Bad Fortune Is Following Dirty Swans

RICHMOND, England, Feb. 7 (AP)—The clean white swans from the upper Thames river defeated the dirty gray swans from down river last night in a five-minute battle that filled the chill night air with clouds of feathers.

The battle started when about 100 swans, their once white feathers streaked with mud, sailed onto the river and prepared to head down for the night on a small islet near Richmond bridge, 10 miles above London.

Battle Begins

The flock of clean white natives arched their graceful necks in indignation and flapped into battle. For five minutes they grunted and hissed and lashed out with beak and wing. Then the grays skeddaddled up river. The grays got the dirty end of the stick no matter how you looked at it. They were refugees from a sunken oil barge which coated their sleek white feathers with slimy oil three weeks ago while they were paddling in the Thames.

Sent to Cleaners

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals came to the rescue. It rounded up all the polluted swans and sent them to the cleaners.

But the RSPCA released them in suburban Richmond, far from their own contaminated section and in other swans' territory. That might have been all right, but the RSPCA made a mistake. It kept the swans in a muddy garden after de-oiling them and the swans got themselves dirty.

Dislike Dirt

A rufel RSPCA official said the dislike of dirt is inherent in swans. "It is unusual for river birds to fight," an inspector said, "but clean swans don't like dirty ones."

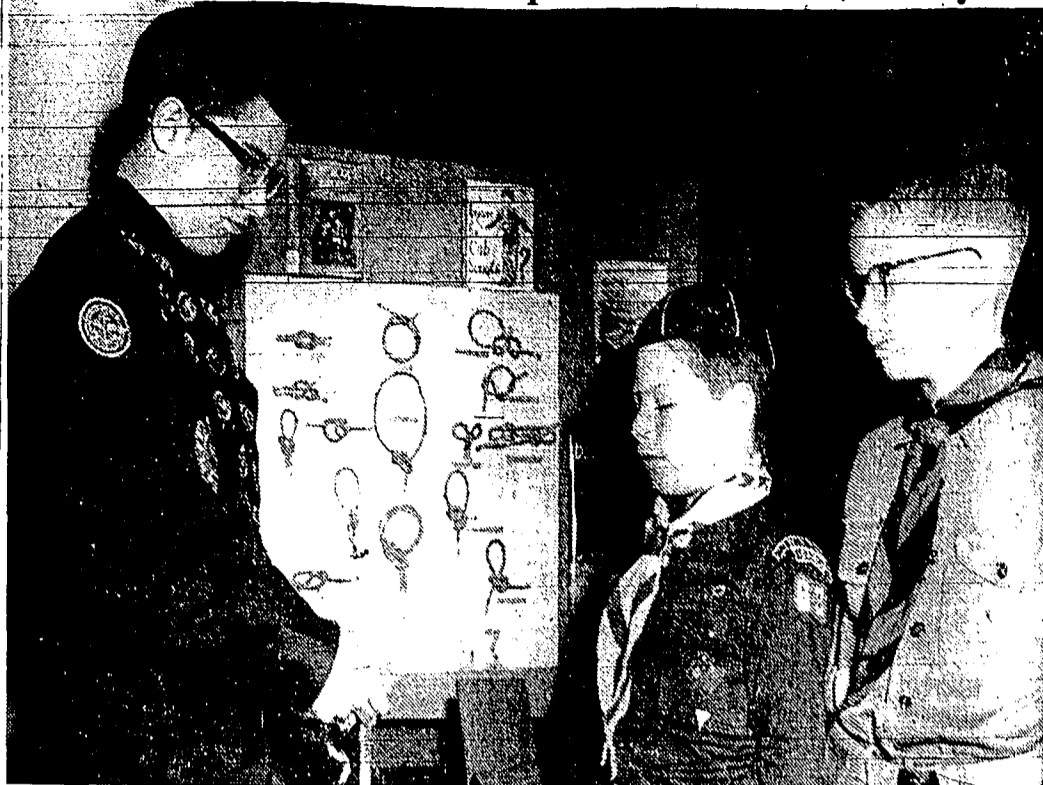

Student Slips Into China to Seek Kinfolk

HONG KONG, Feb. 7 (AP)—Turn by tugs of loyalty to a family divided by war, Liu Yung-ming slipped behind the bamboo curtain last night to be with his wife and 8-year-old daughter in Red China.

