Man of Stanley Tells How to Maintain Galena Summit Road

Editor, Times-News:
The road maintenance crews at Stanley and Ketchum could keep the road over Galena summit open if given the necessary authority to do so.

Members of the Stanley maintenance crew have kept a light truck with a push blade going all night with a storm and the road has been passable since the storm ended. A heavy truck with a V-blade and a heavy plow has followed to the snow bank and to wing the snow bank away and to wing the snow bank over the edge of the road when a possible "A" rotary plow would be a great advantage to throw the snow completely off of the road to make way for snow. If and when it comes way for snow.

Regardless of the snow depths reported by the Sawtooth national forest it does not all come with one storm and if an effort was really made by the state highway department the snow from one storm could be cleared away before the next storm arrived.

It would not be necessary to spend \$100,000 for new equipment, shed, crew and crew quarters for winter maintenance of that thirty-mile stretch of road if greater use was made of the presently owned equipment and full work hours of the men and maintenance crews.

Contrast the cost of opening this 30-mile stretch of road in the spring from Obsidian junction to a point 13 miles north of Ketchum) to keeping it open during the winter months with regular crews that otherwise would be working short shifts.

If a motor grader was needed for use on Galena for winter snow removal it would not move in one from some area where it would otherwise be used through the winter months. One rotary plow stationed at Stanley would be available for use on Galena and it then would also be available for use down river from Stanley.

The first 18 miles down Stanley has a greater snowdrift than Galena ever has. Some slides not only fill the road but run across the Salmon road and back up the water until it gets high enough to run over the snow dam. A rotary would be a great advantage in moving these masses of snow. What about the two rotaries standing idle at Shoshone?

Did E. V. Miller read the Saturday Evening Post article about Colorado state highway snow removal problem? Does he think that Idaho has a snow removal problem compared with that of Colorado? There would be more travel over

Residents Moved

ALGIERS, Algeria, Feb. 18 (AP)—Algerian officials today announced that some 600 residents have been evacuated from a terrorist-ridden area of western Algeria.

The evacuation came on the heels of one of the bloodiest weeks in Algeria since the native rebellion erupted 15 months ago. It was the biggest mass evacuation yet ordered by Algerian security officials.

Hoover said the church "must provide two-listed forthright men who are not afraid to trample on toes when the honor of God or country is at stake."

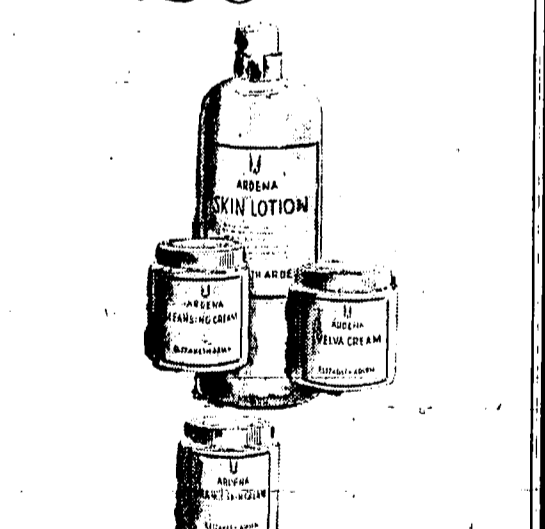
Airman Is Saved By Quick Action

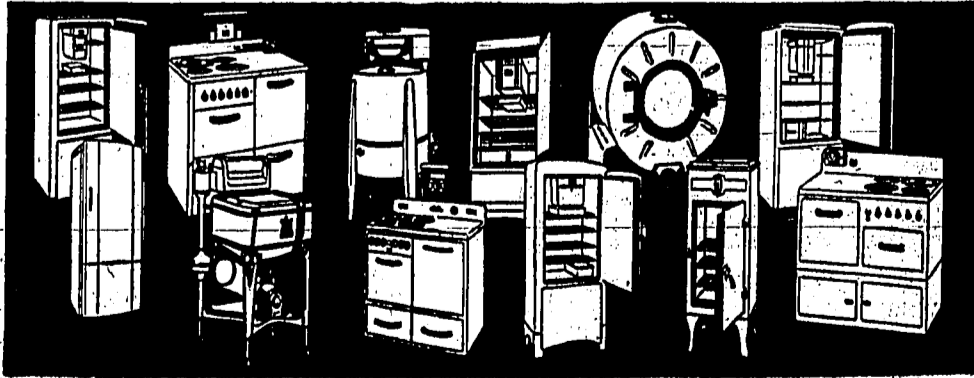

Russia Could Attack Foes, Official Says

MOSCOW, Feb. 18 (AP)—A top Soviet official said today that the Soviet Union has the means to deliver and drop the hydrogen bomb on American cities and hinted at globe-drooling rockets.

