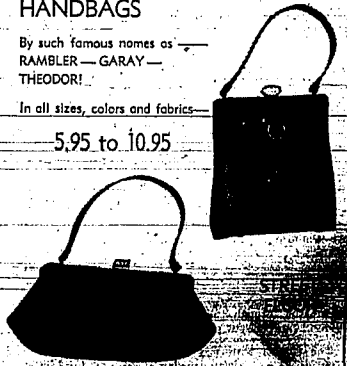

Japan's Bids To Halt Tests

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—The United States has rejected a Japanese plea to suspend atomic tests in the Pacific. It said the tests are vital to defense of the free world.

In a formal note delivered to the Japanese embassy here last Monday, the state department said "the possession and competence in the use of nuclear weapons by leading nations of the free world are the basis of deterrence to aggression and peace."

The note, received last night, also rejected a Japanese request for "adequate assurance the United States would pay for any damage or loss to Japanese shipping or fishing."

"However, it said this country would give further consideration to the issue if any official evidence is received after the tests of nuclear atomic weapons are made by Japan or any other people."

In Tokyo the Japanese foreign office said the rejection was another indication of the United States' attitude that adequate precautions should be taken against atomic tests.

The United States fails to take adequate precautions against atomic tests, according to a report of the American Peace Society.

Court Appeal Is Slated for Boycott Case

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 24.—Three attorneys said today they would fight the case of a midwestern Negro minister charged with conspiring to boycott Montgomery city buses all the way to the U. S. supreme court.

Central judge Burnie Carter yesterday convicted the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., of obstructing a city's transportation by leading a boycott which has crippled the city's main company for more than 15 weeks.

Carter ordered the accused leader to pay \$10,000 in fines or court costs or serve 30 days hard labor under a little-used statute making it a misdemeanor to enter a contract to boycott a business.

The judge announced it would be the decision to the Alabama court of appeals, and the state of other Negro demonstrators and health charges were ordered continued until final disposition of King's appeal.

Young Fred King, who led King's force, said he would fight the decision "by way to the U. S. supreme court if necessary." He said a very few King was indicted by a grand jury.

The boycott, which started Dec. 1, led to the arrest and conviction of a Negro seamstress who refused to work for a city "Jim Crow" bus, and the bus company to increase fares and eliminate a number of the "segregated" company. The boycott on Negroes for more than 15 weeks.

The next thing you know, the scientists and engineers won't work out the means of transportation — and you'll find that all that talk about the moon is just a pipe dream — but what are the inhabitants of those planets going to do? How are they going to take up their rights on their homeland?

Remember, no one knows for sure that there aren't any people on the satellites and the planets; those of us down here on earth just think they are uninhabited. They could be alive with people and those people could very well be cantankerous cusses who want no part of us.

The Mount Palomar telescope has disclosed even so much as one on the moon. It could be that the people up there are perfectly satisfied just to let their hair grow and grow. What are they going to say when they have to start paying a buck and a half, plus tip, to get their hair trimmed? It could result in a riotous rebellion.

Some of our prices are likely to shock them into madness, too. What is going to be the reaction of the first Moonster when he patronizes a drive-in and is charged forty-five cents for a peanut butter sandwich? Even using moon arithmetic, which is rather faulty, he will be able to figure out the immense profit his body is making on a loaf of bread and a jar of peanut butter. It's a mental pinch, too, that the first man who takes a look at the shoe and finds it doesn't have enough leather in it to cover one big toe and a fraction of the heel.

No, the more I think about it the more I believe that we are going to have a hard time colonizing the satellites and planets.

Benson Minimizes Force of Problem

LONDON, March 24 (U. P.)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson told British radio listeners tonight that the American farm problem is unlikely to be a decisive issue in the presidential election.

In a recorded interview broadcast by the BBC, Benson in Washington was asked what part the farm support program would play in the election campaign. He replied:

"Now, I think it will not be a decisive issue. The farm problem, of course, cuts across party lines in America, and for that reason alone it is not likely to be a decisive issue in the presidential election. . . . U.S. Students Are Asked to Tour Soviets

NEW YORK, March 24 (AP)—Mila Dubrovina, Russian deputy minister of education, issued a sweeping invitation today to American high school students and their teachers to visit the Soviet Union "and see how we live."

