





### Truman Talks With Old Aide On Fast Walk

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman and former Postmaster General James A. Farley talked "ships, and shoes and sailing war" this morning in a brisk 26-block walk down Park avenue to a Waldorf-Astoria hotel breakfast.

That was how Mr. Truman characterized it.

Conversation ranged from window washing to the personalities of the lie-abed residents of the houses they passed. They reminisced about political friends and St. Patrick's day celebrations. Mr. Truman talked to accompanying newsmen about traffic problems and made a joke about earth satellites. At one point Farley lost a black silk garter.

**Talked Politics**

At breakfast, at a corner table in a public dining room of the hotel, Mr. Truman said he and Farley "talked politics from A to Z."

Newsmen asked if they'd settled on a Democratic presidential candidate.

Mr. Truman put on a serious face. "There's no use having a convention," he said. "It's all settled."

Then he laughed. "We didn't even talk about it," said the former President, who has said he'll stay "neutral" until next August's convention.

**Act Like Missourian**

Asked what he thought about the projected earth satellites, Mr. Truman acted the part of a man from Missouri.

"I'm like Adm. (William) Leahy when he said on the atomic bomb 'I think it is a lot of hokey.'"

"It's like those flying saucers. It's possible, I guess, but don't know what good it'll do."

Then the 71-year-old former President laughed at himself and said "I'm getting to the age where I'm old-fashioned, I guess."

### Twentieth Century Club Raises Fund For Big Fireplace in New Local Park

The Twentieth Century club of Twin Falls has donated \$300 to purchase materials for construction of an outdoor fireplace in the proposed Harry Barry Memorial park on Birch Street between Wiseman and Borah avenues.

Saturday, Mrs. O. H. Weinrich, club president, and City Park Superintendent Ernest Craner inspected outdoor fireplaces in Harmon and South park so she could report back to club members on the type of fireplace to be built.

"We are providing the fireplace in an effort to get parents and children together in healthful outdoor activities. By doing this we believe we can help combat juvenile delinquency," Mrs. Weinrich said.

She explained that funds were provided by members. "We should take more interest in our public parks. By helping provide facilities of this type we feel that local residents will spend more time in them," Mrs. Weinrich said.

Funds provided by the club do not go into the fund for the park, which now stands at \$4,825.90. The amount needed for completion of the park is \$5,800. The project is sponsored by the Twin Falls Rotary club. Robert Warberg is chairman of the fund drive. Warberg said actual construction of the park will begin this spring as soon as weather conditions are favorable. The park will include approximately four acres of land.

### Bulgaria, Russia Ink Trade Pact

MOSCOW, Feb. 4 (AP)—Soviet Premier-Nikolai A. Bulganin, who has not been seen in public since Jan. 3, yesterday signed an economic agreement with Bulgaria, it was announced.

Bulganin's absence from diplomatic functions during the past month touched off speculation that he was ill. Soviet officials, however, maintained Bulganin was in good health, that he was resting after the exhaustive tour of south-east Asia.

The agreement provided for 300 million rubles (nominally 75 million dollars) in Soviet credit to Bulgaria and an additional 70 million rubles (nominally 17 1/2 million dollars) for technical aid. The credit is payable within 10 years at two per cent interest.

### Idaho's Guard Growth Notes Top Progress

BOISE, Feb. 4 (AP)—Enrollment in the Idaho national guard has reached the highest point in the state's history, Maj. Gen. John E. Walsh, state adjutant general, announced today.

"At present 3,304 men are members of the Idaho guard," Walsh said. "Of a total of 42 army guard units, six are now recruited to full authorized strength. Most of the others are well above the minimum required by federal regulations."

The adjutant general said more than 500 men had enlisted in the guard during the past three months and added, "We expect to have a record-breaking number of men at Gowen field for training this summer."

Noting that the new armed forces reserve law places new responsibilities on the guard, Walsh declared: "Our increased enlistments are coupled with a movement to provide more adequate and suitable army facilities. A new armory at Homedale, to be built through federal, state and local cooperation, has been approved."

Walsh said the new reserve law provides that men enlisting in the guard before they are 18 may complete their military obligation by serving in the guard continuously until they are 28. Others may reduce their liability to eight years by taking six months of active duty training.

### Couple Is Aided In Mercy Flight

COEUR D'ALENE, Feb. 4 (AP)—W. H. Cook was recovering from an illness today at his isolated home on Lake Coeur d'Alene after a Coeur d'Alene pilot flew to his rescue.

Cook and his wife are the only year-round residents at Camp Sweeney, 10 miles from here on Mica bay. There is no road into the camp and it cannot be reached by boat because the lake is frozen. There is no phone.

When Cook became ill, his wife first tried to attract attention by blowing a horn. When that failed, she turned on the yard light Thursday night and pointed the reflector toward Coeur d'Alene.

