TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—As a result of his amazing recovery of health, only Dwight D. Eisenhower's personal desires stand between him and a second term as President of the United States. That is the unanimous opinion of family and political friends closest to him. Besides reporting on the merely physical aspects of Ike's condition, Dr. Paul Dudley White disposed of the more basic and serious objection to almost five more years of presidential activity. These concerned the mental and physical "stress and strain" which the responsibilities, tensions and pressures impose upon the man responsible for the nation's immediate fortunes and future destiny in these troublous days.

Whenever Ike, as a layman, has discussed this intangible problem, he has asked himself and his friends whether (1) he could endure this battering without physical impairment, and (2) whether his physical condition would enable him to make right and responsible decisions on grave world and domestic issues. It was, in short, a clash between desire and duty.

HEART SPECIALIST'S VERDICT—Dr. White's answer was an unqualified "Yes." The heart specialist's comment on this specific and all-important question deserves repetition, not only as it affects Ike, but also less distinguished Americans. Discussing the "fundamental causes of arteriosclerosis of the coronary arteries themselves," he said:

"Some think that too much rich food is responsible, some think lack of exercise is responsible, some think that stress and strain are responsible. But some of us, and I personally, do not think that stress and strain are responsible, but it can be an aggravating factor, and that must be weighed in making any statement as I have made, and we have had to weigh the stress and strain of the job, which are, of course, considerable."

Here, Dr. White went to the core of the dilemma.

THE TEMPERAMENT HELPS—Since Ike does not eat "too rich food," and can easily regulate his exercise in accord with medical requirements and prescriptions, the "stress and strain" factor becomes determining save for Ike's own personal inclinations, and Dr. White eliminates that as an objection to a second term.

Moreover, contrary to public opinion, the presidency is not a "man-killin' job" for a man of Ike's temperament, philosophy and general metabolism. He is utterly unlike Woodrow Wilson, Warren G. Harding and Franklin D. Roosevelt, whose deaths led to this belief, although even their records belie the theory.

WOODROW WILSON'S CASE—Wilson was an intense introvert, whose mind lived more strenuously and violently than his body. He was a visionary and dreamer, a man far ahead of his times, who could not reconcile his lofty ideals with political practicalities and limitations. His was a fierce and throbbing conflict within himself and with an avry world. And he lived for about three years after leaving the White House.

Harding was an indulgent and intemperate individual. He was not the stuff of which Presidents should be made or tried. Mourning his loss of freedom for his convivial cronies, he told the late James W. Wadsworth, Jr., only three months after his inauguration, that "The White House is a prison." His belated discovery of his pals' betrayal of him contributed to his death.

FDR'S LONG SURVIVAL—In view of his physical handicaps, it was a miracle that FDR survived as long as he did. And yet, he served for more than 12 years during the worst domestic and foreign crises in the nation's history.

These are the pros and cons which Ike will weigh before reaching a final decision. In view of the medical clearance on "stress and strain," and the grave effect which a change of administration would have at home and abroad, it is believed that Ike will subordinate desire to duty.

VIEWS OF OTHERS

NEWS ABOUT HOSPITALS

There was both good and bad news in the paper this week relative to hospital care for people in the Salt Lake area.

The good news was announcement of a million dollar addition to St. Mark's hospital which assures expansion of facilities in all three of Salt Lake City's private hospitals. While today's hospital bed shortage will remain serious pending these expansions, some relief is promised.

The Latter-day Saints hospital is already well along on a two million dollar expansion and Holy Cross hospital announced a two million dollar addition project a short time ago. When all three projects are finished something like 275 additional beds will be available, with related additional operating, emergency, X-ray and other facilities.

This will mean more than a one-third increase in private hospital bed capacity, bringing LDS total to nearly 500 beds (making it one of the West's largest private hospitals), St. Mark's to nearly 300 and Holy Cross to approximately 265.

Another valuable aspect of this building program is that at LDS and Holy Cross it includes provision of special units for short term psychiatric treatment, which will make such treatment available at all Salt Lake City hospitals, as well as at the two Ogden institutions.

