New Plan Presented To Russia

LONDON, March 22 (AP)—A plan to place years of delay about disarmament with the United States wants 40,000 to 60,000 miles of Russian territory and American territory opened to American arms inspection.

The U. S. proposal for preliminary tests of disarmament controls was made today at a meeting of a committee of the five big powers.

The committee, which resumed sessions here this week, is the plan in line with U. S. proposals in the Geneva talks.

The committee is expected to make a final report to the United Nations in the next few weeks.

The U. S. proposal called for a five-year period of disarmament controls. It is aimed at a comprehensive control of controlled arms reduction and a general control of all arms.

The committee delegates referred to American plan to their governments. It may not be taken up again.

The U. S. proposal came a few days before officials here and in Moscow announced that the U. S. has launched a new series of atomic tests. There were no tests in the last 18 months, but presumably they will be in a deserted area of Alaska.

The U. S. pilot plan for testing disarmament controls was presented at a meeting of the five big powers in London on March 21.

The committee is expected to make a final report to the United Nations in the next few weeks.

Special Buys Are Cited for Turkey, Ham

Best food buys already appearing for the Easter holiday include turkey and ham—at special prices this week-end.

One choice is bringing over-sized turkeys down to 50 cents a pound, and plans to keep the birds at that price through next week. Chickens are also offered at special prices.

Ham has been less frequently a special this week-end but there are some attractive specials offering it a week ahead of the Easter feast.

Pork, which has been the mainstay of the low-priced meat market in recent months, moved a little higher this week. It is still generally higher, however, and some cuts are still featured at special prices throughout the country. Whole hams this week are a little higher.

Meat prices are steady this week, but choice cuts are among specials offered for the week-end. First ribs are a good buy. Each cut is a shade higher on some wholesale markets, but so far there has been little increase in the retail level, much to the satisfaction of housewives who find it a welcome change.

Other vegetable buys include asparagus and endive, beans, cabbage, carrots, parsnip celery and potatoes. In the West, however, shoppers may notice some irregularity in the condition of leafy vegetables in some areas, principally by shipping delays in grow states that buried the crops early in the week.

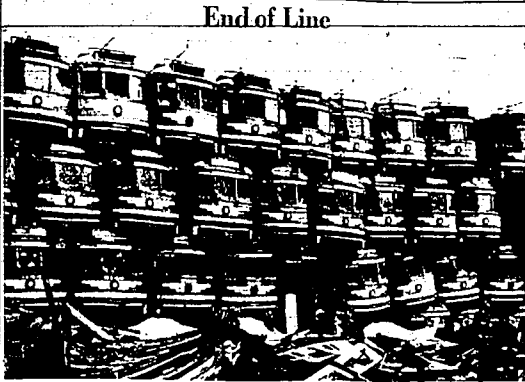
Frost said that since the end of World War II, the army and navy have positions of operation of all major terminals on all coasts, and that they should be responsible for their own maintenance.

U.S. Weather Bureau Agrees To List 26 Names for Storms

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—"Frankly," a bureau spokesman says, "we are not answering all bureau bulletins." This year it will have a hurricane name for each of the 26 letters of the alphabet.

The bureau never has had that many names in any one hurricane season. The greatest number of hurricanes in any year was 11, listed in 1954. The average is five. Of last year's 13 tropical storms, 10 reached hurricane force.

So in the past when it put only some 21 names on its annual list, skipping the hard letters, the bureau figured it was being more than fair-handed.

Why 26 this year? Do the following "extension" names mean a super crop of hurricanes in 1956?

No they don't. They don't mean what the sea will bring forth. It's the kids' names ever try to tell the bureau the kids of America don't learn their A-Z's.

Every year the bureau receives hundreds of letters from school children all over the country offering suggestions for hurricane names.

Didn't anyone ever tell you there are 26 letters in the alphabet or did you just forget or couldn't you think of any names starting with Q ... ?

"Frankly," a bureau spokesman says, "we are not answering all those letters. We are in."

So this year a alphabetical list of 26 names. Here they are:

Anna, Bloss, Carla, Dora, Ethel, George, Gloria, Hilda, Irene, Judith, Kitty, Lora, Moby, Nona, Odette, Paul, Quentin, Rhonda, Sadie, Teresa, Ursula, Verna, Wanda, Xina, Yola, and Zenia.

It takes more daring to complete such a list than you might think. None is spelt-out-the-moment counter, not even Quincy or Xina (pronounced "Zena").

By time-tested custom the names are those of girls. For various reasons—this is clearly why, and making no comment—they must have two syllables and four, five or six letters. Most not have been used before in the Atlantic or Gulf of Mexico and must be different from the names used in the Pacific for typhoons.

Backlogs for the name-pickers there is a lot of source material—such as books of names published to help "reputable" parents.