The signal was spotted by sheriff's officers and pilot Harold Rhodes put his in his light plane and flew into the camp, returned here to have a prescription filled for Cook and flew the medicine back to the camp.

### Eight Words Used as Label; Story Has Huge Dimensions

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (AP)—Each day for three weeks the "Congressional Record" has used this heading to describe the main business before the senate:

"Amendment of the Natural Gas Act, as amended."

Rarely have eight words done as poor a job in telling what has been going on.

For, in discussing natural gas, senators have poured out thousands of words, fired hundreds of statistics, and mulled over dozens of charts.

Governors, mayors, editorial writers and plain citizens have demanded that senators do their duty, but with conflicting opinions on what that duty is.

Lobbyists—or so several senators have claimed—have labored with a relentlessness rarely seen, even in Washington. Sen. Francis Case, R., S. D., said he even was offered a \$250,000 campaign contribution in an effort to get his vote for the bill.

The showdown is scheduled for Monday in the form of a senate vote.

What, then, has the shouting been about? Why is gas so explosive?

Here's the background:

It begins with the 5,000 to 8,000 producers, some of them extremely small operators, who own the wells. They sell to the 17 companies that move the gas from the field to the market through 88,000 miles of huge pipelines. The investment in pipelines: Four billion dollars.

Here the gas is sold to the utility companies that pipe it to homes and factories. Their investment: Eight billion dollars.

The 26 million home owners who use gas pay an annual bill of \$1,400,000,000 and have 14 billions tied up in gas appliances. In addition, a huge volume of gas is used in industry.

Whether you use the stuff or sell it, collectively, it's big business, the sixth largest in the nation.

In 1938 congress decided the federal power commission should have jurisdiction over any gas sold across state lines. In 1954 the supreme

court ruled that this control included not only the pipelines, but also the producers.

The present bill, in effect, would nullify the court ruling by amending the 1938 law so that producers would be excluded from direct federal control.

Last year the bill squeaked through the house, 209-203. The senate vote could be equally close.

### 67 Cows, Farmer Prefer Electricity

PARIS, Tex., Feb. 4 (AP)—Bill Musgrave and his 67 cows can't wait until linemen restore electric power to Musgrave's dairy farm.

When ice-coated power lines gave way early yesterday, Musgrave had 67 cows ready to be milked and they couldn't wait. So Musgrave started milking them by hand. The job was doubly hard because the cows, which had always been milked by machines, didn't like the new-fashioned method. They acted up quite a bit.

Even though the neighbors helped out it was nearly noon before Musgrave finished the morning milking. That left him just time to grab a bit of lunch and feed the cows before starting the evening milking.

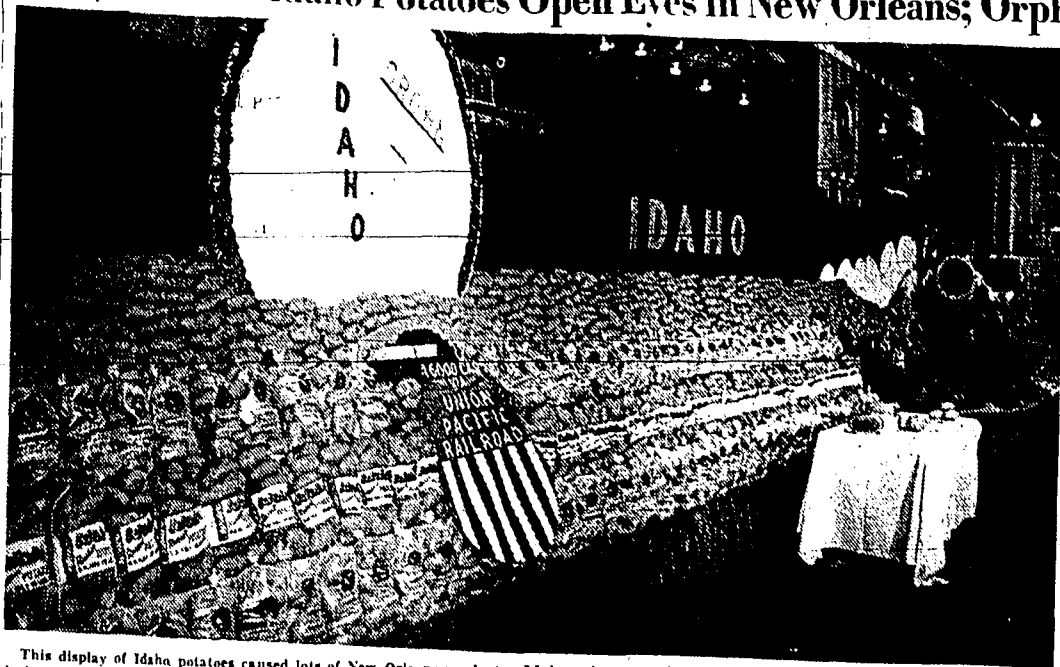

### Idaho's Potato King Adds to Fame as Chief Spud' Booster at Annual Meeting

Joe Marshall, Idaho Potato King, returned to his Twin Falls home Saturday from the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable association meeting in New Orleans where he added to his fame as the chief booster of Idaho's famed tuber. Marshall, now 81, is a charter

