### Plans Made on Speedier Type Of Warplanes

LOS ANGELES, March 17 (AP)—A chief official of the air force today indicated that a new type of bomber is being designed to replace the B-29 Superfortress as an eventual successor to the B-50 heavy jet bomber now going into service.

Mr. Ogilby also said that the development of an intercontinental ballistic missile will require many ways that will be more difficult than those that are now being developed for the B-50.

He predicted in a speech prepared for the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Alumni association here that the next 10 years will see development of combat aircraft that take off and land vertically.

He also forecast nuclear-powered bombers that will have "essentially no tail" and "no wings."

But he said there probably will not be nuclear-powered bombers because of the difficulty of handling and shielding them.

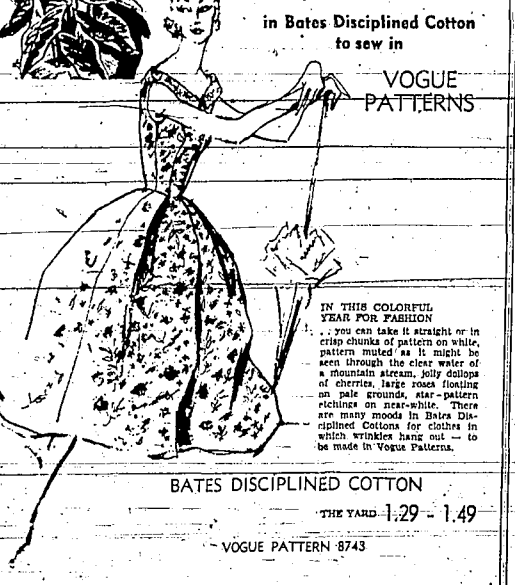

## Evidence of Early Man Is Sought by Archaeologists With Pipeline Project

When the natural gas pipeline is installed through Magie Valley from Bull to Deale, it may aid scientists in determining how long ago early man arrived in the Northwest. If the pipeline is completed next fall, it will have immeasurably to a geologist's knowledge. It may have shed light on the activities of man in the Northwest 10,000 years ago.

The 1,487-mile route from the Southwest to the Canadian border crosses the cradle of prehistoric man.

### Noted Woman Scientist Dies

PARIS, March 11 (AP)—Irene Joliot-Curie, Nobel prize-winning discoverer of artificial radioactivity, died in a hospital here last night. She was 68 years old.

Madame Joliot-Curie was the famous daughter of famous parents, Marie and Pierre Curie, discoverers of radium.

She became one of the most noted woman scientists of her time but was refused membership in the American Chemical Society in 1953 because of her pro-communist leanings.

She and her husband, Jean Frederic Joliot, won the Nobel Prize in chemistry in 1935 for their discovery of this new form of artificial radioactivity. They both became involved in lelling activities, though, and the French government, dropped him from its atomic energy commission in 1950 and her in 1951.

Magie Valley excavations may further the scientific investigations. Because of the cooperation and financial assistance given by Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation, the project is being completed. Discoveries expanding scientific knowledge of ancient civilizations are being made. Archaeologists are working alongside pipeline surveyors, leveling the land for surface existence of underlying relic, and inspecting every foot of the trench in which the pipe is being laid.

This scientific work is under the direction of Dr. Jesse Nusbaum, senior archaeologist for the department of Interior. Dr. Nusbaum, whose home in Santa Fe bears the remnants of a lifetime devoted to the study of the past, is in charge of a field crew of archaeologists that includes Albert Mohr, Alan Bryan, Robert Roberts, and Donald Touhy from the University of Washington; Richard Forbes, an archaeologist from Mossouth, Mont.; is surveying the Spokane stretch.

Dr. Douglas Osborne, curator of anthropology of the Washington State museum at the University of Washington is cooperating closely with Nusbaum for exploration in Washington. What do they hope to find? Dr. Osborne has traced evidence of early man dating back 10,000 years. The pipeline is the dragnet which may solve the Northwest's oldest mystery.