First Deputy Premier Anastas T. Mikoyan, in a speech to the 20th Communist party congress now in session, made public today, warned: "In the event of American aggression, hydrogen bombs can in return fall on American cities, too. Nor will the American imperialists be able to hide from these bombs. They will not be able to hide their factories."

Hints at Development
The veteran Soviet leader hinted that Russia already may have an intercontinental missile capable of carrying atomic and hydrogen warheads.

He said war was not inevitable, with one of the deterrents being the fact that both East and West have hydrogen and atomic bombs.

Warmongers, he said, "are restrained, apart from public opinion, apart from the great military strength of the countries of socialism, by another new important circumstance. It is the appearance of atomic and hydrogen bombs not only in America but also in the Soviet Union, as well as the means to carry these bombs to any point of the globe by aircraft or rockets."

Adds Points
Mikoyan then added: "We believe that if anyone attempts to drop a hydrogen or atomic bomb, the best people of mankind will not allow civilization to perish. They will immediately unite, will put the aggressors into strait-jackets and will put an end to all wars and to capitalism at the same time."

Soviet press reports said that this statement was greeted by delegates to the Communist party congress with "prolonged applause."

Boise Woman Is Charred in Home Inferno

BOISE, Feb. 18 (AP)—Mrs. Edith Kading Eastman, the 74-year-old widow of a pioneer Boise businessman, was burned to death late last night in a fire that virtually destroyed her three-story home on fashionable Warm Springs avenue.

Boise city firemen, who still were combing the smoking wreckage this morning, said the house would be a total loss but there was no immediate estimate of damages. The building was gutted, they reported, leaving only the old-fashioned cupolas and brick walls standing. Only the kitchen escaped total destruction.

Mrs. Eastman's body was found in the dining room near the den. Firemen at the scene surmised that the fire might have started from a space in a fireplace in the den and Mrs. Eastman was unable to control the outbreak.

It was reported this morning that she was alone at the time and all doors to the building were locked. Mrs. Eastman was the wife of the late Ben Eastman, a pioneer businessman whose name still identifies one of the city's larger office buildings.

Ada County Coroner Russell Reilly said there would be no inquest.

Noted Career Ends in Death

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 18 (AP)—A risky Arctic flight in a war-surplus plane has ended the career of pilot Harold "Whitey" Dahl, one of the last of the thinning group of international soldiers of fortune.

Whitey's luck ran out Tuesday. Rescue parties removed his body yesterday from the twisted wreckage of the DC-3 which crashed in the frozen wilderness of northern Quebec.

Killed with Dahl was W. Givens, St. Jovite, Que. Eric Pearson, identified only as an American from California and co-owner of the DC-3, survived.

Pearson was found wandering dazed and shocked through the wreckage when a ski-equipped Royal Canadian air force plane landed to take the bodies and Pearson to Goose Bay, Labrador.

Pilgrimage Is Made to Foster College Mother by Columnist

COLUMBIA, Mo., Feb. 17 (AP)—Came again to the old white frame house a block off the University of Missouri campus and knocked at a well-remembered door.

The door opened, and I saw before me the same lady who had opened that same door to me when I had first knocked upon it a quarter of a century ago as a brash young student.

The grayed old lady looked hesitantly for a moment at the graying middle-aged man before her, and then her mind peeled away the ravaging changes time had made in him, and she said in a real pleased voice:

"Why, Harold!" And then I put my arms around her and pressed my face against her cheek—and knew myself at home.

Going back to his old college is a spiritual ordeal to any man. So many of the landmarks of his youth have vanished and been replaced by new landmarks for a new generation that he feels himself a stranger from a lost time.

But Mrs. E. E. Tydings, my foster mother, hadn't changed.

