Driver Is Killed In Car Crash as Toll Jumps to 6

RUPERT, March 8—Magic Valley's sixth traffic fatality and Minidoka county's first for 1956 came early Thursday when Vely M. Linzy, 33, Rupert, was killed when his automobile went out of control two and one-half miles north of Rupert on the Cemetery road. Mr. Linzy died within a mile and one-half from his residence as he was returning from a meeting in Burley.

Sheriff Theo Johnson said Mr. Linzy's car went into the borrow pit and overturned several times. The driver, alone at the time, was thrown clear of the car, he said. As the automobile rolled down the ditch considerable fencing was ripped up and one telephone pole was broken off, he added.

Strong Force Cited as Base Of Asia Plan

KARACHI, Pakistan, March 8 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) today that a strong strategic force was the basis of America's new Asian defense plans.

Dulles said the United States plan also called for three of the Asian members of the defense organization to build up a "strong and indigenous" force able to resist aggression, conference sources said. The sources said Dulles outlined the simple two-point defense plan in this morning's secret session during which he told the SEATO ministers the strength of allied forces in the SEATO treaty area was greater than U. S. strength in the Pacific during World War II. This was believed to be a reference to greater allied fire power through modern developments including atomic weapons. Dulles told Pakistan that U. S. aid to that country had been "calculated to increase her military strength materially." He said the United States agreed that there "should be sufficiently strong indigenous forces in each member country" but that the United States believed the "major concept" of deterring aggression to be a "strong strategic force that could strike any aggressor."

Record Snow Packs Pose Flood Menace

PORTLAND, Ore., March 8 (AP)—The U. S. soil conservation service warned today of a "hazardous" flood threat in the Columbia river basin because of record snow packs in the mountains. The threat is particularly critical in northern Idaho. Snow depths are far above normal in the watersheds of the Pend Oreille, Clearwater, Spokane, Boise, Snake and Kootenai rivers.

At Portland the weather bureau river forecast center said the runoff for the Columbia river, measured at The Dalles, likely would be 133 per cent of the 1938-1952 average for the March-through-September period.

Winter Snow Blocks Some Idaho Roads

Senate's Leaders Indicate Administration Will Win OK of Flexible Supports

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Senate leaders indicated today that the administration forces apparently have the votes to continue flexible farm price supports in the showdown vote scheduled this afternoon. Republican Leader William F. Knowland, Calif., flatly predicted that "rigid price supports will be eliminated" from the farm bill. Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, Tex., wouldn't dispute the claim that the flexible support forces would win by a few votes. The crucial vote on flexible vs. rigid high supports had been expected around 2 p.m. EST. But the final arguments on that issue were delayed when a dispute over the senate's controversial lobbying investigation was taken to the floor.

New Red Line Is Dangerous, Speaker Says

MOSCOW, March 8 (AP)—The new communist line is "a good deal more dangerous than the old one," a professor of international relations told the ninth annual Bosch conference for the outflow of war today. Dr. Harold H. Fisher, San Francisco State college, speaking at the University of Idaho, said: "The communists base their new tactics on the belief that if they remove the pressure on the free world, the rivalries and conflicts of interest among and between non-communist countries will be revived. They base it on the belief that the selfish interest inherent in free enterprise will prevent the domestic and international cooperation necessary to deal as successfully as a dictatorship can with the problems and opportunities of this world of rapid change."

Armed Show Is Slated for 'Hot' Region

LONDON, March 8 (AP)—The United States and Britain have agreed on a show of force in the eastern Mediterranean to prevent a threatened war between Israel and its Arab neighbors, informed sources said today. Diplomatic sources said the tip off came when the United States announced it was sending 1,800 U. S. marines into the area at a time when Britain was reinforcing its Cyprus garrison with troops who could be flown to the Middle East in a matter of an hour or so.

Simplot Buys More Of Minidoka's Land

The land sold by them to Simplot is located north of Acequia. Of the 560 acres, 500 are irrigated by three deep wells. The amount of the sale was not disclosed although the land reported sold by the Kerbs land company to Simplot last week was reported sold for approximately one million dollars.

Soviet Policy To Face Tests Of Italy Reds

The new "soft" policy of communist infiltration in Western European countries is about to undergo its first test.

This new policy was laid down at the recent 20th Communist party congress in Moscow. It calls upon communist parties in foreign countries to work with the Socialists and other left wing groups in parliament instead of resorting to violence.

