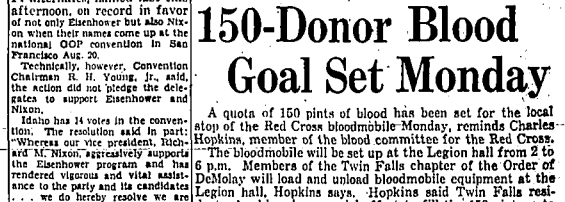

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Poles Linked By Radio and Boost of Ham

WARREN, R. I., April 14 (AP)—Radio linked the North Pole and South Pole yesterday for the first time in history.

News Kraus, a ham radio operator since 1933, used his amateur station to supply booster power and link VE2ML—the most powerful radio station in the world—with KZ5BA at famed "Little America," Weatherman John Murray.

Murray, from Cranston, R. I., is with an eight-man U. S. research team studying weather at the South Pole. He is with Operation Deepfreeze, building U. S. bases on the continent.

Wants It Warm "Get it good and warm down there, will you?" Murray asked the Antarctic operator. "I'm getting a vacation in the states soon and then I'm supposed to come down to join you."

Over the sound he heard the northern station "fine" despite the distance and the complications involved in using Kraus' transmitter for booster power.

Higby said that at his southern station it was "nearing midnight." Murray in the north polar region reported it was the Gale Bad.

"The food is good but the weather is getting terrible," Higby said. "In a few weeks we'll be getting a vacation during the winter season down here. But we're pretty well prepared."

He reported that a "quicker bid" for his Little America radio relay, almost certainly a small party of workers who had come to see how the "newbound arctic" looked.

Murray reported that his expedition site was near the spot from which Admiral Peary set out in 1909 on the first expedition ever to reach the North Pole.

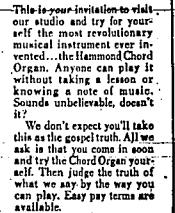

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

Every Sunday Ray Tucker answers reader's questions of general interest on national and international politics and current events.

WASHINGTON—Ray Tucker, writes W.H.C. in an indignant letter to the Houston (Tex.) Post... Tucker points out that 20 or 30 men, meeting behind closed doors, and sometimes only two or three persons, select the candidates for the Republican nomination as President for both parties.

As an individual interested in national politics, I challenge him to make public, in plain English, the names and addresses of these 20 or 30 principal selectors... I have written many newspaper stories depicting the behind-the-scenes work of the "bosses" in politics.

WHEN HARDING WAS CHOSEN—The bosses called a caucus, and met during the night at the Blackstone hotel... Wood and his cronies ran neck and neck for the first four ballots, with Harding having only a handful of delegates.

These were the kingpins, although a few obscure-national and congressional members sat in... Another historic gathering—in the other most historic national convention of this century, Franklin D. Roosevelt was nominated in much the same way.

STOPPING THE SLAUGHTER—The National Safety Council recently took a look into the future and came up with the prediction that another 10 million people will be killed on the road, piled at various times by 90 million drivers, and that they will pile up a total of something like 100 million bodies annually.

FARM PUBLIC RELATIONS—Though opinions differ greatly on farm programs, most agricultural leaders agree on at least one point: The nation's farmers have a big job to do in the future.

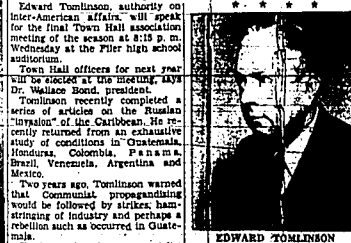

PITTSBURGH, April 14 (AP)—The churches of the nation will be called upon tonight to face the problem of maintaining Christian ethics in a booming economy with realism. The call was scheduled to come when the official message of a national study conference on the church and economic life is unveiled to the four-day meeting sponsored by the National Council of Churches.