"Why, Harold, come right in," she said, and shut the door against the winter chill.

We went into the kitchen, and as Mrs. Tydings plaidly busied herself at the stove, I sat in the old straight back chair she had received as a wedding present around the turn of the century. We talked of old times, and it was almost as if I had never been away.

"My mind often goes back . . ." said Mrs. Tydings.

Every college campus has its Mrs. Tydings. They are the motherly women who take in lonely college boys and give them a home away from home.

Over the years Mrs. Tydings and her husband, Dr. Tydings, a dentist, now dead, must have sheltered and fed a hundred or more students—and lost a lot of money doing it.

"I just don't know how many boys have stayed with us," said Mrs. Tydings. "I've never bothered to count them."

"How do the college boys of today compare to those who were in school when I was here?" I asked, rathling hoping, I must admit, for a bit of personal recognition.

"Why, Harold," said Mrs. Tydings, "there's been a wonderful change. Maybe I am just getting more tolerant, but I do think the boys today are better behaved around the house."

Tanks Slated As Price for Arabia Field

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Saudi Arabia told the United States a year ago the "absolute minimum" price for continued American use of the vital Dhahran air base was the 18 tanks impounded in New York, the United Press learned today.

The present U.-S.-Saudi Arabia agreement for use of the Dhahran base expires next June 18.

The big base in the Saudi Arabia desert near the Persian gulf is within easy striking distance of the Soviet Baku oil fields. It is a vital link in the strategic air command's bulwark against potential aggression.

Officials said the decision to halt shipment of the U. S. tanks to Saudi Arabia not only jeopardizes the air base but also further opens the Middle East door to Soviet arms salesmen.

The dangerous possibilities were disclosed as the administration worked on a "crash basis" to head off a cold war defeat for the West in the Middle East.

There were rumors that the administration would soon lift the "temporary embargo" it imposed on all arms shipments to the Middle East. The tanks may be delivered to oil-rich Saudi Arabia and Israel—may be given some of the defense arms she has been asking for to counter communist arms sales to Egypt.

The state department was expected to explain soon, probably today, why it canceled the tank shipment. Officials said the Middle Eastern nation has few, if any, tanks.

Mrs. Everett Irwin and her son, Frank, Seattle, were injured when the car in which they were riding, driven by Mrs. Irwin's husband, rammed into the rear of a Hillsdale highway district gravel truck one and one-half miles east of Eden at 11:20 a.m. Friday.

Deputy Sheriff Gordon Newbury who investigated said the gravel truck had been stopped on the highway by its driver, James Crumrine, who was helping remove a ditched car operated by M. F. Dickey, Cleveland, Tex.

Irwin was unable to stop his east-bound machine and it rammed the rear of the truck. Irwin, en route to Lowrey air force base, Colo., was not hurt.

Dismantling of Old Buildings Marks Landmarks' End Here

Dismantling of city-owned buildings at Seventh street south and Second avenue south marks the end of a Twin Falls landmark.

First used for water storage, and then site of the recreation shop and storage barn, the lot is being cleared for possible sale.

The first water-tower, a 20-foot wooden structure, was erected on the lot in 1910. It was a milestone in the city's history.

William Hendricks, city plumbing inspector, who lived in that area during the time, recalls the water tower was particularly impressive to him as it relieved him and his brother of the duty of carrying water out of Rock Creek canyon for home use.

Hendricks remembers water was pumped up from the creek for city use but it dried up for a short time each summer. During the dry spell he and his brother carried two buckets affixed to yokes from a small spring in the canyon.

As sufficient water was put into the canal, the water was tapped from its present source and was piped across Rock creek below the stockyards into a new metal tank.

At that time the present buildings were used as the water office. Although the offices were moved in a few years, the tank remained until around 1929.

After that the site was reduced to storage.

U.S. Keeping Missile Lead, Official Says

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Air Secretary Donald A. Quarles is confident the United States generally is probably well ahead of Russia in the missile race. But he concedes the communists may have the lead in some respects.

Quarles said that in the race with Russia to develop guided missiles "in many respects... we are very probably well ahead of them, though in a few elements we may be behind."

Even in the long range ballistic missile field we may not be ahead of them in every respect," Quarles said. "But I want to emphasize this. I think it is quite fair to say that one thing and one thing only is up as though it were the only thing."

