LONDON, March 14 (U.P.)—The United States, in what appeared to be a major switch in policy, has agreed to "examine" nuclear disarmament here next week with her Western allies and Russia, official sources said today.

Full Support Pay Is Set for Food Wheat

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—The senate voted yesterday for 100 percent parity supports on all wheat grown for human consumption in the United States but rejected a similar amendment on cotton. Strings were tied to the wheat plan, however. It would not start to operate until 1957 and then must be approved by a two-thirds vote of wheat growers and the secretary of agriculture. The administration was announced as not supporting the proposal, but there was a dispute over whether President Eisenhower and Secretary of Agriculture Benson were adamant against it.

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Copper Group Given Time to Deliver Metal

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—The government announced yesterday that it has given producers an extra six months to deliver 36,000 tons of copper earmarked for the nation's defense stocks.

The copper was supposed to have been shipped by June 30. The new deadline is Dec. 31.

The office of defense mobilization said the delivery was postponed to allow existing copper production to catch up with the government's stockpile in the second quarter to have gone to the government for future emergencies and other defense purposes. The other 28,000 tons represent previously postponed deliveries.

ODM also said the commerce department has been asked to work out with the general services administration which handles actual administration—such as materials—a stockpiling of scarce materials—a copper delivery plan.

ODM Administrator Arthur S. Fleming said nickel, copper and aluminum are high on the list of critically essential defense materials. Of the three, he said, only aluminum is stockpiled in adequate amounts to meet foreseeable defense mobilization needs.

Budge Declares War on Land Withdrawal Policy

WASHINGTON, March 14 (Special)—Idaho Rep. Hamer Budge has declared war on the military services' land withdrawal policies.

He introduced legislation to prevent the military's disposal of surplus lands "like surplus airplanes, rubber boots or curry combs."

Budge said the present military land withdrawal policy permits the services to acquire land by executive order, later declare it surplus, and

then turn it over to the government for public sale.

"While temporary (land) use by the military must be permitted, that land should revert to its original status as soon as military use ceases," Budge declared.

He plans to introduce an amendment to that effect on the upcoming military construction bill for fiscal year 1957.

Meanwhile, Budge has introduced a special bill to require congressional approval of all land withdrawals made by the military. At present such withdrawals are effected by executive order.

The national forests and other public domain has been set aside for the use and enjoyment not only of the present generation but of generations to come," Budge said.



Poisoning Is Confessed by Waitress, 49

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 14 (AP)—A 49-year-old waitress confessed last night she had fed fatal doses of ant poison to three of her children, two husbands and mother to collect their insurance.

Police said Mrs. Rhonda Belle Martin signed a statement admitting her relatives' deaths and said she confessed poisoning her present husband, Roland Martin, who is recuperating in a Biloxi, Miss. hospital. He was her stepson and is 19 years younger than his red-haired wife.

Probe Continues
Atty. William Theford said an "investigation is still continuing" into the deaths of two more of Mrs. Martin's daughters.

Officials said earlier that the six relatives she admitted killing and the two whose deaths they are still investigating all died from similar ailments—violent vomiting and diarrhea. The symptoms were described as arsenic poisoning.

Received Cash
Theford said it was undetermined how much insurance money the waitress received from the deaths. He said she apparently received from \$3,000 to \$4,000 from the insurance policy of Claude R. Martin, her fourth husband who died here in 1951.

The attorney said Mrs. Martin got \$750 from her mother's estate, but apparently received only "small amount" from the other alleged victims.

Investigation Begins
State county and city officers began the investigation two months ago when it was learned that Roland Martin, her 30-year-old present husband, was suffering from arsenic poisoning. He was admitted to a veterans administration hospital at Biloxi, Miss., last December for treatment of a "mysterious" ailment. Arsenic traces were found in strands of his hair by experts in Washington.

Mrs. Martin was arrested last Friday at Mobile and charged with murdering her fourth husband Claude R. Martin, father of her present husband. Martin's body was exhumed and examined several days earlier and found to contain arsenic.

"Let me introduce myself," said the driver of the other car. "I am Eugenio Castellotti."

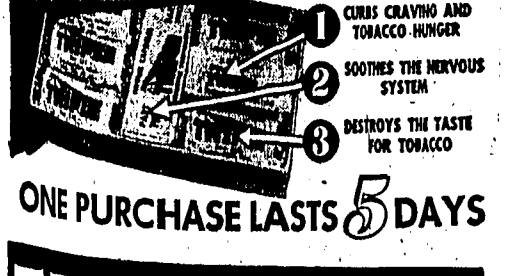
Both men burst out laughing. Castellotti is Italy's leading automobile racing driver.