"Over all the world, early man used rivers as lowland highways and fords and the Columbia, important to our own industrial civilization, was vital to early man. It may have been one avenue of entry for the ancestors of the American Indian if it is true, as one theory has it, they came from Asia over a dry-land bridge now represented by the Alaskan isthmus.

Along the Columbia and Yakima rivers are areas to which Indians have come for centuries generations. The bottom cultural level at those sites may fill many gaps in the scientific knowledge of early man in the Northwest. The pipeline project is seen by Dr. Nusbaum as an opportunity for archaeologists to explore, distances no amount of hand digging could ever uncover.

"One important site which may have yielded many years for discovery but for the pipeline work, was found in Oregon, on schedule-12, a 23-mile construction spread between near Powder valley, and terminating just beyond the Columbia river crossing near Umatilla.

It is a large quarry site where, apparently, ancient hunters and warriors came for raw material to make into stone weapons. It extends for two and a half miles along the right of a mile and a half wide, into the Six Mile cattle ranch, 15 miles south of La Grande, Ore.

"Thousands of prehistoric chipped stone cores and many crudely shaped and apparently unfinished artifacts were found strewn among water-washed boulders of fine-grained basalt over all the valley floor. Large percursor "chipped" stone (chipped blades) many apparently broken in manufacture, and bludge "blanks" from five to 12 inches long are common.

At one edge of the site, distinctive small points of basalt and obsidian material, not found at the quarry, apparently indicate that a different group occupied the area. Did invaders come to drive off the local inhabitants? Perhaps the answer to that and many other questions lies somewhere in the area's cultural level which extends from two to three and a half feet below the surface. Unquestionably, a lot of hard work was done on the spot centuries before the rolling pipelines came along.

In southern Idaho, the pipeline right-of-way was a hunting area not populated thickly or permanently. Small chipping locations, occasional fire hearths and whole or broken projectile were found widely scattered to support the hunting-ground theory.

"We are hoping to find some early things along the Snake river," Dr. Nusbaum said, "there are large areas

in southern Idaho that have never been properly explored."

Two large sites off the pipeline right of way near Glenna Perry were given a surface search. Five projectile points were found, one later identified as an Anasazi point, and two as Mexican points first recognized in the northern great plain at sites which have been dated at 2000-3000 B.C. and 3000-1000 B.C. Exploration of those sites will have to wait, for the archaeologists must keep actively in step with the pipeline construction program.

Through the Rocky mountain area north of the San Juan basin, the pipeline traverses terrain which early man probably avoided except for an occasional hunting foray.

The most numerous and valuable finds to date along the pipeline route have been made in the vicinity of Cortez, Colo., near Mesa Verde national park, and in the San Juan basin, long known to be an eye rich in archaeological data. At one point, 10 ruins were uncovered in a space of 10 miles and 34 sites were discovered near compressor station number one at Ignacio, Colo.

Several "Jeep" loads of artifacts found at the sites have been taken to Mesa Verde park where they are being cleaned, photographed and studied by Mohr during the winter months in an attempt at interpretation.

Each ruin as it is uncovered is examined carefully, the location of skeletons and artifacts recorded for future reference, and excavated material prepared for removal to a museum, where eventually it will be made available for public view.

Field workers send in weekly progress reports to Dr. Nusbaum in Santa Fe, outlining what they have found. Mohr, in one report to Dr. Nusbaum, recorded these activities:

"Six days were spent excavating a pit house at Snake 220, which had been cut through by the trencher. Two laborers were used on five of

those days (70 man hours). The house measured 24 by 20 feet and the floor was about 100 feet below the surface. The house had two small pits above the floor, two bottle-shaped storage pits in the floor and a fire pit. The house had been burned so that besides the usual central and peripheral post holes, considerable wall were obtained from the charred remains of the roof. The house also produced four red-slipped pottery vessels, a number of metal and metal, a bone awl, a tear-shaped point, a bird skeleton and a probable dog skeleton. A wall was continued while pipe was laid and welded over the pit so as not to delay."