Quarles' views, which echoed President Eisenhower's statements at his news conference, were made shortly after Russia's premier said that the Soviet Union has the means to carry atomic bombs "to any point of the globe by air or rocket."

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Time Limits Are Clarified for Work Under Desert Land Act

BOISE, Feb. 18—Increased activity in irrigation of "new" land in Idaho under the desert land act has brought a need for clarifying bureau of land management regulations governing the time limit for "proving up," according to J. R. Penny, state supervisor.

A recent release of procedures by Director Edward Woolley is aimed at strict compliance with those regulations which permit extensions of time.

An extension of time to make final proof can be granted only if the failure to make final proof was due to unavoidable delay in construction of irrigation works (including wells and installation of pumps) such delay not being the fault of the entryman. The granting of an extension is discretionary.

Penny emphasizes that no delay will be considered "unavoidable" if the entryman failed to take all reasonable steps to anticipate or avoid the cause of delay at least six months before the end of the four-year final proof period. The policy will be to deny requests for an extension where the individual has failed to diligently undertake development.

Generally, lack of finances or failure to obtain financing is not acceptable. In perfecting an application, the individual is required to submit estimated costs of development. It is assumed that he has thoroughly given recognition to the problem of financing at the time of seeking allowance of entry.

A request for an extension of time must set forth proper reasons which are fully supported by facts and evidence. An extension can be granted if it is shown by documented evidence that there has been a failure by a well driller or pump supplier to meet contract requirements which, if observed, would have permitted timely proof.

This also applies where electric power has been contracted for in sufficient time but has not been made available. Other acceptable reasons for granting extensions include acts of God, strikes which delayed or destroyed work in process or delayed delivery of materials and equipment that has been purchased.

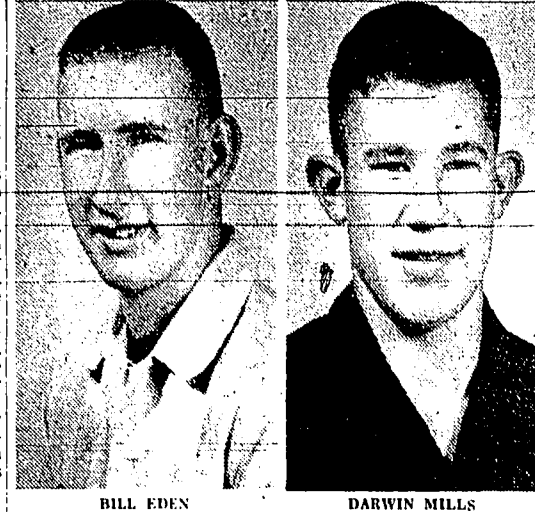

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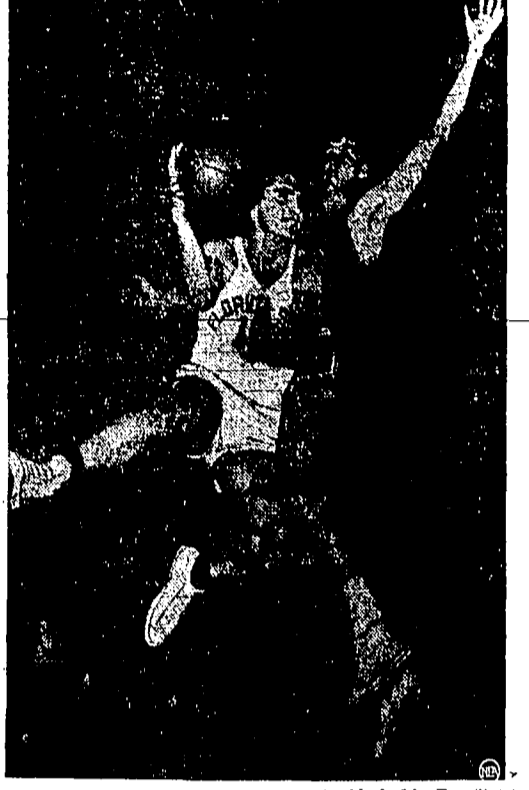

Pressure Put Upon Agency For Embargo

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12—The state department found itself under heavy pressure from all sides today because of its White House-approved embargo on all shipments of arms and military equipment to the Middle East.

