BETHESDA, Md., Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Idaho Secretary of State Ira H. Masters, who fought as valiantly for life as he did for political office, died yesterday in the National Health Institute, he was 79.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday. Gov. Robert E. Smylie said the body of the four-term Democratic secretary of state would lie in state in the capitol rotunda from 10 a.m. until noon on Thursday. National guardsmen will form an honor guard around the casket and Statehouse offices will be closed.

Cairo Plane Smash Fatal to 52 People; 12 Are Badly Hurt

CAIRO, Egypt, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—A French airliner on its way from Indochina to Paris dived to low in approaching Cairo airport today, hit a desert sandhill, crashed and burned, killing 52 of 64 persons on board.

It was 12 hours after the crash before officials of the French airline were able to confirm and announce that 64 persons were aboard. The officials said the four-engined DC-6B carried 55 passengers and nine crew members. Only 12 of the 64 survived—six crew members and six passengers. Most of the survivors were in critical condition, though all but possibly one were expected to recover.

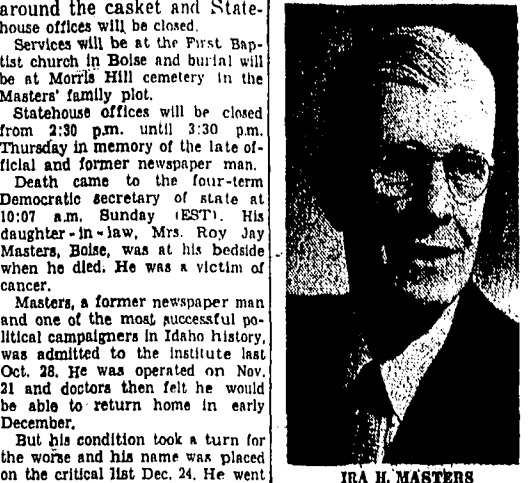
Molotov Joins Rising Chorus Against Stalin

MOSCOW, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, one of the last of the "old Bolsheviks," joined in the morning chorus of criticism of the one-man rule of the late Joseph Stalin, the Russian people learned today.

Molotov is one of the few remaining original followers of Stalin. He has been foreign minister of the Soviet Union since 1939 except for a brief period after World War II.

Deep Snow Piled in North Valley Region

Winter returned with renewed vigor to the northern part of Magic Valley Monday and piled a foot and a half of light fluffy snow over Hailey and Ketchum. Fairfield reported 14 inches of new snow, Carey nine inches and Shoshone three inches. No snow fell in Jerome, Twin Falls and Burley but high winds caused some drifting of old snow on east-west highways south of the Snake river. Further south the Associated Press reported more snow, indicating parts of southern Idaho and northern Utah and Nevada made up an island crossed by gusty winds but no snow.

Note Sorrow, Give Tributes

News of the death of Secretary of State Ira H. Masters brought words of tribute and sorrow from many of Idaho's leaders. They came from Robert E. Smylie, the Republican governor, from State Budget Director James H. Young, who, as Republican candidate for secretary of state in 1954, was the last man to oppose him for public office, and from others.

Smylie ordered the flag over the statehouse in Boise lowered to half mast until the funeral, which will probably be Thursday or Friday in Boise. There are also tentative plans for the body to lie in state in the capitol rotunda on Thursday.

Frozen Men Found; Europe Toll Mounts

LONDON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—The frozen bodies of six Norwegian sailors were found in a lifeboat in the North sea today as the bitterest winter of modern records continued to lash Europe. The death toll since Feb. 1 shot up to 749.

The life boat with its grisly cargo was found a short distance from the spot where their ship went down off the south coast of Norway last week. The sailors survived the sinking only to succumb to the bitter cold. Shortages of coal, food and medicine plagued the continent. A hard shell of ice blocked inland waterways and coastal harbors and deep snow clogged highways.

Notes Committees Support

Youth Issues Under Study By Delegates

BOISE, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Approximately 150 delegates to Gov. Robert E. Smylie's conference on youth problems opened two days of discussions today, following the pattern set in earlier conferences on education and safety.

Most of the discussion will be in groups of 10 persons or less, spokesmen said. Delegates include educators, judges, religious leaders, attorneys and teen-agers.

Pro-Western Leader Wins Greek Ballot

ATHENS, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Pro-western Premier Konstantinos Karamanlis squeezed through to an upset victory in Greece's national elections, official results showed today.

The Democratic Union rolled up a big popular vote but a complicated electoral system of proportional representation introduced last December by the handsome premier gave him the victory.

Warm Winds Clouds, Snow Set for Area

Envoys Meet On Terms of Saar Return

PARIS, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Representatives of France and West Germany met today to discuss terms for returning to Germany the disputed Saar area which was all but annexed by France after each of the two world wars.

French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau and West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano sat down at the negotiating table.

President to Stay in Dixie 3 More Days

THOMASVILLE, Ga., Feb. 20 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower decided today to prolong his vacation until Friday or Saturday.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty told newsmen meanwhile "there isn't a thing to be said" in commenting on a report that Eisenhower had decided to announce late Friday, after the stock markets close, whether he will seek a second term. The President has indicated he will disclose his political plans around March 1, possibly at a news conference.

New Protests Made Against Freight Hikes

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Government officials and three Republican congressmen from Idaho asked Interstate Commerce Commission today to block a proposed seven per cent increase in railroad freight rates.

"The 500 million-dollar-a-year increase will be effective next Monday unless overruled by the commission," they said.

Solon Seeking Federal Sums On Campaigns

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger proposed today that the government finance federal election campaigns to eliminate the "pull" influence of large private contributions.

The Oregon Democrat made the proposal in a bill prepared for introduction today. He called it "the Teddy Roosevelt bill" because he said it is based on a proposal originally advanced by President Theodore Roosevelt in 1907.

Fighting Occurs At Struck Plant

FARMINGDALE, N. Y., Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Fighting broke out today at the main gate of the Republican Aviation corporation as a strike of 12,000 production workers against the company's four plants entered its second day.

Twelve men identified as pickets were arrested as the scuffling continued through the morning. One of those arrested was identified as Justin Castro, president of the striking unionists. All were accused of shouting and pushing employes attempting to go to work.

Official Calls in Idaho Warrants

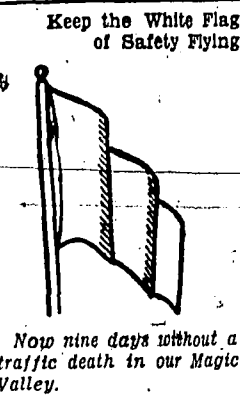

Control Step Is Noted for Cancer Fight

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—What could be the first glimpse of a breakthrough in the cancer fight was reported today by distinguished scientists who were controlling the growth of a particular kind of cancer in chick embryos inside eggs with "substantial success."

Dr. Alfred Taylor and Roger J. Williams of the University of Texas reported their revelations with scientific care but suspected that successful cancer investigation "may take a course involving first the control of cancer in embryonated eggs, second its control in experimental animals, and lastly its control in human patients."

Report Given

If that proves to be so, the first step has now been taken, they reported in the proceedings of the national academy of sciences. By combining anti-cancer chemicals with an increased temperature, they stopped the growth of a mouse mammary tumor without interfering with the normal growth of the chick with the normal in the same egg.

