It takes a two-thirds vote of both the senate and house to override a veto. Since the house failed to override, no senate action was necessary. The roll call vote on the motion to override was 211 yeas and 202 nays.

Kefauver Is Drubbed In New Jersey Ballot

NEWARK, N. J., April 18 (AP)—Gov. Robert B. Meyner won a near-shutout victory over Sen. Estes Kefauver in the New Jersey primary race for 56 Democratic national votes, almost complete returns showed today. With more than three-fourths of the votes counted, Kefauver was assured only one of eleven delegates with a half vote at the Democratic national convention in August in Chicago. He had hoped to win eight to 10 votes. Kefauver showed early strength in south Jersey in the paper ballot counties but it was not sufficient to offset the organizational turnout in populous Camden county. His supporters conceded their entire eight-vote slate of pledged delegates about midnight.

Cocktails Eyed To Stop Attack

LOS ANGELES, April 18 (AP)—Special cocktails served before each meal are a new clue to preventing heart attack.

These cocktails reduce the amount of a fat-like material, cholesterol, in the bloodstream. Plugs or deposits of cholesterol in the arteries to the heart are by current theory largely blamed for bringing on heart attacks.

But time and more research are needed to show whether this treatment actually does ward off heart attacks, Doctors Mauro M. Best, Jr., and Charles H. Duncan of University of Louisville school of medicine said yesterday in a report to the American College of Physicians.

Archbishop Tells Of Possible Plan

LONDON, April 18 (AP)—The archbishop of Canterbury said he would be embarrassed if he had to meet Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist Party Chief Nikita S. Khrushchev while they are visiting Britain.

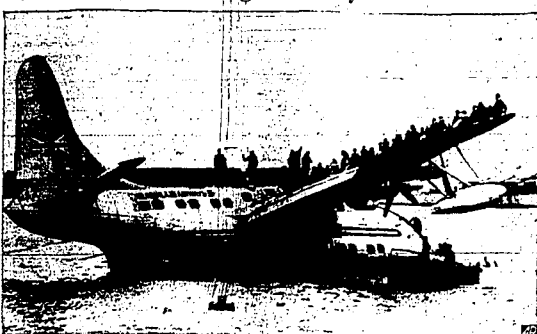

SEC Opposes Pool Plan for Power Groups

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—The securities and exchange commission yesterday opposed a bill which would let corporations enter a pool for development of power resources without being subject to the 1935 public utility holding act.

J. Stanley Armstrong, SEC chairman, told a Senate Interstate Commerce subcommittee the proposed exemption would be "contrary to the interests of both consumers and investors."

The bill is sponsored by Senator Potter, R. Mich., and several other senators. They said it has two main purposes:

1. To permit industrial companies to join with utilities in the development of atomic reactors to produce electricity without subjecting the industrial firms to regulation as utility companies.

2. To permit electric utilities to pool financial resources for such projects as dams to produce electricity by hydro energy without coming under the holding company law.

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Odds were quoted at something over 1,000 to one today that the United States won't match Britain's new national lottery.

The British government announced yesterday it will conduct a lottery for savings bond buyers. Purchasers will get their bonds, but no interest. The interest will be paid in the form of three monthly prizes of about \$2,000 per \$100 bond.

Conceded Defeat

Rep. Paul A. Flato, R., N. Y., author of the only lottery bill offered in this session of congress, conceded today his proposal hasn't a ghost of a chance.

"It's not as if the bill was there," he told a reporter. He said congressmen tell him privately they are "all for me" but in public—no.

Other congressmen, he agreed, are opposed to a U. S. lottery because they are in the point of non-attendance. Congress has refused repeatedly in recent decades even to consider a lottery law.

Cites Figures

Flato, himself a gambler, says all out of every 10 American dollars are in the form of a year's lottery or illegal, and much of it goes to racketeers and criminals. Uncle Sam could easily raise in 10 billion dollars of the way he maintains.

Leaky Barrel Sheds Poison On Workmen

SALT LAKE CITY, April 18 (AP)—A drum containing a deadly chemical sprang a leak yesterday, touching off a search for persons who have come in contact with the chemical.

Police finally isolated nine persons and had four hospitalized for observation. But last night it appeared that none of them had been seriously harmed by their exposure.

The 60-gallon steel drum contained an oily liquid called Parathion, officials described it as an organic phosphorus compound that acts on humans something like a nerve gas. They said exposure to the poison could cause death if the subject went without treatment.

The drum was leaking when four workmen handled it at a Salt Lake City trucking firm. Leaking drums were found yesterday. Apparently unaware of the deadly nature of the poison, the men washed their faces and went home when their shift ended.

But it's a suspect line. It's 2-10-45 that Louis Thompson just burnished up a dove and showed it to his poem as a prop. He wanted to bring on his prop—and justly famous line. He desperately needed a dove to rhyme with the bird in the next line. He got the dove through a young man's fairly light turns to thoughts of so that exploded the dove theory. How about the robin theory?

When the first red robin comes bobbin' along, is it always spring? No indeed. More often than not, this eager beaver pilot of the bird

Always gets his landing gear stuck in the last snow of winter.

Robins are notorious for jumping the gun—and getting their rudders so hooked up they can't steer... and making crash landings... and living on the bread-crumbs charity of old maids and nannies till winter-chaw.

