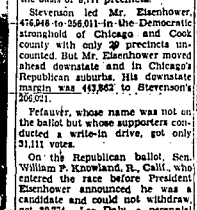


Upper Colorado Pact Legislation Is Signed by Ike

Demos' Farm Bills

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—The house today defeated a last-ditch administration attempt to revive a farm bill. It did so despite warnings that President Eisenhower would veto the bill in its present form. The house rejected a Republican motion to send the bill back to the senate-house conference committee with instructions to accept a five-point administration compromise. The roll call vote was 338 to 181 against sending the

Mr. Eisenhower, with only nominal opposition in the Republican primary, piled up 699,873 votes with 8,922 of the state's 9,511 precincts counted. Stevenson had 682,695 on the basis of 8,277 precincts.



Stevens led Mr. Eisenhower, 47,646-46 to 556,011 in the Democratic stronghold of Chicago and Cook county with only 20 precincts uncontested. Mr. Eisenhower moved ahead dominate and in Chicago's Republican suburbs. His downstate margin was 143,863 to Stevenson's 20,745.

WASHINGTON, April 11 AP — Sen. Henry M. Jackson said today that even with a proposed step-up in B-52 bomber production the United States will not match Russia in output of intercontinental jet bombers.

The Washington Democrat, a leading critic of administration air power policies, flatly predicted "there will be further step-ups once the facts are brought out" by a special armed services subcommittee which will look into the extent of U. S. air power.

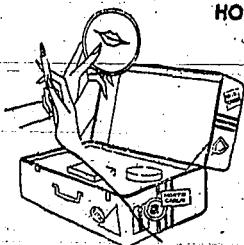

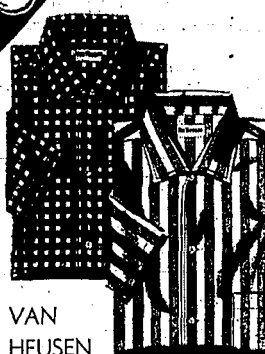

War Drills to Test Country In July Alert

WASHINGTON, April 11—A week-long war drill in July will test America's readiness to meet a swift and increasing nuclear assault on the continent of North America, according to defense officials.

The office of defense mobilization announced yesterday that an "Operation Alert 1956" will be held July 1-7 on an almost a continental scale.

Canada is participating.

China will participate in the simulated emergency, which will not include nuclear weapons and key personnel evacuating government buildings for secret relocation.

The combined civil defense and government evacuation test will be similar to last year's exercise in which Eisenhower and federal officials directed government affairs from hideaways outside the capital.

A total of 78 areas in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Canal Zone will be "targets" for nuclear bombs.

In addition, Canada is expected to receive attacks on its key cities.

South Korea has been discussed the first of its participation.

The maneuvers will assume that the target is hit by from one to 10 bombs having destructive power equal to from 20,000 to five million tons of TNT.

COM said the alert will come at 8 a.m. (EST) on July 20 and that "attacks" will last five hours.

Film Packing Of Groceries Eyed for U.S.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 11.—The American grocery trade faces a future of undesirable eggs and "top-of-the-butter" margarine. The shell-egg men and the margarine makers are among two of the groups at the 15th annual meeting of the American Manufacturers Association which opens a new session here today.

The new egg comes in a transparent, unbreakable, polystyrene container which is even more proof than the shell provided by nature.

In process described by Cornell university, the eggs are shelled, dropped into rollers in a polystyrene sheet and then covered with heat-sealed polystyrene. The sheet is then folded and the egg is held as a final step to keep out air.

Eggs packed in the new manner will be shipped in the same way as any other food item in the sheet.

Facilities for separation and the individual containers have not yet been developed.

New Outfit Seen

The eggs may be sold and eaten right out of the container, said a spokesman. He predicted the new method will allow children to get other outlets for their product— vending machines.

The process and equipment are expected to be commercially available within a year.

In another exhibit, the Aluminum Company of America, Pittsburgh, Pa., demonstrated a new packaging for the hamburger. Frodoled from the hamburger are wrapped in foil packages. They may be heated by popping them into the toaster.

Sawdust Used In Mushroom Seeding Plans

DALLAS, April 10.—A tasty and cheap mushroom can be grown abundantly in ordinary waste sawdust, two Florida chemists reported Tuesday.

Tests indicate 300 pounds of fresh mushrooms can be grown on a ton of sawdust in 11 days, Dr. R. B. Black, University of Florida chemical engineer, told the American Chemical society.

The sawdust, with a little nutrient added, is seeded with the spores of mushroom fungus. The fungus transforms some of the sawdust into mushrooms.

"You might get 12 crops a year of mushrooms this way," he said. "Just two or three of standard mushrooms grown on mature and straw compost," Dr. Black said. "The process is cheaper, he added.