Reports Note Korean Reds Have A-Arms

SEOUL, March 14 (AP)—U. S. and Republic of Korea officials said today they have received reports the communists are moving atomic artillery into Red Korea, but added they cannot vouch for the authenticity of the information.

A spokesman at U. S. Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer's headquarters said the past record of communist duplicity in Korea makes it "obvious a possibility that atomic weapons have been brought in."

Korean Defense Minister Sohn Won Il said "informants" of dubious veracity have reported seeing tests of atomic artillery in red-held Korean territory.

A ROK intelligence officer said communist soldiers from Korea are being sent to Russia for training in atomic gunnery. He expressed doubt, however, that any A-guns actually have been brought into Red Korea.

He said a 110-ton Russian atomic field gun has been waiting for four months on the north bank of the Yalu river, separating Red Korea from Communist China, but that the poor condition of North Korean roads has made it impossible to move the gun across the border.

A Swiss armistice inspector said he has "no information" on the atomic reports. Lemnitzer's spokesman commented that the restrictions the reds have imposed on neutral truce inspectors make it unlikely they would know whether or not the communists have moved A-guns into Korea.

"Several reports have been received which suggest that atomic weapons of some kind have been supplied to communist forces in North Korea," the spokesman said. "It has not yet been possible to determine how accurate these reports are."

Official Seeking Increase in Rate

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—Postmaster General Summerfield asked congress for higher postal rates today with the argument that the present charges "burden the taxpayer for services rendered to others."

"We cannot in good conscience continue" to do that, he told the house postoffice committee.

The postoffice department has racked up a deficit of \$4,500,000,000 in the last 10 years, Summerfield said.

VISIT SLATED

BONN, Germany, March 14 (AP)—West Germany's atomic minister, Franz Josef Strauss, will pay a 14-day visit to the United States at the end of April. The German minister was invited by Lewis Strauss, chairman of the U. S. atomic energy commission.

Trusting

CHICAGO, March 14 (AP)—A 78-year-old, partially blind widow, who told police she and her late husband did not trust banks, reported the burglary of \$25,000 in \$20 bills from her home yesterday.

Mrs. Sophia Wysokinski said the money was kept in a paper bag in a trunk in her third-floor apartment.

"Chiller" Hurtles Way Into House

LOS ANGELES, March 14 (AP)—Damon Leon Angulo was watching television last night but the chiller that came through the air didn't show on the screen. It crashed through the roof.

Angulo told sheriff's deputies he heard a rending noise in another room. He found a hole in the ceiling about 18 inches in diameter. The floor was littered with smashed ice.

Angulo thought pranksters were at work. But officers said the hole was beneath an airline route into International airport and they deduced that ice had slipped from a plane in flight.

Budget Is Set

HAILEY, March 14 (AP)—Hawatha canal waterusers set their budget at \$1,000 Saturday and elected Martin Young watermaster.

Dale Mizer was reelected director for three years. Holdover directors are Kenneth Buttram and Don Spencer.

All members are to spend a day or two cleaning the canal after a large head of water has been turned in to concentrate leaves and other debris. Weeds and willows along the ditch will be sprayed.

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—Latest word from the Texas wildlife refuge where the whoopers spend the winter is that one of the tiny surviving flock of 28 birds is missing. The whooper is so close to extinction, that conservationists from coast to coast grieve over the loss of even one of the big birds.

Point is, we are approaching National Wildlife week and the "whooping crane" is only one of the creatures we ought to hang onto if we possibly can.

The National Wildlife federation has some ideas for people of all areas. Federal and state agencies should get to work to protect endangered wildlife and restore national environments. Habitats could be improved.

If men want to continue to stalk the quail and the pheasant and the like they will have to put up a little dough to see that the fields and streams are restocked and protected from poachers and trigger happy out-of-season hunters.

A few for instances: The sea otter is threatened. So is the lake sturgeon, and the key deer in Florida and the trumpeter swan.

The federation nails home a point when it asks the question: "Why save an endangered species?"

The federation falls back on the late Aldo Leopold, teacher of wildlife management and philosopher to the conservation movement.

Leopold was dedicating a monument to the extinct passenger pigeon. Said he: "For one species to mourn the death of another is a new thing under the sun. We who have lost our pigeons mourn the loss. Had the funeral been ours, the pigeons hardly would have mourned us."

Some of you might not cotton much to the grizzly bear, but this fellow is going the way of all flesh. Guns, traps, stray dogs and the lack of legal protection are doing the bear in.

Time was when the waters of the country were well supplied by nature with lake trout. But these fine eating fish are getting scarcer. Man didn't have so much to do with this misery of our finny friends. It was one of his distant relatives—the sea lamprey, an eel-like rascal with an appetite for lake trout.

