UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., April 5 (AP)—U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld today mapped a mission to find ways to bring peace to the Middle East. Armed with a new authorization from the security council, Hammarskjöld planned to leave tomorrow to investigate the causes of tension along the Israeli-Arab border. He is to meet with the security council within a month with measures to calm down Israel and her Arab neighbors. En route to the Middle East, the secretary general planned to fly by way of London and Paris to meet with foreign office experts on arms sales questions and other problems.

## Heart-Breaking Job of Reconstruction Begins In Tornado-Hit Areas

The remnants of a vast killer storm moved out into the Atlantic ocean today, leaving a heart-breaking job of reconstruction behind. The final death count in the two-day battle of tornadoes and storms stood at 43. Hospitals were jammed with many of the estimated 500 injured. Hundreds of families, their homes wrecked, searched for their loved ones. In Washington, U. S. weather bureau officials may be down as one of the worst in the nation's history. Other tornado histories have killed more persons. But few have ever moved so fast and covered such a wide area.

## Path of Destruction

The storm came racing out of the southwest Monday and hit their homes Tuesday night when they killed 11 persons in western Michigan. The vicious weather front kept going east, but lost much of its power trying to get over the Appalachian mountains.

The twisters' final toll in terms of lives and millions of dollars probably will not be known for weeks. Michigan's death toll had passed the fatality count set up in Tennessee with the death of an infant hospitalized victim.

—State-by-state—the death count was Michigan 17, Wisconsin 3, Tennessee 3, Oklahoma 5, Texas 3, Kansas 2, Mississippi 1, Minnesota 1, and Kentucky 1.

Twisters and storms also spread havoc through parts of Indiana, Iowa, Illinois, Nebraska and Arkansas.

The "northern" state called upon their full resources to clean up the wreckage.

## Final Touches Put On Farm Bill; OK Of Ike Is Expected

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—House-senate conferees began putting final touches today on a controversial farm bill designed to increase farmers' income about 10 billion dollars this year. Supporters of the bill said they believed, on the basis of President Eisenhower's news conference remarks yesterday, that he is relaxing his opposition to it and will sign it. The conference committee struck a new deal—the administration yesterday by tentatively approving a heavily increased price support for four feed grains and for so-called non-commercial corn grown outside the main corn belt. This was the last point at issue before the committee, which has been compromising differences between house and senate versions of a new farm program.

## Red Cross Change Is Planned; Drive Fails

Failure of the 1956 fund drive of the Twin Falls chapter of the Red Cross, will result in abolishment of the position of executive secretary, board members reported Thursday. The change became necessary when the 1956 fund drive failed. Although all returns haven't been reported yet in the drive, workers say the total will be far below the \$20,000 goal.

The fund drive, about \$4,500 has been held for the campaign. However, the drive has been extended to May 1.

The Red Cross blood program operated for Magic Valley Memorial hospital, a fund of \$1,000. The Red Cross has committed itself to operate the blood program and the fund would remain as flexible as possible.

The change from a paid executive to a volunteer position was made after a week-long study by Red Cross officials. The study showed the local chapter would be forced to draw on the fund for rent, wages and other maintenance.

Details of the volunteer plan will be announced later.

Residents who weren't contacted during the drive were urged to mail their contributions.

The claims set up by the commission are for over one billion dollars of bonds which were issued by the Russian Czarist government in 1916 and 1917.

### Paraguay Refuses Aid Offers From Soviets; Reasons Given

ASUNCION, Paraguay, April 5 (AP)—The republic of Paraguay says it is not having any help from Russia, thanks to the Soviet offer to help.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin made a strong bid last January for increased trade with Latin America. Paraguay urgently needs foreign aid, investments and technical assistance, but the Soviet offer fell on deaf ears here. The government suggested, in fact, that it would re-examine trade agreements it now has with iron curtain countries.