So much for the good news about hospitals. The bad is the report from the president of the American Hospital Association that hospital costs will continue to rise at the alarming rate of about five per cent a year—and that the increased cost of hospitalization can no longer be offset by decreased length of stay, as has been true in the last decade or two.—Salt Lake Tribune.

ALASKA READIES ITS HOUSE

Alaskans have worked and waited a long time for the hope of statehood. At the turn of the century they were seeking more self-government, and when the territory of Alaska was incorporated in 1912 they felt eventual admission to the union was promised. In session after session of recent United States congresses they have seen hopes raised, then disappointed. Usually in the past new states have waited until congress passed an enabling act before they wrote a state constitution. But in 1950 the residents of Hawaii held a constitutional convention and produced a basic charter in anticipation of statehood—which also has yet to come. And last year Alaskans decided it might be a good idea to formulate a constitution so congress might see how they would govern themselves.

Their constitutional convention—of 55 members, like the assembly which wrote the federal constitution—now has finished its task, and the product sounds like a creditable framework of government. It must now be seen whether this will have additional weight with congress.

Echoing a keynote sounded at the opening of the convention by former Governor Ernest Gruening, a closing resolution protests against "continuation of colonial rule among a people who are capable of governing themselves." The serious deliberations of the convention are a strong argument in their behalf.—Christian Science Monitor.

PUTTING IT BLUNTLY

"I cannot understand why anybody should enter a country except to pump out its wealth and resources." Nikita Khrushchev said that. He was talking a few days ago to Harold Wilson, member of the British parliament, a visitor to Moscow. Khrushchev had spoken sharply to Wilson about the sins of British colonialism; he said the British had always "pumped out" Wilson retorted that Britain was "pumped in" vastly more to colonial economies since the war than it has taken out. That drew from the Soviet leader the above surprised, candid and significant comment.

So let Egypt and all the Arab countries take notice. Let India be advised, and Afghanistan and all the long list of countries into which the Soviets are seeking entrance by means of military aid, promises of loans, and other devices. For Khrushchev gave one and all the bluff of Communist policy, pump a little in, then after you've got in pump out, as long as there's anything left to pump.

Nice, isn't it, to have it spelled out so clearly and bluntly. Now nobody can say that Nikky didn't tell them.—Denver Post.

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Voting Age of 18 Is Backed By Kefauver

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 21 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver, winding up a four-day campaign tour in his bid for the Democratic nomination for president in Minnesota's March 21 primary, said today it is time to lower the voting age to 18 "if only to keep the nation on an even electoral keel."

The Tennessee Democrat, who is up against Adlai Stevenson on the Democratic ticket in this state primary, said more than 6,300,000 voters would be added to the national rolls by lowering the age requirement to 18.

"The life expectancy in our country is going up and up," Kefauver said at a University of Minnesota convocation today. "Consequently, the decisions we make at the polls are coming to reflect a disproportionate weight of judgment of the aged."

Balance Sought

He called for a balance of viewpoints at the polls with "the vigor and enthusiasm of youth inter-laced with the wisdom of age."

He said he believes the new young voters would be "voting" voters rather than merely eligible voters and that lowering the age requirement to 18 would be moving "a long way toward that new concept of politics than mere voting."

Jibing at the Republican administration, Kefauver charged that "word merchants have infested Washington since 1952" and "reduced this great nation to the level of government-by-motto."

Cites Two Words

"We've had 'massive-this' and 'militant-that' yet the glib sloganeers have signally failed to come up with two words which would supply a crying need in our nation and in the world today," he said.

The Tennessee lawmaker said the two words are "responsibility" and "imagination."

"If we must deal in slogans, then I suspect that what we need is a young look—a reappraisal of all our problems from the fresh, vigorous, optimistic, determined viewpoint of a youthful nation," he told the students.