Well, the plain facts are that lamprey sneaked into the great lakes and has played havoc with the life of the lake trout.

Summing up—the conservationists are more than a mite worried.

Snags Shown In Attempt to Probe Secret

IOWA CITY, Ia., March 14 (AP)—Scientists' plans to measure cosmic rays with huge "skyhook" balloons hit a snag today. They can't be sure the balloons will stay put.

One of the mammoth balloons slipped its leash yesterday and led the flatfooted scientists on a 700-mile chase across the northern United States.

Instruments Dumped
It finally dumped its load of precious research instruments near Buffalo, N. Y., and the data was being rushed back to Iowa City today.

Scientists had planned to send another balloon into the stratosphere tomorrow. But they admitted yesterday's exhausting experience might cause them to change their plans.

The wayward balloon, about the size of a football field, was launched from Iowa City early yesterday. It was supposed to wander across the Mississippi river and dump its equipment by parachute somewhere in eastern Illinois or Indiana.

Climbs Steadily
Instead, the big balloon climbed steadily until it was 21 miles above the earth. Then a jet stream of air caught it and it began whizzing eastward at an 80 miles per hour clip.

A plane tried to keep up with the fast-travelling balloon so it could spot the area where the equipment went down. It seemed an easy assignment, but the balloon almost gave it the slip.

The plane had to make re-fueling stops at Chicago and Cleveland, while the helium-filled balloon kept right on going. It was so high that clouds sometimes hid it and it had to be tracked by ADF aerial detection finder—it was also far from the radio range of its home base here.

End Occurs
The end finally came when a pre-set timing device freed the 200-pound cluster of equipment over New York state. The packages floated down about 50 miles east of Buffalo and 40 miles southwest of Rochester.

The balloon really got lost then. It climbed a mile or so further and then exploded.

Iowa scientists didn't mind that. They planned it that way, they said.

Soviets Use Cultural Means In Attempt to Further Plans

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Million dollar movie extravaganzas are the newest thing in the Soviet Union's propaganda bag of tricks.

"These artistic films compare with the best Hollywood is able to produce in the cultural field. Cost is no barrier for the state-backed communist movie-makers.

It's part of a stepped-up program to sell Russia as the cultural leader of the world.

This is the opinion of officials at the U. S. information agency who are gravely concerned. They fear the communists will hoodwink the free world.

Others are apprehensive. "One of the weakest links in the U. S. defense against Soviet Russia is relations with other nations," declares Rep. Frank Thompson, D., N.J. "The Soviet Union has long accused the U. S. as a nation of being culturally barbaric and this propaganda has had considerable influence throughout the rest of the world."

Recently USIA movie experts attended a secret showing of Russia's latest product. It was a color ballet film, "Romeo and Juliet," music by Prokofiev.

"There were no smiles when we stepped out of the room after the movie," reports one official. "We knew the opposition had come up with something."

Other than a brief narration, no words were spoken. There was no obvious propaganda, just art and culture all the way.

"This product is one of such beauty, such grace, such elegance and such dramatic presentation of the sweetness of true love that one wonders how it could have come from the land of mass obedience by fear," commented a Washington society reporter.

This type of reaction gives USIA experts the chills. They don't blame anyone for enjoying Russian films. But they realize this cultural barrage can lull people into thinking the Soviet hierarchy is more concerned with culture than communism.

The Kremlin is pouring huge sums of money into the red movie program, according to Turner Shelton, chief of the USIA's motion picture service. He estimates Russia is spending approximately 200 million dollars a year on feature films and documentaries.

On the optimistic side, Hollywood films are more than holding their own with Russian films, Shelton reports. And the Soviet emphasis on spectacular films could well be a reaction to "Cinerama," shown successfully last summer at the International Trade Fair in Damascus, Syria.

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African Plans Of Reds Told In U. N. Meet

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., March 14 (AP)—Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., warned today that Soviet Russia has begun an economic penetration of Africa.

Lodge, chief U. S. delegate to the United Nations, returned yesterday from a three-week inspection tour of U. S. and U. N. economic air projects in Libya and the Sudan.

He said he had prepared a report for Washington on the "battle of assistance" with Russia and that he expected to testify before congress on the U. N. technical aid program. "I think the Soviet Union is beginning to establish itself in Africa in a general way," he said.

Competition Cited
"There is a competition in the world as regards economic development. The free world is in that competition. How to meet it without making the people scrap their freedom is a very big question."

Lodge refused to identify the African countries concerned but said he had heard of "a number" that had received and are considering Soviet offers of aid with "strings attached" to the Kremlin.

