gives promise of yielding fabulous amounts of oil.

King Saud does business with the American-owned Arabian American Oil company. He gets royalties of about 250 million dollars a year from it.