These were the pressures:
1. Saudi Arabia was urging that the government "soon find a way" of delivering 18 Walker Bulldog tanks caught at the port in New York yesterday when the embargo was imposed.

See Little Point

2. An Israeli embassy spokesman said his government "saw little point" in imposing a general embargo in order to stop the tank shipment to Saudi Arabia because, he argued, the result could have been gained by suspending that shipment alone. About \$110,000 of scheduled shipments to Israel are affected, he said.

3. A senate investigation of the whole tangled affair was demanded by Chairman George D. Aiken, of the senate foreign relations committee. George said he wants an explanation from Secretary of State Dulles when Dulles returns from a Bahamas vacation.

Review Planned

Under instructions from President Eisenhower the state department is reviewing the situation with respect to arms deliveries to Egypt and the Arab states. Officials said they did not know how long this review would take.

Some officials argued that delivery of 18 tanks to Saudi Arabia, which has no common border with Israel, would not materially affect the Israeli-Arab balance. If their view prevails it appeared likely that Saudi Arabia eventually would get its tanks.

American authorities generally were inclined to blame the excitement over the affair on bad timing. The tank deal with Saudi Arabia was disclosed just when the United States is working hardest toward an Arab-Israeli settlement.

Order Pending

Israel has a request pending for 50 million dollars worth of weapons, including jet fighter planes and anti-aircraft guns. The United States has been delaying final action while seeking a basis for an Arab-Israeli settlement.

The United States has said it would not engage in a Middle East arms race. Communist Czechoslovakia is supplying arms to Egypt.

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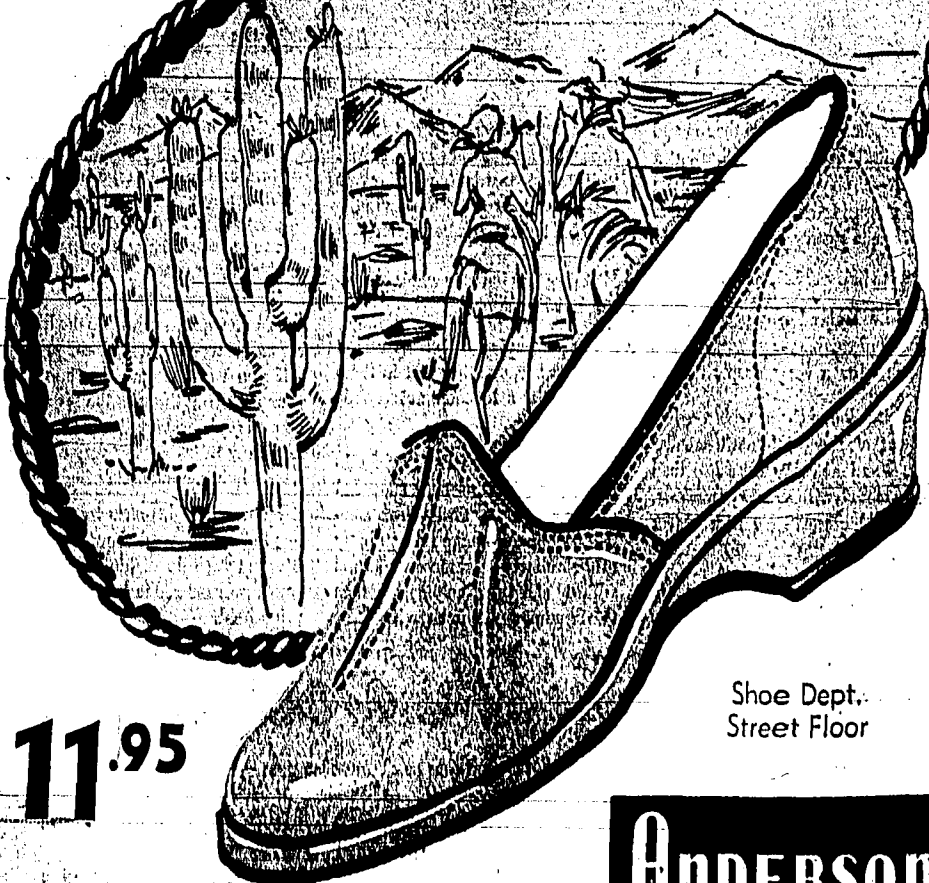