member of the Idaho advertising commission which plugs Idaho's spuds over wide areas of the nation. Every year Marshall turns over some of his choice tubers to the commission to be used in a giant display at the convention of the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable association.

And every year, at the end of the convention, Marshall donates the remainder of the giant display to the nearest home for orphans. This year, 4,000 pounds of potatoes and 400 pounds of onions went to the Protestant Children's home and the Idaho avenue housing project in New Orleans. Other exhibitors have started to follow the example. As a result, New Orleans orphans received a wide variety of produce this year.

New Orleans papers published pictures and stories about Marshall, giving his background and details of his "hobby," raising potatoes.

"I've devoted my life to the Idaho russet potato," New Orleans papers quoted Marshall. "I can't make a meal without potatoes. You see, I'm in good health, better than most folks half my age. I never took a dose of medicine in my life. I contribute my health a great deal to potatoes.

### Benson OK's Disaster Plan In Gem Area

BOISE, Feb. 4 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson has approved the application of Gem county farmers for disaster relief as a result of last fall's early frost. It was announced last night.

William Baugh, Jr., state director of the farmers' home administration of the Gem county area, said that the disaster area made the farmers eligible for loans at three per cent interest for periods of as long as 20 years.

Baugh noted, however, that the loans must be proved to be "sound" ones for the purpose of rehabilitating Gem county orchards. The area was hit by a hard frost on Nov. 15, when the mercury plummeted to 13 degrees below zero.

State Agriculture Commissioner Harold West said estimates of damage ran from 40 to 90 per cent of crops. Prunes and cherries were the hardest hit, but there was some damage to apples, peaches and other fruit crops.

The actual amounts to be loaned will depend on the need of the individual farmers.

Baugh said inquiries had been received about the possibility of getting similar relief for growers in Adams county, but no formal request had been made.

The request for Gem county was submitted by a committee of growers. Gov. Robert E. Smylie and the local office of the farmers' home administration.

### Magic Valley Hobbies No. 6 Books of Instructions Say It's Easy But Leather Work Covers Wide Field

Neither exceptional skill nor considerable experience is needed for leather handicraft—that's what the books of instruction say. But, for a subject that isn't supposed to require much skill or experience, a lot of books have been written to explain the craft.

Yet the craft has a multitude of followers. Two devotees are residents of Richfield and each is a specialist. Mrs. Carl Riley, a housewife, makes garments from leather while Gran Nield, farmer and horse trainer, works designs upon leather.

All leather workers agree, at least in one respect, with the books written on the craft. The leather must be good and for design work, the leather must be water tanned so it will not leave an impression. Leather upon which designs are to be worked never should be rolled or folded.

The type of leather a leather worker chooses depends on the work to be done. As to types, the worker has his choice of calf, cowhide, oxhide, sheepskin, goatskin, velvet, Persian, chamois, pigskin, crocodile, fish, lizard, doeskin, vellum or skiver which is sheepskin that has been split thin.

Garment making with leather is similar to making garments with cloth except that a knowledge of leather and what the leather is to be called upon to do are extremely important. Sewing leather, too, requires a somewhat different process than sewing cloth.

Also important to the garment leather worker is a knowledge of how to applique with leather—the superimposing of a leather design upon a leather base.

A pair of chaps for her daughter, Carlee Riley, coupled with what she called an "inborn" feeling for good leather, started Mrs. Riley on the road to making leather garments. For the most part she uses scrap

Surface modeling, another means of decorating leather, is not too popular among leather hobbyists. It consists of modeling on the surface of the leather with plastic paste. Another type of leather designing is done with a special knife with which the design is cut rather than traced. The incision then is opened and one side is pressed out flat. Curved leather carries the embossed design a step further. Paris

Members of the KIMBERLY-HANSEN ground observer corps invaded the Mountain Home airbase last week for first-hand information on the work and duties of the air force.

The GOC members saw ground training machines, simulating types of airplanes, that can produce any emergency. Trainees are taught to handle all such emergencies. Radar gun training and survival trainings also were shown and explained.

A barracks, to replace all old barracks at the post was shown. The new barracks has a TV room and a reading and game room. Living quarters have two and three beds to a room. A tour also was taken around servicemen's homes. A modern school, built on the grounds and maintained by the Mountain Home city, is furnished for pupils in the first six grades.