Their successful experiments were repeatable, which is an acid test. This experiment they detailed: 107 fertile eggs were inoculated with cancerous mouse tissue. On the 10th day of incubation, 140 eggs were inoculated with tem, an anti-cancer chemical, at the same time the incubation temperature was raised from 98.5 degrees to 104 degrees. The remaining 87 eggs were left alone in a 92.3 incubator.

Eggs Opened

On the 15th incubation day, all eggs were opened. In all the 57 "control" eggs except one, the embryos had been killed by the growing cancer, and the one survivor contained a large tumor. Of the 140 which had been treated with Tem and increased temperature, 88 not only had survived but had reached normal growth and only traces of atypically (not typically) appearing tumor were present in most of them.

Tem has been widely used against human cancers, with disappointing results. In only some it has slowed cancer growth—but only for a time. With other anti-cancer chemical compounds they found that increased temperature also enhanced effectiveness. All their results when put together emboldened them to suggest that cancer control may be found to involve the simultaneous use of chemical and physical agents. (Heat is a physical agent.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, D., Ore., said today Oregon tax reports prove that the Al Sarena Mining company "has been harvesting timber" in the Rouge-river-national-forest.

Neuberger and other congressional Democrats have accused the interior department of a timber "give away" in granting mining claims to Al Sarena in the area. The matter recently was investigated by a senate subcommittee. Interior Secretary Douglas McKay has said the claims were awarded under laws passed by congress.

Neuberger said Oregon state forest-fire tax reports show that the company has cut more than two million board-feet of saw timber in the past two years.

Two Negroes Are Admitted To Sigma Phi

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Feb. 20 (AP)—Two Negro students, the center of a raging controversy within the national society of Sigma Phi, were initiated into the Williams college chapter of the fraternity.

Both the college and the local chapter, which "will judge these men on their merits or get out," zealously guarded the identity of the students.

Initiation "Routine"

"They will be initiated along with other pledges without fanfare and without being identified," a school spokesman said. "As far as we're concerned the initiation is routine."

Earlier this month, the national society condemned the Williams chapter for pledging the Negroes and expelled the unit. A meeting of the national board of the fraternity was called in New York to consider an expulsion resolution.

Chapter Refused

The 40 undergraduate members and nine alumni trustees of the chapter refused to oust the pledges and took the matter up with Williams officials. The college reiterated a long-standing rule that no fraternities could remain on the Williams campus whose "chapter is not free to elect to membership any individual on the basis of his merit as a person."

Williams chapter representatives were victorious at the New York meeting where they found they had the support of more than a majority of the chapters represented. The national group did not expel the Williams chapter and fears that the initiation of the Negroes would cause other chapters to resign from the national society apparently were unfounded.

Colored Leader Is Shot in Argument

COLUMBUS, Ga., Feb. 20 (AP)—Dr. Thomas H. Brewer, about 55, prominent Columbus Negro leader and member of the local executive committee of the NAACP, was shot and killed Saturday night and a white man was arrested in connection with the case.

Solicitor General John H. Land said seven bullets from a small caliber pistol were fired into Brewer's body. He was hit in the head and chest and was dead on arrival at City hospital.

Land said Lucio Flowers, owner of the F and B department store in the downtown Negro business section, was arrested and being held, pending further investigation.

Stevenson Calls Veto Right Move

DENVER, Feb. 20 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson, candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, said Saturday President Eisenhower "did the right thing for the wrong reason" when he vetoed the natural gas bill.

Stevenson, who talked to newsmen briefly during a brief stop-over here while flying to Chicago from Salt Lake City, said he "presumed" that the President's reasons for vetoing the bill were the reasons Eisenhower stated.

The 1952 Democratic presidential nominee declined to speculate what effect, if any, the veto would have on this year's campaign.

Fashion Houses Put Into "Tizzy"

LONDON, Feb. 20 (AP)—A London newspaper threw fashion designers into a tizzy by threatening to expose their cherished secret designs before they are ready.

Lord Beaverbrook's four million circulation "Daily Express" said it will no longer promise to observe the cease-date restrictions imposed by the fashion czars of London and Paris.

The paper said it was acting in the name of freedom of the press.

Gracie Pfoost Joins Others On Proposal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Rep. Gracie Pfoost, D. Ida., said Saturday she has joined with Reps. Lee Metcalf, D. Mont., and Don Magnuson, D. Wash., in suggesting the route of the Lewis and Clark expedition be designated a national tourway.

"They made the suggestion in a house-joint resolution that the designation be made by the U. S. commissioner of public roads in cooperation with the highway departments of the several states.

"This is just one more way of calling attention to the importance of completing the so-called 'missing link' in the Lewis and Clark highway so there will be a through route to the coast," Mrs. Pfoost said.

"Passage of the resolution in itself won't give us an extra red cent right now for construction, but might help get money in the future. And it will certainly boost the prestige of the road."

The tourway would extend from St. Louis, Mo., along the general route of the expedition, through Montana, across Idaho, and along the north bank of the Columbia river, ending at Seaside, Ore.

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Ira Masters Loses Fight, Dies in East

(From Page One)

His mark on Idaho's history will be lasting.

Governor Gets Task

It will fall to the governor to appoint a successor to fill the remainder of Masters' term, which ends in 1959. Any consideration of the appointment "would be inappropriate to discuss at this time," Smylie said today.

In two of Masters' terms as secretary of state, he was the only Democrat to hold an Idaho elective office. In 1950 the feat earned him the nickname of "Mr. Democrat" of Idaho.

He was born on a Kansas homestead near Newton, Feb. 16, 1877, and came west as a football coach and teacher in 1907. He attended country schools but did not go to high school.

He went from grade school to Kansas Teachers' college in Emporia, where he got a yen for the newspaper business in carburetor chats with William Allen White, the famed "age of Emporia." Masters in later years often recalled delivering papers to White while working his way through college.

He was graduated from Kansas State and took two years of graduate work at Ottawa university. Following that, he took a job coaching football in La Junta, Colo., and the next year moved to a similar position in Ogden, Utah.

In 1910, he purchased the Bingham Press-Bulletin and later the Provo, Utah, Herald. While in Bingham, he met Corinne Harris, a musician, who became his wife March 17, 1913, in Provo.

Entered Politics 40 Years Ago

Masters entered politics in 1918 as a delegate to the national Democratic convention that nominated Woodrow Wilson for a second term as president. He was elected to the Utah state legislature in 1918.

In 1921 Masters sold the Provo Herald and purchased the Twin Falls, Ida., Daily Times. This paper was sold in 1927 when he bought the Idaho State Journal, Pocatello, then a morning daily.

The Journal was the fourth Republican newspaper he purchased only to change its political leanings toward the Democratic party. He was later to tell a reporter in Boise that his hobby was "changing run-down GOP newspapers to Democratic and making them pay."

Appointed to Post

Masters was appointed registrar of the U. S. land office at Blackfoot in 1928 and three years later won his first term as secretary of state by a 40,000-vote majority. He was defeated twice in bids to represent Idaho's second congressional district and in 1944 returned to the state house as secretary of state. He won again in 1950 and once more in 1954 at the age of 77.