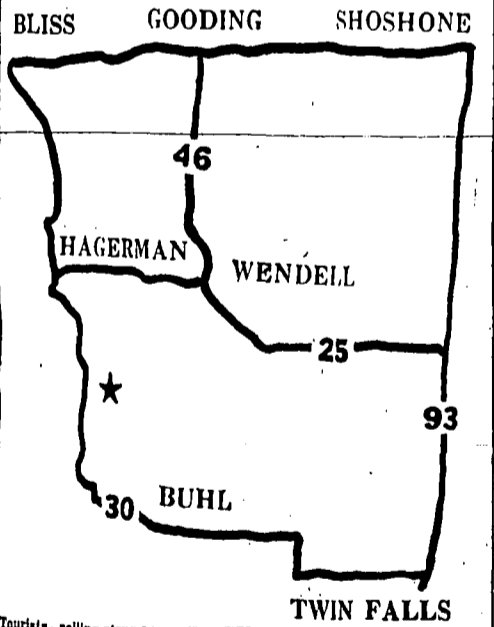

Geologists Solve Mysteries of Springs But Sight Still Remains Awe Inspiring

Authors spin yarns of mystery for readers to devour. They leave false trails for suspense and alternate evidence for speculation. But the rest of them is a rank amateur compared to the craftsmanship nature used to stud Magic Valley with geological mysticisms.

Shoshone, enlarged the plant. Today the plant has a 7,500 kilowatt hour capacity.

Long before there was any large scale irrigation in Magic Valley, residents of Hagerman valley were using the abundant supply of water in the valley for irrigation purposes. Hagerman gets its water supply from a spring—not one of the Thousand Springs but another one nearby.

Geologists, nature's detectives, claim the water is nothing but good old Snake river water. Many years ago, the river, much larger than it is today, traveled a straighter course across what now is Magic Valley.

Probably nothing in modern time not even the atomic bomb, can be used as a comparison to describe the sight and sound of millions of tons of red hot lava pouring into a rushing torrent of cool, clear water.

It is this supply of water that is being tapped on the north side today to irrigate thousands of acres of prairie. That the water is flowing beneath the surface and is not an underground lake accounts for the fact there is little or no pull down when thousands upon thousands of gallons of water are pumped out onto the desert lands on the northside.

It is this water, seeking an open, that pours back into the Snake river near Hagerman as Thousand Springs. Other springs, more ancient than Thousand Springs, have done likewise. Among them are Crystal Springs, Clear Lakes and Blue Lakes.

How do the geologists know these others are more ancient? Because, in the outpouring of water, canyons have been cut and geologists predict that eventually similar canyons will be cut at Thousand Springs.

Adding to the flow of water from Thousand Springs are the Lost rivers which disappear into the ground near Arco. The Big and Little Lost rivers join the underground Snake before it spills out the openings in the canyon wall.

Later L. A. Newell and Arthur Ponsford, Denver, Colo., decided to build a ditch to collect the water from the springs and to generate electricity from the water, in the ditch. They never succeeded in getting enough funds together for the project.

On June 13, 1911, the Thousand Springs Power company was formed and a plant was completed in 1912. Almost immediately they sold out to the Great Shoshone and Twin Falls Water and Power company and, in 1920, the Idaho Power company, which had taken over Great

of the wells, most of which are hot and some of which bubble from the bed of the new Snake river.

In addition to "whopping" trout, sturgeon weighing up to 200 pounds have been taken on hook and line.

Three resorts, two with hot water swimming pools, lie along the south bank of the river at the springs. The river is used for boat races in the

summer and the placid waters have drawn racers from California, Nevada, Washington, Utah and Colorado as well as Idaho.

Using the face and works of a discarded electric clock, he has added new and larger numerals so patients throughout the ward can see the time of day. The numerals were cut from a calendar and painted with luminous paint.

Using the works from the old clock, a cigar box, X-ray film, numerals from the calendar, a little tin foil for trim and a razor blade as the major tool, Yanick estimated the completed clock was assembled in two afternoons.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Too bad Col. Ed Starling isn't president to match marksmanship with President Eisenhower in the Georgia piney woods.