Speaking at the New York Herald Tribune forum for high schools, Mila Dubrovina repeatedly stressed the principle of "peaceful co-existence" and "the historical necessity of friendship between the peoples of the world." She said American students and teachers "will be out meeting people quite as if they come to Russia."

Mila Dubrovina said American visiting Russia will find that the Russian teacher is "much loved and esteemed." They are considered "to be members of the younger generation's souls." She noted that Russian teachers receive pay equal to that of students and are accorded "rights to exemptions and privileges including medical treatment, household expenses in some cases, book titles and decorations."

The greatest task now facing the Russian teacher is the implementation of the educational development program outlined in Russia's sixth five-year plan beginning this year. Mila Dubrovina said all education in the Soviet Union will be free beginning in September of next year.

Mila Dubrovina was followed by Mrs. H. F. Johnson, secretary of health, education and welfare, who said one of the notable features of American education is that we do not have a "federally controlled system." He said the American people had placed in control of education in the communities and states in their desire to advance their own interests.

"Thus we avoid the pitfalls of a nationally controlled education—the pitfalls of rigid uniformity and the difference to the intimate personal nature of our individualistic-Pulchritudinal educational system. This national interest in education. This interest has been demonstrated throughout our history, and currently is being recognized by several federal agencies."

Merger Plans Are Slated by Church Bando

'Natural Instincts' Lauded as Guide to Combat Delinquency

LONDON, March 24 (AP)—The Ball's Executive Officers American mothers should trust their own natural instincts in the rearing of children, pay less attention to books filled with "radical psychology."

"And maybe," he said, "they will see to it that the simply irresistible juvenile delinquency problem in the United States."

At large and amiable man, Sir Ball is one of Britain's leading authorities on the subject. He has returned from a tour that took him as far south as Miami, west to Salt Lake City, and north into New England.

"I saw juvenile delinquency much worse than anything I have ever seen to date," he said. "It is a staggering problem, but I do not think it is hopeless and I reject the excuse one hears for this state of affairs—well, we have many reasons you know and so on."

He said that juvenile delinquency figures have been falling steadily here and are almost back to normal.

"We still have many serious cases, of course," he said, "but nothing like I saw in the United States. Gangs of boys 12 and 13 using knives and guns, stabbing and shooting."

What's wrong with American kids? "I don't believe that their mothers are that they must not repress their children," he said. "They get their own way much more than is good for them. They must be a framework of discipline and children must learn they cannot expect to pay with impunity either at home or in school."

Sir Ball also is opposed to juvenile police bureaus.

"Over here any child over the age of 7 or 8 who commits an indictable offense comes before the court, the same as an adult. I fear that in the United States, the child is responsible for his actions. He learns, more importantly, that he cannot evade things."

One of the new millions of the American situation is television, according to Sir Ball. He said there was too much of it, that it kept children from reading and studying and set the impenetrable maze of many had examples in the crime programs.

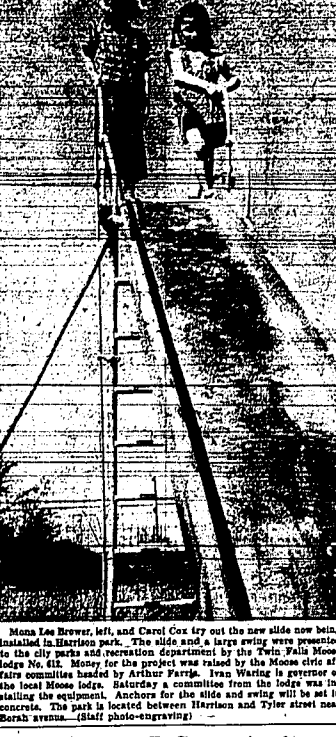

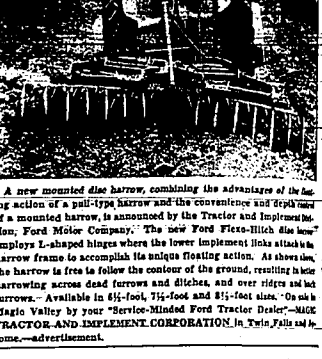

Easter Season Provides Fine Theme for Parties

Easter brings to mind rabbits, eggs, chickens and a happy season for all the family to enjoy.