Gustavo Stormy, president of the government's Central Bank of Paraguay, declared in an interview: "Our policy is to carry on our commerce at the highest levels possible for Paraguay to participate in the effort presently being made throughout the world to place international commerce on a good and firm basis. In aiming at this objective, we will have in mind that our country is linked by solemn pacts to the inter-American community and besides it is deeply in accord with the spirit which animates the free nations."

Paraguay, he continued, "cannot ignore the fact that the countries comprising the Soviet bloc developed a policy of foreign commerce with the main objective consisting not in the establishment of relations of mutual convenience, but in the ideological penetration" of the underbelly of the free world.

"In the special case of our country, in the present accord with countries behind the iron curtain not only did not give the results that some people childishly expected but showed that even according to the economic point of view, these accords were unattractive."

"These accords, in consequence, must be re-examined and must function in the high interest of the country."

Schroeder said Idaho needs more taxable wealth. He pointed out that he is paying for educational and other necessities.

Schroeder sees a rosy future for the west, basing his predictions on statistics for the past few years. He said these figures include a 51 percent increase in the population of the 11 western states since 1950, compared with a national increase of 22 percent, and a manufacturing employment increase of 106 percent in the 11 western states compared with a national increase of 49 percent.

There are yet great strides to be taken, he said, reporting the 11 western states in the same period made about one-eighth of the motor vehicle parts used in these same states, for example.

He wasn't particularly concerned about freight rates. More volume and more local industry will overcome disadvantages in this field, he said.

Schroeder, who is encouraged by the enthusiasm he has found around the state, said he knows of no cure-all but "it would help to let industrialists of other states know about Idaho's tax rate, its climate for corporations, its friendliness and its wish to see industry come to Idaho."

"Eighty per cent of what we use is produced by 6000 manufacturers and the time is now to start attracting some of those manufacturers to Idaho," Schroeder told his audience at Kimberly in this field, he said.

# NATO Chief Draws Blasts On Statement

**PARIS, April 5**—NATO American commanders in Europe draw heavy criticism in Germany and elsewhere yesterday with a reported remark that his forces would have to give up Western Germany in event of a general European war.

Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, supreme allied commander in Europe, issued a statement yesterday which drew heavy criticism in Germany because it was interpreted as having said NATO's defense line must be drawn in southern France.

A spokesman at the NATO command post, however, told a reporter that Gruenther had been misunderstood. He said that the general had already expressed his view on the reported statement at a news conference in London last week.

The West German and British military representatives at SHAFEP (Staff Headquarters Allied Forces Europe) had been ordered to inquire if the general had really made such a statement.

The NATO force headquarters in London yesterday issued a clarification of the general's statement and said the NATO force headquarters in Washington April 4, 1934. The headquarters was created in 1941.

Critics here attacked the statement and said that the NATO force headquarters had come to be a "minor deterrent" to aggression on the continent, but later could not be reached for a reply to the criticisms.

Other reports did not quote Gruenther correctly. He said the NATO force headquarters had issued a statement on the military situation in which the general had given a picture of the present situation.

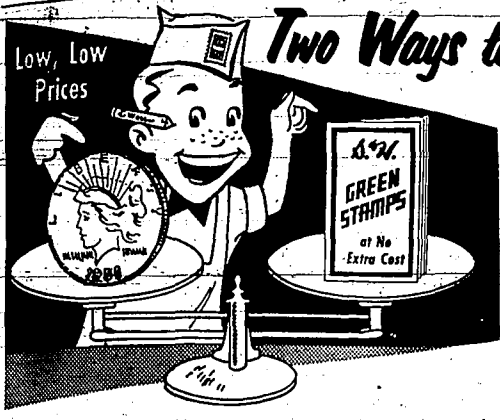

# Chance of Atom Power Plant Runaway Delaying Private Buildups on Reactors

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—Chances of an atomic power plant catastrophe are remote, but the "hurry" to build a large number of reactors is one of the big reasons why private business isn't moving with noticeable speed to set up an independent nuclear power industry in America.