Doctors Note Acid-Burned Eyes Worsen

News Report Notes Troops Ready to Sail

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—Col. Samuel Drew Pearson, declared in a special column that the U. S. second armored division definitely has been alerted for shipment from Germany to the invasion-charged Middle East. The defense and state departments earlier this week categorically denied a similar report carried in the Hartford (Conn.) Times. But Pearson said his "own careful check" convinced him the alert had been ordered. Although it has been denied officially, and though the orders may be changed, the columnist said: "There is no question but that an alert has been sent to the second armored division." The columnist prepared to call to Saudi Arabia in 30 days. He also wrote that arrangements were made for the British to "support" the second armored division with air support. The troops concerned, he said, were given "no knowledge as to what their mission will be or whether the orders will be countermanded." But Pearson said there is speculation the division would be used to protect American citizens in Saudi Arabia where some 5,000 to 6,000 Americans are employed by the Arabian-American Oil Company. The columnist said an order has been sent to the third division at Fort Knox, Ky., to prepare to move to Germany to replace the second if the latter actually is sent to Saudi Arabia. The third division, Pearson said, had originally been scheduled to leave for Germany Aug. 15. Capt. James Cook, British air corps, was the first to use citrus juice to fight shipboard scurvy.

Patent Suit Filed On Atom Process

LONDON, April 14 (AP)—Britain's atomic energy authority has been sued for patent infringement in a case similar to one that cost the U. S. government \$200,000 three years ago. It was announced today.

The seven scientists who took out the patent include the late Enrico Fermi and Giuseppe Bruno Pontecorvo, who is now working in Russia. The U. S. treasury is holding \$20,000 for Pontecorvo as his share in the 1952 judgment.

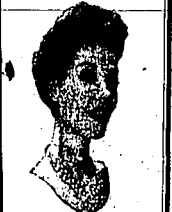

Lookout Station on Notch Butte South of Shoshone Extends Man's Eyes



Present-day view from Notch Butte as windswept and silent as the early pioneers and emigrants found it. From the top on a clear day, the Shoshone mountains to the north stand in sharp focus. Striking in all directions is the desert with small, rolling hills. Indians still make the notch in the butte their headquarters. At present, a large band of sheep is grazing around the bottom of the butte.

Magic Valley Tours Butte Near Shoshone, Landmark for Ages, Continues to Serve Mankind

Going north on highway 93 two and one-half miles south of Shoshone is a landmark that's prominent as a high peak on a bald head. It's the Notch Butte lookout station for the bureau of land management.

The butte looks like two but really only one with a crease in the middle. Although its actual height is not great, the butte "lowers" down the flat desert and probably was used as a lookout spot for both Indians and whites long before the lookout station was built in 1944.

Although manned only during the season, which usually runs from June 1 through Sept. 30, the BLM welcomes visitors to the 14-by-14-foot structure that contains almost as much window glass as it does wood. From it can be seen a goodly portion of Magic Valley, making the location an ideal one for a fire watch. The lookout is located approximately one-half mile east of

the highway and can be reached over a good road—as desert roads go. "Probably of volcanic origin, the butte has figured prominently in the history of southern Idaho. Reference to it even is included in some of the old Indian legends about the area, from its sight an Indian brave, with his stolen bride, watched as his pursuers closed the gap to freedom. Rather than be returned as captives, he and his bride faced almost certain death by taking to the tall but less flows that were creeping down from the Craters of the Moon.

The old stagecoach trail from Shoshone to Shoshone falls wound close to its base and there is an unverified story that a cave just east of the butte once was used as a hiding place for some gold bars stolen from an Oregon Short Line train between Shoshone and Minkola.

As a matter of fact, there are many small caves in the area and whether or not Notch Butte of Rattlesnake cave was the actual one used for the cache isn't known.

Rattlesnake cave can be reached by taking the first road below the cave and going east for one mile. While the road can be negotiated, travel on it is not recommended because of the high center and large rocks.

Today, the cave is about 75 feet long. Caves have shortened it considerably. The entrance is 8 or 10 feet high but even though the first section narrows down rather rapidly it is possible to crawl through a cavern to another cavern.

Some people in Shoshone have heard the rumor the cave was blasted intentionally to prevent children from becoming lost in it since, rumor claims, the cave once wound its way to Snake river. Most people feel, however, that the caves are natural phenomena.

The state highway department usually stores dynamite in the cave to use in road construction work. Two steel truck beds which came from World War I army surplus trucks were put in the cave for this purpose before World War II.

One bed is turned bottom-side up over the other, the engines forming a double door. Inside is a false wooden floor upon which the dynamite is stored. The explosives are not kept in the cave during the winter but are taken to the district "powder magazine" only after the weather is sufficiently dry to prevent spoiling.