The "strings," he said, are Russia's insistence that Soviet personnel be assigned to any economic project so they can "work behind the scenes."

Freedom Goes
"The Soviet Union has shown," Lodge said "that when it goes into a place, freedom disappears."

"What we do has no strings. We do not offer the type of assistance we have seen behind the iron curtain."

Lodge said the Kremlin has been offering African countries "things which are desperately needed in most parts of Africa." Among them, he said, he had heard of offers of cement, road materials, farm machinery and hospitals fully equipped and with personnel.

While patrons will spend only half the previous time in line, the machine also saves time and money for the postal department as it eliminates the selection and affixing of stamps.

Church in Jerome to Dedicate Carillonic Bells Palm Sunday

JEROME, March 14—Dedication ceremonies for the carillonic bells being installed at the First Christian church will be held at 8 p.m. March 25, Palm Sunday.

The instrument consists of 25 miniature bell tone generators of bronze bell metal, which are struck by metal hammers, producing exact true bell tones. The bell vibrations are amplified more than 100,000 times. The instrument provides the tonal equivalent of 79,462 pounds of cast bells. The range is G below middle C and G two octaves above.

The bells will be played from a special keyboard located at the grand piano in the church. Selector switches will permit the bells to be heard within the church alone, from the tower alone or together.

The project was proposed in 1951 when then the bells' memorial fund was started. The committee in charge of the fund is composed of Mac Ambrose, chairman, Ruth Adams, Urban Fort, Harold Otto, Grant Reynolds, Mitchell Tomlinson and Elbert Rice.

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Ransom Set To Free Yank From Chinese

HONG KONG, March 14 (AP)—Walter B. Miner, the last American prisoner in Shanghai, will be freed from Communist China in a month, it was reported here today.

Unofficial sources said the U. S. State Department has granted the Chinese government permission to return to the U. S. the \$200,000 in American dollars in Shanghai that the Chinese are holding as a settlement in winding up the affairs of the U. S. companies belonging to the U. S. interests.

Some of the companies have been turned over to the reds. Miner said in a telephone interview today that the U. S. State Department is meeting Communist government officials this afternoon to sign an agreement giving up the Shanghai Post and Mercury.

The agreement has been signed on the other two companies, American Asiatic Underwriters Federation, Inc., and the Underwriters' Guild, Inc., and that the agreement is being signed "very soon."

The progress of negotiations is being reported as "faster than expected."

Miner has been trying to leave China for five years but the reds refused to give him a permit. Since the current Geneva talks began Miner's departure has been held up by Communist demands for settling the affairs of the six companies. The reds wanted that the assets of the companies were less than the liabilities and therefore the owners had to cough up cash in addition.

As soon as all the agreements are signed, Miner said, "I expect a remittance of money to reach the exact amount is not known."

Officials of American Associated Underwriters here declined to disclose the sum. However, Miner said the amount is "about \$200,000."

Miner's departure will leave two Americans at liberty in Shanghai. They are Catholic Bishop James H. Hickey and Mrs. Juanita Huang. Several other Americans are in prison in Shanghai.

Eyewitness Gives Account of Cambodia King's Coronation

PNOM-PENH, Cambodia, March 14 (AP)—Sixty-two Buddhist monks in saffron robes chanted prayers in the throne room of the royal palace of Cambodia to conclude the ceremonies in which King Norodom Suramarit and Queen Kossamak formally ascended the throne of this exotic kingdom.

Gigantic displays of fireworks flashed in the skies every night of the coronation week, illuminating the soaring spires of the magnificent palace with its orange tiled roofs and gilded pagodas on the banks of the broad Mekong river.

The capital's broad, tree-lined boulevards, fronted by stately government buildings and tribunes ablaze with lights at night, were draped in flags and flower garlands. The boulevards were the crowd-

lined routes of a spectacular parade in which the king and queen on golden palanquins beneath glistening silver umbrellas, were preceded by tanks, marching soldiers, sailors, cabinet ministers, brass bands, spear-carrying aborigines, court dancers, silk and velvet festooned elephants and the royal court musicians. They played while borne on a broad-covered litter by red-saronged men in peaked golden helmets.

The splendor of the gorgeously costumed court men in voluminous knee-length breeches beneath stark white coats, with gold epaulettes, jeweled decorations and badges of office far outshone the top-hatted diplomats of the western world in their somber black swallow-tailed coats.

Both groups were in sharp contrast to the monastic simplicity of the yellow-robed monks who presided over all rituals with a corps of Brahmin priests.

These rituals dominated the coronation. Monks administered the final oaths of fidelity heard in the silver pagoda, so named for its floor of solid silver tiles. Enshrined here are solid gold Buddhas encrusted with diamonds, an emerald Buddha on a towering, golden-tiered pagoda, silver Buddha—all sheltered within richly frescoed walls depicting scenes in the life of the Lord Buddha.

