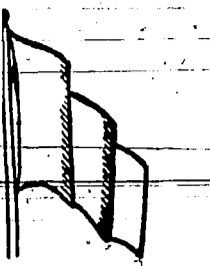

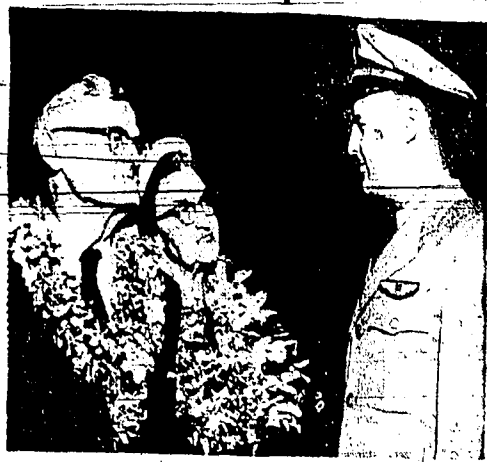

Gas and oil are two items of car care most people look after religiously. People still seem to run out of gas occasionally (I guess a lot of girls still haven't caught on), and sometimes pass the 1,000 miles and the oil is still sticking around (and I do mean sticking).

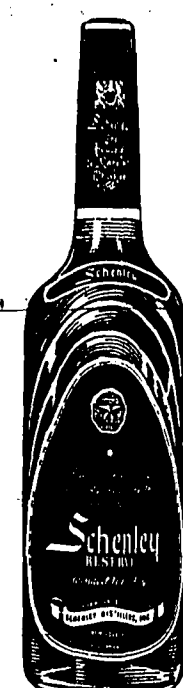

6,500 Pounds of Idaho Potatoes Sent To Washington as Gifts to All Solons

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (Special)—Ninety-four senators and 433 congressmen will be sitting down to a supper of U. S. No. 1 Idaho "bakers."

That is the plan of the Idaho congressional delegation and the Idaho advertising commission which shipped and distributed 6,500 pounds of Idaho's best potatoes to members of the 84th congress.

"The congressional delegation is trying to do everything it can to advertise Idaho's products," said Rep. Hamer Budge.

"These particularly fine products are presented through the courtesy of the commission, which has worked hard to get them here."

When the three tons plus of bakers began to arrive in the senate and house office buildings, custodial staffs were called out with hand dollies to get them stored in the Idaho delegation offices.

The staffs of Senators Dworshak and Welker and Representatives Budge and Plost immediately began attaching cards and writing notes to go along with each 10-pound sack.

"We would like to share with you some of our Idaho potatoes, the best in the world," read the cards which went to senate offices from Dworshak and Welker.

Budge's and Mrs. Plost's staffs attached an official Idaho map and brochure to each sack on the house side and attached a note as well. "Just to make sure they know what state these came from," an assistant explained.

Tests Ready To Aid U. S., Asian Treaty

By United Press The Southeast Asia Treaty Organization is about to undergo an important test...

Communist China, against whose expansionist policies the treaty is aimed, calls it a paper tiger.

So far, unfortunately, it has been the United States, Great Britain and France, the principal signatories, have been busy about issues in other parts of the world.

Exercise Planned But one week from today at least three of the "SEATO" countries—the United States, the Philippines and Thailand—are to start a combined three-day exercise with land, sea and air units.

These maneuvers will be held in the Gulf of Siam, on the coast of Thailand.

The United States is sending more than 1,000 men to take part. The aircraft carrier Princeton, two destroyers, a battalion of marines, a field artillery battalion and a jet fighter-bomber group will be included. Included also will be two of the army's giant " Honest John " rocket launchers. These, capable of carrying atomic warheads, will be flown from Japan.

Conference Sited Then, on March 5, delegates of the eight SEATO countries will hold a major conference in Karachi, Pakistan. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will represent the United States.

Whether any real measures will be taken to put some teeth in the SEATO "paper tiger" remains to be seen.

The Philippines, the closest ally of the United States in southeast Asia, has long urged that SEATO be strengthened by a joint defense force. It would be modeled on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces in Europe.

Argument Given The argument is that even an small standing defense force would be an important symbol of allied determination to resist aggression. It is also argued that such a force would slow up the trend toward "neutrality" by some southeast Asia nations.

Advances speculation is that the formation of a SEATO defense force is a matter for the indefinite future. But at least, in the maneuvers and in the Karachi conference, some progress may be made toward strengthening what is obviously a potentially important treaty.

Governor Looms As 'Dark Horse'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Friends of Gov. Christian A. Herter of Massachusetts said today that soundings are being made to appraise his chances for the Republican presidential nomination but that he still rates as a dark horse.

As a governor of a populous state, Herter has long figured in speculation as a possibility for the 1956 nomination if President Eisenhower should decide against a second term. An active worker in the 1952 prevention campaign for Mr. Eisenhower, he twice won the governorship in his state before announcing this week that he would not seek a third term.