Well, if not the birds, how about the bees? "Till you the truth, bees don't get a buzz on until flowers start firing the trigger signal flags—and flowers are awful liars about spring. E. B. White once hallooed the first spring flower, if memory serves as follows:

A bulbous plant, the little crocus, Always first in spring to peep—her head up.

But even a crocus will crack in the freeze that follows the first false spring. So early the bird-bee-flower theories. What time-honored signs are left? Love and April. And both seem to be fairly reliable.

Let's consider the month first.

Sam Coltrane pointed out: "The month before the month of May, and spring comes slowly up this way." Bob Browning longed "Oh, to be in England, now that April's there." Jeff Chaucer allowed it was a fine month for pilgrims.

Some time during the magical days that April is laughing and weeping her girlish laughter and tears, the young man's fairy starts to turn, and his pose—as Jim Thompson has said—"gentle spring." Edmund Spenser's "mildness"

No less an American personage than Ralph Waldo Emerson has summed up the whole thing with irrefutable Emersonian logic:

The April winds are musical. The garden-walks are pastoral. To beachelors and damsels. If nature is not to be trusted for spring signs in New York, there are other signs of the season. The title of the first cream cart replaces the aroma of the hot roasted chestnut wagon. Kids bring sidewalk hopscotch in game known in Brooklyn as "pottery."

Quake of 1906 Is Recalled in California City

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18 (AP)—A five-day festival of progress began today at 8:15 a.m.—exactly half a century after the start of the worst disaster ever to strike an American city.

It was at that minute on April 18, 1906, that a great earthquake shook the city of San Francisco. Even before the tremors subsided, tongues of flame began finishing the destruction that the quake had begun.

Fire Rages

The fire raged for three days and nights and when it was over the heart of the queen city of the west was in ruins.

Some 50 years afterward, San Francisco is celebrating the "Rebirth" of the city. The disaster-gathered crowd of 100,000 people gathered in the city's main square, the "Embarcadero," today to hear an invocation and "lay a wreath" in memory of the 500 persons who lost their lives.

A round of luncheons and banquets were scheduled for the next four days and the celebration will be climaxed Sunday by a huge parade.

Loss Is Impressive

Even to the world familiar with mass destruction—the San Francisco earthquake of 1906—the extent of the San Francisco disaster of 1906 is impressive. The total loss was estimated at over \$500,000,000. The quake and fire wiped out 800 blocks and destroyed 28,000 buildings. Close to 200,000 persons were left homeless.

The earthquake came from the San Andreas fault, a 270-mile crack in the earth's structure running along the coast of California and passing the Golden Gate a few miles out to sea. Massive tension mounted along the fault line until the breaking point came.

The shock brought thousands of people streaming into streets. Many were killed by falling beams and the early early hour undoubtedly kept the death toll lower than it might have been if the streets were crowded.

Streets Block

Flames from buildings collapsed streets sunk five feet in some places and cable car tracks were torn from their beds and twisted like snakes. Most ominous of all, however, were the flickering flames that began to burn out of the rubble.

Since water mains had been fractured by the shock, firemen had to pump water from a few miles out in their efforts to halt the flames. Martial law was declared. Rubbish piled up and a few days later the city was a scene of desolation.

Many firemen finally lined up at Van Ness avenue for a last stand. Backfires built along the east side of that wide thoroughfare, proving the turning point in the battle. The fire stopped at Van Ness avenue.

Boost for Strep Infection Incidence Is Noted in 3-Month Medical Report

The quarterly activity report of the southern district health department for the first quarter indicates an increase of streptococcal infections in the area.

Prepared by Dr. Cecil Reinstein, the report covers Blaine, Casalia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties. Influenza cases investigated during the quarter totaled 194. It is estimated the number of influenza cases which occurred during the period approached 10 times the number of reported cases.

His report says cases of diagnosed and reported influenza were unusually severe. Communicable diseases control activities included investigations of influenza, measles, chickenpox, mumps, rheumatic fever, infectious hepatitis, syphilis, encephalitis, meningitis, amoebic dysentery, scarlet fever, cancer and yersinia.

The report shows an increase in childhood typhoid diseases and a high rate of "chickenpox" was noted in adults, including one fatal case.

A survey of 83 school children was made in Gooding following the occurrence of three cases of ringworm in kindergarten and school children.

During the quarter public health nurses made a total of 1,746 visits. Because of a few infectious hepatitis cases among students in Minidoka county, a spot check was made at the school lunch facilities to make recommendations for proper handling of food and equipment.

Bathrooms have been active with individual water supply problems. Over 300 wells have been inspected and sampled. Of this number, 22 including one Jerome county school, were found to be contaminated. After recommended reconstruction of pumping equipment installation to prevent accidental contamination and treatment, 19 wells delivered safe supplies.

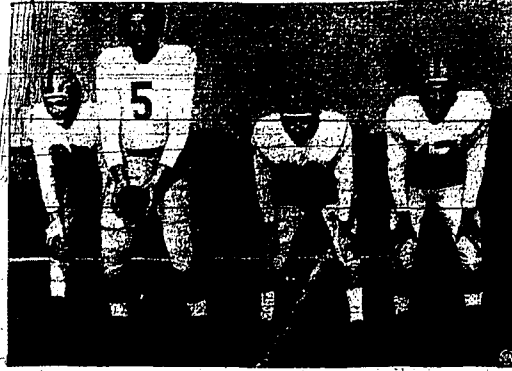