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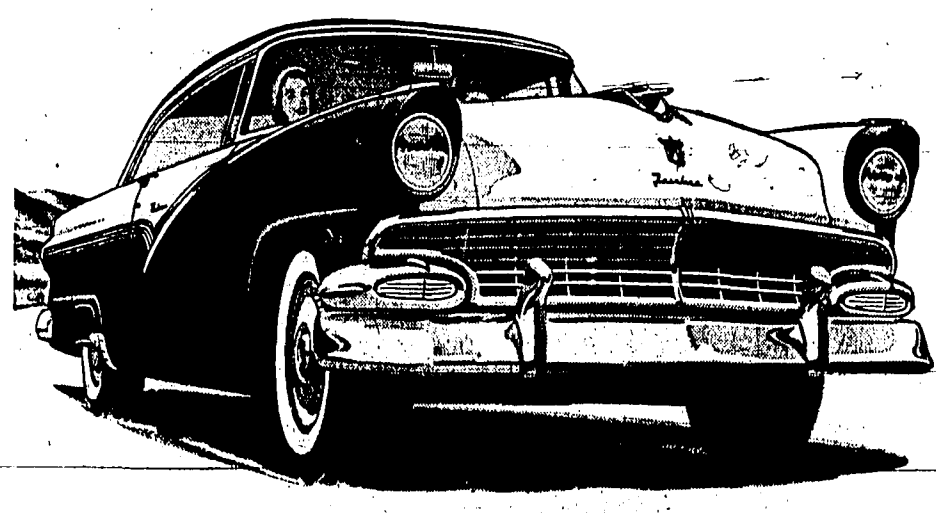

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New Violence Flames Again At Plant Site

NEW YORK, Feb. 21 (AP)—Violence flared again today at the strike-bound Republic Aviation corporation plant here when some 400 non-strikers marched into strong picket lines in an attempt to enter the main gate.

At least three men were hospitalized with injuries suffered in today's violence. One woman suffered injuries and was treated at the scene. Six more strikers were arrested, bringing the number of arrests well above 60 since the strike began three days ago.

Police said the pickets faced non-strikers today with their hands in their pockets, apparently in an attempt to improve police charges that they had attacked patrolmen and non-union workers with their fists in earlier fighting.

Cruel Hour

The new violence occurred just after 7 a. m. today, the crucial hour when the day shift normally reports for work at the airplane manufacturing plant.

Police said several persons were knocked to the ground in the clash which broke out today.

Approximately 400 non-strikers were reported to have broken through the picket lines into the main gate. Some of them gained entrance by joining some 250 pickets walking in tight formation. When the circling pickets reached a point next to the gate the non-strikers broke from it and ran through the entrance.

Were Afoot

Most of the non-strikers who broke into the plant today were on foot. Some of them had attempted to crash through the picket line earlier in the day but were persuaded to turn around and leave by strikers who surrounded their cars.

John J. Ryan, vice president in charge of industrial relations, said all employees who returned to work would receive a 5-cent-a-hour wage increase offered earlier by the company in negotiations with the striking union.

The union, representing some 1,200 employees at the four plants, asked first for a 38-cent-an-hour package increase. It later reduced its demands to a 19-cent package boost.

Cross Is Burned In Pastor's Yard

SYLACAUGA, Ala., Feb. 21 (AP)—A prominent white Methodist minister said today he thought a cross-burning on his lawn was a protest against a recent interracial church meeting and promised to burn one of his own next Sunday as "a symbol of love, good will and brotherhood."

The Rev. Dr. Dan Whitsett said he believed the cross was burned at his home last night because of a Feb. 12 meeting at the First Methodist church in which Negroes and whites discussed race relations.

He has been the target of intimidating telephone calls since the meeting, he said.

Sacred 'Cows' Give Problem To Authorities

NEW DELHI, India, Feb. 21 (AP)—A herd of more than 1,000 "sacred" cows-on-the-loose in the lush farmlands, some 150 miles north of here today posed a serious problem for the government.

Some 17,000 peasants, long torn between religious acceptance of the "holy" beasts and exasperation at their marauding, have threatened a "no rent" strike unless the government finds some way to shoo off the sacred menace.

Cow-worshipping peasants from 30 villages in the Patiala district have formed a 21-member "action committee" as the first step toward solving the problem.

