The United Press was informed that he qualified his statement only to this extent: He would not commit himself publicly until after making a personal test of his physical powers during a vigorous shooting and golfing vacation at Thomasville, Ga.

The Detroit News reported today in a Washington dispatch by Martin S. Hayden that Sherman Adams and Leonard W. Hall had informed top Republicans that Mr. Eisenhower would run. There "were no ifs or buts or buts about it," Hayden wrote. Adams is Mr. Eisenhower's chief White House assistant. Hall is chairman of the Republican national committee. Hall has insisted on his own for many weeks that Mr. Eisenhower would be a second-term candidate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (U.P.)—Doctors renewed their attack today on the disability payment provision of the house-passed social security bill in testimony before the senate finance committee but nurses supported the measure. The physicians who appeared were Dr. J. P. Rousseau, Winston-Salem, N. C., Dr. R. O. Porter, Logan, Utah, and Dr. Leon Higdon, Paducah, Ky. Each represented his state's medical society.

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West Coast Storm Stops As Seven Die

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22 (U.P.)—A disastrous storm which gave the west coast its second worst beating of the winter tapered off today as rail lines resumed service and some blocked highways reopened. At least seven persons were killed in a three-day combination of howling winds, heavy rain and drifting snow which caused numerous flash floods in Washington, Oregon and California.

Twelve Negro Arrests Listed In Racial Row

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 22 (U.P.)—Twelve Negroes, including seven ministers, were arrested today as deputies began rounding 115 persons indicted on charges of illegally boycotting city buses in a desegregation dispute. Among them were the Rev. S. S. Seay who identified himself as the secretary of the Home Missions board of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion church, and E. D. Dixon, former state president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Nixon and Seay surrendered voluntarily.

Contribution for Ike Fund Listed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (U.P.)—Senate investigators were reported today to have found indications that oil man Howard B. Keck made his biggest political contribution in years to the National Citizens for Eisenhower committee. In New York, the citizen group's national headquarters said its list of contributions of \$100 or more, dating back to August, 1952, did not show any contribution in Keck's name.

Dulles Due

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (U.P.)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles returns from a Caribbean vacation today to face a congressional investigation of the administration's controversial mid-east policy. Dulles, arriving by plane sometime in the afternoon, was expected to seek an early briefing from his aides on the furor over a shipment of 18 U.S. tanks to Saudi Arabia—a dispute which broke out while he was away from Washington.

Atom Energy Leader Avers Reds Leading

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Feb. 22 (U.P.)—The chairman of the joint congressional committee on atomic energy warned today that Russia "may be and probably is" ahead of the U.S. in the race toward a nuclear ballistic missile. Sen. Clifton P. Anderson, D. N. M., urged "fast action" on the part of the U.S. and called for an American "cease" to spark an intense research speed-up to match the Soviets' effort.

Forecast Sees "Spring" End

Mild weather brought a hint of spring to the Intermountain area today but forecasters said showers of rain or snow could be expected in some sections by nightfall. Colder weather was predicted for tomorrow with maximum readings expected to be 5 to 10 degrees lower than today. There was a wide range in minimum temperatures Wednesday. Twin Falls and Boise listed lows of 42 degrees while Idaho Falls was 26 degrees colder, at 16.

Friend of Ike Doesn't Know Chief's Future

THOMASVILLE, Ga., Feb. 22 (AP)—Political cards so close to his vest that one of his best friends, Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey, has "no idea" whether the chief executive will run again.

Humphrey made this abundantly clear as he left last night for Washington and New York. He will speak before the Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York.

The treasury secretary, who is Mr. Eisenhower's host in south Georgia, has been widely credited as having the inside track to the President's second term intentions.

Humphrey, however, punctured more than a few political balloons last night as he boarded the presidential plane, Columbus III, for his flight to Washington.

"I have no idea at all if President Eisenhower will run for reelection," he said. Furthermore, he said, and Mr. Eisenhower had not discussed the second term question since the President came south a week ago for a holiday of golf and quail hunting.