The group was allowed to go through a C-119, a cargo plane that can carry tons of equipment such as tanks, jeeps, etc., or 80 men, the B-47 multi-jet bomber, which has a crew of 3; and the KC-97 which refuels the B-47 jet.

When two planes are sighted in the air, one apparently "lowing" another, they will be the B-47 jet being refueled by the KC-97.

The KC-97 also can be converted to a cargo ship by removing extra fuel tanks and replacing the refueling section with a loading ramp. This can be done in a matter of hours.

The group viewed the altitude chamber and was shown how parachutes are operated with safety devices, that work automatically when fliers jump.

The GOC members report air force personnel, from top to bottom, are thrifty conscious. Nothing is thrown away until it is beyond repair. Supplies are kept on hand only for immediate needs and there is a complete turnover every six months. There is no wasted time in moving stock which is not used for months or longer.

Appropriations have been made for a new hospital scheduled in 1958. GOC members also visited the filter center at Boise and they watched aircraft flash calls taken and charted on the filter center maps as other GOC posts reported positions of airplanes.

The annual primary children's hospital penny parade of the Twin Falls Stake Primary association opened Thursday and will continue during February.

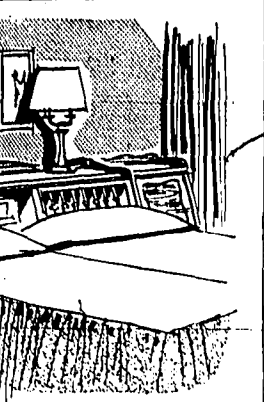
Funds will go toward the operation of a modern 70-bed children's LDS hospital in Salt Lake City. The hospital is maintained for all sick and crippled children.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 4 (AP)—A \$10,000 annual provincial grant may breathe new life into one of British Columbia's most colorful ghost towns.

Trade Minister Ralph Chetwind recommended in the legislature yesterday that the grant be made to preserve the gold rush town of Barkerville, about 300 miles northwest of Vancouver.

The ghost town, now a scramble of tilting shacks, once called itself the "gold capital of the world." It boasted a population greater than any center west of Chicago and north of San Francisco.

Gold in '61

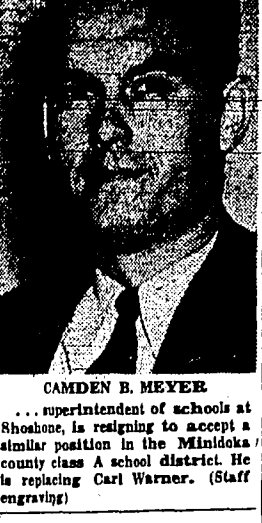
Nestled in a valley amid craggy-faced mountains, the town tumbled into a hurly-burly life in 1861 when Billy Barker discovered a rich deposit of gold. In 1869 at the peak of Barkerville's boom about \$30,000 worth of gold a day was being taken out.

A bronze plaque estimates the total of gold taken from Barkerville claims at 40 million dollars.

Vein dwindles

The gold vein dwindled gradually and Barkerville waned with it, but a small nucleus of miners continued to live there for many years, panning enough gold to keep them alive. At late as 1933 Barkerville was promising a comeback that never happened.

Fishermen Find Good Sport Even in Winter

Many anglers are content to spend the winter months close to the fireside thumbing through equipment catalogs and trying flies for use next spring, but a number of hardy winter fishermen are pursuing their favorite sport more actively—and with good success. Snake river, open the year around, is yielding some big trout this winter. The spring-fed stream, from Twin Falls to Hagerman, apparently is the right temperature for trout activity but non-game fish are a bit sluggish. Most fishermen use bait or artificial lures, although a few stick to fly-casting. Salmon eggs and worms are the most popular baits. Warm dress is essential, of course, but there have been many sunny days this winter that were ideal for outdoor sport. Trout caught at this time of year are reported "tops" in eating quality. There is no trace of mossy flavor and the flesh of trout living in cold water is firm. Some fishermen are having success in angling for whitefish. Most of the whitefish are from 8 to 14 inches long, although one was reported caught from the Salmon river which tipped the scales at 4 1/2 pounds. Hawley Hill, Jerome, district conservation supervisor, said residents of the Magic Valley should consider themselves fortunate in having some of the finest year-around fishing waters in the country available to them. In addition to the Snake river, successful fishing is reported at Murtaugh lake and Jimmy Smith lake where ice-fishing techniques are used. The east fork of the Salmon river is only open in the winter for ice fishing and many simple trout are caught there. American Falls reservoir is another popular spot. Hill pointed out that many fishermen prefer to drive to a remote spot for their summer angling, but they appreciate having good fishing waters close to home for their winter sport.