The most bizarre note of the coronation day almost went unobserved. This was the ritual of the court astrologer solemnly performing the rites of prediction on the steps leading to the throne room only moments before the king and queen appeared and received lustral waters in a ceremonial bath before a chanting assembly of monks.

Prince Norodom Sihanouk, prime minister and supreme councillor, under whose leadership Cambodia achieved full independence late in 1953, reverently partook in all ceremonies, climaxed by the moment before the throne when he handed the golden crown to his father who then placed it on his own head and mounted the sacred throne.

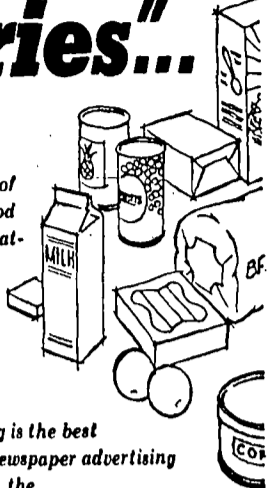

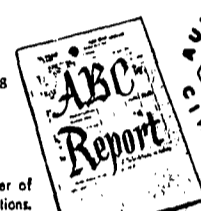

Rebel Leader Urges Battles Be Continued

NICOSSIA, Cyprus, March 14 (AP)—The mysterious leader of Cyprus' Eoka guerrilla organization urged his followers yesterday to intensify the fight against Britain.

Eoka is the underground terrorist army of the Greek Cypriot Enosis (union with Greece) movement.

In the first pamphlets secretly circulated in Nicosia since Archbishop Makarios was exiled to the Seychelles Islands last Friday, "Digenis"—the name adopted by the Eoka leader—promised swift and deadly reprisal against any member of Enosis who might defect to the enemy headed by "galleiter Harding"—Field Marshal Sir John Harding, the British governor.

Strike Grips Isle

Meanwhile virtually the entire island was gripped by a general strike which shut down shops, stores, banks, service establishments and newspapers for the third day.

Scattered demonstrations broke out in Nicosia but they were quickly suppressed by police and riot squads.

At Phaneromeni church, soldiers and police chased Cypriot boys across the roof of the church to halt the ringing of the bell which went on intermittently all morning.

The youngsters were dispersed repeatedly but they came back a half dozen times to sneak into the steeple and set the bells pealing.

Finally police and British troops climbed to the roof in pursuit and stationed a guard in the steeple.

Few Shops Open

Only in the Turkish and Armenian sections of Cyprus' cities were there any shops or other businesses functioning during the strike.

In Athens, where anti-British agitation has reached fever pitch, a four-hour general strike was called for Friday by the Greek General Confederation of Labor in protest against the deportation of Makarios.

Officials said more than 600,000 workers are expected to support the strike. It will be followed by a "Cyprus week" during which labor representatives will undertake to brief all free nations on the Cyprus issue, the confederation said.

Increased Help For India Seen

NEW DELHI, March 14 (AP)—Informed sources said yesterday the United States, in a move to counter the Soviet economic offensive and boost American relations with India, has decided to increase aid to India "substantially."

The sources said that the state department probably would give India a record 70-75 million dollars for economic development during the 1955-57 fiscal year. This would be about 50 per cent higher than the allocation this year.

In addition, the sources added, India next year would get technical assistance of about 10 millions. This is about what she is getting this year.

With India also in a good position to get something from President Eisenhower's special regional fund for Asia, the sources said, total American aid for India could reach 100 million dollars.

Small Toddler, 2, Drowns in Creek

BONNERS FERRY, March 14 (AP)—Ricky Nystrom, 2, who was apparently following his dog, fell into Boundary creek and drowned yesterday afternoon.

The boy's father followed small footprints through the snow and recovered the body of his son from a fishing hole where the creek joins the Kootenai river.

The boy had only been in the water about 10 minutes when found, said Coroner Clarence Callahan.

The family lived at Forthill and was visiting here.

Car Slams Into Antelope Herds

BEND, Ore., March 14 (AP)—A car slammed into a herd of antelope on highway 20 in eastern Oregon's unfenced desert country yesterday, leaving 18 animals dead and dying.

It was believed the greatest such killing in a single accident in Oregon history.

The driver of the car, M. W. Waage, a Bend salesman, was not hurt but his car was badly damaged.

Many of the animals, not killed outright, were dispatched by state police.

Truck Driver Is Hurt in Accident

SNOWVILLE, Utah, March 14 (AP)—A Utah truck driver was injured critically last night in a collision on U. S. highway 30 only a short distance from the Idaho border.