Humphrey and the President flew south together a week ago and have spent the interval in close companionship, hunting quail during the day and playing bridge at night.

Humphrey also disclaimed any knowledge of when the President would announce his intentions.

Movie Is Planned On Miss Truman

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 20 (AP)—Margaret Truman's serialized life story running currently in a magazine may be the basis for a motion picture to be the former President's daughter playing herself in the film.

M-G-M and 20th Century Fox spokesmen said they were reading advance copies of the story, "Souvenir." One studio spokesman said Miss Truman may be asked to test for the lead in the picture if a decision is made to produce the movie.

"But it would be highly premature to say we will ask Mr. Truman to play the piano," the spokesman said.

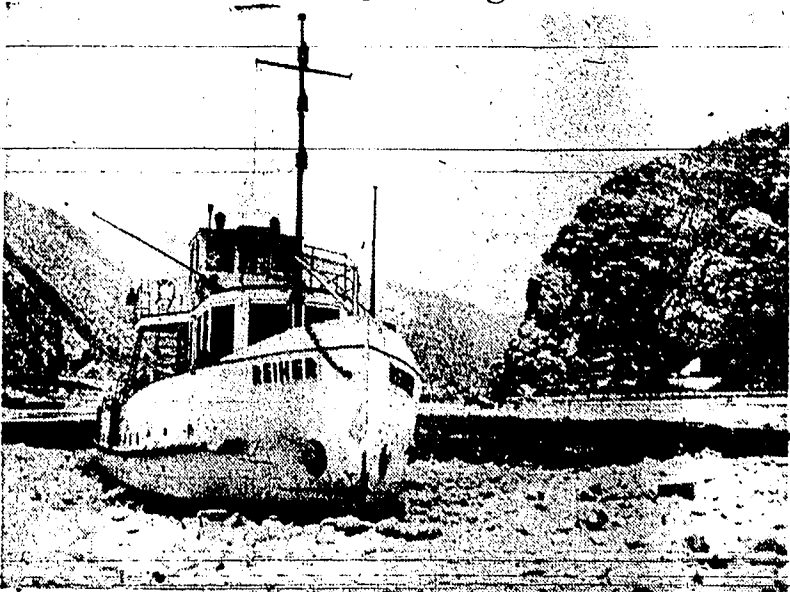
Charges Against U. S. Are Denied

MUNICH, Germany, Feb. 22 (AP)—The Free Europe committee today denied Czechoslovakian government charges that American propaganda balloons caused a Czech air crash Jan. 18 in which 22 people died.

The communists have frequently claimed that the committee's leaflet-carrying balloons are a menace to air travel.

The privately supported American group said launching records show that no balloons were sent to Czechoslovakia on either the day before or the day of the crash.

Suggestions Offered Professor Why Horses Chew Wood Posts

DAVIS, Calif., Feb. 22 (AP)—Prof. professor just shook his head and said: "I don't think there's one that I haven't already tried."

He hasn't tried sawing between teeth. He won't, either, because he is sure that would make a horse's mouth so sore he couldn't even chew oats.

A Sacramento man wrote that his father used to saw between a horse's teeth with a fine saw and "that used to stop them." A similar suggestion came from Windsor, Ontario.

The advice from Devon was that horses chew wood because "to their delight it tastes salty, so they go on chewing in the hopes that they will find some more salt."

"No doubt the acid in redwood is what the horse is after to kill worms," wrote a man from Santa Paula, Calif.

"A certain amount of alfalfa wood shavings" added to a horse's food will stop chewing, the professor was told from Viroqua, Wis.

The Portland Oregonian editorialized that "horses have too much leisure since machines have taken over much of their burden" and observed: "A lot of people spend their increased leisure with an equal lack of purpose."

LONDON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Pretty 24-year-old Kathleen Ruddy talked to a man alone for the first time in her life last night. She also had her first date and her first glass of champagne.