Ed was a Kentucky colonel who looked like a general and acted like a field marshal. He was a real marksman. He abandoned ordinary shooting habits in his early youth and went into the brush for quail with nothing heavier than a .410 gauge shotgun.

Many a shooter must have done a double take this week at the Thomasville, Ga., dispatch reporting that Mr. Eisenhower had gone out for quail with a .410. For your information, a .410 is almost a rifle with a bore only slightly larger than a cigarette. The number of shot which can be crammed into a .410 shell is mighty few and the number of shooters who can bring down quail with such brief armament is fewer. Small wonder that shooters wondered at the President's choice of a gun.

If he gets quail he's a champion and should proceed to the great annual trap and skeet shooting events and win himself some medals. Ed always got quail, an almost perfect shot.

It was Ed who interested the late Calvin Coolidge in fishing. The colonel was a lifetime secret service man—better with a pistol than with a shoulder gun. Back there in early 1923 Cal had been asked about fishing on an up-coming vacation.

"Don't think I'll fish," the President replied. "Fishing is for small boys."

There was an election on the next day and Starling persuaded Mr. Coolidge to pose with a rod and reel, just to humor American fishermen who didn't like that crack about their favorite sport. Mr. Coolidge not only posed, he caught some fish. Thereafter, the President usually directed his vacations toward areas where the fishing was good.

Good fishing was not the only vacation factor. Mr. Coolidge was not a man to be hasty about spending money, his own or the taxpayers'. It was his habit to require merely a special car attached to a regular train when he travelled. He and Mrs. Coolidge were content with a table in the regular dining car, which was reserved for them, although ordinary people could use it when they'd had their food.

And Mr. Coolidge liked free board and room. If his vacation visit coincided with a big real estate promotion, as one did in Florida, for ex-

Ike's Brother Thinks Ike to Be Candidate

EL CENTRO, Calif., Feb. 18 (AP)—President Eisenhower's influential older brother predicted last night that "Ike" would run for re-election.

"I think he will run," the second oldest Eisenhower brother said.

Edgar Eisenhower made the prediction to reporters at a political dinner at which Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson was the principal speaker.

It was the first public statement by anyone close to the President on whether or not Mr. Eisenhower would seek re-election.

The statement was considered particularly significant in view of a report earlier this week by the President's physicians that he had recovered from his Sept. 24 heart attack and was physically fit for another term in the White House.

Edgar, a Tacoma, Wash., attorney, said that his statement was not based on any recent conversations with the President.

"Knowing (we) Eisenhowers and knowing something of the way his mind works, I believe he hasn't finished his job, and until he does finish that job he'll stay on as long as he can," the 67-year-old attorney said.

The President's brother listed three factors which favored Mr. Eisenhower's running for another term.

"Considering that the family is not against it, the doctors' clean bill of health, present world conditions and all factors involved, I think he will run," he said.



Common Cold Cure May Be Readied Soon

NEW YORK, Feb. 18 (AP)—A cure or preventative for the common cold ought to come soon, maybe within five years, an expert predicted today.

The best bet is a yet undiscovered drug rather than a vaccine, said Dr. John S. Dingle, Western Reserve School of Medicine, Cleveland.

Dr. Dingle hazarded his guess at a symposium sponsored by the Common Cold Foundation, an organization supported by a large number of industrial firms.

He and other experts presented instructive pointers on the cause, psychology and treatment of this seasonal misery.

A drug to control colds would have to strike at the virus or viruses causing colds. Present wonder drugs do not hit viruses.

The problem in seeking a vaccine is that having one cold does not give you immunity for very long against another one, Dr. Dingle said.

Maybe this is because there are many different viruses causing the colds. It may be because these viruses are weak in ability to create immunity.

Human psychology makes it tough to measure the effectiveness of any treatment for a cold, said Dr. Dingle and Dr. Howard S. Diehl, University of Minnesota.

They told of tests in which people thought they had up to 60 percent fewer colds if they were given one of the present cold vaccines, or various pills or other treatments.

The rub is that people given some worthless dummy pills or shots reported exactly the same amount of benefit, compared with people getting no treatments at all.

So psychology — thinking something good was being done — affects treatment. How much role psychology plays in bringing on colds is not known, they said.