"I'm getting too old to run again," Masters said following his unprecedented fourth election. "I want to make way for younger men." He would have been over 80 when his term ended in 1959.

Masters, who put on a vigorous campaign despite his advanced age, thanked Idaho's weekly newspaper editors and voters "who helped me in the last (1954) campaign that I will ever make in Idaho."

He credited his victory to "a small advertisement with a picture and a short story and a few cards for the weekly newspapers of Idaho..."

Cites Homeliness

"Many people asked me why it is that so many people voted for me and my only logical answer is because I am so homely," he said. He counted on personal contacts with voters in small towns and on strenuous campaign tours.

"I didn't spend a nickel on radio or television," said Masters. And despite his years in the daily newspaper field he added, "or on the daily papers."

Many Democrats and Republicans alike urged him to run for governor in 1954 but his doctors, whom he called "Republican," persuaded him not to.

Dislikes Nickname

Long known as "Ike" Masters, Idaho's elder statesman has asked to be called "Dick," "Mr. Secretary" or "Mr. Democrat" but not "Ike."

"I don't like 'Ike.' That was my nickname before Mr. Eisenhower had it and it sounds like a black Republican."

Masters is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Maxine Plastino, living in Idaho Falls, and his son, Roy Jay, who resides in Boise. Mrs. Masters, also a victim of cancer, died in 1953.

Attack Slated For Rebels in Peruvian City

LIMA, Peru, Feb. 20 (AP)—Official reports indicated today loyal naval and air units are preparing to strike at the "jungle redoubt" of the army rebels who hold the city of Iquitos and part of remote Loreto province.

A government communique said the "Amazon fleet" is blockading Iquitos, a river port 500 miles northeast of here. The official radio warned the people of the city to listen for instructions on means of "avoiding damage by government action" — presumably meaning air attack.

Reject Appeal

The communique declared also that garrisons elsewhere in Peru rejected rebel Gen. Marcial Merino Perez's appeal to them to join the revolt.

No late word was heard from the rebels' radio Loreto, and government restrictions on telephone services made it impossible to obtain information direct from Iquitos.

Commander Assigned

The rebel radio reported on Friday—the second day of the revolt—that Merino had assigned Lieut. Abel Cordero as "political and military commander" of Loreto and installed Lieut. Col. Daniel Orozco Quintanilla as chief of police.

The latest telephoned reports from Iquitos said the city was proceeding normally under the direction of the new authorities.

The government clamped down on telephone communications early yesterday, announcing that lines outside Lima could be used only for official purposes.

He and other Westerners want proof that the land is required for defense and that military lands already held could not be more efficiently utilized to minimize new acquisitions.

Young, with backing from some other congress, is requesting that:

- Land withdrawals be made on a temporary, renewable basis;
- Hunters and fishermen be permitted to use the lands if this wouldn't interfere with military usage;
- Mineral areas be excluded from acquired lands, or that mining be permitted if it wouldn't interfere with the military;
- Ranchers be permitted to graze livestock on military reservations;
- State water rights be protected.

The water rights problem was aired at a recent committee session and it will be up again Wednesday and Thursday.

Testimony disclosed that navy officials refused to pay \$6 and sign papers recognizing state water rights in a case involving wells in Nevada. The case has been taken to court.

Justice department witnesses have been called to testify this week on state water rights bills sponsored by Engle, Young and Representative Budge, R., Ida.

Youth Sought


BOISE, Feb. 20 (AP)—Police were on the lookout today for Dee Langholz, 19-year-old Owyhee county farm youth who disappeared Friday night from the state hospital south in Blackfoot.

Langholz was committed earlier this month after pleading guilty to shooting and wounding Dean Moore, 36, as Moore was driving a tractor on his farm near Homedale.

Haven Given Negro Co-Ed By Talladega

TALLADEGA, Ala., Feb. 20 (AP)—A tiny, bi-racial college which began integration in this deep-south white supremacy stronghold 30 years ago is providing a haven for Authergre Lucy.

Miss Lucy, "excluded" as the University of Alabama's first Negro student after a wave of riotous protests, is reading and "keeping up with her studies" at Talladega college.

Stays as Guest

Dr. Arthur D. Gray, Negro president, said Miss Lucy came for a stay of about 10 days as a "guest" permitted full use of the library and other facilities but not as an enrolled student.

Miss Lucy, through her attorney in Birmingham, Ala., is awaiting the outcome of federal court action seeking to force the University of Alabama to readmit her to the campus. A hearing is set for Feb. 29.

Practiced Integration

Gray said Talladega college, founded 80 years ago by the Congregational church, has practiced full racial integration without outside interference for 80 years.

At present the six white students among the 300-member student body are children of white faculty members, as were the first white students enrolled 80 years ago, he said.

But in the past, he said, the college has enrolled white students of the area from families which had no connection with the administration.

No Troubles

Gray said there has never been any trouble because of Talladega's bi-racial policies.

Of the 35 faculty members, he said, about one-third are white. Two of these are European, but the others come from various parts of the United States, with the exception of the South, he said.

Gray said integration is complete. He said the white and Negro students work, play, eat and live together.

There are 161 million acres in the U. S. national forest.

Rains, Winds Pound Areas; Flooding Due

Heavy rains and howling winds, reminiscent of northern California's disastrous Christmas week floods, returned to the area today.

Three inches of rain pounded a small community north of San Francisco in 11 hours and minor flash floods and mud slides were reported at San Rafael and Kentfield.

In the mountains, weathermen measured 17 inches of new snow in northern California and 20 inches at Mt. Baker Lodge, Wash.

Bad weather let up in the East, but the weather bureau warned that heavy rains might touch off floods along the Ohio river below Cincinnati.

There was already flooding on parts of the lower Ohio and its tributaries in Kentucky and Tennessee. The rising waters were fed by a week-end storm which also dumped eight inches of snow on Boston, Mass., and six inches on Concord, N. H., before going out to sea.

Elsewhere, rains and showers pelted the northern gulf states and moved into the middle Atlantic area as far north as southern Pennsylvania. Monroe, La., got a 1.13-inch dousing last night and Lufkin, Tex., measured 1.09 inches.

Tycoon Says Persecutions Noted in U.S.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20—Harvey S. Firestone, Jr., warned Americans today that persecution is still being practiced in this country.

Firestone, chairman of the Firestone Tire and Rubber company, told some 850 community leaders at the annual brotherhood week lunch that this country has gained its great status through the bonds of brotherhood.

Firestone, who is brotherhood week chairman of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, said another danger also exists "from communists and fellow travellers who magnify cases of religious prejudice in the United States out of true proportion."

"These people, he said, feed the sparks of resentment into the flames of vengeance, providing grist for the propaganda mills of our enemies."

Firestone said that America stands before the world today as a living example of the power of free men. Americans must practice that freedom.

Bids Planned To Air Man's Space Studies

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Radio astronomy may push man's scientific frontier close to "the edge of the universe."
It may even reveal some of the secrets of creation itself.
That, at least, is the hope of scientists supporting President Eisenhower's plan to build this country's first major radio astronomy center.

