House Authorizes Second Largest Reclamation Job In OK for River's Project

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—The house yesterday voted to authorize the 760-million-dollar upper Colorado river project, a five-state undertaking that would be the nation's second-largest reclamation development. The 256-136 roll-call vote turned back determined opposition from southern California and sections of the agricultural midwest and south and the industrial east. The bill now goes to conference with the senate, which last year passed a more extensive bill calling for power dams, reservoirs and irrigation systems totaling more than 1 1/2 billion dollars.

One major point of difference is Echo Park dam, which would be authorized by the senate bill but was cut from the house bill. Conservationists fought that project because it would have partially flooded Dinosaur national monument in Colorado.

The water development system for Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Wyoming had the personal endorsement of President Eisenhower and the active support of Republican and Democratic leaders in the house.

The gigantic project, even at the lower cost approved by the house, would be surpassed in cost only by the reclamation features of the Missouri basin development.

On passage, 129 Republicans and 136 Democrats voted for the bill and 73 Republicans and 63 Democrats voted against it.

All but one of the intermountain states congressmen voted with the majority Thursday in passing the bill. The lone negative vote in the Utah-Idaho area was cast by Rep. Hamer Budge.

Honors Given To Pontiff for 80th Birthday

VATICAN CITY, March 2 (AP)—Pope Pius XII today observed his 80th birthday and the 17th anniversary of his election as spiritual leader of the Roman Catholic church with prayers for the peace to which he has dedicated his life.

Thousands of pilgrims flocked to St. Peter's square to pay tribute to, and receive the blessings of, the pope, now in excellent health for a man of his years despite a slight hoarseness developed yesterday.

Children Recieved

In the Vatican, the pontiff received the homage of little children, members of the sacred college of cardinals and a group of high church and lay officials come to praise his life of service to church and humanity.

This morning 200 children from 25 nations, including the United States, presented the pope with a birthday cake dotted with 80 candles. The ceremony was unprecedented in Vatican annals.

Following the cake-presentation ceremony, the pope received high day and church officials. The group presented the pontiff a book of parchments containing essays of his life and reign. Next came an audience to the sacred college of cardinals.

Joined-In-Prayers

Around the world, 450 million Catholics who look to the pontiff as their spiritual leader joined him in special prayers: For peace, for the persecuted millions of the "church of silence" behind the iron curtain, and for all those who suffer.

Except for the children's audience, today's ceremonies are of a private nature—the pope had wanted no personal attention at all. The official ceremony marking his twin anniversaries are scheduled for March 11.

Federal and state agencies and their limitations were discussed by several soil conservation men with M. A. Johnson, Wood River soil conservation district, summarizing the talks. Frederickson was moderator for a panel discussion on improving soil district operations.

Speaking were Martin Albrechtson, Blaine district; Clyde Montgomery, North Side district; William Lutz, North Side district; Orville Davis, Wood River district; Glen Nelson, Twin Falls district; Roger Flain, North Side district; and Mrs. Frederickson, Gooding district, on auxiliaries.

Short talks were given on the national meeting and progress of the national association. Those attending noted to have Woody purchase treated posts and equipment to put up district signs.

Power Claimed By Foe to Halt High Props Bill

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Republicans claimed today they have lined up 50 or 51 senate votes against a Democratic proposal to restore high, rigid price supports for basic farm crops. This would be more than enough to defeat the Democratic plan, leaving the administration's flexible price support program in effect. But the claim was disputed by Democratic backers of a return to price supports at 90 per cent of parity for corn, cotton, peanuts, millable wheat and rice consumed domestically.

Chairman Allen J. Ellender, D-La., of the senate agriculture committee said administration forces must be counting some senators who are sure to vote for 90 per cent supports. He expressed confidence that the senate will approve a return to high price supports by a narrow margin when a showdown vote is taken next Thursday.

The basic crop support issue is scheduled for the first vote when the senate starts voting on an omnibus farm bill. The measure also includes provisions for a 1.1 billion dollar soil bank, an increase in dairy price supports and a two-price plan for rice.