Highway employes point out there is no danger from the dynamite. They also report that the walls of

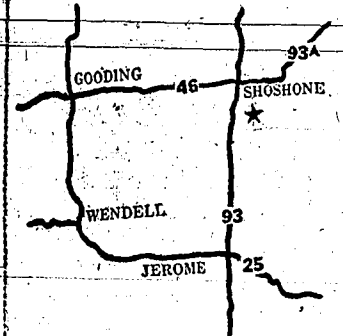

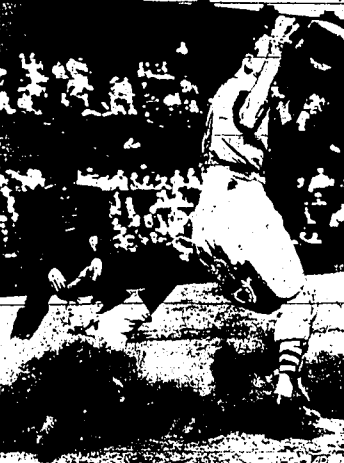

Asphalt Foam Eyed for New A-Waste Bins

TWIN FALLS, April 14 (AP)——A cheap, easy-to-use, long-lasting garbage container made of asphalt foam is being developed by a local inventor.

The new plastic will produce a light, strong, liquid waste container that will not break or leak, without leaking away like the present.

It is made from a special form of asphalt, resembling a blown-up honeycomb, and may be the answer to the problem of already used cans to prevent loss of water from sewage.

Dr. Arnold J. Holberg of the Lion Chemical Company, 2100 N. 2nd St., Twin Falls, is developing the new material. He reported tests at the Idaho Laboratory, Boise, in which the asphalt foams stood up to acids and chemical reactions such as would occur in bins of radioactive atomic waste.

They estimate bins with these linings could be built at a cost of three to five per gallon of capacity. Cost of other storage materials range from 27 cents to \$1 per gallon. Cheap storage of dangerous waste is important in local coal fields for the homes and industry from the atom.

Several years of testing will be needed to show the practicality of the new asphalt-lined cans, Dr. Holberg said.

Dr. Holberg and Watson said one estimate is that by the year 2000, 50 to 600 thousand gallons of radioactive wastes every day, 50 to 60 million gallons of water are essential to safeguard humans and animal health.

Magic Valley Hobbies No. 16 Woman Turns Necessary Chore Into Hobby That Gives Others Enjoyment

Eating is a peculiar thing. Like breathing, it's a necessity; but unlike breathing, strictly an "either-or" proposition, eating has overtones and undertones. It can be a pleasure or a chore. It can be overdone or underdone. It can be taken at random or regularly and the intake can be varied or monotonous.

It would be difficult to make breathing a hobby. The actual act of eating, too, doesn't lend itself to a hobby, unless one wishes to take on a battle with the bathroom scales. But the art of preparing food can be and often does become a hobby.

Mrs. Carl David Hansen, being a wife and mother, cooks because that is part of her work. But her cooking is more than a household chore. She likes to cook, and liking it, goes above and beyond the call of duty.

To her, cooking is more than a necessity. It's a hobby.

Many foods, in their natural state, seem to demand to be eaten. Take, for example, a red, juicy apple. It appeals to the eye and memories of other apples set the taste buds to tingling. Before long, hungry or not, you're on your way around another apple.

Other foods, just as nourishing, need help to fulfill their aim in life. That's where the cook comes in. But some cooks have only the ability to serve food just as flat and unappealing in appearance as the original article. They drown vegetables in

water, put a black crust on meat and wrap pie filling in sole leather.

Not so with Mrs. Hansen and she has five tasters to prove it. Her husband and five children are voracious boosters of her culinary ability.

As a girl, Mrs. Hansen was a member of a large family. She had two sisters and five brothers and as soon as her sisters and mother learned to cook, she was a "fair" for cooking, they turned that work over to her while they handled the housework and the gardening. The fact she had pulled that work over to her while still limited her outdoor activities, probably was a contributing factor which helped channel her interests.

For a short time she worked in a bakery, learning something of the fundamentals of cake decorating, but for the most part, she has been on her own.

There seems to be something of a scientist in a good cook, says scientists, they use formulas (recipes) of others in their fields, but improvise and experiment along the way in an attempt to improve the result.

Health of Ike Shapes up as Top '56 Issue

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—The Democratic campaign is making President Eisenhower's health a top campaign issue. It may be the "Dewey" device of 1952 against Mr. Eisenhower's re-election.

The highly edited "Dewey" device is 36 pages this month to what it terms: "The big new issue for 1964, the part-time presidency." It is published by the Democratic National Committee.