The 36-year-old former student at the University of Missouri, who had spent five years in a mental hospital in the United States, ignored the warning of his father, a minor official in the Nationalist Chinese government on Formosa, that he likely faced eventual death at the hands of the Communists.

He crossed the border at 4 p.m. after telling immigration authorities his real wish was to settle in Hong Kong with his wife. The British government of this crown colony, an announcement said, told him this was impossible.

Liu, one of the Chinese helping has accused the United States of deatining, was released from the State Mental hospital at Farmington, Mo., last month after the Hong Kong government had agreed to give him a transit visa.

He had gone to the United States as a student before the Communists seized power in China. He suffered a mental breakdown after earning a masters degree in civil engineering at the University of Missouri.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 7 (AP)—When Burnest Taylor wants to start his car on these cold mornings he just presses a button at the breakfast table and the old bus kicks over and warms up by remote control while he eats ham and eggs.

Taylor, a "grease monkey" and inventor, and he rigged up this scheme because he directs "come out and getting into that cold automobile."

Taylor has a patent pending for his automatic starting device without the breakfast table push-button. All you do is set a dial inside the car, say for 7:30 a.m., before you go to bed the night before. At 7:30, the motor starts and runs for 15 minutes, warms up and ready for your 7:45 departure.

"It works just fine," said Taylor. "If you oversleep until noon, the motor shuts off automatically in 15 or 20 minutes."

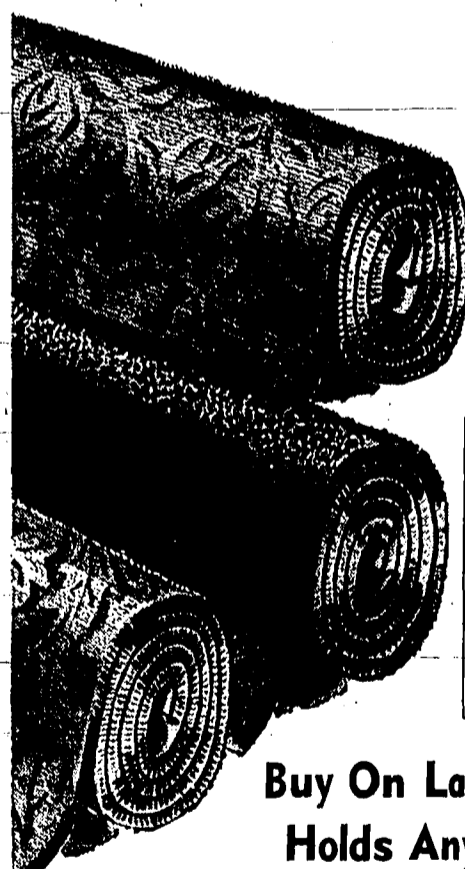

Reds Worried At Peneration Of True News

By United Press
Soviet Russia seems to be getting worried over the anti-communist propaganda which is getting through the iron curtain. A note of "determined protest" which the Soviet government sent to Washington over the week-end mentioned big balloons, equipped with photographic and radio devices, which are landing in communist territory.

But it is evident that the protest really is aimed at the campaign conducted by American agencies against Russia's domination of eastern Europe.

Protests Made
The Kremlin followed up its note to the United States by protesting formally to West Germany yesterday against the launching of propaganda balloons from its territory by American agencies. These balloons, or most of them, are being sent up by the American-financed Free Europe Press.

About 350,000 of these balloons have been sent through the iron curtain when the wind was right, since April, 1954. They carry anti-communist propaganda.