There is another pool of possible names. But before mentioning it, the weather bureau wants one thing understood: It never, never makes

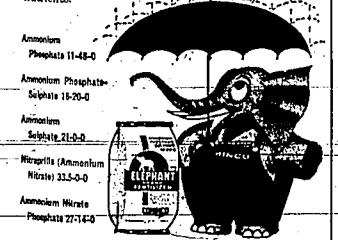

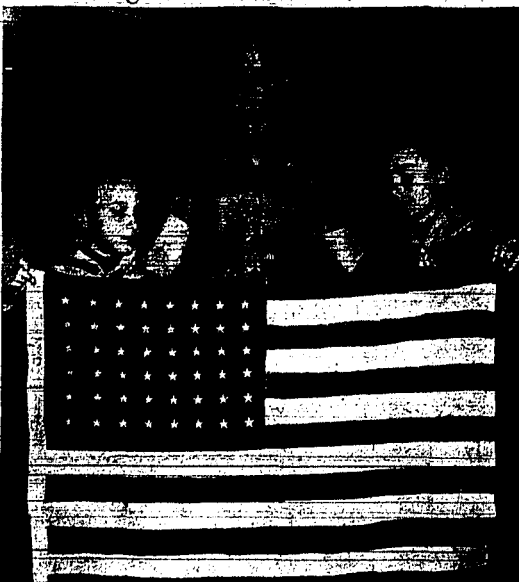

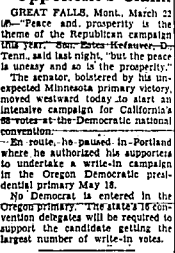
Kefauver Attacks Opponent's Claim

No Democrat is entered in the Oregon primary. The state's 15 convention delegates will be required to support the candidate getting the largest number of write-in votes.

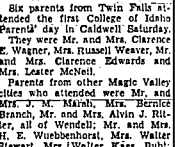

Have to have the paws for it, too. The nails must be straight. And "paterna," whatever they are, must be strong. The old dog army is popular with the army brass—and may as well retain them to producing recruits.

Mostly the army is looking for the ideal male. There are a bunch of things you must do right before he puts his paw mark on a blank sheet that sounds like this:

The requirements state, "working type, revealing evidence of power, endurance, and energy. Head—large, strong, body, good bone, deep chest. Good teeth, healthy gums. Tail must be bushy and held in a high position. Must be alert and steady of paw and responsive to command."

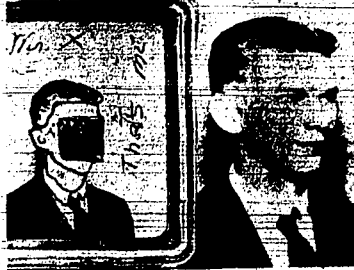

Stevenson admitted he is not the front-runner in the nomination race and faces an uphill battle to overcome Sen. James Eastman's Minnesota victory.

Stevenson conceded Dewey "the first round," but insisted he isn't beaten yet. He pointed out that the Democratic polled a 2-to-1 heavy vote than the Republicans and said, "If anyone should be worried, it should be even more worried than I."

The Illinois based his comeback hopes on victories over Dewey in the May 29 Florida primary and the June 8 California primary. He admitted all hope would be lost if Dewey won both of these.

Official Says Multi-Missile Is Developed

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Secretary of Defense A. Quaresima announced yesterday that the air force is developing not one but two types of "intercontinental ballistic missiles."

He also disclosed that the air force has a 1,000-mile mid-range ballistic missile under development.

Quaresima said the United States is ahead of the Soviets in the guided missile race as a whole. But he pointed out that the Russians have exceeded the ballistic line and we could not be surprised to find close competition in this field.

Quaresima reported "some of the new weapons" under air force development in a speech before the Washington chapter of the Aviation Writers association.

Maneuver Confirmed

For the first time, Quaresima confirmed that in addition to the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile the air force has a second version of the missile he called the Titan. He named the service's 1,000-mile range missile as the Titan. It was the first official acknowledgment of the existence of the missile, he said.

Quaresima said it has been under development "for a number of years" by Convair Corporation, San Diego, Calif., The Denver, Colo., plant of the Titan is the first of the Titan which is developing parts. Ballistic missiles are developing parts which will use many parts of the Atlas.

This plan enables us to conduct simultaneous development of two intercontinental missiles representing different technical approaches at an estimated cost of only 10 percent over the cost of developing a single missile, he said.

Develops Thor

Douglas Aircraft company, Santa Monica, Calif., is developing the Thor missile designed for similar reasons to that of the mid-range version under development by the Army and Navy at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala.

While ballistic missiles are important arms being developed at the highest priority, Quaresima said, there is no reason to call them "ultimate weapons."

In fact, he said, the air force today puts "primary reliance" on manned bombers and has a "strong program" under way for development of successors to the new B-52 heavy bomber.