The Utah highway patrol identified him as Jack Atmep, Vernal. He was taken to a hospital in Burley, Ida., and his condition was reported serious.

Russian Ship Scheduled as A-Tests Near

HONOLULU, March 14 (AP)—A Russian freighter is due Friday for a three-day stop at the same time the U. S. air force and navy are stepping up shipments of planes and ships to the forthcoming nuclear tests in the Eniwetok area.

Immigration officials, the coast guard and the FBI all refused comment on whether crew members of the ship, the Jana, will be restricted to the vessel.

The Jana, which recently cleared through the Panama canal, is described as an ancient Liberty ship. She is towing a floating drydock and a fishing trawler.

The Honolulu Star-Bulletin noted the "coincidence of Russian ships showing up in Honolulu nearly every time the U. S. plans an atomic or hydrogen bomb test in the Pacific."

The newspaper said at least four Russian merchant ships arrived in March, 1948, just as the U. S. was sending a task force to Eniwetok.

In 1950 several Russian ships, mostly fishing vessels, went through Honolulu in February, March and April, the Star-Bulletin said.

Musician Union Sustains Firing

HOLLYWOOD, March 14 (AP)—American Federation of Musicians local 47 early today ousted President John Te Groen at a mass meeting which lasted until nearly dawn.

The end of the entire administration of National President James C. Petrillo was repeatedly demanded at the meeting of more than 1,600 members of the local. Te Groen and the five members of a special investigating committee sent here by Petrillo were not present.

The meeting had been declared illegal by the national board of the AFM. The vote to fire Te Groen came at 2:30 a.m. and sustained the action taken Feb. 27 by a "rebel" group which "suspended" Te Groen. Today's action was voted 1,535-51.

The Grange also will sponsor the Red Cross drive north of Shoshone. In charge will be Mrs. Dean Barney, Earl Vinsant and Guy Payton, members of the community service committee for the Grange.

U.S. May Be Embarrassed by Questions During Meeting on Territorial Waters

By United Press

The United States may be asked some embarrassing questions at a conference which starts tomorrow in the West Indies.

Delegates of the 21 American republics will discuss at Ciudad Trujillo, Dominican Republic, the issue of the proper limit of territorial waters. That means the limit to which a country may claim jurisdiction over the waters off its coast.

Chile, Peru, Ecuador and El Salvador formally claim a 200-mile limit. Some other Latin American countries are ready to make the same claim.

The United States refuses to recognize that. It points out that the historic limit is three miles. It admits that the three-mile limit is really outdated in these modern times.

The arguments of the United States seem somewhat weakened by a prohibition-era chicken which has come home to roost.

Back in the late 1700s the United States and Britain agreed on a three-mile limit of territorial waters. That limit was determined by the distance from shore to which cannon fire might extend.

On the principle, in these days of guided missiles—with inter-continental ballistic missiles on the way—a country might claim jurisdiction which would span the Atlantic.

But the United States itself set some precedents, which now may become embarrassing, back in the 1920s.

time. But it wants to set a modest one instead.

The immediate point in dispute is fishing rights. Some Latin American countries are bitter over the activities of big United States fishing fleets off their coasts. They say the fish population is being wiped out.

But some bigger issues have entered into question.

One is that of the "continental shelf," involving the sovereignty over the under-water oil resources off a country's shores. Another—that especially worries the United States—is defense. If a country can claim a 200-mile limit, it asks, could the claim be extended to air rights?

Could a country set a sweeping jurisdiction over the air lanes over the waters?

The prohibition act had come into force, but not into effect. Fleets of fast run-runners started operating off the American coasts.

The United States succeeded in negotiating treaties with Canada, Britain, Cuba, Panama and Mexico setting at 12 miles the limits to which its coast guard cutters might chase a run-runner. Then it got some countries to agree that run-runners flying their flags might be pursued and captured up to one hour's steaming distance from the coast. That, in those days, might have been 30 miles.

Then came the almost forgotten incident of "Im Alone." An enthusiastic coast guard skipper pursued the Canadian registered run runner of that name for 2 1/2 days and sank it 215 miles off the Canadian coast.

It may be hoped that none of the Latin American delegates at Ciudad Trujillo will be mean enough to hark back to those days. But some of them may be tempted to ask the American delegation the difference between the 200-mile limit they want and the 215-miles limit the United States took.

NEW YORK, March 14 (AP)—A beautiful Italian model who has spent eight months touring the world and mingling with wealthy people is back home now with two avocado seeds, a book on chicken farming and her own serene recipe for happiness.