First Test Is Due
The first test of the policy is coming up in Italy, which has the biggest Communist party—about 2,500,000 members—in Western Europe.

Italian Communist Party Leader Palmiro Togliatti returned to Rome Tuesday from the Moscow congress to find himself faced by a revolt of a strong red faction which believes in being tough.

The rebels—somehow optimistically, perhaps—claim to represent about one million party members.

Issue Manifesto
Possibly they didn't read the newspaper accounts of the Moscow proceedings. In any event, they issued a manifesto attacking Togliatti and other party leaders and demanded a return to the "revolutionary line."

It will be interesting to see whether Togliatti can restore party discipline. If he can't, he will be in trouble—and so will Moscow. Togliatti himself endorsed the new line enthusiastically in an interview in Moscow.

He probably was pained to find out that the "hot heads" in his own party wanted no part of it. Togliatti doesn't look like a red. Spectacled, intellectual, always smartly dressed, an art lover, he could pass for a representative member of the upper middle class.

But he has been called the most successful communist leader in Western Europe. He is a master politician and he has the great quality of patience. He succeeded in building up the Italian Communist party until, in the 1948 elections, it came perilously near to taking over the country.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., March 8 (AP)—Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, chief Scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America, is looking for a Boy Scout to serve as junior scientific aide in Antarctica during the international geophysical year, 1957-58.

Police Begin Top Hunt for Lost Socialite

LOS ANGELES, March 8 (AP)—Police searched today for a wealthy socialite who disappeared almost a year ago when her husband went on an errand for her to a drugstore.

The disappearance of Mrs. Evelyn Throsby Scott, 63, first was disclosed Tuesday when her brother, E. Raymond Throsby, filed a superior court petition seeking guardianship of her \$250,000 estate. Throsby said his sister disappeared last May but her husband, investment broker L. Ewing Scott, failed to report her missing.

Throsby filed a missing persons report yesterday which brought police into the case. Police Chief William Parker criticized Dist. Atty. S. Ernest Roll for failing to notify his department that district attorney investigators were working on the case.

When questioned by district attorney investigators, Scott said his wife was suffering from cancer and he thought she might have entered a sanitarium. He said Mrs. Scott disappeared May 19, 1955, after she sent him to a drugstore for toothpaste. Scott said he did not report her missing because he believed it involved her illness and she had told him previously, "keep your nose out of my business."

Scott is the woman's third husband. Her first husband was the late Clement Pettit, member of a Milwaukee banking family, and her second, the late Norris M. Mumper, a former state department official. She and Scott were married in 1949. When Mrs. Scott disappeared she took \$15,000 in cash, according to her husband.

Nixon's Future in GOP Plans Is Still Cloudy and Uncertain

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Several facts emerge from the confusion clouding President Eisenhower's real intention as to Vice President Richard M. Nixon and the No. 2 place on the 1956 GOP ticket.

1. Some of Nixon's friends are mighty glum these days.
2. The White House was the source of the first news leak that Mr. Eisenhower himself had raised the question whether Nixon would or should be on the ticket.
3. Mr. Eisenhower has put the vice president on a "hot political spot."
4. Nixon's strength lies among organization Republicans from National Committee Chairman Leonard W. Hall down to the grass roots.

Until Mr. Eisenhower refused at his news conference last week to endorse Nixon for renomination, it generally had been assumed here that the President wanted to run again with his young friend. His every public reference to him had been in praise.

Many of Nixon's backers were jolted by last week's news conference decision to postpone any expression of choice for vice president until after the Republican national convention had nominated its presidential candidate.

The news breaks since then—largely leaked from the White House or from personal presidential pals—have further jolted the renominating-Nixon brigade. The latest shocks came when a nationally circulated news magazine hit the stands a few hours before Mr. Eisenhower's news conference yesterday.

Newsweek magazine reported at length that the matter of No. 2 place on the Republican ticket still was up in the air. Mr. Eisenhower followed shortly in response to news conference questions with more high praise for Nixon. But he uttered a stone wall refusal to say him for renomination. On the contrary, Mr. Eisenhower confirmed the backbone of the reports already in print—that it was up to Nixon to decide his political future. It added up about to this: Mr. Eisenhower regards Nixon highly, he would accept him as a running mate, but

Reorganization of China Army Noted

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 8 (AP)—A National Chinese military spokesman said today that while Red China has been reorganizing its coastal armies he saw no particular significance in the move.