Kathleen had been a ward of the government since she was 3 years old. Under terms of a legal order, she was even forbidden to speak to a "male person" alone.

But Britain's Chief Justice Lord Goddard yesterday struck off the legal bonds and Kathleen lost little time in enjoying her new-found "freedom."

Last night she walked arm-in-arm with Joseph Beckwith, 22, a friend of her step-brother. Later, they toasted her release over a glass of champagne. And they talked.

Lord Goddard's order climaxed a long fight for Kathleen's freedom, waged with the assistance of the national council for civil liberties.

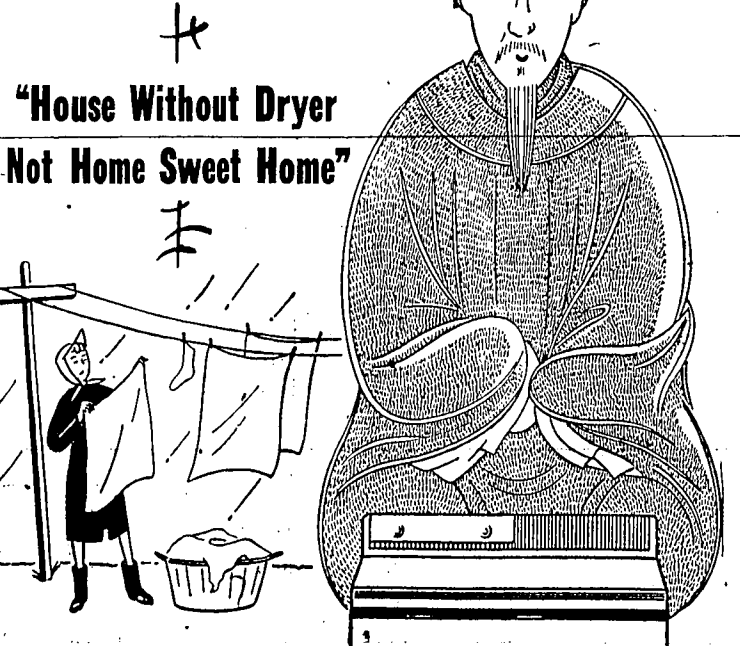

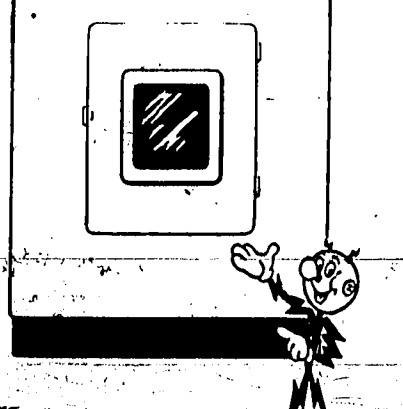

"Mighty Ear" Aids Science In Far Study

MANCHESTER, England, Feb. 22 (AP)—The "mighty ear" of Jodrell Bank will join the "great eye" of Mt. Palomar this year to give astronomers a new understanding of the universe.

The "mighty ear" is the biggest radio telescope in the world, as Mt. Palomar is the biggest optical telescope. In a few months the huge bowl of steel girders, 250 feet across and rotating on steel pillars 180 feet above the ground, will begin to listen to the secrets of outer space.

The above is quoted from Prof. Bernard Lovell of Manchester University, one of Britain's leading radio astronomers and the man who initiated the £500,000 sterling £14 million dollar Jodrell Bank project.

Dr. Lovell is excited about his science and he makes it sound exciting. When he talks about picking up and recording the noise of two nebulae crashing in unimaginable magnitude it sounds like an adventure of awe and wonder—which is what it is.

This collision took place at the very limit of the universe we can see with the optical telescope—100-million light years. A light year is the distance light travels in a year at 186,000 miles a second.