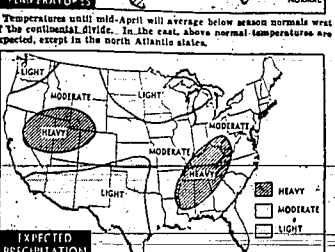
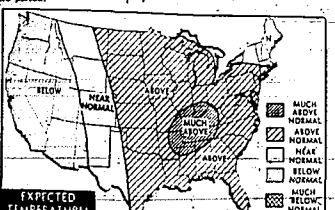

New Rockets Will Be Used For Satellites

BALTIMORE, March 22 (AP)—The public got its first description of the rockets expected to roam outer space and give the earth its first man-made moon: It's a skinny missile—without fins—and appears to more imposing than a huge rifle cartridge.

The Martin company said its history-making Vanguard will be the "fast liquid fuel rocket" designed to be controlled "without the use of fins."

The weight of the tiny moon to be delivered into space by the three-stage Vanguard has not yet been fixed. Estimates have ranged from 20 to 50 pounds.

Martin company's Atlas rocket will be guided by the power plant which is to be installed on a similar or simplified, making possible directional changes in the stream of gases—surging from—the rocket's stern.

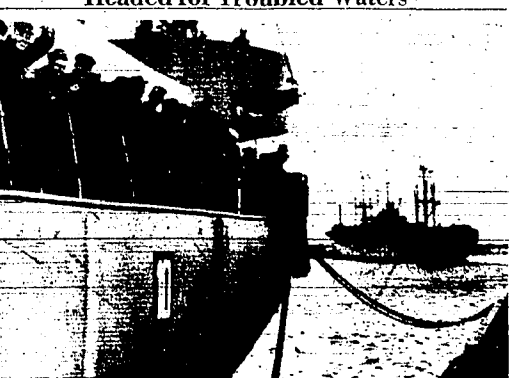

Survey Reveals Heavy Waste For Cut Timber Through U. S.

About one-fourth of all the timber cut in this country is wasted, according to the nationwide timber survey compiled by the U. S. Forest Service.

Charles I. Daugherty, Sawtooth forest manager, reports this survey is being reviewed by the forest ranger and staff officers Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

The report estimates that 30 billion cubic feet of timber in the United States and coastal Alaska. Of that total about three-fourths of 270 billion cubic feet is suitable timber and the remainder is pole size trees.

A little over half of the nation's standing timber volume is privately owned. The volume is privately being reviewed by the forest ranger and staff officers Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

The report estimates that 30 billion cubic feet of timber in the United States and coastal Alaska. Of that total about three-fourths of 270 billion cubic feet is suitable timber and the remainder is pole size trees.

Daugherty says the report is designed to help forest resource management and use with the existing needs.

The timber survey points out that the nation has 115 million acres of unstocked or greatly understocked forest land and more than 30 million acres will require planting if they are going to produce timber within a reasonable time.

There is no excess of forest land, and any substantial reductions in acreage devoted to timber crops can adversely affect future needs.

Also, the report notes the quality of timber is declining as the virgin lands are harvested and more insects, tree diseases and fire continue to deplete the forests at an alarming rate, annually killing an amount equal to one-fourth of the yearly growth.

Greater utilization of the timber harvested and the reduction of mill and logging residue will stretch the national "woodpile," the report continues.

Greatest possibilities, the report indicates, for adding permanently to the nation's timber supply, will be to improve the stocking on commercial forest land, especially the land in small ownership in the south, which are now understocked.

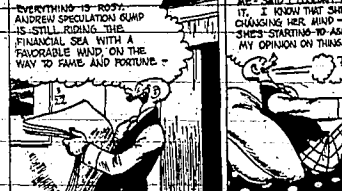

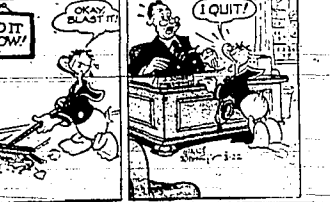

Delay Is Due On Israel Bid To Buy Arms

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—"American" request for United States arms in the Middle East was likely to postpone again a decision on Israel's request for \$4 million dollars worth of arms. Diplomatic experts said that taking a dispute to the United Nations will put the Soviet bloc, which has supplied Egypt with weapons and has been increasingly pro-Arab, in the spot. They said Russia must first decide whether to go along with any U. S. "peace plan" that might be worked out or veto it. The United States formally called on the U. N. security council to take "urgent and early action" in the developing Arab-Israeli dispute. The U. S. request gave no indication of what action it wanted by the United Nations, but officials said President Roosevelt thinks the security council should investigate "the dispute and recom-

mend steps to keep the peace. One possible U. N. action the United States was understood to favor was increasing the manpower and of giving greater mobility to the U. N. truce observation team patrolling borders between Israel and her Arab neighbors. Administration officials considered it unlikely that the United States would give a final "yes" or "no" answer on Israel's arms request while the U. N. is considering the Middle East problem. They recalled that Israel's request was put on ice earlier when the Jewish state was for its December attack on Syria.