The conflicting claims on the outcome of the vote came in the wake of a Democratic speech which charged President Eisenhower with the main responsibility for the fall in farm income. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson has been the chief target of most previous Democratic attacks on administration farm policies.

But Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., said yesterday in a senate speech that Democrats probably have been unfair to Benson. The secretary has only been carrying out orders from Mr. Eisenhower or someone else at the White House, the senator said.

In his senate speech, Humphrey also charged that Benson accepted the services of a public relations firm named as co-conspirator in an anti-trust indictment. Humphrey said the firm, Braun and company, Los Angeles, Calif., was hired by the GOP committee last December as a public relations consultant to the agriculture secretary.

Snow Closes Main Routes In East Area

The state highway department reported today that a huge slide had blocked state route four at Burke, Ida., and five main routes through the border area of eastern Idaho were temporarily closed by snow drifts.

Travel conditions over the rest of the state ranged from fair to good, the department said.

Might Be Opened

Department spokesmen reported that four-wheel drive vehicles might be able to get over the slide at Burke, which killed one person, by this afternoon.

In eastern Idaho U. S. 30N was closed temporarily between Banaroff and Alexander. New snow also was falling in other sections of the area and there was some drifting on U. S. 191 between Downey and Malad.

Other closed routes included state 27 from Sugar City to Victor, U. S. 27 from Idaho Falls to Alpine, state 32 from Ashton to Teton and state 47 at Falls River. Heavy snow floors and some drifting also were reported in other sections of the district.

The players drew for opponents in the first round. In the second round the winners move to one bracket and the losers to another to compete within their groups. All rounds following the second will match players with the same scores.

The players are restricted to 40 moves in two hours on their own clocks.

One point is awarded for winner and one half point for draws.

Idaho Community Hit by Snowslide; One Death Listed

WALLACE, March 2 (AP)—A 10-year-old boy was killed and at least a dozen other persons were injured early today by a massive snowslide that buried five houses in the sleeping village of nearby Mace.

The slide roared down Burke canyon five miles north of here and trapped residents in their beds. Timmy Spencer, 10, was killed but his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Spencer, and another son, escaped alive after being buried by snow and debris.

Mr. and Mrs. Art Bell and their eight children were trapped and had to be dug out by neighbors.

Burke canyon has been the scene of frequent snow slides. A slide Feb. 27, 1910, killed 16 persons. A woman and her son were killed by a slide there Jan. 4, 1933, and a Feb. 11, 1946, slide did extensive damage but one was killed.

Police said the slide was a half mile long and that it cascaded over some automobiles.

District Highway Engineer Jack Phelps said the slide tumbled onto the valley floor with a tremendous concussion that shattered windows had a mile away.

Trees up to a foot in diameter were snapped off about 500 feet from the slide area.

The slide buried the valley floor under 50 to 60 feet of snow, blocking state highway 53, between Wallace and Burke.

The slide hit 20 houses and knocked out 18 utility poles. The snow settled 20 feet deep in places.

Colored Coed Seeks Rest; New Fight Set

NEW YORK, March 2 (AP)—Aurthurine Lucy went into seclusion today to recuperate from the "shock and distress" of being expelled from the University of Alabama after winning two federal court cases to gain admittance. A spokesman said the 26-year-old Negro woman was under the care of a physician for exhaustion caused by her months-long effort to attend the traditional all-white school.

Miss Lucy said she planned tentatively to return to Alabama in "just a few days" to continue her attempt to end the white traditions of the Alabama university.

Her attorney, Thurgood Marshall, said he would confer with other lawyers and talk to Miss Lucy before deciding the next move the Negro coed should make.

He said he would make recommendations to Miss Lucy after she has regained her perspective and then let her call the turns.

Marshall indicated there might be further legal action taken to get Miss Lucy reinstated in the university.

