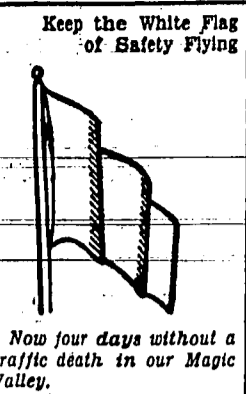


Ranges Use Is Reduced on 2 Grazing Units

Few Cities in U. S. Report Low Mishaps

CHICAGO, Feb. 2 (AP)—Accidents killed 92,000 Americans in 1955, and the auto was the No. 1 killer, the National Safety Council said today.

Mishaps injured 9,200,000 others, the council said, and exacted an economic loss estimated at a whopping \$10,300,000,000.

Motor vehicles claimed 38,300 lives in 1955 accidents; an eight per cent increase over the 1954 count. The number rose each month from March on, to a 14-year high for the last month of the year.

The all-accident toll of 92,000 compared with a total of 89,432 in 1954, an increase of three per cent. Despite the increase, the per capita accident death rate was the second lowest in the history of accident records. The 1955 rate of 56 per 100,000 population was bettered only in 1954, when accidents killed 55.3 out of each 100,000 population.

The safety council said the eight per cent increase in highway deaths was the major factor in the higher all-accident death toll.

The 1955 traffic toll was 2,714 above the 1954 count of 35,588 and about 1,570 below the all-time high of 39,969 established in 1941.

The December toll climbing a 10-month rise was 3,960, up 12 per cent over December, 1954, and the largest monthly total since December, 1941.

The safety council, in its annual year-end survey, showed these figures on accident deaths:

The safety council said one out of every 18 persons in the United States suffered a disabling injury last year.

Falls, always a heavy killer, brought death to 19,800 persons, one per cent more than in 1954.

Drownings accounted for 8,400 deaths, one per cent more than in 1954, and firearms deaths totaled 2,300, about the same as in the previous year.

Accidents in 1955 Kill 92,000 People; Automobiles Rate as No. 1 U.S. Killer

CHICAGO, Feb. 2 (AP)—Less than half the cities reporting traffic accidents to the National Safety Council last year recorded better records than they turned in in 1954, the council said today.

Of the 531 reporting in 1955, 232 showed more traffic deaths last year than in 1954. 207 reported a decrease, and 92 no change, the council said.

Syracuse, N. Y., showed the largest reduction in fatalities among cities of 200,000 population or more—down 37 per cent. Tampa, Fla., had a 34 per cent decrease, and Seattle, Wash., and Dallas, Tex., each 28 per cent.

Other cities in this population classification, and the percentage of traffic deaths decrease in 1955 compared to 1954, included St. Paul, Minn., down 19 per cent; Memphis, Tenn., 17; St. Louis, Mo., Milwaukee, Wis., and Portland, Ore., each 10; and Chicago, three.

Among cities of 10,000 population or more, 81 turned in perfect records for the year. Medford, Mass., with 66,100 population, was the largest city with an unblemished report. Muskegon, Mich., was second largest, and La Crosse, Wis., third.

Demo Tosses Words of '54 Back to GOP

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (AP)—Senator Douglas, D. Ill., who was called a "prophet of gloom and doom" by the Republicans in 1954, threw the words back at the GOP yesterday.

Douglas found flaws in the administration's money plans for the fiscal year beginning July 1 and told Budget Director Rowland R. Hughes:

"I'd say the budget bureau has become a prophet of gloom and doom for the coming year."

Douglas said President Eisenhower's budget presupposes that the national economy will stay at about the level it was in the last three months of 1955. He said that would mean increased unemployment since the population and productivity keep growing.

He addressed these remarks to Hughes during the budget director's appearance before the senate-house economic committee which is studying Eisenhower's annual economic report.

Hughes told Douglas that budget calculations have to be based on what is in sight, not on estimates of economic trends.

Representative Curtis R. M. said there is no implication in the budget that the Eisenhower administration "has anything but optimism" about the economic future.

Fist-Warming Affair Sparks French Wrath

PARIS, Feb. 2 (AP)—French war veterans were up in arms today because three American soldiers warmed their hands over the eternal flame of the tomb of France's unknown soldier under the Arc de Triomphe.