Capt. Liu H-lou said that nationalist intelligence had reports that the communists were replacing older veterans in the coastal armies facing Formosa with younger recruits. But he said it was his opinion that this sort of reorganization was taking place throughout Red China's vast military machine—not only in the coastal areas.

He said he did not think this particular phase of communist military reorganization had any direct and immediate bearing on the situation in the Formosa strait.

Study Planned

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, March 8 (AP)—Two top officials of Denmark's planned experimental atomic power plant will leave for New York Saturday to study American atomic reactors.

Denmark will receive a 1,000-kilowatt capacity reactor under the American-Danish atoms-for-peace agreement signed last year. Later a bigger experimental reactor will be constructed with British help and installed at the power plant at Bjaere, west of Copenhagen.

First Primary Ballots Due; Interest Seen

CONCORD, N. H., March 8 (AP)—To the casual observer most of the action in New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation presidential primary next Tuesday will be on the Democratic side of the ballot.

But one spot on the Republican ballot holds a great deal of interest to the seasoned observer: The place for a write-in preference for vice president.

Democrats have a clean-cut battle for delegates between Sen. Estes Kefauver, of Tennessee and the 1952 nominee, Adlai E. Stevenson.

Sweep Expected

No one expects anything but an Eisenhower sweep on the GOP side. Mr. Eisenhower is the only candidate in the preferential section for President. And 28 of the 38 delegate candidates are favorable to the President. Seven are favorable to Sen. William Knowland of California, two are unpledged and one is favorable to Chief Justice Earl Warren. Fourteen GOP delegates will be elected.

Kefauver is alone in the preferential section of the Democratic ballot but has stiff opposition in the battle for delegates.

33 Candidates Vie

Thirty-three candidates are seeking the 12 Democratic convention seats. Fifteen are either pledged or favorable to Kefauver, 12 are favorable to Stevenson, four are unpledged and one each is favorable to Gov. Mennen Williams of Michigan and Gov. Averell Harriman of New York.

Under New Hampshire law only pledged delegates need the expressed approval of the candidates involved. Pledged delegates are bound to support their candidate until he releases them. Favorable delegates are not so bound.

Kefauver has visited New Hampshire twice to gain popular support and plans another trip here this week-end. Stevenson has given no indication that he is more than casually interested in Tuesday's outcome. He said he had nothing to gain by entering the primary and conceded the delegation to his Tennessee opponent.

Surprises Possible

Whether any surprises on the GOP vice presidential spot will be forthcoming is pure speculation. Any favorable write-in would need the backing of the Republican organization and so far no such movement has been detected.

But the spot is on the ballot and any outpouring for a vice presidential candidate could be interpreted as popular support.

Autry Is Ill

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., March 8 (AP)—Cowboy star Gene Autry was under doctors' orders today to take a lengthy rest to recover from "complete exhaustion."

Autry was stricken with laryngitis when he returned recently from an extensive 24-city personal appearance tour. Columbia Broadcasting system spokesmen said Autry will be absent for several weeks from his Sunday radio program.

Polio Vaccine Isn't Given to U. S. Soldiers

LOS ANGELES, March 8 (AP)—Maj.-Gen. Silas B. Hays, surgeon general of the army, says American soldiers are not being given Salk vaccine shots.

"We aren't giving the Salk vaccine to troops but are following the local policy on the vaccine with regards to dependents," Hays told the annual meeting of the college of medical evangelists yesterday.

"The army gets only a small share of the vaccine," he said.

Hays said the army now has "the fewest people off for illness" than it ever had.

"I must admit, however, that we are losing too many men in traffic accidents during their leaves," he said.

The Lincoln County PTA council was disbanded and Mrs. Ross reminded board members plans of work should be in the hands of the procedure book chairman by April 1.

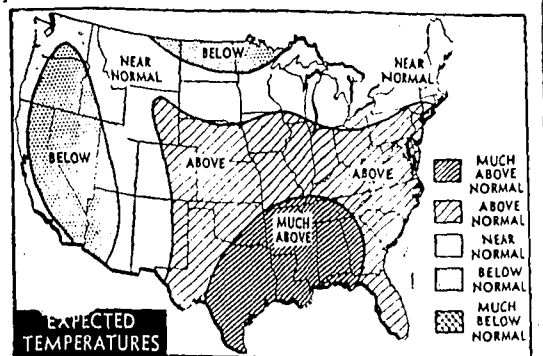
Membership in PTA is only 108 this year, a considerable drop over previous years, officers announced.