So far not one U.S. company or collection of companies has started to build a full-scale atomic power plant wholly financed by private industry.

A number of "preparatory" plants have been under way for some time, but none of them has reached even the construction permit stage. Like mountains on a far horizon, the day of private industrial atomic power seems still to draw appreciably nearer with the passage of time.

There are many reasons, but the one talked about most these days is the problem of liability insurance.

An atomic power plant cannot blow up like a nuclear bomb. But government experts can't promise industry "runaway" is impossible. Insurance coverage. The other, by Rep. W. Sterling Cole, R. N.Y., would

limit the operator's liability to twice the capital investment.

Would enactment of such legislation automatically shove private atomic power development into high gear? Some official observers around here doubt it.

Up to now five nuclear plants to cost a total of 200 million dollars have been proposed for construction without government financial help. Estimated "completion dates" run from 1957 to 1962.

Will any of them be started in that period? Or will other problems like the liability dilemma, threaten further delay? Just how serious, actually, is the liability issue?

One expert here said, "It is more psychological than anything else." The AEC has run 24 nuclear reactors for 24,000 hours without an accident causing radioactive contamination away from the site.

There have been only two major reactor accidents—and one of them was not an accident. The AEC deliberately made a reactor heat up and explode at its Idaho test station while back just to see what would

happen. It was reasonably spectacular but not comparable to an atomic blast. "They've been testing containment at any great distance."

The other accident, a true one, occurred when a fuel element melted in a Canadian reactor at Chalk River, Ont. It was necessary to reconstruct the reactor.

Dr. Donald J. Hughes of the AEC's Brookhaven national laboratory said recently that it is safe to build reactors in populated areas. He said it was a mistake to establish the commission's testing station in the remote badlands near Arco, Idaho. Concerning the chance of a modern reactor blowing up, Hughes said: "The people who're most afraid about it, that is, the scientists, are perfectly willing to sit on one old day long."

What else stands in the way of a burgeoning nuclear power industry in America?

Simple economics, for one thing. "Fuel-rich America" just doesn't say economic sense to establishment of high-cost atomic power here. Also evident in some areas is a well-and-true attitude.

Said one official acquaintance: "If Shipingport is a screaming success, there will be surprised by the speed with which private plants will move. If not, well . . ."

### San Francisco Rates High in Its Alcoholics

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—San Francisco had "the highest alcoholism rate in the nation" in 1954, according to a survey by university researchers reported yesterday.

New York, Detroit and St. Louis had the next highest rates. The survey was conducted by the University of California at Berkeley, and reported in the journal of Studies in Alcoholism.

The survey showed that San Francisco had the highest rate of alcoholism among 100 cities surveyed. The rate was 10.5 percent, compared with a national average of 6.5 percent.

The survey covered cities of 100,000 population or over. The researchers said it is generally known that alcoholism is more prevalent in urban areas than in rural ones.

**Factors Cited**

"But the factors which make up the urban areas that are associated with alcoholism," they said, "do not appear to be directly related to population density."

"That is, it is possible for a city to have a high rate of alcoholism, as Washington, D.C., or Sacramento, Calif., do, although its metropolitan area is less than that of San Francisco."

The psychological or cultural factors which influence the regional rates of alcoholism await elucidation by social scientists.

**Court Ruling Won't Injure Idaho's Laws**

BOISE, April 5 (AP)—Idaho Gov. Gordon Guthrie said he believes Idaho law enforcement officials will not be adversely affected by a recent U. S. supreme court decision knocking out state election laws he added that he had no objection to the decision and was handing his views on record today.

The court by a six to three decision ruled Monday that such laws have been abrogated by federal legislation.

Idaho has no election law. But it has laws which are "anti-syndicalism" by law many years ago to cope with the situation in the coal and oil fields.

Guthrie said he did not believe the question of whether or not laws passed in recent years would be affected by the decision.

"This office and all of the state law enforcement agencies have been cooperating with the federal bureau of investigation and the United States district attorney with respect to communist activities in this state," Guthrie said.