Hope for Okay
The National Science Foundation, anticipating congressional approval, hopes to be able to award a construction contract before the end of the fiscal year starting July 1.
It has been considering sites for some time. The search has narrowed down from 29 to half a dozen, all in the Appalachian mountain country of West Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, and the Carolinas.
Radiotelescopes can "look" much farther into space than even the largest optical telescopes. They also are unhampered by the atmospheric conditions and interstellar dust and gas that frequently block off vast regions from examination by other means.

Cost Is Higher
The starting cost of the radio astronomy center would be about 3.5 million dollars. The final cost might hit 25 million dollars to 30 million dollars. The government hopes operation and maintenance of the center ultimately will be taken over by some yet to be organized group of universities.

Astronomers believe radiotelescopes some day may resolve differences among scientists about the birth and size of the universe or perhaps suggest theories as yet unimagined.

The first radiotelescope at the center would be a metal "dish" 140 feet across resembling a giant radar antenna. Its function would be to concentrate and receive in recordable form faint radio broadcasts from space.

Nine Are Operating
There are nine radiotelescopes in the country now. The largest are a 60-foot antenna at the Harvard college observatory and a 50-foot dish at the naval research laboratory here.

The world's largest will be a 250-foot radiotelescope nearing completion in Great Britain.

Dr. Bernard F. Burke, radio astronomer of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, said it is hoped that the new instruments will clean information at "distances near the edge of space"—assuming there is an edge.

Inquiry Is Made Into List 'Error'

EL TORO MARINE AIR STATION, Calif., Feb. 20 (AP)—A marine corps court of inquiry today investigated the tragic mix-up in which some marines not connected with a Niles, Calif., plane crash were identified as its victims.

The court will also probe the improper disclosure of the names of some actual victims.

The names of five crew member victims of last Friday's marine transport crash were correctly identified in the first list of victims, but wrong names were given for the plane's passengers. The mistake resulted in the relatives of 33 marines being told erroneously that the servicemen had perished.

Several hours later a corrected list was released. It was made up of 34 passengers, 5 actual crewmen and one marine listed as a crewman who was "hitching" a ride.

Race Segregation Is Called 'Sinful'

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 20 (AP)—A Roman Catholic archbishop, in a pastoral letter read to all churches throughout the New Orleans archdiocese, attacked racial segregation yesterday as "morally wrong and sinful."


But the church official, Joseph F. Rummell, said vital circumstances needed more study and consideration before the church could render a decision now on integration of parochial schools under his authority.

In a five-page letter, Rummell said, however, "nothing would please us more than to be able to render a decision now."

The archbishop asked for perseverance on the part of the people with a problem "which should be worked out not in an atmosphere of wrangling or discord or hatred, but in a spirit of brotherhood."

Death of Student Changes Hazings To "Hell Week" By United Press

A cross-section of fraternity men today condemned the old-fashioned "hell week" ordeals which resulted in the death of a college freshman 10 days ago.

They said the traditional "hell week" paddlings and "long walks" are out-dated, unnecessary, and give fraternities a bad name. Some called them "idiotic" and even "barbaric."

The fraternity spokesmen were queried by the United Press concerning the Feb. 10 death of an 18-year-old Massachusetts Institute of Technology fraternity pledge.

The pledge, Thomas Clark, Harvey, III, crashed through reservoir ice and drowned 12 miles from the MIT campus. His superiors in the Delta Kappa Epsilon chapter had

taken him blindfolded on a car ride and ordered him to find his way back in the darkness.

Clark was to be buried near his home today and at MIT fraternity leaders met last night to discuss plans for curbing "hell week" stunts.

In other universities, many fraternities said they had changed "hell week" to "help week." Fraternity pledges, in order to gain official admission into the fraternities, are ordered to roll up their sleeves and farm work gangs for some charitable purpose, they said.

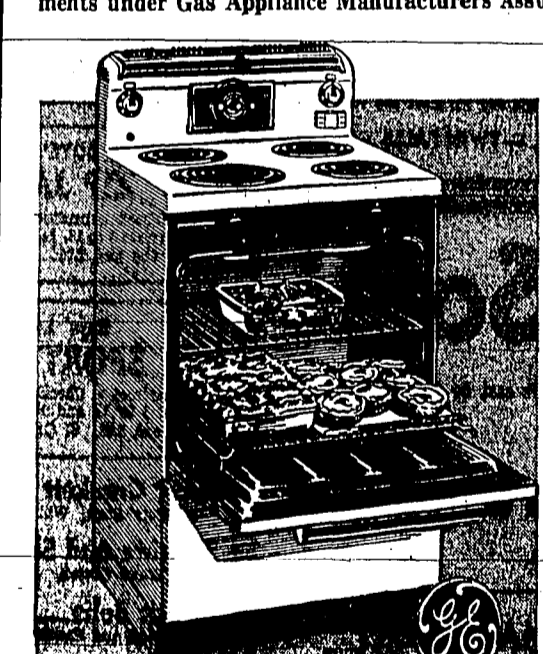

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Lawyer Who Filed Charge Draws Arrest

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 20 (AP)—A Negro attorney who filed an anti-segregation suit growing out of a Montgomery bus boycott was arrested Saturday on an indictment returned by a grand jury investigating the boycott.

The grand jury may write other indictments early next week charging the actual violation of Alabama's "segregation" law, a statute originally enacted to deal with labor disputes.

Fred Gray, 25-year-old Montgomery lawyer, was among the defendants named in 114 true bills handed out by the jury late Friday in a report. The final report is expected today or tomorrow.

Gray was charged with unlawfully filing an anti-segregation suit in U.S. district court last month without the consent of one of the five Negro women whose names appeared on the complaint.

The suit, an outgrowth of the racial boycott against Montgomery City Lines buses, seeks to knock out city and state laws which require segregation on all public transportation.

The attorney was released on \$300 bond after his arrest. He declined to comment on the indictment which was returned under a state law which makes it a misdemeanor to file a suit without authority. Violation is punishable by a \$500 fine and suspension from practice.

Probe Sought By Demos on U. S. Defense

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Democrats renewed their demands today for a congressional review of defense policy following claims that Russia is "ahead of us" in the ballistic missile race.

Tom Gardner, who resigned as chief of the air force research staff earlier this month after a row with the administration over money for research, urged yesterday that congress set up a new "czar" to push an emergency missile program.

"I believe the Russians are ahead of us," Gardner said when questioned about the U. S. ballistic missile program on a television program.

Sen. Stuart Symington, D., Mo., former air force secretary under the Truman administration, who also holds the missile race, said he was "glad the truth is finally getting to the people."

"I am only sorry that under this administration, this apparently can only happen through resignations," Symington said.

He said Gardner's proposal for a new missile czar should be considered by the senate armed services committee.

Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., campaigning for the Democratic presidential nomination in Minnesota, called for a "full review" by congress to "find out if we're properly defending ourselves."

"I'm tremendously concerned about the fact that Russia has either caught us or gone ahead of us," he said.

Kefauver said Gardner should be called as a witness in any congressional investigation of defense.

Gardner said the new missile czar—who would be a new deputy or assistant defense secretary—should be responsible directly to congress for the missile program and should handle money for it "except from normal controls of defense funds."

He also called for a second "crash" program to increase production of the B52 intercontinental bomber from a present 17 a month, which he said was "pitifully low," to 45 a month.

