Water Supply Good in State

WASHINGTON, April 9 (Special)—Streamflow and ground water supplies in western Idaho are expected to be "heavy" this spring, the U. S. Geological Survey reported today.

The survey's "water resources review" for March said that "storage in many irrigation reservoirs was released in anticipation of heavy spring runoff."

Northern Idaho is to equally good condition, the survey said, and the "storage in power reservoirs was far above average."

Meanwhile, the Big Lost river showed "record discharge" near Arco and the entire Big Lost river basin experienced heavy runoff.

With streamflow all over the state at an "excellent" level, the Gallatin river at Whitefish registered its highest peak for any March on record, the survey said.

States' Rights Battle Over Waters Is Shaping up Now as Hot National Issue

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—This suggested the possibility of a presidential veto, should congress approve a bill.

Preliminary rounds were fought recently at senate and house interior committee hearings on bills to give the states control over water within their boundaries.

President Eisenhower will join the fray if members of congress from the West get enough support from the South's traditional states' rights camp to pass a bill.

Senator Barrett, R., Wyo., one of 13 members sponsoring the bill, believes chances of getting one through congress this session are excellent. He calls the legislation of the greatest importance to the West.

Other cosponsors are Senators Goldwater, R., Ariz.; Malone, R., Nev.; Bible, D., Nev.; Dworth, R., Idaho; Welker, R., Idaho; Allen, R., Colo.; and Curtis, R., Neb., and Representatives Engel, D., Calif.; Bunker, R., Idaho; Young, R., Nev.; Dawson, R., Utah, and Thompson, R., Wyo.

The Westerners contend legislation is needed to protect state water rights which they say are jeopardized by recent supreme court decisions favoring the federal government in "water disputes."

"Federal officials were accused of the brazen riding roughshod over states' rights on several occasions and in several states."

At least two federal departments, Justice and defense, went on record as being opposed to the legislation.

Deputy Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers explained in a seven-page report why the justice department is opposed to the bill. And J. Lee Rankin, assistant attorney general, was questioned for several hours on the department's position.

Rankin said the bill would "make the federal government subordinate to the states" and this would require an amendment to the Constitution.

the quoted the Constitution as saying the federal government, when it is exercising its proper powers, cannot be subordinate to a state.

Rankin said that making state water rights supreme would cause many difficulties in connection with construction and operation of federal dams on interstate rivers.

"Which state laws would we comply with?" he asked.

Rankin proposed consideration of a law to require that no project be built until after federal and state officials get together to work out water problem solutions.





Some Close Parallels Eyed Between Depression Era and Present Times

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—There are some uncomfortable close parallels between certain situations today and those which existed in the years before the great depression of the 1930s.

In the quarter-century since the nation poured hell-bent into that bleak and black era, a lot of safe-guards have been built into the economy to cushion against the effects of another tailspin.

Even so, political and economic conditions in the election year 1936 and the election year 1956 are beginning to look very much alike.



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Smithsonian Is Pleased With Top Gift of 230,000 Termites

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—The Smithsonian Institution has just received the heart of a neighbor, the Smithsonian Institution, with a gift of termites.

It gave the Smithsonian 230,000 of the insects in a collection described as "probably the second most valuable in the world."

The collection contains 1,284 distinct species. There are some 2,000 known species of termites and probably many more that haven't yet been discovered. There were only 12 known species when this collection was started in 1915 by Dr. Thomas H. Snyder, retired agriculture department entomologist.

Termites exist almost everywhere except in the Arctic and Antarctic. Dr. Snyder collected them over much of the western hemisphere. He got many old world species by exchange and gift.

Snyder didn't collect termites just because he had a bug for collecting. Termites eat houses and wholly subterranean habitat. How other structures made of wood.

People call termites "white ants." But there is "little if any relationship" between the two creatures. They developed roughly similar body forms and ways of life by quite independent routes.

Termites are more closely related to roaches, which are among the oldest forms of animals. Life. Roaches appeared on earth about 350 million years ago.

Termites made their first appearance about 50 million years ago; ants 30 million years ago.