University of Alabama trustees expelled Miss Lucy yesterday a few hours after Federal Judge Hobart Grooms ruled in Birmingham that she must be readmitted to classes by Monday. Grooms said he could do nothing more pending new legal action by the expelled Negro student.

Last night University President O. C. Carmichael met with student leaders to tell them of the trustees' action. Most of them appeared stunned.

5,200 Minidoka Acres Sell for Approximately Million Dollars

RUPERT, March 2—Sale of approximately 5,200 acres of land in Minidoka county by the Keog Land company, Bakerfield, Calif., to the J. R. Simplot company for approximately one million dollars was announced here Thursday when the Simplot company took over the land. The sale included 2,000 acres of cultivated land, 3,200 acres of undeveloped land, 12 deep wells, a 75 by 600-foot potato cellar and warehouse and the entire sprinkling system.

Charles Hay, who has been manager of the Keog Land company here since the large firm was started in 1952, said he did not know who the new farm manager would be. He added he had no plans for himself to announce at this time.

Principal crops on the 2,000 acres cultivated by the Keog company since 1952 have been grain, potatoes, sugar beets, beans and peas. Hay said.

The land, one piece three miles square, is located near Kimama. The cellar is in the village of Minidoka.

Hay said that during peak employment during the year, Keog employed 40 men on the farm. The majority of these men worked in the cellar and warehouse during the winter, he added.

Death Claims Area Pioneer Resident at 93

KIMBERLY, March 2—Edward Claiborn, 93, pioneer local resident, died at 1:20 a. m. Friday at his home here.

He was born June 6, 1862, in Marysville, Calif., and married Susie Walker in 1888. In Weiser. As a child Mr. Claiborn moved to Oakland, Ore., after moving to Payette in 1892 where he was in the livestock business. After coming to Twin Falls in 1907, he farmed until his retirement in 1928. He worked for the Kimberly Flour mill for a number of years and was a member of the Kimberly IOOF lodge.

Surviving are three sons, Elmer Claiborn, Peck Charles M. Claiborn, Jerome, and Jack D. Claiborn, Kimberly; five daughters, Mrs. Ella Moore, Whittier, Calif., Mrs. Emily King, Jerome, Mrs. Mary Vandpool, Twin Falls, Mrs. Susie Baxter, Winlock, Wash., and Mrs. Madeline Webb, Twin Falls, and one sister, Mrs. Ella Hall, Jerome. His wife and one daughter preceded him in death.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Monday at the White Mortuary chapel with the Rev. Ray Healeth, Kimberly, officiating. Concluding rites will be held in Twin Falls cemetery.

RUPERT, March 2—Minidoka county pupils are going to have to go to school on Saturday.

School Supt. Carl Warner said the extra day of school is being held so commencement can be held on June 1 rather than on June 2 or 3. School officials wish to move graduation up so seniors who are members of the national guard will be able to attend graduation and still go to national guard camp on June 2, he explained.

The school day will be a short one, Warner continued, and classes will be dismissed at 2:30 p. m.

He also reminded parents that school buses on the north side of the project are unable to travel over some of the slide roads because of mud and that pupils are to be met by parents on the main road. He said the buses can pick up pupils in the mornings because the ground is frozen but the roads are impassable for buses in the afternoon.

Denmark Premier Honored by Soviet

MOSCOW, March 2 (AP)—Danish Premier Hans C. Hansen arrived here today on an 11-day goodwill tour of the Soviet Union and got a ceremonial welcome reserved for the most important official dignitaries.

The premier was met at the airport by Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin, Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, First Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and Marshal M. Zhdanov, head of the Soviet civil air fleet.

A guard of honor of 200 crack troops of the Moscow garrison in full-dress red uniforms presented arms. A military band played the national anthems of Denmark and the Soviet Union and the flags of both nations fluttered from staffs around the airport.

4 Jets Crash

STRASBOURG, France, March 2 (AP)—Four royal Canadian air force jet fighter planes collided in a close formation dive and crashed near here today. Three of the pilots were killed and the fourth is missing.