"Walls and skeletons are the lower and upper stories used by ancient people to grind corn, Dr. Nusbaum says, "and were obtained from whom the culture has been dated at 1700 A. D. It is as real as if they were all with us, explaining that the pueblo people were primitive secretary farmers, growers of corn, beans and squash. They were known, he says, as the "Anasazi," the little old people—whose existence is recorded today for the passing tourist in the ruins of Mesa Verde. But as the Pueblo people in public museums nationwide, Archaeology is a science requiring the desire of archaeologists to give close attention to details in the design of an ancient way of life.

"The radiocarbon dating method which measures the amount of radioactivity remaining in a material enables archaeologists now to determine the age of an artifact with remarkable accuracy."

### Genetic Evils For A-Attack Cited at Meet

**WASHINGTON, March 11 (UP)** — A government scientist said yesterday a widespread nuclear bomb attack on the United States would cause catastrophic changes in human heredity and factors from which there would be no recovery.

A stark picture of the effects of nuclear radiation on the human race was presented by Dr. Lauriston S. Taylor, chief of the atomic health standards. He said he has taken into consideration opinions of experts, but is not a geneticist himself.

"The effects of radiation would be no recovery" genetically from radiation effects if 50 or more U. S. population centers were struck by bombs of one to five megaton power. A megaton equals 1,000,000 tons of TNT.

"In the event of an attack of this size, it would constitute a genetic catastrophe. There is no doubt about it," he said.

### Iowa Seashells Go Into Jewelry

### Magic Valley Hobbies No. 12 Resident of Hansen Acquired Seashell Jewelry Hobby During 1948 Iowa Visit

**HANSEN, March 11** — Mrs. Truman Rathbun went the wrong way to find a hobby. Instead of going to the seashore in 1948, she went to Iowa to visit a sister and came home with a hobby of making jewelry from seashells. Continuing in the wrong direction, she usually sends to Iowa when she needs more shells.

But the source of supply of her raw material is immaterial. The finished products are the pink and ear-riety many of her friends wear with pride. She makes her own designs most of the time but, on occasion, will make up particular pieces of jewelry described to her by friends.

The shells she uses come in all sizes and colors. She has one called teardrop. One variety is called like a teardrop. The work is tedious and requires considerable patience.

With tweezers in each hand, Mrs. Rathbun snips a piece of twine on a celluloid backing previously cut out into the design she has in mind for the finished product.

Starting from the center, the Hansen woman applies a little plastic, called acrylic glue to the backing. Using the tweezers, she sets the shells in the glue, holding them in place until the glue hardens enough to hold the shell and then moves to the next shell.

The limits of one's imagination are the limits of the designs possible. The many colored shells can be combined into countless arrangements and can be "built" on top of or around other shells to give a variety of designs.

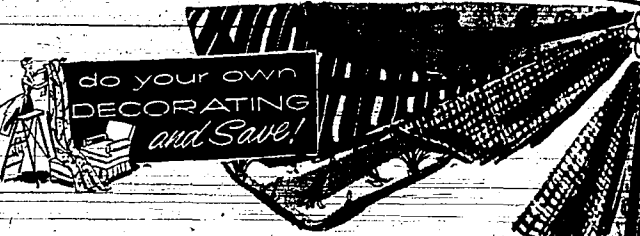
In the case of earrings, the two pieces have to be built exactly alike. Mrs. Rathbun says it takes approximately 25 minutes to make one small piece of jewelry.

After a piece of jewelry has been completed, Mrs. Rathbun fastens a clip to the underside. A double application of glue usually is necessary for this step so the clip will be able to carry the weight of the jewelry without coming loose.

Like many other hobbyists, Mrs. Rathbun has more than one hobby. One that is comparable to jewelry from seashells is quilting. Her greatest undertaking in this field is the matching curtains and neckties worn by members of the Book and Bippers dance club. They match the seashell room and appear identical on the black square danced dresses of the 18 women members of the club. She and her husband are members of the club.

She does textile painting when she isn't busy at another hobby and can turn an article, hand to a very practical task, that of decorating cakes.

Mrs. Rathbun has time for other activities, too. She has been superintendent of the Hansen Community church primary Sunday school and

### Tariff Boosts Ordered for Canned Tuna

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt today ordered a higher tariff duty on canned tuna fish to be imposed in lieu of the 12 1/2 per cent duty which will expire April 1.