Mt. Palomar cooperated, as it has frequently, and pinpointed the collision in the constellation of Cygnus.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—One of the nation's great tributes to George Washington finally came into its own today. The Smithsonian Institution officially opened a new, fully-decorated and properly-lighted room for Horatio Greenough's statue of the first President.

The opening ended the troubled saga of the 30,000-pound statue depicting Washington in classical Roman garb. The story actually began in 1831 when fire wrecked the state house at Raleigh, N. C. amid the ruins lay the blackened pieces of a sizable marble statue of Washington garbed in Roman armor.

Commission Given
The patriots considered loss of the statue a national tragedy. The next year congress commissioned Greenough, the greatest American sculptor of the moment, to sculpt a new one. Only congress wanted a bigger one—much bigger. Greenough went to Italy with \$5,000 of the treasury's money in his pocket. Soon congress sent him another \$5,000, then another, then another. Eight years went by. Finally word came out of Italy that the great statue was completed.

Money Sent
Congress sent Greenough \$10,000 more for transportation expenses. A warship was dispatched. A great celebration was planned. The statue would be placed in the rotunda of the capitol.

The nation waited in fervid anticipation. Few knew what the statue would be like. But they were certain it would be a marvel to behold. It was Greenough, much taken with classical art, carved an heroic marble figure of Washington seated in a great chair. Washington held a sword in one hand and waved the other hand aloft as if he were greeting friendly Indians. Even seated, he towered 11 feet into the air.

Half Naked
And he was naked from the waist up. The rest of him was clad in a toga. His huge feet were shod in Roman sandals. Then came the unweaving. Bands played. Flugs fluttered. Congressmen craned. The cover was stripped away—There was a gasp from the crowd. Several women fainted. The rotunda emptied quickly.

The criticism continued for months. Before the end of 1842, the statue was gone. Congressmen had it stuck out on the lawn. They had it covered with a shed "to protect it."

Taken to Asps
The statue was exposed to the open air and crayed comments until 1908. Then congress voted "to beautify the grounds." So the statue was "stuck in a dark aspe at the Smithsonian Institution (after a wall was removed to get it in, naturally).

In 1953, Congress voted funds for renovation work at the Smithsonian. The Smithsonian used some of this money last week to paint the spe, take the boards off the windows, and install spotlights around the statue. "That statue is significant and of consequence," said Thomas M. Evans, director of the national collection of fine arts. "Those people shouldn't have laughed just because Washington didn't have much on."

Fire Bares Hidden Fortune

Guides Given In Search to Choose Mate

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—Science has provided a handy guide to help you determine why you married—the woman (or man) you did marry—in case you've ever wondered. If you're not married, the guide can give you hints to the kind of woman (or man) you'll marry eventually.

According to the studies of three psychologists, certain personality traits can be grouped together as "assertive" and another set fall under the general head of "receptive." The psychological tendency is for "assertives" to marry "receptives" and vice versa.

An "assertive" personality has these traits: (1) "To work diligently to create something and/or to emulate others"; (2) "To influence and control the behavior of others"; (3) "To fight, injure, or kill others."

The "receptive" personality is marked by these traits: (1) "To accept or invite blame, criticism, or punishment"; (2) "To admire and praise others"; (3) "Fear, conscious or unconscious, of harm or misfortune arising from the hostility of others and/or social reaction to one's own behavior."

The psychologists are Robert F. Winch of Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., and Thomas and Virginia Ktanes, Tulane University, New Orleans. They have been engaged for some years in studying scientifically the psychic things which attract the sexes to one another and which the sexes are contented to call "love."

"Mate-selection," they reported previously, usually is based on "the greatest promise of providing him or her with maximum need—gratification"; and this "great promise" is provided by "complementary" rather than "similar" personality traits.

In their newest report to a technical journal of the American Psychological Association, they went into the question of what personality traits complement other personality traits. In short, assertives "need" receptives and receptives "need" assertives. The "need" may be partly conscious or altogether unconscious.