The furor was touched off by an angry letter to the newspaper France Soir in which an unidentified French veteran complained he was an "indignant witness" to the incident.

He demanded "short lectures" on French history for foreign troops before they are allowed to roam through Paris.

Guards at the tomb said the incident occurred about three weeks ago. They said three American GIs walked up to the tomb and began warming their chilled fingers over the eternal flame.

Two gendarmes finally drove the soldiers away, a guard said.

The French veteran denounced the soldiers' action as a "scandal."

"They self-satisfied grins gave the misplaced gesture a particularly shocking appearance," he wrote.

Woman Stricken After Spider Nip

HONOLULU, Feb. 2 (AP)—A Honolulu housewife who was bitten by a rare poisonous spider fought for her life in an iron lung today after the spider's venom apparently paralyzed her respiratory system.

Mrs. Ethel Tanabe, 42, was bitten on her hand Monday by a chironomium diversum spider while she was cleaning a cupboard in her usual Honolulu home. Several hours later, numbness developed and she lapsed into a coma. She was hospitalized yesterday when paralysis developed in her respiratory tract.

Entomologists of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' association said the rare red and yellow spider arrived in Hawaii five years ago from the south Pacific. They said several other persons have been bitten by the spiders but none suffered ill effects other than pain and numbness.

Doctors said Mrs. Tanabe apparently was highly sensitive to the insect's venom.

Mother Seeks Doctor's Aid, Braves Jaunt

DULUTH, Minn., Feb. 2 (AP)—Mrs. Arthur Madsen, 24, decided she wanted a doctor when her fourth child is born and traveled 150 miles from her Canadian northwoods home to reach one.

But the trip was by snowshoes, snowmobile, dog sled, automobile and bus.

Mrs. Madsen and her oldest son, Chris, 6, left their home on the Canadian side of Saginaw lake Saturday morning in a snowmobile, an automobile powered by a half-truck.

Wait for Husband

They were unable to continue their trip after crossing the lake because the dog sleds they planned to hitch a ride on was loaded with trappers' supplies.

So Mrs. Madsen said she and her son built a fire, and left alone, waiting for her husband, a guide, to show up. The fire was a signal for him to come.

Her husband, Arthur, arrived with a toboggan, which he dragged across the lake ice, and snowshoes. They loaded their baggage on the toboggan and set out on snowshoes for the end of the trail three miles away.

The last quarter of a mile Mrs. Madsen and her son rode on a dog-sled sent out by the trappers to meet them.

Truck Falls

A weekly mail truck was to take Mrs. Madsen and her son into Grand Marais, Minn., but failed to arrive because of a 17-inch snowfall.

Mrs. Madsen and Chris then got a lift by automobile from an Indian guide, George Plummer, who took them to a lodge where there was a telephone.

An emergency call sent a snow-plover crew from Grand Marais to the lodge to open a path for Mrs. Madsen and her son. It was the next morning when the two reached Grand Marais. They took an afternoon bus to Duluth, 87 miles away.

New Circular School Ready

KANKAKEE, Ill., Feb. 2 (AP)—Workmen are putting the finishing touches on a new circular school believed unique in American architecture.

The two-story building forms a circle, 220 feet in diameter. In the center is a gym, circled by 2,300 seats.

Around this is a corridor. On the outer rim of the circle are two stories of classrooms, enclosed by wide expanses of glass.

Edo Bell, Chicago architect whose firm designed the \$640,000 structure, said he believed it was the first of its kind.

Patricia E. F. Hoffman, principal of the school, said some 450 students at St. Patrick's high school will begin using the new structure when the spring term opens Feb. 6. He said students, teachers and parents like the building "fine."

Bell said one big advantage of the circular design is it cuts costs 20 percent with \$20 to \$30 paid to erect new schools in Chicago, about 50 miles north of here.

"When you design a circular building, you eliminate an awful lot of waste corridor space," he said. "The efficiency of the school jumps tremendously."

Truman Says He Considered Ousting MacArthur Earlier

NEW YORK, Feb. 2 (AP)—Former President Truman said today he gave serious thought to firing Gen. Douglas MacArthur from his Far East command fully eight months before he did fire the general.

Mr. Truman made the revelation in his Memoirs being published by Life magazine.

In his version of the events leading up to his actual dismissal of MacArthur, Mr. Truman said he decided against such a step in August of 1950 because "I had no desire to hurt General MacArthur personally."