For the time of year this can be as different and so much fun as you care to make them. The theme of Easter will predominate in decorations, games and refreshments.

Small unbreakable chickens glued on a white card are clever not only as placecards at a dinner, but also as individual scorecards when playing cards.

Glass table decorations are not used on card tables, the center of attention should be the buffet or a table in the front room. If a late supper is planned as refreshment, a plate of deviled eggs placed on lettuce leaves attached to something else to prepare but also decorated so that can be eaten the next day if need be. Spaghetti, a tuna casserole, sandwiches, or hot dogs are usually favorites of a party of this type.

A large cake can be trimmed with white icing and lopped off with green-colored coconut. Make small nests in the coconut of little Easter eggs. You need not have a great many different pastries to make. A few suggestions to extremes with the Easter theme, but a few well-limited suggestions for games and plenty of food will insure a good time for not only your guests but also yourself.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Our young people seem to be marrying at a younger age than in years ago. The military service may have something to do with it, and certainly it has to do with the relationships of many boys and girls who are under 20 years of age.

A girl of 16 is going steady with a boy of 18. He has been graduated from high school, she is in the second year. The boy is entering the service and will be away from home for the first time for the next two years. The question arises in both families concerned as to an engagement, should or should not the girl be engaged to this boy? Maybe he will change. Maybe the girl will. What is best to do?

It seems to me that there is every likelihood of a change of mind in a girl of 16 who will develop in body, character, and feelings. It seems scarcely fair to a girl that young to insure in any way that a young man she will not see very much of for the next few years.

There are many girls of 16 who have never been engaged. They have been met many sorts of people, and all these forces will help her along in one way or another. There is a possibility he will return a different person from the one he was when he left. Wouldn't it be kinder for both the boy and the girl to forego an en-

agement? Leave both free to enjoy their "company" of "other boys or girls" friends? Wouldn't it be kinder to allow those two very young people to be friends and let the future course to them without embarrassing them?

The future is always uncertain, plan as one may, and under any circumstances, trusting that there will be no change of heart in a child of 16 and a young soldier of 18, seems a risky lot.

Engagements of youth are tense and tender. They are likely to take boys and girls into situations that prove quite untenable in a few months or years. In the meantime, these young people find themselves, it would be better to trust to the guidance of their parents than to take their own important decisions as the guide to making important decisions.

Apart from this situation, it seems to me that a girl of 14 is altogether too immature to be "going steady" with a boy of 16 or 17. It results in a heartache for the young people; one of the other, and the situation is not altogether a bad way, when it looked at girls of 15, as children of 16 and need of guidance and allowed time for growth and experience for understanding.

There must be a reason if your child is going steady. It is not a good idea to let a girl go steady with a boy of 16 or 17, as children of 16 and 17 are not old enough to be steady with a boy of 16 or 17.

Soil District Gives Report On '55 Work

BOISE, March 24.—Soil conservation survey in the Wood River soil conservation district during 1955 covered 7,800 acres, making a total of 18,000 acres surveyed to date.

Conservation practices were applied to 2,410 acres, making a total of 27,800 acres for the district. Over mature was applied to 277 acres, crop residue utilization, 4,737 acres, pasture hay and pasture, 6,320 acres, and proper use of fertilizers and moisture observed, 8,721 acres. Rotation grazing was observed on 4,500 acres and pasture planting on 225 acres.

Deferred grazing was observed on 6,820 acres and drainage seedings applied on 135 acres, making 11,235 acres of ranges seeded to date in the district.

Wildlife area improvement amounted to 3 of an acre, making a total of 21.2 improved in the district to date. Tree planting was done on 102 acres and windbreak plantings were done on 28 miles. There were 14 ponds constructed in the district last year, making 138-40 ponds. Three tractors were constructed and one sprinkler irrigation system was set up in the district last year. 11,048 acres were used in improved water application and 6,700 for irrigation water improvement, making a total of 20,210 acres for irrigation water improvement.