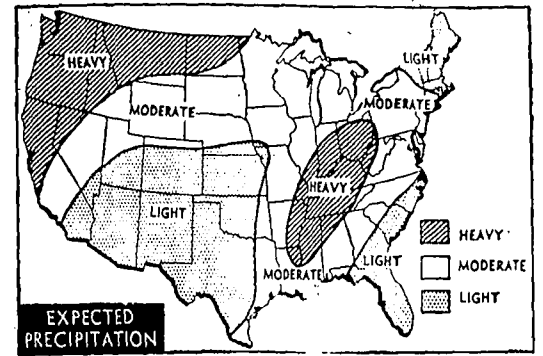

Ike's Popularity Is Attested In Virginia: May Take State

RICHMOND, Va., March 8 (AP)—The bellboy at the Hotel John Marshall said of President Eisenhower, "He's mighty popular around here."

"There must have been 50 people around the TV set downstairs the other night when the President made his speech about running again," the boy went on. "They sure seemed to like him."

The barber stropped his razor paused for a moment, and addressed the customer:

"I voted for Adlai Stevenson in 1952, and I'm going to vote for him again November, if he is nominated. He's smart and these people of foreign countries like him. And besides, the Republicans are for the big business men."

He paused again, sighed and added:

"But Eisenhower is going to be a hard man to beat in Virginia, just the same."

Even the most outspoken political

figure publicly declared in favor of Stevenson over Eisenhower told this reporter.

"It's anybody's territory. The Democrats can win if they unify and work. They can't, if they don't."

That was Robert Whitehead, a member of the Virginia house of delegates and a leader of the anti-Byrd faction of the Democratic party in the state.

The dominant Byrd faction is headed by U. S. Sen. Harry S. Byrd, who refuses to say where his support will go in November.

Four years ago, he said he would not support Adlai Stevenson because he thought Stevenson's views were too closely in line with those of his bitter political foe, former President Harry S. Truman.

Eisenhower beat Stevenson in Virginia 349,037 votes to 268,677, a margin of 80,360 in this normally "solid South" state. Tennessee, Texas and Florida also left the Democratic column to join the Eisenhower landslide.

The biggest issue in Virginia is

the race question, and the U. S. supreme court ruling calling for an end to segregation in the public schools.

Steps are under way to prevent compulsory integration in Virginia. A key feature is to provide public tuition grants for education in private schools for children whose parents object to racially-integrated education.

The issue is a bitter one and the argument over which national party bears the greatest responsibility for the integration development promises to highlight the presidential campaign in this state.

Unlike Whitehead, many of the top Democratic political figures won't make any open commitment yet to support the party nominee.

Privately, most of them say they prefer Stevenson to Tennessee Sen. Estes Kefauver and New York Gov. Averell Harriman on the ground that he is more "moderate" on the race

issue and the only one of the three with a chance to win Virginia.

The Richmond Times Dispatch reported a week ago Sunday that it conducted a poll which showed that as of February 55 per cent of the voters favored Eisenhower, 40 per cent favored Stevenson and five per cent were undecided.

Virginians of both parties told this reporter they thought Vice President Nixon might hand-cap the President in Virginia if he is Eisenhower's running mate again.

Pork prices at wholesale are off about a quarter of a cent a pound from the week before.

Beef prices are about the same as last week at wholesale, but you'll find plenty of marked-down "specials" this week-end at the retail counter. Featured prominently at special prices are sirloin steaks, rib roasts and top and bottom round oven roasts.

Roasting and frying chickens, turkeys and roast duckling head the parade of bargain specials in the poultry department.

Lamb up Slightly
Lamb prices are up a quarter to a half cent a pound at wholesale, but specialists say there will be little if any over-all change in the retail price for at least another week.

Green vegetables from the Southwest offer new variety for dinner menus this week. Increasingly abundant, and therefore moderately priced, are broccoli from California, Arizona and Texas, new cabbage from Texas and Florida, and spinach from Texas. All are listed as "good buys" by U. S. department of agriculture specialists.

"Good" buys in fresh fruits include oranges, grapefruit, tangerines and apples.

You're likely to find egg prices noticeably lower by the time the Easter bunny gets around. Egg production is nearing its seasonal peak.