Mr. Truman said he was tempted to take the step because of a statement MacArthur had sent to the Veterans of Foreign Wars advocating U. S. armament of and possibly U. S. occupation of Formosa as an "unsinkable aircraft carrier."

The MacArthur statement was by implication a criticism of Mr. Truman's policy of neutralizing Formosa.

MacArthur had just told special Presidential Envoy Averell Harriman he would support the President's policy, Mr. Truman said.

The crisis was averted when Mr. Truman told MacArthur to withdraw the statement and "General MacArthur complied at once," the former President said.

Mr. Truman said he suggested his preparedness for school discussed.

Red Officials Feel Uneasy; Ax Is Poised

A lot of high-ranking officials in Soviet Russia must be feeling uneasy these days. The premier of two of the 16 Soviet republics in the Soviet Union have been "relieved" of their posts within the last two weeks.

Now the interior minister in the Soviet Union cabinet, a veteran career police official, has been "released."

Mystery Noted

What is behind it all is a mystery. Some experts say the changes are being made in preparation for a congress of the Soviet Union Communist party on Feb. 14, a sort of housecleaning. Some suggest that Nikita S. Khrushchev is strengthening his position as the "most equal" of the leaders in the Soviet government.

In any event, the changes suggest that the Kremlin has a lot of internal problems to deal with.

Agriculture Bad

For one thing, it is quite evident that the agriculture situation in the Soviet Union is bad—and that Khrushchev himself is to blame.

Khrushchev long ago took over all charge of the agriculture situation. He sponsored some grandiose plans of development. They included the planting of millions of acres of new land and the shifting of hundreds of thousands of youths to eastern regions. A number of these plans have come unstruck. In Russia, the blame has been put on anybody available for the role of whipping boy. Anybody but Khrushchev, in fact.

His Campaign

The Kremlin is pursuing right now an unprecedented campaign of penetration all over the world. It is meddling in the Middle Eastern area situation. It is trying to penetrate economically the nations of southern Asia. It is making a bid to penetrate into Latin America.

The menace of Russian communism to the free world cannot be discounted. But the Kremlin also has its troubles.

2 Papers Battle State's Libel Bill

ATLANTA, Feb. 2 (AP)—Two of Georgia's largest newspapers, which have been critical of state spending under Gov. Marvin Griffin, vowed today they will not be "intimidated" by a new libel bill.

The bill, needing only Griffin's signature to become law, won final approval yesterday in the legislature where one opponent said it would open the door to such press controls as "Peron had in Argentina and Hitler did in Germany."

The bill, favored by Griffin who is expected to sign it quickly into law, would make a newspaper liable to suit in every county in which the paper has more than 50 subscribers.

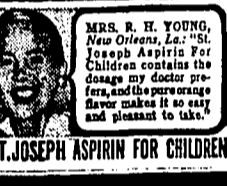
The father, 50-year-old Arthur Merrill Graham, Jr., was the only occupant of the house to escape the blaze.

Auto Cutback Did Not Slug Nation Badly

DETROIT, Feb. 2 (AP)—The worst of the long-expected production cutback in the automobile industry may be over already. If so, like a trip to the dentist, it wasn't as bad as many feared.

The weekly output of new cars has been cut 40,000 a week since early December—a reduction of some 22 per cent. Now production is showing signs of getting back in step with current sales.

Boom Could Help
The normal boom sales in the spring months could cut the biggest mid-winter inventory of unsold new cars in history down to size.

This big cutback has been expected by many people since as long as a year ago. There was much uncertainty what it would bring. The industry is a key to the national economy and some feared a production slack could trigger a chain reaction.

Done Quietly
But the heavy cutback—and a cutback of 40,000 cars a week is a big one—has been made without many people realizing it happened. That is unique when one realizes that a reduction of 40,000 cars a week is like the entire Ford organization coming to a standstill.

The cutback started in early December. The short work weeks at Christmas and New Year masked it. Production naturally fell off due to the shorter weeks and afterward it didn't step back up. Instead there was a gradual dropping.

Layoffs Light
Layoffs have been comparatively light—27,000 out of a total of some 600,000 auto workers.

What is behind the cutbacks is a backlog ranging somewhere between 800,000 and 900,000 unsold new cars on hand. Without further cutbacks, the backlog will get bigger yet. But if spring sales jump, as they normally do, they can work off the stockpile.