In addition, radio transmitters based in Western Germany are transmitting anti-communist propaganda to iron curtain countries 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Programs Heard
It is known that millions of people in satellite countries, and many in Russia itself, take the risk of listening to these programs.

The station called RIAS—Radio in the American sector—operates from West Berlin. It celebrated its 10th anniversary Sunday. Communist newspapers compliment the effective work of RIAS by calling it such things as "a paid, sinking news ulcer owned by foreign monopoly capitalists and war mongers in the heart of Germany."

Equally detested by the reds is Radio Free Europe, which broadcasts a ceaseless stream of anti-communist propaganda from West Germany.

Livestock Bands Ready Demands

BHENANDOAH, Ia., Feb. 7 (AP)—A committee representing 250 Midwest hog farmers will hand congressmen in Washington recommendations to end the farm price "emergency."

The committee of three was elected yesterday at the suggestion of O. C. Swackhamer, president of the sponsoring Midwest Livestock Feeders association, to go to Washington.

The association sponsored a price protest meeting Jan. 23 and drafted resolutions. Farmers from Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Iowa adopted the resolutions yesterday.

They called for 95 per cent of parity for hogs in return for production controls; crop loans of 90 per cent of parity; a thorough investigation of the price spread between what farmers receive and the consumer pays; liberalization of loans to distressed farmers, and a check-off system for promotion and advertisement of livestock products.

Peasants Revolt

PATTAIA, India, Feb. 7 (AP)—Seventeen thousand peasants in this northern India district threatened today to refuse to pay rents unless the state takes measures to protect their farms from a ravaging herd of "sacred" cows.

The cow is a sacred and untouchable animal to India's Hindus. But the herd of 1,000 has been roaming the forests and raiding farm plots for years. A peasant committee was formed to press for immediate state action, including if necessary, wiping out the herd.

Girl, 11, Accidentally Shoots Her Father

POCATELLO, Feb. 7 (AP)—Bannock County Coroner Allen Manning says an 11-year-old Indian girl accidentally shot and killed her father Saturday night while playing with his rifle in the family home at Ross Fork creek.

Manning gave this account yesterday of the death of Emerson Evening, a truck driver at the Gay Mine of the Bimplot company.

Evening returned from a hunting trip, emptied the shells from his rifle and gave it to his daughter, Margaret, to play with. She pulled the trigger twice and a bullet smashed into the father's hip.

The bullet was removed at a Pocatello hospital. Evening died an hour and a half after surgery. Manning said the bullet had caused an air bubble which stopped the flow of blood to Evening's heart.

Widow Fights To Brush Out 12-Year Taint

PARIS, Feb. 7 (AP)—France is digging 12 years into the past to give a widow a chance to clear the name of her famous husband who died under suspicion of being a Nazi collaborator.

The woman is Madame Christine Renault, whose husband Louis gave his name to an automobile and an industrial empire as well known in France as the name Ford is in America.

She charged recently that her husband did not die of natural causes in 1944, as the records show, but was murdered by agents of the French underground who had come to hate him.

Tells of Wait
Mrs. Renault said she had waited 12 years before trying to obtain the facts about her husband's death because she wanted the air to be free of the ill feeling of the immediate postwar years. Last week, a French court ordered Renault's body exhumed to see if her story is true.

Official records show that Renault died Oct. 24, 1944, of uremic poisoning. In truth, says Mrs. Renault, he was tortured to death. She believes examination of his remains will show he died of a broken back.

Renault was in the United States when France signed an armistice with Hitler in June, 1940. At first, he was said to have refused to let the Germans use his big auto plant.

Returns to France
But when Renault returned from the United States, according to charges against him, he turned his plant over to the Germans and they enjoyed the use of it in maintaining their mechanized ground forces.

In August, 1944, when the Germans began fleeing buoyant underground artisans emerged to even the score with those it felt had collaborated with the Nazis.

The communist daily newspaper L'Humanite named Renault in a story demanding "justice against the traitors and profiteers in treason." As public clamor grew an order for Renault's arrest was issued on Sept. 8, 1944.