Katsuo Furuta said she was seeking only publicity and not suicide when she stripped before startled pedestrians and jumped into the moat Saturday despite the bone-chilling 48 degree temperature.

She succeeded, too. The Japanese newspaper Mainichi printed several photographs of her nude swim. Others carried stories.

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White Rhino Ballet Slated For Nuptials

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—Salvador Dalí said today he plans to costume an entire ballet in white rhinoceros horns as a "gorgeous wedding of the future" heralding the wedding of Prince Kelly and Princess Rainier.

The ballet is to be created for the performance at the Monte Carlo Casino at the gala week before the April 18 wedding. Its backers are the idea came from Rainier's father, Prince Antoine.

The rhinoceros horn motif, however, came solely from the surrealist artist who once learned to the artist's watch face. Dalí now feels that "rhinocerosism will catch the rest of our time."

Elks Symbol

"The horn of the white rhinoceros is the successor to the horn of the unicorn and is—like its ancestor in the middle ages—the symbol of purity," the mustachioed Dalí said. "It could be a better symbol for such a noble occasion as this wedding."

The dancer will be clad in a costume having the form of the horn of the white rhinoceros. It will be a gorgeous parade of chaste.

The Bronx zoo said Dalí was off the case if he thought the unicorn was the ancestor of the white rhino.

Data Given

"The unicorn was a purely imaginary creature and therefore could have any offspring," a zoo spokesman said. "The white rhinoceros is a prosaic, living animal, though rare. It is found wild in Africa and in zoos in Europe and Asia."

Dalí was first troubled by such biological considerations. "Our century has been called at times the age of communism, the age of capitalism, the age of anxiety and the age of jazz," he said. "But if you look beneath the surface you realize that this is the age of the white rhinoceros."

