Dulles Says 'No' To French Meet

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The state department disclosed yesterday Secretary Dulles has rejected all French proposal for a special U. S. British-French meeting on the Middle East at Paris early next month.

French Ambassador Maurice Couve de Murville was notified that Dulles felt such a meeting might undercut the current peace mission to the troubled area by United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld.

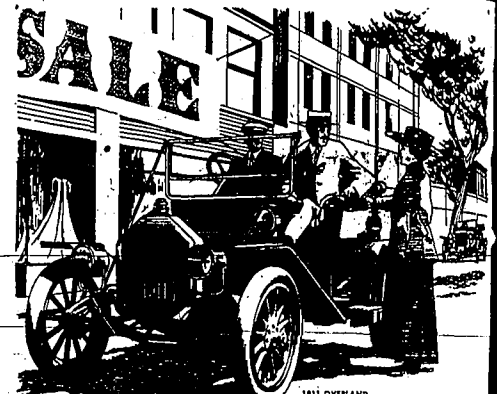

Concern Felt Over Lack of U. S. Policies

LONDON, April 17 (AP)—Britain is becoming increasingly worried that lack of a firm U. S. policy in the Middle East is hurting the West in that troubled area.

Government and financial circles here believe this decline in influence is endangering the vast oil investments which are important to both countries in the area. There is a growing struggle for power in the Arab world, and the stakes are high. Two-thirds of the world's known oil reserves lie under Middle Eastern sands.

Depends on Oil

Britain's financial-solvency depends on the steady flow of revenue from her oil field in Iraq and Kuwait. United States oil companies, too, have big investments in Arab lands.

There is a feeling in London that the United States is afraid of antagonizing Arab chiefs because it is upsetting Arab oil investments, but this fear is contributing to the general breakdown of Western prestige.

Many Britons are calling for the Western stand now to prevent further deterioration of the Western position and to head off an Arab revolt or explosion of nationalisms such as that which took place a few years ago in Iran.

No Signs Seen

But there is no sign that Washington is sympathetic to the idea, despite the fact that it is a matter of economic life or death for Britain. There is little doubt that Britain and Western prestige in the Middle East are on the wane. From the tiny Bahrain islands in the Persian Gulf to the vast desert kingdom of Libya in North Africa, the swelling call of Arab nationalism is gradually winning control of the minds of 40 million Arabs. It is being helped along by sympathetic communist propaganda.

Decline Seen in U. S. Production

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—The federal reserve board says that industrial production declined slightly last month instead of showing the usual rise.

The board said yesterday that the March decline was due to the failure of durable goods production to show the usual seasonal increase. It said auto output also declined during the month.

The board's industrial production index was still seven points above the level of March, 1955. But the auto production index was almost 10 per cent below its March, 1955 level.

17.3 Billion Is Needed to Aid Highway Plan

OAKLAND, Calif., April 17 (AP)—A government official estimates the 11 western states must spend \$17,300,000,000 to bring their highways up to date for the traffic expected in 1964.

This estimate came yesterday from A. C. Clark, deputy commissioner of the U. S. bureau of public roads, who spoke to 350 delegates attending the western public works conference.

Discussing the "populard" federal highway program, Clark said: "Never before in the history of highway development has there been such a public understanding of the highway deficiencies that exist, of the cost and consequence of driving over poor roads and of the economic benefits of riding over highways designed and constructed to modern standards."

Another speaker, J. P. Murphy, principal highway engineer for California, said a federal highway program is needed this year if the state is to meet its backlog of highway needs.

He urged that federal funds be spent on the basis of state highway needs.

Forces Ready To Battle Any Flood Waters

BOISE, April 17 (AP)—The army engineers told Gov. Robert L. Smith yesterday they will spend \$144,000 on emergency preparations to meet widespread floods expected in Idaho this spring.

At the same time, Smith said the flood reports from the U. S. weather bureau and soil conservation service show the flood threat remains undiminished on the Kootenai, Snake and other river watersheds.

But he told newsmen that federal, state and local agencies have reached a stage of pre-flood preparation superior to anything ever achieved in the past in Idaho.

"We're going to remain in a state of alert," the governor said.

The weather bureau and soil conservation service say many portions of the Columbia river basin are endangered by spring runoffs which will come from a record snowpack in the mountains.

Particularly threatened in Idaho are Bonanza Ferry on the Kootenai river, Weiler and other communities in the middle Snake river, and the Libby, and some towns in the upper Snake river valley.

"The latest predictions on run-off conditions are not much different from what we have been anticipating," Smith said.

"But if we get a heavy precipitation and heavy runoff at the same time we'll be in bad shape in a lot of places."

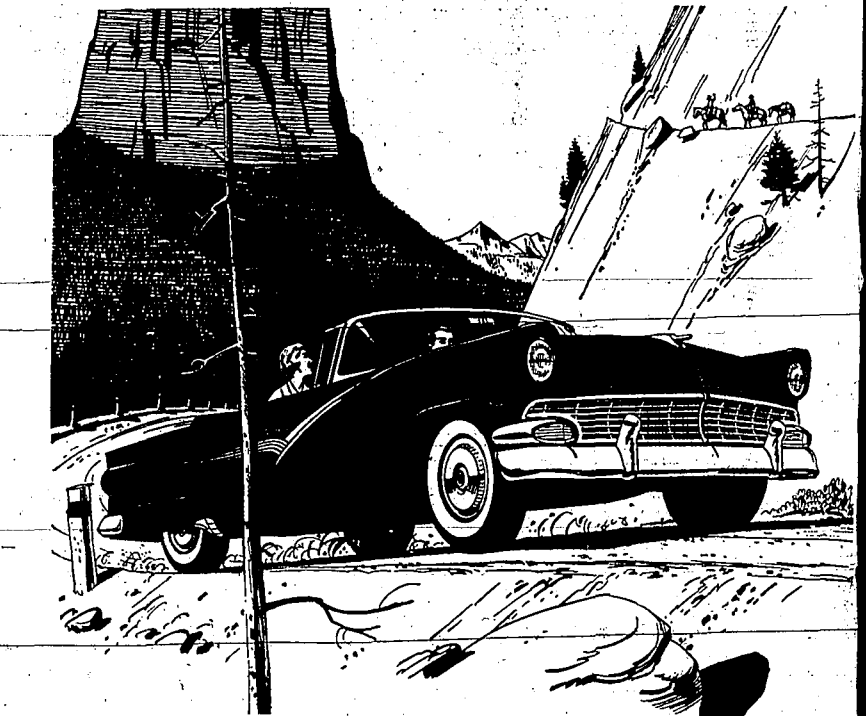