Canadian air division officials said the four F-80 Sabre jets were from the No. 4 fighter wing based at Baden Soellingen, Germany. They crashed in an area 25 miles south of Strasbourg.

ISLES BUFFETED

LONDON, March 2 (AP)—Winds ranging up to 80 miles an hour raged across the British Isles today causing widespread damage and driving dozens of ships to cover. Two deaths were blamed on the storms.

Arabia Requests Plane Purchases

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Saudi Arabia has disclosed today it has asked to buy a small number of jet planes from the United States in addition to 18 more tanks. Officials who reported the request has not received approval. They indicated that they granted the same "most favored nation" treatment in Feb. 12 state department announcement listing a two-day embargo on such shipments.

The embargo was imposed because of Saudi Arabia's purchase of jet fighters from the United States.

Sentencing in Hunter Death Set March 10

HAILEY, March 2—Sentencing of Jack O. Cludas, Picabo, on a charge of involuntary manslaughter in the hunting death of Leonard Boggs, Shoshone, near Carey, last fall, has been set for 10 a. m. March 10. The sentencing was scheduled for Thursday before District Judge D. H. Sutherland but was continued as a further investigation of the case could be made.

Boggs was shot in the arm while deer hunting near Carey last October and died the following month in a Blackfoot hospital. A Blaine county coroner's jury held he had died as a result of the negligent handling of a rifle by Cludas.

The Picabo man was charged with involuntary manslaughter and pleaded guilty when arraigned before Judge Sutherland. The district judge ordered a pre-sentence investigation and set Thursday as the time for sentencing.

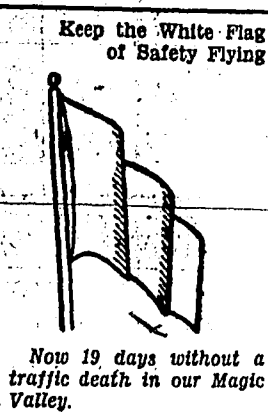

McKay Charged With Dam 'Bias' WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D., Ore., today accused Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay of giving "unreliable and biased" testimony on the Hells canyon dam.

Morocco Inks Tentative Pact On Home Rule

PARIS, March 2 (AP)—Representatives of France and Morocco signed a preliminary agreement on home rule here today that also may improve the premier's chances of victory in the Algerian vote.

Agreement formally acknowledged Morocco's right to independence, but simultaneously required the strategic North African territory to accept "bonds of interdependence" with France.

It envisioned further negotiations for a detailed agreement to replace the Fez treaty, which made Morocco a protectorate of France.

Mollet has vowed to "mobilize the nation" against the Arabs who have been waging a campaign of murder and terror against the French in Algeria. It is this policy the communists oppose.

Reports today that at least 48 natives were killed in North Africa yesterday emphasized the seriousness of the situation.

The big French "overseas province" was the scene of most of yesterday's bloodshed. French security forces killed 46 terrorists and captured 47 in various parts of the country.

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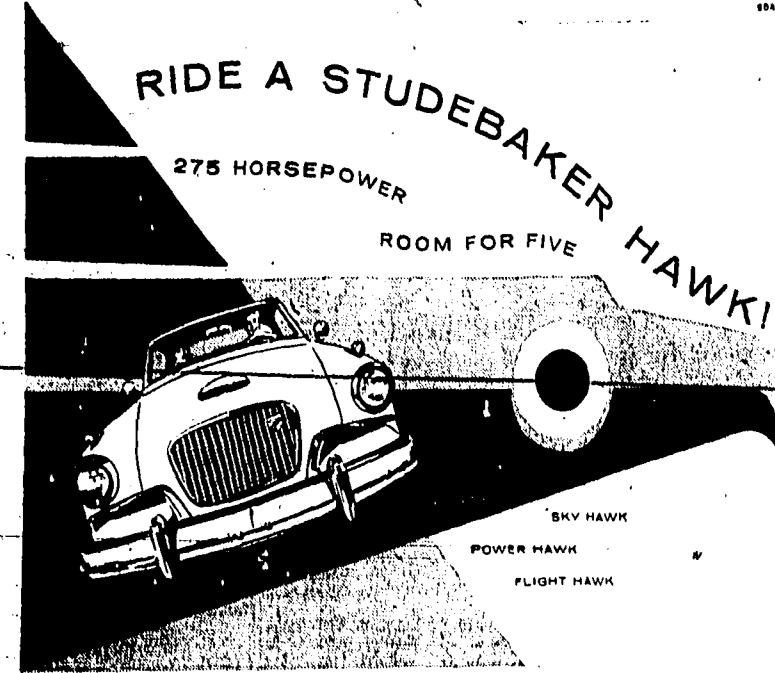
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C. of C. Eyes Plan to Hold Rodeo at Fair

