Non-Communists Win in Elections

ROME, March 30—Non-communist labor unions indicated a crushing defeat on the communists in shop steward elections in the Fiat, official results disclosed today.

The results were announced as Italian Communist party boss Palmiro Togliatti and French Communist boss Maurice Thorez prepared to meet in Rome to study the upheavals in their parties that followed Moscow's denunciation of Josef Stalin.

Togliatti already had called a national party meeting for next week in an effort to restore order in Italian red ranks confused by the down-fall of Stalin's program. Other prominent members of the Italian party still were denouncing the Moscow action.

Bid Disputed

KANSAS CITY, March 30—The new Communist line that Premier Stalin was "mad" was described as a "cover up" by former President Harry S. Truman.

"Stalin was anything but mad when I talked to him," Truman said. That was at the Potsdam conference. "He was one smart hummer," the former President said. "He broke all our agreements—three months after I'd talked with him." Truman added.

4,000 Evacuated

SAO PAULO, Brazil, March 30—Authorities rushed plans today to evacuate 4,000 persons from areas where landslides and floods took four more lives yesterday.

The latest victims brought to the death toll in the Sao Paulo-Bahia area this month from slides and floods caused by torrential rains.

Pilgrims Are Met by Rains In Holy Land

JERUSALEM, Jordan Sector, March 30 (AP) — Heavy rains greeted thousands of pilgrims arriving in Jerusalem yesterday for religious observances commemorating Christ's death and resurrection.

Forecasters predicted clearing weather for Good Friday, but it rained continuously in Jerusalem and today thousands of pilgrims expect to follow the mass pilgrimages to the "Way of the Cross" which winds through the old city from the place of Christ's death to his burial site.

The Way of the Cross is the real climax of the Easter observance which began on Palm Sunday with a procession from Bethel to the place through St. Stephen's gate in Jerusalem to the site of Christ's death.

Yesterday, Latin Patriarch Albert De Mont — acting as Christ's representative — led a group of 12 men representing the 12 apostles in a service at the Holy Sepulchre.

In the evening hundreds gathered in the Church of All Nations in the Garden of Gethsemane for the annual ceremony celebrating Christ's agony in the garden.

NEW YORK, March 30 (AP) — Competition for the consumer's dollar was never hotter and industry is spending \$1 billion dollars this year in a program to lure them in.

Spending ads tell the story: "Buy your tires and get a fifth one free."

"A wallet free with every watch."

Life insurance accident life insurance policy free with each new car.

Companies making everything from breakfast cereals to television sets are offering premiums and incentives of all kinds to get extra sales or extra incentive among their customers.

The record 1.7 billion dollars expended for that purpose in 1955 represents an increase of 200 million dollars over 1954. And this expenditure is one and a half times the \$1 billion dollars to be spent for advertising in newspapers and other media.

Industry spokesmen say the premium boom is part of industry's effort to keep production lines humming without resorting to price cuts.

The marines landed the 12-point difference in total score on the target of some of their top shooters.

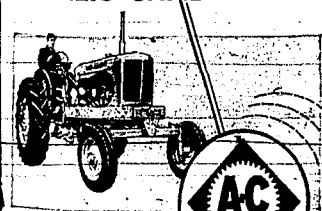

Budge Says Hells Canyon Agitation Is Designed to Reelect Morse in Oregon

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP) — Rep. Hiram Budge, D., Idaho, says agitation in congress for the federal Hells canyon dam is designed to reelect Senator Morse in Oregon.

The Idahoan made his comment after release of a letter from Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler to congressional leaders of his party. "This issue is hot in Oregon and will be a vital factor in the reelection of Senator Morse and Rep. Edith Green (Portland)," Butler wrote.

Budge says, "This puts the federal dam in its true light. I agree with Mr. Butler that its purpose is to reelect Senator Morse and Mrs. Green."

The letter from Butler said that he is fearful "our party next fall may be in a very weak position in the area of natural resources."

"If we are to be in a position to go to the people with a record of conservation of our natural resources that will gain votes in one key state and district after another, it is apparent that a few important measures should be considered in this session."

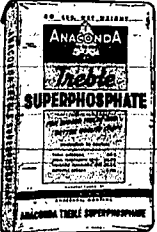

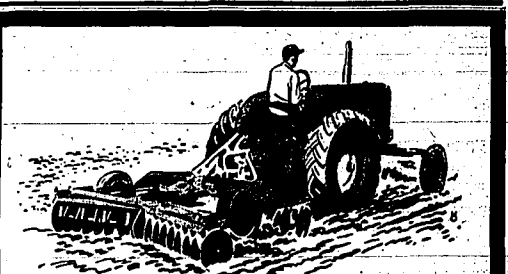

Yankees Start Early Travels To All Areas

NEW YORK, March 30.—American airlines are starting their travels earlier this year.

TWA's "jetliner" service, booking more than the usual number, for the busy week observations in Italy, Spain and Portugal. A sizeable number of Americans have chosen Japan for the March-April flower season. Florida reports a record number of tourists for the Palm Beach and Miami areas.

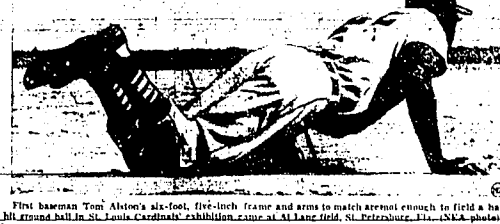

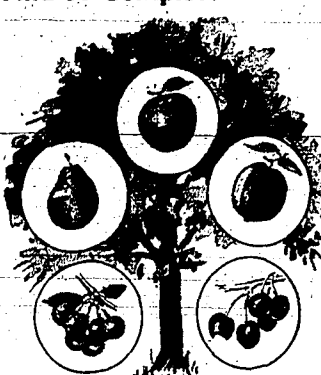