Gardner said without qualification that this country has "no operational ballistic missile." He said the United States is ahead of Russia in development of air-to-air and ground-to-air defense missiles but behind in development of a ballistic missile.

Gardner said Soviet Defense Minister Georgi K. Zhukov's speech Saturday brought out what U. S. officials "have been fearing for some time."

Zhukov declared Russia has atomic and hydrogen weapons and "long-range missiles." He said nuclear bombing of U. S. cities would follow any western attack on Russia.

Wyoming Mother Shows How Public Schools Can Be Aided

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Mrs. Fred D. Boice, Jr., an attractive mother of two youngsters from Cheyenne, Wyo., is rocking the nation's top educators right back on their blackboards.

Mrs. Boice's idea turned out to be one of the hottest to come out of the high-level White House conference on education because it revealed that she and a handful of public-spirited citizens in Wyoming are just about five years ahead of everyone else at the conference. Its citizens weren't asking anybody for anything.

Her report included these facts:

Five years ago the Wyoming legislature, upset by the state's deteriorating schools, set up a citizen's committee to investigate the problem. As a member of the legislature, informed on school problems, a tireless worker and mother of two kids, Mrs. Boice was made chairman.

"The first step in solving any problem is to face squarely the fact that the problem exists," she says. "That's what we did by going to the people all over the state, taking a completely objective look at the schools and trying not to be blinded by school legislation already on the books."

"Each member paid his or her own expenses and worked hard. We did a \$300,000 study on \$12,000—which proves that the size of an appropriation does not limit the accomplishment."

What her committee uncovered was a situation not worse than the present one existing in most states. But not much better, and getting worse.

In a few years enrollment had jumped 24 per cent. The state's birth rate was 11 per cent. higher than the national average. Only 37 out of the state's 87 high schools were accredited by the North Central association.

A study of the state's outmoded school district system revealed that 820 one-teacher rural schools were being maintained in separately organized districts, 45 districts did not maintain any schools and about two-thirds of the districts did not maintain high schools.

Only 47 per cent of the elementary teachers and 18 per cent of the rural teachers had four years of college.

The committee decided that the immediate need was 500 more teachers and 400 additional classrooms.

Then the committee tackled the most difficult of all educational problems: How schools are financed.

It found that one method of appropriating money was on the basis of the number of teachers and school bus drivers in a district. The effect of this was to give more money to the wealthier districts and less to the poorer ones.

The final report was put into attractive, booklet form which any person could read and understand, and distributed widely around the state.

Among other things the report recommended that practically all present laws governing the financing of schools be replaced with new ones adaptable to modern, growing educational needs.

Chief financial recommendations were that a one per cent sales tax be authorized for the support of the schools and that the basic education cost formula be computed on a minimum expenditure per classroom.

It said: "Guarantee to every child in rural, elementary and high schools a program costing \$5,500 per classroom unit."

This is a respectable figure for any U. S. state school system.

Then, when the committee laid its

Rigid Support Is Sought for Cattle, Swine

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Two Democratic senators have called for broadening proposed return to rigid price supports to include beef and pork.

Sens. Walter F. George, D., Ga., and Robert S. Kerr, D., Okla., said they would add the provision to the omnibus farm bill, scheduled to go before the senate for debate next week. The bill already includes a return to rigid 90 per cent supports for corn, cotton, peanuts and wheat.

George and Kerr also proposed an amendment to double the extra 250 million dollars already included in the bill for the federal beef and pork buying program aimed at bolstering livestock prices.

The administration strongly opposes scuttling the present flexible price support program for a return to rigid supports. Some Republicans predict President Eisenhower would veto the bill even though it contains the administration-backed "soil bank."

Kerr told reporters adding beef and pork "would meet a need which is now generally recognized as being critically acute." Both Kerr and George have voiced their support of rigid supports already in the bill.

Israeli Arms Bid May Get Solons' Okay

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Israel's chances of getting U. S. arms aid, including some jet planes, have improved as a result of events of the past three days, some administration officials said today.

They emphasized that no decision has been reached but said Israel may get some favorable reaction on its arms request as a result of the controversial shipment of 18 U. S. tanks to Saudi Arabia. Saudi Arabia is one of Israel's Arab foes in the Middle East.

The freighter James Monroe sailed from Brooklyn, N. Y., today with the tanks. Late last night, 29 of the ship's 33 crew members demanded a 25 per cent bonus as wartime pay for making the voyage. This delayed the sailing more than eight hours until 6:53 a. m. (EST).

After the tank shipment was disclosed, the government early Friday clamped an embargo on any arms shipments to the Middle East. But the embargo was lifted some 43 hours later.

Rep. Emanuel Celler, D. N. Y., charged yesterday that "oil interests" represented by Undersecretary of State Herbert Hoover, Jr., persuaded President Eisenhower to lift the embargo.

Celler said the "oil interests go to the President's ear" on the controversial arms shipment. He said "they are represented by Herbert Hoover, Jr., who in the past has received some very lucrative contracts" from them.

Hoover was not available to reporters and a state department spokesman declined comment on Celler's charge. The New York congressman, a frequent critic of U. S. policy toward Israel, did not say where he got his information.

Teen-Ager Killed In Blast Accident

GREEN RIVER, Utah, Feb. 20 (AP)—An exploding oil well casing killed 14-year-old Duard Lee Cox yesterday and the sheriff who investigated said he was "pretty bitter" about the abandoned dynamite used in the explosion.

Emery County Sheriff Don B. Kofford, Castle Dale, Utah, said Cox and two teen-age companions had found the dynamite at the abandoned Black Panther uranium mine about 23 miles south of Green River.

"The powder was right out in the open, under a rock," he said. "It was old powder—very dangerous. It shouldn't have been left there."

Hells Canyon Development Is Discussed by Joint Committee

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (Special)—The federal high dam in Hells canyon briefly entered the economic picture this week when the joint congressional committee on the economy report discussed natural resource development.

The committee heard testimony from Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay, anti-high dam official, who was quizzed by Sen. Paul Douglas, D. Ill., long an ardent advocate of the single dam.

In setting forth his reasons for opposing the high dam, McKay said he "came to Washington with an open mind, but after talking (with engineers and other interior specialists) I was convinced the high dam would be a white elephant."

Douglas countered with the belief that "the administration made a great mistake when it favored two low-level dams instead of the single one."

Douglas went on to say that great power supplies will continue to be required in the northwest, and that the processing of phosphates was only one of the industries which will increase the requirements.

McKay agreed that "requirements are going to grow," but he pointed out that "upstream storage on the Snake river is essential and there is not enough water upstream to fill the big dam."

"Storage should be built where the water is," McKay concluded.

Mediator Tries To Settle Strike

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20 (AP)—New efforts will be made to end a six-week strike of 850 Brotherhood of Railway Mail Clerks against Western Air Lines with the arrival this week of Federal Mediator Leverett Edwards, a company spokesman said today.

The spokesman said new negotiations will be scheduled upon the arrival of Edwards either tomorrow or Wednesday.

The federal mediator returned to Washington last week shortly before the clerks rejected a company wage proposal.