Massachusetts political sources here believe Herter is available for the nomination but doubt that he will get into any state presidential primaries outside his own state even if Mr. Eisenhower makes an early retirement announcement.

Ultimatum Given Maritime Unions

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10 (AP)—West coast lumber schooners, tied up for more than four months, will sail next week with or without striking members of the Masters, Mates and Pilots of America.

George Olson, president of the Shipowners Association of the Pacific Coast, made the announcement last night after conferring with heads of four other maritime unions. He said schooner operators will ask the 40 striking deck officers to return to work on Feb. 15 at the old rate of pay plus 85 cents a day for pensions and welfare.

If they do not return, we will employ deck officers who are not members of the striking union," Olson said. "Officers of four other unions have assured us that their members will work with the officers we select, as long as they are employed under union conditions."

Car Demolished

BURLEY, Feb. 10.—James C. Rouse, Prineville, Ore., reported to Burley police Wednesday he demolished his 1955 Pontiac on the detour over the mainline canal one mile east of Murtaugh at 1 a.m. Wednesday.

Rouse said he was driving west on highway 30 and did not see the signs indicating the bridge was out. He said he came upon the construction job suddenly and in trying to follow the detour, overturned his car. He was uninjured but he said his car was demolished.

Bank's Loans Are Reported In Association

BURLEY, Feb. 10.—Arnold Anderson, Spokane, regional manager of the Federal Land bank, Spokane, told members of the Cassia county national farm loan association at their annual meeting in the IOOF hall Tuesday that 1955 was a record year for credit extended. In Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, farmers and ranchers used \$32,562,000 of credit in the largest year for 38 years, he said.

Anderson pointed out Idaho farmers borrowed \$11,340,000 of this amount. He explained the cooperative features of the system which give borrowers a share in the earnings and outlined the broadened credit services now available.

Anderson said "The farm credit act of 1955 broadened the scope of credit service available through the NFILA. The loan limit has been boosted from \$100,000 to \$200,000; family co-operations engaged in farming operations are now eligible; the base upon which credit may be extended to part time farmers has been broadened, and credit services are available for the off the farm requirements of the borrower. In addition, a revision in appraisal levels affords an opportunity to more adequately serve the needs of the farmer and rancher."

Walter R. West, Twin Falls, social security officer, discussed the 1954 amendments to the social security law as it applies to farm families. West told farmers they would pay three percent on net incomes up to \$4,200 if self employed. Where work is done for another, two percent is withheld from the wages and two percent is paid by the employer.

S. H. Kunau, secretary-treasurer, reported that the association had closed \$832,500 in new loans in Cassia county during the past year to bring the face value of loans outstanding to \$1,700,600. Dividends paid to stockholders amounted to \$3,250 this year. Lawrence M. Cardon and William Darrington were re-elected as directors for three-year terms.

Copper Wire Sale to Reds Alarms U. S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The United States is seriously concerned about large-scale purchases of copper wire from the West by Russia and its satellites, it was disclosed today.

President Eisenhower, during his recent talks with British Prime Minister Anthony Eden, was reported to have voiced American alarm at the heavy copper wire sales to the Soviet bloc by British and other suppliers after controls were lifted in August, 1954.

Informants said there is evidence that the Russians have been buying large quantities of unshelved copper wire and melting it into hard-to-get ingots. Copper has thousands of military and industrial uses. It is used, for example, in all electrical machinery.

Experts said the Russians are having to pay a higher price to get their copper via the copper wire route. In the first 12 months after controls were lifted, the communists paid out 15 million dollars for copper wire, according to one official estimate.

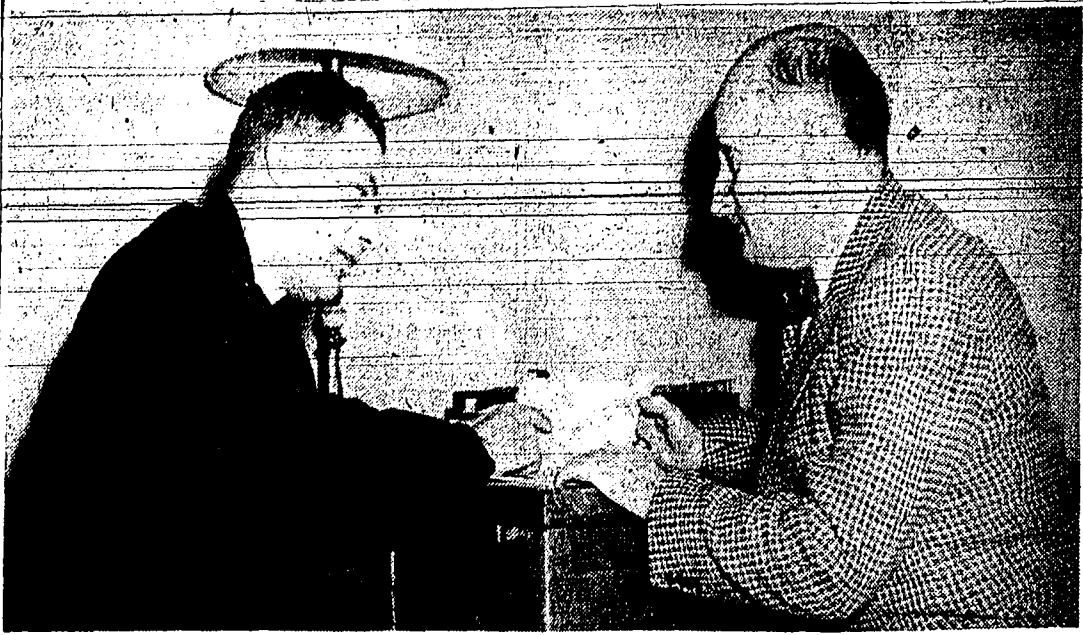
Mr. Eisenhower, according to some informants, hinted to Eden that the United States might consider it necessary in the future for the allies to reapply export controls on copper wire. At any rate, this government believes a closer "watch" should be kept on such shipments, it was said.