Story Told
As Mrs. Renault tells the story, Renault was told he would not be arrested if he appeared before a judge voluntarily for questioning. He appeared, but the judge ordered him imprisoned.

Renault was moved to a psychiatric hospital where his wife visited him Oct. 8. She said that when the guard opened the door of his room he covered his head as if to protect himself.

Mrs. Renault has offered the testimony of Dr. Pierre Trucbat, an X-ray specialist, that Renault was suffering from a fracture of the first cervical vertebra—and not uremic poisoning—when he died.

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 7 (AP)—Actress Grace Kelly and Prince Rainier II have announced they will be married in a double-feature wedding in the prince's tiny European principality of Monaco on April 18 and 19.

The celebrated couple disclosed their double wedding dates yesterday after lengthy conferences with Mrs. Kelly's family in Philadelphia and the prince's advisers in his homeland.

The announcement said they would first be wed in a civil ceremony on April 18 and then would be reunited again in a Catholic ceremony on the following day, probably by the bishop of Monaco.

A friend of the prince said the wedding dates were selected "so as to not interfere with French holidays so as to get the maximum news value."

Royalty, diplomats, international socialites and film stars are expected to attend the nuptials, which will be celebrated in Monaco with several days of festivities.

Informed sources said the government, ignoring vigorous anti-communist protests, has presented a proposed schedule for the trip to Ambassador Jacob Malik for relay to the Kremlin.

The communist boss and the Soviet premier, who denounced the West at every opportunity during a recent tour of India, are expected to use their visit here to promote the current Russian effort to divide Britain from the United States.

Noted 'King' Boom Begins Down Under

SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 7 (AP)—Davy Crockett has hit Australia.

The craze that ran its course last year in America is just getting started here.

Australia's small fry has embraced the "king-of-the-wild-frontier" with an enthusiasm that seems to depress Hopalong Cassidy as the No. 1 juvenile hero.

Davy Crockett hats are the mode. One leading furrier estimates more than 100,000 have been sold in less than three months and the peak of sales has not been reached.

Movies Is Packed
The Walt Disney movie about Davy Crockett has been running in Sydney for more than six weeks. Every day a block-long line of youngsters in frontier caps wait outside the theater.

"The Ballad of Davy Crockett" has been on Australian hit parades for 12 weeks, an unusual record for any kind of popular tune. Sheet music and records are expected to sell from three to four times the normal volume for a hit song.

The Australian version of the coonkin cap sells for about one pound (\$2.25) and is made from Australian fox skins and tails. Rabbit skin caps, oddly enough, are more expensive in this country that has always had a problem of too many rabbits. Efforts to destroy rabbits by introducing a virus disease among them has been too successful.

Cat Rescued
Police in a Sydney suburb had to rescue a cat from some over-zealous youngsters who were determined to make their own headgear.

The rise of Davy Crockett has not been without controversy. Some Australians say their youngsters ought to be imitating one of their own country's pioneers rather than an imported character from America.

But child welfare authorities and the Sydney electric light authority are all for Crockett. The welfare people say the legend of the brave Indian fighter has helped curb juvenile delinquency.

Other Targets
The electric company estimates that only a score of electric street lights have been broken in the past few months compared with a loss running up to 2,000 bulbs in the pre-Crockett era. Youngsters seem to be shooting at something else with their air rifles.

The only juvenile opposition to the Crockett craze comes from die-hard members of the Hopalong Cassidy fan clubs.

They picketed the theater showing the Walt Disney movie with signs reading: "It Isn't Crockett."

Soviet's Stand For Antarctic Is Announced

Expeditions from the United States, British Commonwealth, France and Russia are beginning an international search for the mysteries of the south pole. The United States hopes to gain the honor of being the first to reach the South Pole. The Soviet Union's expedition is a radio message received from Moscow by the Soviet foreign ministry in the following dispatch, reprinted in the chief Soviet newspaper, Pravda.