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Report Avers GM Workers Salaries Hike

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 20 (AP)—General Motors reported today workers in its United States plants received an all-time record weekly pay averaging \$102.41 during 1955.

"General Motors people had a good year in 1955," Harlow H. Curcio, company president, and Alfred P. Sloan, chairman of the board, reported in a special statement made in advance of the company's annual report.

The pay of the workers was up an average of nearly \$11 a week from 1954, when the weekly average pay was \$91.44.

Employment Is High

The number of workers drawing the pay checks also was up sharply. In 1954 factory employment averaged 387,462 in United States plants. In 1955 the hourly-rate employment was up to 410,022.

Workers in the car, truck, body and assembly divisions did even better than the average for all General Motors workers. They drew weekly pay checks averaging \$104.77. In 1954 their checks had averaged \$95.34.

Total employment in all GM plants throughout the world was 624,011 salaried and hourly-rate workers, who earned \$3,127,145,514, the report said. This was also up sharply from 1954, when world employment of the firm was 576,667 and the total pay roll was \$2,610,195,006.

Pay Rolls Cost

The report said that the pay rolls cost more than a fourth of all General Motors sales during the year. Average hourly earnings in the United States for General Motors were \$24.1 compared to the \$18.8 average for all manufacturing reported by the bureau of labor statistics.

The company said the average work week was 42.5 hours, compared to 40.4 hours in 1954.

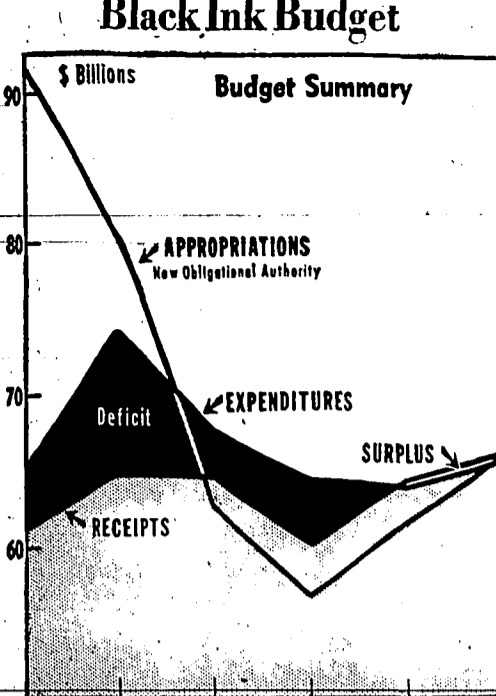

Six-Legged Insect "Pal" Can Make Some Man Tidy \$25,000

By HAL BOYLE

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 20 (AP)—Do you have any little six-legged insect friends who would like to gamble their lives on a chance to win \$25,000?

If so, Ralph G. Martin is the man for them to see.

Martin, president of the Cook Chemical company, has built his life-long hatred of bugs into a profitable million-dollar business in insecticides.

Bugs are stubborn creatures. The best known way to kill bugs is to pinpoint them on a hard surface and then hit them with a sharp blow on the head with a hammer.

While this form of insecticide appeals to the hunting instinct in man, it is too time-consuming and gives the bugs too great an advantage. By the time you find and hammer down a bug he has already had 3,612,489 descendants, and is probably ready to die of old age anyway.

The trouble with chemical insecticides is this: A chemical that is one bug's poison in time becomes another bug's meat. They develop an immunity.

Martin pioneered in the distribution of DDT and, later, chlordane, which was up to 10 times as strong as DDT. But strains of bugs now have emerged tough enough to survive either DDT or chlordane.

Martin isn't a man to give up easily. His latest weapon is an insecticide called "Real-Kill," fortified with still another chemical, dieldrin, which he says is 28 times as deadly as DDT.

Martin is so convinced of the strength of his new mixture that he has announced a \$25,000 reward for the first bug that does not die after being sprayed with it.

The rules are quite simple. The contest will run for a three-month period starting in June when bugs are in their best physical and mental condition. Any bug can enter voluntarily or, if you have one that's bashful, you can enter him, against his will.

"There is no humbug involved," said Martin, who expects thousands of contestants from all walks of bug life in America. "If there is no winner—and I don't think there will be—the \$25,000 will be given to a national charity."

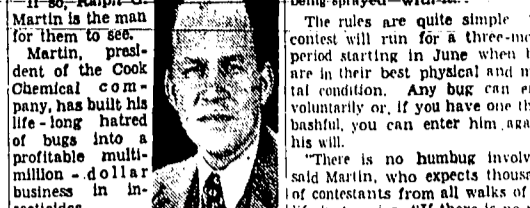
Anyone wanting to muscle in on this potential wealth, however, had better start putting his bug in training now, so he'll be in real shape by summer.

No lazy, fly-by-night insect stands a chance. Victory will take a hard, stubborn crawl. Martin took the precaution of testing his spray on 300 different kinds of bugs before announcing the contest, and none lasted a full round.

Bugs have names as strange, exciting and glamorous as boxers, con men and female movie stars.

Russia Won't Take Balloon Explanations

MOSCOW, Feb. 20 (AP)—Russia Saturday night brushed aside a U.S. explanation that balloons seized in Soviet territory were collecting weather data.

The Soviets offered to exhibit them in Washington, New York, London, Paris or any other city to prove their contention that the balloons did not carry meteorological equipment.

A diplomatic note delivered to U.S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen here renewed the Soviet protest against the flight of balloons in Soviet air space. The Soviet reply said in effect that the U.S. version was not true.

The Soviet note declared the American description of weather balloons did not correspond with studies of the equipment by Soviet experts.

It charged that the balloons "pursued a different aim."

The Russians refused to accept any of the explanations of the balloons in the U.S. note of Feb. 9, but added that it "acknowledges the statement of the U.S. government that it will take measures to stop further balloon flights over the Soviet Union."

The United States ordered an immediate grounding of the balloons,

Tanks Shipment Blasted by Demo

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 20 (AP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, D., Ore., last night blasted the plan to ship military tanks to Saudi Arabia as a move which would heighten Middle East tension.

Neuberger, speaking at an annual banquet of Americans for Democratic Action, said the proposed shipment of the 18 tanks "undermines America's moral position in the Middle East."

He said such a step "places the United States in the position of aiding the potential aggressor. Furthermore, it furnished the warlike Russians with the excuse they have been waiting for to intervene even more belligerently in the explosive Middle-Eastern situation."

Tiff Develops In Probes for Campaign Gift

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Jurisdictional problems today engulfed the senate's proposed investigation of improper attempts to influence legislation through campaign spending.

It appeared certain that a broad investigation will be conducted in the wake of controversy arising from a \$2,500 campaign gift offered to Sen. Francis Case, R., S. D., by an attorney interested in passage of the natural gas bill. But it was by no means certain who will conduct the inquiry.

The senate elections subcommittee which has voted to make a broad inquiry, was called into session to consider a budget for the investigation. Chairman Albert Gore, D., Tenn., said he also hoped to select a committee counsel today.

But Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland, Calif., in a week-end statement, questioned the authority of the Gore subcommittee to conduct the broad inquiry. Knowland said other committees have a stake in the subject matter of such an investigation. He said a new, bi-partisan special committee might be formed to do the job or an extension voted for the special committee currently studying the Case incident.