Asked about the reported Eisenhower-Eden talk on copper wire, the White House said only: "The United States is not planning to put an embargo on copper wire shipments."

Britain is known to be opposed to re-application of the copper wire controls which were dropped at British insistence in August, 1954. The British argument is that copper is used in so many ways that it cannot be classified as strategic.

ARE YOU HAVING TROUBLE CALVING OR LAMBING

It is common after a long cold winter to run into many troubles at calving and lambing time. Calves and lambs may be premature and many of them are dead at birth while many more may be large healthy looking babies and alive at birth but are too weak to get to their feet and suckle. Then, in a few hours they are dead. Even though the mothers are

soluble vitamins A, D and E must be supplied by the ration—or by sunlight as in the case of Vitamin D. Vitamin E is equally important in production of calves and lambs and is an important factor in prevention of white muscle disease. This problem will be dealt with in an article in the near future since we are talking about Vitamin A

In good condition, this problem will still prevail. This condition exists all through the west. Let us see what things about this condition might remedy the trouble.

Research has proven that a cow or ewe has the ability to store Vitamin A in the liver for from two to five months, depending on the amount and concentration in the fall grass and in alfalfa hay in the form of carotene (pro-vitamin A). It then has to be replaced either in supplemental feed or in green feed.

Animals Must Have Vitamin A

It might be well to take a look at what vitamin A means to a cow or a ewe:

should have 15 grams of phosphorus and 16 grams of calcium. If the calcium is over twice the level of that of phosphorus as it is in this ration, the calcium will tie the phosphorus up to where it is unavailable to the animal. Thus, an animal with no phosphorus in its blood and body cannot utilize or convert carotene to true Vitamin A in the body of the animal.

Phosphorus content in the grass drops rapidly during dry weather or in the fall, thus the storage period for phosphorus has gone beyond its limit just as it has in the Vitamin A content.

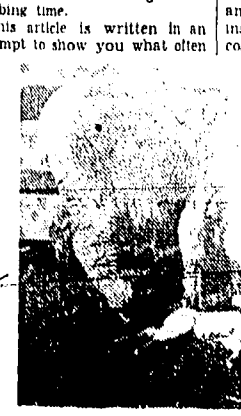
It is very improbable that an animal receiving no Vitamin A or carotene since fall and an inadequate amount of phosphorus to boost the level to compete with the high calcium found in dry feeds will have enough storage in the body to keep the animal out of trouble around calving time or lambing time.

This article is written in an attempt to show you what often

ant vitamin and mineral for at least thirty days before calving or lambing. This will insure production of vigorous, healthy babies and to maintain the health and condition of the cows and the ewes to insure high milk production for the young.

It is equally important to provide early Vitamin A or carotene during early suckling period, as well as gestation particularly in the case of early calving and lambing. ditions corrected in many cases even within a week before calving and lambing.

This is not a cure-all. Some troubles are caused by infectious diseases. In these cases, owners should consult their veterinarian, but first give the animals a chance by removing any hazards by giving them the proper levels of nutrition. Prevention is the best means to remove all doubt.

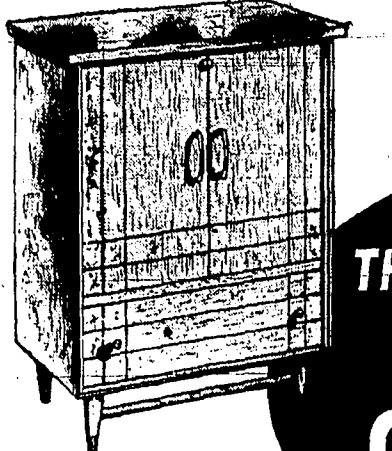
Pregnant cows and ewes should be supplied with ample amounts of true Vitamin A or carotene together with high levels of phosphorus to build up an insurance at very little cost.