The "excited life" is not for her, Marisa Crespi said. She settled on her "true view" of life after leaving Milan eight months ago as one of four Italian models awarded a round-the-world trip by an Australian department store and women's magazine.

The girls spent six months in Australia and New Zealand and two months in Honolulu, Hollywood and San Francisco before coming here two weeks ago. They modeled Italian fashions and got a big social rush on every stopover.

And yet Marisa came out of it all dreaming of planting avocado trees in her grandmother's garden in Italy and starting a chicken farm in Australia.

The shapely brunette, who wears her dark brown hair in a sleek page boy and paints her mouth with pale pink lipstick, discussed her dreams just before leaving by plane for Paris and Milan. Her English, learned in Australia, shows admirable courage but puzzling grammar.

"When I don't know the verb, I use 'I do,'" Marisa thoughtfully explained as she began. She also makes carefree stabs at English nouns, so that bathing suits come out "suit bath" and night gown becomes "sleep dress."

"First you understand I model for two more years, because it is good way to make much money in little time," she began earnestly. "It is impossible beginning nothing if you have no money."

"But modeling is only good for girl for maybe five years. Better to quit when you still are top. To be successful as model you must have excited life at night too—you must go out and have worldly life. I do not like. I find true view of life after I see so much on this trip."

If the avocado seeds grow in her grandmother's garden in Rappallo, on the Italian Riviera, Marisa will try to start an avocado grove. But ultimately, she wants to return to Australia and start a chicken farm.

"In California I went one day to buy some eggs for a family I met," Marisa said. "I get big crash impression. There is chicken farm near Long Beach. And it is organized every way. Americans organize better than anybody."

"This chicken farm I want to have some day. They have all chickens very young—don't take older chickens. And they have machine that washes eggs and dries them."

The chicken farmer told Marisa she'd need at least \$2,000 to start a chicken farm on. He gave her some "publications" telling how to do it. "I have \$2,000," she said, her eyes sparkling. But she intends to work two more years to save more money and take her family with her to Australia.

"I like really Australia," she said. "Is very simply country — like I think America is 100 years ago. Is no excited life."

Dons Repeat as Top Cage Team in Country

University of San Francisco Dons, unbeaten this season and sporting a gaudy 51-straight record, are the nation's No. 1 college basketball team for the second consecutive year. That was the verdict Tuesday in the final nationwide poll of Associated Press.

San Francisco never let the experts down, for they predicted in a pre-season poll that the Dons were of championship caliber, and they ranked No. 1 in every weekly poll since early December.

The Dons, who were voted No. 1 a year ago and then went on to prove it by coping the NCAA tournament, have another tough journey round ahead of them starting on Friday when they clash with UCLA, Pacific Coast conference champion.

It may be rough going—ask North Carolina State, N. C. State wound up as the nation's No. 2 team on the basis of games through Saturday, March 10. But Monday night, with Ron Shavlik operating with a broken wrist, N. C. State was upset by unranked Canisius in the opening round of the NCAA playoffs at Madison Square garden.

Big Bill Russell, San Francisco all-American, will lead his mates in their NCAA title defense at Corvallis, Ore., Friday, but a main cog of the Dons' machine also is missing. Casey Jones, a four-year veteran, is ineligible for tourney play under NCAA regulations.

The opening NCAA tourney round in New York also saw Temple, the No. 15 club, knock off Holy Cross, voted No. 14.

A total of 132 sports writers and sportscasters cast ballots in the final poll, and San Francisco received 66 first-place votes. On the basis of 10 for first, nine for second, etc., the Dons rolled up 1,161 points. N. C. State had nine votes for first, and 809 points.

Others in the top 10 in order were Dayton, Iowa, Alabama, Louisville, Southern Methodist, UCLA, Kentucky and Illinois. Oklahoma City was 11th, leading off the second 10.

Eleven of the top 20 teams gained the NCAA tournament, while three got into the National Invitation tourney starting in New York Saturday.

In addition to San Francisco and N. C. State, the NCAA tourney ranks include Iowa, Southern Methodist, UCLA, Kentucky, Oklahoma City, Holy Cross, Temple, Utah and West Virginia. NIT teams are Dayton, Louisville and Oklahoma A and M.

Contract Let On Boosters For Satellite

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—Work is starting on a sort of souped-up and complicated Roman candle which will give the earth satellite a final push through space at 18,000 miles an hour.

The "Roman candle" is the third of the other stages. A new one, it is learned, has now been let for the most critical and most critical stage. It was not immediately known who got the award for stage

Project Moves
The mere fact that the award has been made indicates that Project Vanguard—the earth satellite—is moving ahead in reasonably high gear.

The satellite undertaking is the most spectacular phase of the international geophysical year (IGY), a multi-nation effort to gain new knowledge of the earth and its star, the sun.