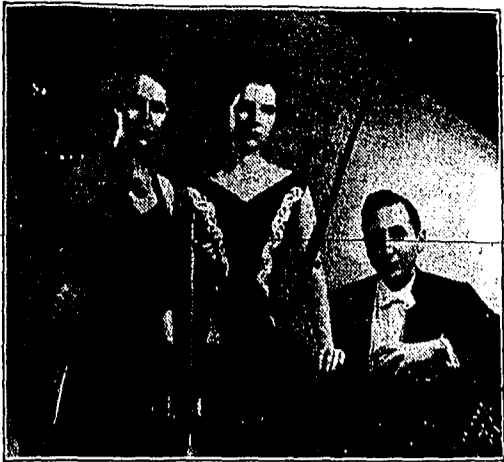
Declines to Run

New Phones Are Installed For 3 Towns

BOISE, March 2 (AP)—"Number please?" If you live in Emmett, Fruitland or Payette and use a telephone you'll be hearing that familiar sound for the last time tomorrow.

Precisely at midnight—or as soon after midnight as the last party gets off the line—they'll cut some cables, throw some switches and convert the three towns to the dial system.

The change will affect about 2,100 customers of Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company in Emmett, an equal number in Payette, and about 700 phone users served by the independently owned Farmers Mutual Telephone company in Fruitland.

The companies say the new system will save time and trouble for almost every family and business establishment in the three towns, especially on long distance calls out of Emmett.

And in the long run it will save money for Mountain States, which is spending more than \$700,000 to install the new equipment in Emmett and Payette.

With the changeover, about 55 per cent of the company's 126,500 Idaho subscribers will be on the dial system.

The ratio will rise to 67 per cent after conversion gets under way next fall in Idaho Falls, Rigby, Rexburg and St. Anthony.

Some of the state's biggest cities, such as Pocatello and Twin Falls, are still on the manual system. But the company's Idaho manager, J. W. Heckman, says that eventually every customer in his area will have a dial phone.

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Demo Claims Wrong Facts Are Released

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D. Wash., today accused the director of the budget bureau of using false figures which mislead the American people about the extent of the ballistic missile program.

Jackson charged Percival O. Brundage, newly named head of the budget bureau, with trying to convey the impression that the ballistic missile program is greater than it actually is.

Speech Cited
Jackson's attack was provoked by a speech in New York yesterday in which Brundage defended the administration's ballistic missile program against Democratic attacks. In his prepared text, Brundage said: "The ballistic missile program has priority over anything else. It is being developed as rapidly as it can be done in this country. We have provided in the budget an amount of nearly 1.5 billion dollars for research and development in the field for fiscal 1957."

Brundage said the implication in Jackson's speech that 1.5 billion dollars will be spent next year to develop ballistic missiles is "false" and "Mr. Brundage of all people should know the correct figure."

Actually, Jackson said, the 1.5 billion dollars is the total to be spent on all types of missiles—both for research and procurement. The amount being spent on ballistic missiles is smaller and classified, "as again Mr. Brundage should know," Jackson said in an interview.

Apology Asked
Jackson said Brundage "owes an apology to the American people for attempting to mislead them" about the extent of the ballistic missile program.