"We have had very satisfactory relations with the FBI and the U. S. district attorney in the field, which the courts' opinion appears to affect."

"The decision will not cause us to change our procedure with respect to law enforcement in this state and we are looking forward to continued cooperation with the federal government for the benefit of Idaho and the whole nation."

**Blast Explained**

BARABOTA, Fla., April 5 (AP)—A mysterious explosion which rocked a 10-acre stretch of the bulk coast here apparently was caused when a 100-lb bomb at sea during a night training exercise, two services reported today.

The coast guard station in Miami and a spokesman at MacDill air field here, Tampa, said their "unofficial" reports stated that the pilot dropped the bomb at sea when he thought he was "farther from the coast than he actually was."

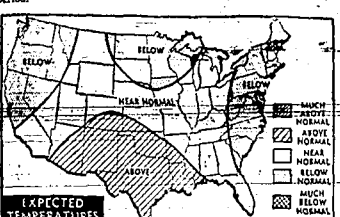

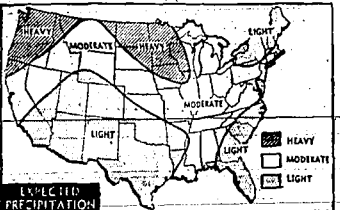

### Hot Furnace Scheduled to Help Studies

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission today announced it will build a large solar furnace capable of producing radiation temperatures of 1,000 to 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

A solar furnace is a system of mirrors capable of concentrating the sun's energy on a single spot. The air force will use the high temperatures for research, for testing the heat-resisting capabilities of materials and weapons components and for determining where possible, the thermal effects of nuclear weapons on various materials.

The furnace will be located at about the 6,000-foot level in the Sacramento mountains near Bolinas air development center, Alameda county, N.M. This is an area known for its clear and abundant sunlight.

Contract Drawings already have been solicited for design proposals, the air force said. The air force did not name the contractor.

The projected solar heater under ideal conditions would be expected to attain radiation temperatures of over a substantially larger area than any other furnace known.

The tremendous heat the furnace would generate compares with normal body temperature of 98.6 degrees. Water boils at 212 degrees Fahrenheit.

**Called Feasible**  
The air force said the feasibility of using the sun's radiation to attain very high heat over reasonably large areas has been successfully explored by the French at the Mouri-Louis solar furnace in the Pyrenees.

The air force said the solar furnace would be located at a solar observatory, maintained by the air force, is used primarily by scientists from Harvard and other universities for observations of the sun itself.

"We figure we can send 325 and have full strength in every event," he said. "The general operation will be close to a million dollars," Stringer said, "but a little more than \$200,000 per man."

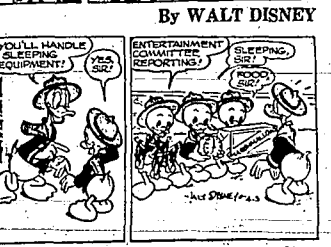

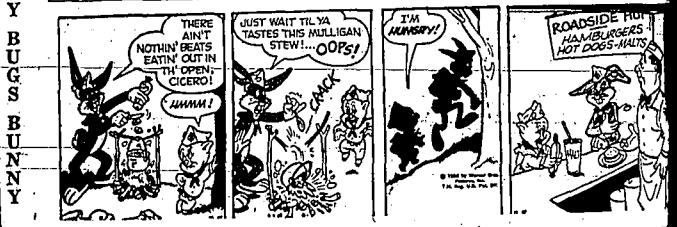

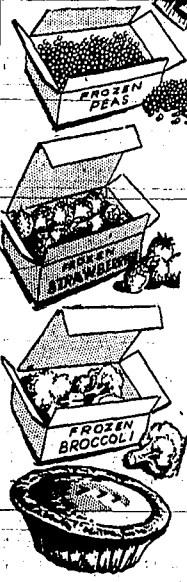