The White House said the President's proclamation would double the duty to 25 per cent when imports exceed 20 per cent of the previous year's U.S. pack of all varieties of tuna.

The higher duty would remain in effect only for the remainder of this year.

One-quarter of this year already is past, the 1934 base percentage of imports will be 15 per cent of the 1933 pack. This means the higher tariff will be imposed when and if imports after April 1 exceed 15 per cent of last year's domestic pack.

West coast fishermen here have sought a 15 per cent increase of grounds tuna imports were eroding them out of the domestic market.

The White House said Mr. Roosevelt's action—taken under the authority of the 1930 tariff act—was in response to a request from the United States received the night of the 15th of March.

### Weather Wrecks havoc With State Roads in Magic Valley

SHOSHONE, March 17 (AP)—Magic Valley's highways are not in the best condition—beaten, buckled and broken in the aftermath of a severe winter.

The state highway department's 30-man district crew is working on "stopgap" repairs until weather will permit more permanent construction.

H. Cairns, district engineer, reported Saturday.

Of the 997 miles of state highways in the district, more than 100 miles are broken seriously, he said. The state department gauges the road on the basis of 100 and any rated at 50 or below are in immediate need of improvement, he explained.

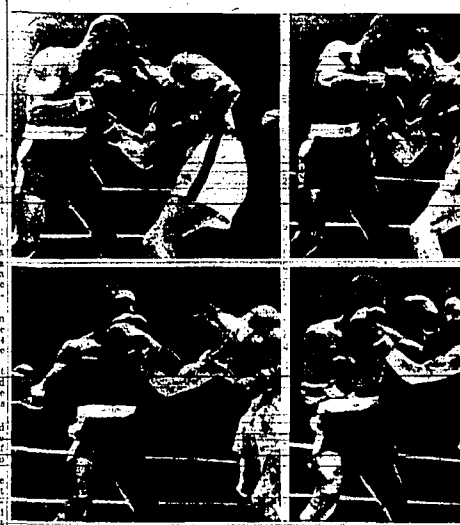

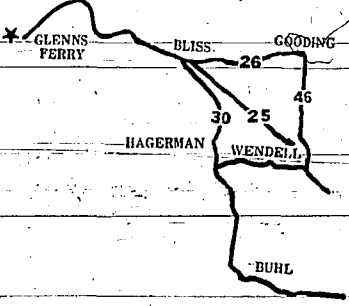
## Glenns Ferry Stands Today at Site of Oregon Trail Crossing of Snake

That dust and thirst, always a bane to emigrants on the Oregon trail, were especially vicious as the train blundered, creaked and groaned across the desert between the river and Snake river in southern Idaho.  
More than 100 waterless miles, and humans awaited in the dust clouds of dust. The individuals joined and mingled, being a tan cloud that hovered and settled on great stunted bodies of the desert into the lungs.  
The crossing was tortuous, made so by the thoughts of sons of the back turn of a wheel, each step a fresh water cascading close at hand through the deep Snake river. The walls of the canyon were steep the scoured water, plainly but inaccessible, often means a waded, block frequently would impede for water and plunge to death into the canyon.  
The crossing of the Snake, therefore, became a goal in itself. There ensued by the day to the "islands" where the trains lay over from the south to the north side of the river. Emigrants met but once beyond the island crossing at what is now

A monument on the north side of the road marks the approximate location of the crossing and from it the river and the three islands used in the crossing can be seen on the south side of the road.  
Even when the crossings were orderly they many times were not negotiated without an accident of some type. What the emigrants tried to do was to wade the various teams and wagons together in long lines, weakest teams in the middle. Then a horse with a rope would swim his way across the river. Other horsemen would follow, using the ropes as a guide. When enough men and horses were across the teams and wagons would start across, men and beasts on the north side bending their backs into the chore of getting the others safely across.  
The emigrants often blocked up wagon beds to give them buoyancy so they would float. Oftentimes hostile Indians would lie in wait on the north side of the river until all the emigrants were engaged in getting the wagons across and then swoop down for a surprise attack.  
Despite the hazards of the trail thousands of emigrants used both during the years the United States was on the move. The first wagon train to use the crossing arrived in 1842 and was composed of approximately 1,000 men, women and children. One of the largest emigrant trains crossed in the following year. That it said to have contained 4,000 persons and 250 wagons. The train