The committee has called on officials to act promptly or landholders would refuse to pay rent.

Until recently, the peasants stood by unhappily because of the Hindu belief in their sacredness. But religious restraints have been cast aside now because of the mounting damage to the once-profitable farmlands.

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Move to Oust Nixon Shows New Strength

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—The movement to oust Vice President Richard M. Nixon off the 1956 Republican ticket has won some powerful support close to President Eisenhower.

The arguments against Nixon include: He is perhaps the most controversial figure in American national politics, he is too young—43. The vice presidency will be of unusual importance if Mr. Eisenhower seeks and gets a second term. Democratic condemnation of his campaign tactics have hurt his position with the public. Democrats are ready to center their campaign attack on any man "who stands a heart-beat from the presidency."

The foregoing are basic in the stop-Nixon effort. They add up to the belief, or fear, of some influential persons that Nixon would cost the national ticket votes if he were on it again this year.

There is no evidence so far that Mr. Eisenhower is impressed by the arguments for dropping Nixon in 1956. On the contrary, Mr. Eisenhower's public words and acts have been enthusiastically favorable to the vice president.

The President fielded Democratic complaints against Nixon's 1954 campaign tactics with a note of congratulation on his speeches and campaign line. That endorsement covered Nixon's discussion of communist infiltration of government during the Roosevelt and Truman administrations.

Mr. Eisenhower also is on record that an individual nominated for President should refuse the nomination if he were not satisfied with the party's choice for second place. There has been a boom of late in confidence that Mr. Eisenhower shortly would announce his availability for renomination.

That is what fired up the effort to displace Nixon. On the basis of information generally available, it will take a tremendous effort to supplant Nixon with another if the President runs again. There is the sturdy evidence that Mr. Eisenhower likes his young friend and approves of his conduct as vice president and as a party campaigner. That approval abundantly embraces what Nixon may have said in the 1954 campaign about the Democratic party leadership and the communist infiltration of government.

Class Teaches About Religion Instead of Emphasizing Creeds

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 21 (AP)—Seventh graders in the public schools here are learning that Alexander-Hamilton was an Episcopalian, that John Adams was a Congregationalist and that even "crusty old Andrew Jackson knew how to pray."

"Our program here is quite unique," says Dr. Herman L. Shibley, Indianapolis superintendent of schools. "We aren't teaching religion. We're teaching about religion."

Indianapolis moved into this controversial area after Parent-Teacher associations and other civic groups issued a call for more emphasis on "moral and spiritual values" in public schools.

Shibley called in about 40 professional and lay church leaders and asked them to work out an approach that would be satisfactory to all. A rabbi laid down a concept of God that would be applicable to all

faiths, and Protestant ministers and a Catholic monsignor concurred.

Teachers in the seventh and eighth grades have been supplied with 23-page guides listing specific events and personalities in history that can be used to illustrate the role religion has played and is playing.

Pupils are taught the dates that the first settlers representing each of the major religious sects landed in America. They learn that Thomas Jefferson's opposition to slavery was based on his religious beliefs, that George Washington held the view that national morality could not be maintained without religious principles.

They also learn that references to God abound in inscriptions on public buildings. There are lines from the Old Testament on the capital and the Library of Congress in Washington, for instance, and the

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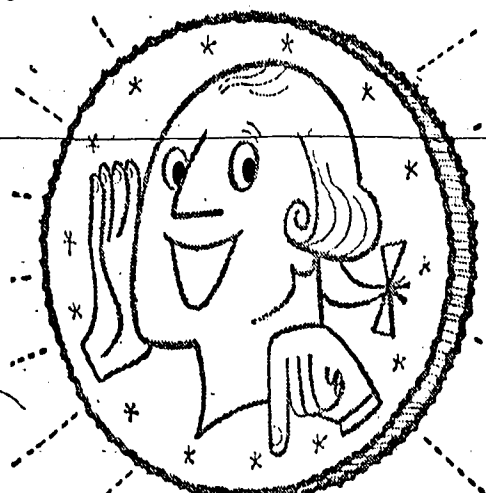
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