Details Sought On "Revolt" of School Cadets

SANTA FE, N. M., March 8 (AP)—Gov. John F. Simeis said today he may send an investigator to New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell to get all details behind a riot by 400 cadets Tuesday night.

The governor said he is trying to determine the validity of a report that a hazing incident set off the demonstration. Institute spokesmen said the disturbance was "one of those things" that crop up every spring and probably was caused by tightened discipline.

The 400 cadets set fire to grass and 50-mile-an-hour winds spread the blaze onto the parade grounds nearby. Cadets stoned firemen and refused to let a fire truck pass until city police finally cleared a path.

The cadets then threw ink over walls in at least one of the institute's buildings and stoned unoccupied barracks.

The institute spokesman said discipline under the school's new commanding officer, former fifth army commander Lieut. Gen. Hobart R. Gay, has been tightened. The spokesman said hazing is strictly forbidden.

No Cold War Yet Reported In Polar Area

MIAMI, Fla., March 8 (AP)—Adm. Richard E. Byrd, returning from Antarctica, reported there is no "cold war" between Americans conducting "Operation Deep Freeze" and Russian explorers.

Byrd said, however, that he plans to talk over the "delicate matter of claims" with the U. S. department. Byrd arrived by plane from Panama and plans to leave for Washington tomorrow.

Relations Cordial
Byrd said on arriving in the United States after 10 weeks as head of the U. S. expedition in Little America that relations with Russian explorers in the Antarctic have been friendly and cooperative.

The two nations are setting up scientific bases in south polar regions as part of the 40-nation observance of the geophysical year. The operations will extend through 1959.

The American group, including 72 men at "Little America" and 90 men at McMurdo Sound 400 miles to the east, have been in touch with the Russian expedition by radio.

Two Ships Stuck
"The last we heard of the Russians, two of their ships were stuck in the ice," Byrd said.

Byrd, who arrived without advance announcement, said he will return to Little America to resume his direction of Operation Deep Freeze. He said he hopes to set up three to five bases.

Whites Abide by Voting Laws; Flunk in Louisiana's Testings

MINDEN, La., March 8 (AP)—A woman registrar disclosed today that her compliance with white citizens council demands for strict enforcement of voter qualification laws has flunked 24 white applicants.

Mrs. Winnice P. Clement, 58-year-old widow, said the two dozen white applicants for vote registration were unable to interpret the U. S. Constitution as required by state law.

The rise in Negro voting power to some 2,000, against 12,000 white voters in Webster parish (county) recently made Mrs. Clement the target of protests by pro-segregation citizens councils.

Mrs. Clement said she had previously followed the custom of passing all seemingly literate applicants without test.

"But now that I'm enforcing the law maybe they'll be satisfied," she said.

Louisiana's voting laws, like those of other states which once tried to accede from the union, are based upon a historical determination to prevent Negroes from voting.

Mrs. Clement, registrar since 1940, said that since the custom was to register whites without tests she permitted Negroes to register similarly.

The citizens councils bombarded Gov. Robert Kennon with protests about Mrs. Clement. The Webster parish police jury (administrative body) sent Kennon a resolution ask-

1 teaspoon orange extract
6 egg yolks (1/4 cup)
3/4 cup milk
Orange sections

Sift together flour, Baking Powder, and salt. Cream together shortening, sugar, orange rind, and orange extract until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Blend in dry ingredients alternately with milk, adding dry ingredients first and last. Beat only until smooth after each addition. Pour equal amounts of batter into 2 greased and floured 8 x 1 1/2-inch round layer cake pans. Bake in a 350° F. (moderate) oven about 25 minutes. Cool thoroughly. Frost with Seven-Minute Frosting. Garnish with orange sections.

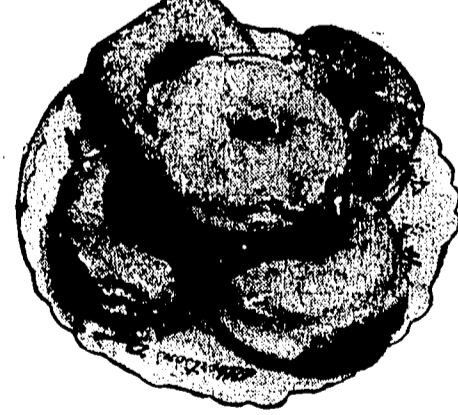