attached out for more than four miles.  
Deaths were frequent along the trail to Oregon and the crossing at Glenns Ferry had more than 100 deaths. The first person to die at the crossing was a Mrs. Bager, a member of the largest train to use the crossing. She was buried near the crossing.  
In later years a ferry was established at the crossing. Nicknamed "Ballou's Creek," the ferry was known as the Mountain Home station. Later Glenns Ferry was named in honor of Gus Glenn who operated the ferry in the 1880s.

### Warning Told For Increases Of Diphtheria

WASHINGTON, March 10 — The U.S. public health service warned parents yesterday to make sure their children are fully protected against diphtheria.

Critically ill—they are—frankly worried about the way the disease has flared up recently in a number of states. They fear it may spread to other areas if steps are not taken to check it.

"The situation could be dangerous," Dr. D. G. Duett said. "It suggests many children haven't been getting their diphtheria shots the way they should and that many adults have lost their immunity."

"Steps" Urged  
The health service urged parents to see to it that their children get at least four diphtheria shots before they enter school, at least two injections—about a month apart—should be given in the third or fourth month of life.

The child should receive at least one booster shot at about 18 months of age. The booster should be given at school. Some authorities also recommend continuing the booster to maintain a high level of immunity through high school.

The health service said adults would be well advised to check their immunity, too. It said adults have figured in nearly half the recent cases in the northern states where natural immunity to the disease appears to have diminished substantially.

Increases Seen  
For the past decade or so, the number of cases of diphtheria dropped sharply each year. But in 1955 there were almost as many cases as in 1954. And in the last half of the year there was a nine per cent increase.

There is presently an epidemic in and around Michigan City, Ind. And there have been sharp outbreaks in California, Kentucky and Ohio, Alabama, South Carolina and Georgia.

Diphtheria is caused by a germ which releases a poison in the body. It causes a sore throat, fever, and—in severe cases—paralysis and suffocation. Between five and 10 per cent of the victims die.

Under the original provisions of the youth rehabilitation law the state board of health had to approve the release of a youngster believed ready to leave the St. Anthony school, Butler said.

"This could mean that a youth, judged ready for release by the school staff and by the youth rehabilitation officer, might have to remain in detention at the school for several weeks until a regular board meeting is held."

"Under the present plan, the youth's release from detention can be ordered by myself and Mr. J. J. Brown, acting for the board of health as secretary," L. J. Peterson is Idaho health director and secretary of the state board of health.

Butler explained that the health board has responsibility for the release of youngsters committed after July 1, 1955, when the youth rehabilitation act went into effect, and the state board of education for youngsters committed before that date.

Procedures followed by both boards are quite similar he said, involving a careful analysis of the student by school officials.

Butler said the new law enables a youth rehabilitation officer to evaluate each case and facilitate rehabilitation of the youngsters after they leave the school.

### Conveyor Belts Eyed for Autos

**LOS ANGELES, March 17**—A series of conveyor belts carrying auto passenger cars some 15 feet above street level is proposed as a solution to the city's transportation problem in congested downtown areas.

The system was described by Architect Samuel Lundin to the citizens traffic and transportation committee.

Cars would leave a station every three seconds, moving as many as 14,000 persons an hour, Lundin said.

### Roster Expected For Guard's Unit

**BOISE, March 17**—The 123rd transportation battalion of the Idaho army national guard is expected to be the first of the state's guard units to reach 100 per cent strength.

Major Gen. John Walsh, adjutant general, said today.

He said three of the battalion's four units have reached full strength and the fourth is expected to do so.

Headquarters of the 123rd transportation company at Emmett both reached the top in February.

Battalion headquarters at Hampe also is up to allotted strength.