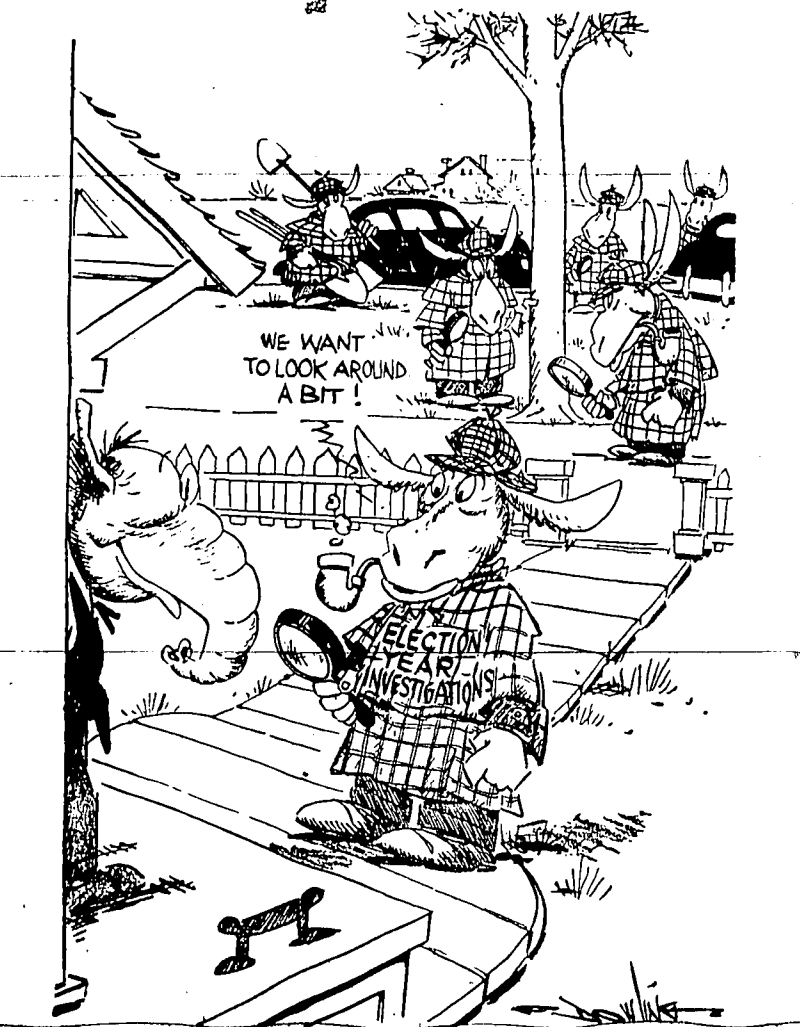

But, before departing by airplane for Birmingham, Ala., the Tennessee senator added the footnote: "I'm in no position to predict victory, even though I feel I have gained strength."

Debates Schedule

Kefauver said he would like to visit Minnesota once again before the primary. However, prospects of doing so are dim because of upcoming debate on the senate farm bill.

Kefauver spent three days in southern Minnesota looking for farm votes and spent yesterday in the twin cities wooing labor.

"The response in southern Minnesota was mighty good," he said. About the twin cities, he said, he wasn't sure.

No Nods Given

None of the labor organizations in this area have given their official nod to either candidate, but several labor "brass" are in the Stevenson camp.

Kefauver did his best to see as many laborers and union officials as possible yesterday. He pumped hands of workers at three industrial plants and talked to the central labor union here last night.

He told the union meeting that the Republicans "fear the American worker at the ballot box" and charged that the "Republicans are trying to besmirch unions and set labor apart from other voters."

Honor Granted For Five Firms

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—The Edison Electric Institute yesterday named five electric utility companies serving various sections of the nation as eligible for final competition for its annual Charles A. Coffin award.

The award, established 34 years ago, is given "for distinguished contribution to the development of electric light and power" and is regarded by the institute as the highest honor in the industry.

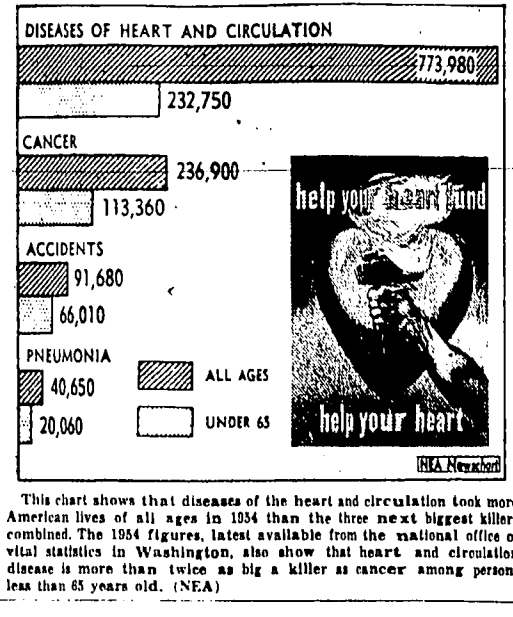

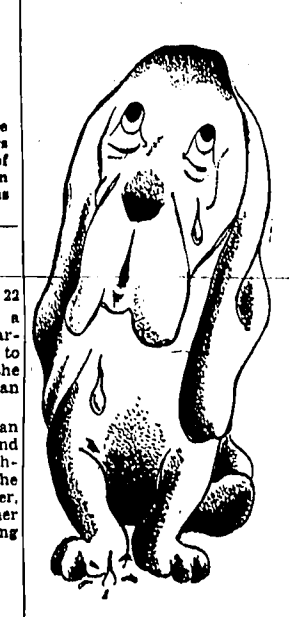

Work Begins for Atom Submarine

VALLEJO, Calif., Feb. 22 (AP)—A giant crane lowered a 40-ton steel cylinder onto a way at Mare Island naval shipyard yesterday, marking the start of construction on the first atomic-powered submarine to be built on the Pacific coast.

The submarine, named the "Sargo," will cost nearly 20 million dollars and will require two and a half years to complete.