By Mikhail Mikhailovich Somov SOVIET BASE, Antarctica, Feb. 2 (Delayed).—We are proud to be active members of the international geophysical year which is uniting the efforts of scientists from an overwhelming majority of nations for the solution of the basic problems of physics.

We believe the international geophysical year will play an enormous positive role in the development of scientific contact between the world peoples and will aid the unification of world scientific thought for the solution of problems in many fields of science. It will facilitate the strengthening of peace among the nations.

Work Outlined
All our strength, experience and knowledge will be devoted for the solution of our appointed tasks. You ask how, under international law, is the territorial status determined of Antarctic territories first discovered and explored by Soviet explorers?

In spite of the fact that Russian explorers discovered Antarctica, the Soviet Union has not participated in discussions of territorial status.

Note Interjected
Editor's note: Russia claims the 1819-21 expedition of Fadel Bellingshausen and Mikhail-Lazarev was the first to touch the Antarctic mainland. The Soviet Encyclopedia says Britain's Capt. Cook first sailed in the area in 1771-75 but failed to find the continent.

As is well known, active members of the geographical society of the USSR on Feb. 10, 1949, unanimously adopted a resolution stating:

... our efforts to decide the question of the regime of Antarctica without participation of the Soviet Union cannot be justified whatever questions concerning Antarctica must be decided primarily by those states which have a historic right to participation in such decisions. However, according to reports in the world press, certain states are trying to decide questions concerning Antarctica without the participation of the Soviet Union, against which the Geographical Society of the USSR cannot but protest in the most decisive manner.

Support Given
I support this declaration. I must point out that according to international practice all interested countries should be invited to discuss the territorial regime of any area of international significance.

I consider that this international practice must be observed in deciding questions concerning Antarctica.

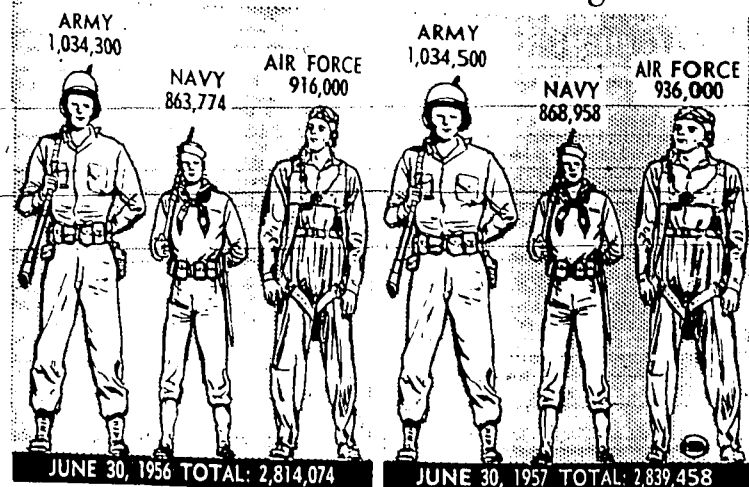

Boom and Bust of Big Bonanza For Acts Noted in Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS, Feb. 7 (P. M.)—On Oct. 16, 1941, the El Rancho Vegas opened its doors to the public. Entertainment was provided by a seven-piece orchestra which was paid \$750 a week.

On April 20, 1955, the Hotel Riviera premiered with Liberace and brother George leading the show. Their salary: \$45,000 a week. The hotel in publicity release inflated this to \$50,000.

These two events marked the beginning and the peak of the greatest bonanza in the history of live entertainment. No show place on earth—not even Broadway in the roaring '20s—has so richly rewarded entertainers. Last year between 18 and 20 million dollars were paid for talent at the night clubs along the glittering Las Vegas Strip.

The boom did not happen overnight. Only the most visionary could have anticipated the future in those early days in the '40s. Among the acts that played El Rancho were Frank Fay and Anne Nagle at \$800 a week, an entire revue starring Maxie Rosenbloom at \$1,000.