The part-time presidency section contains a hard-hitting discussion of Mr. Eisenhower's physical ability to perform the duties of his office. This is by Sen. John J. Sparkman, D. Ala., the 1952 Democratic vice presidential nominee. Sparkman accuses the limitations on the President's activities already have created a "vacuum of leadership."

"The real burden of the presidency—the policy and command decisions—cannot be reduced to a minimum," said the American people will never agree to demotion of the president at a time when the world looks to the American chief executive for strength and leadership.

The section draws on editorial comments from both Republican and Democratic papers to suggest a "Dewey" device of 1952 against Mr. Eisenhower and his ability to carry on. Part of the section implied Vice President Richard M. Nixon would be "convinced to convey the message that Mr. Eisenhower would like to drop him from the 1964 ticket."

Other opponents of Mr. Eisenhower have had from a somewhat different direction. The National Farmers Union telegraphed him yesterday a plan to sign the Nixon bill. The telegram was addressed to Augusta, Ga., and suggested that the President pause in the midst of a round of golf there to give sympathetic thought to the farmers of the United States.

The issue that the President plays too much and works too little is established now as part of the opposition campaign strategy.

From that theme will develop others likely to engulf the 1964 campaign with hard words and personal exchanges among the political principals. The health theme cannot slip short of at least a gentle nudge at the question whether Mr. Eisenhower has reasonable expectation of surviving a second term.

Water Shortages Hearing Delayed

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—A congressional hearing on water shortage problems in the upper Columbia river basin, scheduled next week, has been postponed indefinitely.

Senator Murray D. Monk, chairman of a Senate committee which held hearings last month and was to resume them next week, announced scheduled witnesses have submitted statements covering their views.

Need to Halt U.S. Mental Ills Noted

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon said yesterday that unless steps are taken to curb mental illness "one out of every 10 babies born today is doomed to spend some part of his life within the walls of a mental hospital."

Nixon said "sympathy is staggered by this almost unbelievable toll of human suffering."

The vice president spoke at the dedication of the new Dorothy Lynde Dix Pavilion at St. Elizabeth's hospital, a federal mental institution here.

"An economic terms, mental illness imposes a direct tax burden of over one billion dollars a year," Nixon said. "That represents the known cost of caring for more than 650,000 mental patients across the nation and the payment of pensions to war veterans discharged for psychiatric disabilities."

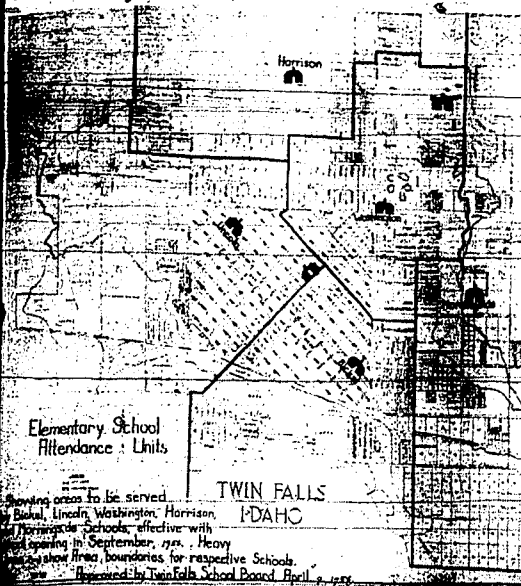

City Divided for New Schools



This city map shows how Twin Falls has been divided into five elementary school districts in preparation for the opening of the **Marionette and Harrison schools next fall.** Starting from left of map, the Lincoln school district boundary comes into city from north on Sparks street, goes at Filer avenue west and goes down to Heyburn avenue west, east on Heyburn avenue to the alley between Harrison and Tyler streets, down to Addison avenue, across to Sixth avenue north, over to Shoshone street, out to Washington street south, the Bickel district boundary to the west is Washington street south and Shoshone street, west Sixth avenue east to Locust street, south to Astor street and then east. The Harrison district has a common west and south boundary with the Lincoln district. From the alley between Harrison and Tyler streets, the Harrison boundary goes north to Borah avenue, east to Buchanan street and north on Buchanan to the city limits, east to Blue Lakes boulevard north, up one block to include Spruce avenue, south to the north boundary of the high school, then north on an extension of Madison street north. The Morrison district boundary comes straight south on Madison street north, north to follow the Perrine course across Addison avenue east, down the alley between Poplar avenue and Ninth avenue east to Locust street and south to a joint boundary with the Bickel school. The Washington district lies in the center of the other four districts, having common boundaries with each. (Twin Falls school district map—staff copy.)