A budget bureau spokesman conceded that Brundage's statement was "somewhat ambiguous." A "fuller explanation," the spokesman said, is that the 1.5 billion dollars is the total to be spent in the next fiscal year on research and development and procurement of all types of guided missiles.

Dulles Starts Long Trip to U. S. Friends

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles leaves for Asia today to review and approve allied strategy for combatting communist aggression and subversion there.

Dulles departs in the afternoon after attending a morning cabinet meeting at the White House.

During his three-week Asian tour, Dulles will attend a meeting of the eight-nation Southeast Asian Treaty Organization in Karachi, Pakistan. He also will confer with Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru in New Delhi and will discuss chances of a Chinese Communist attack on nationalist islands with Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

Waystops Stated

Dulles' plane will head out over the Atlantic and make waystops at the Azores and Malta. He will be in Karachi March 6 for the opening meeting of SEATO. He will return home across the Pacific after visiting India, Ceylon, Indonesia, Thailand, Viet Nam, Philippines, Formosa, Korea, and Japan.

The military phase of Dulles' trip will be concentrated primarily at the eight-nation SEATO meeting at Karachi. Military planners of the eight treaty powers have developed top-secret defense strategy at recent meetings in Pearl Harbor and Melbourne, Australia. The foreign ministers are sure to approve the strategy, which is based on sea and air power, presumably armed with tactical atomic weapons.

Report Issued

A special treaty report made public last night in the eight capitals said SEATO's first year of operations had developed "definite progress in the combat effectiveness of the armed forces of SEATO members."

But it added that the participants "must increase their capacity to deter would-be aggressors."

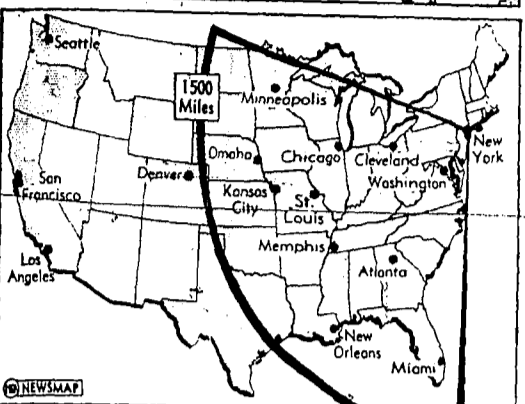
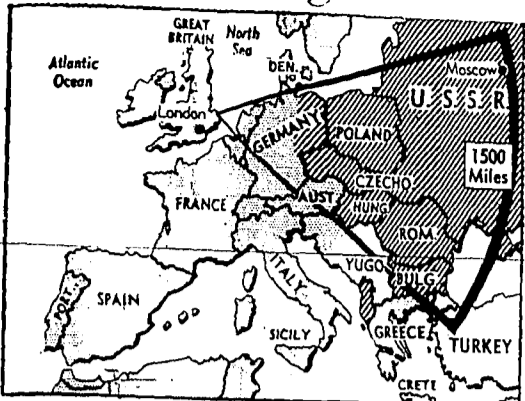
The special report also stated that progress had been made "in countering communist subversion, although it remains a major threat to the area."

SEATO treaty nations include the United States, Australia, France, New Zealand, Pakistan, Philippines, Thailand, and Britain.

Italian Leader Starts Tour of Areas in U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Italian President Giovanni Gronchi winds up his four-day Washington visit today and begins a swing through the United States and Canada.

The 68-year-old Italian chief of state was scheduled to leave by plane for Norfolk, Va., to visit headquarters of the North Atlantic Treaty Naval Command and later to tour Williamsburg, Va., the restored colonial capital of Virginia.

Gronchi, first Italian chief of state ever to visit the United States while in office, also will visit Ottawa, Canada, Detroit, San Francisco, Colorado Springs, Colo., and New York on his transcontinental tour. He departs for Rome March 14.