But business was good, aided by the fun-seeking GIs at Nevada bases during wartime. On Oct. 24, 1942, a second hotel, the Last Frontier, opened on the Strip. The competition between the two gambling establishments boosted prices for entertainers a bit, but there were still plenty of acts to go around.

The start of the real boom can be dated from 1946, when the gaudy new Flamingo appeared. It was operated by a man whose name Las Vegas would like to forget—Bugsy Siegel. The veteran of the underworld and film society—later shot in Beverly Hills in a murder never solved—flew over a parcel of cele-

BERLIN Feb. 7.—RIAS, the radio station most hated by the government of communist east Germany, tomorrow rounds out 10 years of broadcasting.

RIAS stands for "Radio in the American Sector" and since the sector is in Berlin, and Berlin is 110 miles inside East Germany, RIAS gives painful hours to many a communist leader. It produces the reaction by a simple device: The truth.

RIAS attempts to supply news on a round-the-clock basis to East Germany's 18 million citizens. Although the station is sponsored by the U. S. government, it closely follows German broadcasting techniques and traditions.

It has become so German in manner, that it even has referred to East Germany as "Mittel Deutschland" (Middle Germany).

Religion Used To Help Man Discard War

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP)—Lawrence Ayres has an idea that understanding of each other's religions would help bring East and West together.

A man deeply interested in things of the spirit, Ayres has given his idea a boost by traveling around the world and making a series of nine documentary motion pictures of the great religions of the East. These he is releasing in the United States.

Show Is Planned
Next, he wants to make a long picture—a full evening's fare—on Christianity, to be shown to the peoples of the East as well as those of this and other occidental countries.

The aim of this project is to be purely reportorial.
"If these first documentaries do something to acquaint the people of the West with the motivations, the ideas and ideals of the people of the East—bring about a little better understanding—serve as a means of getting acquainted—then they may help pave the way for peace," Ayres said in an interview.

Repelled Fane
Ayres is the actor who jumped to international film stardom 26 years ago in the lead role of "All Quiet on the Western Front." A film luminary when America entered the second world war, Ayres achieved temporary notoriety by announcing he was a conscientious objector to military service—a man averse to killing in any form, who had embraced vegetarianism six years previously.

The draft board accepted his testimony. But he got into the army as a non-combatant and saw a great deal of war as an assistant chaplain and technician with a mobile evacuation hospital.
Ayres has been interested in the world's religions for more than 20 years—"an interest in the why's of the universe," he put it.

Notes "Force"
"I've come to a very firm conviction in the power and presence of a spiritual force in the universe—call it God, or whatever you want—that understands man and loves man," he said.
Reflecting on his globe-circling quest for the secrets of nine religions, Ayres concluded a re-birth of spiritual feeling may be taking place. He thinks this may be due in part to "a universal feeling of insecurity, and awareness of the possibilities of catastrophic disaster."

If the field of religious documentation in movies should prove a success, Ayres, at 47, says he feels he'd like to spend much of the rest of his life in it.
Aim Stated
One thing he'd like to do on film is explore the developing of religion in the consciousness of the human race.
"One method of approach would be to go to primitive areas still existing in the world and use living primitive cultures as illustrations of plateaus in the unwinding spiral of religion," he said.
One thing he's already learned: "Nothing I've ever done has held a candle to the exactness required in making a documentary about a people's religion."

Publisher Indicted For Libel Charges
LAS VEGAS, Nev. Feb. 7 (AP)—Newspaper publisher Herman (Hank) Greenspun, acquitted last April of a federal charge of mailing matter tending to incite the murder of Sen. Joseph McCarthy, R., Wis., was indicted by the Clark county grand jury yesterday on a charge of criminal libel in another matter.
Both charges grew out of page one columns by Greenspun in his daily newspaper, the Las Vegas Sun.
The indictment was based on Greenspun's "Where I Stand" column last Nov. 6 accusing North Las Vegas Municipal Judge Ed Taylor of favoritism. The column was written after Judge Taylor dismissed an assault charge against a man accused of blackening the eye of Child of Police William Pool in North Las Vegas.