Five Elementary School Zones Planned In Preparation for Two New Buildings

Twin Falls has been divided into five zones for elementary schools in anticipation of opening the **Marionette and Harrison schools next fall.** A thorough study of school census plus actual registration of children expected to start school next fall, according to **Superintendent H. J. Haglund.** He expressed the hope that the zoning plan would meet with popular approval. Each of the five elementary schools had to be assigned a quota of students and the quota distributed properly distributed by grade level. The quotas are: **Lincoln school, 110; Harrison school, 110; Morrison school, 110; Washington school, 110; and Bickel school, 110.** Old boundaries governing Lincoln, Bickel and Washington were respected as much as possible. **Marionette and Harrison schools** will serve the area east of the city and north of Rock creek area. South Park and labor camp children have been assigned to Bickel school. **Superintendent Haglund notes that** **Shannon and Union** rural schools are not affected in any way. **Lakeview**, the junior high school and high school are not involved. **With the opening of the two new schools next fall, each grade will be returned to the elementary school according to the zones in which they live.** For the last two or three years, all sixth graders have been taught in the junior high school building to relieve congestion in the elementary schools.

County, DHIA Report Shows Herd Testings

With lists of the total of 1,972 cows in the Twin Falls County Herd Improvement Association tested in March, each cow averaged about one pound of butterfat each day. While there were 417 individual cows averaged 41.7 pounds of butterfat for the month, there were only nine herds that made this average. The two high herds in the county were owned by Clarence Kautzman and son, Filer, and Dan Kautzman and son, Filer. The first herd averaged 49.5 pounds of butterfat from 19 head of grade Holsteins, all milking. Dan Kautzman's 17 head of mixed breeds yielded an average of 47.7 pounds of butterfat in the first unit that averaged more than 40 pounds of butterfat were 23 cows, 23 cows, 41.7, and T. W. Richmond with 25 of 37 milking, averaged 41.1 pounds of butterfat. There were no 40 pound herd averages in unit three due to the higher percentage of dry cows. A grade Holstein owned by Jess Gorman in unit three was the highest cow in the county, she produced 102.9 pounds of butterfat from 1,200 pounds of milk. Second high was a grade Holstein owned by T. W. Richmond, unit one, with a yield of 97.3 pounds of butterfat from 1,810 pounds of milk. L. J. Tenckhoff had the third ranking cow, a registered Holstein, that produced 90.3 pounds of butterfat from 2,150 pounds of milk.

BIRMINGHAM, Calif., April 14 (AP)—It is not just a fact that life exists elsewhere than on earth in the form of beings with mental equipment of some kind, Dr. Harold Shapley, Harvard astronomer, said yesterday. Recent findings of biological sciences which show only habitable differences between living and non-living things make this conclusion inevitable, Dr. Shapley told a news conference here to deliver a lecture at University of California, the astronomer said at least 10,000 galaxies like our own Milky way can be seen with the largest telescopes and that a countless thousands of others probably exist. School Budget OK'd at Meet

Wendell April 14.—The proposed budget for Wendell class school district No. 273 was adopted unanimously at a meeting held last night in the high school assembly room.

W. A. Rider, superintendent, presented the proposed budget, and for the 1934-35 fiscal year is \$24,141.11. This is an increase of \$27,223.23 over the valuation of 1933 which remained the same for six years.

The increase in valuation has made it possible for the district to make an increase in teachers' wages and increase in equipment, he said. Over one-half of this valuation is a result of Idaho Power and other utility companies.

A \$25,000 bill will not be the district's total indebtedness for the 1934-35 school term. Additional revenue will be realized from state and county funds, totaling \$82,175.

Rider announced that approximately 6 million dollars in state bonds will be issued to meet the interest and retirement of bonds in the amount of \$224,474.79.

The expenditures for 1934-35 include administration, \$14,448; teachers' salaries, \$10,000; maintenance, \$1,145,404; janitors' wages, heat, light and supplies, \$19,400; materials, \$1,000; equipment, \$2,500; transportation and social security, \$12,200; fixed charges, \$1,000; improvement on buildings and grounds, \$1,112,142; retirement of bonds and interest, \$217,212.