Transfer Made

TOKYO, Feb. 2 (AP)—The U. S. army's historic ninth corps, which gained fame during nine bitter campaigns in the Korean war, has been transferred to Okinawa and merged with the Ryukyu command under Maj. Gen. James E. Moore, the army announced today.

The announcement said the transfer "is another phase of the army's current redeployment program . . . in the Far East." The corps headquarters currently is at Sendai in northern Japan.

Noted Expert To Hunt, Test Whale's Heart

NEW YORK, Feb. 2 (AP)—Dr. Paul D. White, heart consultant to President Eisenhower, is setting today to hunt down a big gray whale and record its heartbeat.

It's part of a scientific study, aiding in understanding human hearts, that has covered the hearts of mice, elephants and small one-ton whales.

Now the goal is the 250-pound hearts of gray whales that weigh up to 50 tons and run 40 feet in length. The expedition was announced yesterday by the National Geographic society.

The Boston physician and associates will spend eight to 10 days in the gray whale "nursery" area in the Pacific off Baja California in Mexico, using special electrode "harpoons" to record the whale pulse and electrocardiogram.

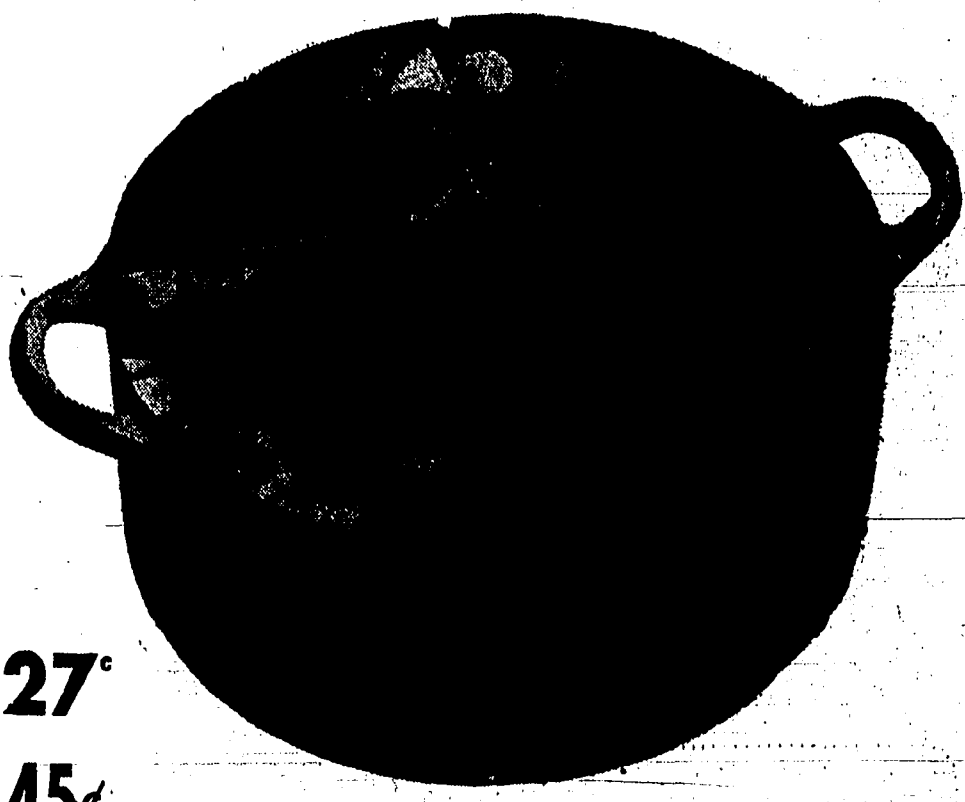

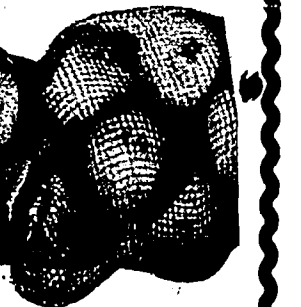

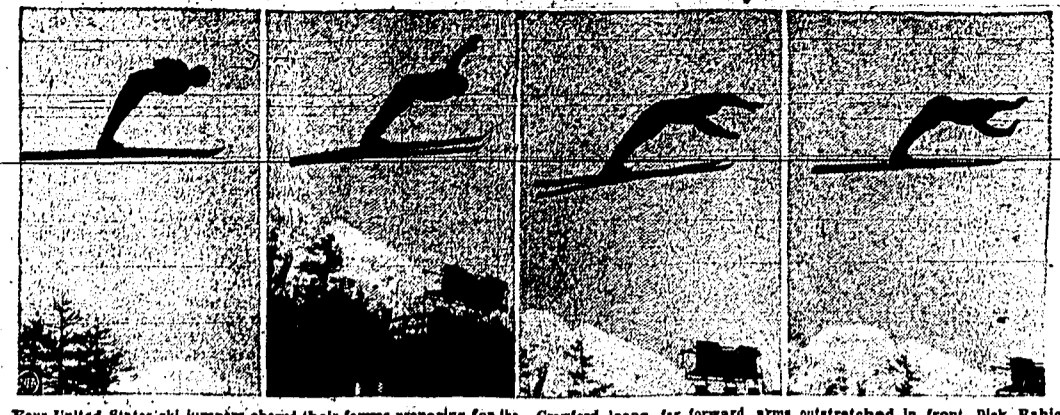

Range, Pasture Development Is Aim of District's Program

SHOSHONE, Feb. 2—At a meeting of the pilot district extension committee for the West river soil conservation district Monday night, emphasis was placed on the development of livestock ranges and pastures on private lands. This program involves reseedence, fencing, water development and brush control with each government agency in the district taking care of its own work.