Red Not Best For Hunters, Expert Notes

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 7 (AP)—An optometrist has shot a hole into the long-held theory that red caps and red coats protect deer hunters from being shot at by other deer hunters.

The red hue, said Dr. William A. Meyer, Jr., Sacramento, may actually be an invitation to danger.
Dr. Meyer is one of a group of vision specialists engaged in a color-blindness research project at the University of California school of optometry.
"In the vision of many male hunters the red coats and hats are indistinguishable from green brush," he declared.
"Some five per cent of our male population, hence one hunter in 20 suffers from this type of red-green color blindness."
Dr. Meyer said the optometrists are recommending golden yellow clothing as more acceptable.
"Such a color, as adopted by the army and navy for life rafts, may still look white to color blind persons," the optometrist reasoned, "but at least, the white would be distinguishable as a foreign object and would not blend into the hunting terrain."

Regional Pioneer Claimed by Death

PRESTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Justice of the Peace Parley Leon Altred, a southeastern Idaho pioneer, died yesterday after a prolonged illness. He was 71.

Jury Asserts Train Wreck Was Mishap

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7 (AP)—A city jury has ruled the Jan. 22 wreck of a Santa Fe commuter train in central Los Angeles with the loss of 30 lives was an unavoidable accident without criminal negligence on the part of the crew.

The "blue ribbon" jury of nine prominent Los Angeles citizens returned the verdict yesterday after deliberating over the inquest case for an hour. Jury Foreman Earl Vaughn, Bank of America vice president, said:
"We find the deaths of the deceased accidental and no persons were criminally responsible."

Relief Noted
Engineer Frank B. Parrish, 61, who had blamed himself "for the dead and orphans I made," was noticeably relieved when the jury's verdict came, but he stated he had nothing to say concerning the vindication.

Parrish felt he was to blame for the two-car train overturning on a curve because he had blacked out moments before the accident.
Dr. Marcus Crahan, a psychiatrist who examined Parrish, said the engineer over the past 10 years has variously suffered from tuberculosis, peptic ulcers, with perforation and peritonitis.

Combination Cited
Crahan said this combination of defects could have produced unconsciousness or mental aberrations of a transient nature. The engineer, said, could have suffered a mental lapse something like sleep walking a few moments during which the train raced out of control.
"It is my opinion that Mr. Parrish, just prior to the train wreck, suffered a fugue state and was not conscious of nor responsible for his actions . . ." Crahan said.

Briton Denounces Friendly Gestures

BIRMINGHAM, England, Feb. 7 (AP)—A British doctor said today that offering a cigarette to a friend should be considered a social crime rather than a courtesy.
Dr. W. H. Bond, of the Birmingham United hospitals, told a Rotary club meeting there was no doubt of the link between cigarette smoking and lung cancer so there was no courtesy in offering a smoke to a friend.
But Bond said even non-smokers in Britain's smog-blanketed cities are endangered because the concentration of cancer-producing agents in the smog is sometimes equivalent to 200 cigarettes a day.

Integration Is Shown Favor By Stevenson

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7 (AP)—Presidential hopeful Adlai Stevenson told a press conference today he strongly favors public school racial integration in the south. He called segregation "an obsolete heritage."
Asked whether he favored desegregation, Stevenson said, "of course I do." The supreme court has so ruled, and that makes it the law of the land."
He cited various stands he had taken on civil rights in the past and pointed out that Illinois schools were desegregated during his term as governor of that state.

In a statement in which Stevenson said he referred to the whole South and no specific locality, he termed discrimination and segregation as "obsolete heritages."
Asked what he thought of Vice President Richard M. Nixon's alleged charges some time ago that former President Harry S. Truman was a traitor, Stevenson said, "I think one of the most shameful episodes in American history has been the efforts of the Republican party to identify the Democratic party with communism."
"I'm indignant when such charges are leveled at former President Truman, for no living man has done