Exposure to cold temperatures does not make people get more spontaneous colds, other experiments reveal. Just getting chilled doesn't cause the colds.

Magic Valley Hobbies No. 8 Making Rugs, Once Routine Work for Housewife, Is Hobby of Filer Woman

Hobbies today oftentimes are the serious things of yesterday. Only a few centuries ago, if a man wanted a rug on the floor of his home, either he or his wife, and generally his wife, made it.

As soon as manufactured rugs became available in this country, the people deserted the art of their ancestors. During the current revival of hooked and braided rugs, though, a flourishing industry has sprung up in New England, parts of the south and in Canada.

Mrs. Fenwick claims the actual work of making a rug is only a small part of the overall task. First, the old clothing and other cloth has to be assembled and cleaned. Then it has to be cut or torn into strips about an inch wide.

The first rugs used by man were the skins of animals. He also used skins for doors, couches and blankets. But as primitive man learned to weave, fabrics replaced skins for everything but doors.

The Moors brought rug weaving with them when they conquered Spain in the 700s A. D. In another 700 years rug making had become a craft in Europe and a guild of rug makers was formed in Paris in 1450 A. D.

England didn't get the rug, or foot covering as it was called, until shortly before the Battle of Hastings in 1066 A. D. and weaving didn't get started there until in the 1300s A. D.

So it's understandable why the early settlers in this country didn't bring any rugs with them from Europe. Instead, they waited until the clothing they wore could not be patched any more and then made the clothing into rugs.

More versatile designs can be made in hooked rugs than in braided rugs and short pieces of material are all that are required. The only limitation on designs is a person's artistic ability.

A chenille rug is, in reality, a hooked rug and the home "manufacturer" can use yarns of wool, silk, cotton or rayon as well as cloth to make such rugs.

Official Tells Of Mine Law

New mining legislation providing multiple use of surface resources on forest land have been explained by C. J. Olsen, regional forester.

The purpose of the new legislation is to protect the public interest and at the same time enable miners and prospectors to increase the development of the mineral resources.

Responsibility for the over-all administration rests with the bureau of land management but the forest service will assist by supplying information about mining claims located within the forest.

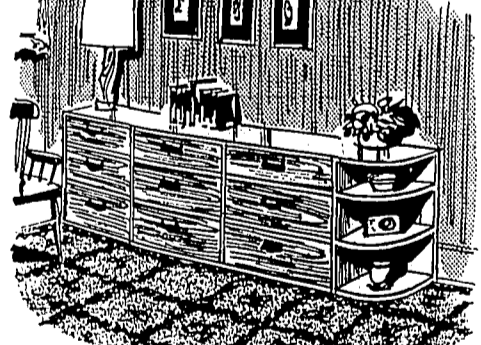

Device Needs No Lights for Night Photos

BOSTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—A scientist unveiled for civilians yesterday a device for seeing in complete darkness.

"Eva" is the nickname affectionately bestowed upon the apparatus, which looks something like an ordinary, professional camera—on a tripod. It not only enables seeing without any light at all, but it takes pictures in color. Eva can easily see anything from a human being to a blacked-out city, at night.

Dr. Bruce Billings, widely known physicist and general manager of Baird Associates Inc., showed "Eva"—otherwise known as an evaporograph—to the directors of American Research and Development corporation.

Dr. Billings displayed a picture Eva made of a man taken at 200 yards in a black, moonless night—without any light source. He said Eva could similarly "see" a house a mile away. And he showed a night-time shot which revealed a far-away dark island and other objects in Boston harbor.

Instead of focusing reflected light, like ordinary cameras, Eva gathers in heat radiation sent out in varying degrees and wave lengths by various objects. And it focuses these radiations on a very thin, uniform film of oil.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 18 — Despite the development of new chemical weed killers, certain weeds are flourishing as never before in the western states, says William R. Purdie of Oregon State College.

In a talk before 400 delegates attending the Western and Columbia Weed Control Conference he blamed the spread on the development and use of the best-known herbicide, 2,4-D.

Much more money and effort must be expended, delegates were advised by Leonard J. Jensen of Utah State Agricultural college, if a way is to be found to stop the spread of noxious weeds.

Range lands are generally of low productive value, he said, making it uneconomical to use even the cheapest chemical killer, such as 2,4-D.