The hope of IGY scientists is that the first satellite will be shot into orbit some time between July 1 and Sept. 30 next year. The launch will be Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., U. S. test center for experimental missiles.

Operate on Theory
Nobody knows whether that goal can be met. But some of the men working on the project said they are operating on the theory that it will be an initial failure, or even a "we'll try again." There will be technological sacrifices just to meet a target date.

The navy, in charge of Project Vanguard, has assigned to the Maryland, has assigned to the job of getting the satellite launcher ready. Subcontracts for the first and second rockets were awarded to General Electric company and Aero-General corporation of Azusa, Calif.

The navy itself is building the satellite. The American IGY committee said recently the satellite will be an instrument-packed ball 30 inches in diameter. That is wrong. It will be only about 20 inches across. It will weigh about 200 pounds.

Pay Hiked
BOISE, March 14 (AP)—The Boise school board voted Monday to adopt a new salary schedule giving teachers an increase of \$120 a year for a 3-year period and an increase according to teaching experience.

C. DeBeumont, school superintendent, said adoption of the schedule would help bring teachers' salaries in Boise to a level of salaries in other districts of similar size in the area.

Icebreaker Sails For Home as 93 Men Begin Vigil

ABOARD USS GLACIER (via navy radio—delayed), March 9 (AP)—This navy icebreaker steamed eastward toward Little America and home today, leaving behind 93 lonely Antarctic pioneers.

They are the Americans who volunteered to spend six months of seclusion in the barren Antarctic to continue preparations for the first U. S. base at the geographic South Pole.

They will live in four months of darkness between now and October in a land where the wind frequently blows more than 100 miles an hour and temperatures drop to 70 degrees below zero.

Their frost isolation will not be broken until the first airplane arrives to begin the second phase of Operation Deepfreeze.

Rear Adm. George Dufek, commander of the operation, said farewell to the group of Antarctic pioneers in the camp messhall shortly before the Glacier sailed from the base at McMurdo sound.

The group is composed of 13 navy officers, 78 enlisted men and two civilians, headed by Lieut. Cmdr. David Canham, Detroit.

Wool Producers Told of Deadline

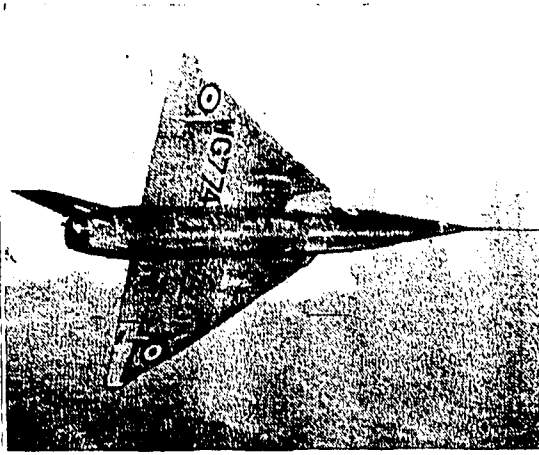

The American Sheep Producers council said payments would be made on all wool and lamb for which final settlement was made during the marketing year April 1, 1955, through March 31, 1956. No wool shorn before Jan. 1 of last year will be covered.

Soviets Admit Slain Official Was Innocent

NEW YORK, March 14 (A) — A well informed foreign diplomatic source says topmost Soviet leaders have admitted that executed Marshal Mikhail Tukhachevsky was innocent.

Tukhachevsky was shot during Stalin's great purge in June, 1937, after he and seven other outstanding red army leaders were convicted of treason at a closed one day court-martial. Subsequently most of Tukhachevsky's judges were also shot.

It was the Tukhachevsky trial which set the stage for Stalin's big purge of red army officers in which thousands were executed.

The reported acknowledgement of Tukhachevsky's innocence was made by Nikita Khrushchev and Nikolai Bulganin to a high ranking foreign dignitary some months ago.

The Tukhachevsky case shocked the Soviet Union and the outside world in 1937. The Soviet marshal, who had been a hero of the Soviet Civil war in 1918-20, was a deputy commander for war until a month before his execution. He was the highest ranking career officer of the Soviet Union and had great prestige inside and outside the USSR.

Conspiracy Charged
He was accused of conspiring with foreign powers—including Nazi Germany.

At the recent 20th party congress, First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan admitted some communist leaders of the Civil war period were later wrongly accused as enemies of the people. This seemed to indicate that at least some of the most prominent of the victims of Stalin's great purge would be publicly rehabilitated. Some, including Hungarian revolutionary leader Bela Kun, already have been. Tukhachevsky may be on this list, too.