Land was leveled on 851.5 acres, making a 12,375-acre total for the district. There were 10 irrigation pumping plants installed in 1955, making a total of 30 for the district. Ponds construction was advanced along 14.3 miles in 1955, making a total of 813 miles. Land clearing was done on 3,772 acres and cropland was seeded to grass on 215 acres.

Supervisors for the district are Mont Johnson, chairman, Richfield; Paul Bennett, vice chairman, Shoshone; Orville Davis, Ellettsville; Dean Gooding, Gooding, and Harry Holt, Puchfield.

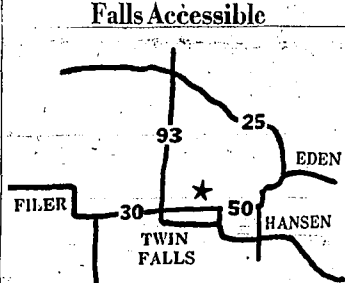

Filer Woman Watches Birds

and if the bill is heavy the bird's principal food is usually seeds," Mrs. Bloom pointed out.

The tail of a bird, forked, notched, acute or rounded, tells an ornithologist many things. An ornithologist also looks for wing bars, and what kind of a nest the bird inhabits. The flight of a bird also can tell an experienced bird watcher many things.

Some birds fly in a straight line, others fly with a wavy motion and the swallow has its own peculiar flight characteristic.

Mrs. Bloom says the robin, which is one of the best known and easily recognized birds, measures approximately nine and one-fourth inches from the tip of its tail to the tip of its beak.

Another "tool" of the successful bird watcher is a pair of binoculars. These need not be expensive, she said, but they should be able to bring the bird up close to the observer.

Mrs. Bloom is most interested in watching birds or, as ornithologists classify them, birds of the passerine order. Passerine birds constitute one-fourth of all the birds, she says. Thrushes are in this classification. The lowest type or order of birds includes the doves and loons which are awkward and clumsy, she said.

Bird watchers each year take a census of birds at Christmas time. Last year some 8,000 bird watchers counted 411 species and more than 12 million birds in this country. Bird watchers also carry out a census during the nesting season. This gives them information on nesting habits.

In 1947 Mrs. Bloom was one of three persons—in Idaho—to note the practice of the starlings in this state. She says the number of starlings in Idaho has grown each year since then. One peculiar characteristic of the birds is that they are seldom seen in Idaho during the summer. "Where they go I don't know," Mrs. Bloom declared. "However, one of these days we will have more information on nesting habits."

Mrs. Bloom has been a resident of Filer for the last five years. She was born in Williams, Ia., and after attending teachers college, there, was married to Mr. Bloom. He was superintendent of schools at Blackfoot in 1920-1924 and in Twin Falls from 1924 to 1927. He died five years ago.

In 1928 she took post graduate work at the University of Wyoming and while studying ornithology she also studied botany. She is almost as interested in wildflowers as she is in birds. She worked with the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts in Idaho and Wyoming several summers, teaching them how to observe birds. "Boy Scouts must learn to identify 40 birds correctly in order to receive the bird merit badge," Mrs. Bloom said.

While in Kummer, Wyo., she also organized nature clubs in the intermediate grades in school.

Mrs. Bloom is interested in bird banding. The present number of active bird banders for the fish and wildlife service is more than 2,000. In 1947 the total was around 1,500. People frequently call upon Mrs. Bloom to identify birds for them. "If they will tell me about the markings, kind of beak, shape of the bill and size, I usually can answer them," she said.

Bird Watching Is Not Only Satisfying Hobby, It Supplies Useful Information

Bird watchers are numbered in the thousands. They reserve the memory of a man named Audubon just as football players honor a man named Rocker.

Persons interested in starting bird watching are told first to purchase a good bird book and familiarize themselves with the birds in their area. Mrs. Bloom says a notice should get a beginner's field observation book, pocket size, for use in the open.

"Keep working and observing and read everything you can about birds," she advises.

Things to look for include measurement of the birds. The sparrow, robin and crow are the three birds used in the ornithologists measurement scale. Look for color and markings, including the breast, wing, tail, top of head and eye stripe.

"If a bird has a slender bill it indicates its principal food is insects