Chairman Walter F. George, D., Ga., called a meeting of the special committee but made it clear that he wants to close up shop. George said the group would inspect some documents and then decide whether any further hearings are required.

It wasn't fair to have the model make the sweater look so good. If the model had been a man of my appearance I never would have bought the fool thing! The use of models with my looks and build won't stop men from buying clothes—manufacturers need never fear that. Men have to keep on dressing because they can't go back to animal skins.

It's in the field of swim clothes that I believe manufacturers play their dirtiest tricks. The fellows who model those swimming trunks and lure us into buying them—should be arrested. Their stomachs are as flat as the Gobi desert, their legs are as strong as young saplings, muscles cavort in just the right places and there is always a girl or two in the ad looking at the model with admiring eyes. So what happens? Thousands of us average guys buy the trunks and head for the beach. We come closer to getting catcalls than the so-admiring glances.

The neck kept popping over my chin, leaving nothing showing except my big, round eyes and my big, round ears.

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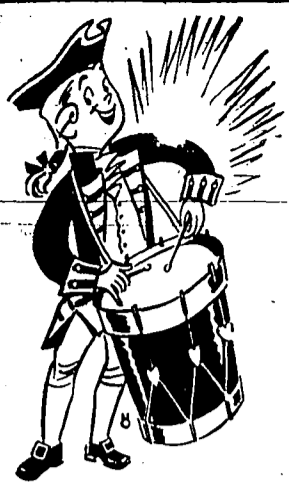

Racial Battle Is Pledged by Citizen Group

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Feb. 20 (AP)—A citizens council leader has said the segregationists will fight "as long as white blood flows pure" against agitation for racial segregation in the South.

This keynote was sounded by state Sen. Walter C. Givhan before an overflow crowd of 600 persons at a council organizational meeting reflecting opposition of townspeople to the admission of a first Negro student to the University of Alabama.

Blame Given
Givhan blamed agitation of "northerners and the Communist party" for rioting which preceded the exclusion of the Negro woman, Autherine Lucy, from further classes pending a court hearing.

"As long as southern blood flows pure in the South they are going to have a fight," he told the applauding crowd, but he said the fight must be waged "within the law."

Biggest ovations were given Leonard R. Wilson, a sophomore pre-law student who made one pro-segregation speech on a flagpole pedestal during the height of the campus riots.

The University of Alabama had no comment about student participation in the council here but one official said "this is a new development we weren't expecting."

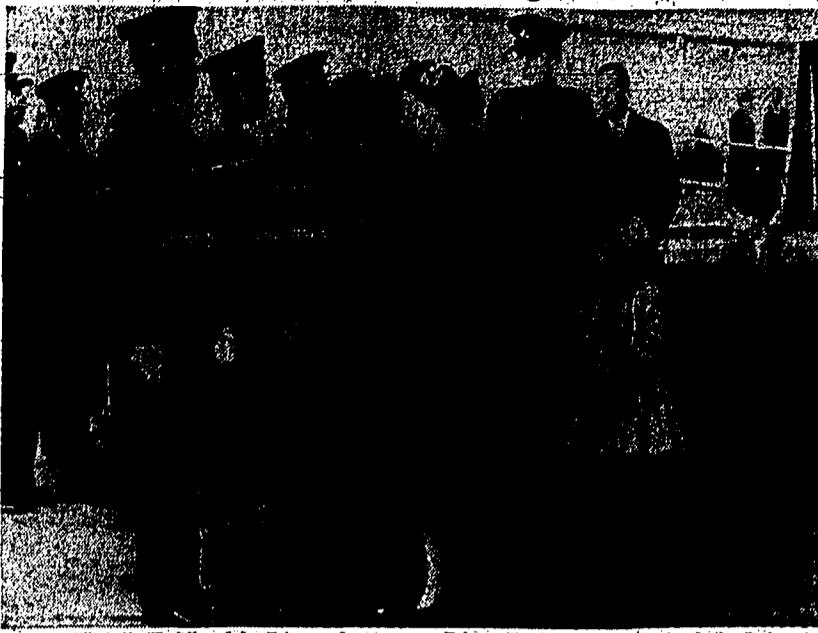
X-Ray Practice Is Discontinued

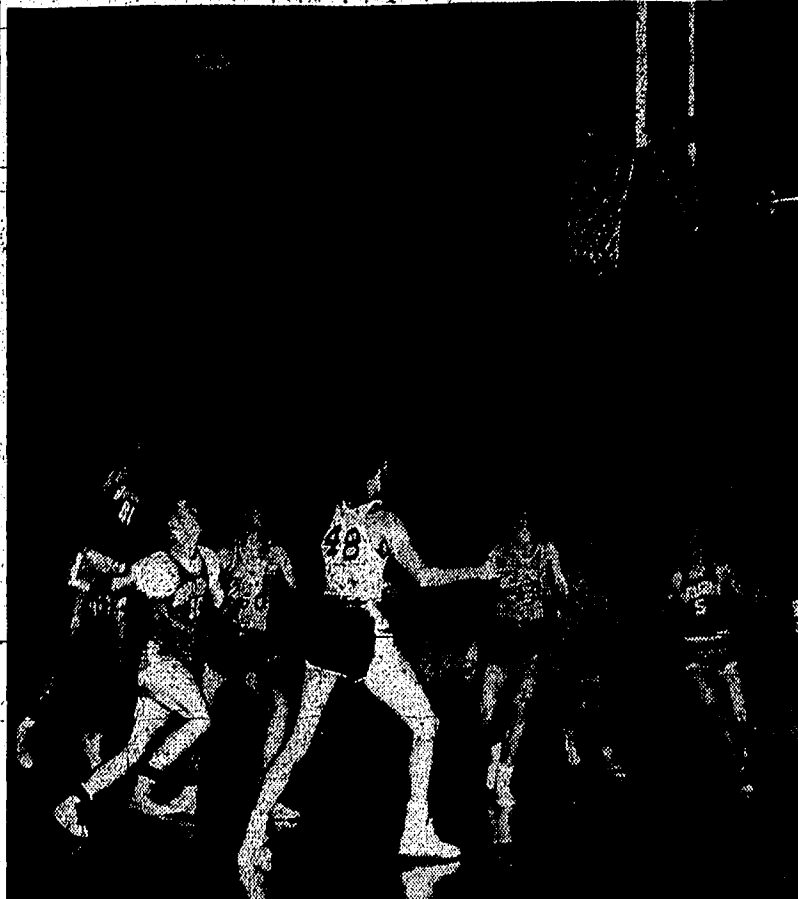

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Santee Preparing For Court Action In AAU Decision

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)— West Santee, America's most hope for the magic 4-minute mile, Monday drew plans for a court suit against the Amateur Athletic Union which has barred him from track for life.

The AAU took the drastic action at its executive committee meeting Sunday after hearing a report by an investigating committee on Santee's expenses. The committee found about \$1,500 which, it said, was "overage," meaning above the allotted expenses permitted.

"We plan to ask the court to enjoin the AAU from carrying out Wes' suspension," said his attorney, Charles P. Grimes of New York. "Our contention is the same that we have been making all along—that the executive committee of the AAU does not have the authority in the case, that it should be turned back to the Missouri Valley association."