The Italian president held a meeting with President Eisenhower yesterday to discuss U. S.-Italian relations and other international problems. It was the second such conference between the two men.

The White House said they agreed that "all possible efforts will continue to be made to achieve a reduction of armaments." They also said, however, that the western nations cannot relax their defense efforts in "the present situation."

Italian Foreign Minister Gaetano Martino had a separate meeting with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles late yesterday. The two agreed that their governments would enter negotiations in which the United States might sell Italy an atomic power reactor.

"'Twould be a good idea. He never has had a record like this."

When the teacher called on the boy's mother, she met the same closed attitude. The mother listened politely, said a few nothings, let the teacher feel that she would better cut the call short and ended it by saying, "Sorry the boy gives you trouble. We will do anything we can to help."

Nothing happened. Cal seemed to withdraw from everything and everyone as the days passed. Then the reason appeared. His parents were separating. Cal was to go to live with his grandmother in a distant town.

Many a time home troubles are reflected in the behavior and the attitudes of children. Rarely do the youngsters mention them, even when questioned. A loved parent or relative is ill, and the child is ill in mind and body. There is a threat to the stability of the family and at once fear enters the mind of the child.

No child grows or learns well under a cloud of fear. Worry, fear, unhappiness and grief are forces that endanger mental and physical health. Any child suffering under these needs help, understanding and friendship to enable him to master the situation.

"Trouble is the bitter in the sweet of life. Nobody escapes it. Most of us learn to live with it and overcome it by faith in a better day to come, in work that drives the thought of it from us, in sharing it with a trusted friend. The sharing is about the one thing a child under stress can do to help himself."

The teacher who knows him best, the clergyman, the Scout leader, a beloved relative, someone he knows and can trust, can help him to open his pack of trouble to a kind eye and heart. 31 People Are Saved in Wild Snowy Region

OSLO, Norway, March 2 (AP)—A rescue party today found 37 Swedish schoolchildren and their 47 teachers who had been missing in Norway's snow-covered mountains since they made a ski pilgrimage yesterday to a Norwegian national shrine. The children had dug caves in the snow to protect themselves from the cold and were in good condition. They had suffered no harm during the night.

Snow lay six feet deep in the mountains near Rondane, 60 miles northeast of here where the group was last reported, and authorities said heavy new falls and strong winds threatened to develop into a gale later in the day. The danger of avalanches in the Rondane area—a popular ski center—was reported great. Several towns in the area have been isolated by avalanches and landslides and most road traffic is blocked. Rescue parties searched the area with snowmobiles while planes prepared to take to the air. Normal life came to a halt in the Rondane area as the entire male population began the search. Specially trained dogs joined the rescue parties.

Ground-Breaking Rites Start \$694,918 School Construction Program for City

A \$694,918.02 school building program was launched Thursday afternoon when Elvis Cain, secretary of class A school district No. 411 board of education, turned over the first shovel of dirt on the Harrison elementary school site. Approximately 20 board members, architects, contractors and interested individuals were present for the brief ceremony. The Harrison street school is one of two 16-room elementary schools to be constructed along with an additional wing on the high school which will include eight rooms and a cafeteria. At the same time extensive remodeling will be completed in the junior high school building. Each of the projects is expected to be completed in time for school opening next September.

Reynolds and Walker, Twin Falls construction firm, has the general contract to build the wing on the high school at a cost of \$114,900. With this addition the school will accommodate 1,450 students. This assures adequate facilities for the next 12 years. However, 1,600 are enrolled in the first three grades this year. A and B Plumbing will install the plumbing at a cost of \$27,388. The cost of electrical work has been bid in at \$16,424.28 by Electric service. The overall cost stands at \$158,812.28.

Both the elementary schools, one on Morningstar drive and the other on Harrison street, will include 16 rooms, an auditorium and offices. The bid for general construction was won by Brennan Construction company at \$401,400. Home Plumbing company will install the plumbing for \$105,440 and Electric service has the electric contract for \$28,468.34. The total for the two schools is \$535,308.34.