If the sawdust method is adopted, the mushroom grower will be able to use up some of the tons of waste sawdust now produced annually, he said. Because, rice hulls or other wastes might be used. The sawdust remains after growth in a crop of mushrooms might still be useful as a fertilizer.

Average American Family Spends One Dollar in Every Four for Myriad Taxes

By NEA

The average American city family with \$20,000 income spends one dollar out of four on taxes.

Here's how it's figured, based on a budget for such a typical family—father, mother and two youngsters. Then, with the help of some of the country's financial experts, study what share of that budget goes into taxes.

The total amount that ends up in the hands of some branch of the government is \$1,918.14, or 29.2 per cent.

Of that sum, \$1,018.14 for direct taxes—income, real estate and sales taxes.

The rest winds up as taxes in hidden or indirect ways, such as a store's property taxes, or a manufacturer's income tax.

Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer aren't even aware they are paying these hidden levies when they shell out the cash for a loaf of bread, a screwdriver, or a newspaper.

But taxes are included in the bill just as surely as though they had been collected in cash.

Of their total tax of \$1,918.14, according to the breakdown, the federal government ends up with more than two-thirds, \$1,400.

Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer's home state takes \$154.

Their own local government—city or town, county, and school—takes \$364.

Other states outside their own are able to reach their home arms into the pockets of Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer for \$154.

Government to Dedicate New, Home-Like Type of Institution

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The government Friday will dedicate a 10-story modern building specifically designed from basement to penthouse for chronic, homicidal care of the mentally ill.

It has been built, and furnished according to specifications laid down by some of the country's most distinguished psychiatrists. It is expected to serve as a pace-setting model for mental hospitals all over the world.

The new building will be part of St. Elizabeth's hospital—the government's largest and most-famous mental institution. It ranks high among the nation's best hospitals.

But there are no "insane" at St. Elizabeth's. The word is taboo. Says Dr. Winifred Overholser, the superintendent:

"We conceive of hospitalization as a result of a person's not being able to get along in society; we think of it as a temporary emergency situation."

No every mental patient, of course, can be completely cured. But many cases at least to the point of being returnable to family and friends. At St. Elizabeth 60 to 70 per cent of the patients ultimately are discharged.

"Our object," Overholser says, "is to provide a society for the patient that is as closely as possible approximates living at home, more closely approaching general society than hospital isolation."

The new six million dollar building, for the emotionally ill men and women living there, will be more a home-away-from-home than a hospital. It is dedicated to the "patient's return to life."

The building, which cost \$6 million, is a red-brick and glass structure in the "Dorothy Lynde Dixon" style. It was named for a Boston teacher who spent more than half her life, until she died in 1887 at 65, trying to improve the lot of the mentally sick. She induced Congress to establish St. Elizabeth's 100 years ago. (And when Congress

Farmers and Car Dealers Not Included in 1956 Prosperity

By The Associated Press

Farmers will not share fully in the bounding prosperity that now seems to await most Americans in 1956. The indications are that auto dealers won't either, an Associated Press survey shows today.

These people constitute two major "soft spots" in the current general business boom. You can find other soft spots here and there—in carpet weaving, poultry manufacturing and textiles. How serious are they?

Here's the thinking of farmers, bankers, auto dealers and others interviewed by the Associated Press in a nationwide business survey:

Number one complaint of many farmers is the continuing decline in the prices they get for crops and livestock. While costs of gasoline, tractor, machinery and fertilizer climb higher and higher.

The weather, as always, is also a target of criticism. In the drought-plagued Kansas farm belt, Raymond Del, agricultural economist, for the 10th federal reserve district says farmers' income right now is the poorest it has been since the depression days of the early 1930s. Bad times face Kansas City—one of the very few U. S. cities where business is expected to decline this year.

In Nebraska, an industrial boom in Omaha contrasts sharply with stagnant business conditions throughout the great farming area. Two counties have asked to be declared eligible for drought emergency relief. A Denver economist says 54 out of 100 farmers in Colorado aren't showing a profit and the livestock growers face "disaster." The drought has left its mark, too, on farms in the Iowa corn belt and in Illinois. Fruit crops in some southern states have been tipped by a late freezing spell; farms in the Pacific Northwest have been hurt by heavy rains and floods.

The survey points up one big difference between the current farm slump and cruel farm depression of the 30's—prices of farm real estate are holding up. Some say it's because farm land to bring sought increasingly for industrial development. But as it is, there has been no epidemic of foreclosures.

The lowest levels of the auto dealers concern the great outpouring of new cars from the factory gates, and skimp dealer profit margins. Now that production has been throttled down, some dealers are breathing easier although inventories of unsold new passenger cars are still close to the 900,000 mark.

Rudy Pica, Kansas City dealer, says his firm will need cut sales at least 4 per cent and "profits of my firm may be down as much as 40 per cent by the end of the year."

A Seattle dealer complains that too many potential customers are "either buying off in the new cars they bought last year or waiting for the 1957 models."