The committee recommended a study be made of a web-worm which is killing sage and scrub brush in the area. Members suggest the state extension service or bureau of entomology investigate the worm and to determine if the worm may move onto cultivated crops.

The pilot district has been in existence for approximately three years and the meeting Monday was the first in carrying out plans suggested as a result of studies made in the district in that period of time.

The district comprises 1,271 square miles, including Lincoln county and 30 square miles of Gooding county. Approximately 109,000 acres, or 13 per cent, are classified as suitable for farming with only 54,000 acres actually under cultivation.

Range land comprises 724,000 acres, or 89 per cent of the district. Of this total, only 29,000 acres, or four per cent, are in good condition. 213,500 acres are in fair condition and 482,500 in poor condition. Livestock contributes 53 per cent of the income of the agricultural enterprise of the district.

That means for every 10 inches of water delivered, less than three inches is used to meet the actual needs of the crops. There are 9,285 acres of cultivated land infested with weeds, 325 miles of weeds along canal banks and the equivalent of 28 miles of solid highway vegetation along district highways.

The average production per cow in the district is 265 pounds of bull-sheep use the district's range land total, the average hay yield is only three tons per acre and cattle get only four cow months of grazing annually.

Also each year approximately 330,000 acre feet of water are delivered through the Big Wood river canal system. There is a loss of 20 per cent in distribution. Of the amount delivered to farms, there is less than 30 per cent irrigation efficiency.

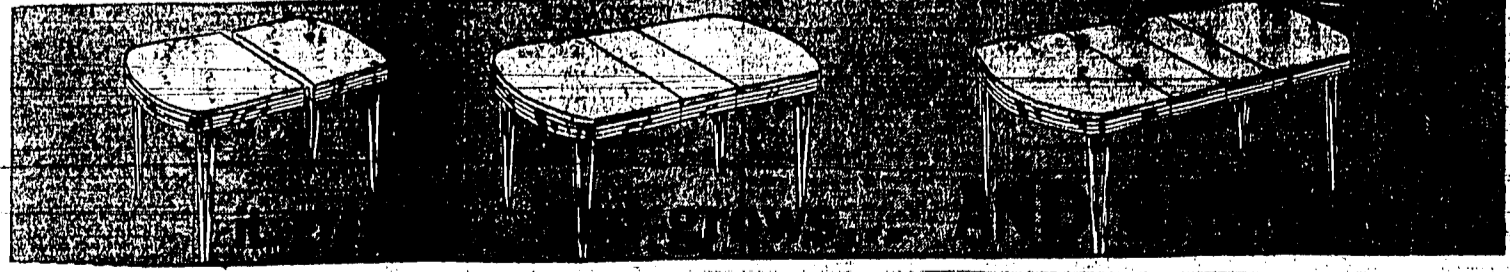