If the AAU's action stands up, it means, of course, that Santee, whose 4:00.5 is the closest any American has come to the 4-minute mile, is out of the Olympics. He was the United States' main hope in the 1,500 meters against Australia's John Landy and several runners from behind the Iron Curtain.

"I'm extremely disappointed," he said bitterly. "I don't believe I received fair treatment. I'm convinced the AAU has violated its own constitution in suspending me. If there are any new charges concerning professionalism, I'll be happy to answer them before the proper authorities—the local registration committee of the Missouri Valley association."

Sober read his report, which took some five hours. On the basis of this, the committee suspended Santee by a 14-1 vote.

Lou Whitke, AAU president last year, was the only committee member who sided with the 23-year-old marine corps lieutenant.

"There were violations, all right," he said. "But he's only a young boy and I was thinking of him 20 years from now. They called me a sentimentalist. I thought the Missouri Valley should get the case."

Actually, the AAU said, through President Carl Hansen, there were seven instances in which Santee's expenses were more than permitted.

He enumerated three—the Modesto and Compton meets in which Santee received about \$700 more than allowed, the Chicago and Cleveland meets in which he was over by \$280 and the Philadelphia and Washington meets in which his expenses were \$150 more than permitted. The AAU allows \$12 a day plus transportation.

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University of Washington Football Probe Is Ordered

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 20 (AP)—A survey of the gnarled football situation at the University of Washington was ordered Saturday by the state's legislative council. The council decided against a full-scale investigation as being too costly—and because of the effects it might have on the athletes, their families and friends and the irreparable damage it might do to the future of university athletics. A full-scale investigation would have brought testimony under oath from persons touched by the turmoil that began last November with a revolt by Washington football players against Coach John Cherberg. As a result of the revolt, the coach has been fired and Athletic Director Harvey Cassill has resigned.

Sets Record



The council assigned the survey to its subcommittee on education and directed a study of these four points:

1. The relationship between the board of regents, the Associated Students of the University and the athletic department.
2. The administration of grants-in-aid and other financial assistance to athletes.
3. The manner of handling purchasing and letting of concessions by the ASUW and its general financial management and control.
4. Methods and procedures of other universities.

State Sen. William A. Gissberg, a former varsity basketball and baseball player at the university, will head the committee making the survey. He said it would be conducted in "quiet and judicial form," without "emotionalism."

Gissberg said the committee's findings would be reported to the 1957 Legislature but it had no intention of fastening responsibility for "mistakes" which had been made.

Carol Heiss Wins World's Skating Title

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 20 (AP)—Pretty 16-year-old Carol Heiss of Ozone Park, N. Y., dethroned Tenley Albright of Newton Center, Mass., Saturday night as world figure skating champion before a crowd of 7,000 in the Garmisch ice rink.

Runner-up in 1955 to Miss Albright, a 20-year-old Radcliffe college junior, the vivacious Carol Heiss became the second youngest girl to capture the championship. A quarter of a century ago Sonja Henie, then of Norway, won the title at the age of 15.

The victory was a narrow one for Miss Heiss, who finished second to Miss Albright in the recent Winter Olympic games at Cortina, Italy.

The 5-foot, 2-inch Carol, who weighs only 103 pounds, put on a terrific show in the finals, given over to the free skating. The tiny blond skated flawlessly, and her performance featured double axels, double flips and loops.

The two American girls, who have been rivals for several years, squared off in one of the closest competitions ever seen in the women's competition as a fairly brisk snow fell on the open air stadium.

The big crowd sensed the drama. For Miss Heiss has been criticized since the Olympics for refusing—at the insistence of her mother and coach—to congratulate and pose for pictures with Tenley at the Cortina finals.

O'Brien Shatters Shotput Record

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—Parry O'Brien shattered every world shotput record—indoors and outdoors—Saturday night when he got off a tremendous heave of 61 feet, 5 1/2 inches in the national AAU championships.

O'Brien, representing the U. S. air force, has been trying for years to make a 60-foot putt indoors and last week came close with 59.9. His outdoor mark is 60-10 and that is regarded as fantastic.

Clash Is Looming In NCAA, NAIA

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—There's a David and Goliath battle shaping up in sports today and the little fellow is so hopping mad that this time he probably won't even need a slingshot.

Ferris Fain, Mellow on New Post, Sees Future for Tigers' Kaline

OAKLAND, Calif., Feb. 20 (AP)—Following Ferris Fain, who twice won the American league batting championship, predicted great things today for Detroit's Al Kaline "because the kid isn't afraid to ask for help."

Fain added that Kaline's potential isn't confined to the plate. "He makes plays unconsciously in the field that some men take 10 or 12 years to learn," the dark-eyed first baseman asserted. "On top of it all, Kaline still is filling out. He hasn't reached full strength yet and has a tremendous future."

There are plenty of others around who think they have it all figured out and won't take advice," Fain went on while discussing the 21-year-old sensation who became the youngest player in history to win the American league batting crown last year. "Kaline isn't like that. When I was following him in the order last year we often would get together in the circle and he'd ask whether he should go after a hit or just try and move a runner along."

"I wasn't exactly a sensation at Detroit or Cleveland," Fain said candidly. "But I think I did pretty well for an old man with a bum knee. My baseball age," he added with a grin, "is 34."

Fain, whose nine years in the majors were spiced up with some lively rhabdus off the diamond as well as on it, now is a businessman as well as a coach who modestly hopes to "cut the mustard in the outfield" at Sacramento.

Iceing on the cake was added when Dawn Fraser, a comely 18-year-old south Australian, finished second in 5:07.9, in her first attempt at this distance in championship competition.

Ruth Legend Gets Denial by Ex-Chicago Moundsman

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Feb. 20 (AP)—The "bat pointing" legend of Babe Ruth's "bat pointing" during the 1932 world series was given Saturday by a man who is said to have known him.

He didn't point any bat," declared gray-haired Charley Root, who he'd have knocked him out."

Root was in a perfect spot to see Babe Ruth's "bat pointing" during the 1932 world series. He was in the Chicago Cubs on Oct. 1 day when Ruth belted one of his offerings into the bleachers at Wrigley field. The smash has been down in baseball annals as one of the classic homers of all time. You know the legend: The New York Yankees came into Chicago for the third game of the series after winning the first two. Ruth had failed to hit a homer in New York, and Chicago fans were on him.

Root was the Cubs' starter. The first two Yankee hitters got on in the first inning, bringing Ruth to bat. The Babe promptly slammed a homer for a 3-0 lead.

The Cubs had tied it up at 4-4 with Ruth falling to hit in his second trip to the plate, after four innings and Root still was on the mound. The Cub bench and taunting fans renewed their heckling when Ruth came up in the fifth.

"This is how the 'Encyclopedia of Sports' describes what happened then: 'The Babe looked around the stands, then, with his bat, pointed to the fence in center field—a gesture that he would drive the ball over that spot. And that is exactly what he did.'"

"That's not the way it went, though," says Root.

"I got two strikes on him," he recounts, "and each time he turned to our bench and held up first one, then two fingers. He knocked the third pitch over the fence."

"But he didn't point any bat. If he had, I'd have knocked him down."
