TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Top Democrats' personal, virulent and concentrated derision of Vice President Richard M. Nixon is inspired solely by the belief that the Californian will be the Republican party's 1956 presidential nominee. They seek to "tear him down" and "give him hell" by using Trumanesque vernacular, now the latest of the conventional, will leave so little time for mauling him.

Even if Ike does run, he has announced that he will do no "barrage-bombing." While he conducts a White House porch campaign and delivers several carefully planned television speeches, Nixon will tour the countryside with all the publicity and paraphernalia which normally accompany a President or a presidential candidate. "Dick" will be on-the-spot target.

DEMOCRATS OUT TO "GET" NIXON—Again, if Eisenhower should feel able to make the race, his health will inevitably focus unusual attention on the behavior and the qualifications of his running mate. Truman himself, as well as Senators Kerr and Neuberger, assured this strange twist with his statement that the American people will not elect a regency or a part-time chairman of the board.

VICE PRESIDENT'S MISSIONS—Nixon has attended almost every meeting of the cabinet and the national security council, presiding in the absence of the President. He has been sent on extremely important foreign missions, the latest being a successful journey to the inauguration of Brazil's new chief executive.

WEAKNESS IN DEMOCRATS' ARMOR—The Democrats concern over Nixon's political prominence is understandable. They realize that, if he is the No. 1 candidate or campaigner, the question of their alleged softness toward communists in government under Truman will become a major issue in the presidential contest.

Billions More Needed, Says Ex-U. S. Aide

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—Trevor Gardner, who quit a high air force post in a row over defense economies, has told congress the air arm needs billions more than requested by the Eisenhower administration.

It was learned today that the resigned assistant air secretary told a secret house appropriations subcommittee hearing on Monday the air force should have 20 billion dollars in new money for the year starting July 1. President Eisenhower is asking for 16.5 billion dollars.

Gardner, who was in charge of air force research until his Feb. 8 resignation, is scheduled to testify similarly tomorrow to a subcommittee of the joint congressional atomic energy committee, headed by Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D., Wash., persistent critic of GOP defense policies.

Could Be Explosive

The former air aides' testimony could have explosive results. Any such sum as he proposes would wreck the administration's delicately balanced federal budget, which is estimated to show only a 400 million dollar surplus in fiscal 1957. The plea for more funds for all phases of air force operations from a high official who quit only last week will also put Air Secretary Donald A. Quarles and Air Chief of Staff Gen. Nathan F. Twining on a spot in testifying on the budget. A lot of officers on the air staff at the Pentagon are known to subscribe to Gardner's views.

Quarles and Twining have both publicly announced support of the President's budget. But they are more certain than ever now to be closely questioned by Democrats on the congressional committees who already contend that this country's air power is endangered by Russian developments.

It was learned that the 20 billion dollar figure advocated by Gardner was the first air force estimate of needs for fiscal 1957. But that sum was shaved to 16.8 billion dollars before being presented to Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson.

Further Cut Made

Wilson, his staff and budget bureau officials then cut the air force request by 2.3 billion dollars.

The cuts, it was learned, covered one billion dollars for aircraft procurement; 500 million dollars for other procurement, such as radar for the distant early warning line in northern North America, vehicles and munitions; 400 million dollars for day-to-day maintenance and operation and 300 million dollars for base construction and research and development.

As a result of the cuts in requested funds, the air force will order about 400 fewer planes than it believes it must order annually to keep modern. Airmen are concerned that maintenance money will be too thinly spread to keep all the complicated new jet planes constantly combat ready, and they are apprehensive that flying hours may be curbed to the point where combat effectiveness is lowered.

Louisiana Will Battle Federal Court's Ruling

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 16 (AP)—Louisiana geared for action on two fronts today to fight a federal court decision that ruled the state's segregation laws are invalid.

A joint legislative committee of the legislature announced in Baton Rouge that it would study new legislation to counter the ruling while school officials attack it in the courts.

The legislative committee had already been considering possible laws to safeguard segregation in private as well as public schools when the decision was made here yesterday.

The Orleans parish school board, ordered by the court to end its segregation policy "with all deliberate speed," was expected to appeal. C. P. Bease, board president, said that the board would take all "legal and honorable" means to combat the integration decree. He said the board felt strongly that integration of white and Negro students in public schools would be "detrimental to the community."

Sen. William M. Rainach, head of the legislative committee, headed the court of plunging the state into "a sorrow and strife." Rainach vowed that "moves will be met with countermoves, decrees with new laws and political court decisions with political strategy," he said, and Louisiana will "fight and fight until we have finally won."

Railroad Sets Solid 'Cutoff' Across Water

OGDEN, Feb. 16 (AP)—The Southern Pacific Railroad company has decided to go ahead with its huge project to construct a solid rock-fill cutoff across Great Salt lake, the Ogden Standard-Examiner said it was learned yesterday from reliable sources.

The sources said the SP is ready to sign a 40-million-dollar contract with Morrison-Knudsen Construction company of Idaho for the project.

The new construction would replace part of the present roadbed, which involves 12 miles of expensive-to-maintain wooden trestle.

For several months, the railroad has been making tests over a wide area of the lake bed to determine if the rock fill is feasible and where it should be.

A Morrison-Knudsen official in Boise said his company has been talking with the SP about the contract, but he would not say how far the negotiations have progressed.

A Southern Pacific official said the date on which official announcement of the contract can be expected is not available, but preliminary construction is under way.

Mayors Believe Ike to Run, Win

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—A poll of 25 mayors attending a Washington conference showed today that they overwhelmingly believe that President Eisenhower will run for a second term and will win.

The mayors were among 225 mayors and city managers of cities of 50,000 or more in population who were receiving first-hand briefings from top government officials on civil defense, national security and other matters. The conference, the third of its kind, was called by President Eisenhower at the request of the U. S. conference of mayors and the American Municipal association.

Of the 25 mayors polled, 19 said that Mr. Eisenhower would seek reelection, five said he would not and one was undecided. The group polled included 13 Democrats, 10 Republicans and 2 independents.

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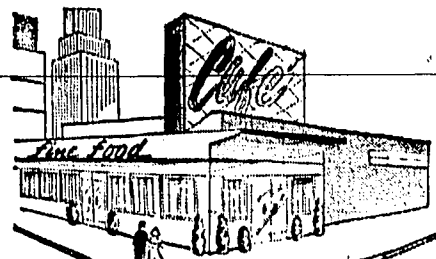


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
